## New semester brings crowds to campus gyms

The new semester is already in motion, and so are UF students.

Except at Student Recreation & Fitness Center and Southwest Recreation Center, students wait in line to use gym equipment as if they were queuing up for a night out at 101 Cantina.

Pam Hightower, assistant director of ad-

ministrative services with the UF Department of Recreational Sports, said the gyms employ a "one in, one out" system at the beginning of each semester until students adjust to their schedules.

"Usually after week two everyone has adjusted and we're more balanced," she said. "Right now, people are all coming at the same hours."

Hightower said the gyms experience the heaviest traffic after 4 p.m. and the greatest

"That's when you'll see the lines outside and the associates acting as bouncers," said Williams, 22.

Carolina Casariego, an 18-year-old UF sports management freshman, said that it's time consuming to work out at SRC.

"It's just more of a hassle to go," she said.

## Satchel's supports locally grown food

Slices at Satchel's Pizza will now feature locally produced sausage, according to an announcement the pizza staple's owner, Satchel Raye, made this week.

The restaurant's switch parallels a national consumer trend reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture this month, which suggests buyers are now turning to local food markets more often than they used to.

The new sausage is sourced from two different farms in the region: C and J Farms in Gainesville and Full Circle Farm in Live Oak.

Raye said the restaurant first decided to make the change after someone from Full Circle dropped off a few samples.

"We had a family gathering and we cooked it on the grill, and it was so delicious that I decided we should try and switch over to that sausage," Raye said.

Satchel's goes through about a pig's worth of sau-

## UF presidential search continues, requests student input

In the hunt for The Gator Nation's next leader, the Presidential Search Committee is reaching out to the greater UF community.

Appointed in May, a search committee was formed with the expectation of finding a qualified group of candidates to vie for the position of UF's 12th president. The committee

is now asking for input in its search process by Friday.

In an email, search committee chair Steven Scott asked that the UF community answer two questions on the search criteria of previous presidential searches. To provide input, students and staff can visit the presidential search website.

The feedback will form the framework for future discussions with candidates, said UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes.

"All of the pieces have to come

together in order to formally launch the search for a new president," Sikes said.

The search committee will meet Sept. 5 to review and consider the responses. All committee meetings will be live-streamed and archived.

An advertisement for President Bernie Machen's position will be placed in The Chronicle for Higher Education.

Student Government President Cory Yeffet wrote in an email that the search committee and Board

of Trustees have approved a very comprehensive and thorough list of qualifications.

"With our goal of becoming a top 10 public institution, it is especially important the next UF President has a distinguished academic career, in addition to the operational expertise that are needed to lead a \$4.4 billion dollar operation," Yeffet said.

Over the summer, an outside consultant provided the search committee with a range of compensation for the next president, and a market-

ing plan was approved along with the Chronicle advertisement.

Sikes said the position criterion is extensive.

"To sum it up, basically we're looking for national leaders with a strong academic background, a research academic background," she said.

Students like UF biology junior Edward Daly find the search and new criteria important.

"I think they need to find some-

# Man arrested after hurling flower pot

A Gainesville man was arrested Tuesday following a heated argument between neighbors.

Javontea Antonio Black, 18, was charged with aggravated assault and throwing a deadly missile after police say he yelled at and threatened to kill his neighbor and her friend, located at 6025 NW 23rd Terrace.

As the argument escalated, Black walked across the street and picked up a flower pot in front of one of the victim's houses, throwing it at them. The victims went inside and shut the door as the pot shattered next to them, according to the Gainesville Police arrest report.

After entering a different apartment, Black picked up a metal pipe and returned to the victims, saying "I'll kill you, b\*\*\*\*."

After throwing the metal pipe at the victim's house, he fled the scene.

GPD found Black several blocks away and arrested him.

While on the way to jail, Black kicked the patrol car's windows. He was put into a RIPP restraint, which belts the hands and feet, but managed to get out of it. After beating his head against the window, Black told the arresting officer he was going to shoot her the next time he sees her.

