## Florida Prepaid prices drop, students to be reimbursed

Florida Prepaid tuition plan prices are expected to drop nearly \$20,000 by next year, according to the Florida Prepaid College Board.

The lowered rate is mandated by House Bill 851, which Gov. Rick Scott signed into law last week and will go into effect July 1. It is the same bill that legalized in-state tuition for undocumented immigrants in Florida.

The Stanley G. Tate Florida Prepaid College Program payment plan allows parents or guardians to finance a child's college tuition early by paying monthly installments as the child grows up.

More than 11,600 UF students re-

ceived awards from the program in the 2012-2013 year, said UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes.

Cindy Lorenzo, a 21-year-old UF biology senior, said she's thankful her parents started investing in her early.

"I've been paying it for so long that the weight of college tuition isn't so heavy on me," she said.

Now, Lorenzo said, it's even less of a burden.

Students currently receiving aid will be reimbursed or credited the difference in aid, while future students enrolled in Florida Prepaid will simply pay a lower ticket price from the start.

Lorenzo said if she receives the money in the form of a refund, she will still

In a joint effort by multiple law enforcement divisions, officers were able to act swiftly to protect most residents at a Spanish Trace Apartments shooting situation that ended with an alleged suicide.

Around 3 p.m. Wednesday, a Gainesville Police Department officer responded to Spanish Trace Apartments at 3500 Windmeadows Blvd. for a call placed in relation to alleged noise complaints, according to a GPD press release.

Kim Walsh, a resident of the neighboring apartment complex Regency Oaks Apartments, said she witnessed females being dragged away, one of whom was wearing a bathing suit.

Upon arrival, the officer spoke with some involved parties on the second floor when he heard gunshots in Apartment 11 on the first floor.

The officer ran down and found the female and male victims, later found to be a 21-year-old and a 24-year-old, respectively, running from the first floor apartment with obvious gunshot wounds in the arm and chest, according to a press release.

Ali Richter, a 21-year-old UF English major and resident of Spanish Trace Apartments, said she was in her apartment all day when the incident started.

She noticed cops were either escorting residents out of their apartments or commanding

## GNV fire rescue rated higher

### ► IT MOVED FROM CLASS 3 TO 2.

Property owners in Gainesville should expect to see a reduction in their fire insurance bill in September.

Gainesville Fire Rescue has improved its classification by the Insurance Service Office. It will go from a Class 3 to a Class 2, effective Sept. 1. The scale is from one to 10, with one being the best public protection in fire-protection capability and 10 indicating that there is no recognized protection.

This could mean more money in the pockets of property owners because insurance agencies use this information to set insurance rates for houses and buildings.

"The city commission has supported mak-

ing improvements so the fire station can perform at an optimal level, and the ISO rating reflects that," said Mayor Ed Braddy.

The insurance office rates on three primary areas: response time, quality of equipment and quality of training.

According to the insurance office's website, GFR is one of 40 departments with that rating out of 682 in Florida.

Fire Chief Gene Prince said that numerous factors improved GFR's rating, but said he thinks the biggest factors were adding Fire Station No. 8 in 2011 and hiring 16 new firefighters.

"We've been held up to the light, and we're doing pretty good," he said.

Prince said the new rates will reflect the best practices that the fire department uses in its delivery of services.

"At the end of the day, I think that's what our citizens want to know," he said.


### Gallery Talk at Artwalk

### Universal: New Harry Potter area will open July 8

ORLANDO — The new Harry Potter-themed area at Universal Orlando Resort is set to open early next month.

Universal officials announced Wednesday that

the new Harry Potter attraction at Universal Studios Park will open July 8. It will double the size of the Harry Potter landscape in the park and will be tied via the Hogwarts Express train to the original Wizarding World of Harry Potter at Universal's Islands of Adventure.

The new area's centerpiece ride, Harry Potter and the Escape from Gringotts, will take visitors into Gringotts Bank to help retrieve a magical object and recreate a scene from the popular book and movie series.

If fans want to see both parks, a two-park ticket is required. For adults, a two-park ticket for one day costs \$136, for children, it's \$130.

use it for its intended purpose.

"I would use it to contribute toward my graduate school," she said.

