UF pitcher: SEC Female Athlete of the Year

Hannah Rogers has proven time and time again her value to the Florida softball team.

In her four years in the circle for Florida, Rogers led the Gators to a 127-31 record in 191 appearances.

She was UF's first four-time All-American in softball program history.

She tossed three solo no-hitters over her final two years with Florida to go along with her 41 career shutouts.

And after leading Florida to its first Women's College World Series title in

her final year, Rogers can add one more accolade to her list as she was announced as the 2014 Southeastern Conference Female Athlete of the Year on Tuesday.

"It makes me proud to have done this for the University of Florida, but also for the game of softball," Rogers said in a release. "Though the game is getting bigger and bigger, it probably doesn't get the recognition it should, so this is something I can take pride in."

The right-hander finished her UF career second to Stacey Nelson in wins (127), shutouts (41), complete games

The Swamp to hold first hot dog eating contest

The winner will be awarded a silver plate with his or her name engraved into it, \$100 in cash and a \$50 gift card for the

Police say local man with drill chased maintenance man

A Gainesville man is accused of hitting, biting and chasing a maintenance worker after an argument about door locks and then yelling racial slurs.

Gainesville Police arrested 33-year-old Curtis Antonio Wims on charges of aggravated battery and aggravated assault along with committing a hate crime on Monday, according to an arrest report.

At about 4:10 p.m., an argument between David Raymond Rossman, a local maintenance man, and Wims began, concerning locks being installed in Wims' girlfriend's living room.

When Rossman tried to leave, Wims blocked him and made racist comments, according to the report. Wims then punched Rossman in the nose.

Rossman grabbed Wims to avoid getting hit again, making both of them fall onto the couch, according to the report. Wims continued to hit Rossman's back and bit his nose with enough force to leave marks.

Rossman was able to get away, holding his electric drill, ac-

ording to the report. Wims ran after him and grabbed the drill Rossman dropped and then chased him around the yard.

Wims said, "Cracker, I'm going to f**k you up," according to Rossman in the report.

Unable to catch up with Rossman, Wims left the area and was later found near the 2000 block of East University Avenue.

After questioning, Wims said he did not like "crackers" and that Rossman started it all, according to the report. Wims said he did not bite Rossman's nose.

Officers booked Wims into the Alachua County Jail on Monday at 5:30 p.m. As of press time, his bond is set to \$75,000.

restaurant.

UF observatory gets star ranking

UF's astronomy observatory was recently ranked fourth in a list of the top 25 college observatories in the nation on CollegeRank.net.

According to the listing, the Rosemary Hill Observatory is a strong selling point for students who aim to study the stars, physics or related areas.

"It provides a good training ground for our graduate students who need to use large, sophisticated instruments elsewhere," said Howard Cohen, associate professor emeritus in the UF astronomy department. "It provides an opportunity for them to get their feet wet."

Founded in 1967, the RHO is about 30 miles southwest from Gainesville. The facilities include two telescope domes, a dormitory and utility buildings, according to the UF astronomy website.

Unlike many other observatories featured on the list that are public, the RHO is private and intended more for research, Cohen said. UF's Astronomy and Astrophysics Soci-

ety has visited the observatory at least once a semester in the past two years as part of their social events, said Natalie Foster, a 20-year-old UF astronomy and physics senior and president of the Astronomy and Astrophysics Society.

Satellite photos show Rosemary Hill near the center of the largest dark area in north Florida, where it is free from light pollution, according to the UF astronomy website.

"A lot of people are surprised when they go out there for the first time because it's in a part of Florida that doesn't have a lot of big cities so it's really open, and the trees are low, so we have a lot of sky to look at," Foster said. "Sometimes you can see the Milky Way. It's really nice."

Foster said she believes that the department could continue to gain recognition for the observatory if given the support it needs.

"I think if we could get a little more money to improve it, we might get that award again sometime," Foster said. "I think it's definitely something that we can strive toward."

3. Texas A&M Astronomical Observatory

It relies on powerful computers to conduct complex processing of recorded images and radio sounds.

