Toddler battling brain tumor

At 14 months old, Carl Jordan Melton III--called "Little CJ"--has a smile that could melt your heart.

But that sweet smile doesn't come as easily these days and the coming weeks promise to be filled with challenges, fears and hopefully, a miracle, for the toddler and his family.

Last Thursday, doctors discovered a malignant brain tumor growing on Melton's brain stem. Specialists in both Gainesville and Jacksonville said there was little they could do and referred the boy to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tenn.

"We knew there was something going on with him, but just not what. He would wake in the mornings crying and hold his head. The doctors have been working through a series of tests to find out what was

Time to make a splash!

The new splash pad at Rosehead Park is open and ready for visitors.

City Manager Bob Brown said they were given the green light to open the facilities Thursday morning and the park attraction opened for business at 4 p.m. that afternoon.

Watermelon Man says he's on city's 'most wanted' list

For the past several years, Rick Moore has been a staple of summer, manning a produce stand at the corner of Highway 19 and U.S. 98. His main offering has been watermelons and many simply called him "Watermelon Man."

However, Tuesday night Moore added a new title to his name—"Most Wanted."

Wearing a bright orange t-shirt with the words "Most Wanted Watermelon Man" emblazoned across his chest, Moore appeared before the Perry City Council to contest a local ordinance that could send him packing from his favorite corner.

Under an ordinance adopted by the council in 2009, all vendors operating along the U.S. 19 corridor

must conduct the bulk of their business from a building that meets the Florida building code; if they are not operating out of a building, then they are considered "transient merchants" and must pay a \$375/day licensing fee.

Moore, who lives in Hernando, has been conducting his business roadside with produce displays in the back of trailers. Until now, no one raised the alarm. However, in recent weeks City Hall received multiple complaints regarding Moore's business which prompted an investigation that led to police officers asking him to comply with the ordinance.

"I have been at that corner

for five years. I have an agreement with JB's Tire to use the property and don't know why I have to leave," Moore told council members.

"Under the ordinance that addresses U.S. 19, you have to be conducting the majority of your business inside a building. Although you may face Highway 98, the property you are on fronts U.S. 19. The ordinance covers any piece of property that touches 19. If you get the property owner to let you use one of the garage bays and all contact with the money is made inside the building, then you could be in compliance," City Manager

2 days early

Scallop season opens Saturday

Only a handful of days before the start of the 2013 recreation scallop season, Gov. Rick Scott announced Wednesday that the season would begin early, on Saturday, June 29, rather than the traditional July 1 kick-off.

The decision gives scallopers and those businesses which rely on their annual arrival an extra weekend this year.

Local businessman Don Everett Jr. said he and his father were discussing the opening of scallop season earlier this week and wondered why it couldn't start a few days earlier on Saturday (instead of Monday) to help increase

Buckeye shareholders to vote on Georgia-Pacific merger

Georgia-Pacific LLC and GP Cellulose Group LLC, an entity controlled by Georgia-Pacific, today announced that GP Cellulose Group has chosen to convert to a "long form" merger in the pending acquisition of Buckeye Technologies Inc. and to terminate the previously

announced tender offer in accordance with the merger agreement with Buckeye Technologies.

Georgia-Pacific and GP Cellulose have chosen to convert to the merger as a result of the previously announced second request from the Department of Justice regarding the

nonwovens business. The "long form" merger affords Buckeye Technologies' shareholders the opportunity to vote to approve the merger.

Under the merger agreement announced April 24, Buckeye Technologies has agreed to hold a special meeting of its shareholders

promptly to consider and vote on adoption of the merger agreement. Adoption of the merger agreement requires the affirmative vote of at least 75 percent of the outstanding shares of Buckeye Technologies' common stock. Subject to the receipt of shareholder approval and the satisfaction

or waiver of the other conditions to the merger, Buckeye Technologies' shareholders will receive \$37.50 in cash per share in the merger, the same price they would have received in the tender offer.

RIDING THE RAILS

Perry's first railroad arrives in 1903

Interlude II

For the past two weeks, former Perry resident Russell Tedder has been serving as conductor on a ride through Perry's railroad history.

Tedder, who was guest of honor at the Perry Historic Station's grand opening in 2009, recently returned to Perry to donate four model trains to the city which are now displayed at Java Depot in the station. So far, we have looked at those

models, representing the Live Oak, Perry & Gulf Railroad, the South Georgia Railway and Atlantic Coast Line Railroad's Southland.

While the Florida Railway is not among the models now on display, it played an important and early role in Perry's railway past.

Chapter 4: The Florida Railway

"There was one other railroad that came into Perry that I don't have a train for, called the Florida Railway," Tedder said.

