FWC to appeal

Judge lifts stay on net fishing

The Leon County circuit court judge who ruled against the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) last week over its regulations enforcing the 1994 net ban amendment, sided with the litigants in the case a second time Wednesday, lifting a stay which automatically put her order, compelling FWC to cease enforcing the ban, on hold when agency officials appealed her original decision.

In her decision Tuesday, Oct. 22, Judge Jackie Fulford of the Second Judicial Circuit, enjoined FWC from enforcing the net ban amendment and adopting rules regulating marine life with respect to the use of a "gill net" or an "entangling net."

The net ban amendment prohibits the use of nets larger than 500 square feet, while FWC's subsequent regulations limited nets' mesh openings to two

inches.

"Continued attempts to enforce these contradictory provisions that exist in our constitution and the rules adopted by FWC are grossly unfair to the parties to this case, to those being prosecuted for violating the provisions and to the citizens of the State of Florida," Judge Fulford said in her order. "These provisions simply cannot co-exist. We cannot have a provision in our constitution which outlaws the use of all nets in fishing, except use of a hand-thrown cast net; and at the same time have rules adopted by FWC that make exceptions to those constitutional provision."

Within hours of the ruling, the state announced its intention to appeal the ruling by Judge Fulford, stating that the regulations would remain in effect in the interim.

Health dept. welcomes surgeon general here

Florida's Surgeon General and Secretary of Health Dr. John H. Armstrong visited the Florida Department of Health in Taylor County Thursday, Oct. 31, to promote the Healthiest Weight Florida initiative.

Healthiest Weight Florida is a public-private collaboration bringing together state agencies, not-for-profit organizations, businesses and communities to help Florida's children and adults "make consistent, informed choices about healthy eating and active

living."

While speaking with DOH-Taylor staff and local community partners, Dr. Armstrong made an appeal regarding the "number one public health threat" challenging Florida's future weight.

Currently, only 35 percent of Floridians are at a healthy weight, according to DOH officials. One quarter is obese and the rest are overweight.

Underscoring the economic impact of obesity, Dr. Armstrong stated that the costs of care for chronic diseases alone--diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure and arthritis--are "unsustainable," estimated to be \$34 billion in Florida over the next 17 years.

Bending the projected Body Mass Index (BMI) curve of 65.1 percent by just five percent from its current trajectory by 2017, could prevent hundreds of thousands of new cases of chronic diseases while saving millions in healthcare costs, he said.

Community leaders get firsthand look at inner workings of TCI

Block walls barely taller than waist-high give a modicum of privacy between the line of toilets that face an open bank of showers.

A small span of concrete floors separates the communal bathroom from the open bay of sleeping bunks. Metal bunk beds flank the walls and circle even more beds arranged in neat lines in the center of the room.

A metal locker, not much bigger than a standard tote, sits at the foot of each bed and holds all the worldly possessions a Florida Department Corrections inmate is allowed.

The inmates who occupy the bunks--and others like them in close management dorms and open dorms which dot Taylor Correctional Institution's (TCI) three compounds--come in all shapes, sizes and personalities yet share one commonality: they are all convicted felons. Their

threat levels vary on the violence spectrum.

Those with nothing to lose sleep alongside short-termers. It is the job of the correctional officers who oversee the dorms and compounds to ensure the safety of them all--and they do so armed with their training, their wits, a personal body alarm, a single can of chemical agent and the trust they must have in the department's motto "We Never Walk Alone."

The sparse conditions inside the prison gates are a far cry from the glamorized version of prison many know only through television shows and movies.

The harsh realities of incarceration and the environment hundreds of men and women face each time they walk through the gates at Taylor Correctional Institution (TCI) was front and center during the facility's second Community Partnership event held Wednesday, Oct. 30.

State institutions like

Taylor are an "integral part of the communities we serve," Deputy Secretary Timothy Cannon told the assembled group of city, county and community leaders gathered for the tour.

"In the past we have missed the boat as far as letting the community know what we do...they inmates are not in here for singing too loud in church. We have got some bad people in here. The purpose of events like this is to show what we accomplish day in and day out," Cannon said.

"We have also missed the boat in the corrections part of our job. As I have matured as a man and as a Christian, I have come to realize that a person is in here for punishment, not as punishment. The average prison term for an inmate is three years and then they are going to live back in society for another 30, 40, even 50 years. While they are here, we must see what we can do to help them

Bygone beauty

The once-proud engine covered in vines and weeds is a heartbreaking sight to any train lover or history buff. But that is just the scene captured by world-renowned commercial photographer Joseph Janney Steinmetz of Lee Tidewater Cypress Company's #16 locomotive. The 2-6-2 was built by Baldwin Locomotive Works in June 1919 for the Burton-Swartz Cypress Company in Perry. It had 44" drivers, 16" x 24" cylinders, operated at 180 psi boiler pressure, and could exert up to 21,400 lbs of tractive effort. The locomotive later became Lee Tidewater Cypress Company No. 16 at Copeland (where this photo was later taken). Steinmetz's images appeared in such publications as the Saturday Evening Post, Life, Look, Time, Holiday, Collier's and Town & Country. His work has been referred to as "an American social history," which documented diverse scenes of American life from affluent north easterners to middle-class Floridians. The Florida Lottery owes my Uncle Charles.

