Florida man arrested with 89.5 pounds of weed in car

That's about \$356,000 worth

Shiloh took a sniff: He knew first.

The police dog alerted officers to the smell in the car during a traffic stop, and they found about 90 pounds of marijuana.

Gainesville Police arrested a Fort Lauderdale man Tuesday night after a high-

way traffic stop revealed he had an estimated \$356,000 worth of marijuana in his car.

Officers arrested 51-year-old Michael John Cefola on charges of marijuana trafficking, according to an arrest report.

At about 7:45 p.m., an officer working with the Gainesville-Alachua County Drug

Task Force was patrolling Interstate 75 and noticed a car driven by Cefola weaving in traffic.

After pulling the car over, the officer asked Cefola if he could search his vehicle, but Cefola didn't consent, according to the report.

Shiloh, a Labrador retriever certified to detect drug smells, alerted the officer to

the odor.

Citing probable cause, the officer searched the vehicle and found a bag with 89.5 pounds of high-grade marijuana, according to the report.

During questioning, Cefola said he was driving the weed from California to South Florida for \$15,000.

Officers booked Cefola into the Alachua County Jail at about 10 p.m. He was released at noon Wednesday after meeting a \$40,000 bond.

Bo Diddley Plaza could get \$1.4 million makeover

Bo Diddley Community Plaza could receive a makeover as soon as this fall, and renovations to the East University Avenue side of the plaza could bring more performers and programs.

The estimated \$1.4 million project would include storage rooms, restrooms and dressing rooms for performers.

In the past, performers had access to only an 8-by-8 foot storage room and a public restroom facility before going on stage.

The renovations would also feature a restaurant similar to the Lunchbox Café.

Sarah Vidal-Finn, manager of the Gainesville Community Redevelopment Agency, said the plaza isn't used much during the day.

"The biggest hope for the project is to really increase better utilization of the plaza during all times of the day," she said.

With construction potentially beginning in late fall, Vidal-Finn said the renovations will cause as little disruption as possible, especially for the plaza's homeless population. A homeless resource center set to open May 1 could alleviate some construction concerns.

Russell Etling, interim manager of cultural affairs for the City of Gainesville Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs department, said the improvements will bring more visitors to the plaza.

"We are thrilled that it will get a face-lift and hopefully become even more popular," he said.

ROTC Gators train, are tested in water

► IT'S A REQUIREMENT FOR UF ARMY ROTC STUDENTS.

At 5:30 a.m. when most students were in bed, some ROTC Gators were taking a plunge.

The UF Army ROTC program conducted its annual Combat Water Survival Training on Wednesday morning at the Florida Pool, where cadets tested their survival skills in the water with full equipment in tow.

Capt. Nathalie Conley, an assistant professor of military science in the UF Army ROTC department, said the test is a commissioning requirement for all UF Army ROTC students.

It requires students to complete a 10-minute diagnostic swim, five minutes of treading water and a 15-meter swim.

It also includes a blindfolded 3-meter drop in the water with their equipment and a drop in the deep end of the pool where they have to take off all the gear without surfacing, Conley said.

"This training is generally not

harder than other programs, except for those who don't know how to swim," she said. One cadet had to be rescued by the lifeguard during the exercise.

"Lately, there has been a turn in the Army where people aren't up to stuff on their swimming skills or their aquatic abilities," said cadet Tyler Schaper, a 22-year-old UF geography senior. "This training just gets them used to swimming and dealing with water problems."

Conley said ROTC provides free lessons to students who are struggling with swimming.

Siblings relish chance to share job

Two siblings will soon share more than an alma mater: They'll share a 27-foot-long hotdog car experience.

Silvana Smud, a UF alumna who graduated as a telecommunication major in 1999, got the job of driving the Oscar Mayer Wienermobile across the country for a full year after graduation.

The job is difficult to get: Only 12 drivers are chosen out of more than 2,000 applicants every year, she said.

The genes must run in the family, because Smud's younger brother, Spencer Smud, also got

the job.

"I had such an amazing experience with this job and I always wanted Spencer to have the same experience," Silvana said.

Spencer, a 23-year-old UF recreation, parks and tourism senior, will graduate in May and start driving the Wienermobile in June.

The job is a one-year contract that involves driving across the country and hitting three cities a week for specific events, Silvana said. Drivers are known as Hotdoggers.

When she had the job, a then 7-year-old Spencer would come out to the events and help his sister. It was a part of his childhood.

"Next thing I know, I'm finding out I'm going to have one of the best jobs that a college graduate could ever have," Spencer

said. "People saw me literally do my happy dance."

Spencer will fly to Wisconsin on June 1 and go through a two-week training known as "Hotdog High." He will graduate as part of Hotdogger Class 27. His sister was in Class 12.

Silvana said their family is also ecstatic about their shared Hotdogger status.