"It was the first railroad into Perry. Originally it was called the Suwannee and San Pedro Railroad. It ran from Live Oak, crossed the Suwannee River at Lauraville, went to Mayo and then turned back northwest and came to Perry up through Fenholloway.

"It arrived in Perry in 1903. They had advertisements and schedules in Perry and said there was a livery station with horses and buggies. So you could ride the train and rent a

horse and go to places like Shady Grove."

In 1905, the Suwannee and San Pedro Railroad became the Florida Railroad.

"It was owned by the Drew family," Tedder said.

Gov. George Franklin Drew was elected Florida's 12th governor in January 1877, the first Democratic governor after the Reconstruction era.

Born in Alton, N.H., he built Florida's largest sawmill at Ellaville on the Suwannee River. He returned to the lumber business following his term in office and died in Jacksonville in 1900. His sons George L. Drew and Frank Drew joined him in his ventures and the rail served their timber interests.

"He had two sons and they were the ones who built the railroad," Tedder said.





wrong. Then, last Thursday he fell out of a chair and hit his head. So we took him to the hospital and they did a CT scan. Dr. (Joda) Lynn came out and told us that he was fine where he hit his head, but there was another issue—a tumor on his brain stem," Melton's aunt Lynn Carter, said.

"According to what the doctors told us, the tumor is wrapped around the parts of the brain stem that controls the functions of his major organs. At first they were thinking to start treatment with radiation, but once they realized where the tumor was located, they referred him to St. Jude's."

As of presstime Thursday, the family was awaiting instructions from the

children's hospital as to their next steps.

"Little CJ's mother, Valerie, is pregnant and will not be able to go to Tennessee with them. So it will be just Little CJ and his dad, Carl 'CJ' Melton Jr. He is the main provider for the family and that is why an account has been opened for the family at Tree Capital Credit Union," Carter said.

Council opts not to make changes to existing rules for U.S. 19 corridor vendors

Bob Brown said.

"Once a complaint is filed, we ask the Perry Police Department to send an officer to see if the vendor is in compliance. We don't go looking for offenders... when a complaint comes in, it triggers an investigation," Mayor Daryll Gunter added.

"This issue triggered a lot of discussion and I put the issue on the agenda to see if the council wanted to do something different with the ordinance," Brown noted.

"So if he stepped inside the building to collect money he would be in compliance?" Councilwoman Venita Woodfaulk asked.

"The intent of the ordinance to have the majority of business conducted inside a building," Brown said.

"But I have built my business there and a lot of my customers don't have vehicles—they walk or ride bicycles to see me," Moore said.

"The ordinance was put into place to address transient merchants who were here today and gone tomorrow. It was intended to be a protection not only to our local citizens, but local businesses as well," Brown said. "We do have provisions where he could set up in another area in

town that is not along the U.S. 19 corridor—in the two shopping centers on Jefferson Street. All he would need to do is provide proof of a six-month lease and purchase a business license (prorated fees would be just \$15)."

(Later in the meeting Brown noted that Moore had brought in a lease for the Perry Plaza Shopping Center and had purchased a business license. However, reports Thursday indicated he was still conducting business Hwy. 19/98.)

Moore found little support from some audience members, who spoke out to say "Just comply with the ordinance."

"The problem is not what you are selling, but where you are selling it," Gunter

said. "My advice would be to conduct the bulk of your business inside the building and then you could be in compliance," he added.

"I think we should leave the ordinance like it is... it's working," Councilman Mike Deming said. "My understanding is you have been given a number of options on how you could conduct your business within the city limits and still be in compliance with our ordinances. I'm satisfied with that."

Discussion on the issue came to a close without any clear directive for either Moore or city staff.

"So if that's settled, I'm on my way to pick up a load of peaches," Moore said in parting.

Frank Drew was an attorney in Lake City and like his father joined the political arena, serving as a member of the 1895 legislature.

"They tried to make it work," Tedder said of the brothers.


"They were going to expand it to go to Jacksonville and Fernandia. It never worked out for them.

"They couldn't compete with the Live Oak, Perry & Gulf Railroad. It had been built and it was backed by the Atlantic Coast Line. They couldn't compete with that, even though they both

served Live Oak to Perry.

"They abandoned it about 1916. The station was just north of city hall, on that block of Drew Street. There is a picture in the Florida Archives file of the end of the station, just beyond where the fire station was. That's the only picture of the station I'm aware of."

Keaton Beach Fishing Report

Winds must cooperate

We landed 16 trout for Wayne, Donna and Ken Walker—all of Gainesville—last Thursday (June 20). We fished with live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders in 4-6 feet of water to land our trout. We had three fish over 20 inches long.

