## UF releases police report regarding Treon Harris case

UF released 175 pages of documents Wednesday, including a witness testimony and an interview between Treon Harris and Detective Justin Faroni. The documents also contain an incident report and multiple text messages that shed light on the details of the sexual battery complaint filed against Harris on Oct. 6, which was withdrawn Oct. 9.

It is 6:36 a.m. Oct. 6, and Treon Harris is in the kitchen area shared by the residents of the fourth floor of Building 4 of the Springs Residential Complex in just a shirt and his underwear. He can't get any other clothes because his room is sealed off by police, and anything in it is considered potential evidence. He agreed to speak with Faroni there instead of at the Univer-

sity Police Criminal Investigations Division because he didn't want to leave the building without wearing more clothes.

Just after midnight Oct. 6, a female UF student reported that Harris sexually assaulted her in his room in the early hours of Oct. 5. Harris admits he has known the complainant since the summer when they both arrived at UF, admits immediately in the interview with Faroni that he believes she's inter-

ested in him romantically and says on the night in question, she "kept" trying to sleep with him. Harris repeatedly states in the interview with Faroni that the two had intercourse but that it was consensual and that she in no way gave him any sign of not wanting to have intercourse that night.

Harris is repeatedly confused about why the complainant waited nearly 24 hours to report anything and is also distressed about the fact that the incident might appear on ESPN.

Harris says he could tell the complainant liked him from the moment he met her. He said she would say things like "you're so handsome."

The night began after Harris returned to Gainesville with the rest of the Florida football team after a 10-9 victory over the University of Tennessee Volunteers. Harris and the complainant had "hung out" the Wednesday before the game — Harris and the team left for Knoxville, Tennessee, on Oct. 3.

When they returned the next day, per testimony given by Harris' roommate Quincy Wilson, Wilson said he and Harris returned to their residence hall at 6:30 p.m. and watched T.V.

## Greek life on UF campus due to expand in 2015

A few new sororities and fraternities will be added to the UF Greek community starting Spring of 2015.

Voting for the potential groups took place Wednesday night. The official decision will not be announced until mid-November.

The Multicultural Greek Council Expansion Committee and Panhellenic Council Extension Committee are voting to invite three groups to be a part of UF's campus.

"It's really exciting to see our community as growing like this and to have the membership to support more groups," said Betsy Adams, program coordinator for the department of Student Activities and Involvement.

Since 2002, UF Panhellenic has not added a new sorority, and the Multicultural Council has not added a new group since 2011.

"This is a historic time for us," Adams said.

She said UF Panhellenic is looking to add a new sorority in Fall of 2015. The three sororities applying to be new additions to UF are Gamma Phi Beta, Phi Sigma Sigma and Alpha Phi.

Phi Sigma Sigma closed in 1994, but the sorority is looking to re-establish itself on campus.

Kelsey Torgerson, 22, president of UF Pan-

## Panel discusses dangers of Islamic State

As the Islamic State becomes a growing topic of national discussion, three UF professors hosted a public conversation on the issue Wednesday.

The Bob Graham Center for Public Service held the ISIS and the Question of Islamic Militancy panel in Pugh Hall.

The professors offered different perspectives on the violent actions of ISIS and other Islamic militant groups.

Panelist Terje Østebø, an assistant professor with UF's Center for African Studies and the Department of Religion, spoke

first about ISIS trying to establish religious purity.

"What we're seeing is enforcement of this purity now with very violent means," Østebø said.

He said ISIS claiming to be a religious movement is something to be taken seriously.

About 50 people attended the ISIS dis-

cussion.

At the panel, Matthew Jacobs, an associate professor in the UF Department of History, suggested ISIS should be seen as a problem stemming from years of political chaos in that region.

Panelist Leonardo Villalón, the International Center dean, expressed similar concerns during the discussion.

"We need to ask ourselves, what are the conditions that are provoking people to join these kinds of movements?" Villalón said.

Audience members were encouraged to make their own points and pose questions at the end of the panel.

# New expanded bicycle racks to appear on RTS buses in Nov

## They allow for 3 to 5 bicycles at a time

As the grand opening of its new facility nears, Gainesville Regional Transit System is one step closer to incorporating new bicycle racks on each of its buses.

The RTS Bus Fleet Maintenance & Operations Facility will open Nov. 20 with more space and improved buses, which will be accompanied by bike racks that could fit three to five bikes at a time, said Chip Skinner, RTS spokesman.

