## Local conservancy helps find almost extinct bat

A Gainesville-based animal research group working in Papua New Guinea recently encountered something no one had seen in years — the New Gregorian Monkey-Faced Fruit Bat.

The Lube Bat Conservancy discovered one of the most endangered bat species on the Solomon Islands after no sightings in five years.

Brian Pope, Lube Bat Conservancy director, said the research team got together with a local group of Australian researchers to study and capture the bats.

“These type of bats are so rare that any type of research would be beneficial to the species,” Pope said.

This bat hasn’t been researched for 20 years.

These elusive mammals are hard to spot because their habitat is disappearing at a rapid rate. The rainforest these bats call home is not protected, Pope said.

Gabby Milanese, a 20-year-old UF entomology and nematology senior, said it’s important to educate people about the impact humans have on their own environment.

“A lot of animals have become extinct because people don’t realize that their actions affects the animals that live around them,” she said.

## Free RTS on Wednesday to bring awareness of new bill

Riders who usually pay the \$3 fee for an All Day bus pass will receive one for no cost on Wednesday.

Gainesville’s Amalgamated Transit Union and Regional Transit System are pairing up to provide this Fare Free Day to bring attention to a transportation bill, the MAP-21 Reauthorization Act, going through Congress. Riders can get a pass at the Rosa Parks RTS Downton Station or on the bus.

Among other things, MAP-21 provides

funding for facilities, new program starts and buses, wrote Chip Skinner, RTS marketing and communications supervisor, in an email interview.

The bill will provide long-term funding that will give state and local governments the opportunity to improve and expand the nation’s transportation infrastructure, according to the U.S. Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works’ website

Cassandra Roldan, a 23-year-old Gainesville resident, said she regularly buys an All Day pass.

Roldan said she appreciates the bus system providing this service, but thinks there should be more done to market the event.

“They should advertise it on the bus,” she said.

# Sales tax holiday prepares Floridians for hurricane season

Starting May 31, Gainesville will see nine days of no sales tax intended to help residents stock up on supplies for the hurricane season.

Approved by Gov. Rick Scott on May 12, Florida House Bill 5601 was signed to start the tax holiday a day

before the 2014 Atlantic hurricane season that begins on June 1 and ends on Nov. 30.

By signing the packet, Scott declared that sales tax cannot be collected from May 31 to June 8 in Florida on certain items to aid in hurricane emergencies. The bill specifies flashlights that sell for \$20 or less, tarps for \$50 or less, first-aid kits for \$30

or less, fuel containers for \$25 or less, small household batteries for \$30 or less and a portable generator for \$750 or less. The bill excludes automotive and boat batteries.

The list of tax-exempt items does not include some items referenced by the National Weather Service on the government’s readiness website: Suggested supplies such as toilet pa-

per, garbage bags, water, manually powered tools and local maps are missing from the list of objects.

Additional items like plasticware and feminine supplies are not covered by the new bill.

Even though portable fuel-powered generators will see a sales tax exemption, fuel will not. Historically, fuel prices rise during large natu-

ral occurrences, such as tornadoes or hurricanes.

Hurricane-preparedness tax relief is one part of a three-part series of sales tax holidays established by Scott. As a part of the “It’s Your Money Tax Cut Budget,” more than \$121 million in taxes from the \$500-million planned tax and fee cuts are

Orlando commuter rail hits car

MAITLAND — A train from metro Orlando's new commuter rail hit a stalled car, but no serious injuries were reported.

Officials said none of the passengers on the SunRail train were injured in the Monday afternoon crash.

Maitland police officials said the car's driver was able to get out of her vehicle before it was hit by the train. She had minor injuries from flying debris.

Florida Department of Transportation spokesman Steve Olson said the systems operations were delayed for only a short time, and the trains were running on time during the afternoon commuter time. SunRail trains debuted at the beginning of the month.

Monday was the first day that riders had to pay fare to use the trains.

Autopsy confirms girl's body found in Tampa Bay

TAMPA — Authorities said an autopsy has confirmed that a body found floating in Tampa Bay is a missing 9-year-old girl.

Felecia Williams went missing Friday night after going to visit a family friend in Tampa. Boaters found her naked body off the Courtney Campbell

Causeway near Clearwater on Saturday afternoon.