"Just the fact of having two Hotdoggers come out of Brandon, Florida," she said. "They are just thrilled."

The Smud siblings said the shared experience is extremely rare and hope that it will bring them closer.

"USA Today quoted that statistically, it's easier to become president of the United States than to be chosen as an Oscar Mayer Hotdogger," she said.

me, given the large number of Jewish students here," she said.

Last June, Swedroe started coordinating with Gator Dining to get kosher options in UF's dining halls this year to better meet the needs of the student population.

"A lot of people keep kosher for Passover even if they don't keep kosher for the rest of the year," she said.

Jaron Mandel, a 21-year-old UF accounting senior, said he thinks the option is going to work well for a lot of students.

"I'm happy that they're doing it," he said. "I'm sure it will be the start of something really nice."

Jonathan Josephf, a 19-year-old UF biology sophomore, said he struggled to find kosher options on campus last year with his meal plan.

"I'd have to buy matzo at Publix and just make make matzo and cream cheese sandwiches and PB&Js on my own," he said.

Josephf, who still has a meal plan, said he thinks the partnership with Hillel is "very progressive," and he plans to

take advantage of it.

Kosher offerings include hard-boiled eggs, tuna salad, fruit and salad. Gator Dining is also exploring the option of serving kosher yogurt and sausage, Swedroe said.

Passover-friendly options will be marked with kosher symbols, she said.

The food will be prepared in disposable pans and served on disposable plates so it doesn't touch anything that has prepared or served bread products.

In addition to the strictly kosher foods served, kosher-style options containing no-bread products such as salmon prepared with no breadcrumbs will also be available.

"It's hard if you're living on campus," Swedroe said. "I want to make it easier."

- barley
- oats
- wheat
- crackers
- cake
- cookies
- beer

UF should observe National Alcohol Screening Day

Today is National Alcohol Screening Day, and more than 600 colleges in the U.S. will be holding free alcohol screenings on their campuses to help students identify any problems they may have with alcohol abuse. It's a fantastic idea; after all, nearly 2,000 Americans ages 18 to 24 die each year from alcohol-related injuries. The annual screenings are hosted by a nonprofit called Screening for Mental Health, which advocates mental-health and substance-abuse resources to be made readily available to those who need it.

UF, however, is not participating, which is pretty surprising. GatorWell Health Promotion Services offers great resources for students struggling with alcohol problems and students who know people struggling with alcohol. The school's medical amnesty policy protects students from disciplinary action if they suspect a friend has alcohol poisoning or has overdosed on drugs and call 911. Counseling is available at no charge to students in the UF Counseling & Wellness Center, and GatorWell has educational information on its website about alcohol abuse.

However, we like the idea of the PR initiative that a National Alcohol Screening Day event would provide. Rather than pushing a single anti-alcohol-abuse idea, the anonymous screenings would be a way for mental-health providers to connect with students who may be at risk.

In fact, a screening day (or multiple screening days) may be the missing link in alcoholism prevention that UF needs. GatorWell offers proactive resources for stopping underage drinking and alcohol abuse, and the CWC offers solutions for people who've realized they have a problem. But how can the university help students identify the fact that they may have an unhealthy relationship with alcohol?

Because we're immersed in a culture that normalizes extreme alcohol consumption, many of us have no way of knowing if our alcohol habits are unhealthy. Young people who are just becoming exposed to practically limitless amounts of alcohol need ways to determine whether or not they're truly drinking responsibly and if habitual alcohol abuse is a symptom of a deeper problem.

That's why anonymous screenings work. According to the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, screenings have become a "mainstay of today's preventive health care."

"Screening is not the same as diagnostic testing, which establishes a definite diagnosis of a disorder. Instead, screening is used to identify people who are likely to have a disorder, as determined by their responses to certain key questions," the NIAAA website states. "People with positive screening results may be advised to undergo more detailed diagnostic testing to definitively confirm or rule out the disorder."

Anonymous screenings, then, offer a nonthreatening way for students to become more aware of their relationships with drinking.

We hope GatorWell will consider participating in future college National Alcohol Screening Days to raise awareness about alcohol-related mental health issues and direct at-risk students to the right resources to prevent further problems.



Criminal justice system favors the rich

There are two criminal justice systems in the U.S.: one for the rich, one for the poor.

You don't have to look far to find both of them. Two stories set the Internet on fire recently, both regarding child abuse.

Sanesha Taylor is a black, homeless mother of two whose mugshot went viral, complete with tears running like rivers off her cheeks. She was arrested for leaving her two children, aged 6 months and 2 years, while she was in a job interview. Her children were taken away, and she's facing trial for a felony. The only way she's been able to pay legal fees so far is through online donations.

