Details of Treon Harris incident still not released

The 18-page incident report was mostly redacted

Three days after true freshman quarterback Treon Harris was accused of sexually assaulting a student at a UF residence hall, an incident report was released. However, with the majority of the report withheld by state law, most questions are left unanswered as

the investigation into the alleged assault continues.

The 18-page report confirms the time and location of the incident: between 2:30 and 3:25 a.m. Sunday at the Springs Residential Complex. It also confirmed the offense was sexual battery. The rest of the narrative was redacted.

Florida law requires all active

criminal intelligence information and active criminal investigative information to be withheld from the public.

"We cannot discuss what is happening at all

because it is protected by student privacy laws," UF spokeswoman Janine Sikes wrote in an email.

Sikes said the UF Student Conduct process "seeks to provide a fair, compassionate, safe and equitable place for students to tell their perceptions of what happened and for decision makers to determine, using a more likely than not stan-


dard, whether the Conduct Code was violated."

Attempts to speak with UF law professors were made but none were available for comment.

"Most people just aren't going to want to comment on the subject," Sikes said. "But our professors have academic freedom and can speak on whatever topic they'd like."

Panel discusses Ebola concerns

As the Ebola epidemic continues to cause concern, UF scholars gathered Wednesday to discuss the issue.

About 200 students, faculty and community members filled the Ocora in Pugh Hall to listen to the evening panel.

The UF panelists included Dr. Paul Psychas, assistant professor of community health and family medicine;

Sharon Abramowitz, assistant professor of anthropology; Timothy Nevin, visiting professor in the Department of History; and Jill Sonke, director of the Center for Arts in Medicine.

UF's dean of international studies, Leonardo Villalon, moderated the discussion.

The U.S. medical system has the capacity to handle the disease, he said at the event.

"These kind of things test our system," Villalon said. "There have already been critiques of the situation in Dallas."

The panelists addressed

UF student arrested for counterfeiting tickets for LSU game

Police found 26 additional tickets

A UF student in the journalism college was arrested Wednesday morning after police said he sold multiple copies of counterfeit tickets for Saturday's UF vs. Louisiana State University football game.

Jordan Joseph Peters, 24, was reported to Gainesville Police by a person who pur-

chased tickets from him Tuesday on Craigslist.

The advertisement Peters posted featured a photo of the tickets, and the two met in person for the transaction.

Following the exchange, the buyer became suspicious of the tickets' validity and contacted the University Athletic Association ticket office.

Covert GPD officers contacted Peters early Wednesday to buy tickets from him. Upon meeting with investigators at a set location, Peters gave them the same counterfeit tickets he had given the victim the day before.

Police found an additional 26 copies of the same tickets in his backpack.

Peters said he completed three or four transactions. All copies were under the

name Richard Ronson and listed the seats as Section 19, Row 51, Seats 2 through 6.

Peters was arrested on charges of grand theft, scheme to defraud and fraudulent creation and possession of admission tickets.

All the victims of the scheme were contacted. GPD urges anyone else who purchased tickets from Peters or has tickets for the listed seats to contact police.

Peters was booked into Alachua County Jail around noon, where he remained with no bond set as of press time.

Police warn of gas money scam

Gainesville Police and the Alachua County Sheriff's Office are asking locals to keep an eye out for a recent door-to-door scammer.

According to police, Carisa Dineen-Lewis has been asking Alachua County residents for gas money, claiming it is so she can visit her terminally ill mother in Georgia. However, police said Dineen-Lewis' mother is not terminally ill and this is a scam.

GPD spokesman Officer Ben Tobias said Dineen-Lewis has been seen in the area of

4400 SW 34th St., 700 SW 16th Ave. and 1600 NW 35th Place.

"Basically all over," he wrote in an email.

Tobias said there are three documented victims of Dineen-Lewis' scam with a total loss of \$80: \$30 from one victim and \$50 from another.

