

## Suspect testifies he has no memory of shooting

# McNutt: 'the lights went out'

Paul McNutt, 71, testified in his own defense Thursday morning telling the jury his side of the story and the series of events Dec. 5, 2011, that resulted in the death of two men and the maiming of a third.

The accused double-murderer spent nearly 90 minutes on the stand, answering a series of questions that drew a picture of a once-neighborly relationship between his family and the Spees. It was a relationship, he said, which deteriorated as conflict over a 30-foot dirt road escalated.

The conflict began, he said, shortly after he and his wife purchased the home on Johnson-Stripling Road they had previously rented.

McNutt described "anger" that arose from the Spees family, anger he said was expressed through intentional speeding up and down the road that was built on a 30-foot easement of his property and led to a group of homes owned (and occupied) by the Spees.

He said much of the hostility came from Lee Spees III, the grandson of Lee and Connie Spees Sr.

"He would stop and I wouldn't want to repeat the language he was hollering toward us (he and his wife, Diane)," McNutt testified.

On the day of the shooting which claimed the lives of Lee Spees Sr. and his son, Lee Spees Jr., McNutt said he and his wife were in a hurry to get over to his daughter's home for dinner. (A second son, David Spees, was critically injured during the shooting incident.)

"Did something happen that day to cause you to call the law?" his attorney, Cliff Davis asked.

"Yes, sir. We have to use the easement too. I came out and saw there were ruts in the road from where they (members of the Spees family) had pulled a tree over it. They had cut a string I had put up and left

# Commission, DMH board debate lease

The Taylor County Commission spent more than an hour Tuesday evening discussing a proposed new lease agreement between the county and Doctors' Memorial Hospital (DMH) Board of Directors for the

continued operation of the hospital.

A number of DMH board members were present for Tuesday's workshop as commissioners talked about the lease and the hospital. Much of the discussion

once again centered on a proposed clause in the lease which would give DMH the authority to partner or participate with a regional health care system, with the resulting partnership having the authority to appoint

additional members to the DMH board.

By the end of the discussion, the commissioners were able to reach an agreement, at least amongst themselves, on most of the other issues

raised about the lease agreement during the workshop, including the perceived need for DMH to partner with another entity to help sustain its operation.

# Rep. Southerland: D.C. is a place where truth is relative

U.S. Rep. Steve Southerland spoke to the Perry Rotary Club this week, discussing Washington, D.C., and its political divides, not in the usual terms of Republicans versus Democrats, but those

who believe in "absolute truth" versus those he called "relativists."

He began his talk by saying he was thankful that Taylor County remained in his district following last year's state redistricting

efforts, calling the county a "home base of sorts" when he visits the eastern portion of his district.

"You've been absolutely fabulous to us," he said to the 40 people in attendance. Southerland was first

elected to Florida's second congressional district in 2010 and was re-elected last year to a second term.

## Remember when...

### How hard is it to take a photo?

Who knew that the hardest part of writing and publishing a book would be taking an author photo? Well, at least for me, it has been.

Two and a half months from now, my novel, *Our First Love*, will make its second debut, but unlike 2008 when I self-published the novel and released it only in North Florida, my new editor and publisher are thinking globally with the December 2013 debut.

Since my editor, Zane, acquired two of my novels' publishing rights for Simon & Schuster, I've been busy completing a list of assigned tasks in preparation for the first novel's fall 2013 release.

The first task was to read the book again. I wrote the book in 2006 and 2007, and I had not read it since 2008, so I needed to refresh my memory. Before I could re-read the book, my publishing director, Charmaine, emailed me a six-page Author's Tip Sheet filled with questions that needed to be answered from the author's perspective. The questions were about the novel's storyline, target audience, marketing strategies and history. I read the novel overnight then began completing the tip sheet.

As soon as the tip sheet was done, I was contacted by a cover designer from the company who had his own questions about the novel, as well as ideas about the novel's cover. Two weeks later, he sent me three versions of the cover and asked me to choose the one I liked best.

After I made my choice, Charmaine asked, "When can we expect an author photo?"

"An author photo?" I asked, glancing down at the last item on my "To-Do List."

"We don't need it right away," Charmaine responded. "But, we'll need it by the first of October when the book goes to print."