Clearwater Police spokesman Rob Shaw said there were no visible signs of trauma.

Police said 23-year-old Eboni Wiley told them she picked up Felecia up on Friday, and they went to her apartment. She told police she discovered Felecia missing when she got out of the shower but didn't alert authorities for five hours.

Wiley was charged Sunday with making false statements to law enforcement and released on \$2,000 bail. It's not clear whether she has a lawyer.



# States start 911 texts for emergencies, not Florida

In several states, texting 911 for help is the newest way to summon police, but Florida is not among them.

Starting last Thursday, select locations in the U.S. can text 911 in an emergency situation, provided their cellphone carrier supports the service, according to the Federal Communications Commission.

The FCC proposed a rule that would require all cellphone providers to support this texting feature by Dec. 31.

Maj. Brad Barber, spokesman for University Police, said UF already has similar resources.

Blue light emergency phone systems are installed around the UF campus, and UPD monitors these phone systems constantly.

"Any method that helps expedite getting law enforcement officers to an incident location would be beneficial," Barber said.

Ivette De Santiago, a 20-year-old UF art and technology junior, said when calling for help, authorities can hear the tone of your voice and sense immediacy. But in some situations, calling might not be an option.

"If you are being abused, you won't want to pick up the phone and call," De Santiago said. "You can be more inconspicuous with texting."

# Depot Avenue construction closes roads

## The project will last for two years

In two years, Depot Avenue will have roundabouts, landscaping and decorative lighting. But for now, it's closed to traffic for construction.

Work began Monday on the section between South Main and Southwest 11th Street, near Sorority Row and Royal Village apartments.

Traffic on Main Street will be unaffected, but Depot Avenue will be closed west of Main Street, said project manager John Veilleux. Drivers can detour through Southwest Fourth, Southwest Fifth or Southwest 16th avenues to get to Southwest Sixth Street.

The reconstruction is projected to be finished by summer 2016, Veilleux said.

"We think two years is a

good duration to make it so the contractor will be busy, but he should have time to accommodate for weather and such," he said. "We've got enough time in there to account for delays."

The \$6.5-million project is funded mostly through a county incentive grant, but also with money from Gainesville Regional Utilities for the utility and wastewater

work, Veilleux said. The rest is from local funds, which are bonds owned by the city.

The largest part of the project will be the three roundabouts located at Southwest 11th Street, Southwest Sixth Street and South Main Street, which were chosen to better match the flow of traffic.


"It allows us to keep traffic moving, predominantly," Veilleux said. "People won't

just be waiting at a light and not able to go anywhere."

But the roundabouts aren't a positive addition for everyone.

Avid biker Nathaly Ruiz, a 21-year-old UF English senior, said bikers find roundabouts confusing and scary.

"It's more dangerous because you just have to go when you think it's safe. There are no lights or signals," she said. "It kind of seems like at any point, something could come around and hit you."

# The tax break covers flashlights, batteries, tarps and generators

going back to Florida taxpayers, according to the Florida government's website.

Tax breaks on school supplies and energy-efficient appliances are included in the bill as well.

John Fleming, the communications director for the Florida Retail Federation, said he is excited about the new sales tax holiday.

"Florida has done this before," Fleming said. "It is a good way to allow people to stock

up." The bill helps people become aware of what they need, he said. And retailers benefit from these tax holidays, too.

"The state had a lot more tax revenue coming in," Fleming said. "It's a great thing for consumers in Florida."

HB 5601 creates sales tax exemptions on child car seats, bicycle helmets, college meal plans, therapeutic pet foods and cement mixers. It also reduces the tax on electricity.

This is the largest broad-based tax cut that

has been implemented in a decade, according to the website.

Steven Milian, an assistant supervisor at Zell's Hardware, located on 3727 W. Univer-

sity Ave., was unaware of the new bill's passing, but knows customers will take advantage of it.

"I can only see an advantage to get the supplies that they need," he said.

Milian said he knows that items listed on the bill will go up in sales at Zell's, and he expects more customers to take advantage of the tax holiday at the store.

"We don't have any plans for advertisement," Milian said. "However, we will be mentioning it to customers."

