
Fall calendars fill up quickly and organizers urge residents to "save the date" for the following happenings:

## United Way: Who does the \$\$\$ help?

With the Taylor County United Way ready to kick off its latest fund-raising campaign Tuesday, the organization has outlined how it allocated the \$273,000 raised here last year and how those agencies utilized the funds to serve the community.

The campaign will officially kick-off its 2013-14 efforts at the annual breakfast celebration on Tuesday, Sept. 24, at the Taylor County Senior Center on Ash Street from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m.

Breakfast will cost \$5 and includes sausage, eggs, grits, biscuits, coffee and juice.

Proceeds from the event will be donated to one of United Way's participating agencies through a drawing held following breakfast.

This year's campaign will be chaired by Taylor County Tax Collector Mark Wiggins, who is asking the community to come join them Tuesday morning to talk with United Way's local participating agencies and see how they can get involved.

"The money raised here, stays here," Wiggins said. "Every bit we raise stays in our community."

As for last year's funds and the services provided

to Taylor County by the agencies, Campaign Associate Glenda Hamby provided the following breakdown:

- 2-1-1 Big Bend (allocated \$3,000 by United Way) provides a 24-hour crisis hotline, suicide prevention, human services information and referrals. In 2012, 454 callers received assistance.

- Ability 1st (\$3,000) provides assistance to persons with disabilities. In the last year, 13 clients received services, including the construction of four ramps.

- Alzheimer's Project (\$1,000) provides a full range of resource services including counseling, referral and support groups; 75 local clients were served.

- American Red Cross (\$5,000) provides disaster, health, safety, emergency, volunteer, youth and military services. More than 8,875 local residents received educational services, primarily for hurricane preparation.

- America's Second Harvest Food Bank (\$4,500)

## County, DMH to discuss new lease agreement

With the lease agreement between the county and Doctors' Memorial Hospital (DMH) set to expire in November, the Taylor County Commission and the DMH Board of Directors began discussing a modified lease Tuesday night, but a divided commission voted to table further talks until its workshop next week.

The abbreviated talks focused mostly on a proposed addition to the lease agreement, which would give DMH the authority to partner or participate with a regional health care system, but the language appeared to

create confusion among the commission.

"If DMH enters into a partnership, members of the DMH partnership may be appointed at the discretion of the partnership organization," the addendum states. "The chairman of the DMH Board of Directors must in all cases be a resident of Taylor County appointed by the board of county commissioners."

At the meeting, DMH Board Chairman Ken Arnold said, "If the (DMH) board enters into a partnership, the partner will

### Who should I blame?

I could blame my oldest first cousin, Gloria, since she was the first one to call our grandparents "Momma" and "Daddy" and her parents, Ann and Charles.

I could blame my grandparents for not relinquishing the titles "Momma" and "Daddy" when their grown children became parents.

And I could blame my mother and my uncles Charles and Archie for not insisting that we call them by their proper titles.

I could lay the blame on all of these folks, but until Saturday night, I never knew there was anything to blame them for.

We were gathered around the television watching the Floyd Mayweather boxing match when my cousin Tonja's daughter turned and asked, "Antmar, do you think there's something wrong with my children calling me Alexis?"

Before I could answer, Alexis' sister, Natasia, chimed in. "You couldn't pay one of my children to call me by my name."

TaSonja, their cousin, nodded in agreement.

"Well, I don't see anything wrong with it," Alexis countered. "Even if they call me Alexis, they know I'm their mother." Then she turned and tried to get Tonja's attention by calling out, "Ma."

Until that moment, I'd never noticed that all of my cousins' children call them Momma or Daddy. None of them are referred to by their first name. And now, their grown children were debating whether it was wrong or right for their own children to call them by their first name.

My cousin Sonja, Tasonia's mother, eyed me as I pondered Alexis' question. As usual, she was ready to pounce on my response if it wasn't what she thought I should say. So I knew I had to choose my words carefully. Before I could figure out how to answer this question in a way that would please everyone, Alexis inquired, "Didn't all of y'all call Grandma Doris 'Momma' and your mommas Ann and Lois?"

She had a point.