I breathed a sigh of relief. A friend who was sitting nearby and privy to this exchange asked, "You act like you're scared to take a picture. What's with that?"

"I'm not scared," I said. "I just need time to get ready. I have to tone up. Drink more water. Get more rest. And get a hair cut so I can look like an author."

That was back in April. The first of October is next week, and I still don't look like an author.

I've completed all the other tasks on my "To-Do List." I've set up my author page on the Simon & Schuster web portal. I've read and approved two edited proofs of the book. And I've completed my first magazine interview for an entertainment magazine, "The Promoter."

Back in August, after sensing my reluctance to take my author photo, the same friend tried to motivate me by telling me to Google "Our First Love" and "Anthony Lamarr." I did and discovered that even though the book doesn't go on sale until December, it is being set up in traditional and online bookstores all over the United States and in places like Canada, England, France, Australia, Germany and Japan. I also came across an article in Publisher's Weekly about fall 2013's most anticipated romance novels, and lo and behold, there was "Our First Love" by Anthony Lamarr.

"You need to get ready and take that photo," he said, "because it's going to be seen all over the world."

I don't mind people everywhere reading what I write, but the idea of my photo being seen all over, terrifies me. So, instead of motivating me, my friend scared me into joining the gym the next day. Unfortunately, I was scared enough to sign up but not enough to show up.

So, with only a few more days before the Oct. 1 deadline to submit the author photo to my publisher and complete my pre-publishing to-do list, I turned to my friend again for advice.

My friend pondered his brain for a few seconds then advised, "Your picture is going on the back of the book, not the front. So nobody expects you to look like Fabio."

"But it wouldn't hurt if I could channel Fabio," I responded.

"Well, you have three days to take that picture," he grinned and said. "Get to channeling."

some pretty deep ruts in the road. I called the officer to come verify (the damage/ruts) and where they came from. We were running late but when Diane got home from work I asked her to go walk on the road and look at the ruts while I walked our dog. As we got to the end of the easement, she walked to the corner (of the property line) to verify where the tracks went (onto the Spees property). As she walked to the corner, here comes people who streamed out all around her, bumping and grinding, pushing and shoving," McNutt said.

He related that the group of people included Lee Sr., Lee Jr., David Spees and his fiancée Dana Ellison.

"They just came out in rush, almost like they were waiting on us," McNutt said.

A verbal argument arose between the individuals and McNutt said he stood off to the side of the group, on his property line, and did not

get involved.

However, as the argument progressed McNutt said he felt a "spell coming on" and that he needed the medicine he took to control episodes he described as "seizures."

He said, "I heard Mr. Spees Sr. say, 'I'm tired of this stuff. I will kill the "b" and then he turned and started pulling up the (fence) stakes. At that time I realized I was in trouble and I needed to get my medicine."

McNutt said he has a medical condition—a chemical imbalance—which is triggered whenever he becomes overly emotional or stressed.

"I knew I had to get to the house and get my medicine. I turned and was walking to the house when I heard a blood-curdling scream that I knew was Diane. The last thing I heard was her saying, 'Paul, help me' and the lights went out. The last thing I remember was her plea for help. The next time I knew anything was the next day when I woke up in the (jail) cell

still in my regular clothes and the officer told me to come out and get changed because I was going to be charged with murder. I thought she was teasing me.

"I had no idea why I was there. I thought she was cutting up with me. I was still in a daze," McNutt said.

Under cross-examination, Assistant State Attorney John Weed challenged McNutt's statement regarding his wife's distinctive scream by playing a portion of an audio recording taken at the time of the shooting.

"Where is the scream?" Weed asked.

"There's too much commotion. It was before then," McNutt said.

Closing arguments in the case were presented Thursday afternoon and the jury was excused to begin its deliberations at 3:55 p.m.

A verdict had not been returned as of presstime; the final judgment will be posted to the newspaper's website ([www.perrynewspapers.com](http://www.perrynewspapers.com)) once it is returned.

transported to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital.

Kaufman was cited for careless driving.

My wonderful sister-in-law, Pat Rowell, invited me and others to breakfast last week. She served the most delicious quiche. Here's the recipe. I know you will want to try it.