# UF presidential search criteria picked

UF's presidential search committee unanimously confirmed changes to the presidential search criteria at a meeting Monday, mostly strengthening the focus on UF's preeminence campaign.

Fluency in a second language was swapped for "meaningful international or multicultural experience," and a new criteria calling attention to UF's diversity, particularly in liberal arts and technology, was added.

Steven Scott, chair of the

search committee, said his personal research into presidential criteria showed that the common denominator was academic achievement.

"This is a person who should easily be recognized by faculty at our university and around the nation and world, who has done something extraordinary with his or her career," he said.

Susan Cameron, a presidential search committee member, said that the chosen candidate is not expected to meet all of the suggested criteria.

"Individuals will be assessed under the totality of the qualifications," she said.

Friday, the search committee will present these changes to UF's Board of Trustees.

# GPD arrests 3 for drug possession and probation violation

Gainesville Police arrested two men and a woman for having .4 grams of cocaine, a crack pipe, weed and giving a false ID after a traffic stop on Sunday, officials said.

Officers arrested 44-year-old Michael Pippenger on drug possession, driving with a

suspended license and giving a false ID. Officers also arrested 33-year-old Jared Fearing on drug possession and 39-year-old Nikki Knudsvig on violation of probation, according to an arrest report.

The officer pulled Pippenger over at about 5:30 p.m. for illegal tint near the 1000 block of Northwest Sixth Street.

While walking up, the officer smelled mari-

juana coming from the car.

Pippenger told the officer that he did not have his driver's license on him, according to the report. He said he owned the car and provided Jonathan Branchik, 61, as his identity.

Pippenger did not appear to be 61, the officer said, and the photo on the actual license did not look like Pippenger. He said that he was in a car accident two years ago and lost

weight, according to the report.

When Pippenger was detained, officers found out his real identity. He spontaneously admitted to lying because his license was suspended, according to the report.

Officers booked Pippenger, Fearing and Knudsvig in the Alachua County Jail at about 6:30 p.m. As of press time, their bonds are set at \$7,000, \$7,000 and \$6,000, respectively.

# General Motors Co. recalls may have no effect in Gainesville

Despite consumer concerns about General Motors Co., Gainesville dealerships have felt lit-

tle to no impact after recent recalls.

GM recalled a total of about 2.7 million vehicles Thursday, the largest recalls being Chevy Malibus with numerous issues spanning over models from 2004 to 2012 and 2014, according to its website.

Don Close, owner of Don Close Auto Direct located at 2629 N. Main St. next to Northside Shopping Cen-

ter, said he has not seen any change in sales of GM vehicles caused by the the recalls.

"I've been to auctions all around the area and people still buy GM just as much," Close said. "I think today's generation of drivers is more willing to forget the past and look forward."

Mike Brewster, sales manager at

Tomlinson Motor Company, said he, too, has not seen any decline in GM sales.

"It has not affected the (used) market whatsoever," Brewster said.

"The American public has a very short memory."

While there has been little immediate effect on GM sales around

Gainesville, consumers have expressed concerns.

As a 2008 Chevy Malibu owner, Brennan Mace said he has reservations about buying from GM again.

"It's extremely worrying," Mace said, a 16-year-old high school student at Cornerstone Academy. "If I had to choose right now, I'd buy Ford."

## Common Core part of the gay agenda?

Yesterday, the Chicago Tribune published a compelling editorial defending Common Core, a set of proposed educational standards for U.S. students that was met first with overwhelming support and then with vitriol.

The Common Core debate is pretty messy and, as you may have guessed, mired by political interest. Common Core was embraced by the Obama administration in 2009 and thus defected by the GOP — who, according to the Tribune, said that though the program wasn't a government production, still carried "a strong whiff of federal intrusion into local schooling."

Objectively, Republicans have a good point. Where does the line between help and intrusion lie?

Rather than adding to an intelligent debate on improving education, Florida Rep. Charles Van Zant, R-Keystone Heights, is making headlines for claiming that Common Core will make Florida youth turn gay.

During a speech in an Orlando "Operation Education Conference," Zant said that those implementing Common Core are "promoting as hard as they can any youth that is interested in the LGBT agenda," and that they want to "attract every one of your children to become as homosexual as they possibly can."