My brothers and I called our grandmother "Momma" and our mother "Lois." My Uncle Charles' children called our grandmother "Momma" and called their mother "Ann." My Uncle Archie's children did the same. They called our grandmother 'Momma' and their mother "Boot." And, to all us, "Daddy" was our grandfather.

So I agreed with Alexis.

I also agreed that even though we called our grandparents "Momma" and "Daddy," we all knew, without a doubt, who our parents were.

In fact, my cousins visited our grandparents' house nearly every day, but they lived with their parents. And, my cousins Carlos and Beverly spent their early years living in Michigan, but still called our grandparents "Momma" and "Daddy" and their parents by their name.

When we were growing up, a lot of my friends used to ask why I called my mother Lois. I knew what they meant, but I usually responded, "That's her name." I'm guessing the real reason we called our parents by their names and our grandparents "Momma" and "Daddy" was because we were copying our teenage uncles and parents.

have a right under this new lease agreement to appoint some members of the board, but not to displace any of the board members appointed by the county commission or the city council."

The current DMH board consists of seven members, five appointed by the commission and two by the city council. Its bylaws allow for a board of five to 11 members.

Tuesday's talk began with Commission Chairperson Pam Feagle asking to table the discussion until the commission's workshop set for Tuesday, Sept. 24, at 5:30 p.m.

Commissioners Malcolm Page, Pat Patterson and Jody DeVane, however, were in favor of moving forward with the talks that evening.

The commission then turned to County Attorney Conrad Bishop to outline several issues he had noted about the agreement, the first of which was the clause about the partnership.

As the discussion

continued about the clause's wording and Arnold's explanation, however, Patterson stated she was now in favor of tabling the matter until the workshop.

When no one else offered a second, Feagle passed the gavel to Page to second the motion.

Arnold noted that the DMH board's next meeting was scheduled for the same time as the workshop, but then stated they were willing to change the date of their meeting to accommodate the commission.

The board then agreed in a 3-2 vote to table the matter, with Page and DeVane voting no.

DMH CEO Geri Forbes asked commissioners to send any specific questions concerning the agreement to her ahead of the workshop so they could be prepared with answers. Assistant County Administrator Dustin Hinkel instructed the board to send the questions to him so he could forward them to DMH.

The workshop will be held at the Courthouse Annex on Green Street.

McNutt is facing two first degree murder charges for the Dec. 9, 2011, shooting deaths of Lee Edward Spees Sr., 70, and his son, Lee Jr., 47. He has also been indicted on a charge of attempted first degree murder while armed for the shooting of David Spees, 43, as well as a fourth count of shooting at a building.

He has been in custody at the Taylor County Jail since his arrest in 2011.

Arrest records indicate that the shooting incident may have stemmed from a long-standing property dispute between the McNutt and Spees families.


## Birthday cake salutes Roseheads' 12 years

I have fond memories of one rose. I found it in my grandmother's front yard. Check your memory! These rose bushes are everywhere in our county. They are hearty, fast-growing, pest-

fall. The smell is forever in my mind.

Grandmother didn't allow us to pick, just to smell. This firm warning didn't keep me from taking one or two when she was not watching. Our family has always had this rose, but never knew the

are fragrant, easy to grow, constantly bloom and will grow from cuttings.

The other rose of my childhood was pink, six-foot high and almost as wide. It was in front of Aunt Evelyn's house. Guess what? She always let me pick those beautiful and large pink blooms. This rose is Mrs. B. R. Cant. Its blooms are lovely. You can pick a large bouquet and not tell—from the bush—that you picked any.

If you would like to see 13 varieties of old garden roses, go to our Extension Office and look to the left. Mr. Bill Dority, a rosarian of Tallahassee, gave these to our Master Gardener program, and we planted them there.

Another great place to see heirloom roses at their best is springtime in Goodwood Plantation in Tallahassee. They also have a rose sale where you can buy plants taken from all the roses grown there.

The best and cheapest place to get your roses is always from friends and neighbors. We are always happy to share that special bush that comes down from family.

Roses are easy to grow in our sandy soil. You just have to know the right

variety. Buy books, join a rose society, or call your local County Extension Office.

Look around Taylor County and see who is growing roses. Happy growing!

**Growing fundamentals:**  
Soil: roses need a ph of 6.0-6.5 in loose, drained soil with lots of organic matter

like mushroom compost and cow manure.