I'm not sure if my Uncle Charles was still living when the Florida Lottery came into existence, but he coined the catchphrase, "You can't win if you don't play," years before the lottery did.

"You can't win if you don't play," was the advice my Uncle Charles gave me when I decided I was going to quit my youth league basketball team halfway through the season because we had not won or even come close to winning a game.

Through the years, I've given and received my share of opinions. Some of the opinions, both given and received, turned out to be good advice, while others aptly fit the cliché--everybody has one. So I mostly try to keep my opinions to myself. As for good advice, I'm sure I've received more than I've given. Some of the advice I received helped me through difficult crises in my life, while some, like the advice from my Uncle Charles, changed my whole perspective on life.

Before Charles' advice, I rarely made an effort to do anything or compete in any way unless I was absolutely sure I would win. I was addicted to the thrill of winning and allergic to the agony of defeat, which put me in an unhealthy predicament, especially when it came to sports.

With the exception of my Little League football team, the Redskins, it seems like every team I played on ended the season with more losses than wins. It wasn't because the teams I played on lacked talent. Every team I was part of was bursting at the seams with talent. However, turning all of that talent into a cohesive and winning team seemed to be an insurmountable task for all of my coaches except Warren Blue, who coached the Redskins to winning seasons every year I played.

None of my baseball teams had a winning season even though the starting line-ups had a few potential Cy Young award winners. The same went for my basketball team. We had a dream team several years before Michael Jordan and a few other NBA greats joined forces to bring home the Olympic gold medal. Still, when we took to the diamond or court, spectators wondered if there was more talent on the empty bench or in the empty dugout than there was playing. Every game ended the same way in the agony of defeat. And, because of my aversion to defeat, I was ready to hang up my cleats and Converse during mid-season. That's when my Uncle Charles assessed the situation and offered a piece of advice that I still follow.

I stayed on the team and continued as the starting point guard. At the end of a winless season, another teammate and I were chosen to be on the league's All-Star team. Two weeks later, as I put my first mark in the win column, I thought about my Uncle Charles' priceless advice. "You can't win if you don't play."

So far the Florida Lottery has been unwilling to pay up for using my Uncle's advice without permission, but I'm willing to let bygones be bygones if the lottery's advice turns out to be as priceless as his.

All I need is one win. And let it be a jackpot. Then I'll let the lottery off the hook.

At a hearing Wednesday, however, Judge Fulford approved a request from the litigants' attorney to reinstate her ruling.

State Rep. Halsey Beshears, whose district includes Taylor County, has been vocal in his support of the case and Judge Fulford's ruling.

"These commercial fishermen have had their day in court over and over again each time with slaps

in the face," Halsey said Friday. "Judge Fulford's ruling has offered the best encouragement yet to continue this fight, and continue we will."

He went on to say the fight was not about the amendment itself, but to allow fishermen to use a larger mesh size so they can fish for mullet without entangling and killing undersized fish.

"They want to fish, to work, to make a living just like all of us, just like everyone at FWC,"

Beshears said.

FWC officials are now asking for an emergency appeal to be heard by First District Court of Appeals, which in turn could issue its own stay on Judge Fulford's ruling while the case continues its way through the system.

As of presstime, it was unclear whether Judge Fulford's decision was limited to the boundaries of the Second Judicial Circuit or if it affected FWC's regulations statewide.







Hey! Trout fishing is fantastic at Keaton Beach!

We had limits of trout last Thursday for Steve Henshaw of Birmingham, England, and Gary Sams of Macon, Ga., including a 38-inch redfish weighing around 27 pounds which Steve landed on 10-pound test Trik Fish line. We caught our fish on live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders.

Friday, I took Phyllis Newport of Perry out with her sons Richard and Roby on her "birthday" trip and we had 20 trout of which the top ten weighed 26 pounds! Roby caught his share on Assassin 5-inch Shads in Croaker Shad, Sweet Pea and Clear/Gold rigged under an original Cajun Thunder, while Richard and his mom used live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders to land their trout. Richard also caught a fine 26.9-inch redfish on a live pinfish. Oh and Phyllis took the top honors with the largest trout, a 23-plus inch beauty!

Plenty of trout have been caught on plugs. Billy Sims, down from Atlanta for two weeks, has been limiting out for his buddies while throwing topwater baits in less than 2 feet of water -- the whole time.

Bill Pillow fished with me last Wednesday and we

caught nine trout on those "\$1.98 plugs" in less than 3 feet of water.

David Bosch of Tifton, Ga., fished four days last week with David Stewart of Tifton, Bubba (Adel) and Big Show (Tifton). They picked up limits of trout each day with a couple of slot reds thrown in and some Spanish. Bubba picked up a nice 5-pound Spanish.

