Bill Nye rules, lines drool: Tickets gone

Bill Nye tickets are bye-bye.

The box office of the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts, which will host the '90s icon at 8 p.m., distributed all 1,550 free tickets within an hour, said Todd Taylor, a spokesman for UF Performing Arts.

By 12:50 p.m., all tickets were sold out to UF students, leaving none for the public.

Taylor said if weather permits, the event will be projected on a screen outside. The venue has made similar arrangements for past speakers such as Neil deGrasse Tyson.

A few students with tickets have taken to the event's Facebook page and Craigslist to sell them for prices as steep as \$100 per ticket.

Accent Speaker's Bureau chairman Daniel Landesberg said he looked into the Stephen C. O'Connell Center for a larger venue, but Nye was only available today, which conflicts with the Gators basketball game

against Middle Tennessee.

"At the end of the day, we can have Bill Nye speak to 2,000 students, or we can have Bill Nye not speak at all," he said.

Devin Holland arrived at the Phillips Center after his class ended at 11:30 a.m. and was unable to get a ticket. He said the line for tickets snaked around the building — even in gloomy weather.

"I knew I would be able to get a ticket if I skipped class, but I couldn't afford to skip class," said the 24-year-old UF electrical engineering junior.

County forum sifts out residents' concerns

Homelessness and water protection surfaced as recurring themes on Wednesday when residents and officials gathered at the Santa Fe Kirkpatrick Center for the Alachua County legislative delegation hearing.

Sen. Rob Bradley, Rep. Clovis Watson Jr., Rep. Keith Perry and Rep. Elizabeth Porter attended to hear the concerns and issues regarding Alachua and surrounding counties.

At the beginning, Perry reminded at-

tendees that the lawmakers were not there to act on behalf of a particular group.

"Our job is to represent you, and I encourage you to express concerns as individuals or in small groups and make sure you understand our open door policy," he said. "We represent a large group of constituents and individuals."

Community members discussed topics that included funding requests for UF and Santa Fe College, concerns for local victims of human sex and labor trafficking, and local support for eliminating the death penalty in

Florida.

A common issue brought up by numerous constituents and officials was the protection of local water.

Jean Robinson, a representative from the League of Women Voters, said protecting local water is of the utmost importance for Floridians.

"Water is Florida's golden egg," she said. "Let's not kill that goose."

Lee Pinkoson, an Alachua County commissioner, said that "anything we could do

Snap away, selfie-lovers: Dictionary nods to trend

That girl puckering her lips at her phone in class is now validated by Oxford Dictionaries.

The editors of the reference guide have revealed their 2013 word of the year: "selfie." And, like it or not, many students say they can't deny the amount of face time the word gets.

Selfie is defined as "a photograph that one has taken of oneself, typically one taken with a smartphone or webcam and uploaded to a social media website," according to the Oxford Dictionaries, which added selfie earlier in the year. It beat out words like "twerk," "binge-watch" and "bitcoin."

Last year's Oxford Dictionaries word of the year was "GIF."

Language change such as the acceptance of the word selfie occurs when people need different ways to express new ideas and to help show off their social identities, said UF linguistics professor Wind Cowels.

He said that type of change has been happening since language began.

"Social media, and the (Internet) generally, encourages communication among people who might otherwise have never come into contact, and allows us to form, expand and maintain social groups in an unprecedented way," Cowels said in an email interview. "As a linguist, I find the language change that emerges from that social interaction to be fascinating."

For many students, the winning word doesn't come as a surprise because in a social-media-driven society, selfie is thrown around all the time.

Molly Delattre, a 22-year-old UF English senior, is not a supporter or participant but still said she finds it appropriate the word won the top title.

"I hear the word at least 10 times a

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UF Greeks trying to save water

Sustainable UF has challenged Greek Gators to cap their water usage.

"It's a contest where we're harnessing the competitive nature of students to raise their awareness of water conservation," said Stacie Greco, water conservation coordinator for the Alachua County Environmental Protection Department.

The competition is a partnership between Alachua County and Sustainable UF, said Laurel Nesbit, program assistant for the UF Office of Sustainability.

Greco said the campaign seeks to emphasize to students in fraternities and sororities the connection between their personal water use and the effect on the springs they like to frequent.

Points are earned through two channels — the first being weekly checks of each house's percentage reduction in water use and the next being weekly challenges.


The challenges include activities such as playing games at the Sustainability Hut, creating banners and attending presentations about water conservation.

To participate, the houses must register by Dec. 4, said Nesbit, and the contest will take place from Jan. 20 until March 2.

