Toy Run is this Saturday


The 12th annual Toy Run to benefit Guardian ad Litem will be held Saturday, Dec. 7.

Minimum wage will jump to \$7.93 starting on Jan. 1

Taylor County workers currently earning minimum wage will see a 14-cent increase in their hourly pay Jan. 1, when Florida's minimum wage jumps to \$7.93.

This follows a 12-cent increase this year and a 36-cent increase in 2012.

Once the new rate goes into effect, Florida's minimum wage will be 68 cents above the national minimum wage of \$7.25.

Florida law requires the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity to calculate a minimum wage rate each year. The

annual calculation is based on the percentage increase in the federal Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers in the South Region for the 12-month period prior to Sept. 1.

Downtown revitalization efforts are beginning to return dividends to local residents with more retail opportunities available in the historic district than ever before, local officials note.

"The City of Perry's DREAM (Downtown Revitalization Economic Appearance Motivator) grants really helped make it possible for some building owners to spruce up the exterior of their buildings, which in turn, encouraged others to take advantage of the grant themselves. United Way seeks best return on donations made to local groups

More than 20 volunteers and concerned community members joined together Wednesday morning for a "community conversation" as the United Way of the Big Bend (UWBB) works to ensure the agency "delivers the greatest possible return" for the money invested by

organizations and citizens in Taylor County and across the Big Bend.

At Wednesday's session, UWBB President & CEO Heather Mitchell said the organization has been holding community meetings in all of its counties, with the process

set to culminate in January with a goal-setting summit.

In the past 71 years, UWBB has delivered \$131 million to community agencies in the Big Bend, she said.

At the Taylor meeting, those in attendance included United Way volunteers,

representatives from many of United Way's 20 local participating agencies and other community leaders.

The discussion centered on what was perceived to be the community's most pressing issues and how well those needs were being met. Some of the

issues highlighted were homelessness, parental involvement and teen pregnancies.

Mitchell stressed that the problems noted during the meeting were not isolated to Taylor County and

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Magistrate gives horse owners add'l 30 days to address code violation

Editor's Note: The following article was first published in **The Perry Herald** on Nov. 29, 1928, and spotlighted two "great industrial enterprises just established in Perry."

Florida's first big contribution to the manufacture of motor cars by Dec. 15 will be a continuous stream of virgin hardwoods passing from the forests of Taylor County through two great industrial enterprises of Perry and over freight lines to two body manufacturing plants at Wayne, Mich., and Evansville, Ind.

About 4,000,000 feet of lumber from the great forests of Taylor County are already stacked behind the saws of the Wilson Lumber Company plant, the first of the two to begin operations, and soon this same air-dried dimension lumber will be passed through huge kilns of the Graham-Paige Body Corporation and rushed to the factories in the northern states.

Dry kilns of the latter corporation are nearing completion to face the yards of the Wilson Lumber Company. To make a start in the air curing, the Detroit-Florida company already has about 4,000,000 feet of fine hardwoods in stacks in the great yards. Changes are to be made so that all the dimension lumber as it comes from the Wilson company's mill will be stacked on trucks, riding elevated tracks running to every part of the yards and over leads direct into the big drying kilns of the Graham-Paige plant. By this very rapid and modern system not less than 4,000,000 feet of lumber will be moving from the mill of the Wilson Lumber Company through the yards, curing the desired time, and thence on to the kilns for the next step in the process.

The hardwood logs come into Perry and the Wilson mill from the timber tracks under a contract

for a 10-year supply, over the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and the Live Oak, Perry and Gulf Railway. The logs are being hauled now a distance of about 17 miles and about 20 cars a day received. The cars are unloaded direct to the dog chains that carry them to the saws, the surplus going into the log stack being built up to maintain continuous operation 10 hours a day.

A. G. Wilson of Detroit is president of the company. The general manager is John Shippen, secretary of the company, and the assistant manager Edward S. Shippen. The company will get electric current from the Taylor County Power Company and operates the plant with steam power generated in a fine plant with two 200-horsepower boilers. A high water tower gives water and fire protection. This water is of superior quality.