Lee Crowe of Greensboro, Ga., who had three on board last Friday including his son Jordan, had 20 trout to 27 inches using live shrimp and Gulp under Cajuns in 2 to 4 feet of water. So, don't tell me I didn't tell you... 'cause... it's time to go fishing!

'Dogs play for district title tonight

Fort White (5-1 overall, 2-0 in district) lost for the first time this season last week, as Suwannee County (6-1) scored late to pull out a 31-27 victory.

The Indians travel to Perry tonight (7:30 p.m. kickoff) looking to win their first-ever district title against a Taylor County High program that has kept them from that goal several times over their 12-year history.

Fort White High School, which opened its doors in 2000, started playing football in 2001 and has had quite a rivalry with Taylor County over the past 12 years.

In the first meeting between the two schools, Fort White won a 41-34 shoot-out in 2003. The Bulldogs evened the series at 1-1 with a 34-16 win in 2004. Taylor won the next two meetings, edging the Indians, 26-18 in 2005 and 30-25 in 2006.

After a one-year break,

the series resumed in 2008, when Fort White pounded the Bulldogs, 49-7. Taylor County got revenge in 2009 with a 16-6 win that prevented Fort White from winning the district title.

In 2010, on the way to an undefeated regular season, the Bulldogs again ruined Fort White's hopes of a first-ever district title, winning 38-21 on the way to winning district. Fort White finished as district runners-up.

Taylor defeated Fort White 35-28 in 2011 and Fort White defeated the Bulldogs, 21-9 last season in Fort White in a non-district game.

The Bulldogs will have to contain the Indians' powerful rushing attack led by tailback Tavaris Williams,

who is averaging 234 yards per game on the ground. The 5-11, 180-pound senior has 131 carries for 1,405 yards and 15 TDs in just six games. Williams also has 59 receiving yards and 62 yards on kick returns for a total of 1,526 all-purpose yards in six games this season (254 yards per game).

Fort White only has 409 yards passing on the season, as QB Andrew Baker has completed 34 of 76 passes with 7 TDs and 4 interceptions.

By comparison, Bulldog QB Daniel Wentworth has completed 98 of 157 passes for 1,252 yards with 15 TDs and 4 interceptions.

The Bulldogs have an extremely balanced

offensive attack, rushing for 1,040 yards and passing for 1,277 yards on the season. Taylor has 15 passing TDs and 16 rushing TDs.

Leading the Bulldogs on the ground through 8 games is Art Nelson (56 carries, 335 yards, 4 TDs), Darrell Cook (36 carries, 168 yards, 1 TD), Wentworth (78 carries, 160 yards, 4 TDs), Jermaine Watkins (20 carries, 154 yards, 4 TDs) and Jordan White (16 carries, 78 yards).

Moral Stephens leads the Bulldogs receiving corps with 41 catches for 622 yards and 7 TDs. Chance Rodgers has 19 catches for 255 yards and 3 TDs, followed by Jalen Oliver (17 catches, 102 yards) and Jermaine Watkins (6 catches, 76 yards).

Solid performances can't save 'The Counselor' from its faults

There are some movies which, when completed, become more than the sum of their parts, better than they have any legitimate right to be. Then there are movies which, despite the resumes and talents of those involved, simply fail to live up to expectations and leave you, in retrospect, asking, "What went wrong?"

Unfortunately for director Ridley Scott's star-studded "The Counselor," it falls firmly in the latter category.

Simply put, the film had everything going for it: an accomplished director, a cast filled with Academy Award winners and nominees and a screenplay from author Cormac McCarthy, whose novels have been adapted into successful movies such as "The Road" and the Academy Award-winning "No Country for Old Men."

In the end, the film's acting performances cannot overcome its unrelentingly morose story filled with irredeemable characters making bad decisions that bring trouble and death upon themselves and those around them.

The story follows the Counselor (Michael Fassbender, "X-Men: First Class"), an attorney who, in one of the film's less-successful attempts at being quirky, is never named. The Counselor is preparing to propose to girlfriend Laura (Penélope Cruz, "Vicky Cristina Barcelona"), but he is also facing a serious money problem which leads him to cross the line of law and order in plotting a large-scale drug deal with friend and club owner Reiner (Javier Bardem, "No Country for Old Men"). Brokering the deal is money man Westray (Brad Pitt, "World War Z"). The wild card of the group (and I mean wild with a capital WILD) is Reiner's girlfriend, Malkina (Cameron Diaz, "Bad Teacher"). Of course, the deal inevitably goes south, putting targets on everyone involved, and you can be assured that when the dust finally settles, there will be little left but blood stains and sorrow.

It's hard to put a finger on just one aspect of "The Counselor" as the fatal wound, but the evidence is there. I should note that a dark and brooding film can work, which a prime example being the aforementioned "No

Country for Old Men," directed and adapted from McCarthy's novel by Ethan and Joel Coen. It's pretty obvious that Scott used that film as inspiration for "The Counselor," but the latter simply doesn't stack up to the former, leaving those looking for a dark and brooding film with a much better option.