"Our recommendation is to not answer the door for anyone you're not expecting," Tobias said.

"Unfortunately it's not 'like it used to be' and folks are not always honest."

Dineen-Lewis was arrested twice in 2008 on criminal traffic charges. In July, she was arrested on charges of false imprisonment and battery on a person 65 years of age or older.

Police filed charges with the State Attorney's Office and are urging people not to give money to Dineen-Lewis and contact the sheriff's office if they are targeted.

A local nonprofit's new program will allow volunteers to turn service credit into a car.

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No new meningitis cases after UF student hospitalization

Officials have located all in contact with student

A week after UF sent out a mass email to the Student Body, no new information is available on the student hospitalized with meningococcal disease.

Nadia Kovacevich, an epidemiologist at the Florida Department of Health in Alachua County, said the department has located everyone who was in contact with the student.

"Everyone that was considered high risk was located and informed of the disease," she said. "The university was given the information to make sure that we didn't need to contact any other high risk individuals."

Jamie Kerzner, a 19-year-old UF biology sophomore, attended Coral Gables Senior High School in Miami with the Georgetown University student who died in September from meningitis.

"From what I've heard from

other friends, when she got to the hospital it was too late," she said. "I'm not sure if she thought she

just had a cold, but it's very unfortunate and very sad."

Kerzner said the idea of getting the disease is worrisome.

"I just need to be aware of my health," she said. "That goes for everyone. I think everyone has a complex where they think they can touch it out."

Meningococcal disease, a type of meningitis caused by a bacteria carried by people in their nasal passages or throat, can spread from person to person until the germ is no longer present, according to the Florida Department of Health.

Prevention for contracting the disease includes vaccinations,

avoidance of sharing eating utensils and covering the nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing.

Talking to a health care provider and making sure the appropriate testing is done is another way to prevent the disease, Kovacevich said.

No other cases of the disease have been reported.

Symptoms include fever, headache, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, increased sensitivity to light and altered mental status, according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

issues ranging from Ebola's impact on West Africa to how the countries medical systems are ill-equipped to handle the outbreak.

Villalon also stressed the importance of awareness and education about the disease.

"I think it's the most important thing we can do," he said. "No one in Gainesville is likely to get it."

Alysha Cooper, a 19-year-old UF biology junior, attended the event as a part of UF's Ebola research group.

"It's important to have information on the CDC, Atlanta and Texas, but it's easy for us to see Africa as a blob far from us," she said. "Education is key."

Abramowitz, who organized the event, is leading the Ebola research group at UF. Abramowitz said students should take action and help Ebola affected countries.

"I would encourage people and student organizations to start doing more fund-

raising," she said.

Paul Psychas was the first presenter of the evening.

He said he worked on the Ebola outbreak in Central Africa in 2002.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention predicts that there will be between 1.2 and 1.4 million cases of Ebola in West Africa by January 2015, Psychas said in his presentation.

"You can watch a whole string of headlines and never get the bigger picture," Psychas said.

UF stakeholders met to discuss strategies for handling the virus on campus Tuesday, Psychas said.

Medical staff are running drills at the UF Health Shands Hospital to practice isolating and treating an Ebola patient.

Joscelyn Essegbey, a Gainesville resident, attended the discussion to hear about the differences in treatment for the disease.

"The disease has no borders," Essegbey said. "We become aware of what we can bring in and take out."

Polk County 10-year-old girl diagnosed with Enterovirus

The viral respiratory infection that shocked the Midwest in August made its way to Florida this week.

The Florida Department of Health confirmed Tuesday the state's first case of Enterovirus D68

was detected in a 10-year-old girl in Polk County.

According to a press release, the girl is recovering. No other information was revealed on her condition.

The virus is highly contagious and spread through droplets in coughs or sneezes, or through contact with contaminated surfaces, such as countertops or doorknobs. It has proven especially dangerous for

infants and young children.