Ah, the old "gay agenda" argument. Not to speak on behalf of all LGBT people, but isn't the only thing on the "gay agenda," like, equal rights? And an end to discrimination and homophobic/transphobic bullying and assault? And a second season of "Looking"?

Zant, unsurprisingly, has been caught in preposterous lies before. According to PolitiFact Florida, in 2013, while advocating for the criminalization of abortion based on the race or sex of the fetus, Zant claimed, "Abortionists have reduced our black population by more than 25 percent since 1973."

PolitiFact deemed that "wildly incorrect."

Zant's statements about Common Core are, additionally, wildly incorrect.

In order to understand the reasoning behind Common Core, one must be aware of the context. No other nation in the world, Diane Ravitch told the Washington Post, has "inflicted so many changes or imposed so many mandates on its teachers and public schools as we have in the past dozen years."

Ravitch, an education historian who has become the leader of the movement against corporate-influenced school reform, went on to point out that both Republican and Democratic agendas surrounding education reform have nothing to do with improving education or creating equal opportunity for students. Instead, she argues, both parties want to cut costs, standardize education and shift delivery of education from high-cost teachers to low-cost technology. Common Core was caught in the center of the desire to standardize and gut American education. Rather than fixing the public education problem, it only added to the sense that American education is just a standardized test-based meritocracy.

Common Core has its problems, yes. But Florida needs more than a hate-speech-spewing bigot when it comes to repairing public education and finding a solution.

And please: Enough with "the gay agenda."

## Your boner is not my problem, dude

College introduced me to some great things: keg parties, Midnight Cookies and a lack of dress code I had previously never enjoyed.

When I lived at home, my mom refused to let me out of the house wearing shorts that had holes or frayed hems. And my high school required my shorts to hit mid-thigh and my shirts to fully cover my shoulders.

So imagine my delight when I found out that I could wear anything, from pajamas to dresses so skimpy, they could count as lingerie, to class.

But some people are still struggling with dress codes and rules regarding what to put on their own bodies. Enter Clare, a home-schooled student from Richmond, Virginia, who was kicked out of her prom for wearing a dress that might cause "impure thoughts" from males, according to some of the male chaperones.

The dress was silver and fingertip-length, which met the one rule stipulated by the prom coordinators, according to a blog post Clare wrote last week. This, of course, is complete bull in how gendered it is.

It makes sense, though. Most dress codes are gendered, just as this one, which highlights the double standards against women in terms of clothes and body exposure.

Many dress codes or standards of dress are stricter toward women because women's bodies are seen as public property. It's more acceptable for men to dictate what is appropriate for women to wear and do, as the male chaperones did to Clare, than for a female to do the reverse.

This is apparent in many everyday, offhand comments. It's a normal occurrence for men to judge women's clothing — pause for a montage of men saying high-waisted shorts are unattractive — but I've never actually heard a girl say that cargo shorts are unappealing on men.

This issue also stems from the fact that female bodies are more sexualized than male bodies. If you don't

think that's true, think of it this way — if a girl posted a picture on Facebook with a very low-cut top, you would probably sooner call her a slut than you would a boy who posted a shirtless photo, even if he was showing more skin.

Not to mention that the body part in question here, Clare's legs, are not even a typically sexual body part. It's ridiculous that we're regulating the exposure of thighs or shoulders — if you are so turned on by my mid-thigh that you cannot focus on your schoolwork, or that you start thinking "impure thoughts," then we have a bigger issue here.

And that's what this all really comes to. Women are being forced to take responsibility for how other people view them. Clare said it well when she stated that this ordeal "(implied) that it is my responsibility to control other people's thoughts and drives."

If an individual wears a short dress or a low-cut top, sure, someone might find that attractive. But how that person reacts to that attraction is an issue for that person to handle.

It's not our responsibility as individuals, or as women, to dress so that men do not constantly have erections based on what we wear.

Clare said it best when she ended her article by saying, "And if you think I am, then maybe you're part of the problem."

We need to stop judging the sexuality of others — whore, slut, prude — based on what they wear. We might not still have a dress code, but the repercussions of past dress codes still exist. Don't let them make you part of the problem Clare warned against.