### Sausage Quiche

1 lb. Jimmy Dean sausage, cooked and well drained  
1-1/2 c. shredded Swiss cheese  
2 t. diced onions  
1/4 c. chopped green bell peppers  
1/4 c. chopped red bell peppers  
4 large eggs  
1 c. light cream (may substitute with milk)  
1 deep dish pie shell  
Mix cooked sausage and cheese. Beat eggs and cream/milk together. Combine onions, peppers, sausage and egg mixture. Pour into pie shell and bake in a 375 degree pre-heated oven for 40-45 minutes or until quiche is set.

That's all for now. Lord willing I'll see you back here in two weeks.



Trout continue to bite for those fishing out of Keaton Beach. Live pinfish and shrimp under Cajun Thunders plus Rapala Husky Jerk plugs all took nice limits of trout last weekend.

David Bosch of Tifton, Ga., fished Saturday with David Stewart, also of Tifton. They picked up a limit of trout and a wide variety of "others." Bosch topped the box with a 21-inch trout and a couple at 19.5 inches. Most of the trout were caught on pins (pinfish) under Cajuns in 3.5 - 5 feet of water. The water temps held steady at

80 degrees.

Here are a couple of reports from Keaton Beach Marina:

Justin and Ed Davidson of Americus, Ga., fished last Thursday and had 8 trout over 17 inches long, with one 23-incher to top off their stringer. Then Friday, they limited out on trout in under 2 hours using Rapala's Husky Jerk plugs in 7-8 feet of water.

Phillip Sellers and Keith Pittman of Plainville, Ga., fished for three days last weekend and caught 28 trout to 25 inches and one Spanish while fishing with live shrimp under Cajuns.

### New bass rule for Lake Jackson

A new largemouth bass harvest regulation is in effect on Lake Jackson, just north of Tallahassee. An angler on Jackson can now keep up to five bass a day, with one of the five bass exceeding 16 inches in length.

The old regulation on Lake Jackson prohibited anglers from keeping or harvesting smaller bass, most of which are male and

now make up a large part of the lake's bass population. The former rule also allowed the taking of largemouth bass over 18 inches, which are typically female "trophy fish" that bass anglers love to catch.

"The rule change will allow the needed harvest of some of these smaller bass," said Chris Paxton, Regional Fisheries Biologist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife

Conservation Commission. "Allowing the harvest of these abundant smaller bass will reduce competition for the available forage. Increasing the abundance of food for fish that are 14, 15 and 16 inches will enable them to grow faster."

Paxton said that the majority of the 419 anglers (96 percent) interviewed in 2011 who fished Lake Jackson supported a move to the current regulation.

Lake Jackson normally covers about 4,000 acres but currently is 2,000 acres. The water level is about 3 feet lower than historic full pool. As a result, access is limited to a few ramps and to those using smaller boats about 16 feet or less in length.

Currently, the best ramps are the ones at Crowder Road Landing and U.S. 27 (North Monroe Street). Some boat ramps, such as Miller Landing, may require the use of a four-wheel drive vehicle.

## 'Prisoners' is powerful with some of best performances of the year

There are very, very few acts, if any at all, more horrendous and horrifying than violence against children. Regardless of our divides, we can always come together against those who would commit such atrocities.

It's something we never want to even think about happening to someone we love, yet time after time we become obsessed with the latest missing child on the national news cycle.

Additionally, television procedurals such as "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit" and "Criminal Minds" have presented dozens of fictional cases as the heroes try to find the monsters in the dark and ensure they face justice. They have also been among TV's highest rated programs.

As an admitted fan of both shows, I can't help but wonder sometimes at the idea of gaining entertainment value with such stories.

I keep coming back each week and enjoy the shows, so don't expect an answer to the question from me, but it was a question I was asking myself when I was preparing to watch the film "Prisoners," a powerful drama about two fathers and one police officer dealing with the abduction of a pair of little girls.

From Canadian director Denis Villeneuve, "Prisoners" is gripping and shocking, with one of the best top-to-bottom casts I've seen this year. There are movies you can go into and simply enjoy them for their entertainment value, but this is not one of them. This is a film that you simply experience, letting it wash over you. I left emotionally drained at the end of its two-and-a-half-hour runtime, but convinced I'd seen something special.