Florida joins 43 states and Washington, D.C. that have reported more than 500 total cases of Enterovirus D68 nationwide. A 4-year-old boy in New Jersey died of the infection on Sept. 25 and an additional four people infected with the virus have died, but it's unclear if the deaths were caused by the virus.

According to the U.S. Centers

for Disease Control and Prevention, almost all the cases have involved children.

The Florida Department of Health said the virus is often mistaken for the common cold or flu, and those with asthma are at a higher risk of infection. Symptoms may include wheezing, trouble breathing, high fever with ill appearance, thick nasal discharge and signs of dehydration.

The department recommends washing hands frequently and disinfecting surfaces with nonalcoholic products. Alcohol-based products, such as hand sanitizers, are not effective in combating the disease.

Nadia Kovacevich, an epidemiologist with the Florida Department of Health in Alachua County, said the agency is urging residents to remain at home if they are not feeling well.

UF uses grants to start diabetes institute focused on treatment

UF campus research centers have banded together to form a diabetes institute.

Five grants, totaling \$13.6 million, helped fund the program. The grants were from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases, which is part of the National Institutes of Health.

"We were very excited about these awards because UF may be the most represented in an effort to understand the role of insulin produc-

ing cells in Type 1 diabetes," institute director Mark Atkinson said.

The institute will be staffed with about 100 faculty members from the colleges of medicine, engineering, public health and health professions, nursing and the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS).

The institute will focus on advancing treatment for patients with both Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes.

Atkinson said UF diabetes research is one of the top in the country in terms of Type 1 diabetes.

According to Atkinson, the institute has a threefold mission that will dedicate diabetes research to improving clinical care and advanc-

ing the teaching and training of the next generation of researchers and caregivers.

"We cannot afford to let the diabetes epidemic continue," Atkinson said. "We need to do a better job of educating people what diabetes is and how to avoid it."

One in every 10 Floridians has diabetes, said Dr. Kenneth Cusi, the institute's adult medical director.

IFAS will be involved in outreach programs to educate the community about ways to prevent Type 2 diabetes.

"We hope that we will have an impact in inspiring the new generations to join this crusade in curing diabetes," Cusi said. "I'm very excited. This is probably the most important initiative for patients because Florida has one of the highest rates in diabetes."

David S. Guzick, senior vice president for health affairs at UF and president of UF Health, said he hopes to work with IFAS to prevent patients from developing Type 2 diabetes.

"We have to realize that diabetes is a significant health problem," he said. "We have a commitment to improving health throughout the state."

Leeana Peters, 19, conducts research on Type 1 diabetes in the Todd M. Brusko Laboratory and has seen diabetes in her family. Her 6-year-old sister was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at the age of 3.

"I am absolutely ecstatic that UF is establishing an institute to conduct more research on diabetes," the UF biology sophomore said.

New 'positive' Scott ad hypocritical and misleading

The Florida governor's race has seen some strange ads this election season. In particular, the recent ad from the College Republican National Committee that compared incumbent Gov. Rick Scott and challenger Charlie Crist to wedding dresses set a new standard for bizarre political advertising. Scott's "Flippin' Amazing!" attack ad against Crist also made waves for its strange — albeit amusing — brand of humor.

Now another ad from Scott's campaign has many Floridians scratching their heads. The ad doesn't contain any ostentatious formalwear or clever catchphrases. Instead, the TV spot contains a strangely hypocritical argument coming directly from the governor himself.

The ad, which Scott's campaign is trying to brand as a new, positive message, begins with the governor looking into the camera and saying:

"After all these attack ads, Charlie Crist wants you to hate me. I guess that's all he's got."

Leaving aside the fact that this supposedly "positive" ad is really just an attack against Crist for running a negative campaign, Scott's entire message is incredibly hypocritical.

According to Marc Caputo of the Miami Herald, in the last nine weeks, "likely voters in Florida have at least glimpsed 2.1 million ads bashing Crist and 1.7 million ads bashing Scott."