This is McCarthy's first screenplay written directly for the screen, and I have to say without the filter of outside screenwriters, his script suffers from a disjointed plot and a high level of sexual content that ventures in the realm of uncomfortable. I haven't read his books and I'm not attacking his writing talent, but this simply isn't a good screenplay.

We are given a group of characters, who, with the exception of Laura, let their greed and vices lead them to decisions that bring the horror that follows upon them.

Additionally, the film inexplicably foreshadows just about everything that is to come in the final act of the story. Twice characters describe horrible things which have happened to people previously, and without fail,

both atrocities eventually arrive before the end. Even worse, it's terribly obvious who is pulling the strings behind the botched deal, killing much of the tension that could have helped the film overcome its other problems.

It's not all bad, however, as both Fassbender and Bardem give very good performances, and despite the film's many defects, could still earn a possible nomination when award season arrives. It also wouldn't be a huge surprise if Pitt's name was included as well. Cruz isn't given much to do aside from being the innocent bystander, but she excels with what she has. The weak link is Diaz, who has some solid scenes, but is underwhelming in many others, which is a problem considering the pivotal role her character plays.

I went into "The Counselor" expecting a depressing story of bad decisions and suffering which would be made compelling by an intriguing story and interesting characters. It turns out I was only half right.

The film is rated R for graphic violence, some grisly images, strong sexual content and language.



Pixar's 'Monsters University' graduates to DVD & Blu-ray

With Pixar still mired in a bit of a slump, this past summer's "Monsters University" arrived this week on Blu-ray and DVD.

The film is a simultaneous case of the studio playing it safe financially and dangerous in the terms of creative integrity. Thus, I'm of two minds when it comes to "Monsters University."

On one hand it is funny and entertaining, presenting a new look at beloved characters Mike (voiced by Billy Crystal) and Sully (John Goodman) to see how they became the monsters we first met 12 years ago. On the other hand, if you strip away the typically beautiful Pixar animation and the familiar characters, you're left with a paint-by-the-numbers college comedy; even worse, it is one that's been watered down to a G-rated level.

As for its target audience--children--"Monsters University" will most likely satisfy them and keep them entertained for its entire 110-minute runtime. But simply put, I've come to expect more from Pixar.

The story begins with a young Mike on a school field trip to Monsters Inc., where he decides that he wants to become a scarer when he grows up. Flash forward a few years and Mike is on his way to Monsters University to enroll in its scarer program and finally realize his dream.

He soon meets fellow freshman Sully, but their initial encounters leave them more enemies than friends. In fact, their rivalry leads them both into trouble which threatens their chances to even remain in the scarer program at all.

If they have any hopes of reaching their dreams, they will have to find a way to work together and win the Scare Games.

Writing prequels are always tricky, because while you can depict the events which led to the people and places we've already met, the fact that we know how things will turn out kills much of the tension. This is clearly

evident in "Monsters University," where we know that Mike and Sully do indeed become the best of friends and both have become highly successful employees of Monsters Inc. Unfortunately, it is on these two elements that the film relies for its conflict.

Of course, the journey is half the fun, but again "Monsters University" suffers because the plot is essentially a recreation of just about every college challenge story we've already seen. There's the evil fraternity, there's the fraternity of misfits, there's the main characters who must join forces with the misfits and ultimately learn lessons of teamwork and friendship.

In a way, "Monsters University" is quite similar to "Cars 2"--and suffers many of the same problems--where the studio has taken familiar characters and forced them into an existing film genre with very little tweaking to the conventions.

Fortunately the college genre fits here better than the James Bond genre fit with "Cars," and that's why "Monsters University" is the vastly superior film, although admittedly that isn't a high bar to achieve.

Truthfully, I think it really comes down to heart. Pixar was the poster-child for injecting copious amounts of heart into its films, "Monsters Inc." included.

While "Monsters University" is indeed funny, entertaining and child satisfying, it simply doesn't have the heart to make a decent film a great one.

The movie is rated G. "Monsters University" is available in a four-disc Ultimate Collector's Edition Blu-ray 3D Combo Pack, three-disc Collector's Edition Blu-ray Combo Pack, three-disc Blu-ray Combo Pack and DVD.

Special features vary between releases, but include a copious amount of featurettes along with deleted scenes and the animated short, "Blue Umbrella," which appeared in theatres with the film.

and teach them to be better citizens. We have a turnover of 33,000 inmates a year who are released from state institutions. Of those, 91 were released to Taylor County. Those 91 are sitting beside you at baseball games, are in the grocery store with you or might be sitting next to you in church. Our job while they are here is to teach them marketable job skills and values they will carry with them outside the gate," he said.

While Cannon may describe himself as "just an old boy from Dixie County," he currently holds

the second highest position in the department, serving under Secretary Michael Crews.

His rise through the ranks included several years of duty at Taylor C.I. and he had nothing but praise for the administration and staff here.

"Taylor County is unique in that there are a number of job opportunities and that makes it hard to staff the prison. I know you are in a tough situation and I commend the staff for everything they do. I personally know you struggle and I appreciate each and every one of you."