The performances are top-notch, and I would be surprised if several of the film's actors are not among the contenders when award season comes around. Even with its length, the story is taunt with tension from the moment the girls go missing to the second the end credits begin rolling, with enough twists and turns in the investigation to keep you guessing. If you think you can handle it, "Prisoners" is a film worth watching.

The story begins as Keller (Hugh Jackman, "Wolverine") and Grace Dover (Maria Bello, "Grown Ups") prepare to share Thanksgiving dinner with Franklin (Terrance Howard, "Dean Man Down") and Nancy Birch (Viola Davis, "The Help"). Both families have a teenager and a younger daughter.

After a miscommunication allows both young girls to head alone back to the Dovers' house, they do not return, sending their parents into a frenzy. The only clue is an old RV parked a few houses down earlier in the day seen by the older siblings.

Detective Loki (Jake Gyllenhaal, "End of Watch") joins the case when the RV is found at a local rest stop, leading to the arrest of Alex Jones (Paul Dano, "There Will Be

Blood"), who has the mental capacity of a child himself.

Keller is convinced Alex is the one behind the girls' disappearance, but the police can't prove it. When Alex is released into the care of his mother (Melissa Leo, "The Fighter"), Keller is determined to discover the truth himself, by any means necessary.

"Prisoners" is a long movie, but the story (from writer Aaron Guzikowski, "Contraband") smartly skips over certain events that we don't really need to see, keeping the momentum moving forward, even when the film slows down at times.

If I had one complaint, it would be that there are parts of the film when there is simply so much going on that it was hard to take it all in. Emotionally I could only give so much, and there were times I couldn't decide which aspect of the film needed my attention the most. Of course, the main

worry is the fate of the girls themselves, and the mystery behind their disappearance is closely tied to that. Much of the film is also devoted to the moral ambiguity of Keller's actions, and as the plot shifts back and forth over who may be the culprit, it sometimes overwhelms the rest. Although it affects the film, it is actually a testament to the acting prowess of Jackman, who gives one of his best performances to date, and Dano, who is the only member of the principal cast without an Academy Award nomination or win.

Based on screen time and story importance, Gyllenhaal would probably get second billing after Jackman, and is simply excellent as a somewhat jaded detective who is still more than willing to give the case his full attention. Or perhaps he's just incapable of giving anything less. It is the small things Gyllenhaal brought to the role, including a blinking tick Det. Loki exhibits during stressful moments, that bring an extra level of realism to the performance.

Howard's Franklin Birch doesn't get as much to do in the story, but he provides a valuable foil to Keller's darker reactions, and the actor, like the rest of the cast, gives the role his all.

The directing from Villeneuve, whose film "Incendies" was nominated for a Best Foreign Language Academy Award in 2011, is rather sparse, without a lot of embellishments. In this day and age of in-your-face techniques, however, the film is more powerful for the restraint.

"Prisoners" is not an easy film to watch, and it is definitely not for someone looking for a simple way to kill two hours, but if you're looking for a film that will make you think, make you feel and present three or four of the best performances I've seen this year, this is for you.

The film is rated R for disturbing violent content including torture, and language throughout.

## this weekend at the movies

I've mentioned before that September hasn't been the busiest month at the theatre, with only five wide releases so far. Well, this weekend makes up for it, with three new films, a nationwide expansion and an IMAX exclusive which will be expanding next weekend.

Of the new films, up first is "Baggage Claim," starring Paula Patton ("Jumping the Broom") as a flight attendant who decides to do whatever is necessary to ensure she is not the oldest woman in her family unmarried. With a supporting cast that includes Taye Diggs and Djimon Hounsou, this one could find the same audience that made "Jumping the Broom" a nice hit. It also helps that there aren't a lot of romantic comedies to compete with this time of year.

The film is rated PG-13 for sexual content and some language.

"Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs 2" reunites most of the characters from the 2009 original when Flint Lockwood ("Bill Hader") is forced to return to his devastated hometown after he learns that his machine is still operational and its creations are trying to escape. I found the first film surprisingly funny and endearing, with a solid voice cast that included Anna Faris, James Caan,

Andy Samberg and Neil Patrick Harris. Was a sequel necessary? Nope. But I still plan on seeing what they're serving this time.

The movie is rated PG for mild rude humor.