This means Scott's campaign has run more than 26 percent more negative ads than Crist's.

Scott's ads have not only been overwhelmingly negative but also factually misleading or simply false.

Earlier this year, Scott's campaign ran an ad featuring a Fort Lauderdale investor named Dean Kretschmar who claimed to have been "swindled" and "bankrupted" by Ponzi-schemer and former Crist donor Scott Rothstein.

Media investigations revealed that Kretschmar's lawyer, William R. Scherer, is a donor to Scott's campaign. Not only that, Kretschmar wasn't even actually bankrupted; he recouped the majority of the \$8 million he invested in Rothstein's scheme.

The implication of the ad, that Crist was somehow involved in Rothstein's illegal financial maneuvering, is completely bogus, as Scott himself later acknowledged.

The proliferation of negative advertising is one of the biggest problems with the modern American political system. Rather than engaging in honest debate about public policy issues and proposing solutions, politicians seek to drag each other into the mud with petty, often false, personal attacks. And rather than selecting a candidate who best represents their interests and values, voters end up choosing between the lesser of two evils.

Scott's half-hearted attempt to turn the governor's race in a positive direction would be mildly praiseworthy if he were not so hypocritical.

If Scott wants to attack Crist for running negative ads, he should take his own advice and stop the negativity coming from his campaign. Right now, he's throwing some very hefty stones from a very flimsy glass house.

'Twin Peaks' return bound to disappoint

Last Friday, director David Lynch sent out a rather interesting tweet: "Dear Twitter Friends: That gum you like is going to come back in style!"

Fans of Lynch and his cult-hit TV series "Twin Peaks" knew this had to be an important message, hinting at the possibility of the series' return.

On Monday, the theories were confirmed when Showtime announced it is picking up nine episodes of "Twin Peaks," which will air sometime in 2016.

If you haven't watched "Twin Peaks" yet, I strongly encourage you to do so. Television as we know it today simply wouldn't exist without this show.

"Twin Peaks" premiered in 1990 and was canceled after two seasons due to low ratings, but it forever changed the way stories are told on TV. It received tons of critical acclaim and instant status as a cult icon, and its fanbase has only grown over the years.

What is "Twin Peaks?" There's no way I could do it justice in a single paragraph, but I'll try anyway. It's the story of what happens after the most popular girl in a small town in the state of Washington is murdered. It tells the stories of the FBI agent who comes to investigate, the townspeople's not-so-quiet secrets and the dark, supernatural forces in the woods. The show is about the violent struggle between good and evil, love and damn fine cups of coffee. "Twin Peaks" is, at times, quirky and hilarious, and at other times horrifically cold, hard and brilliant.

Now that I've finished gushing, I need to confess: I'm not actually that excited about "Twin Peaks" coming back.

I'm sorry, but I'm not buying it — literally.

Something tells me some Showtime executive saw an opportunity to backstroke through a pool of money so big it would make Scrooge McDuck feel modest. Or, at the very least, Showtime realized it's going to have to step up its game if they're going to compete with HBO's programming in the long run.

Signing "Twin Peaks" is a godsend for Showtime. The network can expect thousands of diehard fans to hop on for the new season, as well as legions of insecure, over-ea-

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ger twenty-somethings desperate to seem like they know what they're talking about at parties.

I have enormous respect for Lynch, and I'm not calling into question his integrity as an artist. However, a powerful lust for organic coffee and cigarettes doesn't pay for itself, and surely no one can blame an artist for

agreeing to get paid obscene amounts of money to produce more of his work.

I'm simply skeptical. I have sincere doubts these next nine episodes will be as good as the originals. I point to the prequel/sequel film "Twin Peaks: Fire Walk With Me" — which some consider both an artistic and a financial disaster — as well as the fact that every member of the original cast is now either significantly older or has kicked the bucket.