Mulch: pine straw, pine bark and oak leaves help hold moisture during the hot, dry summer days.

Water: Roses like water but not overhead sprinklers. When leaves are wet overnight, they have a tendency to develop fungi.

Disease Control (Fertilizer): Don't wait until you see disease. Spray on a regular basis. I like

Bayer products. They have a systemic liquid for disease and a granular fertilizer that works well.

Prune: After flowering, cut back plants to encourage them to bloom again. Give

them heavy pruning in January. Cut out all dead

canes. Sun: Roses like six hours

of full sun. Never plant under trees.

## Keaton Beach Fishing Report

### Trout fishing is 'great at Keaton'

Trout fishing is pretty great at Keaton as evidenced by two trips we had Monday and Tuesday with limits both days including fish over 20 inches for each angler. Other folks are also limiting out and sand trout have shown up for those fishing out deeper. Credit that to the "east" w-i-n-d of the last few days. Gulf water temps are running 84-88 degrees and the trout are liking the darker water.

Monday, I took out Dr. Floyd Falany of Rome, Ga., and his daughter and granddaughter Dr. Angie Hulse and Mac Hulse of Waleska, Ga., and we brought back 20 trout weighing a whopping 30.1 pounds with the top ten weighing 24.2 pounds! We fished live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders in 3.5-4.5 feet of water.

Tuesday, I took Bill Foster of Wellborn and his pal Don Flowers of Vicksburg, Va., out and we landed 15 keepers with three over 20 inches as well. Don took top honors with a 23-inch

trout weighing almost four pounds. Again our trout were caught on live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders from 3-4.5 feet of water.

Here are some reports from Keaton Beach including a few I forgot to pick up last week.

Steve Alley and Caleb Tarno of Locust Grove, Ga., had a limit of trout and 10 "sugar" trout (sandtrout) as well as 2 flounder, a bluefish and two 12-inch black sea bass on Sept. 9. This duo was fishing with New Penny Gulp under a cork in 8 feet of water.

On Sept. 7, Josh Ahern of Auburn, Ga., with Matt Savin of Perry had a limit of trout with two over 20 inches plus an 8-pound sailcat while using live shrimp under Cajuns in 7 feet of water.

Last Friday, Larry Bailey of Franklin, N.C., had his five trout with the largest at 21.5 inches. He was throwing a MirrOrlure Jerk bait in less than 3 feet of water.

On Sunday, David Lee and three friends from Macon, Ga., had 13 trout, 13 sand trout and a Spanish mackerel while using live shrimp fished under a Cajun Thunder in 6 feet of water.

Also on Sunday, Mike and Becky Fallin of Thomasville, Ga., had their limit of trout to 22 inches with New Penny Gulp under a float in 5 feet of water.

That's all except to say don't let the dark water scare you off folks ... cause ... the trout are biting!

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## 'The Family' brings the laughs while on the run from the mob

"Goodfellas," directed by Martin Scorsese and starring Ray Liotta as the real life Harry Hill, is one of my favorite movies. That's not hard to say, since it's considered one of the best movies ever made.

The story follows Hill from a young age when he joins the mob and continues as he works his way up the ranks, taking part in several high-profile crimes. Ultimately, he turns on his friends after becoming convinced they are preparing to kill him to keep him quiet.

And thus, he becomes an FBI informant, and he and his family are whisked away into Witness Protection. Cue the credits.

The real-life Hill would struggle with trying to live the straight and narrow, getting arrested multiple times and eventually getting kicked out of the program. He died last year at the age of 69, not in a hail of bullets but from a bad heart.

The ending of "Goodfellas" and the intrigue over the real event upon which the movie was based, begs the question: what would a story be like if it told Hill's story, not during his time as a mobster, but while hidden away with his family, trying to fit in and keep his head down.

"The Family" is basically that movie, at least in spirit. With Scorsese as executive producer, and directed and co-written by action film guru Luc Besson ("The Professional," "The Fifth Element"), it follows former wiseguy Giovanni Manzoni (Robert De Niro, "Silver Linings Playbook") and his family as they move into their latest identities as the Blake family in rural France. The story is told mostly through Giovanni's eyes as he narrates the movie while writing his memoirs, although the rest of the family members get their due as well.