# Popular political television shows fuel conservative ideals

One are the days of NBC's hit political drama "The West Wing," and President Josiah Bartlet's fictional administration is but a distant memory. Although Bartlet was a democratic commander in chief, viewers of all political persuasions gravitated toward the fair-minded and principled president. America finally had its utopian chief executive, albeit one from a scripted primetime drama.

Contemporary political television shows, it's safe to say, are not as inspirational and uplifting. ABC's "Scandal," Netflix's "House of Cards" and HBO's "Veep" attract the most attention and critical acclaim. Their stories revolve around a presidential affair, a Machiavellian politico who rose from the House of Representatives to the White House and a gaffe-prone vice president, respectively. Thank goodness they are all fictitious!

Each of these representations of Washington, D.C., and the political processes reflect the sentiments of the population. "The West Wing" — which spanned the Clinton and second Bush presidencies — viewers were hopeful of the promise of the new millennium.

Fast forward to today, and the nation has become disillusioned with that promise of hopeful politics. While Americans are fed up with the political status quo, these shows

indulge the population's jaded yearnings.

Real-life politicians are seen as either worthy of parody on late-night television shows or too out of touch with the common man. Gridlock is commonplace in the capital. But rest assured, citizens, Hollywood is happy to oblige.

But oddly enough, Hollywood's take on Washington persuades viewers to entertain a conservative view of the government.

Take "House of Cards": Frank Underwood, the brooding politician whose obsession with power is that of legends, enters into the political arena for all of the wrong reasons. Instead of representing the needs and concerns of his district, he manipulates other politicians, the media and even his constituents for his own gain. Underwood eventually becomes the most powerful man in Washington. As Underwood confides to the audience, his co-conspirators, "Democracy is so overrated."

The conservative critique of this show is fairly obvious: With an adherence to the Constitution, keeping politicians accountable for their actions, limiting the scope of government and enacting term limits, Underwood's rise

to power would not take place. One man should have all of that power. Should citizens be a little suspicious of those in power? Probably.

Now consider the comedy "Veep." Like "House of Cards" and our actual government, politicians and their staff on the show act in their own self-interest. And like our actual government, comedic situations are always around the corner. Botched press releases and poorly planned book tours fuel humorous workplace tensions. On the show, Vice President Selina Meyer and her staff often ridicule and reprimand each other because of the constant frustration of running the country, partly caused by their own gross ineptness. Despite her future political aspirations, Meyer is unable to control her staff, let alone the No. 2 spot in government.

One would assume conservatives would be quick to point out that such characters hold power and operate in the government. That should not surprise anyone. What should surprise many is the fact that Washington insiders are quick to tell the actors and production team on "Veep" how true to life the show actually is. The insiders confess that each staff

has its own Amy, Gary, Ben and — gasp — Jonah. To any fan of the show or any fan of our government, that statement should be cause for concern. Then again, if the situations on "Veep" are as true to life as they appear to be, the causes of the shortcomings in Washington should not be that much of a surprise.

Churchill famously said that "the best argument against democracy is a five-minute conversation with the average voter." The conversation can now be extended to those in the government, provided they do not mess it up.

The conservative arguments for these shows are quite clear: When the government grows too big, when politicians enter into the arena for the wrong reasons, when the media is in cahoots with elected officials and when citizenship becomes a spectator sport, these shows become more of a reality. It's easy to laugh at government ineptness or cringe when a congressman reveals his interior motives (or extramarital affairs). But when these happen outside of scripted entertainment, the country should become concerned.

Perhaps even more concerning: Conservatives can thank Hollywood for the assistance.



# THIS WEEK in GAINESVILLE

May 20, 1999

Locals expressed their support for a bill Gov. Jeb Bush signed into law to regulate body piercing. Professional body piercers thought it would keep unprofessional, unqualified piercers out of their business. UF student Brooke Curtiss said she thought the rules might not work. "Kids are going to do it anyway. They'll just have their friends. I think they are just using sanitation as an excuse to enforce conservative values on kids."

May 23, 1989

Thanks to a donation to the St. Francis House, the homeless people of Gainesville had something other than water to enjoy with their lunch from the soup kitchen. Nutri-Products donated more than 2,000 servings of their high-protein drink Go!, which was designed to help athletes recover from training. Normally the about 80 homeless people who ate the lunch only got a liquid through vegetable soup.