Trout fishing was tough Saturday, as the w-i-n-d just wouldn't cooperate. We managed 11 trout, 6 BSB and a Spanish Mackerel for Harry Dorsey, Joe Brown and Mike Johnson of Albany, Ga. We caught them on live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders in 4.5-5.5 feet of water.

I saw one boat Saturday which had four anglers on board and they had 13 trout ... the best I heard of for the day. Simply put, in 87 degree water you must have a decent breeze to get them going otherwise it will be tough.

Here's a report from two guys who fished three days at Keaton Beach:

Andy Young of Perry and Jeff Edwards of St. Augustine had 7 trout last Thursday, 8 trout on Friday and nine on Saturday while using live pinfish under Cajun Thunders in 8-10 feet of water.

Man found alive after 5-day search

A 55-year-old St. Johns County man is alive, thanks to the efforts of many people, after rescuers found him early Monday, mired deep in a swampy area of Flagler County.

Efforts to find Guss Baker began June 20 by Flagler County Sheriff's Office deputies, its FireFlight helicopter and members of its volunteer posse.

Just after midnight Monday, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Officers Rich Wilcox and Lee Lawshe were three hours into searching for Baker at the Turkey Island Hunt Club. Searchers had been on the

property over the weekend but had not been able to locate the man.

A member of the hunt club had called Lawshe late Sunday with some new information and Lawshe rallied FWC Officers and Flagler County deputies around 9 p.m. to try again. The physical aspects of the search were not easy; the swampy area was thick with impenetrable vines, bushes and trees, and it was pitch black despite the full moon.

As they maneuvered their way through the thick swamp undergrowth, the officers kept yelling the man's name over and over again. "Guss! Guss! Are you

there? Guss, we have food and water, and want to help you!" Finally, Wilcox heard a faint response, "Yes."

Try as they might, the officers could not get to Baker. Baker's responses became faint and slowly diminished. Lawshe got on his radio and coordinated help with other FWC officers and Flagler, Volusia and Seminole County sheriff's offices. Flagler responded with deputies; Volusia put a helicopter in the air.

Wilcox remained in the woods to continue talking with Baker while Lawshe left the dark, swampy woods to coordinate FWC officers, Flagler deputies and aerial support.

The Air 1 helicopter from the Volusia County Sheriff's Office responded and located Baker, using forward looking infrared (FLIR) thermal equipment to direct Lawshe, FWC Officer Dustin Bonds and Flagler County Deputy Jennifer Prevatt to him. When they found Baker, he was perched, shivering, on a stump in ankle-to-knee-deep water and it was clear to Lawshe that Baker would have to be hoisted out by

helicopter because of his physical condition and the dense swamp.

The rescuers used jackets and their bullet-proof vests to try to warm Baker while Officers Wilcox and Ryan Campbell carried in water and blankets as they waited for the Seminole County Sheriff's helicopter Alert 1 to arrive with its rescue hoist. Upon arrival, a rescuer was lowered from Alert 1 to Baker and the officers. Baker was then hoisted from the swamp to the helicopter and flown to nearby Flagler County paramedics who transported him by ambulance to Florida Hospital Flagler in Palm Coast.

Information received by the FWC indicates Baker is still recovering in the hospital and is expected to make a full recovery.

"I'm sure it has been a harrowing few days for Mr. Baker," said Lawshe. "Everyone involved in his rescue used their skills and training, and worked closely together to find him and bring him out safely. I am relieved we found him alive; I only wish we could have found him sooner."

'World War Z' is not just a good zombie movie, it's a good film

I've said it before, but the fact remains the same: zombies are officially the next "big thing." So long vampires. It's been nice knowing you, werewolves.

The undead hordes are in. Although zombies had always been a horror staple, the mass popularity of AMC's "Walking Dead" has taken the genre to an entirely new level. Whenever something goes mainstream, people strive to find a new angle, and the latest angle for zombies is "World War Z."

Author Max Brooks, son of famed writer/director Mel Brooks, didn't jump on the zombie bandwagon. He's been riding along since 2003, with his satirical "The Zombie Survival Guide." He followed this up three years later with "World War Z," a history of the decade-long Zombie War consisting of accounts of people from around the world who had managed to survive. It's just the kind of book that many call "unfilmable," but Leo DiCaprio and Brad Pitt apparently disagreed, as their respective production companies ended up in a bidding war over the film rights, with Pitt coming out on top.

After five years of production, which based on reports may have been as hellish as the apocalyptic world it depicts, the film has arrived with Pitt in the lead role and director Mark Forster ("Finding Neverland," "Quantum of Solace") behind the camera.

I had admittedly low expectations after reading of the production woes, but the final product seems to have been hardened rather than broken by the fire through which it traveled. There may be little left of Brooks' novel after multiple rewrites--the last of which occurred after principal filming had been completed--but his decision to consider the reality behind the fiction survives.

