UF allows guns in cars on campus

UF's ban on firearms has loosened following a Florida appellate court decision that allows for guns locked inside a vehicle to be brought on campus.

The court decision came in December after a University of North Florida student filed a lawsuit against the university chal-

lenging its ban on storing firearms in vehicles on campus. The court ruled in favor of the student, setting precedent for Florida's other state universities.

UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes said a University Police policy for storing firearms in vehicles on campus was removed shortly after the court decision.

Sikes said UF's gun policy doesn't address firearms in vehicles, so a footnote

was added to ensure clarity.

The footnote states that the university will comply with state law, specifically those governing guns securely encased in a vehicle.

"That's not to say that guns are allowed on campus, because they're not," she said. "As long as people keep their guns in a

Scam emails impersonate UF Help Desk

A phishing scam has recently surfaced to hook students into providing their GatorLink information.

The scammer, posing as the UF Computing Help Desk, sends a malicious email instructing users to follow a link to change their UF Webmail account information.

A variation of the scam email also included the accurate UF Computing Help Desk contact information to further confuse students.

An alert for the scam was released Monday by UF Information Technology.

UFIT communications manager Tracy Gale said no one from the UF Help Desk can send mass emails to students.

"Nobody at UF will ask for your GatorLink password," she said.

UFIT releases alerts of phishing scams immediately on social media once they are reported by IT security, Gale said.

Austin Landis, an 18-year-old UF international studies freshman, said it could be easy for students to fall for scams considering how often UF sends out reminders to change passwords.

"I know my passwords are considered weak," she said. "UF is always trying to make them stronger."

Gale said there is no way of knowing how many students were affected by the recent scams.

"A university environment has a false sense of security," she said. "Having strong passwords is a really big help."


Students receive free admission to the Florida Museum

Peacock freezes to tree after Chicago zoo escape

DUNDEE, Ill. — An adventurous peacock had to be rescued by Chicago-area firefighters after he flew from his heated pen to a nearby tree and froze to a branch in subzero temperatures.

The (Arlington Heights) Daily Herald reports that Blue the peacock is recovering after Tuesday's misadventure that lasted about 90 minutes.

Blue managed to fly from his enclosure at the Randall Oaks Barnyard Zoo in Dundee and perched atop a nearby pine.

Firefighters with a ladder helped zoo staff pluck the wayward bird from the tree. Temperatures at the time were 12 degrees below zero.

Brian Mangiaracina is Randall Oaks' park and division manager. He says the whole thing was a "freakish accident" and that Blue is in quarantine.

Dundee is about 35 miles northwest of Chicago.

Pizza shop delivers medicines during cold snap

LIGONIER, Pa. — A western Pennsylvania pizza shop has been delivering prescription medicines and other supplies to ill and elderly residents so they don't have to go outside in the bitter cold.

Tom Wynkoop, owner of Fox's Pizza Den in Ligonier, tells WPXI-TV that he tweeted his offer because his community about 45 miles east of Pittsburgh has a lot of elderly residents.

Wynkoop told those in need to call his cellphone to arrange deliveries of prescription medicines and other products — no strings attached. That's right: Folks don't have to order food from Wynkoop's shop to get help.

Wynkoop says his shop has made four deliveries. He says, "You have to be there for your residents."

The region was hit with record-low, subzero temperatures Tuesday. Temperatures were subfreezing by Wednesday.

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Woman arrested after purposefully hitting husband with car

Police: She chased him with a bat

Alachua County Sheriff's deputies arrested a local woman Wednesday morning after deputies said she hit her estranged husband with her car and chased him with a bat.

Deputies arrested 41-year-old Tara Lyso-

nya Johnson in response to charges of aggravated assault and battery originally filed by Gainesville Police, wrote GPD spokesman officer Ben Tobias in an email.

At about 6:30 a.m., Johnson went to her husband's job to find out why he hadn't come home. After she saw her husband's ex-girlfriend drop him off, Johnson purposefully hit

him with her car, according to an arrest report.

She then stopped the car, pulled a bat from the trunk and began chasing him with it, according to the report.

Johnson drove away after the incident, and deputies later arrested her at her home, according to the report.