"She was upset. This is a sad situation all around. She said she was homeless. She needed the job. Obviously, not getting the job. So it's just a sad situation," said Scottsdale Police Sgt. Mark Clark, according to Connecticut TV station WFSB.

It goes without saying — it's not a good idea to leave your kids locked in a hot car. But are those conditions much different than the ones they'd face on the streets? This woman was homeless, trying to make a better life for her kids and herself by getting a job. It's not as if she had money for a babysitter.

Robert H. Richards IV is a white, affluent father and heir to DuPont, the ubiquitous chemical company. He also confessed to raping his 3-year-old daughter in 2009. The case recently went viral after it became public when his ex-wife filed another suit against Richards seeking compensatory and punitive damages for the sexual abuse. Richards received a probation sentence for rape instead of jail time because the judge felt he would "not fare well" in prison.

Of course, it's unclear who exactly does fare well in prison, though looking at this dichotomy does make one thing certain: The two-tiered criminal justice system is alive and kicking. On one hand, you have a woman get-

ting charged with a felony for going to a job interview to make a better life for herself. On the other, you have a rapist getting a slap on the wrist for molesting his own 3-year-old daughter.

Of course, the worry for Richards stems from the stereotype that people who raped children are treated worse than other inmates in prison.

I'm not sure if this is true, having never been in prison myself, but there are options other than letting him off with probation.

An inmate can be placed in protective care alone if his or her safety is threatened. The idea that he wouldn't fare well is no excuse for his sentence.

The juxtaposition of these cases is a clear-cut reminder of the dual criminal justice systems in the U.S. In fact, people of color make up more than 60 percent of the prison population, according to the Sentencing Project, an advocacy group for prison reform.

One in every three black men will likely go to prison in his lifetime, compared to one in 17 white men. Not to mention that the U.S. has the largest prison population in the world.

As soon as racism enters the discussion, too many retreat. We live in a post-racial society, they say. We elected a black president, after all. But racism is bigger than individuals or prejudice. Racism is systemic, and it has infected every institution from our systems of education to incarceration. This single story of disparity fits into a larger narrative of racism that our country must address.

Skin color and financial status shouldn't be the deciding factors in whether someone is a prisoner.

Live Nation Florida wanted to be consumer friendly and continue to build interest in the festival, Jacobsen said.

People across Florida and the U.S. are expected to flock to Tampa for the festival.

Melissa Daum, a 20-year-old UF finance junior, said she's excited to catch the headliners and all of the up-and-comers.

"I'm excited for Big Guava because there's no better experience than a music festival with your friends," she said.


Daum said she's most excited to see Foster the People.

Walker announces decision to stay for second season at Florida

Minutes after Florida's Elite Eight victory over Dayton on March 29, Chris Walker heard Gators fans chant "One more year! One more year!" as he climbed the ladder to cut down the nets.

They got their wish Wednesday.

Walker announced via his Twitter account (@cwalkertime23) that he will return to UF for his sophomore season, opting not to test the NBA Draft waters. The freshman forward was projected as a late first-round pick in June's draft.

"This year has been a great one, and I'm happy to say I will be joining the gatornation again for one more year!" Walker posted at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday.

With Walker back, Florida now has 12 of its 13 scholarships committed for 2014-15.

A highly touted prospect coming out of high school, Walker could not enroll at UF until after the fall semester ended on Dec. 14 because of academic ineligibility concerns. Following a 12-game suspension handed down by the NCAA for receiving impermissible benefits from agents, Walker made his debut with the team on Feb. 4.

In 87 minutes on the court in 18 games for Florida this season, the 6-foot-10 forward averaged only 1.9 points on 59.3 percent shooting and 1.3 rebounds per game but showcased his athleticism and shot-blocking in spurts.

Walker logged only 18 minutes during five NCAA Tournament games, but he had his best game of his short season in a 79-68 victory against UCLA in the Sweet 16 on March 27. Against the Bruins, he provided a spark off the bench by recording seven points, three rebounds and a block in six minutes of action.

But at times this year, Walker looked lost and out of position on the defensive end. An offseason

under coach Billy Donovan should help the Bonifay native better understand UF's defense and expand his post moves.

Walker could earn a starting frontcourt role next year.

The Gators lose 68.5 percent of their offensive production in their four seniors from 2013-14, but they return point guard Kasey Hill, shooting guard Michael Frazier II and forward Dorian Finney-Smith — three key players from a Gators rotation that won 36 games and reached its first Final Four since 2007.

The Gators also bring back DeVon Walker, Jacob Kurtz and Rutgers transfer guard Eli Carter, who redshirted and sat out most of his 2013-14 campaign to let a fractured fibula in his right leg heal.

Power forward Alex Murphy and center Damonre Harris should add depth to Florida's frontcourt, which loses a productive trio in Patric Young, Casey Prather and Will Yeguete.