LSAT possibly waived for 10 percent of law school admits

Students looking to apply to law school may no longer need to take the LSAT starting in August.

The American Bar Association recently said accredited law schools

can admit 10 percent of an entering class without requiring the LSAT.

The UF Levin College of Law Interim Dean George Dawson wrote in an email that the change will be considered when the faculty meets to evaluate its admissions.

"We will review data from prior years in order to assess the potential impact of such a change on our admissions policies and on our stu-

dents," Dawson said.

To be considered, a student must apply to a law program at the same institution as their undergraduate program or must be seeking a J.D. degree in combination with a degree of a different discipline, according to the ABA. A student must also have scored at or above the 85th percentile on the ACT or SAT.

Students with the combination

of degrees must have scored at or above the 85th percentile on the GRE or GMAT, must be ranked in the top 10 percent of their undergraduate class or have a cumulative GPA of a 3.5 or above throughout six semesters of academic work.

"These requirements should ensure that highly qualified students will be admitted even if they have not taken the LSAT," Dawson said.

Incoming Levin College of Law student Elise Holtzman, 23, said because she spent so much time improving her LSAT score, a law school that does not require it would become less attractive to her.

"I don't know if the LSAT is necessarily the best method of measuring a person's ability to think logically," Holtzman said. "But there has to be something."

UF student helps US Special Olympics soccer team win second

They may not be playing in the FIFA World Cup, but the Special Olympics Unified soccer team came, saw and conquered at the 2014 Special Olympics USA Games.

The Orlando Special Olympics soccer team took home the silver medal at the USA Games in New Jersey.

Olivia Marinov, a 20-year-old UF applied physiology and kinesiology junior, has been involved with Special Olympics since she was in the eighth grade, coaching soccer

at a summer camp to children with autism and playing in this year's Olympic games.

Marinov was a Unified Partner, someone without an intellectual disability, for her team, which practices three times a week.

"Just like a regular soccer practice, we do conditioning and ball-control drills," Marinov said. "They're just like us, but sometimes you just have to break things up and find different ways to say things."

In June, the Orlando team played against Nebraska, and although they lost 2-0, Marinov said it felt like they won.

She received a phone call on Tuesday

from her coach that her team received a bid to go to the Special Olympics World Games in the future.

"It's a huge part of my life, and it means a lot to me," Marinov said. "I've seen the team grow up as players and as people."

Danielle Spears, spokeswoman and public relations director for Special Olympics Florida, said the goal of Special Olympics is to provide year-round sports training and competition for children and adults with intellectual disabilities by offering them a fair opportunity to demonstrate their skills and increase public awareness.

There were 180 Florida athletes and coaches who attended the games this year, she said.

In total, 3,500 athletes participated, and there were more than 70,000 volunteers and families present.

She said that the success of this team is a win for inclusion and acceptance for people with intellectual disabilities.

"We really believe in the transformative power of sports," Spears said. "By sharing their abilities and successes with the community, we hope to shatter stereotypes about people with disabilities."



Lo-fi Motown-soul duo III Bones graduates from Gainesville

On Monday evening, lo-fi Motown-soul duo III BONES held one of its final rehearsals in Ocala on American Eagle Farm. Light from the setting sun streamed

in through the farmhouse's floor-to-ceiling living-room windows as guitarist/singer Victoria de Benedicty, guitarist/singer Dalton Jacob and fill-in drummer Jared Reddick practiced for III Bones' farewell show at High Dive on Saturday night.

The farm belongs to 18-year-old de Benedicty's parents. She and Jacob, 24, the band's owners, are preparing to relocate from the de Benedicty's home to Austin on July 8 in their recently acquired used 1992 Tiffin Motorhomes RV.

After 18 months of making music together, the pair is ready to get its feet wet in the city's flourishing music scene and find more musicians to fill out the band.

They recorded their third album, which will be released this fall, at Good Danny's, a recording studio in Austin owned by Danny Reisch.