# Nail polish exposes date-rape drugs

Four North Carolina State University students have hit the nail on the head with their invention.

The materials science and engineering students have created a nail polish to help detect if colorless, odorless compounds are being used to drug drinks.

The nail polish, named Undercover Colors, changes color when common date-rape drugs such as Rohypnol, Xanax and GHB, have been slipped into drinks. Women can identify the drug by sticking their fingers inside their glasses.

According to UF Health, about one in three American women will be sexually assaulted in her lifetime.

"I've never seen someone put something in someone's drink, but I've been with people who have thought someone did," said UF telecommunication sophomore Sami Wax, 19. "And that is very scary."

Similar preventative products

have been made available to the public, including coasters that change colors, said Rita Lawrence, GatorWell's interpersonal violence prevention coordinator.

"[It's] not just women who are sexually assaulted, it could happen to anyone," she said.

Lawrence said the nail polish can be part of a strategy against date rape, but awareness is key.

Allyson Montoya, a 19-year-old UF English junior, said she would consider buying the nail polish when it becomes available to the public.

"If they have that with them, it's almost like carrying a weapon with you," Montoya said.

# SCREAM Theater coming to UF today

A sexual violence prevention program is making its first UF appearance today with a campus theater performance.

SCREAM (Students Challenging Realities and Educating Against Myth) Theater will host a night of 30-minute skits in collaboration with Gator Wesley as part of its welcome back week activities.

Since 1991, SCREAM'S skits cover topics prevalent to college campuses, ranging from sexual assault and domestic violence to bullying.

The skits will then be followed by a Q-and-A segment with the actors remaining in character.

Evan Morris, a 20-year-old UF marketing junior, is an intern at Gator Wesley, the United Methodist Campus Min-

istry. Morris saw SCREAM'S production last year with Gator Wesley at the United Methodist Seminar program in New York City.

"It's frightening to see, and they're all really good actors," Morris said. "You feel like you're actually there."

Morris said SCREAM shows the reality of sexual assault on college campuses through its performances. It has been organizing and performing these skits since 1991.

Narcie Jeter, the executive director at Gator Wesley, said she wanted to bring the production to UF and Santa Fe College campuses after seeing the production last August with Gator Wesley in New York City.

"We thought nothing could be better than if we shared the SCREAM Theater's presentation, as well as additional UF resources," Jeter said.

SCREAM Theater is putting on its free show today at 8 p.m. in the University Auditorium.

sage every couple of weeks, or about 20 to 30 pounds a day, said Mark Rodriguez, a kitchen manager at Satchel's.

Rodriguez said he thinks the new sausage is a better quality product.

"I think it goes along with the idea of the restaurant," Rodriguez said. "Satchel's is a pretty big supporter of buying local and doing things locally."

Aside from pizzas, calzones and salads, Satchel's started serving homemade sodas about a year ago.

Dennis Stoltzfoos, the owner of Full Circle Farm, calls local farming a "lost art."

Unlike most commercial farms, Full Circle moves its hogs through different wooded areas instead of keeping them in pens. Every five to 10 days the pigs move to a new half-acre lot. No cages, no concrete and no processed food.

"There's a fresh bunch of wild edibles, and the pigs get to root and express their pigness," Stoltzfoos said.

Full Circle supplies pork to about three other businesses but is quickly growing.

In the 11 years he's been farming, Stoltzfoos said he's

seen a steady growth in demand for local products.

"Seems like the word is spreading," he said.

Nationwide, the number of farmers markets has increased about 76 percent since 2008, according to the USDA study.

The increase indicates a continued demand and growth of local farmers markets and locally produced food throughout the country.

C.W. Phillips, the owner of C and J Farms, said he believes the difference between his product and bigger corporations is in the raising of the hogs.

He said there's no processed food or growth hormones involved in his operation.

C and J Farms supplies about 10 local businesses, each ranging from orders of 30 to 150 pounds of pork a month.