"Don Jon" is the directorial debut of actor Joseph Gordon-Levitt, who also stars as Jon, a New Jersey guy who finds his obsession with pornography makes it difficult to



maintain a relationship, especially when he meets Barbara (Scarlett Johansson, "Avengers"). The early festival buzz has been very strong for Gordon-Levitt's first time behind the camera, and the movie boasts one of the better trailers out there at the moment, not to mention (once again) a great cast which also includes Julianne Moore and Tony Danza.

The film is rated R for strong graphic sexual material and dialogue throughout, nudity,

language and some drug use.

After a brief limited run, director Ron Howard's "Rush" is expanding nationwide this week telling the true story of the Formula One rivalry between James Hunt (Chris Hemsworth, "Thor") and Daniel Brühl, "The Bourne Ultimatum") during the 1970s. Formula One isn't nearly as popular here in the states as say, NASCAR, but with Howard behind the camera, this is surely set to be among the award contenders at the end of the year. My main hope is that the trailer didn't give away too much of the story.

The film is rated R for sexual content, nudity, language, some disturbing images and brief drug use.

Finally, opening exclusively in IMAX 3-D before its nationwide release next weekend is "Metallica: Through the Never," the narrative film/concert movie hybrid which features a Metallica roadie (Dane DeHaan, "Chronicle") sent into the city to retrieve a package only to be beset by riots, enigmatic horsemen and more, all interspersed with footage from the concert itself. Having seen the IMAX preview before "Elysium" and as a fan of the band, I know I will be catching this sooner or later.

The movie is rated R for some violent content and language.

# Discussion focused on partnership clause

Where there remained a divide, however, was over the amount of control the commission would retain over those decisions, including approval of any partnership agreement as well as the appointment of additional board members, if any.

Ultimately, the commissioners agreed to have County Attorney Conrad Bishop work with DMH Attorney Cline Moore, who was not present at Tuesday's workshop, on the wording for the proposed changes to the draft lease agreement, while leaving the partnership language as it was at the start of the meeting.

The agreement is expected to return to the commission for further discussion and a potential vote at a future meeting; no formal action could be taken Tuesday because it was a workshop session.

The language stirring the most debate is located in Section 1.01 of the agreement and states, "DMH has the right at its sole discretion, and to the benefit of Taylor County, to partner with or participate with a regional health care system. If DMH enters into a partnership, members of the DMH partnership may be

appointed at the discretion of the partnership organization. The chairman of the DMH Board of Directors must in all cases be a resident of Taylor County appointed by the board of county commissioners."

Commission Chairperson Pam Feagle began the discussion by presenting a modified version of the language, which would change the second two sentences to read, "If DMH enters into a partnership, board members may be nominated by the partnership, but approval must be granted by the [board of county commissioners]."

This sparked DMH Board Chairman Ken Arnold to reiterate his comments from last week, stating that any board members appointed by the hypothetical partnership would be in addition to the existing seven members, five of which are appointed by the commission and two by the Perry City Council. The DMH articles of incorporation and the board bylaws allow for up to 11 board members, which leaves the possibility of four members in addition to the current make-up.

"Part of the agreement may or may not involve appointing additional board members, but whomever we partner with is going to want to have control over who they put on the board,"

Arnold said. "What is the logic behind someone else appointing four board members?" Feagle asked.

"To give the partner an opportunity to have a voice," Arnold said. "If a partner is going to participate in a fiduciary fashion and have skin in the game, as it were, then they should have some right to speak to how it's going to be administered."

"I'm not saying that the partnership could not have four board members, if that's what they chose to do," Feagle said. "I'm just suggesting that we maintain some control over that. I'm a little reluctant to give up all the control to be very honest with you."

"Do you have a problem with us having a little control over who you nominate?" Commissioner Jim Moody asked.

"Our partners may," Arnold said.

"I just don't want to see a situation where we have four people that end up dominating seven other people," Feagle said.

"If I was going to invest in a business, I would want some say-so," Commissioner Jody DeVane said. "I'm not trying to give it away, but the kind of investments you're looking at, somebody's going to have some say-so."

Bishop said the reason

he raised the issue among his notes on the lease was to question whether the commission would be able to look at a partnership agreement before it was approved by the DMH board, which then shifted the discussion away from the board appointments to whether the commission would have any input on such agreements.

"I think the potential for partners may diminish significantly if we are caught in the position of not being able to negotiate privately," Arnold said.