The new record, scheduled to be released later this year, represents a growth spurt for the group. The songs are a bit more up-tempo, a bit more rock 'n' roll and a lot more refined as III Bones establishes itself as a serious lo-fi soul outfit.

"Long term, we want to tour in this," Jacob said and gestured at the inside of the RV, "for like, the next 50 years. It's like a certain type of addiction when you go on tour."

Since III Bone's formation in early 2013, de Benedicty and Jacob have played more than 200 shows in Gainesville and along the east coast, recorded three albums and opened for acclaimed indie bands like Surfer Blood, Reptar, Hank & Cupcakes, Matt Pond PA and Jacuzzi Boys.

From the moment they met at an open mic night at an Ocala bar on Jan. 1, 2013, the two have remained focused on writing, performing and recording as much as possible.

Jacob, a Warped Tour veteran who had been in and out of pop-punk bands since he was 16, knew immediately after seeing de Benedicty cover of the Kinks' "Strangers" at O'Malley's Alley that he wanted to perform with her.

"(She) was so good that no one in the bar was talking," Jacob said. "They were just turned around, watching her. I don't even know if the guitar was in tune — it

might've been slightly out of tune. But that really didn't matter. It was just (her) singing, playing acoustic guitar into that microphone."

After having played piano since she was 2 years old, de Benedicty picked up guitar and learned to sing by mimicking the vocal styles of the blues artists she loved.

She was bored with top 40 pop music and fascinated by blues, especially the guitar playing of Robert Johnson, Blind Willie McTell and other Delta-blues style artists.

"You listen to those recordings

from the early 1920s, and they're just so raw," de Benedicty said.

"There's just nothing else like it. I really felt something in that music that I didn't feel about anything or anywhere else."

The two clicked instantly that first night, realizing they had similar musical sensibilities and shared a passion for lo-fi blues rock that was earthy and honest, unprocessed and gritty.

In a matter of weeks, they wrote, recorded and self-released their first EP, "Organic." In April 2013, they released their second album, "No Great Shakes."

They started performing around Ocala wherever they could.

They acted as house bands for both a Greek restaurant and a tattoo parlor, and they played secret shows at a local Starbucks while preparing to move beyond Florida.

Following de Benedicty's graduation from Hale Academy in May 2013, Jacob spent last fall booking shows, and soon, the duo, along with former drummer Jason Sands, began performing in clubs along the east coast.

Audiences in New York City loved them, Jacob said, and they planned to return that winter, but the north polar vortex cold wave caused storms that resulted in the cancellation of the band's plans to go back.

"I guess we were sad for maybe six hours," Jacob said, "Then we just (went to Austin), replanned, locked ourselves in and made a whole new album."

They credit the momentum they earned in Gainesville to local musician Waylon Thornton, who acted as a mentor and adviser, and Pat Lavery, owner of the promotions company that organizes High Dive events.

Lavery, owner of Glory Days Presents!, met Jacob and de Benedicty through Thornton.

After one show in April 2013, the duo said they took Lavery to dinner at Moe's and asked for advice on how to "get serious."

Lavery, who has longtime roots in the Gainesville music scene as an agent and booking manager, said their eagerness to learn and listen was a quality that not many artists have.

He advised them to be persistent and grateful.

"They're such nice kids," Lavery said, "they have 'It' — this charisma about them that's really important for getting people excited about a band. They're unpretentious, and that's a big part of why I like them."

They plan to debut songs off their new album on Saturday at the High Dive.

Doors open at 9 p.m., and tickets are available for \$5 in advance or \$6 at the door.

RiFF RAFF's 'Neon Icon'

After much album-date release confusion and pandering to white girls on Twitter to revamp excitement, Houston-based rapper RiFF RAFF finally released "Neon Icon" on June 24.

This album is a mixture of new sounds and his traditional Versace rap game with the common themes of drugs, ballin' and b****s all throughout. "Neon Icon" stands out from his old work in one prominent way — his skit tracks. I have literally no idea what they are for because I listened to the album while sober.