It may take a little longer, but he said it's a lot like taking steroids when you work out. You'll bulk up faster, but not in the good way. You've got to eat "natural stuff," he said.

Phillips said he worries about what will happen if local farmers were unable to compete with corporations.

"[Local farmers] gon' do pretty much what's right for the people," Phillips said.

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# Marijuana might reduce painkiller abuse, study says

As Florida voters face an amendment that could legalize medical marijuana this November, a study suggests it could lower rates of painkiller abuse.

The research found that deaths associated with opiate abuse fell in 13 states after they legalized medical use of marijuana, according to a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association's Internal Medicine.

The findings were shared just days after the federal government announced it was finalizing new restrictions on drugs that contain hydrocodone, a highly addictive painkiller and now the most-prescribed drug.

"Yes, opioid overdoses are a national problem," said Dr. Scott Teitelbaum, a UF psychiatry professor and medical director of the Florida Recovery Center, a rehab clinic at UF Health. "They don't heal a wound. They change the brain's perception of pain. But is the solution pot? I don't think so."

Teitelbaum said the study shows a correlation between the decline in opioid-related overdoses and medical marijuana, but it does not prove medical marijuana legalization caused the decline. There are many factors that weren't considered in the study, he said, like when the medical marijuana laws were

implemented in each state and whether the decline could be attributed to the use of opioid blockers, which treat addiction.

"This is kind of jumping from A to Z," Teitelbaum said.

In Florida, prescription drugs are present in more drug-related deaths than illegal substances are, according to Florida Department of Law Enforcement records, but it said drugs are not limited to opioids.

State records show opioid-related deaths decreased between 2011 and 2012, according to the most recent report available. Records also showed that marijuana was one of the most commonly present substances in drug-related deaths, but it never was the cause of deaths.

But research on marijuana at UF is still up in the air.

Even if medical marijuana is legalized in Florida this November, UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes said the university cannot conduct medical marijuana research because UF relies heavily on federal funding, and the drug is still illegal in the federal realm.

Per federal law, Sikes said the university can apply for permits to conduct medical marijuana research but cannot grow or cultivate the plant.

"I am aware of at least one researcher who plans to conduct research on medical marijuana at some point in the future," Sikes wrote in an email. "We have conducted research on other regulated drugs in the past. These researchers must comply with federal regulations about how that is done."

# 911 botches call of baby locked in car

TAMPA — A 911 dispatcher is in trouble over his response to a mother who called for help after her 10-month-old son accidentally locked himself in her car, police said.

Shana Dees said she put her son Jack in his car seat Saturday afternoon, and when she went to move a shopping cart, Jack hit the lock button on the keychain remote, The Tampa Tribune reported.

She called 911 because it was hot inside the car and said she was shocked by the dispatcher's response.

"We won't be able to try and gain access to the car unless the

child is in some kind of distress," Dees said the dispatcher told her. "And by that point, they may just smash your windows."

And then he hung up.

Tampa police spokeswoman Laura McElroy said the department's protocol regarding a child locked in a car is to always send an officer and fire rescue to the scene.

The dispatcher didn't even ask the location of the vehicle.

McElroy said disciplinary action could range from a written

reprimand to a suspension.

An off-duty police officer called 911 and spoke to a different dispatcher who sent help.

In the meantime, a nurse grabbed a wrench from the store's utility closet and smashed the window.

By then, Jack had been inside the car for 15 minutes. The nurse got the boy out and poured cool water over his head.

Dees said she and her husband thanked the nurse, but they didn't get his name.

"He acted when nobody else did, and we're very grateful he did that," she said.

Jack has rebounded, but he's no longer allowed to play with car keys.

## Rubio's comments on immigration miss the mark

Florida's junior senator, Marco Rubio, has been very vocal in recent weeks on the topic of immigration reform.

In a letter to President Barack Obama, Rubio said the president's newly proposed executive actions on immigration would "close the door to any chance of making progress on immigration reform for the foreseeable future."

Rubio is correct in saying the prospects for immigration reform are grim, but blaming that on Obama is simply ludicrous.

