Officials may repossess WUFT gear because of contract dispute

Angry local officials are threatening to repossess \$75,000 worth of camera equipment they donated to UF's WUFT-TV because the station is not televising the officials' public meetings.

Gainesville city commissioners, Alachua County commissioners and county school board members chipped in \$25,000 each in 1974 to purchase for WUFT, the local Public Broadcasting System affiliate, \$75,000 worth of low-light color cameras and associated gear.

WHILE THE free equipment was to be used to cover commission and school board meetings live, the coverage has declined steadily in recent months — much to the dismay of the elected officers who purchased the paraphernalia.

And one member from each governmental body said WUFT is violating a contract under which the equipment

was purchased because the live meeting coverage is "non-existent."

"I think Channel 5 has violated the letter of the contract," said former Gainesville Mayor and current City Commissioner Aaron Green, a practicing attorney.

"THE COVERAGE has been relatively non-existent lately. I can't even recall when they were there last, even for a taped session," Green said.

The 1974 contract states that Channel 5 will provide live, full-length telecasts of meetings agreed to by WUFT and the school board and county and city commissions.

But the WUFT general manager cannot recall the last time his station televised a live meeting. Nor could General Manager David Brugger predict the next time a meeting would be covered.

THE PROGRAM secretary, Shirley Blackman, was only able to determine the date of the last taped telecast — May 26.

Four years after WUFT agreed to the live telecasts, it now appears the "local government in action" programs are headed for the same fate as other shows with poor ratings — dumped at the end of a season run.

"They have been treating us like forgotten children for about the past year now," School Board Chairman Charles Chestnut said last week.

"THEY HAVEN'T been doing it up to par as far as the city and school board. They have not been living up to that true bill to us," Chestnut said.

Alachua County Commission Vice Chairman Tom Coward added, "We didn't get full coverage and then we got spot checks. Then at some meetings we don't have anybody there."

Calling the gripes a "misunderstanding," Brugger insists that the station never adopted a policy to stop all live coverage of the meetings.

BROADCASTING LOCAL governmental meetings live at their usual 7 p.m. starting times until 10 p.m. is forcing the PBS affiliate to pre-empt increasingly popular PBS programs, Brugger said.

"... all the surveys, mail and phone calls were complaining about the pre-emption and so on," Brugger said. Current television listings show MacNeil-Lehrer Report,

Student regent vote doomed; UF lobby blamed

The student member of the Board of Regents probably will remain relatively powerless next year, and legislators backing a proposal that would give the student regent voting power blamed UF student lobbyists Monday for the bill's expected failure.

"The Senate approved the bill almost unanimously, and the governor says he won't veto it. It seems like the only people still against the bill are University of Florida students or at least their Student Government representatives," bill sponsor Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami Beach, said Monday.

"I DON'T understand why the students didn't push to have the bill moved out of committee. It's their bill. It's

designed to increase their representation," Gordon added.

Despite the support of House Speaker Donald Tucker, D-

Tallahassee, and intense lobbying from Board of Regents staff members, the student regent bill has been sitting inactive in the House Education Committee for more than two weeks.

Tucker has asked education committee Chairman James Redman, D-Plant City, to pull the bill out of committee and put it directly on the House calendar for possible considera-

BUT REDMAN has refused, saying he can make no exceptions this close to the scheduled June 2 adjournment late.

"I can't pull one bill out of committee without pulling out all the rest," Redman said. "If Mr. Tucker wants the bill to be considered this session, he's going to have to ask for a twothirds vote of the House.

UF Student Body President Terry Brown, the power behind UF's four-person student lobbying coalition, said Monday he did not push the student regent proposal because he does not think the bill would be in UF's "best interest."

"I WAS asked after my election what my feelings were, and I didn't recommend any changes in what our lobbyists were doing," Brown said.

"I'm not sure voting status will help the student regent, and I didn't feel it should be our primary lobbying thrust. Other lobbying organizations like the FSA (Florida Student Association) are pushing the bill because they think it will help their schools more."

West German terrorists arrested in Yugoslavia

BONN, WEST GERMANY (UPI) — Four of West Germany's most wanted terrorists — including three members of the Baader-Meinhof urban guerilla gang — have been arrested in Yugoslavia, the government announced Monday.

Two of those arrested are suspected of being involved in the kidnap-killing last fall of industrial magnate Hanns-Martin Schleyer.