Bishop then questioned whether such negotiations could be held privately due to Florida's Sunshine laws. Later in the discussion, he examined the statute, which includes exceptions for private entities which lease public hospitals, and it was determined that DMH meets enough of the listed criteria for the board to keep certain business matters private.

"My concern is that the board of directors at DMH maintains that 50 percent of control," Commissioner Pat Patterson said. "I personally am not in the medical field. I want those who know about medicine, those who know about the ins and outs of the medical field, to be able to make the right decisions."

"As a board member, I don't want to be in charge of the hospital," she said.

"I don't want to control the hospital. I want the board to be able to control the hospital."

"I don't have any objections to the partnership that has been explained to me and as long as DMH has 50 percent of the vote, I'm fine with that," Commissioner Malcolm Page said.

"I really was praying that we had something that DMH could partner with that would help the hospital get some strength to it, some financial stability to it, the partner would bring a lot of expertise and we wouldn't be on the brink year after year. That is my hope."

"I don't see how you can negotiate a partnership agreement with another organization if this board has to approve it," Page said. "How can you get together in a room to come up with a partnership? Well, I'd like to delegate you that authority to come up with a partnership with a 50 percent parameter and go ahead and do what you need to do. I concur with Commissioner Patterson that we have enough on our plates without running the hospital. That's what we have this board for."

"I think you've done a real good job," Moody said to the DMH board members. "I hear real good reports about your business out there. I'm proud of you. I want to work

with you to make it better. Keep going the way you're going."

"We need to have our say in it so we don't fall back into the same problems they had (in the past)," he added.

"I've got great confidence in the board," DeVane said. "They know a lot more about the hospital than I do. That's why we elected the board to take care of (the hospital)."

"I, in no way, have indicated that I want to run the hospital," Feagle said. "Nobody here wants to run the hospital. I'm not advocating we run the hospital. If that's what you think, that's not what I'm saying. I'm just trying to make sure that we are very cautious with what we're doing."

"I am pretty sure that in order for this hospital to be successful and not be coming back here every two or three years wanting money that we don't have, they have to partner with someone. I think that's a smart move to partner with someone. I'm okay with that. I just want to be sure that when we do a lease that we have thought through every avenue and at least consider some other things," she said.

"I think we need to go with a partnership, we just may not be on the same page with what exactly goes there."

# America: 'It's still on its worst day the envy of the world'

D.C., he said it is a place where truth is relative.

"Truth changes," he said. "What is true today isn't what was true yesterday and what is true today is not necessarily what will be true tomorrow. Truth is whatever you need it to be today."

"There are people who believe in absolute truth and those who don't," he continued.

"I find that in Washington, D.C., if you don't know what those absolutes are, if you are not tethered to a truth, then you are like a boat without an oar, a rudder, and you will be moved and you will be tossed and you will be turned and before you

know it, you will be in a place you've never been in your life. And that has produced chaos in your life."

"I will tell you, Washington, D.C., has produced chaos for the American people. Much of the pain that I see today in Washington, D.C., and around this country is man-made pain, because relativists, without any commitment to absolutes, have made emotional decisions in their own self-interests and thus have created chaos and an environment of uncertainty. And so, all it produces is more uncertainty."

"That is pervasive in Washington, D.C. So I'm of the opinion that it's not Democrats and Republicans,

but it's those who believe in absolute truth and those who are relativists. And by the way, they're in both parties."

Southerland went on to say that Congress is focusing on the "symptoms" rather than the "root causes" of the country's problems.

"We're going to spend billions of dollars to prevent the cough, the nausea and the fever and then we're going to complain about why we're always sick," he said. "Because we're not courageous enough to address the root cause. Why are we sick? Because there's something going on here that's not right. That's an absolute."

Despite the country's problems, however, Southerland argues against

"glass is half-empty" descriptions of America's future.

"It's still on its worst day the envy of the world," he said. "Count your blessings and be thankful that in a world of eight billion people, there are 308 million of us blessed by God to wake up every day in a country called America."

"I'm not here to tell you how bad America is. I'm here to remind you how great it is."

In Congress, Southerland serves on the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure as well as the House Committee on Natural Resources.