Obama's actions on immigration to date can be classified as moderate. The president has heavily stepped up both border security and deportation efforts during his administration.

The president's new proposal, an expansion of the Deferred Action on Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program, would mostly provide protections to undocumented immigrants who are making positive contributions to American society. DACA primarily protects individuals who have no criminal records and have either enrolled in college or served in the armed forces.

Obama's proposal is a well-reasoned response to the complete failure of Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives to produce any sort of coherent or substantive reform bill.

In the House Republican caucus, ideas on immigration policy are inspired by such luminaries as Rep. Steve King, R-Iowa. Among other ignorant statements, King once said that for every undocumented immigrant who becomes a high school valedictorian, there are 100 with "calves the size of cantaloupes because they're hauling 75 pounds of marijuana across the desert."

Despite King's fearmongering, the reality is that the overwhelming majority of undocumented immigrants have much more benevolent motivations.

These immigrants cross the border not to commit crimes or to sabotage the U.S. economy, but to build better lives for themselves and their families. Many of these individuals come to this country fleeing the murderous wrath of drug cartels, groups that the American-led "war on drugs" has helped to expand.

Even Speaker of the House John Boehner has acknowledged that Tea Party-aligned Republicans are the ones holding up the reform process. Asked about the Tea Party stance on immigration reform, Boehner said this: "We get elected to make choices. We get elected to solve problems and it's remarkable to me how many of my colleagues just don't want to."

Rubio deserves credit for his willingness to support the Senate's immigration reform bill. Support from Senate Republicans is an important step toward resolution of this issue, which has serious implications for the social and economic well-being of the United States.

But if Rubio is truly interested in enacting comprehensive immigration reform, simply criticizing the president for proposing modest unilateral action is not acceptable.

Rubio must also call out his fellow Republicans for their refusal to budge an inch from their hardline stance.

Until he does, Rubio will appear to be more of a political opportunist than someone truly dedicated to immigration reform.



## Undercover Colors: genius or misguided?

Facebook has fallen out of favor with me. Between endless streams of Ice Bucket Challenge videos and depressing life updates I otherwise would've forgotten about long ago, I only have one reason to visit the website anymore: to see whatever the latest BuzzFeed post is, scoff at it and then read it intently.

It was during one of these spirals of boredom and hypocrisy that I first found out about Undercover Colors. The startup and its founders were featured in one of BuzzFeed's recent articles.

The founders of Undercover Colors are undergraduate engineering students at North Carolina State University. The underlying concept itself is simple, but also highly innovative. The students are designing nail polish that changes color when it comes into contact with common drugs used to facilitate sexual assault such as Rohypnol (roofies), GHB and Xanax. The product is essentially an inconspicuous and convenient drink testkit.

Undercover Colors isn't the first product that's been created to detect date rape drugs. Tumblers, coasters and other common drinkware have all been engineered to help their users avoid assault. But this is the first that doesn't need to be carried around with the user.

Undercover Colors has emerged at a time when the disgraceful prevalence of sexual assault on college campuses is coming to national attention. The White House even organized a task force to deal with campus sexual assault in January.

The panel found that one in five college women will be sexually assaulted during their time as students. In the state of Florida, the number is one out of six: a modest improvement, but not nearly good enough.

In 2013, 107 instances of forcible rape were reported in Alachua County. Given that each individual act of rape is a horrendous and disgusting crime, this grim statistic shows that there is a lot of work to be done.

Undercover Colors isn't perfect, and the product has encountered some valid criticism. Some anti-sexual as-

sault advocates argue that the product places an undue burden on the potential victim. Rather than preventing sexual assault by controlling the behavior of would-be rapists, Undercover Colors is one of many seemingly inexhaustible solutions to sexual assault that require women to alter their own behavior.

Don't walk alone at night. Don't wear revealing clothes. Don't accept drinks from guys—but if you do, paint this on your fingernails first. As one feminist writer put it, "Personally avoiding sexual assault — or one particular, rather uncommon type of sexual assault — is not the same as preventing sexual assault."