Yesterday, I watched the "Psych" tribute to "Twin Peaks" — you know, for research purposes — which used many actors from the original series. Twenty-five years ago, they convincingly played hot high school students. In the tribute, they convincingly played wrinkly, gray-haired, middle-aged people. It was profoundly upsetting.

Retroactive final seasons hardly work out well at all — I'm looking at you, season four of "Arrested Development" — even if they're objectively OK. Even if these new episodes are of passable quality, they're inherently unnecessary. Part of what makes cult TV shows so sacred in our society is that they died before they had a chance to be terrible. We get to remember the greatness of the shows without coping with a disappointing finish.

Obviously, I'll be watching these new episodes of "Twin Peaks" along with all the other diehard fans.

However, I still believe there's no need to resurrect the mythology.

The show really should be left in peace.

Luke Bryan Farm Tour sells rural escapism, goofy charm

The turnout for Luke Bryan's Farm Tour 2014 stop in Gainesville Saturday night was like something, well, straight from a Luke Bryan song.

Mud-splattered trucks by the hundreds crowded the giant field on Whitehurst Cattle Company in Archer. Boys in camo and overalls, minus shirts, and girls in all manner of sundresses, cowboy boots and body glitter drank from Miller Lite tallboys. In the center of the field, a giant stage stood flanked by semi-trucks bearing Bryan's face and Cabela's slogan, #ItsInMyNature. Red-topped Smirnoff tents stood next to stands selling leather belts and cowboy boots.

With a No.1 single and multi-million-dollar national tour, Bryan is a veritable country cash cow. Sponsored by 5-hour Energy, Cabela's and Miller Lite, his sixth annual Farm Tour, with special guest up-and-comer country artist Cole Swindell, comes off the tails of his That's My Kind of Night Tour, which has thus far grossed more than \$55.5 million. A portion of the concert proceeds will go toward the Luke Bryan Farm Tour Scholarship, which awards scholarship money to college students from farming families around the communities on the tour's stops.

Bryan's goofy charm and soror-

ity girl sex appeal are enough to allow him to skate by on tired, repetitive lyrics about country babes, drinking and trucks laid over simplistic, three-chord rock progressions. There's a reason why critics, including Tom Petty, have pointed out that today's bestselling country music is more Bon Jovi than Hank Williams.

After Swindell's raucous opening set, the lights dimmed and a clip of Bryan shooting a flaming crossbow played over the monitors on stage — a familiar scene from one of his Cabela's ads. Then began his act with plenty of hip gyrating, contrived shout-outs to the Gators win and live performances of the hits that have propelled him forward as today's top-earning male country artist.

And though Bryan's success is purely commercial — Rolling Stone gave his 2013 album "Crash My Party" just two and a half stars — the Farm Tour illustrates the crux of his appeal. Whether it's one three-minute, three-chord song or one night spent on a farm 30 minutes away from campus, the Bryan listener can escape into a rural fantasy of whiskey, catfish dinners and country girls shaking it on the hood of daddy's tractor.

I would venture to guess it's a fantasy that doesn't exist for the average Bryan fan. On Saturday, as he launched into "Rain Is a Good

Thing" — prompting the girl behind me to upend her Miller Lite on the back of my legs in excitement — and images of corn fields and tractors played on the screens behind him, a girl next to me cracked open a canned Smirnoff screwdriver. In front of me, people held their smart phones high above their heads to capture video of Bryan bounding across the stage. The next day the hundreds, perhaps thousands, of

UF students who'd taken a break to get muddy on a farm returned to their apartments, fraternity houses and the Starbucks in their libraries.

Sure, Bryan has tapped into a lucrative brand of rural escapism, and sure, maybe some of it rings a bit phony — Bryan has, at this point, pushed the limit on the amount of times one artist can mention catfish in his songs. But as the sun sank over Whitehurst Cattle Company,

the temperature dropped and feel-good country song after feel-good country song played. Bryan's pop-country crossover appeal became clear. He's a cute, affable guy with a guitar and just the right amount of songwriting chops — besides genre and time, what separates Bryan from Frankie Valli, Elvis Presley or John Mayer?