"We're not as large as a bigger city where the bus can swing into another lane and come around," Skinner said. "We've always been limited to a two-bike rack system."

But with the help of new vendor Byk-Rak, RTS buses will soon have more room for bicycles.

"They actually offset it so it's more of a staggered bike system," Skinner said.

Byk-Rak has been working with the Florida Department of Transportation for the past two years to approve the company's racks, said Ron Coon, Byk-Rak marketing and sales vice president.

"The bike owner can have fenders on their bikes and use our racks," Coon wrote in an email. "With our wheel-locking system, fenders have no interference to our tire-locking device."

Some students are wary of the new bike rack system and how effective it may be.

UF art history sophomore Alejandra Carrillo rides her bike at least four times a week.

She said she likes the idea of more space for bikes but is worried about the logistics.

"I think it's good because sometimes you get there and there's two bikes already, so you have to wait again," the 20-year-old said. "However, I struggle putting my bike on the rack when there's one in front and I have to put it behind that one."

hellenic Council, said it's an honor to have the opportunity to be able to begin the process of expansion.

"The council hasn't expanded in over a decade, so it's due time that we bring an incredible chapter to the University of Florida," the UF political science senior said.

Torgerson said by expanding, more UF women will have the opportunity to be a part of the Panhellenic experience.

Nine groups applied and three were selected for the final round of the Multicultural Council's decision. The three Asian interest groups are: Delta Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., Lambda Phi Epsilon Fraternity, Inc. and Sigma Sigma Rho Sorority, Inc.

Adams said it will take about one to two years for the Greek houses to be built and it will cost around \$6 million to be constructed, based on previous houses.

President of the Multicultural Council Hrishu Kumbhojkar, 22, said the council is always looking for ways to grow and include as many cultures as possible at UF.

"All three organizations brought personality and opportunity for students, and the students themselves are very active both in their organization and on campus," the UF mechanical engineer fifth-year said. "In MGC (Multicultural Greek Council) it's all there. We offer a lot for any individual wanting to join Greek life."

# Vive Delivery will caffeinate on the go Mondays through Fridays

Housed on the first floor of The Swamp Restaurant, a new coffee delivery service will soon cycle java to students.

Vive Delivery will quell coffee cravings via bicycle deliveries starting next month, replacing the void GoJoe left after the company went on hiatus following Spring semester.

Deliveries will run Mondays through Fridays from 6:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

"I noticed so many times that line outside of Starbucks going out the door, and students frustrated having to go out of their way to get their coffee," said Vive's co-founder, DJ Staub. "I heard so many complaints."

The 22-year-old UF food science and human nutrition senior decided to start the business with Daniel Varona, a UF alumnus.

"If I was going to work 100 hours a week, I wasn't going to do it for anyone else," Varona

said.

The student-based company offers three different types of coffee: a light roast called Eyes Wide Open, Vive's Medium House Blend and Premium Brazilian Dark Roast. All three cost \$2.99 each including tax and delivery fees. Orders can be placed through Vive's mobile application, its website or a telephone call.

Unlike GoJoe, Staub said Vive personalizes each cup of coffee.

"It's going to be slow with this first location opening up," he said.

But in the next four years, Staub and Varona plan to expand their business to 10 different college campuses in the Southeast.

UF psychology senior Iman Bouryou said she would be interested in Vive for the convenience.

"A great aspect of this is that I can order through an app so I don't have to stand in a long Starbucks line at the Reitz or Library West," the 21-year-old said.

About 200 people traveled to a garage sale at the UF Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Extension Bookstore on Wednesday to buy donated household items.

The department made about \$800 during the event, which lasted from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. All of the proceeds from the items provided by the IFAS Communications Services employees will be donated to the UF Campaign for Charities, said Pam Bobilin, IFAS communications services special events and projects planner.

## Build-your-own pizza chain, Blaze Fast Fire'd Pizza, will debut in Gainesville in December

If you're in college, it's likely that pizza is the love of your life — the Internet says so.

And come December, you'll be able to customize your favorite food into the ideal thin-crust slice thanks to a new build-your-own pizza chain coming to Gainesville.

National franchise Blaze Fast Fire'd Pizza will open its doors at 3617 SW Archer Road, across from Butler Plaza, bringing a new meaning to assembly-line fast food.