The movie is a dark comedy, with lots of laughs coming from events we honestly shouldn't be laughing at, like when Giovanni nearly beats the plumber to death. There is also Besson's usual action, although not as much as I was expecting. It should be noted that while there are laughs, and good ones, this is a comedy that gets serious at times, especially in the final act.

I honestly left the theater a bit conflicted about "The Family," having difficulty nailing it down. The various tones felt a bit disjointed and the proportions of comedy, action and drama seemed a bit off.

But I then realized that like Harry Hill in "Goodfellas," who also narrates his film, Giovanni (aka Fred Blake) isn't a good guy. An interesting guy, and sometimes a funny guy? Sure. But he is not a nice guy. He's a killer, a criminal and someone who is getting to live his life—at least a different version of it—with his family in freedom, even if none of them are terribly happy about it.

We can enjoy the journey while we're with them watching the movie—and I certainly

did—but I didn't fully appreciate the movie until I realized Besson was using irony in the true definition of the word in a wonderfully manipulative way that only becomes clear at the end, and ultimately ties the movie together like the right rug does to a room.

Besson hasn't directed an action movie since 1997, but has written and produced countless films since then, including "The Transporter," "Taken," "Kiss of the Dragon," "Unleashed," "From Paris with Love" and more. This movie proves he is still a great director, able to pace out his story in a way that isn't always conventional, but works in its own way. It's not a coincidence that "The Professional" and "The Fifth Element" are also on my top films list.

Like I said before, the script is funny, but despite the absurdity of some of the situations, the story always feels grounded in reality. This is most evident in the final act

when the mob eventually finds their location (this is revealed in the trailer, so I don't feel bad mentioning it here). In another movie, the entire family would pick up guns and blast their way out of the situation, blow the smoke away from their smoking barrels, and then saunter off into the sunset. Although there are elements of that, they play out in a completely unexpected way, realistically. Although it does seem a bit off compared to the comedy which preceded it, again, it is part of Besson's purposeful irony.

It doesn't hurt that the cast is great from top to bottom. De Niro, who I've already mentioned, has found a creative resurgence since his work in "Silver Linings Playbook" and manages the comedy and the more serious elements quite well, with no sign of the slapstick style he has been utilizing over the past several years in films like "Meet the Parents." Michelle Pfeiffer ("Dark Shadows") plays Giovanni's wife Maggie, and she steals most of her scenes, also pulling off the comedy and the drama, especially when things fall apart in the final act.

The younger generation of "Blakes" include Dianna Agron (best known as cheerleader Quinn Fabray on FOX's "Glee") as Belle. Agron is perhaps the discovery here, stretching her acting muscles some and showing signs of the actress she might become. John D'Leo, who plays son Warren, is the least well known of the Blakes, but like his on-screen sister, this movie should help him land some more roles in the future.

Rounding out the principal cast is Tommy Lee Jones as their Witness Protection handler, and he does his usual straight-man routine to De Niro's eccentricities.

In the end, "The Family" is good adult comedy with a surprising level of depth, although it goes out in a way you might not expect.

The film is rated R for violence, language and brief sexuality.

## this weekend at the movies


September hasn't provided a large number of movies to date, and we get just two more this weekend.

Local 4-H youth took part in serving at the annual Farm Bureau banquet held Sept. 5.


Youth assisted members and guests as a community service project adopted by the 4-H Livestock Club. Farm Bureau is a proud



## FROM THE RECIPE BOOK



### Crispy chicken done healthy

Chicken is a versatile choice when cooking for family and friends or even when preparing a meal for one or two people. Chicken can be cooked and seasoned in a variety of ways, and one chicken entree may taste completely different from another.

For many chicken lovers, no method of cooking chicken is more tasty than frying. But frying isn't very healthy, and the desire to mimic the taste of fried chicken without actually frying it is what led chef Kevin Gillespie to come up with the following recipe for "Cast-Iron Skillet Chicken With Farro and Brussels Sprouts." Included in his cookbook, "Fire In My Belly" (Andrews McMeel), this recipe provides the same crispy flavor of fried chicken, but it does so in a much healthier way.

connecting the wing to the body, grab both wing and breast together and cut through the wing joint to remove breast and wing in one piece. Score the meat around the next wing joint closest to the breast, cutting down to bone and scraping with the knife so the bone is fairly clean. Bend the joint to break it and remove the wing. The resulting boneless breast with the first wing bone attached and exposed is called an airline breast. It looks nicer than the boneless breast by itself, and the wing bone helps keep the meat moist during cooking.