There are other problems. As hinted in the quote above, drug-facilitated rapes make up an extremely small percentage of rapes overall. Even then, the drug most commonly used in these rapes is alcohol, which seems counterintuitive given that the nail polish is meant primarily to test alcoholic drinks.

In addition, pinning responsibility on the victim may actually lead to more victim blaming when sexual assault does occur. "This wouldn't have happened if you were wearing Undercover Colors," some will inevitably say.

These issues are important to keep in mind, but these arguments will be fully valid only in theory until the ideological framework that has allowed rape to pervade our society is dismantled.

I agree with the criticisms of Undercover Colors. But I also realize that the problem of sexual assault and rape in our society is far from being resolved.

There is still a terrifying number of men in this country harassing, assaulting and raping women. And I support anything that might be able to stop them.

# First Magnitude Brewing Co. enjoys successful grand opening

At a whopping 97 degrees, Saturday was as seasonably and uncomfortably hot as ever. Yet thousands of people continued to pour into First Magnitude Brewing Company's brewery barn, where beer and good company took precedence over sweating.

After more than two years of planning, FM Brewery, 1220 SE Veitch St., opened its doors and served the public Saturday, enjoying an opening more grand than expected.

"It was amazing. Better than we could have dreamed of, as cheesy as that sounds," Meg The Losen, FM Brewery president, said.

The doors opened at 2 p.m., and just fifteen minutes later, The Losen was getting texts from her team saying the parking lot was already full. Soon the line was out the door — and stayed that way throughout the day.

Named after the powerful first magnitude springs of North Central Florida, FM Brewery started out as just an idea in March 2012, when four friends talked about opening a brewery together in Gainesville.

Head brewer and former associate director of the UF Honors program, John Denny, had been telling his students to follow their

dreams for more than 13 years. Knowing he would live with regret if he didn't follow his own, the beer aficionado took his own advice and moved forward with opening a brewery.

"It was as good of a start as I can imagine," he said. "I'm very grateful for all the support."

Throughout the opening weekend, he and his partners, including his wife, Christine Denny, The Losen and her husband, Wells The Losen, sold about 3,000 beers, serving more than 1,500 people. They even ran out of a few of their specialty beers.

FM Brewery has high hopes for the future, like selling to restaurants and creating a beer garden with outdoor seating, live music and old-fashioned games like ring toss.

But even nearer is the excitement of the first Gator game of the 2014 football season, even though the brewery doesn't have a great sense of what to expect.

"It will be a very different game than what I'm accustomed to," John Denny said. "I hope people come and enjoy the game with us."

The brewery will be open Saturday from 2 to 9 p.m., and it plans to have a large TV broadcasting the game.

Ameraucana Wood Fire food truck will serve food, the bar will

be fully staffed and legal-sized growlers can be filled for customers to take to tailgates. FM Brew-

ery will also have its own labeled growlers.

"We're hoping people can stop

by for a pint," Christine Denny said. "We're excited and ready to pour."

# Less Than Jake's Wake and Bake Weekend starts Saturday

## It's the third year they've done it

October marks UF's Homecoming, but a different kind of homecoming — one of the punk-rock variety — starts this weekend at High Dive.

The Gainesville-bred, ska-punk rockers of Less Than Jake will kick off their third annual Wake and Bake weekend, a two-day-long festival that attracts fans from as close as UF to as far as England.

Wake and Bake, according to Alligator archives, began two years ago as an intimate gathering for Less Than Jake's family, friends and local fans.

The festival has grown considerably in popularity since then, attracting super fans from around the world in addition to local music buffs who've followed the band's

immensely successful 22-year run.

"Most of us went to college here — most of us failed out of college here — but our roots are [in Gainesville]," drummer and lyricist Vinnie Fiorello said.

"The ebb and flow of Gainesville is what keeps me [here]. You have freshmen and college kids coming in, bringing different ideas and tastes from where they come from. It's a constant flow of ideas and music and head space."