To representatives from

AMETC Less-Lethal Systems, Cannon said, "you could not have a better bunch who you'll find than Taylor County...but would you wait until we have all our vacant positions filled before you start hiring?"

Additional special guests included Assistant Regional Director Rodney Tomlinson along with wardens, assistant wardens and colonels from institutions across the Panhandle.

The morning's program also emphasized the impact TCI has on the Taylor County fiscal and aesthetic well-being, pumping a bi-weekly payroll of \$669,000 into the economy and saving taxpayers thousands of dollars through its work crew partnerships with the city and county.

Warden David McCallum noted that the institution has a staff of 567 full-time employees and oversees some 3,495 inmates.

"Some 82 percent of the people who work here live here in Taylor County," he related, sharing additional figures that surprised several who were attending from the community.

"It costs \$53 a day to house an inmate and the latest count has a statewide inmate population of 100,000-plus.

"Another example of our impact on the local economy is to look at what we pay in utilities. Last year, our power costs were \$670,000 (to local provider Tri-County), our water costs

were \$271,000 (to local provider the City of Perry) and \$71,000 for phone service (to local provider Fairpoint Communications). So with just those three, the impact is just over \$1 million."

Re-entry efforts have been stepped up in the past several years, focusing on education, vocational opportunities and basic life skills, he said.

"In 2012-13, 88 inmates received their GED. We also have very successful vocational programs in carpentry and the masonry

field. "We try to prepare the inmates so that when they leave they do not come back. We are probably the only business trying to work itself out of business," McCallum said.

Once the presentations were complete, a number of community representatives took part in a tour of the prison's main unit with stops at the chapel, a secure cell dorm, open bay dorm and the vocational workshops.

Those taking part in the event included County Commission Vice-Chair

Malcolm Page, Tax Collector Mark Wiggins, Superintendent of Schools Paul Dyal, Property Appraiser Bruce Ratliff, City of Perry Vice-Mayor Don Cook and Councilwoman Shirlee Hampton.

Each expressed their appreciation for the role TCI plays in the community.

"As I have said in several council meetings, the assistance you give the city through the work crews is just tremendous and we appreciate everything you and your staff do," Cook said.

FWC considering new deer regs for 2014-15

Following months of meetings and evaluations of public preferences, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has formulated possible changes to deer hunting in northwest Florida for the 2014-15 hunting season. The changes are intended to improve hunter satisfaction, officials said.

Under the proposed changes in Florida Zone D, in northwest Florida, the FWC is looking at antler-point regulations in Deer Management Unit (DMU) D-1 that would require that antlered deer have at least one antler with two or more antler points on one side to be eligible for harvest. DMU D-1 is south of Interstate 10. In DMU D-2, which is north of Interstate 10, antlered deer would need at least one antler with three or more points on one side to be eligible for harvest.

Other changes under consideration are to shift the antlerless deer season on private lands in DMU D-1 from the current seven consecutive days to four weekend days during the general gun season. In DMU D-2, antlerless deer days would increase to eight weekend days. Three weekends would occur during general gun season, and one weekend would occur during the muzzleloading gun season.

the stakeholders' goal of maintaining or increasing the deer population while also increasing the flexibility of antlerless deer days during general gun season," Kelly said. "Deer-herd density and productivity is higher in DMU D-2, which is why we are recommending more antlerless deer days for this unit."

Hunters under the age of 16 would be exempt from the proposed antler-point regulations on private lands and on some wildlife management areas. Zone D stretches from Tallahassee west to the Florida-Alabama state line.

Kelly said the regulation proposals are based on detailed input from hunters, landowners, farmers and others during a series of public meetings, public webinars, surveys and technical assistance group meetings.

"The purpose of the antler-point regulations, both in DMU D-1 and DMU D-2, is to protect the majority of 1.5-year-old bucks from

harvest while allowing the harvest of 2.5-year-old and older bucks," said James Kelly, assistant Deer Management Program coordinator. "During our outreach efforts, we heard a lot of support for increasing the number of bucks in the population, improving buck-to-doe ratios and increasing the size of bucks harvested."

The proposed changes are recommendations by FWC staff and have not yet been presented to commissioners for consideration and action. More detailed information and the opportunity to provide feedback on both proposals can be made at MyFWC.com/Deer.

Hunting out of state this year?

Florida hunters planning to hunt deer, moose or elk out of state this year need to be aware of certain laws and regulations aimed at preventing chronic wasting disease (CWD) from entering our state.

CWD is a contagious, neurological disease that has been found in captive and wild cervids (white-tailed deer, mule deer, moose and elk) within 22 states, two Canadian provinces and in South Korea. The disease causes degeneration of the brains of infected animals, resulting in emaciation, abnormal behavior, loss

of bodily functions and death. There is no known evidence that CWD can be transmitted to livestock or humans.