Customers can go down the line and build 11-inch personal pizzas from the sauce up. Choices include a selection of handmade sauces, like Blaze's spicy red sauce, cheeses from ovalini mozzarella to ricotta, vegetables and meats like applewood bacon and Italian sausage.

Pile them on — no matter the toppings, the pizza comes for one set price: \$7.85.

Personal pizzas are then cooked in an open-flame oven and served in 2 to 3 minutes.

"We try to position our price point so that it's affordable for college students that are on a budget," said Dennis Sherer, a managing partner for the Florida market.

The restaurant also serves "simple pie" cheese pizzas for \$5, signature pizzas for \$7.85, entree salads for \$6.25 and its s'more pie dessert for \$2. It will seat about 100 customers between indoor tables and two outdoor patios.

Blaze's special dough is made from executive chef Brad Kent's recipe, which requires a 24-hour fermentation period to create a crisp crust.

Blaze will also offer gluten-free dough and vegan cheese, as well as a selection of wine and craft beer.

Backed by investors such as LeBron James and Maria Shriver, the chain has opened

in 11 states and Washington, D.C. since its California opening in 2012. Blaze Pizza will continue to open restaurants across Florida, from Tallahassee to Miami, in the coming months.

Sherer said the restaurant's target audience is millennials, with college towns acting as a major draw for its new locations.

Ken Peng, owner of food blog Ken Eats Gainesville, said it is still to be seen if Blaze will match up to the other local pizza places.

"Blaze would be the first pizza joint that really allows the customer to customize pizzas exactly how they want," he said. "For better or worse, more variety is a healthy thing."

Peng said he expects the concept will appeal to college students who are fans of other assembly-line restaurants, like Chipotle Mexican Grill and Moe's Southwest Grill. Still, he said he feels artisanal Italian pizza "is an art that should be left to chefs."

"It'll stick around if only for the opportunity to pile nothing but meat onto a pizza," Peng said. "Someone's going to do it."

A Gainesville woman was arrested Tuesday after police said she poked the father of her child on the shoulder with a knife, cut up his bed sheets and destroyed his laptop.

At about 9 a.m., Kiara Shandrea Sharde Cray went into the victim's apartment.

She and the victim had been in a relationship for about three years and have a 1-year-old son together. They split about a month ago, according to a re-

After entering the apartment at 2044 SW 66th Drive, the 23-year-old grabbed a large knife, cut up the victim's bed sheet, tapped the victim on the forearm and poked him on the left shoulder with the knife.

"Where do you want it?" Cray said to the victim. "Do you want me to stab you in the

throat, cut off your d\*\*k or stab you in the ribs?"

She also told their child, "Son, go into your room. I am going to kill your daddy."

Cray grabbed the victim's laptop — a Toshiba — and threw it, causing the screen to crack and \$150 in damage.

Cray was arrested on charges of aggravated domestic battery and criminal mischief.

She was released Wednesday afternoon on a \$6,000 bond.

## Scott's handling of execution is telling of office

On Tuesday night, Florida Gov. Rick Scott and Democratic challenger Charlie Crist squared off in their third and final debate.

One of the debate's most heated moments came during a discussion about the execution of Marshall Lee Gore. A convicted rapist and murderer, Gore was put to death Oct. 1, 2013.

Gore's execution was originally supposed to take place in June of that year. However, legal concerns over Gore's sanity resulted in Scott postponing the execution until Sept. 10.

After the date in September was chosen, Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi requested that Scott postpone the execution once again. The reason for Bondi's request? According to the Tampa Bay Times, the date of the execution conflicted with Bondi's "hometown campaign kickoff" at her South Tampa home."

Bondi apologized afterward for the postponement request, saying she "absolutely should not have requested that the date of the execution be moved."

Ironically, Bondi has been one of the strongest supporters of Florida's Timely Justice Act, which aims to ensure speedy executions for Florida death row inmates. Apparently, timely justice is critically important unless Bondi finds it politically inconvenient. During the debate on Tuesday, Crist pressed Scott about whether he knew Bondi's reason for requesting the execution be postponed.

"She asked me to delay it because it didn't work on the dates that she thought it was going to be on," Scott responded. "She apologized."

Scott claims he did not know the reason for the delay. This leaves two possibilities. The first is that the governor is lying and did, in fact, know that Bondi wanted the execution postponed so she could hold her fundraiser. The second — and equally damning — possibility is the governor simply postponed the execution without being given a good reason. Such carelessness in matters of life and death is inexcusable from someone who wants to lead our state for another four years.