5. Cut off any excess flaps of skin and pat the chicken very dry with a paper towel. Generously season the chicken on all sides with salt and pepper. Heat two large cast-iron skillets over medium heat. Add enough grapeseed oil to coat the bottom of each pan. Put the chicken legs in one pan, skin side down, and put the breasts in the other pan, also skin side down. Crank the heat up to medium-high and cook until the skin is nicely browned, about 4 minutes. No need to peek; just let the chicken cook undisturbed. When the skin is browned, it will release easily from the pan and the meat will start to pull away from the bone. Turn the leg-thigh portions and cook for 1 more minute skin side up, but let the breasts cook skin side down the entire time.

6. Place both skillets in the oven and roast for 5 minutes. Carefully pull out the pan with the legs, turn the legs skin side down once again, and return to the oven for 3 more minutes. The breasts will still be skin side down, remember; they do not get turned at all. After a total of 8 minutes, carefully pull both skillets from the oven, transfer the chicken to a large plate, and tent with foil to keep warm.

7. Using mitts, carefully pour out and discard the accumulated fat from the pans. Heat one pan over high heat until smoking hot. Add the cooled farro to the pan, spreading to evenly cover the bottom (save any leftover farro for another use; it makes a great salad). Again with the mitts, grab the handle and shake and toss the farro so it heats through evenly. After about 3 minutes, the farro will begin to caramelize and puff. Add the Brussels sprout leaves and stir nonstop for 1 minute. Add the garlic and warm chicken stock, then shake and toss the mixture for 2 more minutes, until almost all of the liquid is gone. The farro will absorb the stock and release its starch to thicken the remaining liquid, creating a creamy mixture.

8. Stir in the olive oil, lemon juice, a pinch of salt, and any accumulated chicken juices from the plate. Taste and adjust the seasonings as needed; with all that lemon juice in the farro, the dish screams for salt to balance it out.

9. To serve, drizzle a circle of tahini sauce in the center of the plate, and top with a scoop of farro and a chicken breast and leg.

### Cast-Iron Skillet Chicken with Farro and Brussels Sprouts

- Serves 4
- 1 cup, semi-pearled farro, preferably Anson Mills
  - 3 cups water
  - 1 pound Brussels sprouts (about 32 golf ball-size sprouts)
  - 2 chickens, about 4 pounds each
  - 2 tablespoons grapeseed oil
  - 3 cloves garlic, shaved on a mandoline
  - 2 cups warm chicken stock
  - 2 tablespoons olive oil
  - 1/4 cup lemon juice
  - 1/4 cup tahini sauce
  - Salt and ground black pepper to taste

- Preheat oven to 500° F.
- Soak the farro in the water for 30 minutes. Drain off the water and rinse the grains with cold water. Put the farro in a 2-quart saucepan and add enough fresh cold water to cover. Bring to a boil, then cut the heat down to low, cover, and simmer until tender yet still chewy, about 20 minutes. Drain off any excess liquid and spread the farro on a baking sheet to cool. You should end up with about 2 cups of cooked farro.
- Meanwhile, peel off the outer green leaves of the Brussels sprouts until you have 4 cups. Reserve the inner heads for another use.
- Cut up the chickens into leg-thigh and breast-wing portions with the skin still attached. For each leg-thigh portion, bend the leg away from the body, cut down to the joint, then bend the joint to break it. Cut between the ball and socket, then down around the carcass to remove the entire leg-thigh portion. For each breast-wing portion, cut down along one side of the breastbone, then run the knife along the contour of the rib cage and around the wishbone to begin removing the breast from the body. When you get to the joint