The disease has been detected in New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Wyoming,

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Following the deer trail to the target

One of the most highly visible pieces of deer sign is the deer trail. Deer trails are worn paths that are made by constant use as deer travel back and forth throughout

the woods. Deer hunters can use these trails as a starting point when trying to decipher which direction deer are traveling and when. However, special care

must be taken not to leave any human scent along deer trails. If so, deer will easily pick up on this and as a result, change their travel patterns.

Doe droppings resemble little pebbles, while buck droppings are clumps.

Deer will typically choose their travel paths based on cover, hunting pressure, the lay of the land and sometimes wind direction. When trying to decide where to set your treestand, consider where the deer are bedding and feeding and simply set up in the highest odd location in between. A mature buck's often preferred travel route can typically be found in heavy cover. Immature deer are less likely to use such areas as primary travel routes unless pressure is very high. Deer droppings mean one thing...deer are in the area. Deer normally defecate wherever they feel most relaxed and comfortable. Therefore, when you find an area with a great deal of fresh droppings on the ground, this could be an area of interest.

Deer trails are worn paths that are made by constant use as deer travel back and forth throughout the woods. Deer hunters can use these trails as a starting point when trying to decipher which direction deer are traveling and when. Trails that have been pounded into the ground provide great insight on buck movements.


Many deer hunters will dismiss the importance of

deer droppings, but they are a vital component to the overall deer puzzle. In the spring and summer months, deer will be feeding on watery vegetation which will make their droppings moist, light in color and clumpy. During the winter, deer will be feeding on much drier food such as

scorns and branches and twigs. This will make droppings much darker with a somewhat dry texture.

Overall size of the droppings can determine sex of the deer. Large droppings typically come from a buck, and smaller from does and

The line that divides zones C and D has been modified slightly this year, so please make sure you know which zone you're hunting in.

The line still begins at U.S. 27 at the (Gadsden County) Florida-Georgia state line and runs south on

U.S. 27 until it meets S.R. 61 in Tallahassee.

From there, it follows S.R. 61, running south until it hits U.S. 319. There, the line follows U.S. 319, continuing south to U.S. 98; it then runs east along U.S. 98. And here is the part that changed.

The line used to turn south on Spring Creek Highway, but now it continues east along U.S. 98 until it gets to the Wakulla River, where the river becomes the line, heading south until it meets the St. Marks River and continues downriver until it meets the Gulf.

Kansas, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Montana, South Dakota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Michigan, Virginia, Missouri, North Dakota, Maryland and Texas. It has also been detected in Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada, and in South Korea.

Hunters need to know that it is against the law to bring into Florida whole carcasses of any cervid from any of the above-listed areas. The purpose of this measure is to prevent


CWD from being brought into the state. The infective agent, called a prion, can be accidentally deposited into the environment, where it can persist for years and can infect other deer. Many states have a prohibition similar to Florida's in place.

It is OK, however, to bring into Florida deboned or processed meat, hides, finished taxidermy mounts, cleaned skulls, antlers and teeth from any of these places, as long as all soft tissue has been removed.

If anyone sees a sickly, extremely skinny deer (see photo at MyFWC.com/CWD), he or she should report its location to the toll-

free CWD hotline: 866-293-9282. Hunters who harvest such a deer should not handle it but call the CWD hotline.

Dove season re-opens Nov. 16

The first phase of dove season closed on Oct. 28 but will re-open for the second phase on Nov. 16. Legal to take are mourning and white-winged doves. The shooting hours are from 12 noon until sunset in the first phase and from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset in the second (Nov. 16-Dec. 1) and third (Dec. 14-Jan. 12) phases. The daily bag limit is 15 birds with 45 in possession.

Waterfowl permitted at most water bodies with public access

In general, waterfowl hunting in Florida is permitted on any water body that has public access, unless it is closed for a specific reason, such as being in a park or in an

area where the discharge of firearms is prohibited. Wildlife management areas (WMAs), water management district (WMD) lands and national wildlife refuges (NWRs) that offer duck hunting may have special permit requirements and restrictions on when and where you can hunt. Regional offices of the FWC can provide additional information on WMAs and other duck hunting areas.

Please check with local law enforcement agencies for specific firearm discharge regulations on public water bodies prior to hunting. 2013-2014 Waterfowl Season Dates: Regular Season (Ducks, Coots, and Light Geese) - Nov. 23 - Dec. 1, 2013 and Dec. 7, 2013 - Jan. 26, 2014. Regular Season Canada Goose - Nov. 23, 2013 - Jan. 30, 2014; Youth Duck and Goose - Feb. 1 and 2, 2014.

Wild hogs fair game year-round on private property

You can hunt wild hogs on private lands year-round with no bag or size limits. On most WMAs, there's also no bag or size limits, and hogs are legal to take during most hunting seasons except spring turkey. On a few WMAs, bag and size limits do apply, so be sure to check the brochure for the specific area to be certain.



While the first phase of dove season closed Oct. 28, two more phases remain, between Nov. 16 and Dec. 1 and between Dec. 14 and Jan. 12. The daily bag limit is 15 birds with 45 in possession.