Sustainable UF will be distributing shower timers to all participating houses, as well as low-flow shower heads to the fraternities, which weren't involved in the contest last year, and all the sorority houses that did not participate.

Prizes were donated by Ginnie Springs and Blue Springs, said Nesbit, and include donations to philanthropies and ticket packages to the parks.

"Their livelihood is really dependent on how well the aquifer is doing," she said. "They're very directly impacted by water conservation efforts."

for water and bill protection is encouraged because water will be a critical issue as we move forward."

The issue of homelessness in Alachua County also surfaced several times.

Randy Wells, a Gainesville city commissioner, stood to hold the deed for the Gainesville Correctional Institution, the

building they recently acquired to create a center for the homeless.

Pinkoson said homelessness remains an enormous issue. He requested \$1 million to assist in organizing an Empowerment Center with food, shelter and other resources for the underprivileged.

"Our No. 1 priority, homelessness, is a big issue that's been languishing for decades," he said, "and I think we finally

have a solution."

Mayor Ed Braddy touched on the increasing need to re-evaluate the area of "complex" governance of Gainesville Regional Utilities.

"We are beginning discussions to find a voice for the 30 percent of customers who live outside city limits," he said.

The 2014 Legislative Session starts March 4.

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Isis King spreads transgender awareness

Sleek and confident, Isis King was met by loud cheers as the former "America's Next Top Model" contestant turned the conference room into a runway.

King, who was the first transgender woman to compete on the show, spoke to about 120 people on Transgender Day of Remembrance and offered her life's story in encouragement Wednesday night.

After holding a moment of silence for the transgender community, she began by showing a clip from "Born in the Wrong Body," a 2007 MSNBC documentary that featured her story of transitioning from a male to a female.



King

King, 28, said from a young age, she had an indescribable feeling about her gender.

"I knew I was different," she said. "I knew I was a little girl."

At 21, King said, she began the transition process, and in 2008, she became a contestant for the 11th cycle of "America's Next Top Model."

"I was completely scared," she said. "So many people said so many negative and scary things."

In 2011, King entered the show again for the 17th cycle.

She now works as a freelance fashion designer, model and speaker and lives in New York City.

"You can't allow others to dictate who you are or who you are going to be," she said.

Collin Vernay, the director of programming in Pride Student Union's internal cabinet, said King was given \$4,000 to speak.

The 20-year-old UF psychology and sociology junior said King's talk was part of Trans* Days, a three-day campaign to raise awareness and educate students about the community.

Jennifer Heard, a 32-year-old UF alumna, said she went to see King because she thinks it is beneficial to transgender individuals.

"I think that speaking up and showing support for the transgender community is important to me," she said.

King said at the start of the process, her family was not supportive and would not call her by her chosen name.

But today, she said, her family calls her Isis.

"I am not a transgender female," she said. "I'm a woman."

Panic switch: Recognizing, treating anxiety

It starts in subtle ways: a little shaking, some quickened breathing. No one else will notice, but you know the train has left the station. There's no way to stop it.

Crippled, weakened and gasping, you've become a prisoner to your own bedsheets. Pillows become either punching bags or a gag to muffle screams. But the worst is still coming.

In a matter of moments, you turn from a human being to an infant, incapable of controlling your movement, breathing or thoughts. Incomprehensible chaos ensues: thinking of everything at once and nothing at the same time while it feels as if you are being ripped apart.

Control of breathing comes back first, then your heart slows, and finally, the shaking ends. As quickly as it came, without warning or evidence, it all stops. You're left lying in silence, motionless. It's almost a slap in the face. After that display of unbridled terror, everything goes back to normal.

That's a panic attack.

Or at least, that's how I have traditionally experienced them.

I began having panic attacks in high school — sometimes three in one week. Luckily for me, I had a supportive family and friends who encouraged me to get treatment. My senior year, I was diagnosed with generalized anxiety disorder.

It took some therapy and a lot of practice to get me where I am today, and the journey is still far from over. But now I know how to deal with my illness. Even when I know an intense panic attack is coming, I know what to do to stop it before it starts.

If you have anxiety or experience panic attacks, I'm writing this for you: You are not alone, and things don't have to be this way.

In fact, anxiety disorders affect 40 million Americans and cost more than \$42 billion a year.

It can feel isolating, though. It's difficult to talk to people who seem to not have a care in the world when you're worried about stuff you know doesn't make sense. Every time I walk in a room, I look for every exit in case someone becomes the next mass shooter. When I walk

down the street, I constantly watch cars to make sure they aren't running off the road to hit me. I know my worries are mostly unfounded, but they are relentless.