It's a familiar formula, and it's one that works.

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Downtown Hippodrome State Theatre rebrands after 20 years

A horse with six legs and a collaboration between downtown neighbors: The Hippodrome State Theatre is changing pace.

"Getting rid of the old H, and trashing the tradition," said Mark Sexton, the former general manager of the Hippodrome. "This is insane. This is the best thing ever!"

On Tuesday night, the 41-year-old Hippodrome and local marketing team 160over90 revealed their strategy for a complete rebranding of the historic theater, the first one in about 20 years.

Before the reveal, Jessica Hurrov, managing director, said the Hippodrome was excited and extremely grateful for the chance to work with its neighbors. 160over90 collaborated and designed the rebranding completely

free of charge.

The old design was drawn on a napkin by an old set designer.

"The swoopy H didn't say anything about us. It was just a fancy H," she said. "160over90 aims to use our marketing to tell a story."

At the reveal, Greg Ash, the creative director at the firm that is also handling UF's rebranding, presented a minimalist logo: "Hippodrome" in a rectangular box with the six-legged silhouette of a horse behind it.

The horse contains symbolic references to the theater's past, present and future, Ash said. The horse is there because the original meaning of the word hippodrome involves horse racing, and the six legs represent the six founders, the six columns of the building and the six goals of the theater.

He said the point of the logo is to get people to ask questions. If the Hippodrome can use this logo

to start a discussion in the community, then 160over90 has done its job.

"I can see this logo on a poster that says threesome on it," Ash said in relation to a sample production poster for the play "Two Musketeers."

Before the reveal, Ash said the idea for the rebranding came from conversations between himself, Hurrov and other Hippodrome employees last October.

He said he believes the Hippodrome is the face of culture in Gainesville. The old building at the end of the street can be intimidating and isn't always appreciated as it should be.

He said he wanted the rebrand to display a shift in perspective, make the community look inward, keep the dialogue going and help people be a little less afraid of the old building down the street.

So it's really like we just kind of agreed to get together and see how it felt — or see if we could feel it out and see if it was something we'd be interested in doing. But at the time we were thinking about doing one show, then it just kinda grew from there. We ate breakfast and started getting back into the material and started getting reconnected with one another again. It was kind of time in all of our lives where a lot of us were in transitional phases between different things we were doing work-

wise and schoolwise and familywise and what not, so it just sort of worked out — like all systems go. So we have a good friend who's been hassling us for a while about doing something with Mineral. They're sort of involved in the music world, and they offered to manage the affair and put things together for us. So we green lighted it, and it kinda blew up.

Twenty years ago is this something you ever thought your band would do?

Definitely not — although 20 years ago, I probably thought we'd still be around. Which I guess we are, but in a different way than I would've imagined at that time. I was very much career minded at the time. I didn't really see any reason why Mineral wouldn't be around now.

Do you think this reunion will inspire new music from Mineral?

That's been a popular question for sure. I

think our take on it has been that we're certainly open to it, but there's no specific plans in the work. I think that's something that would take a little more time to develop. As of right now, we kind of we have our hands full just getting ready for the tour, preparing and re-learning the material and all learning the gear, the technical aspect together. I think we have the next leg of the tour to be addressed, and then we have quite a while off before we got off to Europe and Japan in January. So I guess we'll see what happens. We're definitely not closed minded to the idea. Nobody is thinking that we should definitely not do that. Like I said, there's just no plan other than the tour dates we have planned right now.




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

Driskel to start at quarterback, backup to be determined

With quarterback Treon Harris indefinitely suspended from team activities while he is investigated for alleged sexual battery, Jeff Driskel will be Florida's starter on Saturday when UF (3-1, 2-1 Southeastern Conference) plays host to LSU (4-2, 0-2 SEC) at 7:30 p.m.