AUTHORITIES GAVE few details of the arrests, but said the four were all arrested before May 20 and all taken into custody at the same time.

Justice Ministry Spokesman Sepp Binder indentified those arrested as Brigitte Mohnhaupt, 28, Rolf Wagner, 33, Sieglinde Hofmann, 32, and Peter Boock, 26.

According to police records, Mohnhaupt, Wagner and Hofmann are members of the original Baader-Meinhof gang.

BOOCK, ACCORDING to the dossiers, is a member of the so-called "Siegfried Haag Group," an offshoot organization.

A spokesman for the Interior Ministry said Yugoslav authorities acted on information supplied by German police and "highly sophisticated technology" played a major part in tracking down the terrorists.

He said authorities believed a "severe blow" has been dealt to terrorist organizations' logistic systems.

MOHNHAUPT AND Wagner are suspected of involvement in the slaying of Schleyer, 62, who was kidnapped on a Cologne street while driving home from work Sept. 5, 1977.

He was killed Oct. 18 after authorities refused to release 11 imprisoned members of the Baader-Meinhof gang.

Mohnhaupt and Wagner are also wanted on suspicion of involvement in the killings of West German prosecutor general Siegfried Buback April 7, 1977, and banker Juergen Ponto July 30.

MOHNHAUPT DROPPED out of sight after her release from a prison where she had served a 4 1/2 year term for illegal possession of fire arms and being a member of a terrorist organization.

She is also suspected of being involved in a gunbattle with Dutch police in Utrecht last September in which one officer was killed.

Hofmann is believed to be a comrade of West German terrorist Stefan Wisniewski, 25, whom French authorities arrested at a Paris airport earlier this month and deported to Germany.

WISNIEWSKI AND Hofmann are said to have received special training in a camp of the People's Front for the Liberation of Palestine in 1976.

Binder said Yugoslavia had asked Bonn for the extradition of some Yugoslav citizens living in West Germany.

Political sources said Belgrade apparently wanted Croation exiles it believes have been involved in armed attacks on Yugoslav diplomatic personnel and installations in West Germany in recent years.

Binder said, however, that Bonn would not agree to any prisoner swaps.

FBI challenged by SCLC leader

ATLANTA (UPI) — The head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference said Monday the FBI is still trying to discredit black leaders, and challenged the bureau to "put up or shut up" about Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Dr. Joseph Lowery, president of the civil rights organization King founded, said the FBI should make public all its information about King and the SCLC, rather than blotting out the name of a black leader with whom the bureau allegedly conspired to ease King out of the movement.

"I find it incredible that any reputable black leader would engage in a conspiracy with the FBI to 'remove' Dr. King from the civil rights scene," Lowery said in an interview.

Highway deaths match predictions

The Memorial Day weekend wound down to the last, most dangerous, hours Monday with traffic deaths on Florida highways hovering about half the total of 22 predicted by the Florida Highway Patrol.

The patrol reported Monday night one traffic fatality in Alachua County.

The nation's highway death toll Monday matched the grim predictions of safety experts as the homeward crunch began in the final day of the long memorial holiday weekend.

As of Monday, the traffic body count topped 400, the lower edge of the National Safety Council's pre-holiday projection

The council had predicted between 400 and 500 persons would die on the highways during the holiday which began at 6 p.m. local time Friday and ended at midnight.

A United Press International count at 2:30 p.m. EDT showed at least 425 persons had died in traffic accidents since Friday evening.

Stone evaluates policy toward Cuba

PENSACOLA (UPI) — The United States has told the Castro government in Cuba that it will not give up its rights to the Guantanamo Naval Base, Sen. Richard Stone, D-Fla., said Monday.

"The administration also has assured me that it does not plan to lift the trade embargo against Cuba in the near future," Stone said in a Memorial Day speech at Pensacola Naval Air Station.

"These are significant developments, especially after the administration's efforts to warm up to (Cuban President Fidel) Castro early last year," the Florida senator said.

Stone said he wrote Secretary of State Cyrus Vance last week asking if the United States is considering giving equipment openly to certain factions in Angola. He has not received a reply yet.

Masterpiece Theatre and The Forsythe Saga are popular programs that would be bumped during the 7 to 10 p.m.

GREEN, CHESTNUT and Coward said they would use a provision in the 1974 contract to return the cameras to the sponsoring local governments.