May 21, 2002

The Florida Museum of Natural History said goodbye to a T.rex named Sue. The four-month-long exhibit brought the museum nationwide attention. "The Sue exhibit let the community know that the museum is playing in the big leagues," museum associate director Graig Shaak said. He said he estimated attendance to the exhibit of the 42-foot skeleton was nearly 100,000 people. As a follow-up to the popular exhibit, the museum was going to open "Tusks!" that would show the history of Florida's prehistoric elephants.

# Blueberry festival keeps Alachua traditions

ISLAND GROVE, Fla. — Sliding a birdshot round into his Remington 1100 shotgun, Kinnis Thomas takes aim at one of several small, paper targets about 30 yards into a wooded clearing.

The 69-year-old pauses for a moment and then peppers the target in one loud bang, hoping to be closer to the bull's-eye than a handful of other contenders and win a delicious prize—a rack of ribs.

At the Island Grove Blueberry Festival, which took place Saturday in southeast Alachua County, the turkey shoot has been around for many years.

Although it's certainly one of the highlights of the event, attendees also enjoyed picking blueberries and shopping for mom-and-pop knickknacks throughout the venue. About \$10,000 of the event's proceeds went to support the Cross Creek Volunteer Fire Department.

With smoke blowing from his shotgun barrel, Thomas places his gun on a table and grabs a Diet Pepsi and a chair to eye

his competition.

"I could hear 'em gobble that time," he said, hoping for a strike.

His first name is John, but people call him by his middle name, Kinnis.

Living near Island Grove since he was born, Thomas said over the years he has seen the already small town get smaller as farmers moved out of the area.

But one of the things that hasn't changed is the turkey shoot, which already won him a rack of ribs. He keeps his winning target folded inside his shirt pocket for safekeeping. Traditionally, winners received vouchers for a free turkey at the local grocery store, but since the holidays aren't upcoming, the prize is the slab of pork.

"They call it a blueberry festival for the lack of calling it something better," he

said, laughing.

Some women temporarily left their husbands to go shopping through the flea-market cluster while the men made their way to the gunfire in the distance.

One man in particular, 83-year-old Donald Faircloth, said he doesn't remember how many times he's been to the blueberry festival but hints that it's a lot. He's been in the Gainesville area since before 43rd Street and 34th Street were even built, a project he had a hand in.

"We built the first stretch of 34th Street from Archer Road to Northwest 16th Avenue," said Faircloth, who worked for a construction company in 1958. "That's as far as it went."

Some years earlier, he was a prospective UF student, but before he could start class, he was swept into service by the U.S. government to fight in the Korean War.

"Uncle Sam needed my services before I even got started," he said.

He served for 10 months before returning home.

"They shot real bullets at you there," he said.

Although some festival-goers like Faircloth have been coming to the Island Grove Blueberry Festival for many years, several first-timers came for a taste of Florida's blueberry heritage.

Self-proclaimed Wizard of Odd, Joe DiVito, brought homemade hot sauces that go from "mild to wild." He gave out free samples of his sauces to spread the word about his LaCrosse-based business.

"So far today we've only killed seven people," DiVito said, joking. "I use lucid dreaming to come up with my recipes."

Alachua County's Aunt Zelma's Blueberries and 301 Blueberries both provided more than 150 cases of berries for the event at discounted prices.

Everything from fresh blueberry ice cream to blueberry goat cheese candy was served to children and families at the festival.

And for those who aren't tired of the violet-hued berries, "U-Pick" blueberry picking will take place for another two weeks at both farms.





## Three-person pitching rotation boosts UF to Super Regional

► GATORS OUTSCORED REGIONAL OPPONENTS 29-0.

After UF defeated UCF 7-0 in the final game of the Gainesville Regional on Sunday to advance to its seventh NCAA Super Regional in program history, coach Tim Walton took a moment to remember former Gators pitcher Stacey Nelson.

“Every time we go to Super Regionals, I think of her just because she did it first,” Walton said.

When the Gators reached the Super Regionals for the first time in 2007, they rode three shutout performances and two complete games by the three-time All-American pitcher in the regional rounds as they defeated Stetson, Georgia Tech and Texas by a combined 18-0 score.