While coach Will Muschamp knew Driskel was going to have time on the field against the Tigers, he did not have a starter selected between Driskel and Harris heading into the week.

"Jeff was going to play in the game," Muschamp said. "I do know that."

Driskel was benched in favor of Harris with eight seconds remain-

ing in the third quarter of Florida's 10-9 win against Tennessee.

Harris led UF's offense on both of its scoring drives, and Driskel finished the day against the Volunteers completing 11 of his 23 passes for 59 yards while throwing three interceptions.

"Jeff's a tough young man. He's resilient," Muschamp said. "I met with him Sunday and I talked

to him after the game and talked to him Monday. He understands there's some situation. He needs to play better. He takes full responsibility to be the quarterback at the University of Florida."

But now the focus has shifted from who will start against LSU to who will be Driskel's backup.

Muschamp said Wednesday that redshirt sophomore Skyler Mornhinweg and true freshman Will Grier are splitting the second-team reps in practice this week.

Grier is a four-star recruit out of Davidson Day (N.C.) High and the second-ranked dual-threat quarterback in the 2014 recruiting class, according to Rivals.com. He tallied 90 total touchdowns and more than 6,000 total yards in his senior year of high school alone.

Grier missed three weeks of practice with back spasms but was cleared to practice again on Sunday.

"I didn't see a lot of rust from him as far as those things," Muschamp said of Grier. "He's been involved in all the meetings."

Muschamp admitted Wednesday that he had thoughts about redshirting Grier but the discussions did not go too far.

"We hadn't really made a decision considering the length we still had to go in the season," Muschamp said. "So, you know, we had not had that discussion as far as redshirt at that time. Given the

situation of having two guys that had played to that point in the season, that's probably where we were headed. Certainly given the situation right now, obviously not."

Mornhinweg started Florida's final three games of the 2013 season following season-ending injuries to Driskel and then-backup Tyler Murphy.

In those three games, the Philadelphia native recorded 344 yards, three touchdowns and an interception while completing 69.8 percent of his passes.

Mornhinweg and freshman defensive lineman Gerald Willis were in an altercation involving a pair of cleats Monday evening that resulted in University Police being dispatched.

Neither player pressed charges, and Muschamp clarified the incident on Wednesday and said that the two are not receiving disciplinary action.

"It was a tremendous misunderstanding," Muschamp said. "I tell you what, we've made a big one out of this. We've got an air thing that takes the wetness out of the cleats. Skyler last year was No. 17 and Jordan Sherit's No. 17 this year. Gerald was coming from class and trying to get ready for practice. Couldn't find his cleats on the air thing, and he grabbed No. 17 because he's buddies with Jordan Sherit and he thought that'd be OK. Went out to practice, and there was a disagreement on the cleats and whose cleats they were."

"Nobody stole anything. If anybody stole anything, they wouldn't be on this football team anymore. I can assure you of that."

Muschamp said they communicated well — a struggle during the Alabama game — and executed their assignments much better. This could be from having with extra time during the bye week to prepare for Tennessee and to go back to basics.

The Gators also stripped away some of

the checks that are usually made at the line of scrimmage by the secondary to reduce confusion and allow players to play fast without thinking, only reacting.

Injury update: Receiver Valdez Showers is the only player confirmed that is out for the LSU game.

Defensive lineman Leon Orr is questionable for Saturday's game against LSU with a knee injury, with Muschamp saying he's worked out, and continues to progress. Linebacker Mike Taylor has resolved his knee injury but contracted the flu, but is still expected to play.

Receiver CJ Worton has recovered from sustaining a broken hand and will play Saturday. Quarterback Will Grier is good to go after being cleared by trainers for having back spasm, as are running backs Brandon Powell and Matt Jones.