The officials have until October 1979, when the contract expires, to act. One provision of the contract requires that if the use of the equipment for live meeting coverage is "terminated" before the contract ends, the equipment becomes the "collective property" of the three local government

If no action is taken before the contract ends, the equipment belongs to WUFT-TV.

"I COULD support a motion to try to recover that portion of the city's interest in the equipment, or a reasonable monetary value of it so we could pursue other alternatives,"

"I wouldn't want to feel that Channel 5 is going to take the position that they're going to bogart the whole situation and force us into some kind of position that we'd have to go to court," Chestnut said.

"We invested the taxpayers' money, and if we're going to do anything to benefit the taxpayers, I believe in living up to an agreement," Coward said.

CHANNEL 5's Brugger said, "I think we're living within the agreement" and "we plan to still do live coverage.

"We had not made any decision not to cover the meetings live anymore. We weren't doing as much of it because we felt the contents of the meetings didn't warrant it, and could be done as well with edited coverage," Brugger said.

Chestnut said he is "totally displeased" with the edited. taped version of the meetings because "They (WUFT) are making the judgment as to what is important to the people."

GREEN SAID better efforts should be made between the station and the elected public officials to coordinate video taping of the scheduled meetings. The station should advertise to inform the public of delayed broadcasts, he said.

There is a proposal to move live coverage to a channel on the University City Cable TV system. That may ease Channel 5's coverage woes, Green said.

Brugger said he has been working on the idea since January with cable TV President Jim Milliken. The cablecasts could be ready by January 1979.

MILLIKEN, HOWEVER, called the discussions with Brugger "cursory."

"I've talked to Mr. Brugger at WUFT, but we really haven't come to any conclusions so far," Milliken said.

The "government on the cable" set-up would involve microwaving the original meeting signal from City Hall to Channel 5's UF stadium studios - as has been done for past

CHANNEL 5 would then relay that same signal via a new cable to the cable company, which would then telecast the signal on Channel 8. Channel 8 is now used for printed UPI news and stock market reports.

UF's microwave antenna, however, is broken and a cable from the stadium to Southwest 34th Street would have to be

Brugger said the microwave, which transmits the signal from City Hall to the stadium for live or taped coverage, has been broken for about a month. He said the microwave should be repaired in the next two months.

Milliken said he hopes to work out something between WUFT-TV and the cable company within the next two

Six of the seven original signers of the 1974 contract are either out of public office, have resigned or are about to leave their official positions.


Former UF Student Body President Paul Leino developed the \$6,500 UF Lobbying Association one week after pulling out of the FSA, a statewide student lobbying organization designed to push bills benefiting the entire university system.

LEINO ACCUSED FSA members of ganging up against UF and Florida State University representatives, and said his new lobbying organization would work only on UF-oriented projects.

Rep. Fran Carlton, D-Orlando, a member of the House Education Committee, said Monday the student regent bill could have been saved if the students had pushed harder.

"Why should the committee give the student regent a vote when the students don't care enough to even fight for it?"

'The bill's probably dead — it's pretty late in the session to get things moved up now. It's unfortunate, but there's really no one to blame except the students themselves.'

Women's leader asks for review of Shaara decision

One of UF's top Affirmative Action advocates Monday attacked a decision clearing Infirmary Director Richard Shaara of hiring violation charges.

Committee on the Status of Women Chairwoman Phyllis Meek said she will ask Affirmative Action Coordinator Jackie Hart to review the decision made by acting Executive Vice President John Nattress last week.

NATTRESS SAID Thursday that an informal group Shaara invited to review candidates for a high-paying Infirmary psychiatrist position was technically a search committee and met Affirmative Action requirements.

"The thing that concerns me about that is that Shaara will do the initial screening before the search committee gets to interview the candidates," Meek said.

Nattress said the search committee should screen 11 applicants passed by the UF personnel office and recommend candidates for formal interviews with the Infirmary staff.

MEEK SAID Shaara's committee will review the candidates only after the interviews with the Infirmary staff.

"Normally, the person who is going to make the final recommendation doesn't do the initial screening. If there is any favoritism involved, this would be the time to do it," Meek said.

"If he wanted to hire a white, male psychiatrist, he just wouldn't include any blacks or women to be interviewed," Meek said.

SHAARA'S HIRING practices in finding a new psychiatrist to replace Mental Health Service Co-director Robert Buchholz have been under question for several weeks.

Shaara was reprimanded by Nattress three weeks ago for interviewing an old friend for the position a week before the job was officially open.