The Graham-Paige Body Corporation, W. H. Neeley

of Detroit president; takes the lumber as it comes from the Wilson mill, controlling the air drying process from then on. Its operations with the yards cover about 25 acres. In the yards at this time, awaiting completion of the kilns, are immense stores of the hardwoods of the finest red gum, black gum, white oak, magnolia, bay, elm, ash and hickory. Much of the red gum, with its beautiful grain, in boards measuring 30 inches in width, it is readily observed, would bring fancy prices in the manufacture of Victrolas, radio sets, furniture of high quality and in the interior finish of fine residences, banks and office buildings.

These beautiful woods bring a sigh to some who look upon them and understand that they are to be hidden away under the metal finish of motor cars, the world never to see and appreciate the beauty in the rare woods of Florida.

I'm going to be a rebel with a cause this Christmas.

Instead of only giving gifts that require children to move their fingers, I'm giving gifts that will get them up and out of the house. And it's not just for their benefit. It's for mine too.

Last Christmas, as well as the past several Christmases, I've awakened to barren yards and streets on Christmas morning. Children everywhere were missing in action. Instead of running, crawling, flipping, jumping and laughing so hard and so loud their bellies nearly burst, they were shut up in our houses with the electronics and "indoor" gifts Santa left them.

Now, don't get me wrong. There's nothing wrong with giving electronics and "indoor" gifts. For years, Leapfrogs, X-Box and Play Station games, cell phones and accessories, and Easy Bake Ovens have topped my gifts list. And this year, I'm going to give a few. However, instead of electronic and indoor gifts topping my gift list, I plan to rebel and put outdoor gifts at the top.

When I was growing up, the grown-ups made sure that if they only gave their kids one gift, it was something they could play with outside. Because for them (and for us), the real joy of Christmas was to see their yards and neighborhood streets crammed with children playing--to hear their unrestrained laughter fill the air.

Back in the day, Christmas Day was mostly spent outdoors.

Every Christmas morning, we woke up with my mother guiding us past the bicycles and other gifts in the living room, out the front door, to the swing set or a merry-go-round in the back yard.

An hour later, and still before the sun rose, she ushered us back inside to get dressed. When we were very little, we dressed in our new cowboy and Indian outfits then turned our yard and neighborhood into the Old West. By the time I was seven or eight, we were dressing in our new Miami Dolphin football uniforms and pads and turning the dirt road in front of our house into a block-long football field.

Christmas Day was the only time my mother, who had absolutely no interest in anything relating to sports or the outdoors, would put on a pair of her brother's tennis shoes then join us for a game of tackle football.

Some of the girls would line up along the road and cheer, while others showed no interest in the game and pushed their doll carriages up and down the street.

My grandmother, aunts and the other women in the neighborhood would spend the day going back and forth between their kitchens and front porches to watch the games.

My uncle, Mike, and neighbors, Renard and Herbert, would referee the games, and more often than not, their bad calls caused the fights that eventually ended every game.

The day wasn't over though. Every kid in the neighborhood got a form of transportation for Christmas. Whether it was a new bicycle, skates or a skateboard, by midday we were racing up and down the streets throughout the neighborhood.

The grown-ups sat on the porch or watched through opened windows to make sure we adhered to the rules they gave us and to debate who was the best rider, who would be the first to fall, and how long it would be before my brother Tony or cousin Andre crashed and totaled their bicycles, which they usually did before the day was over.

After washing up and eating dinner, then and only then, did Christmas Day move inside and we got to play our indoor gifts, like board games, chemistry sets, typewriters and our TV tennis game. This was also when the girls got to cook on their Easy Bake ovens and the boys became food testers.

By the time the kids turned in, Christmas Day had become an unforgettable and well-spent day. I can barely remember what I did or what the kids did last Christmas, which is why I'm rebelling.

Ask yourself and then ask your kids how they spent Christmas Day two or three years ago. If you or they can't remember, or if no one's face lights up, then it's time for you to rebel too and put some real playing and joy back into Christmas.

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Board re-elects Carlton as chair

Taylor County School Board Chair Brenda Carlton will retain her position for another year after she was unanimously elected by the board during its recent re-organization meeting.