"I get to fight for red snapper," he said of the

latter. "By the way, there are a lot of people who don't care much for me when it comes to the fight for red snapper."

"I'm tired of people who have never fished making the laws and rules that govern those of us who do. If they'd ever come down here, they'd see there is more red snapper than they want to admit to. When I got there, I found out there was a fish survey, but not counting fish on artificial reefs. That's like counting deer on your property but not around your feeder."

"Someone finally did a survey this year and it came back telling us exactly what I knew was out there. The surveyors came back and said, 'Oh my, we thought

there was seven million pounds of biomass out there. Well's there's actually 15.'

"As a result, we kind of embarrassed them into giving up two extra weeks starting Oct. 1 in federal waters and three additional weeks in state waters starting Oct. 1," Southerland said.

He concluded his talk by urging those who need assistance with Social Security, Medicare, veteran benefits or other problems, to contact his office.

"We're here to serve you," he said.

# Time to plant vegetables, fruit trees and berries

It's official, it's finally fall! Next to spring, fall is the best time of the year to get outside and garden. Now is the time to plant vegetables, fruit trees and berries. If you have been thinking of making some landscape changes, it's also

the perfect time to plant trees and shrubs. The cooler temperatures will make it much easier for the plants to get established before the heat and humidity of next summer. It is very rewarding to have a vegetable garden in your own backyard and there are many cool-season

vegetables and herbs that can be planted in October and November.

### How to get started...

If you are starting with a new bed, here are some things to keep in mind:

Clear the site of all weeds and avoid locating the garden near trees and shrubs.

A vegetable garden is easier to plant, cultivate and harvest if it is near the house.

If possible, locate the garden near a source of water.

Vegetables do best when they get 5 to 6 hours of sunlight during the middle of the day.

A fertile soil is best. Adding organic material, such as manure, compost and leaves will help to improve the water-holding properties of our sandy soil and help to provide nutrients to the plants.

Some of the cool-season vegetables to plant now include beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, collards, mustards, radishes and spinach. Some of the cool-season herbs to plant now include basil, dill, cilantro, fennel, garlic, parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme.

# Seasonal chores: Raking leaves burns about 350 calories an hour

Raking leaves is a fact of life for many homeowners. Cool autumn weather and less sunlight are signals to certain trees that it is time to shed their leaves. A leafless tree is more capable of conserving energy and riding out the winter successfully. Trees also shed their leaves during periods of drought or if they have produced too many leaves in the summer and need to conserve water.

For homeowners, fallen leaves can be an unsightly nuisance that can stain concrete and smother lawns, especially when fallen leaves are not promptly removed. Raking is a timely task many homeowners dread. But it is possible to cut down on the time it takes to clear a yard

of all those unsightly leaves.

- Wait for the majority of leaves to drop before beginning your work. If you start too early in the season, you may end up raking multiple times and that is not time-efficient.

- Use the technology at your disposal. If the grass is still growing, you can use a mulching mower to take care of some of the leaves. The mower will shred the leaves and create nutrients for the soil and the lawn. However, once the lawn stops growing you do not want to cut it too short. This is when it is time to take out the rake.

A composting vacuum and leaf blower are other ways to make quick work of cleaning up leaves. Although

these devices may not be as eco-friendly as a rake, they can significantly reduce the time it takes to clear a yard of fallen leaves.

- Remember to rake downwind. It is a good idea to save raking for a day when it is not too breezy; otherwise, you may end up raking the same spots over and over. Handle small spots at one time and rake the leaves into small piles. Then you can easily transfer the leaves to a tarp or bag and set aside for disposal or deposit them into your compost heap.

- Invest in a lightweight leaf rake and a good pair of gloves. Being comfortable while doing the work will make it go more smoothly and quickly, and a lightweight rake won't be too taxing, while gloves will prevent the formation of blisters. In addition, take breaks to rest and recharge.

- Move your feet as you

rake so your arms and back are not doing all of the work. Think of it as dragging the leaves more so than just shuffling them around. The more leaves you can gather in one pass of the rake, the more quickly the job will go.

- Spread the work around. Sharing the task with others certainly cuts down on the time it takes to clear the yard. Have a leaf-raking party in which members of the household each pitch in before everyone enjoys a well-deserved backyard barbecue.