The controversy over the Gore execution is very similar to New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie's "Bridgagate" scandal. As a brief reminder, this scandal unfolded after revelations that Christie's political aides intentionally caused roadblocks and traffic delays on the George Washington Bridge as retaliation against one of Christie's political opponents. Christie continues to claim he had no knowledge of his staffers' actions.

Both "Bridgagate" and the Gore controversy demonstrate governors who are either actively involved in unethical and inappropriate political scheming or are simply ignorant of misconduct occurring right under their noses. However, because the Gore incident involved playing political games with a human life, Scott and Bondi's malfeasance is far more despicable.

Florida needs leaders who demonstrate a clear and unwavering commitment to serving its citizens' best interests. The mishandling of the Gore case is just the latest evidence that Scott and Bondi are not those leaders.

## 'GamerGate' latest in online harassment

On Monday morning, Monica Lewinsky joined Twitter.

Lewinsky spoke at Forbes' "Under 30 Summit," which was geared toward successful millennials. She told the crowd about her plans to lead a cultural revolution against the Internet's culture of harassment. She called herself "Patient Zero," because after the scandal in which she was implicated as Bill Clinton's alleged mistress, she was harassed through chain emails and on message boards. Lewinsky was inspired to speak out about online harassment after Rutgers University student Tyler Clementi took his own life. Clementi was driven to suicide in the wake of harassment he received when his roommate posted video taken in secret of him and another man kissing on the Internet. In an effort to "give purpose to (her) past," Lewinsky started her campaign.

Within hours of Lewinsky joining Twitter, people began harassing her, vilifying her again for her role in the late '90s scandal, as if it doesn't take two to tango and that her past indiscretions completely discredit her as a voice against a malignant trend that hurts real people.

But this perfectly illustrates Lewinsky's point. Online harassment has become expected — so entrenched that people accept it as one of the unalterable realities of life. The re-emergence of a public figure of Lewinsky's caliber is telling, because her "cultural revolution" is in sync with a new culture war's first skirmish.

This skirmish is GamerGate and its surrounding controversies.

GamerGate is a social activism movement that began in August when Zoe Quinn, who developed the critically acclaimed indie game *Depression Quest*, broke up with her boyfriend. Enraged, he took to his blog and said, among other things, that Quinn had cheated on him with a journalist from the game site Kotaku. Quinn's boyfriend claimed this was the only reason her game took off: reviews in exchange for sex. Outrage radiated from this story into the general body of gaming journalism, despite the fact that the story of the affair was totally unfounded and Kotaku never even published a review of *Depression Quest*.

Masquerading under the banner "Ethics in Games Jour-

nalism," supporters of GamerGate are patrolling social media and online forums, harassing anybody they deem subversive to their vision of what the gaming community should be.

There are, of course, good people involved with GamerGate who hold legitimate concerns about gaming journalism, and

their voices should be heard. In spite of these noble people with noble intentions, though, GamerGate has become a front for hordes of reactionaries. It has effectively become a massive act of pointing to the crudely painted "No Girls Allowed" sign in front of the clubhouse and shouting down all who suggest otherwise with rape threats.

Demographically, these people don't represent the gaming community at all. Gamers are simply people who enjoy playing video games. That is a huge and extremely diverse demographic.

However, a small but loud segment of the movement sincerely believes feminists are in league with a progressive media establishment and waging a war on gamers and gaming. Figures who have nothing to do with gaming are now using this vaguely right-wing, anti-establishment stance as a launchpad for their rhetoric against institutions outside of gaming. Everyone is entitled to their opinions, even if those opinions are barely veiled justifications to keep women out of gaming and maintain the precious status quo. Their toxic ideology gives those who buy into it an excuse to harass and threaten women and men to the point where they're afraid to live in their own homes. As an example of this harassment, when feminist game critic Anita Sarkeesian announced her plans to speak at Utah State University, a man emailed the university and pledged to commit "the deadliest school shooting in American history" in response.

This is culture war in the time of the Internet. One can only hope Lewinsky will save us now.

# Your cookbook is more than simply your recipes

A cookbook can be considered an autobiography.

The very title of early American food writer M. F. K. Fisher's "The Gastronomical Me" suggests that to write about food is to write about oneself. Her collection of essays, which depicts events from her childhood, her life in France, the beginning of World War II, the ending of her first marriage and the suicide of her second husband, are told through a culinary lens. The embedded recipes suggest a cookbook but one that is more than a list of ingredients and instructions.