The fee reductions are an attempt to combat the trend of tuition hikes that have been growing since 2008, when the state enacted a law allowing universities to raise tuition up to 15 percent above the state-mandated rate.

"We are the largest and longest running prepaid program in the nation," Florida Prepaid College Board executive director Kevin Thompson said in a press release.

He said this legislation will make sure the program continues to keep that title.

Specifically, HB851 eliminates any increase in fees charged above the state-mandated rate for state

universities excluding UF and Florida State University, whose fee increases are now limited to 6 percent above the state standard.

According to the Florida Prepaid College Board, 4-Year Florida University Plans and 2+2

Florida Plans purchased from the contract year 2011 to 2014, as well as Tuition Differential Fee Plans purchased from the contract year 2008 to 2014 will now cost lower than they have in five years.

Monthly payments for new contracts are estimated at \$250, down from \$350.

Those estimates will become

concrete Oct. 15, when open enrollment officially begins.

This is good news, said 22-year-old UF advertising senior Maria Eisenhart.

She said the decision of whether to sign up for Florida Prepaid has been hard for some of her friends.

"My best friend got it for her niece," she said.

But she said her friend has two nieces and had to choose between the two.

Now she will likely be able to afford to pay for both, she said.

Eisenhart said she plans to do the same for her future children.

"You don't know what situation you'll be in financially as a parent, or what the child will be in." With Prepaid, she said, "at least they have, like, one step in the door."

# Man arrested with cocaine in underwear

Gainesville Police arrested a local man on Tuesday for storing nearly 3 ounces of cocaine in his pockets and underwear and running from officers.

Officers arrested 38-year-old Xavier Queyonta Hill on charges of trafficking cocaine, resisting an officer with violence and possessing marijuana, according to an arrest report.

On Tuesday at about 7 p.m., Gainesville Police officers made a traffic stop on a car that had an expired registration date. An officer approached Hill on the passenger side of the car.

Hill voluntarily exited the car and then attempted to run. The officer ran after him, grabbing his shirt. Hill pulled away, losing his shirt.

After being stunned, Hill was then found with 3 ounces of powder cocaine, according to the report.

Officers found one bag in Hill's shorts pocket and two others in his underwear.

After questioning, Hill admitted to owning the 1 gram of marijuana inside the car. However, he did not make any statements regarding the cocaine, according to the report.

Officers booked Hill into the Alachua County Jail at about 8 p.m. on Tuesday. As of press time, his bond is set at \$120,000.

# Suspect was found dead

residents to stay inside, shouting, "Do you want to die? Get in your apartment!"

The officer heard another gunshot as he was getting the victims to safety at Oaks Pawn and Jewelry to be treated for wounds by EMS.

Both victims, who were evacuated and transported to a local hospital, suffered non-life threatening injuries, GPD spokesman Ben Tobias wrote in an email.

The shooter, later identified as 48-year-old Lorenzo Fitzpatrick, retreated back into Apartment 11, allegedly still armed with a handgun but no hostages.

Multiple divisions of GPD, including K-9, SWAT and the Negotiation Response Team, arrived with the help of Alachua County

Sheriff's Office and U.S. Marshals Florida Fugitive Task Force, according to a press release.

Around 6 p.m., SWAT was able to slow the situation down to plan their approach, where police believed the shooter was contained in one of several apartments, Tobias wrote in a GPD Facebook update.

Around 6:30 p.m., officers unsuccessfully attempted to make direct contact with the suspect.

Gainesville SWAT officers, with assistance from ASO SWAT, formed a response team that ultimately cleared the interior of the apartment, where Fitzpatrick was found dead at about 6:50 p.m., according to a press release.

A handgun was lying near the body, leading investigators to believe Fitzpatrick turned the gun on himself.

# UF Phonebook gets facelift, update from 2008 version

Juan Arboleda was searching for his professor.

Arboleda, a 19-year-old UF microbiology and cell science sophomore, looked online, but found nothing.

He wandered around the genetics lab until a security guard guided him to his destination.

Students facing a similar dilemma have a solution in UF's newly updated directory.

Starting June 25, the new-look UF Directory will replace the online UF Phonebook, launched in 2008.

When the original program was launched, mobile devices did not have the capability to perform complicated searches or the computing power necessary to conduct searches for such a large database, Tracy Gale, UF's

Information Technology communications manager, wrote in an email.