Making the effort to feel better is the hardest step, but it's also the first one. Anxiety is daunting. My mistake was thinking it was bigger than me. Any progress seemed null when the next panic attack rolled around.

But nothing is bigger than you. Once you realize that, coping with anxiety becomes easier.

The next biggest problem I had was getting help. The isolation that comes with anxious thoughts makes it difficult to talk to people about what you're feeling. But everyone understands anxiety. People know what it feels like. It's an emotion. When you talk to people you trust and care about, your words will not fall on deaf ears.

UF has great resources that help immensely. I went to one-on-one counseling at the Counseling and Wellness Center two years ago this semester, and I progressed much faster with guidance than I would have otherwise. Therapy would have been too expensive otherwise, but the center offers free help for students.

Don't doubt people's ability and desire to help you.

More importantly, don't forget you have that same capability.

Don't be a prisoner of your mind any longer.

Art students 'Quarantine' work in Reitz Union Gallery

Dipping his hand into a jar of Vaseline, UF art student Zac Thompson covers his lanky upper torso as if he were using sunscreen, thick enough to shine in the sun.

For further protection, the 21-year-old UF drawing senior wraps his head in plastic wrap.

He then takes a white T-shirt and stretches it over his head. He twists his body inside the shirt until he has the position he wants and sits on a foldout chair in his backyard. His head presses against the shirt, casting an expressionless face into the fabric.

A classmate smothers his frozen figure with sticky, white plaster. He wears the gunk until the mold is dry enough to take off, grabs another shirt and repeats the process, contorting into different positions.

Those plaster molds now accompany his work in the the Gallery at the Reitz Union as part of the "Quarantined" exhibit he and two classmates put together. The exhibit, which is on the second floor near the main stairway, runs through Dec. 5, and the opening reception is tonight from 7 to 9 p.m.

"For me, it's because I think too much," Thompson said about what makes him want to pull his shirt over his head. "That's where it came from: things in life being overwhelming where you want to revert back to a day when you were a kid."

Dounia Bendris, a 21-year-old UF drawing senior, and Hannah Dwyer, a 21-year-old UF printmaking senior, are also featuring work in "Quarantined."

"We all just kind of make work that is based around the idea of isolation," Dwyer said.

The exhibition depicts themes of loneliness, removal from society, uncomfortable situations and feeling mind trapped.

"I see it, instead of keeping something in ... as that idea of being isolated or being quarantined in your head," Bendris said.

One of her drawings shows a woman

sleeping with a breathing mask over her mouth inside a darkened room, something she saw in a dream. She sketched this piece first using charcoal and then used her fingers to smudge the thicker, darker lines into shadows. Her fingerprints slide throughout

most of her work in the gallery.

All three artists will be at the opening reception to talk about their work. Additionally, selected works will be for sale for those interested in purchasing art. Free food and drinks will be provided by Reitz

Union Board Entertainment.

Bendris said outside perspectives are important to artists.

"I have in my head what I want people to think," she said. "But I want to hear what they think."

H&M debuts collab with French designer

Global retail powerhouse H&M debuted its long-awaited collaborative collection with high-end designer Isabel Marant this past week. Isabel Marant pour H&M was available for purchase as of Nov. 14 and was met with out-the-door lines and a frenzy of online activity that briefly shut down the H&M website.

Highly anticipated since its announcement in June, the collection has generated a massive buzz from bloggers, fashion enthusiasts and bargain hunters alike.

Following in the recent footsteps of other retail giants — 3.1 Phillip Lim for Target debuted in September — H&M worked with French designer Marant to create a collection that echoes the style of her main line but is sold at a lower price point.

The collection reflects the eclectic, trendy and characteristically French style of Marant's main collection with oversized sweaters, fitted pants and fringed ankle boots.

Gabrielle Piloto, a 19-year-old UF telecommunication sophomore and CollegeFashionista.com intern, said the H&M collection has some beautiful pieces.

However, with pieces as expensive as \$399, she said she also feels the collection doesn't present many bargains for most shoppers.

"Overall, the collection is too overpriced for the normal H&M customer," Piloto said, "no matter how gorgeous the pieces are."

Prices aside, designer and mass retail collaborations like the Isabel Marant collection have become massively popular in the past few years.

UF marketing professor Richard Lutz noted the collaboration is a type of "co-branding," aimed at creating an even more appealing product

for consumers.