The meeting opened with Superintendent Paul Dyal overseeing as nominations were opened for the chair. Board Member Danny Lundy nominated Carlton with a second from Board Member Darrell Whiddon. There were no other nominations and Carlton was approved unanimously.

Board Member Kenneth Dennis then nominated Lundy as vice-chair with a second from Whiddon. He was also elected unanimously.

The positions will run through November when the board holds its next re-organization. Both Carlton and Lundy will be up for re-election in 2014.

The board agreed to maintain its meeting schedule on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 6 p.m. in the Alton H. Wentworth Administrative Complex on Clark Street. Carlton noted that there would be one meeting during the year held in Shady Grove and one in Steinhatchee.

The school board will hold only one meeting in December and January due to the holidays. The next meeting will be Tuesday, Dec. 10, with a workshop set for 5:30 p.m. to discuss the district's 0.25 mill critical needs property tax.

The next item under discussion during the re-organization meeting was the re-appointment of Board Attorney Angela Ball. Board Member Danny Glover made a motion re-appoint Ball and Whiddon seconded. The measure passed unanimously.

Annual increases tied to constitutional amendment

In 2004, Florida voters approved a constitutional amendment creating a state minimum wage, which applies to all employees in the state who are covered by the federal minimum wage.

The state's minimum

wage was relatively static for several years after the federal government raised its own minimum wage to \$7.25 in 2009.

The Florida wage rose to \$7.31 in June 2010 after the state lost a court battle over its interpretation of calculation methods.

It jumped to \$7.67 in 2012 and then to the

current rate of \$7.79 in January.

Employers must pay their employees the hourly state minimum wage for all hours worked in Florida.

Employers of tipped employees, who meet eligibility requirements for the tip credit under the Fair Labor Standards Act, may count tips actually received as wages under the Florida minimum wage. However, the employer must pay tipped employees a direct wage. The direct wage is calculated as equal to the minimum wage (\$7.93) minus the 2003 tip credit (\$3.02), or a direct hourly wage of \$4.91 as of Jan. 1, 2014.

Employees who are not paid the minimum wage may bring a civil action against the employer or any person violating Florida's minimum wage law. The state attorney general may also enforce the minimum wage through legal channels.

Former council suspended enforcement of ordinance

In 2004, Holton was cited for the same violation and, at that time, appealed her case to the city council.

She produced minutes from the meeting whereby the council, by consensus, agreed to suspend the enforcement portion of the

ordinance governing horses inside the city limits.

No further action was taken by the council to re-address the issue.

At Monday's hearing, McMillan-Fredricksson took into account that the Holtons "may have reasonably relied on the actions" taken by the council back in 2004.

That consideration bore on her ruling to extend the amount of time the couple had to re-address the issue.

"They have 30 days in which to file a re-zoning request, re-locate the horses or seek other considerations regarding the issues," City Manager Bob Brown said.

Poinsettias the 'official' plant of Christmas was nothing more than a weed in Mexico

Poinsettias are known for being the official Christmas plant for the holidays but they used to be considered a weed in Mexico where, when planted in the ground, they can reach up to 10 feet tall! These plants create colorful holiday decorations for any home. After the holidays are over, they can be used as landscape plants.

The distinctive, colorful part of the poinsettia is not its flower but its petal-like leaves, which are also called bracts. Different poinsettia cultivars come in many different colors and shapes.

Contrary to popular belief, poinsettias are non-poisonous and non-toxic. True, they are a latex plant from the rubber tree family and they produce a milky sap that can trigger an allergic reaction to those who are sensitive to latex. But other than getting an upset stomach from eating the leaves, your pets should be fine. Besides, they are so bitter it's doubtful your cat or dog could make it through one leaf. However, some people may be sensitive to the latex in poinsettia sap, so when used as an indoor plant, it should be kept out of reach of children and pets.

With proper care, your poinsettias may stay colorful for many months. Poinsettias can retain their color until March if they are not exposed to freezing temperatures. However, getting them to re-bloom is a whole different challenge.

Indoors, keep your poinsettias away from drafts and chilly air. They grow best in well-lit areas, direct sun or hot lights can dry out the plants.