Johnson's husband was taken to UF Health Shands Hospital after feeling hip pain, Tobias wrote.

During questioning, Johnson told police she did not hit her husband with her car and that he jumped on the car and may have fallen off, according to Tobias. She also denied chasing him with a bat.

Deputies booked Johnson into the Alachua County Jail at about 10:30 a.m., where she remained as of press time.

UF biology freshman Kelsey Gwin, 18, has yet to attend a Broadway performance at the Phillips Center but said she didn't realize ticket prices were so low.

"I don't know why I haven't gone yet," she said. "'Rock of Ages' is definitely a fun show that I want to see."

UF IT cracking down on device updates

Starting Monday at 7 a.m., devices that have not been installed with anti-virus software and updated with Java and Flash will be locked out of UF's Wi-Fi.

Students can check their devices for the current requirements at getonline.ufl.edu.

Tracy Gale, UF Information Technology communications manager,

said the device updates are necessary to protect student information and the university.

"You need to make sure what you have is safe," she said. "We're not trying to make this a hassle. We're trying to protect your personal information as well as the university's networks."

Device updates are held each semester.


For Sarah Lassiter, a 20-year-old UF finance junior, the frequent up-

closed container in their vehicle, we shouldn't have a problem."

William Salvato, a 21-year-old UF biology senior and president of UF's Students for Concealed Carry chapter, said the ruling brings the club closer to its goal of decriminalizing possession of a firearm while on campus.

"We think it's a big step in our direction," Salvato said. "We finally have something that's been done toward our ultimate goal."

He said the university's current program, which allows students to store their firearms at UPD and check them out, isn't practical.

Because alerts of dangerous activity near campus are a regular occurrence, Salvato said, owning a gun for self defense and having to leave it at the police station was impractical.

"Crime doesn't have a time or place where it will

occur," he said. "When every second counts and the police are minutes away, having your weapon on you makes a difference."

Other UF students are more leery of the court's decision.

Andrew Sanchez, a 19-year-old UF biochemistry freshman, said the court's decision only spells trouble.

Sanchez said letting students have firearms on campus could complicate already bad situations such as a robbery or assault.

"The police will always be your best option," he said.

He said prior to the ruling, anyone knowingly bringing a firearm on campus would obviously have bad intentions.

Now, someone with malicious intent can have a gun in his or her vehicle on campus without hassle from the police.

"My gut instinct says it's a little dangerous," Sanchez said.

he said. "It sounds fun."



Alachua County Sheriff's deputies used a Taser on a Newberry man early Wednesday after deputies said he refused to leave a Waffle House.

Thomas Esli Thompson, 59, was arrested on charges of trespassing and resisting an officer, according to an arrest report.

At about 3:50 a.m., Thompson walked into the Waffle House at 7611 W. Newberry Road and asked for a cup of water. Thomp-

son mentioned to an employee that he wasn't leaving the restaurant until the bus line began running again, according to the report.

The employee told Thompson he could not stay that long and asked him to leave several times. She then called the police.

A deputy arrived and told Thompson he would be arrested if he didn't leave. Thompson refused, according to the report.

The deputy told Thompson

he was under arrest. Thompson responded by shoving his right hand in his pocket and telling the officer "You don't know what I got!"

The deputy drew his gun and told Thompson to take his hand out of his pocket. Thompson refused, and the deputy told Thompson if he continued to resist he would use a Taser, to which Thompson replied, "Tase!" The deputy then deployed his Taser twice and was able to place Thompson in handcuffs.

Thompson was booked in jail at about 5 a.m. Wednesday, where he remained in lieu of a \$5,000 bond.

County launches wage theft recovery program

With the new year comes a new way for workers to collect overdue paychecks.

The Alachua County Wage Recovery Program, which offers a structured method for helping residents negotiate with employers to get withheld wages, launched Jan. 1.

The ordinance passed 3-2 at an April County Commission meeting, about four months after its inception, according to Alligator archives.

So far, no one has filed a claim with the office, said Alachua County equal opportunity manager Jacqueline Chung.

"We have received some calls with questions but no formal complaints yet," she said.

When the complaints do start rolling in, the office will be ready, she said. One full-time employee has been designated to investigate wage theft as well as reported discrimination in employment or housing.