Seven years later, No. 5-seed Florida accomplished that feat again — shutting out Florida A&M, Stetson and UCF with an aggregate 29-0 score to clinch a Super Regional berth against No. 12-seed Washington that begins Saturday at Katie Seashole Pressly Stadium.

But unlike that 2007 campaign when the Gators had Nelson start all three games and pitch 18.1 of 21 innings, the 2014 Florida team used a different pitcher in each regional contest.

“At the beginning of the year, I thought having three pitchers was going to be a huge advantage for us in a situation like this,” Walton said.

“In this kind of setting, in this kind of situation playing head-to-head with three different opponents,

I think it’s a huge, huge advantage to have not just three pitchers, but three quality pitchers.”

Walton gave freshman Delanie

Gourley the nod to start against FAMU on Friday, and she responded by pitching UF’s first postseason no-hitter as the Gators cruised to a

five-inning, 8-0 victory.

Gourley showed much more command in the circle compared to her last start on April 26 against

Missouri — a game where she gave up four runs and was pulled from the circle in favor of Lauren Haeger

After defeating No. 1-seed Georgia in the NCAA quarterfinals on Saturday, the Gators couldn’t pull off another upset in the semifinals.

## Florida earns first-round bye

Florida’s quest for a seventh Southeastern Conference tournament championship begins this week as the top-seeded Gators descend upon Hoover Metropolitan Stadium.

The Gators’ first pitch of this year’s tournament is Wednesday at 5:30 p.m., and UF will face the winner of Tuesday’s eight-nine matchup featuring Alabama and Kentucky — the Gators’ seed affords them a first round bye. The first four rounds are double elimination to get the field down to four teams before the final three games of the tournament are played in a standard single elimination win-or-go-home format.

With the 13th SEC regular season cham-

pionship in school history already clinched, Florida (37-19, 21-9 SEC) failed to sweep eastern division foe Tennessee (31-22, 12-18 SEC) losing 7-5 to close out the 2014 regular season over the weekend.

With nothing to play for, Florida trotted out irregular players in its starting lineup like catcher Mike Fahrman, left fielder Ryan Larson, second baseman Jason Lombardozi and third baseman Josh Tobias. Regular second baseman Casey Turgeon got the day off for the first time all season.

Tobias — who had started only one game since March 23 — made his presence felt in a big way with a tremendous home run to lead off the third inning that soared over the left-field fence. It was his second home run this season and the fifth of his UF career.

In five innings on Friday, the freshman lefty fanned seven of FAMU's 17 batters to bring her strikeout total to 125 on the season. Gourley's 1.18 strikeout-per-inning mark is third among all freshmen and 31st in the country.

"Delanie really set the tone for us with that (two strikeout) first inning," Walton said on Friday. "She really pitched well and I'm proud of her in her first postseason start."

Senior ace Hannah Rogers followed Gourley's performance with a six-inning, four-hit shutout Saturday as Florida rolled over Stetson 14-0.

Rogers struck out four batters en route to her 24th win of the season and her 12th career postseason victory.

"I always go out there with a lot of energy," Rogers said on Saturday. "I'm not trying to change anything. I just want to keep doing what I do out there."

In her career, the Lake Wales, Fla., native holds the second-highest marks in UF

history in wins (121), complete games (102), innings pitched (950) and strikeouts (809).

Junior Lauren Haeger then capped things off for Florida on Sunday by pitching a complete-game shutout of her own in UF's 7-0 win over UCF.

"Hannah's lights out. Delanie's lights out," Haeger said. "I told myself 'They did it, so you can, too.'"

The Peoria, Ariz., native struck out five batters in the win and dropped her ERA to a career-best and team-leading 1.57. Haeger also holds the Gators' best marks in opponent batting average (.178) (UF's career mark is .174, Haeger is second best all-time) and strikeout-per-walk ratio (3.05:1).

Center fielder Kirsti Merritt feels it's a benefit that Florida has three different pitchers that can produce in the circle in any given game.

"It's amazing," the sophomore said. "I love it whenever we get all three pitchers in there. I like having the different pitches: Delanie's change-up, Hannah's drop ball and then Lauren coming out with the hard screwballs."

the DH spot in the lineup for the ninth time this season. Despite the two runs, the Gators still found themselves behind 4-2 after three innings.