This year's Wake and Bake weekend arrives at the end of a busy summer for the band, which spent the past few months playing across America with Vans Warped Tour.

From Aug. 14 to 19, the band traveled to Russia to perform at the international music festival Kubana-2014.

Fiorello said one major change in

this year's lineup is the bands they chose to have open for them.

In the past, Wake and Bake has featured national bands, but this year the opening acts are all younger Florida-based groups.

"I'm excited about that," Fiorello said. "Being able to support Florida music is important to Less Than Jake."

Wake and Bake weekend begins Saturday at 1 p.m. with a tailgate at High Dive and bingo hosted by Less Than Jake frontman Chris DeMakes.

Local food trucks will be on site, and the band is bringing back its legendary Less Than Jake yard sale, featuring old and new merch.

On Sunday evening, fans who purchased the VIP bundle have the opportunity to perform live band karaoke with the members of Less

Than Jake themselves.

Doors for the Saturday night Less Than Jake performance open on Saturday night at 8 p.m. with guest openers Duppies, UNRB, Teen Agers and Bill Perry Orchestra.

On Sunday night, doors open at 7 p.m. with guest openers Mighty Mongo, Chilled Monkey Brains and General Tso's Fury.

"Show up early; support the Florida music scene," Fiorello said. "See some opening bands you might not have heard of, or heard of but never seen."

Less Than Jake prides itself in not ditching Gainesville for the fast-paced Los Angeles music scene.

It frequently pays homage to the city in both its discography and production — their most recent record, last year's "See the Light," was written, recorded and produced in

Gainesville.

"They're a band that really represents Gainesville's music scene," Pat Lavery, owner of local booking company Glory Days Presents!, said.

"They mix so many music styles... Gainesville is a melting pot, and their sound reflects that."

"In Los Angeles, the music industry is a constant," Fiorello said.

"You have people that float in and out of that constant, but Gainesville has these waves of creativity that come in. It's influenced my music and the way I look at the world."

Tickets are \$15 in advance or \$17 at the doors, available for presale either on Ticketweb.com or without fees at Hear It Again Music, the High Dive box office and High Tides.

On Saturday from 1 to 6 p.m., there's no cover. A \$3 underage fee will be applied at the door, and showgoers younger than 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

## Taylor, Jones highlight talented Florida running back group

With Jeff Driskel returning from a broken fibula to play in Kurt Roper's new high-tempo spread offense — and not to mention the hoopla surrounding the backup battle between Treon Harris and Will Grier — much of the attention surrounding Florida's offense has been directed to the quarterback position.

However, the Gators have quietly stacked a crowded and talented backfield during the offseason to potentially give coach Will Muschamp his most potent offense since he arrived in Gainesville in 2011.

I think that's a physical position that is hard to stay healthy. I'm glad we've got a bunch of guys."

One of the tailbacks that had a difficult time staying on the field was Matt Jones, who played just five games in 2013 after a viral infection and a torn ACL caused him to be sidelined.

But now a fully healthy Jones coupled with a more experienced Kelvin Taylor gives Muschamp the one-two punch out of the backfield that he envisioned when he recruited the duo years ago.

Taylor went as far to say that he and his self-proclaimed "bigger brother" have the potential to accomplish a feat never seen in UF history: have two running backs record 1,000 rushing yards in a single season.

"I mean, this year . . . both of us could go for 1,000 yards," Taylor said. "We just got to keep working hard and I feel like me and Matt can do that, yes."

Mike Gillislee was Florida's last 1,000-yard rusher in 2012, but Jones — a freshman at the time — only accrued 275 yards on 52 attempts as the Gators' No. 2 running back.

The duo's goal of 1,000 yards each seems even more daunting with Mack Brown still in the mix as well as Brandon Powell and Adam Lane.

Although a deep backfield may hinder Taylor and Jones' personal achievements on the field, the rotation should give the offense as a whole a boost with more fresh legs and more

targets in the passing game.