The first step of the wage re-

covery process is for the employee to alert the employer that they owe wages within 60 days after the money was due.

If the employee can't resolve the issue alone, he or she must contact the county Equal Opportunity Office within 180 days — about five months — to get the mediation process started.

Although no one has taken advantage of the system yet, employee rights activist Jeremiah Tattersall said the measure is giving workers confidence to confront employers who owe them money.

Tattersall, who advocated for the measure with the Alachua County Wage Theft Task Force, said he knew of one person afraid to speak up about wage theft. But after the ordinance took effect, the employee felt comfortable enough to talk to the employer about the issue as the first step of the wage recovery process dictates, and the worker received the withheld money.

"Having the legal backing helps people be bolder," Tattersall said.

He said younger workers can especially benefit from the wage recovery program.

"Students tend to take the lower-paid jobs," he said, "and the research shows that the lower paid your job ... the more susceptible you are to wage theft."

F*** civil liberties, how do they work? Rap group sues FBI

“Workaholics” fans remember the episode in which Adam, Ders and Blake become entangled with the Juggalos, or devotees of the rap and hip-hop duo Insane Clown Posse. Members of the Juggalos are, stereotypically, drug-addled low-income followers of the band famous for their yearly gathering — or as the New York Daily News called it, “weeklong bacchanal” — called the Gathering of the Juggalos. The Gathering is notorious for Juggalos engaging in “blatant drug use and general bad behavior.”

That particular episode of “Workaholics” ends happily enough: A female Juggalo, played by the delightful Rebel Wilson, convinces Adam to care less about how others see him, and a nice Juggalo family charms Ders.

However, in reality, Juggalos are classified by the authorities as a gang.

The Michigan chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union joined Insane Clown Posse and four fans to announce a lawsuit against the FBI and the U.S. Department of Justice yesterday to protest what they perceive as the unfair labeling of a group of music fans.

The New York Times stated, “The seeds of this lawsuit were sown in 2011, when the F.B.I.’s National Gang Intelligence Center published a report that described Juggalos as ‘a loosely organized hybrid gang’ whose members were ‘expanding into many U.S. communities.’”

The New York Daily News article included links to other stories detailing various acts of crime that Juggalos has been held responsible for, including a testimony from former reality star Tila Tequila claiming Insane Clown Posse fans tried to kill her at a concert.

According to the New York Daily News, “It’s time for the FBI to come to its senses and recognize that Juggalos are not a gang but a worldwide family united by the love of music,” said one member of the rap duo, Joseph Bruce, aka Violent J, in a statement released by the Michigan American Civil Liberties Union, which joined the suit.

We’re skeptical of Insane Clown Posse proponents who claim the Juggalo community is a “family” united purely by a “love of music.” It’s not as if the songs promote peace or positive change. Its 2009 hit “Miracles” contains the often-quoted (and often-mocked) lyric, “F***** magnets, how do they work?”

So is Insane Clown Posse genuinely concerned for the well-being of its fans? Probably not.

The lawsuit smacks of an attempt to stir publicity for an irrelevant fringe group.

Photos of the duo in their signature black-and-white clown facepaint looking noticeably out-of-place in an official ACLU press conference accompanied the online story.

In full Insane Clown Posse gear, including oversized jerseys and chains, the two men stared pensively at the ACLU representative speaking for them.

“This is what revolution looks like!!” commented one online reader.

Legalized marijuana means higher tax

New Year’s Eve was about lighting fireworks. New Year’s Day in Colorado was just about lighting up. But that’s old news, of course. It’s nearly impossible to live in a college town like Gainesville and not hear some excited stoners talk of the new weed mecca.

Marijuana’s legalization means more than a few people getting high: Tax revenue will rise, too. Some estimates state that it’ll generate \$67 million each year for the state, with just less than half that revenue going to schools, the Los Angeles Times reported.

But with strict regulations on growing and selling, it’s difficult for stores to keep up with demand. At least 37 stores are licensed to sell pot, and they collectively made more than \$1 million the first day.

Many of these shops are saying a sellout is imminent. Such a limited supply, of course, is increasing prices and might push some back to the black market where prices are low because of nonexistent taxes.