Water your poinsettia when the surface of the soil is dry to the touch. By placing a saucer under the pot you can keep the soil from getting too soggy by draining the water

it collects. Too much water can kill a poinsettia.

Placing your poinsettia on a gravel filled tray and misting them daily will help prolong the plants' color and life.

Do not fertilize your indoor poinsettias. Wait until you are ready to move them outside.

When the weather starts to warm in spring, trim the fading bracts. Leave 4 to 6 inches of the stem on each branch. Begin using a well-balanced fertilizer, and move the plant outdoors to a somewhat shaded area.

Poinsettias grow best in a full-sun location, but will need a week or two to adapt to the outdoor temperatures and increased light levels.

Your poinsettia will need to be planted in an area that receives full sun most of the day. However, your poinsettias require 14 hours of complete darkness each day for 6 to 8 weeks before flowering. Any interruption to this dark period can delay or prevent the plant from flowering.

Poinsettias grow best in moist, well drained, fertile soils. As long as the soil is well drained, your poinsettia will grow well in a wide range of soils, including sand, muck, marl and clay.

Fertilize your outdoor poinsettias once a month. In central and south Florida, start fertilizing in March and continue until October. In north Florida, the plants should be fertilized between May and September.

Prune your poinsettias in early spring after they are finished blooming, and the danger of frost has passed. Cut them back to within 12 to 18 inches of the ground. If the plants have been frozen below this point, cut them back to the live wood. Pruning during growing season will produce a compact plant at flowering time. After four weeks or

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Keaton Beach Fishing Report

Fishing remains solid despite cold

Despite many folks being buffaloed by the cold snap and subsequent drop in Gulf water temperatures last week (49 degrees Friday morning), we had two outstanding days of trout fishing on board One More Cast.

I had Zack Cook and Nathan Alexander of Woodstock, Ga., out and we used Catch 2000s and MirrOdines to land 14 trout with three over 22 inches on Friday. We also threw back two over 20 inches. Our top 10 trout were all over 19 inches long!

Saturday the w-i-n-d was up early and the Catch 2000 got us five nice trout including a 5.1 pound, 25-inch trout for Zach, the first fish of the day.

Then the w-i-n-d laid off and the water warmed up from 51 to 55 degrees and we had to resort to live shrimp under Back Bay Thunders to finish off our limit.

All of our fish came from 2 to 3 feet of water Friday and yet Saturday we caught fish out to 3.5 feet.

I would expect this week's warm-up to put the "Gulpers" back in business as well as the folks trying to get the trout to hit Gold Cordell Redfins. Tip: S-l-o-w down and let the lure rest on the surface five to 10 seconds before resuming your working of the bait.

Saturday, I saw these two boat loads of Georgia boys who had their limit using Gulp under Cajuns.

Joel Rykard of Eastman with George Etheridge of Columbus were on boat #1 and Jim Manley of Griffin with John Porter of Americus

and Chad Dennis of Eastman were in boat #2.

December brings cooler weather, holidays and hunting opportunities

There's finally a chill and certain festiveness in the air as most of us try to take time off from work to enjoy spending quality time

with family and friends and reflect on the passing year. Children will be out of school on winter break soon, and while the holiday season is upon us, so are several traditional hunting opportunities.

The second phase of waterfowl and coot season comes in statewide Dec. 7 and runs through Jan. 26. In addition to the usual hunting license and permit requirements, duck hunters also must have a Florida waterfowl permit (\$5) and a federal duck stamp (\$15).

The daily bag limit on ducks is six, but you need to know your ducks before you pull the trigger, because there are different daily limits for each species. For instance, within the six-bird limit there may be only one

black duck, one mottled duck and one fulvous whistling-duck.

Only two of your six-bird limit may be canvasbacks, pintails, redheads or scaup, and three may be wood ducks. And you may have no more than four scoters or four mallards (of which only two may be female) in your bag. All other species of ducks can be taken up to the six-bird limit, except harlequin ducks.

The daily limit on coots is 15, and there's a five-bird limit on mergansers, only two of which may be hooded.

When hunting waterfowl, hunters may use only nontoxic shotgun shells. Only iron (steel), bismuth-

FWC board repeals rule requiring venting tool

Soon Florida anglers will no longer be required to have and use a venting tool when fishing for reef fish in Gulf of Mexico state waters.