"As with all technology, advances in programming and capabilities require service upgrades," Gale said.

The updated directory provides a less cluttered interface that will be responsive to desktops, laptops and mobile devices. Just this year, about 70,000 people have used the UF Phonebook, according to the UFIT website.

Jacelyn Mitchelson, the Innovation Academy's senior secretary, uses the online UF Phonebook often to locate staff and faculty on campus.

When using the updated UF Directory, she was able to locate a name she did not find in the current version of the phonebook.

Students will be able to access the new-look UF Directory through a link located on the current Directory-UF Phonebook website, [directory.ufl.edu](http://directory.ufl.edu).

## Clinic closes for renovation

The Student Health Care Center basement and first two floors are scheduled to close to patients and students from June 23-27, but limited services will be available for university athletes.

The patient rooms and lobby are undergoing renovations to update the building, said Catherine Seemann, communications coordinator for the SHCC.

The renovations started June 6 with the basement of the infirmary, and the renovations will continue in phases.

The center is also adding a rubber runner on the wheelchair ramp to add traction and assist students, she said.

The renovations, including design and construction, will cost \$375,000, wrote the UF spokesman Steve Orlando in an email.

General medical services will be available at the UF Health Shands Satellite Clinic in the Student Health Science Center.

Information about the clinic will be

available on the outside of the building in the information tubes.

"This shouldn't affect students," Seemann said. "The only disruption is break week."

The pharmacy is open in an alternate opening in the back of the building, and students can take RTS or GOTCHA ride with a Gator 1 Card to UF Health Shands Satellite Clinic.

## Time to reflect on history of Iraq War

**I**raq, a country that for mind-boggling reasons the U.S. invaded in 2003, is in a state of disarray. In recent weeks, a terrorist group known as the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria has taken control over large swaths of the country, including Mosul, Iraq's second-largest city.

Here at home, politicians and foreign policy experts are trying to find a way to solve the growing crisis — ISIS now has a foothold in both Iraq and its neighbor Syria — and in the process, continue to toss political barbs.

After all, someone must be blamed for the disaster in Iraq, and it most certainly can't be former President George W. Bush, who was decider-in-chief when we invaded in 2003.

Let's be very clear: The entire destabilization of the Middle East started with Bush's inane 2003 invasion of a sovereign country without any provocation. This testament to macho behavior cost the lives of nearly 4,500 American men and women in service and tens of thousands of Iraqis at a cost of \$1.7 trillion.

Most of Congress — and sadly, the American people — agreed with Bush. In March of 2003, the U.S. launched a full-scale invasion of a sovereign country that had nothing to do

Who knows? It may save the lives of future men and women in the U.S. Military.





## Lana Del Rey's voice is the star on her cinematic new album


Lana Del Rey's career skyrocketed with her 2012 release, "Born to Die," where she wrote songs of love, heartbreak and alcohol addiction at an early age. The album had strong hip-hop influence in its quick-tempo production and moments of rap from Del Rey on songs like "National Anthem" and "Diet Mountain Dew." While her latest record, "Ultraviolence," doesn't vary much in lyrical content, it is a bigger, more cinematic experience than her previous effort thanks to the change in production and attention to Del Rey's voice.

The new album's first four tracks take more than 22-and-a-half minutes to complete, but Del Rey's vocals aren't rushed, and the pain and beauty in her voice can lay out over the background production ("Shades of Cool" and "Ultraviolence"). There isn't much hip-hop influence in the album, with the exception of "West Coast," and Del Rey takes on a heavier soul/blues angle to the way she sings her songs (evident on the album's final song, "The Other Woman," a Nina Simone cover), which allows for her painstakingly beautiful voice to shine through. Rather than catch up with the music, she displays her emotions of love, backstabbing and heartbreak over the music without sounding hurried, which is heav-

ily influenced by the main producer of the album, Dan Auerbach, who is the lead singer of the blues rock band The Black Keys. "Ultraviolence" doesn't have many up-tempo moments — most of "Born to Die" was quick in tempo with the exception of "Video Games" and "Radio" — but Del Rey's drawn out, cinematic vocals sound better over the slower-paced, rock/jazz production.