Shaara could not be reached for comment Monday.

Thieves attack cyclist, steal bike

A man was attacked with a steel pipe Tuesday night by two men who were stealing his bicycle.

Richard Shultz told police two black males took his 10-speed bicycle after one of them hit him in the head several times with a steel pipe. Shultz described both the men as being of medium complexion and having braided hair. One was 6 feet 1 inch tall and weighed 180 pounds, the other was 5 feet 9 inches and 160 pounds, the victim said.

Police said the incident occured in the 1000 block of Northwest 13th Avenue.





Sex clause in constitution may help push ERA

A revision to the Florida Constitution prohibiting sex discrimination may not solve the problems of women seeking equal rights but could serve as a push for the Equal Rights Amendment, the chairman of the Florida Constitution Revision Commission said.

Summarizing the list of revisions at a League of Women Voters luncheon last week, Talbot "Sandy" d'Alemberte said the women's rights issue was one that "stuck in my craw."

"I USED to oppose the word 'sex' added to the state constitution, but now I support it," the Miami attorney and UF law school graduate said.

D'Alemberte added the Legislature's defeat of the ERA last year in Florida was "not a tragedy."

And even though the Florida Legislature is not expected to consider the ERA this year, d'Alemberte said the constitutional sex discrimination proposal will be a boost for the amendment.

THE COMPLETED revisions have been certified by Secretary of State Bruce Smathers and now await approval by voters Nov. 7.

D'Alemberte said the commission received more than 800 suggestions for the constitution from residents throughout the state.

"I am startled at the public interest the revision has received, and there is time for more debate before the people vote on it in six months," d'Alemberte said.

ONE OF the many revision proposals calls for a state board of education made of residents appointed by the governor.

D'Alemberte said he also wanted a constitutional Board of Regents that would govern the State University System on a day-to-day basis.

"This board would regulate student fees and arrange for guest speakers, but the state Legislature would still have the final authority."

THE RIGHT of privacy proposal was the most controversial, d'Alemberte added.

"The federal and state constitutions do not have the right of privacy fully developed," d'Alemberte said.

The revision states a protection for the right of privacy "against governmental intrusion." D'Alemberte said this clause, however, was "as vague as the phrase 'due process of law.'"

County to discuss charter government tonight

Today's Alachua County Commission meeting has been canceled, but commissioners will meet tonight in a workshop session to discuss charter government.

The proposed charter would authorize more home rule for county commissioners and change constitutional officers to charter officers, which would take away their right to appeal their budget to the Cabinet.

The charter would limit commissioners to two terms in non-partisan elections.

Voters will be asked to vote on the proposed charter during the Oct. 10 primary election.

This will be the third attempt by the county to pass a form of charter government in the last seven years.

The other two attempts failed by wide margins because of heavy opposition by rural and small-town residents, who feared loss of power.

The meeting begins at 7:30 on the fourth floor of the county administration building.

Prof maintains innocence to sexual battery charge

An internationally known economics professor who was arrested here last week on sexual battery charges held a press conference Saturday to deny the allegations.

Visiting economics Professor Ezra Mishan, who will leave UF at the end of the quarter to return to the London School of Economics, was arrested Wednesday after placing ads in local newspapers to solicit sculpture models.

WOMEN WHO answered the ad claim it was a deceptive attempt at attracting them to Mishan's home for sexual pleasure.

"I assure each of the (model) applicants and my friends and colleagues here at the University of Florida and in Gainesville, that I am innocent of any wrongdoing, either legal or moral," Mishan said in a prepared statement.

"I have done nothing more than is commonly done by a sculptor," he added.

MISHAN SAID he warned the women interested in being models before they visited him that his work would require touching their nude bodies. But one of more than 20 women who answered Mishan's ads directly contradicted that claim Monday.

"What has been omitted from the press accounts, is that before seeing any of the applicants in my home, it has always been my policy to explain that I wished to sculpt an erotic recumbant figure in clay medium and that in so doing I would be required to use both my hand and eye over the body of the model. I explained, then, that I could not work with a timid girl," Mishan said.

BUT ONE of the women interviewed by Mishan for the modeling job claimed Mishan's statements are inaccurate.

"He did not tell me he had to use 'both hand and eye' over the body until I was disrobed," the third-year UF English student said.

After a short initial conversation, the woman said, Mishan left the room, she disrobed, and he returned.