That black market is part of why marijuana has had such a bad reputation for so long. This is not a column to glamorize weed or speculate how long it’ll be before it’s legal in Florida — it’s to lament injustice many face because of this plant.

Despite known medicinal properties, prescription weed will only be legal in 21 states and Washington, D.C. — at least once New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo legalizes it by executive order.

And even though there has never been a documented death because of marijuana, it’s beaten into our heads that it is a dangerous drug. It remains a schedule-one drug along with heroin, apparently worse than methamphetamine and cocaine.

In a way, it is more dangerous — because it’s illegal. Without legalization, marijuana profits fall to drug cartels instead of state coffers.

Multimillion-dollar tunnels dug under the U.S.-Mexico border can get weed here without customs and drug-sniffing dogs. And even though they’re expensive to construct, they

can pay for themselves multiple times over in a single day.

So, because marijuana is illegal here, drug cartels that kill innocent people and control countless Mexican government officials through bribery continue to rake in massive profits.

Not much is known about the people who dig the tunnels. At first, it was rumored anyone who dug them were killed immediately afterward to maintain secrecy. One of the only firsthand accounts from a tunnel digger tells the story of someone forced at gunpoint to dig for 12 hours a day for \$150 a week.

As long as it remains profitable, these cartels will continue to operate and mar everything around them.

Uruguay recently legalized marijuana to combat this very problem. To ensure it’s not profitable, they’re setting the price at only \$1 a gram. Stores running short on green in Colorado were charging up to \$70 for an eighth of an ounce, or 3.5 grams, according to Time magazine, which by comparison was selling the same product for \$35 for medicinal purposes before if was legal for recreational purposes.

It’s not just cartels that are threatened by the legalization of weed, though. The prison industry is as well. The U.S. has the highest incarceration rate in the world, with roughly 25 percent of the world’s prisoners, according to an OP-Ed by the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette. Its high population stems from numerous nonviolent offenders housed in our prisons such as those charged with marijuana possession.

Legalizing weed is one of the best things we can do for this hemisphere. It will reduce crime and the number of people in prison who shouldn’t be there, and it will boost our economy.

So you can put that in your pipe and smoke it.

Snapchat apologizes for hacking, introduces preventative measures

More than 4.6 million people entered 2014 with a little less privacy after hackers published phone numbers and aciiT-

count information from the smartphone app Snapchat on New Year's Eve.

Although smartphone users used the app to share 10-second pictures of their festivities, the website SnapchatDB.info uploaded phone numbers and user In-

ames from 4,609,621 accounts from 78 area codes across the U.S. and Canada.

The website censored the last two digits of each phone number to prevent spam and abuse, but it will possibly release the uncensored database to interested parties "under certain circumstances."

"Having my account leaked — it made me fearful of using social media and what it's capable of," said Laura Turk, an 18-year-old UF industrial and systems engineering freshman.

According to a statement published on the website, the leak was intended to bring public attention to the flaws in the Snapchat security pointed out in a Christmas Day report posted by Australia-based security research company Gibson Security.

The report was publicly released after attempts to privately contact Snapchat were unsuccessful. It provided the previously unpublished code needed to match numbers with names and create fake accounts.

"Privacy is overstated on some of these social media platforms," said Bruce Floyd, UF social media specialist. "The idea that you can post an image of yourself or something with the promise that only the intended viewer will see it is wishful thinking."

In a blog post published Jan. 2, Snapchat promised to release an update that will allow users to opt out of the Find Friends part of the application and improve restrictions and rate limiting to prevent future attacks. The post also stated that pictures sent through the app were not leaked and only usernames and phone numbers were accessed.

Additional websites have been set up by Gibson Security and other corporations for users to determine whether individual account information was leaked.

Criticism from social media experts regarding its supposed privacy and its origin as a sexting app did not stop Snapchat from becoming one of the most downloaded apps of 2013, but it remains to be seen whether the leak has any effect on its usage.

"I'm going to keep using it even though it annoys me a little bit that my number got leaked," said Kenneth Fernandez, a 19-year-old UF exploratory engineering freshman. "I can't really do anything about it. My number is out there even if I stop using it."