During its Nov. 21 meeting, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) removed the requirement in Gulf state waters, making state regulations consistent with rules in federal waters. By removing this rule, anglers will now have the freedom to determine how to best maximize survival of released reef fish using devices they feel are appropriate, depending on the circumstances.

The Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council removed the requirement to have and use a venting tool in Gulf federal waters earlier this year.

These changes will take effect as soon as possible. Another notice will be issued to let the public know when these changes take effect.

When fish are brought quickly to the surface from deep water, the change in pressure can cause gases within the fish's swim bladder to expand. This condition is called barotrauma and can cause damage to internal organs and reduce the likelihood a fish will survive when returned to the water.

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Disney has a another hit in the snow-covered 'Frozen'

After a rather disappointing period, Disney Animation has been on a roll of late, with two consecutive box office and critical hits: 2010's "Tangled" and 2012's "Wreck-It Ralph."

When Disney bought Pixar and put John Lasseter in charge of both studios, there was some question whether there was room for Disney after a decade of animation dominated by the folks who gave us "Toy Story," "The Incredibles" and "Wall•E."

But something strange has happened over the past few years. After peaking with the tear-inducing "Toy Story 3," Pixar seems to have fallen a bit stagnant, with three consecutive disappointments in "Cars 2," "Brave" and "Monsters University."

Meanwhile, Disney is trying to keep its winning streak alive with "Frozen," its latest animation offering inspired by the Hans Christian Andersen story, "The Snow Queen."

With films like "Tangled" and "Frozen," you could say Disney has reached its "neo-classical" period, combining the trademarks of Disney films of old--princesses and musical numbers--with a more self-aware approach to storytelling while re-creating the feel of its hand-drawn works with the latest computer-generated animation.

And while I wouldn't put this latest feature on quite the same level of "Tangled" or "Wreck-It Ralph," "Frozen" is a fun adventure with endearing characters, catchy songs and a poignant story with enough twists on the usual formula to keep the audience on their toes.

I've mentioned it before, but 2013 has not been a stellar year for animation, and "Frozen," this year's last major release, finds itself at the top of the domestic releases, in my opinion, and will most likely provide Japanese director Hayao Miyazaki's reported final film, "The Wind Rises," its biggest competition when award season arrives.

"Frozen" tells the story of two sisters, the elder Elsa (Idina Menzel, "Enchanted") and the younger Anna (Kristen Bell, "Gossip Girl"), both princesses in the kingdom of Arendelle. Elsa is special, possessing the ability to control ice and snow, but after an accident which almost kills Anna, her parents make her promise to keep it a secret from everyone, including her sister.

This promise results in both sisters being sheltered from the outside world and from each other for years, until Elsa is due to become queen. While her sister struggles with how to keep her abilities hidden, Anna is only thinking about seeing new people and new things for the first time in years.

She soon meets the visiting Prince Hans (Santino Fontana) and in typical Disney fashion, falls in love at first sight. Unfortunately, things don't go nearly as well for her sister, and soon the kingdom is bathed in a growing layer of ice.

Determined to save the kingdom and her sister, Anna sets off alone, at least until she runs across Kristoff (Jonathan Groff, "Glee") and his trusty reindeer Sven. Along the way, they also encounter Olaf (Josh Gad, "Jobs"), a snowman from the sisters' childhood which Elsa inadvertently brought to life.

With the future of the kingdom at stake, Anna must find a way to reach her sister and free the land from an eternal winter.

While Anna is the main focus of the film, Elsa's own struggles get more screentime than I would have thought, making this a true dual story. That can be difficult to pull off, especially in a family film such as this, but co-directors Chris Buck and Jennifer Lee (who co-wrote "Wreck-It Ralph" and becomes the first woman to helm a major Disney Animation release), handle both stories quite well.

This does leave the film without a true villain in the usual Disney sense--if you don't count a rather unsurprising twist in the third act--but solid storytelling and character development more than make up for this.