"HAND AND EYE is not the question," the woman said. "Any sculptor has to touch you. But fondling genitals is a different thing," she said.

"I do feel I was deceived," the woman

said. "Had he told me (he would have to touch her) I would not have gone there for the first time."

The woman was sent back to Mishan's home by police to gather further evidence with an electronic listening device.

SHE ALSO said Mishan identified himself as "Michael."

"If he didn't intend to deceive, why did he use a different name?"

Mishan has directed questions concerning the charges against him to his attorney, Larry Turner. Turner would not comment Monday on the woman's allegations.

Man dies in double shooting

A Friday night traffic accident resulted in a double shooting and the death of a Gainesville man, police said Monday.

Following an auto accident at Hawthorne Road and Southeast Third Avenue, Willard Sanders began to chase the other man involved in the crash, Robert Moore of 654 NE 16th Terrace, Gainesville police said.

When Sanders found Moore in the 600 block of Northwest 16th Terrace, Moore shot him twice in the upper body with a pistol, police said. Police said Sanders then shot Moore, 61, in the head with a shotgun, fatally wounding him.

Sanders of Evinston, Fla., is being held in the Alachua County Jail without bond. He is receiving medication for pain caused by the bullets, which are still lodged in his body, a jail spokesperson said.



Dr. Bushnell Named Chairman History Dept.

Dr. David Bushnell has been named chairman of the Department of History. He replaces Dr. Arthur Funk, who has returned to teaching.

On the UF faculty since 1963, Dr. Bushnell will serve as acting chairman until September, when he will become permanent chairman.

Dr. Bushnell came to UF fifteen years ago from the U.S. Air Force Office of Aerospace Research, where he served for three years as chief of the Historical Division. He taught on the faculties of the Universities of New Mexico and Delaware. Early in his career, he was a research analyst for the OSS and the Department of

A specialist in Latin American History, Dr. Bushnell was a Fulbright lecturer to Colombia in 1972, and was visiting professor of international relations at the National War College in 1969-70. In fall, 1977, he served as a Visiting Fellow at St. Antony's College, Oxford University.

He has authored four books and 27 articles on topics ranging from Latin American development to space biology. Dr. Bushnell received B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard University.

Dr. Ernest J. Briskey, vice-president of Campbell Soup Co. and president of the company's subsidiary Technological Resources, Inc., will be here Thursday and Friday. Anyone interested will have opportunities to participate in interviewing two times on both days.

Dr. Ronald F. Bunn, vice-president for academic affairs at State University of New York, Buffalo, will be here June 7-9. His interview schedule will be published in the University Digest later in the week.

Dr. Briskey's schedule includes public interview sessions with a portion of the President's staff from 8.9:30 a.m. Thursday, a portion of the Administrative Council from 10:30-11:30 a.m. Thursday, the Faculty Educational Policy Group, 10:45-noon Friday, and another portion of the Administrative Council, 1-2 p.m. Friday. All sessions will be in the Board Room, 226 Tigert Hall.

Dr. Briskey will also be interviewed by vice-presidents in individual conferences. members of UF's Council of Advisors and community leaders throughout the two days. He will be hosted at breakfast Friday morning by a group of students representing Student Government, college councils and other groups.

Dr. Briskey joined the Campbell Soup Co. in 1971 as vice-president for research in the company's Institute of Food Research. Prior to that, he was distinguished professor of agricultural and life sciences and director of the Institute of Muscle Biology at the University of Wisconsin. He joined the Wisconsin faculty after receiving his Ph.D. from that University in 1958. He received the B.A. degree from Wisconsin in 1952 and the M.A. from Ohio State in 1955.

Dr. Briskey is the author or co-author of over 140 scientific research articles published in 26 different international jour-

The native Wisconsin, who grew up on a dairy farm, has conducted research, consulted or studied in nations throughout the world, including Africa, the Middle East, South America, Japan, Hungary, Poland, Denmark, Mexico and England. He was a lieutenant in the U.S. Army from

1952 to 1954 and served in Korea. The two candidates have been selected from a list of more than 200 supplied by the Academy for Educational Development, which has served as staff to President Robert Marston in searching for candidates and conducting pre-screening. The candidates have also been screened by the vice-presidents and by the Faculty Educational Policy Group. The FEPG is a Campus-wide faculty group elected by the Steering Committee of the UF Senate. The screening will continue. No pre-determined number of candidates to be invited

President Marston has stated that in choosing a successor to Dr. Harold Hanson he will discuss candidates "in whom we are seriously interested" with appropriate faculty, including the FEPG; students, including the presidents of the Student Body and the Student Senate; alumni and Foundation leaders, and the senior administrative officers of the University, including vice presidents and deans.