Murphy, a Duke transfer, cannot play until mid-December unless he receives a waiver to play earlier, per NCAA transfer rules.

Donovan dismissed Harris, a rim protector and dynamic shot-blocker, from the team last December after the center violated team rules and failed to meet his responsibilities. But a regretful Harris, eager to work his way back onto the team, has returned to Florida and has practiced with the Gators since January.

Florida also adds Devin Robinson, Brandone Francis and Chris Chiozza — three players from Rivals.com's top 50 for the Class of 2014 — to the mix next year.

Donovan's son of the same name, walk-on Lexx Edwards and Dillon Graham, who missed last season with bone spurs in his hips, will vie for spots in the rotation.

Barring any injuries, Florida enters 2014-15 with a deep roster — especially now with Chris Walker back in the fold.

Power hitting gives Gators the edge over Seminoles on the road

Castro hit two-run home run

No. 6 Florida held a 2-1 lead heading into the seventh inning against No. 8 Florida State in Tallahassee on Wednesday.

Seminoles pitcher Lacey Waldrop, who was second in the nation with a 0.70 ERA heading into the contest, gave up only two hits while striking out seven batters heading into the final frame.

But with two outs and Stephanie Tofft on second base, junior Bailey Castro pinch hit for Kathryn Medina.

With Florida hoping to put some insurance runs on the board, Castro delivered.

Facing a 3-1 count, the Pembroke Pines native belted a home run to left-center field to lift the Gators to a 4-1 lead over the Seminoles.

Florida's defense gave up a second run in the bottom of the final frame, but the Gators (35-8, 8-7 Southeastern Conference) ultimately ended up winning the contest against the Seminoles (38-5, 14-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) 4-2 at JoAnne Graf Field.

"Bailey's hit obviously really helped us

because we kind of fell apart there in the end," coach Tim Walton said in a radio interview.

"But overall, that's the name of the game. ... Sometimes nerves get the best of you.

The team that gets the most hits with runners in scoring position typically is going to be the team that wins."

After three scoreless innings, which included just one hit and five total strikeouts, Florida found success in the fourth frame.

Kelsey Stewart opened the inning by grounding out to third, but Briana Little drew a five-pitch walk to give the Gators

a baserunner. Sophomore Kirsti Merritt followed Little with a single to left-center field.

Lauren Haeger subsequently struck out, but Tofft took a full-count walk at the next at-bat to load the bases.

Taylor Schwarz took care of business from there.

Facing a 1-1 count, the Palm Beach Gardens native ripped the ball through the left side to score Little and Merritt and put Florida on the board first.

With the single, Schwarz became the fifth Florida batter this season to accumulate 25 RBIs.

Even though the offense only logged

Hargreaves stepping up as he enters second season at UF

It's not easy to get better when you're already one of the most talented cornerbacks in the nation.

That's what sophomore Vernon Hargreaves III is facing in 2014. Even after recording three interceptions and 11 pass breakups as a freshman, he has some ideas on how to improve.

"I just need to be a better leader," the Tampa native said. "A lot of guys are looking up to me now, a lot of freshman corners we have now. Just being a better leader and staying on top of my game."

Hargreaves is setting an example for the secondary, which is reloading this season to fill the voids of NFL Draft prospects Marcus Roberson, Loucheiz Purifoy and Jaylen Watkins. True freshmen Duke Dawson and Jalen Tabor are fighting for the corner spot opposite Hargreaves. Hargreaves knows what it's like to have high expectations in year one.

"You've just got to focus. Focus on what you can do because it's hard and coming at you fast, especially with the up-tempo offense we have," he said. "Everything is faster than what it usually goes. I tell them to be focused. Everything else will take care of itself."

Hargreaves' father, Vernon Jr., is the current linebackers coach at Houston. Prior to Houston, he coached defensive ends and special teams at USF for three seasons and was on

Connecticut's staff for 13 years. Growing up as a coach's son helped shape Hargreaves into the player he is today.

"I've been around football for as long as

I can remember," Hargreaves said. "Being around, when my dad coached at Miami, I was around all those great players like Ed Reed, Sean Taylor. I was around all them. I remember how hard they used to work and compete. I took that from them."

A professional opportunity for defensive backs at Florida exists — a number of proficient players under coach Will Muschamp and defensive backs coach Travaris Robinson have succeeded at the next level. Some notables include Baltimore Raven Matt Elam, Jacksonville Jaguar Josh Evans and Roberson and Purifoy.

"Coach Muschamp and Coach T-Rob know a lot of players, Muschamp's coached in the league. They know what it's like and our defense is based on a NFL scheme," Hargreaves said.

"(Former defensive coordinator) Dan Quinn is at the Seahawks now, he coached last year, he knows a lot of the stuff that we do. We base a lot of our stuff off of what he does, so it's just a great opportunity."