Excitement may lead to better performance

Before taking our chemistry tests, a friend of mine used to say we weren't actually anxious, but we were instead excited, like electrons. I would just look at her and roll my eyes. No one could convince me that my increased state of agitated energy was anything but an expression of dread and fear.



Of course, my friend has always been the more optimistic one, whereas when I see a phone call from my dad, my brain immediately jumps to someone has died, or I've messed something up.

Studies have shown that optimistic or happy people are healthier, more successful and live longer.

And according to a December study published online in the American Psychological Association's Journal of Experimental Psychology: General, positive people have another thing going for them: They perform better on activities that trigger anxiety.

The research, conducted by Alison Wood Brooks, an assistant professor of business administration at Harvard Business School, finds that telling yourself you are excited before a stressful event can be more effective than telling yourself to calm down.

The experiment evaluated participants in different exercises like public speaking, karaoke singing and math-test taking. The individuals who were instructed to try to get excited performed better than those who were told to try to remain calm.

Dr. Linda Lewis, licensed mental health counselor at UF's Counseling & Wellness Center, said for some people, the word "anxious" means unease or worry, whereas for others, it means eagerness or anticipation. The body reacts the same way whether one is anxious for positive or negative reasons, she said.

"The way we talk about our feelings has a strong influence on how we actually feel," according to the study.

So, saying "I'm excited" out loud before a dreaded activity can actually increase feelings of excitement.

Lewis said this is why counselors ask students to say positive affirmations or make goals out loud.

Though Lewis is not familiar with the full study, she said it may change how she works with students on anxiety before their exams.

Sara Martin, health promotion specialist at Gator-Well Health Promotion Services, said three strategies she teaches for stress management are preparation, confidence and relaxation, and those first two steps deal mostly with study skills and time management.

Therefore, you can tell yourself whatever you want, but if you do not have a solid foundation, you are still probably not going to do well on your exams. But if you are fully prepared and still anxious, you can try tricking your brain into thinking you are excited for that test and train it to perform better.

What's the worst you can do? Or, let me rephrase that. What's the best that can happen?

been shown in a movie-theater setting. Tickets can be purchased at the door or online at squareup.com/market/the-wooly.


Here's what Jason has to say about the films:

A movie with bite: the Avenue reviews 'The Wolf of Wall Street'

As this Sunday's 71st Golden Globe Awards approach, Martin Scorsese's "The Wolf of Wall Street" has garnered much attention.

Nominated for Best Motion Picture, Musical or Comedy, the film is fit to contend alongside worthy films "American Hustle," "Her," "Inside Llewyn Davis" and "Nebraska."

Diverging from his last picture, "Hugo" (2011), a children's movie in revolutionized 3-D, Scorsese's most recent film is nothing short of charming. However, the charm might be hard to see blurred behind layers of debauchery, midget tossing and hedonism. But as each layer is peeled away like a cocaine-snorting, office-orgy onion, there is a core left and a message that has been told long before: Greed topples man. And, possibly, hookers topple man, too.

Adapted for the screen by Terence Winter, the film is based on the personal memoir of Jordan Belfort — played by Leonardo DiCaprio — a multimillionaire by 30 who served time in prison for fraud crimes.

The film shows the rise and fall of one of the most powerful individuals on Wall Street and his consequential demise from living a life

of excess and deception. The raunchy cycle of self-indulgence that is Jordan Belfort's life is brilliantly captured by DiCaprio.

This is the wildest, most goose-bump-inducing, three-hour movie that I have come across. But, if you are looking for how Belfort destroyed the lives of many, this film is relatively disappointing. Instead, it's an introspection into his life as he explains how he got away with his evil, genius plan through a persistent, first-person voice-over.

Although Scorsese is 71 years old, his style has not suffered. Voice-over is a huge element to how the story is told, reminiscent of "Goodfellas" (1990), when Ray Liotta narrates the life of Henry Hill with wise guy voice-overs. Although Scorsese's use of voice-over has been heavily criticized, it allows the audience to get in the mind of the charismatic crook and into the feverish roller coaster that he is shackled to.