Credit should also be given to Bell and Menzel for their performances. Anna is more plucky and tomboyish than most Disney princesses, and Bell gives her a wonderful mix of naivety and tenacity. Meanwhile, Elsa has the more emotional struggle of the two, and Menzel does a great job, especially with "Let it Go," which could be the film's most memorable song.

I noted in my review for "Tangled," that the music and songs in that film seemed secondary; there were only three numbers, including one which was played over the action rather than having the characters "sing" it themselves. In "Frozen," however, we have a more traditional Disney musical, with the characters breaking into song on a pretty regular basis. Fortunately, everyone involved has a good singing voice, resulting in some of the best songs to come out of a Disney production in years.

"Frozen" is a fun film with beautiful animation and plenty of laughs that should entertain children and adults alike, although it doesn't seem to have that same spark that made "Tangled" and "Wreck-It Ralph" instant classics in my view.

The film is rated PG for some action and mild rude humor.

McConaughey brings a fire to fascinating 'Dallas Buyers Club'

I love this time of year. And not just for the turkey and the shopping and the holidays.

With studios prepping their slates for the upcoming award season, there are quite a few really good movies in theaters these days. While some get nationwide releases, others are making their way around the country in front of smaller audiences, but they are still expanding much wider than they would during other times of the year.

One such movie is "Dallas Buyers Club," starring Matthew McConaughey ("The Lincoln Lawyer") in a transformative leading role as the real life Ron Woodroof, a man determined to extend his life as long as possible in the face of a deadly disease.

This is a movie based on true events and people so outlandish and unbelievable they could only be real. It is a fascinating story about determination and survival with larger-than-life characters deftly brought to the screen by a wonderful cast, two of whom have to be considered near locks for Academy Award nominations next January.

This is not a film for everyone, but for those looking for an interesting story, great acting and a chance to see a part of our near history not many are familiar with, this could be for you.

As told in the film, Ron Woodroof is a Dallas electrician by trade, a rodeo cowboy and hustler by hobby. He enjoys booze and women, preferably in large quantities, and he is willing to pay for both.

When we first meet Ron in 1985, he is down on his luck and really not feeling well. After passing out, he finds himself at a local hospital, where he is given the news that he has contracted HIV and has only 30 days to live, a diagnosis the severely homophobic Ron can't at first accept.

Reality cannot be denied for long, however, and Ron sets out to learn everything about HIV to find a way to beat his deadline. Unfortunately, this is the 80s, and there are no drugs yet on the market, and the only one the FDA has approved for testing, AZT, is still in the early phases and not available to those outside the study.

The law hasn't stopped Ron before, and soon he finds the medicine through underground channels. This ultimately leads him to Mexico, where a doctor tells him about all of the promising drugs available around the world, but non-existent in the U.S. since they haven't been approved by the FDA, even though those infected with the disease have already been given a death sentence.

Seeing firsthand how much better these drugs are working, Ron sees an opportunity to make some money. Thus begins his new career as a drug smuggler, bringing in life-prolonging medications for Dallas' HIV and AIDS patients, many of whom are in the gay community.

This leads him to Rayon (Jared Leto, "Chapter 27"), a transgendered man who becomes his business partner. Basing his methods off of other groups springing up around the country, Ron creates the Dallas Buyers Club, which does not sell or prescribe medications, but offers--for a price--a membership which includes free medicine. Along the way, he also befriends a local doctor, Eve Saks (Jennifer Garner, "The Odd Life of Timothy Green").

The film documents Ron's continuing efforts to bring in new medicines, all the while fighting against the FDA which is working very hard to shut down his entire operation.

There is a frankness in the film thanks to director Jean-Marc Vallée ("The Young Victoria"), but the movie

belongs to McConaughey and Leto. The former reportedly lost nearly 40 pounds to give himself the haggard look of a man suffering from late-stage HIV and AIDS. McConaughey, known for most of his career as a pretty face, has been branching out the past two years, culminating with his performance here, bringing all of the Texas-large personality and bravado we've come to expect, but in a much more serious and controlled package. His work alone is worth seeing this film.

Leto has his own transformation in this film, and could be considered to have better odds in the support actor category than McConaughey has in the leading category. Rayon is a tragic figure, but one who is still fighting for as much time as possible.