"The idea is that ... there is a strength in both brands, and by combining them, there's an even stronger attraction to the product," Lutz said.

Despite the appeal and anticipation of the collection, it seems the Isabel Marant collection will still be slightly out of reach for most student shoppers.

Dani Shapiro, a 26-year-old California graduate student and style blogger at DailyDaniBlog.com, said the designer pieces are more accessible in theory than in reality.

"Sure, it's cool that they're trying to make the brand accessible, but \$300 jackets at a fast fashion superstore are hardly accessible," she said. "People who can't afford original brand prices still can't afford those prices."



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Stay off your phone or fear a straying partner

Put down that smartphone. Showing your device too much love could lead your partner to infidelity.

According to a recent survey conducted by Victoria Milan, a dating website that provides assistance for people looking to discreetly cheat on their significant others, 45 percent of Victoria Milan users are unfaithful because they feel there is a lack of attention from their partners.

The survey showed that about 50 percent of people on the website shared the feeling of having an unattentive partner.

Among the 6,000 Victoria Milan users that participated in the survey, about 60 percent were male, and about 70 percent of all participants indicated they would not be unfaithful at all without the help of technology.

In an email interview, Aishah Vassallo, the public relations manager of Victoria Milan, said paying more attention to a device than a partner can weaken relationships, "which can lead us many times to look at what is missing in our relationship," she said.

"At the same time, the use of portable devices and websites like VM can make cheating more discreet and easier than before."

However, some UF students and professors are dubious about the merits of the survey. Laurie Mintz, a UF psychology professor specializing in sexual health and behavior, said the results of the survey cannot be generalized to the public outside of the website's users.

"All we know, then, is that for people [that] are already using technology to help them cheat on their partners, smartphone use may also contribute to the problem of cheating," she said.

While many students agree that cheating is an extreme reaction, some think the problem applies to different demographics.

"I feel like it's more a problem with older married couples because when you're our age, you usually haven't been with someone long enough to know everything about them so you focus on them more," said Vivek Kumar, an 18-year-old UF finance sophomore. "Still, if I had this problem, it wouldn't urge me to cheat."

However, Alex Borkholder, a 19-year-old UF political science sophomore, disagrees.

"I see a lot of college-aged couples out and on their phone instead of communicating with each other," he said. "You don't fix problems by cheating. You talk to your partner."



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Florida failing to create turnovers

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Seven starters from a year ago are not the only thing gone from the Gators' defense this season.

The unit's ability to create turnovers has also seemingly vanished.

"That's something we've talked about a lot," coach Will Muschamp said. "We've gone through and tried to emphasize to our players some opportunities that they had to strip the ball, to take the ball away."

Florida has failed to create many turnovers this season.

Through 10 games, the Gators have forced six fumbles and intercepted nine passes; their total of 15 takeaways is tied for 83rd in the nation and tied for ninth in the Southeastern Conference.

Juxtapose that against the 30 turnovers the defense created last season, and it's no surprise the team's overall turnover margin has dipped from plus-15 a year ago to minus-3.

"When I was at Texas, we had a guy named Earl Thomas, who had 10 or 11 interceptions and four or five caused fumbles," Muschamp said. "The next year we weren't as good in turnovers [because] Earl Thomas wasn't there."

Florida has experienced similar upheaval among the players who consistently created turnovers last season. Matt Elam and Jon Bostic — two players who left the Gators for the NFL — totaled eight takeaways a year ago.

"You've got to develop in that role a little bit," Muschamp said. "We've got to take advantage of those opportunities."

Florida's offense has experienced similar regression.

After finishing last season with 15 turnovers, the Gators have already coughed up the football 18 times this season.

"We know how critical it is to our success," defensive coordinator D.J. Durkin said.

"We've got to protect the ball and get the ball out on defense. Obviously, we're not winning in that

Forward flashing versatility for UF

At 6-foot-8, Dorian Finney-Smith is a sight to see when he brings the ball up the court.

With Kasey Hill out for a month with a high left ankle sprain and Scottie Wilbekin still suspended, coach Billy Donovan said he is confident in his newest big man handling the ball during No. 16 Florida's matchup against Middle Tennessee tonight at 7:30 in the O'Connell Center.

Finney-Smith, who was suspended for UF's first two games, returned to the court against Arkansas-Little Rock and helped the team's scoring in the paint and rebounding.

In two games, Finney-Smith has averaged 12.5 points and eight rebounds.

After going 4 of 7 from behind the arc, the Virginia Tech transfer is also Florida's most efficient three-point shooter.