DiCaprio isn't the only actor that had a stellar performance. Matthew McConaughey plays the role of Mark Hanna, Belfort's Quaalude-popping, excessive, masturbating boss. McConaughey's personality and infectiously witty demeanor steals the scene from DiCaprio with his satire of life on Wall Street. Jonah Hill also gives the performance of a lifetime as Donnie Azoff, Belfort's

right-hand man. This is the best performance that Jonah Hill has given since "Moneyball" (2011), proving he is a versatile actor.

As one of the most highly anticipated movies of the year, "The Wolf of Wall Street" is nothing you have ever seen — unless your life con-

sisted of securities fraud, hookers, blow and "morphine, because it's awesome."



Gators lose point guard in win against Gamecocks

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No. 10 Florida handled Southeastern Conference bottom-dweller South Carolina 74-58 on Wednesday night in the O'Connell Center, but a right ankle sprain to senior point guard Scottie Wilbekin put a damper on the Gators' program record-tying 24th straight home victory.

Wilbekin left the game with 2:39 remaining after injuring his right ankle — the one he injured on Dec. 2 against UConn — on a missed layup attempt. He could not put any weight on his ankle and needed UF trainers to help him to the locker room.

The severity of Wilbekin's injury is unknown, and he is questionable for Florida's game at Arkansas on Saturday, coach Billy Donovan said. Wilbekin will miss the Gators' practice today and will be re-evaluated by trainers on Friday.

"He was driving down the lane out of control," Donovan said of the play. "There's no movement. It's early in the clock. He's just got to do a better job."

Florida had a sub waiting for Wilbekin before the senior suffered the sprain.

"It sucks, because it was around the end of the game that he went and did his little minor ankle sprain or whatever it may be," center Patric Young said. "But I think he's going to all right."

"I talked to him afterward and he said he's going to be OK."

Before suffering his injury, Wilbekin was in the midst of a breakout game and finally ended a recent shooting slump. After shooting 11 of 35 from the field — including a 4-of-17 clip from beyond the arc — in his previous three contests, he shot 5 of 11 for a team-high 17 points against the Gamecocks in his team's SEC opener.

In 34 minutes of action, Wilbekin made 3 of 6 three-point attempts, notched three assists, did not turn the ball over and sunk all four of his free throws.

Young and senior forward Casey Prather each chipped in 13 points for the Gators (12-2, 1-0 SEC).

Florida's win was not as lopsided as last season's result — the Gators beat the Gamecocks by 39 points last year in the O'Dome and held them to only 10 points at halftime. On Wednesday, South Carolina was within single digits of UF in the second half.

The Gators jumped out to a 14-1 advantage in the game's first six minutes and led by as many as 18 points in the first half. South Carolina needed 9:23 to make its first field goal.

But over a span of 2:08 late in the half, USC responded

with a 7-0 run to cut UF's advantage to 34-21 at halftime.

Eventually, South Carolina trailed by only eight points 5:09 into the second half as its 2-3 zone had Florida frustrated. Then, Florida increased its lead to 15 points thanks to a 12-5 run capped off by an alley-oop dunk by Dorian Finney-Smith.

Utilizing a full-court press, the Gators forced the Gamecocks to 21 turnovers on Wednesday.

"It definitely benefitted us," Prather said of UF's full-court press. "That's like playing to our strengths, using our guys who are athletic and quick in speed anticipating."

Florida shot only 5 of 19 from three-point range but 21 of 26 from inside the arc.

UF's win is its sixth straight and 24th consecutive victory at home, tying a streak held from March 1, 2006, to Nov. 20, 2007.

Third-year point guard making most of rare playing time

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Through Florida's ongoing winning streak, one thing has remained constant. Redshirt sophomore Cassie Peoples has been spearheading the charge as the Gators' starting point guard since December began.

The transition to starter occurred during Florida's trip to the Bahamas for the

Junkanoo Jam. Peoples played a season-high 28 minutes in the loss against Illinois State, only to top that with 35 minutes in a win against Oregon State — the first game of the current eight-game win streak.

She has averaged 33.6 minutes per game in those eight games. In the prior seven contests, Peoples averaged just under 21 minutes.

"One of our AAU coaches was at the game (against Kentucky), Jack Givens, a

Kentucky great," assistant coach David Lowery said. "Jack watched and told me, 'David, she's grown so much.'"

Peoples accounts her growth this season to simply being able to play on a consistent basis.