There are quite a few reasons people should see this film, and thankfully, not the least of which is the fact that it is a powerful drama filled with heart, resolve and a little bit of Texas flare. Ron's story is about survival featuring a man who defies not only the clock, but also a system which valued its own importance over the reality of the dying patients they were supposed to be helping.

That's a message that's worth hearing, and worth seeing.

The film is rated R for pervasive language, some strong sexual content, nudity and drug use.

The dark thriller from director Scott Cooper ("Crazy Heart") stars Christian Bale ("The Dark Knight") as Rodney Baze, who must navigate

to cross him. Cooper's directorial debut, 2009's "Crazy Heart," won Jeff Bridges an Academy Award. If the early buzz around this one is to be believed, it could happen again for any number of the cast members.

The film is rated R for strong violence, language and drug content.

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

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) gives notice of its intent to issue a permit, administrative order, and Level II Water Quality Based Effluent Limit (WQBEL). The proposed permit and administrative order will require Buckeye to implement upgrades to the paper mill manufacturing process, modify the existing wastewater treatment system, and relocate their discharge outfall. These steps collectively will enable Buckeye to meet applicable Class III marine water quality criteria for the discharge to the Lower Fenholloway River. This permit authorizes a new outfall location into the marine portion of the Lower Fenholloway River that is more suitable for the salinity of the discharge. The proposed permit and administrative order authorize the permittee to operate at One Buckeye Drive, Perry, Florida an existing 58 million gallon per day (design) industrial wastewater treatment system discharging at the current location (Outfall D-001), and to construct improvements, including modifications to the existing wastewater treatment system along with an approximate 15 mile treated wastewater pipeline with an outfall/diffuser structure discharging treated effluent to the Lower Fenholloway River estuary through Outfall D-002. The new permitted discharge, D-002, to the Lower Fenholloway River estuary, Class III Marine Waters (WBID# 3473A), will be located at approximately mile point 1.5 upstream of the River mouth approximately at latitude 29°59' 44" N, longitude 83°46' 40" W, in Taylor County, Florida. The outfall includes a diffuser port that is approximately 100 feet in length and discharges at a depth of approximately 8 feet (Mean Sea Level). The applicant, as part of a water quality analysis, published a Notice of Proposed Water Quality Study, and conducted an approved Plan of Study to establish appropriate WQBELs associated with the proposed relocation of the discharge outfall. The applicant completed data collection and analysis and submitted a final technical report. The Department has approved the final technical report under the WQBEL Level II

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Process in accordance with Chapter 62-650, F.A.C., which is a means of determining the available assimilative capacity of the waterbody and establishing WQBELs for dissolved oxygen, total ammonia, nutrients (total nitrogen (TN) and total phosphorus (TP)) and transparency. The intent to issue and application file are available for public inspection at any time through our electronic filing system at <http://wrmedms.dep.state.fl.us/Oculus/servlet/login> by searching for Facility-Site ID FL0000876 or during normal business hours, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except legal holidays, at the Department's Northeast District Office, 8800 Baymeadows Way West, Suite 100, Jacksonville, Florida 32256-7577, at phone number (904)256-1700. The Department will issue the permit with the attached conditions unless a timely petition for an administrative hearing is filed under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes, within fourteen days of receipt of notice. The procedures for petitioning for a hearing are set forth below. A person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's proposed permitting decision may petition for an administrative proceeding (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, Florida Statutes. The petition must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received by the Clerk) in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000. Under Rule 62-110.106(4), Florida Administrative Code, a person may request an extension of the time for filing a petition for an administrative hearing. The request must be filed (received by the Clerk) in the Office of General Counsel before the end of the time period for filing a petition for an administrative hearing. Petitions filed by any persons other than those entitled to written notice under Section 120.60(3), Florida Statutes, must be filed within fourteen days of publication of the notice or within fourteen days of receipt of the written notice, whichever occurs first. (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate;

(e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the Department's proposed action;

(f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the Department's proposed action; and