"Tip Toe Wing In My Jawwdinz" is the first song on the album that brings back the authentic Jody Highroller sound — it's really reminiscent of songs on "Rap Game Bon Jovi" with a slow, creeping beat and almost whispering vocals building up to the main verse that he delivers with his traditional enthusiastic emphasis on each syllable.

The album really changes it up with "Time," a twangy, country-hip-hop hybrid. I know the idea sounds awful, but trust me when I say it's pretty good. RiFF RAFF sings over the beat while an acoustic guitar strums in the background. It's almost romantic, until the auto-tuned bridge.

The only song with a reprise, "How To Be the Man," really is the best song on the album. Packing the lyrics "Show you how to be man, how to be the boss / How to buy the car, how to buy the house," maybe UF should take a few notes and replace what is the good life with a class called how to be the man.

Overall, I give the album four-and-a-half stars out of five. I take half a star off because the second-to-last song, "VIP Pass to My Heart," sounds like an over auto-tuned song from some Disney teeny-bopper with sexual undertones. Why would you try to end an album on that note?

Matt Sherman wants to show you what is on the menu — James Bond’s menu.

The 45-year-old Gainesville author and UF religion alumnus has created a website where people can donate money to publish a higher quality version of his book, “Eating James Bond: 007’s Every Last Meal.” He has until July 15 to reach his \$20,000 goal.

That money will be used to cover the cost of color printing, have a professional photographer shoot meals and memorabilia and to advertise the book. The book will be published in black and white if the \$20,000 goal is not achieved.

The Bond novels became famous because of the sense of travel and the detailed descriptions of international cuisine, Sherman said. The agent has something to eat every 10 minutes during a two-hour film.

Sherman said his book can serve as a tour guide to all the different locations that Bond has ever had a drink or eaten a meal.

“You can eat what Bond eats, where Bond eats,” Sherman said.

The cuisine plays a bigger part in the movies and books to a true fan, said Frank Herbert,

66, who has been studying James Bond novels and movies for 50 years and is a member of the International James Bond fan club based in the U.K. Average fans may only notice a few meals here and there.

“When I was younger everyone wanted to eat what James Bond ate,” Herbert said. “People were even interested in the type of toothpaste he used.”

Some things have changed since then, considering the opinion of Alan Ferry, a 27-year-old aerospace engineering junior.

“I don’t enjoy martinis whether they’re shaken or stirred,” Ferry said. “I prefer beer.”

The book will be published through CreateSpace, Amazon.com Inc.’s self-publishing platform, and it will be available on Amazon and other outlets, Sherman said. The book is scheduled to be published by Aug. 1. Books will cost approximately \$25 for the black-and-white version and \$35 for the color version.

Furry friends fear the 4th

Animals hate America’s favorite holiday. Fireworks scare them, hot dogs upset them and bug spray makes them sick. It’s no wonder that more pets are lost on the Fourth of July than on any other day of the year.

The Humane Society is already preparing for the influx of lost animals, mostly dogs that will run away due to the fireworks. “Most people don’t realize how scary it is for animals,” said Amanda Burks, executive director of the Alachua County Humane Society.

Burks suggests bringing pets inside before the festivities get underway. She recommends leaving pets at home if you are going to a party.

Any changes to an animal’s diet can add stress as well. Tossing your dog a burger can cause digestive issues. Common Fourth of July items like bug spray and citronella candles can make pets sick if ingested.

Never leave alcoholic drinks un-

attended or within reach of animals, Burks said. Intoxicated with a belly-ache during an earsplitting fireworks display is not how your pet wants to spend its evening.

Setting up a safe space for your pet, such as a crate, is an essential precaution, Burks said. If your animal already has medication for storms or a Thundershirt — a shirt that uses gentle pressure to provide a calming effect on dogs — Burks recommends using those.

“Dogs aren’t as good at hiding, so they flee,” Burks said. “Cats are just as scared, but they’re better at hiding, so they run under the bed instead of jumping over the fence.”

The animals at the Humane Society will be kenneled earlier than normal on Friday. Being in their “safe space” keeps the agitation level low, Burks said.

The best precaution is to make sure that pets have proper identification makes it easier to get animals back to their owners.