"Just getting my timing back," she said. "I haven't played a game in forever, so it's

going to take time to get timing back in a game."

Peoples' collegiate career had been riddled with injuries; she has not played regularly since her high school days at San Antonio (Texas) Cypress-Fairbanks.

"It's been a matter of figuring out exactly what coach Butler wants in her system and what she wants to do with her offense," she said. "That's the biggest thing,

Class of 2014 looks to bolster meager Florida offense

Florida's offense will have a new look in 2014.

Offensive coordinator Brent Pease is gone, taking his pro-style offense with him. Replacing them are Kurt Roper and an up-tempo spread offense.

Roper, who comes to UF after coaching at Duke for six seasons, will have a lot of talent to work with in the 2014 recruiting class. The class currently has 12 commits on offense, including one quarterback, three wide receivers and six offensive lineman. Some of them have the potential to make an immediate impact.

The Gator wide receiving corps needs a lot of improvement. Florida finished 2013 ranked 116th in passing yards per completion. Current wide receiver commit Ermon Lane could turn things around quickly.

Lane is the No. 6 receiver in the 2014 class, according to Rivals.com. However, he has wavered on his commitment in the past month, especially after running back Dalvin Cook flipped from Florida to Florida State last week. Lane said during the Under Armour practices that he and Cook have always wanted to play together.

On Wednesday afternoon, Lane posted a picture on his Instagram

account (@lane_to_live) of himself wearing a Florida State track suit. If Muschamp can keep him committed, it will be great news for Florida's passing game.

If Lane does decommit, UF has just two other receivers in the class — Moral Stephens and Ryan Sousa. Neither crack the top 20 in Rivals' position rankings.

There are also two three-star tight ends in the class — Deandre Goolsby and C'yontai Lewis — who will try to revamp the undeveloped position for Florida.

The Rivals No. 2 quarterback from 2014, Will Grier, has a chance to get reps as a true freshman because of his impressive high school campaign. However, Grier, who is listed at under 190 pounds, will need to put on some weight before running the spread. He will likely redshirt in 2014, but if Jeff Driskel does not stay healthy, Grier might have to play early in his career.

The position with the most obvious lack of depth for the Gators is the offensive line. Florida has just five offensive lineman with starting experience returning in 2014.

UF's best commit from this group is David Sharpe, whose 6-foot-8, 275-pound frame makes him a menacing offensive tackle. Sharpe played left tackle in high school, and his size and improved footwork could potentially earn

him a starting role in 2014.

Last season, redshirt junior Max Garcia needed to move from his natural left guard position to left tackle after Tyler Moore suffered a season-ending arm injury in November. Moving Garcia back to left guard could give Sharpe a prime shot at getting meaningful reps at tackle.

The newest member of Florida's class is Rivals three-star offensive tackle Kavaris Harkless. Harkless was previously committed to Louisville and was set to enroll this week until news of Charlie Strong going to Texas broke.

He decided to enroll at UF instead and enrolled on Wednesday. Harkless is a versatile athlete who can play both left and right guard, as well as tackle. Harkless is a skilled run blocker, but he needs more consistency in pass blocking.

Nolan Kelleher, Rivals' 29th-ranked tackle, will fit best at guard. Kelleher has good instincts and run blocks well, but can improve getting off the ball quicker. Kelleher has already enrolled.

Two important prospects, Isaiah McKenzie and Jeff Jones, will both make official visits on Jan. 24. McKenzie can serve as insurance if Lane decommits, and Jones, whose stock is high after an MVP performance at the Under Armour game, can make up for UF losing Cook.

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as far as being able to improve, is just learning the system."

Along with more minutes, Peoples' rapid maturation has also been a contributing factor to her recent success. A point guard holds the most responsibility of any position on the floor, acting as a general directing their players when on offense.

"I think one of the things that has given her an opportunity to grow is that she has accepted the role of being a point guard, accepted the role of trying to get her teammates to follow her on the floor," Lowery said. "I know that's something Amanda (Butler)'s on her about all the time."

Butler, Peoples and Florida (12-3, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) are set to square off against a tough conference rival in Arkansas (14-1, 1-1 SEC) tonight in the O'Connell Center.