Cookbooks as autobiographies tell personal stories and are a testimony of one's existence. Simply by writing one's name on the first page of a book is an act of autobiographical writing.

Writing about food is a way to record one's life, giving permanence to the fleeting pleasures of eating and the value of cooking. In composing recipes, cookbook authors jot down notes in the margins, store paper ephemera like grocery lists and magazine articles and save photos between the pages of the cookbook. As a result, cookbooks become a hybrid of written forms: a diary, a journal, a travelogue, an essay and a scrapbook.

As personal narratives, cookbooks connect food and the self in a textual representation, telling how we come to be the people we claim to be through writing the stories and recipes of our lives. Cookbook writers self-consciously shape their identities by selecting memories and preserving them in images and recipes.

Yet, cookbooks are not bound



to a chronological sequence. Instead, recipes are like distinct, fragmented life events made whole and coherent in a cookbook.

Cookbooks are evidence of one's life and community participation, as they are documentations of eating practices and food trends. A cookbook isolated from its author and time period cannot be properly understood, nor can recipes isolated from their origins. Like Benedict Anderson's "imagined communities," there is a sense of community in cookbooks because a non-space-bound comradeship is built based on shared interests and values between the author and reader.

Returning to "The Gastronomical Me," Fisher explains why she writes about food: "(W)hen I write of hunger, I am really writing about love and the hunger for it ... and then the warmth and richness and fine reality of hunger satisfied ... and it is all one." Through her own discrete "I," Fisher represents other intangible hunger pains we all share.

Like Fisher, cookbook writers-slash-autobiographers are compelled to write their recipes and experiences of food, driven by emotional and social hunger for love, attention and acceptance. Other urges, such as the need for defining a personal and collective identity, are also met in cookbooks. Gabrielle Hamilton's "Blood, Bones & Butter" offers a contemporary version of cookbooks-cum-memoirs that trace their development as women and professionals.

Personal twists to a traditional dish allow one to leave his or her mark and seasonings at the kitchen table and beyond.

# Found Footage Festival back in Gainesville with more obscure clips

The dramatic how-to videos of the '90s, such as a McDonald's training video and a 1997 instructional video "How to Have Cybersex on the Internet," will come alive this weekend.

Pickett said videos share a universal language.

"Everybody can relate to stupid videos," he said.

# 'Dear White People' is relief from racial stereotypes in movies

Writer and director Justin Simien's new film, "Dear White People," is a hilarious satire of racial politics and a welcome breath of fresh air. While the movie has its flaws, it is funny, pointed, honest and something we haven't seen in recent modern films.

The movie follows the lives of four black Ivy League students at the fictional Winchester University. The main character, Samantha White, played by Tessa Thompson, has a radio show called "Dear White People," where she calls out white people for actions she sees as racist. Samantha receives opposition from other students of all races: Some of the students feel that she takes things too far in claiming racial divides.

During the movie's climax, there's a party at Winchester: a blackface party that proves Samantha's point that racism still exists. UF is even featured during the closing credits, with a photo from the 2012 blackface incident at an off-campus party that threw frat boys into national news.

Simien's screenplay is a parody that makes the viewer laugh and, more importantly, think. Part of what makes this movie so refreshing is that the characters feel like real people and not caricatures or stereo-

types. At one point, Samantha laments the "homogenization of black people" in movies and television. Coincidentally, the characters in "Dear White People" are nuanced and have distinct personalities. In other words, the people populating Simien's film are the opposite of the portrayals Samantha complains about.



The interesting thing about this movie is that it doesn't offer a tidy solution for ending racism, nor does it provide a clear definition of what racism actually is. Several of the characters think Samantha's radio show is racist toward white people, though the film clearly depicts the opposite regarding incidents at Winchester.

The movie stumbles briefly, only to come back for a thoroughly satisfying conclusion that redeems any faults the film has. There are a few gags that don't land, and the opening 10 minutes is a barrage of jokes, exposition and title cards that are initially disorienting. But once the movie settles in — which it quickly does — it's actually a really good time. It may make you squirm a little or feel a sense of guilt, but this is definitely a movie worth your time.

Billy Horschel and Sean Foley are two of the best in the world when it comes to golf.