Recipes: The instruction manuals you actually want to read

Recipes are, on one hand, an instruction manual with directions or instructions on how to make something and also a narrative with engaging prose or a story that elevates the procedure into something else entirely.

Like directions on how to assemble an ice cream maker or build a bookshelf, most recipes instruct an addressee in a coherent, clear layout, often with steps broken down into numbers or bulleted points in chronological order.

Yet, recipes are different than other instruction manuals. Let's

make a comparison.

Compare the following instructions: (1) instructions on how to set up a network security key for your computer (from Windows) and (2) a recipe from a Duncan Hines cake mix.

Recipes, like instruction manuals, typically use imperative or command tense such as "bake" or "mix." These may be offset from the rest of the directions by font styling with all caps (like example 2), made bold, italicized or underlined.

Also, like instruction manuals, there is an implicit subject and does not make direct reference to the reader. Indeed, from its Latin root *recipere*, recipe means "take!"

We often do not want to wade through dense text to find out how to set up a wireless network or to bake a cake for that matter.

However, we are more willing to invest effort and time reading a recipe than in other procedural discourse. Some admit to having a cookbook on their bedside table. Why? We put more in because we get more out, especially with recipes that have an explanatory, prose-based layout, as in (3) below.

Good recipes go beyond the basic mechanics of cooking; they enable the reader/cook to know what to look for during and after the cooking process. Parenthetical explanations provide reasons or additional

descriptions about the desired results, increasing our understanding of the cooking process. They build credibility in the recipe as an attempted and successful procedure. So, thanks to the recipe writer's previous attempts, if we want runnier yolks, then we know to cook a minute less. We understand more the why than just the how.

Other recipes have prose that conjures up scenes in the reader's mind, such as "I remember, when I was in the south of Italy, eating eggplant that had been roughly chopped, sprinkled with dried wild oregano, doused with olive oil, and then roasted with a little garlic and a lot of red onion," according to Nige-

lla Lawson.

The reader is able to imagine Italy and taste the vegetables voyeuristically through the narrative. Even without precise quantities or detailed cooking instructions, the recipe is able to inspire the reader with novel possibilities proposed and new techniques for cooking and presenting a dish. And beyond the content level, we have a sense of the personality of the writer and the world from which the recipe originates.

Recipes may be the best manual of all in that even if you don't follow all the steps, it doesn't mean you won't have success. In fact, the recipe may be even better.

(1) Installing a Network Security Key

1. Open Network and Sharing Center by clicking the Start button Picture of the Start button, and then clicking Control Panel. In the search box, type network and then click Network and

Sharing Center.

2. Click "Set up a new connection or network."

3. Click "Set up a new network, and then click Next."

(2) Cake Box directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 F for metal or glass pans, 325 F for dark or coated pans*. Grease sides and bottom of each pan with shortening or oil spray. Flour lightly. (Use baking cups for cupcakes).

2. Blend cake mix, water, oil and eggs in large bowl at low speed until moistened (about 30 seconds). Beat at medium speed for two minutes.

Pour batter in pans and bake immediately.

3. Bake following chart below. Add 3 to 5 minutes to bake time for dark or coated pans. Cake is done when toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 15 minutes. Cool completely before frosting.

(3) Soft-center Hard-cooked eggs, from David Tanis' "A Platter of Figs and Other Recipes"

Bring a medium saucepan of water to a boil. Lower six large organic eggs into the rapidly boiling water. Simmer for exactly nine minutes. (For a slightly runny center, cook the eggs for eight minutes.)

Remove the eggs from the boiling water and plunge them into a bowl of ice water to stop the cooking. When

the eggs are cool (this doesn't take very long), tap the shells on the counter to crack them, then return the eggs to the ice water.

This will allow the cold water to seep between the eggs and the shells, making the eggs easily peelable. The eggs will be firm but with a moist, soft yolk.

The 2014 edition of The Opening football camp kicks off this Friday and runs until July 10 at Nike's headquarters in Beaverton, Ore.