# Deming said he has not seen ethics complaint, will wait before making 'appropriate' response

and that the substance of the material echoed the charges she brought before the city council last week.  
Contacted Thursday, Deming said he had not seen the complaint and therefore could not comment on it.  
"When I receive a copy of the complaint, I will respond appropriately," he said.  
While Holton said she would share a copy of the complaint with the **Perry News-Herald**, at presstime Thursday she said she had been advised not to release the complaint in its entirety and was waiting for a call from her attorney before proceeding.  
During her comments last week, Holton said she brought the complaint before the council "within my rights as a citizens to come before you and have you address a grievance."  
She then read from a letter that stated, in part: "Council member Mike Deming misused his position and standing in the community to purposefully, willfully and spitefully break a Florida law that that it is illegal to park on a city sidewalk...Deming, knowing he would be under

no threat of facing a fine, citation or penalty by local authorities, parked in front of his home on the sidewalk adjacent to Jefferson Street on Saturday morning, Sept. 7, and waved to citizens as they passed by after being called out on a social network of breaking the law by me, Tonya Holton.  
"When my spouse, Stacy Holton, passed by, he proceeded to display a derogatory gestures toward him by giving him the middle finger, more commonly known as shooting a bird."  
Holton related that later the same day (around 3 p.m.) she called the Taylor County Sheriff's Office communications center (dispatch) and reported two vehicles being parked on the sidewalk at the Deming residence.  
She said when she passed by the home at 7 that evening, she saw two different vehicles parked on the sidewalks.  
"I drove straight to the Taylor County Jail where dispatch is housed. Speaking through an audio system, I asked to speak to an officer in reference to cars being parked on the city sidewalk. They informed me that they were sending an officer to me and to

have a seat. While waiting, (Perry Police Department Ptl. Scott) McKenzie passed through without saying a word. When passing back by, I stopped him before getting through the door and asked if he was sent to address my concerns. He asked me what it was in reference to, and I told him. With some hesitation, he said he would drive by there and check it out. I continued to wait and thought they may not be sending anyone else, so I proceeded to call communications again. They informed me an officer was on the way.  
"Shortly after, (Ptl. Jamin) Cephuss arrived and stopped at the front bumper of his car on the driver's side, not approaching me, making me approach him. I stopped at the corner bumper of the passenger side and proceeded to give him my complaint. Holding his hand to his left ear, he told me he could not hear me and stepped to the middle of the car indicating for me to do the same, which I did. I felt this was to get me recorded on the car's camera. He had not turned his engine off. I informed him we called earlier, and they had told me they were dispatching an officer. He told me I had then done all I could

do if an officer had already addressed my complaint. I was already aggravated, and this aggravated me further, and I informed him I was making a new complaint, and if local authorities were not going to do anything because of who Deming was, then I would go over their head. This aggravated the officer, but eventually it was decided that we would go to the scene and check it out."  
Holton said when they arrived at Deming's home, the same two vehicles were parked on the (side) sidewalks. She said she and her husband drove to the next block, parked in her mother-in-law's driveway and waited to hear from the officer what the outcome would be.  
She said approximately 35 minutes later, TCSO Sgt. Charles Campbell responded to the scene as well.  
"He approached from behind Mike Deming's home, stopping at the stop sign where my husband and I were standing and waiting. He was on the phone and looking right up the sidewalk where the two vehicles were parked. My husband proceeded to say, 'See what we're talking about? Thank you for coming.' With

much irritation, Deputy Campbell responded with, 'No, don't thank me. I don't even want to be here,'" Holton said.  
"After approximately 10 more minutes, the city officer drove up to us and said that they would be moving the vehicles. The deputy was still on the scene. I apologized to Officer Cephuss stating that if I had been overly excited talking with him earlier, it was due to my aggravation of the whole situation.  
"The next day, Sunday, Sept. 8, my husband and I drove by the Demings (home) on the way to my stepdaughter's house. Vehicles were parked on the sidewalk. Upon leaving my stepdaughter's house, we passed by again, and the entire family was outside with their vehicles parked all along the sidewalks, waving.  
"Deming's actions are highly unethical and totally unbecoming of an elected official, as well as illegal according to Florida law. His actions were not only arrogant, but self-serving, crazy and dangerous. It is an attempt to demoralize me, my husband and any support we may have. The game of one-upmanship