"World War Z" is a serious movie and plays out like a serious movie, just one that happens to have zombies eating people in the street. There is plenty of action, but it always seems to be part of the larger story rather than simply playing out to entertain. The best comparison I can give is the "Bourne" films, which managed--through solid storytelling and focused directing--to elevate themselves above the typical action thriller.

The story follows Gerry Lane (Pitt), a former U.N. soldier who has retired to live with his family in Philadelphia. His day goes from normal to apocalyptic in a matter of

moments when sick people begin attacking everyone on the streets. Yes, people are becoming zombies, although the word isn't actually used until maybe an hour into the film. But these aren't your typical lumbering zombies. These zombies are incredibly fast pack animals that cannot be outrun and will not tire.

Gerry is able to find temporary sanctuary and contact his former boss, Thierry Umutoni (Fana Mokoena, "Safe House") for rescue. Unfortunately, Gerry is given an ultimatum: help the U.N. track down the source of the contagion or fend for himself.

Gerry's journey will take him to South Korea, Jerusalem and beyond, and along the way he will meet a variety of people, each with a different take on the cause of the outbreak as well as the world they now find themselves in.

"World War Z" is essentially three separate acts that surprisingly work quite well together when taken as a whole. The first act is a survival story as Gerry and his family try to find an escape from the ever-growing horde. The second act plays out like a political thriller as Gerry globe-trots in search of answers. Finally, the third act falls into the more traditional horror conventions but even here is still plays by its own rules.

As I mentioned before, the reason each of these seemingly different versions of the same film work together is that the film itself takes each of them equally seriously. It is the same self-seriousness that makes "The Walking Dead" work so well.

Since I've made so much of the rewrites on "World War Z," I feel I should elaborate some. It is rare for a studio to essentially throw out an entire act of a movie and start from scratch, but that is apparently what was done here, with new writers brought in to pen a new ending. Although I'm sure the result departs even further from Brooks' novel (I haven't had the opportunity to read it), I greatly enjoyed the final act here and it only adds to my amazement that it still works as a cohesive whole.

"World War Z" is a solid and entertaining movie. It accomplishes this because its creators set out to make a solid and entertaining movie, not just an entertaining zombie movie.

The film is rated PG-13 for intense frightening zombie sequences, violence and disturbing images.

'Monsters University': an enjoyable film which doesn't live up to Pixar standard

Pixar rode a 15-year-long run as not only the top animation studio, but also one of the most consistent film studios--period--with titles like "Toy Story," "Monsters Inc.," "The Incredibles" and "WALL•E."

Lately, however, there have been chinks in the armor, with the downright bad "Cars 2" followed by the simply alright "Brave."

Whether it is a symptom or the cause of the recent malaise I can't say for sure, but after resisting non-"Toy Story" sequels for most of its existence, Pixar has adopted the strategy so many studios already have and is working to turn its favorite films into franchises.

After the already mentioned "Cars 2," we now get "Monsters University," a prequel to one of its most beloved creations, "Monsters Inc." Ignoring the soon-to-be-arriving "Planes," a off-shoot of the "Cars" universe, we next get "Finding Dora," a sequel to "Finding Nemo" in 2015.

That's not say it's "all sequels, all the time," since we get "The Good Dinosaur" next year and "Inside Out" in 2015.

Returning to the present, it could be said that "Monsters University" is simultaneously playing it safe financially and dangerous in the terms of creative integrity.

And after seeing both the film itself and the box office numbers from its opening weekend, I think both are ultimately true.

Thus, I'm of two minds when it comes to "Monsters University." On one hand it is funny and entertaining, presenting a new look at beloved characters Mike (voiced by Billy Crystal) and Sully (John Goodman) to see how they became the monsters we first met 12 years ago. On the other hand, if you strip away the typically beautiful Pixar animation and the familiar characters, you're left with a paint-by-the-numbers college comedy; even worse, it is one that's been watered down to a G-rated level.

As for its target audience--children--"Monsters University" will most likely satisfy them and keep them entertained for its entire 110-minute runtime. But simply put, I've come to expect more from Pixar.

The story begins with a young Mike on a school field trip to Monsters Inc., where he decides that he wants to become a scarer when he grows up. Flash forward a few years and Mike is on his way to Monsters University to enroll in its scarer program and finally realize his dream.

He soon meets fellow freshman Sully, but their initial encounters leave them more enemies than friends. In fact, their rivalry leads them both into trouble which threatens their chances to even remain in the scarer program at all.

If they have any hopes of reaching their dreams, they will have to find a way to work together and win the Scare Games.