UF could have added another

run in the third after a Harrison Bader flyout to left field. Larson attempted to score from third base, but instead of sliding into home he attempted to step on the plate that was blocked by the left foot of Tennessee catcher Taylor Schultz and Larson became the last out of the inning.

Two innings later in the top of the fifth, the Gators would add three runs to their total, and take a 5-4 lead thanks to two RBI doubles. The first was laced into center field by shortstop Richie Martin and scored Tobias. The second was a Gushue shot down the left-field line two batters later that scored Bader as well as Martin. It was Gushue's second and third RBIs of the game.

Tennessee would answer back with offensive firepower of its own in its half of the fifth on two RBI singles and a sacrifice fly.

From then on, Florida advanced two baserunners all the way to third base but was unable to bring them home.

With the victory, the Volunteers clinched a berth in the SEC tournament for the first time in seven years. In that 2007 tournament, Tennessee was an eight seed that upset the top-ranked in-state rival Vanderbilt in the first round before being knocked out of the double elimination tournament. The first loss was to Ole Miss by the score of 6-3, the second was in the rematch with Vanderbilt, a 15-2 shellacking.

# Florida loses nail-biter to conference rival in quarterfinals

## Freshmen fall short in postseason play

It was a season of breaking records and defying expectations.

Despite Florida's No. 5 rank in the national preseason polls, UF fans were still concerned with the team losing 13 players to graduation in 2013 and replacing them with 11 freshmen.

When Florida defeated Ohio State 10-9 on March 22 to improve to 10-2 to start the year, fans began to see the impact of the 11 new additions.

So when Florida lost in the 12-11 double-overtime game against Northwestern on Saturday, it was a hard pill to swallow for coach Amanda O'Leary.

"I'm just really proud of our seniors, what they brought to the table, their leadership, their love, they're caring and I'm sad for them," O'Leary said. "They gave so much to this program over the course of this four years for Krista (Grabher) and five years for Cara (Canington)."

Attacker Sammi Burgess, midfielder Mollie Stevens and defender Caroline Fitzgerald — a trio of freshmen — became vital players for O'Leary alongside juniors Shannon Gilroy and Nora Barry.

Burgess was one of Florida's biggest recruits before the start of the season. The 5-foot-3 attacker never lost a game during her four years at the McDonogh School in Maryland and became known at Florida

for being a vital scorer when Gilroy failed.

Stevens also came in as a top recruit but she spent her time in high school as an attacker. When Stevens arrived at Florida, O'Leary immedi-

ately moved her to midfield in an attempt to give other midfielders, like Sam Darcangelo and Nora Barry, a chance to rest. Stevens completed the season with 38 points and a reputation for her ability to score on the

fast break.

Fitzgerald became Florida's go-to player when it needed someone to guard the opponent's best scorer. Fitzgerald covered star-offensive players like Syracuse's Kayla Treanor and Northwestern's Alyssa Leonard. The Mount Sinai, N.Y., native finished the season with the most caused turnovers on defense

(22) and 30 ground balls.

Although the freshmen were the Gators' biggest and most unexpected story of the year, Gilroy also made a splash in the lacrosse community.

The Northport, N.Y., native broke the single-season record for most points (106), goals (86) and goals per game (4.15). Gilroy is the second-best offensive player in the country behind Syracuse's Treanor.

Even with Gilroy putting points on the board, it wasn't just goals that she brought to the team. In situations like Saturday when Northwestern's defense controlled Florida's scoring opportunities and stopped many of their offensive possessions, Gilroy used her notoriety as an offensive threat to get teammates like Burgess and Barry open for easy goals.

"I need to worry more about my teammates more than what I need to do to get open because it's always really difficult for me to get off the ball and get open," Gilroy said. "So I needed to be really prepared to help them and do the best I can for them."

With the disappointment of not making it past the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament, Florida will come back in 2015 with one goal in mind: Win a national title.

Senior goalkeeper Cara Canington gave her final thoughts on where the Gators would be in the 2015 season and it matched that of Florida fans sentiments.

"I think the sky's the limit for this team," Canington said. "I think there is nothing but great things to come."