The invite-only event pits the top 2015 recruiting prospects from across the country against one another in a variety of skills challenges as well as 7-on-7 tournaments.

The camp, which features 162 of the top high school seniors, will include a handful of Florida commits and targets.

The three commits in attendance will be quarterback Sheriron Jones (6-foot-2, 189 pounds, Moreno Valley, Calif., Rancho Verde High), wide receiver Derrick Dillon (5-foot-11, 175 pounds,

Franklinton, La., Pine High) and cornerback commit Marcus Lewis (6-foot-0, 194 pounds, Washington, D.C., Gonzaga College High).

Jones, who will be on Team Alpha Pro along with Dillon, will arrive in Beaverton on July 5th to compete in the Elite 11 quarterback challenge, and will be assigned a team following its completion. The Elite 11 challenge has produced high-profile quarterbacks including Tim Tebow, AJ McCarron and Jameis Winston.

There are a number of top Florida targets participating as well, including the No. 4 ranked offensive tackle Martez Ivey (6-foot-5, 271 pounds, Apopka, Fla., Apopka High).

Ivey has offers from in-state rivals Florida State and

Miami as well as seven offers from Southeastern Conference schools.

Florida's top wide receiver target George Campbell (6-foot-3, 183 pounds, Tarpon Springs, Fla., East Lake High) is set to participate in the week-long event. Campbell, a bigger offensive target, might not fit perfectly in Kurt Roper's new offense — one that relies on speedy receivers to make plays by creating space.

However, Campbell is still at the top of Florida's offensive big board.

Ray-Ray McCloud (5-foot-9, 176 pounds, Tampa, Fla., Sickles High) is listed as an athlete on Team Mach Speed but is considered a running back prospect for the Gators.

On the defensive side of the ball, five-star strong-side defensive end Byron Cow-

Design and build team announced for O'Dome

With the heavily anticipated renovation to the Stephen C. O'Connell Center coming soon, there were bound to be leaks of the new additions.

But what Sports Illustrated's Tim Newcomb published surpassed anybody's wildest dreams for what a new O'Dome would look like. Unfortunately for dreamers, the designs belonged to the losing bidder NBBJ, a company connected to the fledgling project to renovate Kentucky's Rupp Arena as well as UCLA's Pauley Pavilion.

Instead, the winner was a combination of Davis Architects, Gainesville-based Charles Perry Partners Inc. (CPPI) Construction Management and TLC Engineering. The school announced that the trio met for the first time Tuesday.

Davis Architects is a firm based in Birmingham, Ala., that has done work on both endzone expansions at the University of Alabama's Bryant-

Denney Stadium as well as the design of Auburn Arena, which is Auburn's new basketball facility. Other clients include the University of Alabama at Birmingham, Samford University, Birmingham-Southern College and Georgia State University.

UF Basketball

O'Connell Center during the 18,500 square foot expansion of the gymnastics practice facility in 2012. The renovated space earned a LEED Gold rating.

CPPI has done most of the recent renovations or expansions Florida fans and players enjoy with the current facilities on campus including the Southwest Recreation Center, the locker room at McKethan Stadium and the Heavener Football Complex.

CPPI also built the basketball practice facility and is responsible for both

Despite heroic effort, US eliminated

SAO PAULO — Turns out Jürgen Klinsmann was right: The United States isn't ready to win the World Cup.

The Americans were eliminated in the round of 16 for the second straight tournament. They've been ranked 13th or 14th every month since September, which means their exit was pretty much at the stage it's expected to be.

"Clearly it gives you the message you have a lot of work still ahead of you," the U.S. coach said Wednesday, a day after the 2-1 loss to Belgium in extra time.

Klinsmann was a World Cup champion as a player with West Germany in 1990 and coach of the German team that reached the 2006 semifinals. Having moved to California in 1998 with his American wife, he is seen as bringing the perspective of soccer's elite to a nation that remains a new world in the sport.

His message to players is they don't do enough. They don't play twice a week, like Champions League stars. They don't face condemnation from their community after losses and poor performances.