On "Pretty When You Cry," Del Rey sings with a soft voice, "All those little times you said that I'm your girl, you make me feel like your whole world," before the spacious guitars and slow-paced drums allow her to belt, "I'm pretty when I cry," speaking to her lover's enjoyment of seeing her cry. Lyrics like this are much more difficult to swallow when they're repeated over choruses and guitar solos rather than cut off by another verse.

"Ultraviolence" is far more intriguing sonically than "Born to Die," which allows the lyrics to stand out more than the upbeat and, at times, fun production on her previous album. It's never easy to listen to people unleash their emotions (unless your Del Rey's lover from "Pretty When You Cry"), and "Ultraviolence" doesn't make it any easier. But as an artist, Del Rey improved in her delivery and sound from her previous record and made "Ultraviolence" a beautiful record to listen to.



## 'Bro Island' and Christian dubstep: Q&A with Hundred Waters Begun in Gainesville, the band returns next week

The L.A.-via-Gainesville electro-indie group Hundred Waters will perform at the High Dive on June 27 at 9 p.m. Tickets can be purchased for \$10 online, at Hear Again Music and Movies or the High Dive box office and are \$12 at the door. Hundred Waters' tour comes off the tails of the release of "The Moon Rang Like a Bell," which dropped on May 27 under Skrillex's record label, OWSLA. The Alligator caught up with electronics/guitarist and former UF architecture major Paul Giese for a brief Q&A.

You guys are returning to Gainesville this month. Will you

be revisiting any places where you used to hang out?

We'll probably grab some La Tienda immediately when we enter the city limits, and then after the show, we'll probably grab a cup of coffee from Volta.

Speaking of Gainesville, I read in the feature SPIN did on you this week about something called Bro Island, a warehouse space you used to practice and perform in—

Oh my gosh (laughs). That's so embarrassing.

So can you tell me more about Bro Island?

Basically it's a little house that's right behind El Indio, that taco place, and we came in at a time

when the subsidized housing that used to be surrounding that area was all being demolished.

It used to be a grocery store and then a dojo and all these things — and it's still there — I think it's kind of fratty now. But it was great. It had a giant yard that was

fenced in, so we could throw shows there. There were giant rooms and concrete floors, so we could be loud and experiment. We recorded the first album; we threw a lot of shows there. We had a lot of great formative times there. It became a great

little piece of the Gainesville music scene at that time.

In what ways has Hundred Waters' sound changed since those early days and now with "The Moon Rang Like a Bell?"

It's hard to quantify those subconscious things that make you do something a certain way. With art and music, it's hard to set a goal and then just have it be achieved and check a box. Ideologies change, so it's a tough question — the listener might be able to answer best.

Reviewers throw around so many different words to describe Hundred Waters, and it's not like the other acts on Skrillex's label. How would you personally de-

scribe your sound?

There's all sorts of fun things people use to describe us, and it's always interesting for us to read them — things like folktronica, or like, synth-pop.

It's hard to describe, from our point of view. We just make it with our ways of making it, and it just ends up being what it is. It's always a tough thing, like when we're at a gas station on tour and a car pulls up next to us and they're like, "You're in a band! What type of music do you make?"

We've been having that question posed to us for two years, and everytime it gets asked we all just lock up and chuckle because we don't know what to say. We usually just say something silly, like Christian dubstep or something.

# Are celebrity cookbooks 'culinary'?

Americans love cookbooks, and this is especially apparent in recent years. In 1961, 49 cookbooks were published. In 2001, more than 1,700 were published, with an astounding 530 million books on food and alcohol sold in the U.S. in 2000. Furthermore, cookbooks are the only genre of print books to maintain sales after 9/11 and to increase in sales during the 2009 recession.

Yet, we are in an era dedicated to convenience and time-saving meals, devoting less time to cooking. More people are buying meals and bringing them home, eating out or eating in the car. In fact, 30 percent of eating in the U.S. is now done in cars, with the 7-Eleven chain introducing "dashboard dining," foods that are designed for convenient car consumption. Thus, an initial question arises: Are we reading cookbooks more than cooking from them? If so, are cookbooks teaching readers more than culinary skills?