Writing prequels are always tricky, because while you can depict the events which led to the people and places we've already met, the fact that we know how things will turn out kills much of the tension. This is clearly evident in "Monsters University," where we know that Mike and Sully do indeed become the best of friends and both have become highly successful employees of Monsters Inc. Unfortunately, it is on these two elements that the film relies for its conflict.

Of course, the journey is half the fun, but again "Monsters University" suffers because the plot is essentially a recreation of just about every college challenge story we've already seen. There's the evil fraternity, there's the fraternity of misfits, there's the main characters who must join forces with the misfits and ultimately learn lessons of teamwork and friendship.

In a way, "Monsters University" is quite similar to "Cars 2"--and suffers many of the same problems--where the studio has taken familiar characters and forced them into an existing film genre with very little tweaking to the conventions.

Fortunately the college genre fits here better than the James Bond genre fit with "Cars," and that's why "Monsters University" is the vastly superior film, although admittedly that isn't a high bar to achieve.

Truthfully, I think it really comes down to heart. Pixar was the poster-child for injecting copious amounts of heart into its films, "Monsters Inc." included.

While "Monsters University" is indeed funny, entertaining and child satisfying, it simply doesn't have the heart to make a decent film a great one.

When reviewing "Brave," I made the comment that Pixar had set the bar so high for its own quality that it might not be fair to hold them to the same standard in their future endeavors. Now, after three straight less-than-stellar offerings, I have to wonder if they are even trying to reach it anymore.

The movie is rated G.

Scott opens scallop season two days early

Scallop season is opening Saturday, June 29, two days earlier than usual, after two Taylor County businessmen contacted the governor's office to see if Floridians could get one extra weekend of scalloping.

The annual recreational scallop season typically opens on July 1 and runs through Sept. 24.

Don Everett Jr. said he and his father were discussing the opening of scallop season earlier this week and wondered why it couldn't open a few days earlier on Saturday (instead of Monday) to help increase tourism dollars in Taylor and other North Florida counties.

"So we called someone that

we knew in the governor's office on Monday and by Wednesday morning the governor had signed an executive order that adds another weekend to the scallop season," he said.

"I asked FWC to open the recreational scallop season early," Governor Rick Scott announced Wednesday.

"This is an opportunity for Florida families and our visitors to enjoy our state's natural beauty, while catching the best scallops in the world. By moving the recreational date up, we'll provide families and visitors with an extra weekend to enjoy the scallop season, which will benefit jobs and families along the coast."

"Harvesting bay scallops is a family-friendly activity that boosts the local economy in areas where harvest is open," said Ken Wright, chairman of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

"Opening the bay scallop season two days early, on a weekend rather than a weekday, and on the weekend before the Fourth of July, will positively impact the communities and businesses that depend on bay scalloping while providing additional recreational opportunities for Florida's residents and visitors."

Scallop season is expected to draw thousands of tourists to the Taylor County coastline over the next 12 weeks.

Last year, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) board voted to permanently extend the end of scallop season until Sept. 24 from its original end date of Sept. 10.

FWC officially recently released its annual scallop survey and the numbers reported in the Steinhatchee area were up from

last year's numbers. Additionally, early reports are saying that the water is much clearer than it was last year, when Tropical Storm Debby had produced significant rainfall in the area.

There are 20 survey stations in the Steinhatchee area, each measuring an area of 600 square

meters (656 square yards), and the results are the average number of scallops found in each station.


This year, the average count was 36.2, up from last year's 28.2. The count was 136.1 in 2011, 54.5 in 2010 and 69 in 2009.

Meanwhile, the average number of scallops observed during pre-season surveys doubled in Homosassa and St. Joseph Bay. The St. Marks average decreased substantially from June 2012.

According to a survey conducted last year as FWC officials were considering extending the season, Taylor County was the most

popular destination among the counties in the legal harvesting area with 32.5 percent of those surveyed saying they scallop off the coast here.

Citrus County was second with 27.1 percent, followed by Gulf/Bay County with 25.5 percent and Dixie County with 23.1 percent (respondents could choose more than one county).



Don't forget the dive flag this season

Divers and snorkelers are required to display a "divers-down" flag (red with a white diagonal stripe) while in the water.

Boaters must stay at least 100 feet away from a divers-down flag in a river, inlet or channel. In open waters, boaters must stay 300 feet away from a divers-down flag.

Scallopers need a Florida saltwater fishing license

Open scalloping areas on Beach Canal in Bay County to the Florida's Gulf coast extend from Pasco-Hernando county line near the west bank of the Mexico Aripeka.



Recreational scalloping is allowed along the Big Bend coastline from the Mexico Beach Canal in the west to the Hernando/Pasco County line in the south.

It is illegal to possess bay scallops while you're in or on state waters outside the open harvest areas, or to land bay scallops outside the open areas.