They are at the top of the line when it comes to their craft. Horschel is the reigning FedExCup champion on the PGA Tour, while Foley is known around the world as one of the best golf instructors.

The two of them also have a connection to the Florida men's golf program, although it's distinctly different for both.

For Horschel, it's simple. He is a University of Florida alum and was a three-time first-team All-American on the golf team under the tutelage of former Gators coach Buddy Alexander.

For Foley, his connection to the program lies with coach J.C. Deacon, as they both grew up practicing on the same course in their native Canada.

Both Horschel and Foley had a chance to sit down with the team during their time off between the second and third tournaments.

The team met with Foley when it traveled to Arnold Palmer's Bay Hill Club & Lodge in Orlando for practicing and qualifying.

Foley shared his experiences working with some of the game's best.

Deacon said the team was able to absorb a lot of information from talking with Foley.

"They got to ask him a bunch of questions, it was a phenomenal experience," Deacon said. "From that I've seen a lot of motivation, the guys have been working harder, working smarter, spending their time in more precise areas."

Players on the team like senior J.D. Tomlinson have high praise for Foley. Tomlinson wrote a note to Foley after the meeting about what he learned from talking to him.

"He is the most single fascinating person I've ever met in my life," Tomlinson said.

"He talked to us for three hours in the hotel lobby and I wish he could've talked more. I learned so much information in that time frame it was unbelievable."

About a week after meeting with Foley in Orlando, the team got the chance to talk to Horschel, who was in Gainesville as he was going to be honored at the LSU-Florida football game.

Horschel brought along with him the FedExCup and left it at the Mark Bostick Clubhouse for display.

The team had a chance to see that even though Horschel achieved tremendous success on the PGA Tour this year, his fervor for the program still runs deep.

"He's one of the most passionate Gators I've ever met," Deacon said. "I think the guys really saw that you know, he just made 12 million bucks this year and won all of these PGA Tour tournaments, but being a Florida Gator still means so much to him."

Even though Horschel is busy playing his own tournaments on the Tour, he manages to keep up with the team and how it's performing in every tournament.

"He knows the guys names, he knows their scores, he knows who's playing well, who's not," Deacon said. "I think that had an impact on them that 'holy smokes this guy is the biggest thing in golf right now, but he's still paying attention to what we're doing.'"

As the Gators wind down their fall season, having the chance to talk to two high profile professionals in golf resonated with them.

Not only can their advice work in the short term, as with Tomlinson, who tied his career-best finish in the previous tournament with a tie for third place.

But it also has a chance to make the team better in the long run.

"I think it gives everybody more confidence, they gave everybody more information, which should make us better," Tomlinson said.

"Just meeting those guys and talking to them, it's a cool experience."

in Wilson's room, which is separated from Harris' by a bathroom. The two then went to dinner and returned to Wilson's room. What happened between the time the two returned and when Harris bid his roommate goodbye at 8:30 p.m. is not explained by Wilson, but Harris claims the complainant came over to watch the LSU-Auburn game which started at 7 p.m.

In text messages included in the incident report, Harris texted the complainant in a conversation beginning at 7:32 p.m. to "Come massage me," to which the complainant responded "Haha. I'll come chill with you for a lil." Harris messages back "Whatever," and the complainant messages back "Lol so no?" Harris

and then kissing, and she began "feeling on me and everything." Harris said while the two were in the bed kissing the complainant removed her own underwear and then the two engaged in intercourse.

Harris told Faroni in the interview that the complainant asked Harris if the sex was good, to which Harris said yes.

According to the report, Harris said the complainant wanted to spend the night with him in his room, but he typically rests on Sundays after Saturday games.

Harris walked the complainant back to her building, then called her to make sure she was "alright" at 3:28 a.m.

Later in the day Sunday, Harris had a short text exchange with the complainant. He started by saying,

with them, according to the report.

The complainant and Harris were in the back seat of the complainant's friend's vehicle while heading back to Springs. While on the ride back, Harris put his hand on the complainant's leg, the complainant told officers. She then said she responded by telling him that he was "not gonna get laid," according to the report.

The two walked into Building 4 of the residential complex and up the stairs to Harris' room.

According to the report, the complainant said she was OK with going to Harris' room at the time because "she was not really tired and did not mind hanging out for a bit." After time elapsed, the complainant asked Harris if she could stay the night, according to the report. Harris agreed.

The complainant, who had removed just her earrings and her boots according to what she reported, lay on the side of the bed closest to the wall while Harris was on the other edge, according to the report.