A way to answer that is to look at the discourse offered in cookbooks, particularly cookbooks written by celebrity chefs. Since

2004, more than half of the top 25 best-selling general cookbooks sold on Amazon.com Inc. are cookbooks written by celebrity chefs, specifically stars from the television channel Food Network. Curious about this phenomenon, scholar Christine Mitchell explores the rhetoric of five celebrity cookbooks, questioning whether the cookbooks have culinary value or serve more as promotional material for the stars.

Comparing cookbooks by Rachael Ray, Emeril Lagasse, Bobby Flay, Sara Moulton and the grande dame, Julia Child, Mitchell finds that much of the difference among the cookbooks in their instructional intent depends on gender. By looking at the rhetoric on the covers, introductions, images, recipes and endorsements, Mitchell suggests that the women concentrated on teaching readers about cooking as a practice to develop and continue, while the men's cookbooks are more promotional material, focusing on their personal likes, dislikes and restaurants.



Is it that women, like their American predecessors — Amelia Simmons in the first genuine American cookbook in 1796 and influential Fannie Farmer in her 1896 "Boston Cooking-School Cook Book" — will continue to be the real teachers in the kitchen? There is no doubt that there are female celebrity chefs who covet and have earned the limelight — Giada de Laurentiis comes to mind — nor can we overlook men who have influenced the culinary habits of American home cooks. James Beard, Craig Claiborne and Mark Bittman are among the greats. The ultimate test for a celebrity cookbook is determining whether the venture would have a chance of standing on its own as a cookbook, or literary effort, had the celebrity sent it to the publisher under an unknown name. Some will be used more in the kitchen than others, regardless of gender.

# Roller Rebels Roll On

"Patti Smithereens," No. 86, fought her way through the pack of women as she was met with crushing shoulder shoves and hips knocking her every which way.

The moment she broke through the crowd of skaters she picked up her pace, speeding around the track only to endure it all over again.

The name of the game is roller derby. One track, eight women on roller skates and nothing but action.

On Saturday, the Gainesville Roller Rebels, Gainesville's first and only competitive women's flat-track roller derby league, battled the Fort Myers Derby Girls at the Alachua County Fairgrounds in the first home game of the summer.

Spectators paid \$10 for a ticket and scoured around for the perfect spot to set up their camping chairs.

"These things get pretty intense," said Veronica Almeida, a 23-year-old UF alumna. "Last game I went to, two girls broke their arms and just got back up and kept playing."

There are rules against certain blocking techniques to protect play-

ers from major injuries, but essentially, being rough is the highlight of the game.

The stampede of women skaters in fishnet panty hose and bright, silver spandex blocked and shoved each other left and right for an hour and a half. The derby ended with the unofficial score of 109 to 274.

Although Gainesville lost by more than 100 points, the skaters didn't let that get in their way of celebrating the game.

Rounding up both teams, the skaters picked up cups of beer and toasted to a good time when the game came to an end.

Christina Cates, the Gainesville Roller Rebels vice president, said bouts are intense, but players usually have no hard feelings in the end. They make jokes and have a good laugh up until that starting whistle blows, and then it's game on, she said.

The team has six games scheduled for the rest of the year, and the next home derby is scheduled for Aug. 2.

The Gainesville Roller Rebels are also looking for more women to join their team and will hold a three-day boot camp for \$30 starting July 13.

# MiXOXO adds to the dating app mix

With mobile dating apps on the rise, a new company is offering a new take on the nature of creating fast relationships by encouraging members to involve family and friends in the process.

MiXOXO developed an app called XOXO to combine social networking and dating services by allowing members to include email addresses for people to include in their group before entering potential partner preferences. It has been available since April 9.

The app takes a step away from the hookup culture behind other popular dating apps. Ethan Weinstein, CEO, said he hopes it will allow users to learn more information about both new and current friends.

One flaw of dating apps is not having a good algorithm that calculates a match-making function using a specific process, he said. MiXOXO created an algorithm based on 12

questions to group users based on compatibility.

"We have made the experience of meeting people fun and interactive, and the 12 questions make it as real life as possible," Weinstein said.

The app also moves away from using GPS locator information and group users in larger regions to introduce them to people outside of their immediate area.

Kyle Miller, a 19-year-old UF finance freshman, said that the app is a good innovation of the traditional dating app. Adding social networking is a good idea to attract more users.