There is a daily limit of 2 gallons of whole bay scallops in the shell or 1 pint of bay scallop meat per person. In addition, no more than 10 gallons of whole bay scallops in the shell or one-half gallon of bay scallop meat may be possessed aboard any vessel at any time.

You are allowed to harvest bay scallops only by hand or with a landing or dip net. Bay scallops may not be harvested for commercial purposes.

Unless otherwise exempt, you will need a regular Florida saltwater

fishing license when you use a boat to harvest scallops.

If you wade from shore, you will need a regular Florida saltwater fishing license or a free resident shore-based license. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, on its website, has attempted to clarify who qualifies as "fishing from shore."

Scallopers who wade into the water are considered to be fishing from shore as long as they can stand on the bottom and do not access or leave the area by boat. If a scalloper arrives at a location by boat, he or she must have a regular saltwater fishing license, regardless of whether he fishes from shore.

'How-to' guide to scalloping off the Taylor Co. coast

Think it's hard to scallop? Basically, the only materials you need for scalloping are a snorkel, mask, fins (or water shoes) and a mesh bag to hold your catch.

Once you're geared up, you'll need a boat to take you out, a diver's flag to mark your place in the water and a recreational saltwater fishing license to keep things legal.

Scallops congregate in shallow water hidden in manatee and turtle grass. If you see a large group of boats in a certain area, chances are they've found a "sweet spot" with lots of scallops.

You should have some luck around the same vicinity. If you see one scallop shell, there's bound to be more around. (Hint: Before you head out, ask around to find out where the hot spots are for the season.)

Of course, not everyone answers the call of open waters. Those who aren't yet ready to test their sea legs should try their luck at Hagen's Cove, where you can join hundreds

of other landlubbers wading into shallow waters in search of scallops.

After you've pulled in your fair share (the limit is two gallons of whole scallops or one pint of meat per person; 10 gallons of whole scallops or one-half gallon of meat per boat), head back to shore to get them cleaned.

Before you begin the task of cleaning your catch, be sure to get some instructions to help move things along. You might have thought it easy enough to get them out of the water, but it's not so simple getting scallops to come out of their shells.

What you'll need: a place to set up shop (most marinas have ample facilities), a knife or other sharp flat object to open the shell, a spoon to scoop out the scallop and a container to hold the meat.

Now all that is left is a quick trip to the grill or frying pan...and enjoying a delicious meal of scallops you caught yourself.

Where do baby scallops come from?

By DR. FRED VOSE

I am frequently asked about the biology of bay scallops, such as "when are young reproduced?"

These young scallops eventually provide the harvest for the next summer season. Scallops typically begin spawning in the fall and one individual can release up to a million eggs per season. Bay scallops are simultaneous hermaphrodites, meaning they are male and female at the same time. In the wild scallops probably do not self-fertilize the eggs when released, but this can occur under laboratory conditions.

After release into the water, the eggs develop into various larval stages for several weeks before settling (see life cycle drawing). The spawning can actually be spread over a large portion of the year but December is a peak time in many areas of Florida for the scallop larvae to settle out of the water onto seagrass blades.

Attaching to seagrass blades helps protect the young scallops from the many predators found along the sea floor. The tiny scallops are attached by small silky threads in a bundle called a "byssus," similar to the way mussels are attached to the bottom.

The settlement process is termed "recruitment" and the young-of-the-year scallops are called "recruits" or "spat."

The attached stage of the scallop life lasts for a period months until the juvenile scallops detach and fall to the bottom, hopefully growing to adult sizes. If the scallop then survives through the summer, it completes its life cycle and begins spawning in the fall.

How do biologists know this, and how do they monitor relative scallop re-population from year to year?

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission

(FWC) scientists and many other partners including Florida Sea Grant use simple settlement traps that artificially mimic the surface of marine plants, such as seagrasses.

These traps consist of a citrus bag with a float at the top that is attached to a half concrete block, with a buoy line to the surface for retrieval from a boat.

In the Big Bend they are placed in sites offshore where the water is deep enough not to go dry during extreme low tides, which include blow-down tides after winter cold fronts.

Every month someone must go to the stations and pull up half of the settlement traps,

removing the citrus bag and placing it in a plastic sample bag labeling the collection location. After tying on a new citrus bag onto the block, the device is returned to the water for another eight weeks (trap pulls are alternated each month).

The citrus bags with attached scallop recruits are dried outside in the sun when brought back to the laboratory. Next, the tiny scallops are carefully identified and counted using magnifiers and microscopes.

By doing this year round, the FWC scientists determine when the highest numbers show up on the traps, and compare numbers counted from year to year to gauge

how the scallop populations are doing.