Then, she said, Harris flipped on top of her and felt like "dead weight," making it impossible for her to move.

The complainant said she told Harris multiple times that she did not want to have sex with him. According to the report, "she kept telling him to get off of her and that she did not want to have sex with him."

The complainant's father paused the conversation and asked to talk with his daughter privately, according to the report. When Zarate returned to the room, she explained to the complainant and her father their options regarding charges, according to the report.

After completing a sexual assault evidence kit, the complainant then continued her story with Faroni.

After initially telling Faroni the same story she told Zarate, the complainant added that she remembered her underwear being removed at some point while Harris was on top of her, according to the report.

"(The complainant) told Harris to get off of her and that they were just friends," the report says. "(The complainant) said for five to seven minutes, Harris remained on top of her, using his body weight to hold her down, while she repeatedly told him to stop. (The complainant) said she specifically told Harris 'I don't want to have sex with you.'"

Harris then put on a condom and had sex with the complainant without her consent, she said to Faroni. She told Faroni that she was unable to move and Harris remained silent throughout.

After Harris ejaculated and threw away his condom, the complainant proceeded to put back on her boots and earrings and headed back to her room of the residential complex, according to the report. Harris walked her back to her room. She said it was about 3:25 a.m. on Oct. 5 when she arrived back at her room. Harris called the complainant later that

night to see if she was still in her room, according to the report.

The girl (whose name was redacted in the documents released) who drove Harris and the complainant back to the Springs Complex in the early morning hours of Oct. 6 wanted to get something to eat. Harris declined to dine with her and requested to be taken back to Springs with the complainant per the incident report.

The girl said she heard the complainant say "no, no I see you as a brother, I see you as just a brother. I don't see you like that," but she thought the complainant was merely intoxicated. In hindsight, she admitted to Faroni as well as Officer Bonnie Boland — who also sat in on this particular interview — that Harris may have been touching the complainant, but she couldn't see anything occurring in the back seat during the drive.

When they made it to Springs at approximately 2:30 a.m., she said she thought the complainant wasn't that drunk anymore and let Harris walk her into the building, holding her hand while he did so.

The driver got food, then returned to Springs and asked if the complainant was OK. Harris called her and said "well, uh, I don't know if she's OK, ah, she opened (her room) door and then she shut it again when I was leaving, so I don't know if she walked out."

The driver then said she called the complainant and asked her if she was in her room. The complainant then replied by saying "yeah, I could have sworn I said no." The driver asked the complainant to clarify what she was saying, and the complainant replied with "I think I said no." The driver thought the complainant was intoxicated and said she'd talk to her in the morning. The complainant sent a text message that said "OMG (redacted) - I really have to tell you about Treon later (sad emoticon)".

But when pressed, the complainant said she wanted to speak over the phone and not over text message. During a phone call, the complainant told the driver, "yeah, last night I think I had sex with Treon." According to the report, the complainant told the driver that Harris didn't walk her to her room but went to Harris' room, and then said "he jumped on top of me and I just

remember repeating 'uh, no Treon, I don't see us like that.'"

Harris called wide receiver Lantry Pittman and a woman named Shanndore Brown at 3:30 a.m. Sunday to pick him up. They all then went to Brown's apartment and Harris watched T.V. and talked about random subjects. Brown says in the incident report that Harris never spoke about anything that had happened earlier that night and the two fell asleep on her couch. Brown woke Harris up at 8:30 a.m. and drove him to Springs, then did not have any further contact with him, per the incident report.

The next day after Harris' initial interview with Faroni, the University Athletic Association released a statement saying Harris would be suspended indefinitely.

By Oct. 9 at 11:35 a.m., Harris' lawyer Huntley Johnson had issued a three-page statement in which they alleged — among other things — that the complainant had sexual relations with another individual earlier that evening and also said he did not believe Harris would be arrested or prosecuted and that they had gathered information from the Internet showing the complainant smiling and happy the day after the alleged sexual battery.

At 2:24 that afternoon, Boland received a phone call saying that the complainant had decided not to press charges on Harris as she previously intended to. By 4:33 p.m. a signed and notarized complaint withdrawal had been returned to Boland. The next day, it was announced publicly that the complainant had withdrawn her complaint and that Harris was fully reinstated to the Florida football program.