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2. **Treat** every firearm with the same respect due a loaded firearm.
3. **Identify** your target and what is beyond it. Know the identifying features of the game you hunt.
4. **Be sure** the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the firearm you are carrying.
5. **Unload** firearms when not in use. Leave the actions open. Firearms should be carried empty in cases to and from shooting areas.
6. **Never** point a firearm at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with a firearm.
7. **Never** climb a fence or tree, or jump a ditch or log, with a loaded firearm. Never pull a firearm toward you by the muzzle.
8. **Never** shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. During target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
9. **Store** firearms and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.
10. **Avoid** alcoholic beverages or other mood-altering drugs before or while shooting.

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Four hunters arrested for killing deer on Eglin Air Force Base out of season

Four residents from Okaloosa and Walton counties are facing multiple charges for killing at least seven deer at night on Eglin Air Force Base, two of them large trophy bucks in velvet. Justin Leon Bailey (DOB 09/25/90), Niceville; William Cody Meakin (DOB 12/07/89), Mossy Head; and 16- and 17-year-old juveniles from Niceville are each charged with taking or killing deer during the closed season, discharging a firearm from a public roadway and willful and wanton waste of wildlife.

Each of the charges is a first-degree misdemeanor, punishable by up to a \$1,000 fine and one-year imprisonment.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) law enforcement officers began receiving calls immediately after two deer, one of them minus the head, were found on private property adjacent to Northwest Florida State College in Niceville in

August. "The suspects were sending Facebook posts to each other, and the posts were then circulated," said Lt. Mark Hollinhead, an FWC law enforcement supervisor.



Hollinhead said the deer were killed at night along Highway 85 in the Duke Field area of Eglin. Highway 85 runs from Niceville to Crestview.

"The thing about this case is the suspects didn't use any of the meat from any of the deer. They simply left the animals to rot," Hollinhead said. "The

suspects did remove the velvet antlers of two large trophy bucks but they got rid of the antlers when they heard we were conducting an investigation."

According to Hollinhead, the racks were clearly shown in the Facebook posts and would likely measure in the 120s to 130s on the Boone and Crockett measuring system. The racks were supposedly tossed in the Yellow River and have not been recovered.

Two rifles reportedly used by the suspects have been seized as evidence.

Florida is one of 39 states participating in the Wildlife Violator Compact. Depending on the outcome of the court case, Florida statutes allow for a three-year in-state license suspension, that will also apply to all states that are members of the Compact.

Eglin AFB authorities also have the option of preventing the four from being on the base for up to 60 months.

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Making sure public lands are safe for the public

Across the nearly six million acres in Florida's wildlife management area (WMA) system, officers with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) can be found atop buggies, operating all-terrain vehicles, in patrol trucks and on foot. One part of their job is to patrol public lands.

This time of year, many hunters are also in the woods too, scouting or enjoying archery season, and other nature-lovers are taking advantage of the cooler weather.

Through state, federal and private partnerships, Florida boasts many diverse and exciting public hunting opportunities. The FWC encourages adults and children to get out and enjoy all the state has to offer,

and its officers make sure that people do so safely and responsibly.

"We want people to be safe outdoors and the resources to be around for generations to come," said the FWC's

Safety while hunting is of paramount importance, which is why hunter safety courses are required for most

hunters. FWC officers make sure all bag and size limits are followed, appropriate methods and equipment are used, and that hunters are hunting during the right hours and possess the necessary license and permits.

"We also check that all users, not just hunters, are being safe and responsible in our WMAs," Wass de Czege said. "They should be operating on open roads or trails, staying off closed roads, following speed limits and showing courtesy to others."

As more people hit the woods this fall, FWC officers may set up surveillance and plain-clothes details and use radar devices to accomplish this. Also, they are just a phone call away if people find themselves in need of assistance.

Violations involving licenses and permits could warrant a \$50 fine plus the

cost of the license. Penalties can escalate for people with recent previous violations. Some hunting and other violations can lead to more serious consequences, including higher fines and even jail time.

"If you follow all posted information and treat others and the resources with respect, you will be setting yourself up for a great time in the outdoors," Wass de Czege said.

All safety precautions and resource laws are of vital importance, on both public and private lands. Those hunting on public lands just need to remember a few extra things:

Do not consume alcohol or use illegal drugs.

Pick up all belongings; don't litter; preserve paradise.

Only build fires of appropriate materials at recognized campsites and

thoroughly extinguish flames and embers before leaving.

Be sure of the specific rules for the area in which you plan to visit. You can go to MyFWC.com/Hunting and click on "WMA Brochures" for more information.

Hunter safety course required for anyone born after June 1, 1975

Anyone born on or after June 1, 1975, and 16 years or older, must pass a hunter safety course before purchasing a hunting license, unless using the Hunter Safety Mentoring

Exemption and hunting under the supervision of a qualified hunter. Completion of a hunter safety course is required to hunt on military bases.

Anyone 16 years or

older and born after May 31, 1975, can hunt under the supervision of a licensed hunter, 21 or older, without having to complete the state's hunter safety certification.