In the future, if you do happen

to see one of these spat traps in the local area, please do not disturb or remove it.







Dr. Fred Vose compiled the above chart based on figures from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. "Scallops are probably a remnant of what they were in the past, but commercial landings of 400,000 pounds in 1958 is pretty amazing," Vose said. The state's commercial harvest only exceeded 50,000 pounds once after 1980. The practice was banned in the state in 1994.

Florida banned the commercial harvest of scallops in 1994

Editor's Note: The following history of scallop regulations was compiled by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Prior to 1985 there were no statewide regulations regarding the harvest of bay scallops in Florida waters although local rules applied in Bay, Gulf and Pinellas counties.

In 1985, the Florida Marine Fisheries Commission instituted statewide regulations (Rule 46-18), governing the harvest of scallops and simultaneously repealed all local rules.

Those statewide regulations included a closure of the fishery between April 1 and June 30 of each year and a recreational bag limit of five gallons of whole scallops, or 1/2 gallon of meat per person per day.

Limits were also placed on the size and number of drags that could be used by vessels harvesting scallops for commercial purposes, and restrictions were placed on commercial harvests in the south end of St. Joseph Bay.

In 1994, there was an emergency

closure of the bay scallop fishery in response to the perceived collapse of bay scallop populations in many areas of Florida.

All state waters were closed to commercial harvest, and the recreational fishery was closed south of the Suwannee River. Additionally, the length of the recreational harvest season was reduced to three months (July-September).

A formal modification of bay scallop harvest regulations, which continued both the commercial and recreational closure south of the Suwannee River, was instituted in 1995.

The 1995 regulations also included a more restrictive individual bag limit (two gallons of whole scallops or one pint of meat per person per day), a boat limit of 10 gallons of whole scallops or 1/2 gallon of meat per boat per day, and a further reduction of the season to July and August of each year. In 1997, the season was lengthened by 10 days (July 1-Sept. 10), but otherwise the 1995 regulations remain in effect.

FWC Wildlife Research Institute seeking help to gauge populations

How many bay scallops live along Florida's Gulf coast? That question researchers address each year through dive surveys at several locations.

Tracking the bay scallop population long term can be particularly tricky because the animal's lifespan is just one to one and a half years.

With limited time to cover all of the state's bay scallop habitats, molluscan fisheries biologists with the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute (FWRI) are turning to other people who know a thing or two about scallops: recreational harvesters. Information they provide will be compiled to complement the researchers' annual population data.

Biologists gather much of their data on adult bay scallop

abundance in the summer before the recreational harvest and occasionally in the fall after the season. (Bay scallop harvest dates and regulations can be found online at <http://www.myfwc.com/fishing/saltwater/regulations/bay-scallops/>.) Researchers conduct counts at sites ranging from Pensacola Bay in the Panhandle to Pine Island Sound in southwestern Florida, including areas that remain closed to recreational harvesters.

To make public participation as easy as possible, researchers created an online web survey at <http://svy.mk/bayscallops>.

Recreational harvesters are asked to indicate where they harvest scallops, how many they collect, and how long it takes to harvest the shellfish.

Participants can also e-mail BayScallops@MyFWC.com to

ask questions or send additional information, such as photos and videos.

With the data these recreational harvesters provide, biologists hope to gain a greater understanding of the species' biology and range limitations. Researchers expect that what they learn about bay scallop abundance in individual areas of the fishery will enhance the accuracy of their next annual report.

In addition, researchers plan to use the public's data, combined with their own, to generate population models and identify long-term trends. More comprehensive information on the fishery could benefit recreational fishermen, charter boat captains, and the tourism industry in communities where bay scallops are harvested.

Recipes to make the most of your catch

Taking your scallops from the shell to the plate

Catching your crop of bay scallops is only half the fun. The rest is finding the perfect way to cook your harvest.

Fortunately, there are plenty of recipes available.

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services hosts online at Florida-Agriculture.com many recipes highlighting the state's wide variety of local agricultural products, fish and shellfish.

Additionally, local recipe books compiled by the Perry Garden Club and other organizations include scallop dishes.

Below are a few of the recipes the site boasts for converting your day's catch of scallops into dinner, from the basic to the complex.

Fried Scallops

- Ingredients:
- 2 pounds scallops
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
 - 1/8 tablespoon milk
 - ½ cup all-purpose flour
 - 1 ¼ cups dry bread crumbs
 - vegetable oil for frying

Preparation:

Rinse scallops with cold water to remove any remaining shell particles. Beat together eggs, salt, pepper and milk. Dredge scallops in flour, dip in egg mixture then coat with dry bread crumbs. Place scallops in skillet with approximately 1/2 inch of hot, but not smoking, oil. Fry at 350 degrees F for 2-3 minutes or until golden brown; turn once during cooking. Drain on a paper towel. Serve plain or with a sauce.