Muschamp assesses offensive line: After

any absence rust becomes a factor for players, and it can take different amounts of time to return to game speed. This is the case for left tackle D.J. Humphries.

"He and I talked after the game," Muschamp said. "That's one thing about D.J., he's a hard self-evaluator and came to me and said, 'boy, we need to tighten some things up.' He'll get back into the swing. I've been pleased with his practice so far this week."

Besides Humphries, Muschamp said freshman Roderick Johnson continues to get better although he did get beat on a stunt in a critical situation.

Fellow-freshman lineman David Sharpe was also mentioned as someone the coaching staff is comfortable with moving forward. Center Max Garcia was the offensive lineman of the game and continues to have "an amazing year" according to Muschamp.

Antwi embracing leadership role among middle blockers

By now, Florida's volleyball team is tired of hearing about Chloe Mann.

Or rather, about her absence.

Mann was a two-time All-American and led UF in hitting percentage for three straight years, beginning in her sophomore season.

She was No. 1 on the team in both kills and points as a senior, and was a large part of Florida's 28-4 record last season and second place finish in the Southeastern Conference.

She was Florida's unquestioned leader at the net.

And now she's gone, but she left something behind.

"Towards the end, (Chloe) kind of knew it was gonna be me (replacing her)," junior Simone Antwi said. "So it wasn't that drastic of a transition because Chloe kind of eased me into it towards the end of the season."

Antwi has inherited Mann's role as the team's oldest blocker.

And just as Mann helped her, Antwi is now facilitating freshman blocker Rhamat Alhassan's transition into Florida's system.

So far, the junior has set a good example.

Antwi is fourth in the SEC in hitting percentage (.398), and of the conference's top 20 hitters, she has the fourth fewest errors (26).

The 6-foot-2 blocker not only takes pride in her own ability, but also in the help she is able to provide Alhassan.

"It's weird now because I'm the oldest middle, so I have to kind of be the mama bear," Antwi said. "When Rhamat's in (the game) and she does something, it's not like I can go out of the game and just check out. I have to pay attention and see what she's doing. ... I've kind of embraced the role of

helping her."

Antwi's mentorship has allowed Alhassan to flourish beyond expectations during her first season.

The freshman has surpassed Antwi in hitting percentage (.476) while collecting just one more error (27).

For Antwi and Alhassan, the distinction between junior and freshman is clear. The line between student and teacher is less so.

"She's helped me more than she knows, to be honest," Antwi said.

After not starting to begin the year, Alhassan has now secured a permanent spot in the opening lineup.

"Who would of thought that a player who didn't start the first set of her first match of her freshmen year can produce the kind of numbers that Rhamat is producing right now?" coach Mary Wise said.

Some of Alhassan's success is a direct result of Antwi's assistance, but even more of it is due to the precedent that Mann set during her Florida tenure.

Mann's gone now, but she left something behind.

"Chloe, having her around was a really big thing, but she also kind of helped us along the way," Antwi said. "While she was here ... (I) learned so much from her. Now we're kind of carrying it on for her."

handled the sexual assault accusations vary.

"I'm proud of the way Florida handled it," said 20-year-old Connor Ingalls. "I think it was good for them to take care of it before it got out of control or overshadowed

the team."

The telecommunication junior said he thinks the university's decision to suspend Harris is strongly influenced by the recent assaults on and around UF campus.

"It all created the perfect storm really for Treon Harris to just have to be suspended immediately," he

said.

However, 23-year-old recent Florida State University graduate David Arbogast said he doesn't agree with Harris' suspension.

"I don't think we should punish someone until they're proven guilty, but I understand why UF did it," he said.

Coach Will Muschamp met with media on Wednesday for the first time since news about Harris' situation broke on Monday.

The Florida head coach did not add any further comment on the situation.

"The statement that the university released Monday, I think,

was pretty self-explanatory," Muschamp said.

"It's a very serious charge, and there's been no change in his status. So that's kind of where we are."