"Coach (Roper) is always talking about getting guys out in the open field," Taylor said. "We've got some players out at receiver, but the backs in this offense are definitely going to catch the ball. That's why we stay after practice and do JUGGS and all different kinds of things."

### Garcia improving at center

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After redshirt senior Jonotthan Harrison played his last game for Florida — a 37-7 loss to Florida State on Nov. 30 at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium to close out a 4-8 season — coach Will Muschamp knew he needed a replacement.

Harrison started 37 games in the middle of the offensive line over his final three years at UF and was the only player on Florida's roster in 2013 with starting center experience at the collegiate level.

Muschamp listed five criteria that he looked for in finding his new starting center once spring practice began.

"You need somebody that's really smart, somebody's that very decisive in their decision-making," Muschamp said. "They need to be able to make a call, have confidence in the call and they need to be right. Then they need to be able to snap the ball."

He thought of nobody better for the spot

than Max Garcia.

"I didn't know about the snapping, but those first four, there's no question he was the right guy for the job," Muschamp said of Garcia, who started at left guard and left tackle in 2013, his first season playing for Florida after transferring from Maryland. "He's very decisive in his decision-making. He is off-the-charts intelligent and a guy that has really done a nice job through camp snapping it."

Garcia struggled with getting a clean snap during the first practices in spring, but his ability has improved as of late.

"Having a good snap is kind of an underrated thing in our offense," quarterback Jeff Driskel said. "If the snap's off, it throws off the timing. He understands that, so he did put in the work as far as snapping the ball. As far as getting the offensive line on the same page, he's second to none."

Added Garcia: "In the spring, I struggled,

Gamecocks uniform. But South Carolina does return a solid line-backer corps this year led by Skai

Moore, who had 56 tackles last year as a true freshman. They also return two starters in the secondary to challenge TAMU's receivers.

Like Texas A&M, South Caro-

lina is breaking in a new quarterback. Fifth-year senior Dylan Thompson takes over for Connor Shaw with some good experience under his belt — he's 3-0 as a starter in his career.

Wideouts Shaq Roland and Damiere Byrd return as well, averaging 18 and 17 yards per catch last season, respectively.

Thompson is fortunate to have sleeper Heisman candidate Mike Davis in his backfield. The junior is coming off of a 1,183 yard rushing season, and if the Aggies can't stop Davis, it could be a long night.

A&M returns seven starters from a defense that ranked 96th or worse in rushing, passing, scoring and total defense.

**Boise State vs. No. 18 Ole Miss - 8 p.m. Tonight, ESPN:** We get two kickoff treats tonight as BCS buster Boise State plays No. 18 Ole Miss in Atlanta. Boise's last trip to the Georgia Dome in 2011 resulted in a 14-point victory over Georgia. It gets tougher for Boise this time around, as they are without prolific passer Kellen Moore and head coach Chris Petersen.

Ole Miss is entering its third year under Hugh Freeze. Returning with him is an extremely talented defense led by defensive tackle Robert Nkemdiche and All-American safety Cody Prewitt. They return seven other starters from the unit. Offensively, they get quarterback Bo Wallace, who had more than 3,300 yards passing last year, back.

Sophomore wide receiver Laquon Treadwell will be his

go-to target, averaging 8 yards per catch as a true freshman last year.

**No. 16 Clemson vs. No. 12 Georgia - Saturday 5:30 pm, ESPN:** Georgia has revenge on its mind after suffering a 38-35 loss to Clemson in last year's season opener.

The 'Dawgs have a new quarterback in fifth-year senior Hutson Mason, who enters with two and a half games experience under his belt. Mason has a plethora of talented wideouts to throw to including Chris Conley, Michael Bennett and Malcolm Mitchell.

Georgia's backfield is loaded with tailbacks Todd Gurley and Keith Marshall, too. Heisman candidate Gurley rushed for more than 900 yards last year despite being banged up for a good chunk of the season.

Marshall is fully recovered from a season ending ACL tear in 2013.