Beau Turner Youth Conservation Center offers sporting clays, rifle range and fishing pond

The Beau Turner Youth Conservation Center, off U.S. 19 N. near Capps, was created to preserve the tradition of ethical hunting and active conservation by introducing Florida's youth to the shooting sports and the great outdoors. Beau Turner formed a partnership with the FWC to open the center in March 2008.

The center, the first of its kind in Florida, encompasses 160 acres

that Turner has leased to the FWC. The goal for the center is to develop a stewardship ethic among youth through programs designed to develop their outdoor skills and to instill an appreciation and knowledge of the longleaf pine ecosystem and wildlife management techniques.

The center offers sporting clays, a .22 rifle range, 3-D and Olympic-style archery ranges, nature

trails and a stocked fishing pond. Events held at the center include hunter safety courses, advanced hunting and fishing classes, volunteer training workshops, as well as youth hunting opportunities.

fawns or immature bucks. A whitetail deer's hoof print can provide a wealth of information.

The track of a mature buck is usually much larger than that of a doe. On average, a mature buck will have hoof prints of 5-1/2 inches in length or longer. This is typically one inch larger than an adult doe. A buck with a tip-to-dew claw measurement of 6 inches or more is thought to be a 300+ pound deer. It is also said that an adult buck will leave distinctive drag marks when walking as a result of not lifting their feet as high as smaller deer.

Typically, smaller deer will meander throughout the woods, whereas an adult buck typically walks in the direction it wants to reach; the straight line being the

most likely line of travel.

The one area deer feel the safest is in their bedding areas. This is mostly likely due to the fact that bedding areas are in the most secluded, well hidden areas; areas that are hard for predators to reach.

And even though it is thought that deer sleep, they in fact don't sleep for very long periods at all. It is more like resting, rather than sleeping. This prevents them from being attacked by predators while sleeping.

Hunting deer in and around bedding areas is perhaps the most difficult area to kill them because they are so highly tuned to their surroundings at this time they notice the slightest disturbance. Try setting up on deer trails leading to and from the bedding areas rather than hunting directly in them.

- (A) Must have \$5 Archery Season Permit as well as hunting license. It is prohibited to use bows equipped with sights or aiming devices with electronic computational capabilities or light (laser) projection during Archery Season.
- (C) Must have \$5 Crossbow Season Permit as well as hunting license.
- (M) Must have \$5 Muzzleloading Gun Season Permit as well as hunting license. The only muzzleloaders that can be used during Muzzleloading Gun Season are those that take black powder or a non-nitro-cellulose substitute and are fired by wheel lock, flintlock, percussion cap or centerfire primer (including 209 primers). Muzzleloaders using smokeless powder, those that can be loaded from the breech or those with self-contained cartridge ammunition capabilities are not legal during Muzzleloading Gun Season.
- (D) Free-running dogs may be used for hunting but must wear collars listing the owner's name and address. When using dogs to hunt deer on private property, hunters must first register with the FWC (at no cost) the tract of land they have permission to hunt, and all deer dogs must have their FWC-issued registration number on their collars. Copies of the registration also must be in hunter's possession when using dogs to pursue deer.
- (T) Must have Turkey Permit (\$10 for residents, \$125 for nonresidents) as well as hunting license to hunt turkeys.
- (F) Furbearers may be taken with live traps and snares, but must have \$26 Trapping License. Live traps and snares must be checked at least every 24 hours. Using or possessing steel or leg-hold traps where wildlife might be found is prohibited, unless authorized by permit from the FWC executive director. Trapping License also is required to sell hide and meat of furbearing mammals year-round, but otter and bobcat pelts may be sold to licensed fur dealers or agents from Dec. 1 through March 31 only. It is illegal to transport wild-trapped live raccoons within, into or from the state, except by FWC permit or authorization.
- (1) **Antlered deer** – Deer having at least one antler 5 or more inches in length visible above the hairline.
Antlerless deer – Deer (except spotted fawns) that do not have antlers or have antlers less than 5 inches in length. It is illegal to take spotted fawns.
- (2) No antlerless deer may be taken on that portion of the eastern Everglades south of Tamiami Trail (U.S. 41) and east of Everglades National Park; or in Collier County south of I-75 during Antlerless Deer Season.
- (3) In Holmes County, there is no fall harvest of turkeys allowed.
- (4) When hunting spring turkeys on wildlife management areas, only shotguns and muzzleloading shotguns using shot no larger in diameter than No. 2 may be used. Bows and crossbows, where allowed, also may be used. All rifles, pistols, buckshot and slugs are prohibited. This rule does not apply to hunting spring turkeys on private lands.
- (5) Only youths under 16 years old are allowed to harvest a turkey while supervised by an adult, 18 years or older. However, adult supervisors with a hunting license and turkey permit are allowed to "call in" the turkey and otherwise participate in the hunt, but they are not permitted to harvest one. Any turkey harvested during the Youth Spring Turkey Hunt counts toward the youth hunter's spring season limit of 2.