Florida head coach Will Muschamp declined to comment to alligatorSports through a spokesperson on the release of the documents surrounding the alleged Harris incident, and University spokeswoman Janine Sikes wrote in an email linking to the documents that "the University will make no statement."

Johnson released a brief statement Wednesday saying "This has obviously been an unfortunate and traumatic event for Mr. Harris and his family, and for the young lady and her family. The judicial system and the University of Florida have both agreed to the appropriate resolution in this case."

After finding out the Waffle House on Archer Road was closed, Harris and his group went to the Kangaroo gas station at 3525 SW 34th St.

then says "It's up to you." And the complainant says "Ite. Ill call you when I'm outside." Harris responds with simply "ok."

With the game turning into a blowout, Harris and the complainant went their separate ways, but shortly after midnight, the complainant texted Harris "Where you at?" to which Harris responded "Finna go out." The complainant then texted "Oh ite. Im at rain."

Harris ended up at the Rain Nightclub & Lounge along with a group of football players.

At the nightclub, Harris said he consumed one non-alcoholic Red Bull and had only had one drink before arriving at the club.

After the nightclub closed at 2 a.m., the group went to Waffle House, which turned out to be closed when they got there. They then went to a Kangaroo gas station and then got into a car with the complainant and a mutual friend (who was driving) to return to Springs.

Harris says in the incident report that the complainant came back to his room — both individuals live in UF's Springs Residential Complex, but in separate buildings — and they laid together on his bed. Harris said they had plans previously to hang out together after going to the club.

According to the incident report, Harris told Faroni that "he removed his shoes and pants and lay down in his bed." Harris also said the complainant took her shoes off, put her purse down and lay beside him. They began talking to each other

# Peoples looks to contribute in 2014 after strong 2013 season

## The redshirt junior led Florida in steals last season

Without much height in the 2013 season, numerous teams attempted to create mismatches against the Florida women's basketball team.

The tallest players barely reached 6-foot, and there was no legitimate post presence the players could throw the ball down low to.

However, the Gators received one of their strongest contributions last season from 5-foot-6 redshirt junior Cassie Peoples.

Originally a transfer student from Texas, Peoples sat out her first season at Florida due to NCAA rules for transfer students.

She trained with the Gators and practiced hard to further develop the game that she excelled

at — ESPN ranked her the seventh best guard coming out of high school.

Peoples faced a significant setback when she tore her labrum in practice and spent the summer rehabbing to hopefully make a contribution to a UF squad that was already deep at the guard position.

So when she finally hit the court last season, Peoples was hoping to finally be past the injuries that plagued her for much of her basketball career.

Peoples, who was finally healthy, played in every game for the Gators and started the final 25.

A scrappy defensive player, Peoples led Florida in steals, and was often responsible for guarding the other team's best player.

She had the second most assists of all Gators, proving that even if she wasn't scoring herself she was positioning her teammates to score.

Peoples — along with the rest of the Gators — is eager to show that last year was no fluke. She's itching to start the season, to highlight how her talent has evolved from last year.

"I think we're all just anxious to get on the court," Peoples said. "We've been training all summer, we've been training this pre-season and we've been working really hard.

"We're ready to show people what that hard work is going to do for us in the game."

With the team missing last year's leading scorer Jaterra Bonds, Peoples and redshirt senior Kayla Lewis are expected to handle a majority of the scoring for the guards.

To improve offensively, Peoples has worked on her shot, especially from the three-point line. She converted nearly 30 percent of her attempts from downtown last season, a number that should improve with the practice she's put in.

She's also worked on getting stronger — spending extra time with Florida's strength and conditioning coordinator Tyler Stuart — to avoid any more injuries that slowed the development of her talent.

"(Strength and conditioning coach) Tyler (Stuart)'s been really pushing our limits, seeing what

our limits are, showing us that we have no limits," Peoples said. "It's been tough but at the same time it's been really great."

With training camp nearing the halfway point, Peoples has seen the hard work pay off.

The team has developed chemistry with incoming freshmen and transfer junior Carla Batchelor, and depth is now a strength for a team that was often labeled short and lacking in depth.

"It was very challenging last year not having a lot of depth," Peoples said. "We made it work, but this year we're going to have a lot more people to work with.

"We're going to be able to go in and out very interchangeably. We're going to be able to play defense for longer periods of time at a high level. We're going to be able to press the whole game and have fresh legs in there, because that does play a big role in your strategy and it plays a role in how effective you are on defense."