Clemson is without the dynamic duo of Sammy Watkins and Tajh Boyd on offense, but their defense returns six starters including defensive end Vic Beasley who racked up 13 sacks last season. The Tigers' defensive line could exploit an inexperienced Georgia offensive line, who returns just one lineman who started all 13 games last season.

but now it's gotten to a point where at some practices, I don't have any bad snaps. So, I've just been really focusing on that, and you can see the development."

Garcia will be the focal point of an offensive line that linebacker Mike Taylor described as "nasty" throughout practice.

"They're finishing blocks up front, opening holes for the running back," the redshirt senior said. "I don't know if it's because of the scheme that they're running but I know that they've

brought a new intensity with how they block and how they approach the game."

Junior D.J. Humphries and redshirt senior Chaz Green will take the left and right tackle positions, respectively, while Trip Thurman will start at left guard and either Trenton Brown and Tyler Moore will start at right guard.

While his spot in the starting lineup hasn't been solidified, Brown — a 6-foot-8, 360-pound senior from Albany, Ga. — is someone that Garcia is grateful to have on his side on game day.

"Trent makes me look so small when I'm standing next to him," Garcia said. "But I like having him there. No one's going to get through him. No one's gonna bull rush Trenton Brown. That's just not happening. And when he puts his hand on someone, that guy's getting moved against his will."

"He doesn't want to get moved, but he's going to get moved. So having him there, he's

a force."

Injuries plagued the offensive line in 2013, forcing the Gators to use seven different starting lineup formations throughout the season.

"We were beat up at times last year," Driskel said.

"Guys were asked to go either inside to outside or outside to inside, which is tough. But at the same time, you've got to have depth and you've got to be able to rely on more than five guys. I think we have started to build some depth. I think our offensive line works well together, and we have a lot of talent at the position."

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# Right-side hitter strives for success

Last season, she was the freshman phenom that was nervous about seeing her name in the starting line up.

This season, she's just ready to get on the court and play.

Right-side hitter Alex Holston, one of Florida's biggest recruits in

2013, showed Florida fans, teammates and coaches exactly why she was ranked No. 9 by Prep Volleyball's Senior Aces list.

With a list of accolades including AVCA All-Region, Southeastern Conference-All Freshman Team and All-SEC Team, Holston set the bar high for incoming freshmen.

But with her first season in the

record books, Holston is looking to improve on her rookie year.

"From a successful freshman season, I always want to do better and take a step up," Holston said.

The Olney, Md., native came to Florida as the school's first top-10 recruit since 2008 when three-time All-American and current USA national team member Kelly Murphy joined the team.

Holston passed up offers from 46 other schools not knowing if she would even make the starting lineup.

"Last year I was really nervous, I didn't know I was going to play," Holston said. "I was just happy to be here and happy to be practicing with the Florida team."

When it was time to announce the lineup for the season opener against New Orleans on Aug. 30, 2013, Holston couldn't believe her eyes.

"When she (Mary Wise) announces the starters it's literally right before the game, so you really don't know if you're playing," Holston said.

"Last year, my heart was beating so fast when I saw my number on the board. I just didn't know what to do."

Despite her nerves, Holston completed her first season opening weekend against New Orleans and LIU-Brooklyn with 14 kills on a .393 offensive clip and six blocks.

At the end of the season, she started 18 matches, making 55 blocks and 286 kills — which were both third on the team.

With her nerves in check, Holston reiterates her original message: she's just ready to play.

"We're all just excited to get out there and play, like every team," she said.

"We always want to play tough teams, we never want to go in and just have a day off. We know that no teams is like having a day off though."

The No. 6 Gators won their first two games this past weekend, shutting out both Miami and South Florida and holding them to a combined five shots compared to Florida's 29.

Senior goalkeeper Taylor Burke also liked what she saw from her defense last weekend. She had high praise for the way her team played defensively in both games.

Although she was quick to give credit to her defense for the two shutout victories, Burke's play this weekend can not be overlooked either.