Acting Recital

The play is directed by student Dandy McConnell and features performances by Craig Hartley, David Moberg, Graham Gilbert, Katherine Hallowell, Deborah Bleckley and Susan Mowrer. Admission is free to UF students and \$3 to the general public. The University shall require a program of general education for all students receiving bachelor's degrees, which program shall be under the supervision of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The courses that constitute the general education portion of the baccalaureate degree must be approved by a Council on General Education, which shall be composed of representatives from the majority of baccalaureate degree granting colleges within the university."

There was no discussion or debate on the motion to amend the Constitution, which required a two-thirds vote of members present and voting. Marston called for a voice vote and received a loud and resounding chorus of "Ayes." When he called for those opposed, there was dead

The Senate also voted with only one dissenting vote, cast by Arts and Sciences Dean C.A. VanderWerf, implementing procedures to put the constitutional change into motion. The procedures disestablish both the University College and the College of Arts and Sciences and transfer all departments affiliated with both into the new college, effective Sept. 1.

The Senate action culminates almost ten years of various efforts to reorganize administration general education at UF. It also follows a concerted one and one-halfyear program, involving four task forces with representatives from faculties of both colleges and input from faculty, students and administrators from throughout the university.

University College was established at UF in 1935 as a pioneer in delivering general education to freshmen and sophomores. During the last ten years, most of the universities that had moved to that concept had changed back to the more traditional system. Now freshmen and sophomores will take their general education requirements as students in the new college or as declared majors in some other college on campus.

During Senate consideration Thursday, Dean VanderWerf moved that action on the implementing procedures be tabled for ten days, but the motion failed on a show-of-hands vote. The vote was not counted when it was evident the motion had failed, but estimates were that up to one-fourth of those present voted to table.

VanderWer? said that he was not against the reorganization, but that he felt that the actions of a search and screen committee of faculty members from both colleges should be investigated before the Senate took final action. The committee had recommended only one candidate for the deanship of the new college, Dr. Charles Sidman of the University of Kansas, who was appointed to the position by President Marston following a poll of more than 50 faculty members and administrators who interviewed him.

If the Florida Board of Regents votes to raise tuition at the state universities within the next year, we're going to send all the angry students to Terry Brown.

Should the Regents vote within the next year to raise dormitory rates, we're going to send all the

angry students to Terry Brown.

And should the Regents vote within the next year to impose military dress codes at the nine state university campuses, we're going to send all

the angry students to Terry Brown.

We are not saying the Regents will approve any of these possibilities. Then again, we cannot say they won't. If they do, they will do it without benefit of a vote from the lone student regent on the board, because for the second year in a row the student regent will not be able to vote. He or she will be powerless.

The Regents have had a non-voting student member for only a year. The Florida Legislature last spring approved adding a non-voting student regent to the board, after Gov. Reubin Askew the year before vetoed the Legislature's attempt to place a student on the board with full voting rights.

Askew signed the Legislature's most recent bill and selected former University of South Florida Student Body President Les Miller as the student

Miller served students responsibly for nine months. He served them with enough dignity and maturity that three full-time regents, including Chairman James Gardener, agreed that a student regent deserved the right to vote.

Enough Florida senators agreed to pass a voting student regent bill this spring. Askew has agreed not to veto it. But the voting student regent b. died in a House committee anyway.

The bili died because not enough student lobbyists, particularly two student lobbyists from UF, pushed House members to vote the bill out of committee onto the House floor for debate. And it is perfectly clear that UF lobbyists David Cohen and Jeff Marcus never pushed the bill because UF Student Box President Terry Brown told them not to.

Brown tells us be lever had lobbyists push the bill because, "I'm, it sure voting status will help the student regent, and I it in't feel it should be our primary lebbying thrust." Malarky.

Brown did not push the bill because of a conflict between UF's Student Government and the governments of the other eight state universities. It was a conflict that urged UF to pull out of the State Council of Student Body Presidents and withdraw UF funding from that council's lobbying group, the Florida Student Association.

Those groups are supporting the voting student regent bill. And because of the earlier conflict over who controls the state council, Brown is not supporting the student regent bill. A classic example of cutting off your nose to spite your face.