"It makes them feel accountable, not just walk away with a bad performance and nothing happens," he said. "If you have a bad performance, then people should approach you and tell you that, so make sure that next game is not bad anymore and that you step it up."

The Americans' final match, which kicked off at 4 p.m. EDT on a weekday, was seen by 21.6 million on ESPN and Univision, impressively close to the record 24.7 million set for a Sunday evening game against Portugal earlier in the tournament. An average of 1.6 million watched the loss to Belgium on digital streams.

"People now start to care about it. Fans care about it. They comment on social media. They comment everywhere about it, and that's good," Klinsmann said.

His most controversial moves

coming into the tournament were cutting Landon Donovan, the biggest star in U.S. soccer history, and taking along 19-year-old Julian Green, 20-year-old DeAndre Yedlin and 21-year-old John Brooks. Brooks and Green responded with late-game goals when they came in as substitutes, and Yedlin was stellar against Belgium when he replaced injured right back Fabian Johnson.

But Klinsmann's proclamation that the U.S. would play an attacking game didn't pan out. The Americans were outshot by a combined 92-41.

"The interesting part is every time we would go down a goal, we'll shift it up," he said.

"I believe it's more a mental topic that we have to work on than it is a talent topic."

Rogers first to win award since Tebow

(108), saves (14), strikeouts (833) and innings pitched (988.0), among other categories. She also finished sixth in program history with a career 1.63 ERA.

Rogers posted a 30-8 record in her senior campaign, marking the third time in her career that she reached the 30 win mark. The Lake Wales, Fla., native also led the Gators in her final run with 27 complete games, 12 shutouts, 167 strikeouts and a 1.60 ERA in 223.1 innings pitched.

Rogers pitched in all five games of the Women's College World Series, tossing four straight complete games — including three shutouts — to start Florida's journey in Oklahoma City.

She then capped the trip with a two-inning save in the title-winning contest against Alabama.

"For it to go to our most unselfish athlete just says a lot about Hannah and so much about our team," UF softball coach Tim Walton said in a release. "I'm excited for her to get the award, but also excited for our team to have put her in position to get that award."

Since the award's inception in 1976 for male athletes and 1984 for female athletes, seven Gators have won the award a combined 10 times, with Tim Tebow (2008 and 2009), Danny Wuerffel (1996 and 1997) and Nicole Haislett

(1993 and 1994) each claiming the honor twice.

Rogers is Florida's first SEC Athlete of the Year recipient since Tebow in 2009, and she is UF's first female athlete to claim the award since Haislett in 1994.

Each school selects one male and one female athlete for the award each year, and the winner is decided by a vote among the league's athletic directors.

UF's male athlete nominee was point guard Scottie Wilbekin, who led the Gators basketball team to a 38-win season, a 30-game win streak, a perfect record in conference play and the program's first Final Four berth since 2007.

The Gainesville native finished the season as the SEC Men's Basketball Player of the Year, SEC Tournament MVP and a third-team All-American.

Wilbekin paced the Gators with a 2.1 assist-to-turnover ratio and 56 steals in a team-best 34 minutes of playing time per contest.

the 2003 and 2013 renovations to the west side of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium.

The indoor tennis facility that CPPI worked on also bears the name of the company namesake Charles R. Perry and his wife Nancy.

Tallahassee-based TLC Engineering has worked on numerous projects across the state, including Florida International's football stadium, PGA national resort and spa, the Amway Center and the Citrus Bowl.

The company specializes in engineering projects related to airports and hospitals, which make up the bulk of TLC's design portfolio.

In June, athletics director Jeremy Foley stated that the O'Connell Center renovations are still \$15 million away from a price tag that should exceed \$50 million once all work has been completed, which would make the renovations the priciest UAA facility overhaul since the \$52 million expansion of the west side of Ben Hill Griffin Stadium in 2003.

If the project goes as planned and the funding stays on track, renovations will be finished by the end of 2015. The construction would displace teams that compete in the O'Dome in the fall like the basketball teams, which will presumably play games in other sites across the state during that time.