Yield: 6 servings.

Broiled Scallops

- Ingredients:
- 1 ½ pounds scallops
 - ¼ cup butter, melted
 - 3 tablespoons lime juice
 - 1 teaspoon garlic, minced
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 1/8 teaspoon white pepper
 - 1/8 teaspoon paprika
 - 2 tablespoons Florida parsley, chopped

Preparation:

Rinse scallops with cold water to remove any remaining shell particles. Place scallops on a lightly oiled broiler pan. Combine

butter, lime juice, garlic, salt, pepper and paprika. Brush scallops with seasoned butter. Broil about 3 inches from source of heat for 3-4 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley.

Yield: 6 servings



Pepper
Pinch of thyme
Pinch of marjoram
2 T. flour
2 T. cream
Fine bread crumbs
Paprika
Heat wine, add scallops and a pinch of salt. Simmer 10 minutes. When scallops become white, drain them. Reserve liquid. Keep scallops warm. In a saucepan, melt butter, add mushrooms, onions, parsley, thyme and marjoram, salt and pepper.

When mushrooms are tender, add flour and stir until smooth. Then slowly pour in warm scallop broth. Add cream to thickened sauce. Blend all together over low heat.

Cool slightly and fill buttered scallop shells to form neat mold. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and dot with butter. Place under broiler until crust is golden brown. (May use Pyrex dishes for larger servings.)

3 T. butter or margarine, melted
1 lb. fresh bay scallops
1/2 c. dry white wine
2 T. chopped fresh parsley
1 T. lemon juice
3/4 t. salt
Pinch red pepper
3 T. butter or margarine
1/4 c. all purpose flour
1 c. half and half
2 egg yolks
1/4 c. soft bread crumbs
1 T. butter or margarine, melted

Saute mushrooms and onions in 3 T. butter in a large skillet until tender. Add scallops, wine, parsley, lemon juice, salt and pepper; cover and cook over medium heat 3 minutes. Drain scallop mixture, reserving 3/4 c. plus 2 T. liquid. Set aside.

Melt another 3 T. butter in a heavy saucepan over low heat; add flour, stirring until smooth. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually add half and half. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture is thickened and bubbly. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually stir about one-fourth of hot mixture into yolks; add to remaining hot mixture, stirring constantly. Gradually stir in reserved scallop liquid (3/4 c. plus 2 T.); fold into scallop mixture. Spoon mixture into six greased, individual baking shells. Combine bread crumbs and

1 T. butter; sprinkle evenly over scallop mixture in shells. Place shells on a large baking sheet, and broil 3 to 5 minutes until top

is browned and bubbly. Yield: 6 servings.
Note: Hailing from France, Coquilles St. Jacques is one of the

most popular and elegant ways to serve scallops. Bake them in any type of small ramekin if you don't have individual baking shells.

Study: Gulf access injects \$10 million annually into Taylor County economy

More than 28,000 boat trips are launched in Taylor County each year, injecting some \$10 million into the local economy.

That's according to a yearlong study of county's Gulf access points conducted by the Florida Sea Grant College Fund.

The study surveyed local residents as well as those utilizing boat ramps and launches, and counted users at those sites periodically from November 2009 to September 2010.

The purpose of the study was to provide local and state officials "science-backed information" to help guide future decisions regarding public Gulf access in the county by determining which access points receive the most users and why, where those users live and what activities they enjoy here, and gauge public

support for expanding access options and improving existing ones.

As part of the study, Taylor County's 12 primary boat ramps were visited 11 times between November 2009 and September 2010 (this predated the opening of the new Steinhatchee public boat ramp at the former Ideal Marina site).

According to the study, the five busiest sites in the county are Keaton Beach (public boat ramp and Keaton Beach Marina) with 37 percent of total users, Steinhatchee (Gulfstream Marina, River Haven Marina and Jena boat ramp) with 21.4 percent, Econfina River State Park landing with 18.1 percent, Aucilla River boat ramp (Mandalay Road) with 7.4 percent, and Spring Warrior boat ramp with 5.3

percent.

Of those vehicles observed at ramps, only 14.3 percent were county residents while 85.7 percent were from outside the county.

Among visitors surveyed, slightly more than half were day trippers, with 30 percent staying either two or three days and 17 percent staying four days or more.

Important to local businesses, the survey showed visitors made 85 percent of the purchases for their trips inside the county with the average day trip costing \$138 and the average overnight trip \$377.

Using multipliers, the study reports the impact to the local economy includes 158 jobs along with an annual \$10 million boost.



More than 80 percent of the vehicles observed at Taylor County ramps during the study period were from outside the county.