Although Florida has already increased its average points by 11.5 per game and rebounds by 10 per game with Finney-Smith back on the floor, Donovan has to utilize all of the red-shirt sophomore's skill sets because of a limited lineup.

"The pressure that you're relieving is most teams are going to play with pretty much two primary backcourt players," Donovan said.


"So, if [Finney-Smith] is playing the power-forward spot, and he's bringing the ball up the floor and he's initiating the offense, a lot of times it's going to be against a power forward. So, it's a little bit different sometimes. So, I think we can,

based on lineups, move and shuffle people around in different positions based on mismatches in certain situations."

Finney-Smith has experience tak-

ing the ball up the court. Although he never played point guard in his one year with Virginia Tech, he said he played the position in high school

Florida freshman Alex Holston has already earned her spot in the Gators' starting lineup.

But after Wednesday night's three-set victory against Tennessee, Holston proved she is ready to assume Chloe Mann's role

when Mann graduates after the season.

Florida swept Tennessee (25-18, 25-21, 25-17) in Knoxville, Tenn. on Wednesday night.

"We would call that a great bounce-back match," coach Mary Wise said in a postgame radio interview.

Holston had 13 of Florida's 47 kills,

which led the team.

She was also efficient, recording no attack or service errors and notching a hitting percentage of .684.

"Alex showed terrific patience," Wise said.

"Recently she's been a little early. Today she showed more patience and great range."

But Mann is not gone yet. She made 10 kills with an uncharacteristically high number of errors, lowering her hitting percentage to .300.

Sophomore outside hitter Gabby Mallette was the only player to record a block in the first set. Her solo block was one of Florida's (25-3, 14-2 Southeastern Conference) two individual blocks — the other coming from sophomore outside hitter Ziva Recek.

The Gators recorded four team blocks, while the Volunteers (9-20, 1-14 SEC) made no individual blocks and only one team block.

"There's definitely some blocks we missed," Wise said.

"It's a place where we've showed signs of being solid. We understand that's not the make of this team. We're not going to lead the country in blocking, but we do think there are more blocks to be had."

The Gators trailed during

the second set until tying the score at 20. From there, Florida took the lead and held onto it until the end.

area right now, and it's affecting the outcome of the games."

Murphy remains questionable: After sitting out of Florida's 19-14 loss to then-No. 10 South Carolina on Saturday, quarterback Tyler Murphy remains questionable to play against Georgia Southern this weekend.

Muschamp said Murphy attempted to throw during practice Tuesday, but discomfort stemming from his sprained throwing shoulder remains.

"It's all about his discomfort level right now, and it's gotten better every day," Muschamp said. "If you look from Sunday to today, it's much, much, much improved. We'll just to continue to work through that."

Skyler Mornhinweg, who completed 10 of 13 passes for 107 yards with an interception in place of Murphy against the Gamecocks, continues to take first-team snaps in practice.

"If we had to play today, Skyler would start and be ready to go in the game," Muschamp said.

Injuries: Florida's patchwork offensive line will continue to lack one of its critical pieces this week.

Left tackle D.J. Humphries, who suffered a sprained MCL

about a month ago, was ruled out for the game. Muschamp said Humphries tried to participate in practice but does not have enough strength in his knee.

Muschamp also ruled out Marcus Roberson (ankle) for Sat-

urday's game. Roberson, a junior cornerback, has not played since Nov. 2.

He was suspended for Florida's game against South Carolina but would not have been healthy enough to play regardless.

As a junior at Portsmouth (Va.) I.C. Norcom High, Finney-Smith averaged six assists per game. Hill is the only Gator to collect six assists in a single game this season.

"I'm pretty confident in my ball-handling, so I think if coach needs me to play point, I'll do it," Finney-Smith said.

Donovan will not have to pressure his forward to handle the ball the entire game.

With DeVon Walker, Michael Frazier and Casey Prather able to bring the ball up the floor, the Gators will employ a community effort at point guard until either Hill or Wilbekin returns.

"We have enough ball-handling to initiate our offense," Donovan said. "I think if we are dealing with any kind of pressure, hopefully utilize it as a chance to open up

Although Florida currently ranks 116th in the nation with a 1.2 assist-to-turnover

ratio, Will Yeguete said Finney-Smith's versatility and ability to handle the ball will help limit the Gators' turnovers even without a true point guard active on the roster.

"You guys saw it at the end of the game when he was handling the ball," Yeguete said. "He can pass it. He can shoot. He's got size and can rebound."