"I've always found it easier to meet people when I have one or two friends around," Miller said.

While the app may offer safety in numbers, some people may still be turned off due to the reputation of dating apps. Itarah Godbolt, a 21-year-old dance senior at UF, is skeptical about the safety of possible interactions.

"I find dating apps creepy be-

cause I feel they have a potential to be dangerous," she said.

While adding social media wouldn't change her views, the company is using a creative marketing strategy, she said.

"They are doing something a little bit different. They are tapping into the trend of social media and speaking to their audience."

It takes less than 30 seconds to create a profile on the app, and it's open for people of all ages, sexual orientations and relationship statuses to use. The app only has a few hundred users so far, but Weinstein hopes it will become an international product.

To access MiXOXO's app for free, download it from the app store and enter the code "XO" during the sign-up process. Each member you sign up with will receive his or her own code offering a discount on the typical membership plan. Prices range from \$8.33 to \$39.99 per month, depending on the plan's length and how many members you sign up.

## Gushue, Turgeon forgo senior season

Since right-handed pitcher Justin Shafer signed with the Toronto Blue Jays on June 10, two more Gators have decided to go pro.

Juniors Taylor Gushue and Casey Turgeon opted to forgo their final year of eligibility at UF after signing with the Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals, respectively.

After being drafted in the fourth round of the MLB Draft, Gushue begins his pro career with the Jamestown Jammers of the Class A Short-Season New York-Penn League. Through five games, the catcher has a .364 batting clip with four home runs and nine RBIs.

During his three-year tenure at Florida, Gushue started 162 games and posted a career .273 batting average with 16 home runs and 103 RBIs.


In 2014, the catcher led the Gators in hits (71), doubles (16), home runs (six), RBIs (49) and slugging percentage (.467) while being second on the team with a career-high .316 batting average. Gushue paced the Southeastern Conference in league play with a .389 clip at the plate and was tied for third with 41 hits en route to first-team All-SEC and second-team All-America honors.

With Gushue's departure, Florida has several options for his replacement behind the plate. Rising seniors Braden Mattson and Mike Fahrman — who com-

bined for 10 starts at catcher last season — are still on the roster. Catcher commit JJ Schwarz, a 2014 Perfect Game first-team All-

American from Palm Beach Gardens High in West Palm Beach, Fla., provides another option.

It may be enough, however, for Snyder to decide whether another name could be more lucrative because it would have the same financial viability and trademark protection as the other 31 teams.

The Southeastern Conference Tournament final pitted the Gators and Wildcats against one another for the third time in the 2013-2014 season.

With just more than 11 minutes on the clock and down by 15, the Wildcats proceeded to go on a 21-7 run to cut the Gators' lead to 61-60 with 1:31 left in the game.

After Scottie Wilbekin and Dorian Finney-Smith each missed free throws with fewer than 30 seconds to go, UK had a chance to jump ahead and capture the SEC Tournament on the final possession.

However, when James Young had an open lane, he slipped and lost possession of the ball to secure Florida's first SEC Tournament championship since 2007.

**Florida vs. Alabama (softball)**



**Result: UF 6-3**

In Game 2 of the Women's College World Series Championship, UF rocked Bama's Jaclyn Traina for five runs off six hits in just 1.1 innings.

Senior Hannah Rogers, who threw a four-hit shutout in the Gators' Game 1 victory, closed out the final two innings to earn the save in Florida's first championship in the program's 18-year history.

UF had made it to the WCWS Championship twice before in 2009 and 2011, but the Gators were swept both times.

**Florida vs. Northwestern (lacrosse)**



**Result: UF 9-8**

In the American Lacrosse Conference championship game, Florida faced rival Northwestern. The two schools butted heads once at the end of Florida's 12-2 regular season and it was Northwestern's opportunity to take the second win.

The Wildcats came out with a solid game leading the Gators 7-2 at halftime, but Florida managed to hold Northwestern to just one point in the second half while the Gators put the ball in the back of the net seven times to win 9-8. UF captured the ALC title for the second year in a row.

**Florida vs. Georgetown (w. basketball)**



**Result: UF 67-65**

Despite not leading for the entire game, the Gators overcame a 16-point halftime deficit to shock the Hoyas. After tying the game at 58 at

the end of regulation, Florida quickly took its first lead of the game on a three-point-play by senior Jaterria Bonds.