must not be tolerated in the actions of an elected official. He needs to be held accountable for not spending his energies and influence on working for the people, instead of against the people.  
Holton concluded her comments last Thursday by stating: "I am claiming Deming violated Florida Statute 112.313(6) misuse of public--no public officer, employees of an agency, or local government attorney shall corruptly use or attempt to use his or her official position or any property or resource which may be within his or her trust, or perform his or her official duties, to secure a special privilege, benefit or exemption for himself, herself or others."  
Mayor Daryll Gunter said the proper course of action would be for Holton to address her complaint to the state ethics commission.  
"So there is no action local authorities can take?" Holton asked.  
"No, the proper venue for this complaint is the ethics commission," Gunter replied.  
Deming, who was present at Thursday meeting, did not offer any comments on Holton's allegations.

provides surplus food to the needy through nonprofit agencies. In 2012, 265,311 pounds of food (equivalent to 221,092 meals) were distributed locally.

- Big Bend Cares (\$1,000) provides education and comprehensive support to people infected or affected by HIV/AIDS; 1,531 residents received services through the education component.

- Big Bend Hospice (\$11,758) provides patient /family hospice care and bereavement services. Locally, 215 individuals and families were served.

- Boy Scouts (\$1,700) provides youth leadership development and prevention programs. Locally, 84 youth participated in these programs.

- Boys and Girls Club (\$102,000) provides activities and education for local youth with 524 local participants.

- Brehon (\$5,000) provides shelter for homeless, pregnant women and services for at risk families. Locally, 193 clients were served.

- Children's Home Society (\$2,000) provides comprehensive services for children and families, including adoption, crisis pregnancy services and child abuse; 34 children were served in the Early Steps Program.

- Early Learning Coalition (\$20,000) provides quality child-care, including assistance with low income working parents; 104 children received services last year.

- Elder Care Services (\$1,500) provides the Senior Volunteer Program

offering individuals 55 and older opportunities to become involved in community work. One senior was trained and became involved.

- Fellowship of Christian Athletes (\$8,000) provides a "powerful, positive and effective program to produce tomorrow's leaders with great, Godly character." Locally, 443 middle and secondary students participated.

- Girl Scouts (\$2,500) provides programs encouraging healthy lifestyles and camp

experiences; 99 girls participated.

- Needy School Children's Fund (\$3,500) provides such basic items as clothing, shoes, medicine and more, as well as basic school supplies; 287 children were assisted through the program.

- Refuge House (\$30,200) provides assistance to victims of domestic and sexual violence, including safe shelter and a 24-hour crisis hotline.

- Taylor County 4-H Foundation (\$5,000) provides nutritionally

approved weekend meals for needy kindergarten and elementary students. Each backpack is filled with food for a family of four. During the 2012-13 school year, 80 to 100 students were served.

- Taylor County Senior Services (\$55,000) provided 14,844 congregate meals, 3500 home-delivered meals and other services to more than 351 clients during this calendar year.

- Taylor County Leadership Council (\$7,000)

operates a food pantry at the Jerkins Community Center where it distributes food supplies to more than 250 families a month. They are a distribution site for America's Second Harvest and USDA commodities.

- Healthy Start Coalition will receive \$99.45 in designated funds to provide services.

- Special Olympics will receive \$735.93 in designated funds to provide services.

## County to finalize budget Monday

The Taylor County Commission held the second of its two hearings on its 2013-14 budget Monday evening, approving several items but continuing its decision on the budget and property tax millage rates until Monday, Sept. 23.

At the start of Monday's hearing, Finance Director Tammy Taylor notified the board that there had been an error in the advertisement published in Sept. 13 edition of the **Perry News-Herald** where it listed the tentative millage rates approved by the board last week.

Due to the error, the advertisement will be rerun in today's **Perry News-Herald** with the hearing continued until Monday, beginning at 6 p.m. at the Courthouse Annex on Green Street.

The commission did approve the county's solid waste assessment at \$140, which is the same as the current level, as well as the solid waste assessment on RVs and active RV power poles at \$46.67, also the current rate.

The board also approved non-ad valorem assessments on a series of subdivisions, including Warrior Creek, Dearwood at the Beaches, Ocean Pond, Strickland's Landing, Oakridge Estates Unit One, Bowden, Steinhatchee Acres, Gulf Coast Estates and Scallop Bay.