Brown never considered issues the Regents vote on that matter to every student in the system, regardless of where they attend. Those issues deserve a student regent's input, whether that regent comes from UF, USF or any other univer-

We can only remind all those students who, in the next year, may have reason to scream over a Regents ruling, that Brown took his office door off its hinges as a symbolic gesture of open administration.

For his childish inaction, Brown deserves to have each of those irate students lean through his open door and scream at him.



Nuclear plant debate discussed and corrected

EDITOR: The recent article in The Alligator, concerning the nuclear power debate, was in error on a point I made. I may have been unclear concerning the point, therefore a correction is necessary.

The amount of energy required for enrichment consumes 2 percent of the total national electrical energy, not 2 percent of the total national energy consumption. Uranium enrichment is but one step in the uranium fuel cycle. The fuel cycle is as follows: uranium mining and mills, conversion to UF6 (Uranium hexafluoride), enrichment, conversion to usable

fuel, reactor use, temporary fuel storage, reprocessing cost (not in process at this time due to economics and the amount of energy required), long-term waste storage (not realized at this time, therefore cost and energy consumption unknown).

Another point I would like to make is "cost per kilowatt" in the article should read "cost per kilowatt of generating

The reactor safety study did consider earthquakes, but the Union of Concerned Scientists' assessment made the following points: "In the case of nuclear reactors, the specification of the maximum credible earthquake for which public safety must be assured demands extreme conservatism for two principal reasons:

 The consequences of some types of serious failure in a nuclear facility must be guarded against even if their likelihood is exceedingly remote;

 The historic record of earthquake occurences is so short that it cannot encompass the entire spectrum of possible events."

Nuclear power plants do not explode like a bomb. They have contained within them large amounts of extremely toxic biological materials, which may be released into the atmosphere over a large area if the containment vessel is rup-

Since my purpose in the debate was to inform the public, they may gain additional information concerning nuclear power by writing either their local congressman or the Environment Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee, B-371 Rayburn Building, Washington, D.C., 20515. Ask for the House Government Operations Committee report entitled "Nuclear Power Costs."

If the Intramural office and the rest of the "brotherly Greeks" had any sense of fair play they would have allowed the ousted frats to enter the meet so that Intramural Sports Program Director Don Hester's "heated caliber of a fraternity" competition would be equalized.

THESE ARE just two of the many examples of the slow deterioration of the intramural program I have seen since I came to UF in 1975. Sure they can blame it all on lack of facilities and on increased participation. But participation is intramural's goal, is it not?

The presumptious in room 227 had better start gearing their interests to students instead of trying to make their jobs easier.

While Kurrus, Kaplan's law student cohort, said he urged her to enter the contest, he said she has dressed up like Monroe before.



'Accommodations'

Confrontations and comedy

Put three people in a run-down New York City apartment
— a would-be actress, the estranged wife of a male
chauvinist and a young psychology student. Take away
their bathroom. What are you left with?

Accommodations, the Hippodrome's current weekend dinner theater at the Plantation Inn. If you can bear a little noise from the bar nearby, you'll understand why the Hippodrome's forte is comedy.

THE ACCOMMODATIONS include two rooms with a kitchen-located tub doubling as the sink, and a toilet outside and down the hall.

Into this, the Nick Hall script, directed by Greg Hausch, adds aspiring actress Pat (Dawne Weiner), who borrows various "costumes" from Simon, the gay landlord.

She has called an agency to locate two people to share the rent, Nos. 8 and 9 in an unbroken chain of "roomies."

NO. 8 is Lee (Megan Bachus), who decided over breakfast that she was leaving her husband, Bob (Dan Jesse), and their eight-room home in exclusive Westchester.

Although nearly nauseated after inspecting her new home, Lee forges ahead and settles in. At this point she meets Pat, who is decked out in a Shirley Temple outfit complete with an 11-day sucker. Lee begins to wonder if the situation is worth her new-found freedom.

Bob arrives and begins a sarcastic but funny fight with Lee over her "search for herself." It's a typical scene between two people whose marriage is undergoing change, but the comedy inserts allow the audience to laugh at the familiar scene.

IMPLORING LEE to go home with him, Bob carefully maneuvers the conversation into a reminiscence of the early days of their marriage and honeymoon, but to no avail. Lee holds firmly to her new feelings and Bob exits — alone.

Pat and Lee soon meet their other roommate, Tracy (Graham Gilbert), assumed to be female. He is a young psychology student, to Lee's horror and Pat's delight.