Although raking leaves may not be the average homeowner's favorite activity, it is a healthy one. Various muscles are worked when raking, which also is a good form of cardiovascular exercise. In fact, a person who weighs 180 pounds can expect to burn more than 350 calories raking leaves for an hour.

# Outta' the Woods: Hunting season is here

Even though you can hardly tell, summer is over.

Kids have returned to school, football is back on TV, and hunting season has been going on for a month now in south Florida. Most of us have already finished our preseason scouting, and we've hung our tree stands along well-traveled deer trails - next to a mature oak tree that'll soon begin dropping acorns, if we're lucky. Finally, the time of year we've been waiting for is here!

Hunting season still comes in first in Zone A, which is that part of the state south of State Road 70. Archery and crossbow seasons there started Aug. 3 on private lands.

Hunting Zone B is made up in part by the Green Swamp Basin and lies south of S.R. 50, west of U.S. 441 and the Kissimmee Waterway, north of S.R. 60 and east of the Gulf of Mexico. Archery and crossbow seasons on private property in Zone B start this year Oct. 19.

The line that divides zones C and D has been modified slightly this year, so please make sure you know which zone you're hunting in. The line still begins at U.S. 27 at the (Gadsden County) Florida-Georgia state line and runs south on U.S. 27 until it meets S.R. 61 in Tallahassee. From there, it follows S.R. 61, running south until it hits U.S. 319. There, the line follows U.S. 319, continuing south to U.S. 98; it then runs east along U.S. 98. And here is the part that changed. The line used to turn south on Spring Creek Highway, but now it continues east along U.S. 98 until it gets to the Wakulla River, where the river becomes the line, heading south until it meets the St. Marks River and continues downriver until it meets the Gulf.

If you hunt west of that line, you're in Zone D, where archery and crossbow seasons begin Oct. 26 on private lands. In Zone C, archery and crossbow seasons opened on Sept. 14.

To hunt during archery season, you'll need a

Florida hunting license and an archery permit. During crossbow season, you'll need a hunting license and crossbow permit. If you're a Florida resident, an annual hunting license will cost \$17. Nonresidents have the choice of paying \$46.50 for a 10-day license or \$151.50 for 12 months. Archery and crossbow permits cost just \$5 each, and all deer hunters must have the \$5 deer permit. Anyone planning on hunting one of Florida's many WMAs must purchase a management area permit for \$26.50.

And don't forget to pick

up the WMA brochure for the area you wish to hunt, because hunting season dates on many of the areas are often different from what the zonal dates are. You can pick up a copy of these WMA brochures at your local tax collector's office or read them at MyFWC.com/Hunting.

During archery season and that part of crossbow season that is concurrent with archery, you can take deer of either sex, regardless of antler size (except for spotted fawns). After archery ends, during the remaining portion of

the crossbow season, only legal bucks (having at least one antler that is at least 5 inches long) may be taken. The daily bag limit on deer is two. Bag limits for deer on WMAs can differ, so check the specifics of the area before you hunt.

You can hunt wild hogs on private lands year-round with no bag or size limits. On most WMAs, there's also no bag or size limits, and hogs are legal to take during most hunting seasons except spring turkey. On a few WMAs, bag and size limits do apply, so be sure to check the brochure for the

specific area to be certain.

It's also legal to shoot gobblers and bearded turkeys during archery and crossbow seasons, given you have a turkey permit (\$10 for residents, \$125 for nonresidents). You can take only one turkey per day, and there's a two-bird fall-season limit. It's against the law to hunt turkeys in Holmes County in the fall, and it's illegal to shoot them while they're on the roost, over bait, when you're within 100 yards of a game-feeding station when bait is present or with the aid of recorded turkey calls.

## Tips to be safe when cleaning your gutters

- Keep the ladder on stable ground, and ask a friend or family member to hold it. The ladder should always be planted on a flat and secure surface. Also, have a friend or family member hold the ladder as you climb up.
- Move the ladder frequently. It can be tempting to reach as far as possible when you're on the ladder, as you can save time by covering more ground on each trip up the ladder. But overextending yourself is a considerable safety risk, so move the ladder frequently, even if the job is taking more time than you had expected.
- Wear tight clothing. Loose clothing when cleaning gutters can easily get stuck on shutters, tree branches or other items when climbing up or down the ladder.