With the UF lead down to 66-65, Bonds, who scored a career-high 26 points in the game, drove hard to the basket and completed one of two fouls to cement the Gators 67-75 comeback victory.

**Florida vs. Auburn (men's basketball)**



**Result: UF 71-66**

Down 38-30 at the half, the Gators stormed back in the final 20 minutes behind their four seniors and the clutch three-point shooting of sophomore Michael Frazier.

Patric Young scored all 17 of his points in the second half and went 7-for-9 at the free-throw line, including hitting three within the final 20 seconds.

The Tigers had the opportunity to make their comeback down 68-66 but Allen Payne threw the inbound pass over the Gators' bench to essentially seal UF's 18th straight win.

With No. 1 Syracuse losing to unranked Boston College earlier that night, Florida's victory against Auburn gave Billy Donovan's squad the top ranking for the first time since 2007.

in rebounds per game (5.0), assists per game (1.6), total steals (37) and total blocks (20) in his final collegiate season.

Since Florida won its last national championship in 2007, 11 former Gators have been drafted — five were first-round choices — with at least one UF player being selected in ev-

ery draft with the exception of 2010.

UF's 2007 draft class saw five players — Al Horford (third), Corey Brewer (seventh), Joakim Noah (ninth), Chris Richard (41st) and Taurian Green (52nd) — taken in the 60-pick draft, tying with the 2006 UConn class for the most players selected in one year until the 2012 draft when Kentucky had six players drafted.

Turgeon, selected by the Cardinals in the 24th round, was assigned to the Johnson City Cardinals in the Rookie Appalachian League. The team opens its season today with a three-game series against the Bluefield Blue Jays.

Turgeon started 185 games — including 177 at second base — during his three-year career at Florida, accruing a .269 batting average with 112 runs, 95 RBIs and 13 home runs. In his junior campaign, the Palm Harbor na-

tive paced the Gators with 35 walks while being second on the team with 36 runs, 33 RBIs, 11 doubles and four home runs.

Florida returns five players who started double-digit contests in the infield in 2014 — juniors Zack Powers, Josh Tobias and Mattson; sophomore Richie Martin; and freshmen Peter Alonso and John Sternagel. UF also has two infield commits — Dalton Guth-

rie, a 2014 Perfect Game second-team All-American selection, and 2014 second-team All-Region selection Christian Hicks — who have experience playing second base.

Florida has three more players — pitchers Karsten Whitson (11th round, Boston Red Sox), Ryan Harris (26th round, Boston Red Sox) and Keenan Kish (34th round, Cincinnati Reds) — who were drafted but haven't made a decision to go pro or remain at school. The deadline for a draft pick to sign with a team is July 18.

# Team could still win appeal on technicality as it did in years past

By the time you read this, the Redskins will probably have already submitted an appeal of the decision. They may even win on a technicality like they did in 2003. That year, they won the appeal of a 1999 trademark cancellation decision because the judge ruled that the plaintiffs who challenged the rule had waited too long after the original Trademark Act of 1946 to do so, and they also didn't have enough evidence. The current suit — originally filed in 2006 — that has resulted in cancellation hopes to dodge the former technicality because its plaintiffs were aged 18-24 at the time it was filed. And they hope the evidence they've presented stands up against the latter.

The team released a statement that reads: "We've seen this story before. And just like last time, (yesterday's) ruling will have no effect at all on the team's ownership of and right to use the Redskins name

and logo." In other words: they're confident the crutch they've used to offend millions will come through for them once more. The second part however, is technically correct, because until an appeal decision is handed down, the team still gets to act as if they have total ownerships of the trademark.

You wouldn't call a team the Washington N\*\*\*\*\*s, a word loaded with centuries of oppression and hate, but still Washington's NFL franchise flies in the face of common decency and even common sense. It is a derogatory nickname that has persevered because it took so long for so many of us to care.

It will change, it's just a matter of time. Public opinion is already on the side of the Native Americans that are so profoundly wounded by Snyder's stubbornness. He isn't changing the name until he absolutely has to, but if an appeals court does what many of us hope it will after the long process is complete, he may not have a choice.