A week passes with Bob calling every day and Lee ignoring him. Tracy studies psychology and Pat studies Tracy.

AFTER SEVERAL attempts to put the make on Tracy, Pat drowns her sorrows in Simon's wardrobe. Lee and Tracy get involved in a discussion which leads into Lee's reflective speech on how values and times have changed.

Lee realizes at the end of this that she has identified her reasons for leaving Bob, the biggest being personal survival. She also realizes that she is enjoying Tracy's company and they agree to go out for the evening and do whatever they please, something new for her.

In the meantime, Pat announces she is having a date over for dinner and would appreciate the apartment being empty. Pat's date arrives — none other than Bob — but she is unaware of his identity. Tracy and Lee have already left, so the audience laughs at the anticipated climax to the evening.

The final scene is as good as the rest, producing a confrontation between Lee and Bob and an alliance between Pat and Tracy. All's well that ends well, so it's been said, and if you enjoy happy endings, this play is a must.



Lady Gator tracksters place high at nationals

Climaxing a season of frustration and injury, three members of the UF women's track team placed high in their events at the AIAW nationals held in Knoxville, Tenn., during the weekend.

Junior Jackie Gordon hurled the discus 153 feet to recapture the fifth-place title she garnered in 1977. Cordon's throw was eight feet farther than her 1977 AIAW effort and three feet from the Lady Gator record she set earlier this

1975 AAU Indoor National Champion Lorraine Ray finished fourth in the long jump at 20-1/2. Ray is a senior academically, but she did not compete in her first year in junior college and will return for the Lady Gators next year.

Sophomore Shonell Ferguson has been bothered by leg inuries all year, but she recovered in time to leap 19-8 1/4 and capture sixth place in the long jump.

"Lorraine and Shonell did real well considering they were just coming off injuries," Lady Gator Head Coach Deanne Johnson said. "They were both just competing on guts."

JOHNSON SAW her pre-season team of 20 women tracksters continually reduced this season as injuries took their toll and she was left with three healthy athletes.

While Ferguson and Ray took their turns jumping into the pit, Modepe Osishikoya from the University of California at Los Angeles emerged from the back of the pack to jump 21-6 and establish a new American record.

The AIAW season is over, but Johnson will take the same trio to Los Angeles June 10-11 to compete in the AAU nationals at the UCLA track.

Anton: golf a happier game at UF

ANTON TIED for ninth place individually in the Gator Invitational, shot UF's second best scores in the Chris Schenkel Invitational and the Southern Intercollegiate Championships and made the All-Southeastern Conference second team with a three-day total of 231 in the conference tournament.

Anton will have another chance to prove himself at the NCAAs June 7-10 in Eugene, Ore. He also has another year of eligibility at UF in which he'll try to reach another goal - the college All-America team.

Hafeman was the No. 1 player at the University of South Florida for two years. But the Junior from West Bend, Wis., wasn't satisfied playing for a team that "knew we couldn't win.'

SINCE COMING to UF, Hafeman has

been in the headlines less, but she's enjoying life more. Her teammates recently showed Hafeman how they feel about her decision by voting her the Lady Gator golfers' Most Valuable Player.

Hafeman can add to her list of accomplishments The Alligator's Unsung Gator award for her consistently solid and frequently overlooked contribution to UF's talented women's golf team.

"Things are really different over here (UF) but I like it much better," Hafeman said. "At South Florida, everybody just tried to be No. I because we knew we couldn't win as a team like we can here."

PLAYING AT UF means more tournaments against better competition for Hafeman, and the physical education major has adjusted quickly.

She finished fifth individually at the Houston Baptist Invitational in October and tied Lori Garbacz for UF's second best score at the Betsy Rawls Invitational in March. Her three-day total of 232 was the Lady Gators' lowest score in their most recent tournament - the Southern Intercollegiate Championships.

Portman: winning is a way of life

Portman, The Alligator's Unsung Gator in women's tennis, is as predictable as a summer storm. Lady Gator fans have come to expect the words "Match, Portman" every time the sophomore netter steps off the Varsity Courts. Portman seldom lets them down.

"AT NO. 3 I know everybody on the team expects me to never lose," Portman said. "I know (UF Head Coach) B.E. (Palmer) counts

"She has become progressively more and more of a team player," Palmer said. "She's been very willing to deny herself for the sake of the team."