(g) A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action petitioner wishes the Department to take with respect to the Department's proposed action. Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Department's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this notice. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the Department have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above. In addition to requesting an administrative hearing, any petitioner may elect to pursue mediation. The election may be accomplished by filing with the Department a mediation agreement with all parties to the proceeding (i.e., the applicant, the Department, and any person who has filed a timely and

sufficient petition for a hearing). The agreement must contain all the information required by Rule 28-106.404, Florida Administrative Code. Choosing mediation will not adversely affect the right to a hearing if mediation does not result in a settlement. Buckeye Florida, L.P. (the applicant), as part of a water quality analysis, published a Notice of Proposed Water Quality Study, and conducted an approved Plan of Study to establish appropriate WQBELs associated with the proposed relocation of the applicant's discharge outfall for its mill. The applicant completed data collection and analysis and submitted a final technical report in support of the WQBEL. The Department has approved the final technical report under the Level II WQBEL process in accordance with Chapter 62-650, F.A.C. The portion of the Level II WQBEL setting forth the total TN (5,573 lbs/day expressed as an annual average) and TP (839 lbs/day expressed as an annual average) loads from all sources to the Lower Fenholloway River estuary (WBID 3473A) shall constitute site specific numeric interpretations of the narrative nutrient criterion set forth in paragraph 62-302.530(47)(b), F.A.C., and shall supersede otherwise applicable numeric nutrient criteria for this particular water body segment. No other portion of the WQBEL will act as a site specific numeric interpretation of the narrative nutrient criterion. The portion of the total allowable nutrient loading assigned to the applicant is a wasteload allocation of 2,698 lbs/day for TN and 600 lbs/day for TP. Because an administrative hearing may result in the reversal or substantial modification of this action, the applicant is advised not to commence construction or other activities until the deadlines noted below for filing

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Multiple hunting seasons begin this month

tin and various tungsten-alloys are permissible.

For something different, try woodcock hunting. Woodcock season again runs Dec. 18-Jan. 31.

Woodcocks are excellent game birds because they hold well for pointing bird dogs and provide a challenging shot when flushed. The daily bag limit is three.

The third phase of mourning and white-winged dove season opens Dec. 14 and runs through Jan. 12. The daily bag limit is 15 birds.

From November on, the shooting hours for all migratory birds are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. However, you must get a no-cost migratory bird permit where you purchase your hunting license before you hunt any of these birds.

The only firearm you can use to hunt migratory game birds is a shotgun, no larger than 10-gauge. Shotguns must be plugged to a three-shell capacity (magazine and chamber combined). Bows also are legal.

Retrievers and bird dogs can be useful in hunting migratory game birds. Artificial decoys and manual or mouth-operated bird calls also are legal and essential gear for duck hunters.

You may hunt migratory game birds over an agricultural field if the crop was planted by regular agricultural methods. However, don't even think about "sweetening" the field by scattering agricultural products over it—or anywhere near it—or you could wind up in serious trouble. It doesn't matter if you aren't the one who scattered the bait. If you knew or should have known that such bait was present, you're accountable under federal law.

Some other things you can't do while hunting migratory game birds include using rifles, pistols, crossbows, traps, snares, nets, sinkboxes, swivel guns, punt guns, battery guns, machine guns, fish hooks, poisons, drugs, explosive substances, live decoys and recorded bird calls, sounds or electrically amplified bird-call imitations. It is also against

the law to shoot from a moving automobile or boat and herd or drive birds with vehicles or vessels.

Bobcat and otter hunting season always runs Dec. 1-March 1, and there's no daily bag or season limit on either species.

Like foxes, bobcats may be chased year-round with dogs, but possessing firearms during the closed season, between March 2 and Nov. 30, is prohibited. On a few wildlife management areas, bobcats and otters may not be taken, so please consult the specific area brochure before you hunt.

December has the hunting opportunities you're looking for, whether you are upland-bird hunting with friends and family, shooting ducks on the pond with your favorite lab or taking that big cat as he slips up behind an unsuspecting fawn.

Typically, fish suffering from barotrauma must be treated if they are to survive and swim back down to deep water. Venting tools are used to treat barotrauma by allowing gases to escape from a fish's body cavity.

Descending devices, which bring fish back down to deeper waters, are another, more recently developed option that can now also be used to increase survival

rates among fish with barotrauma. Maximizing post-release survival of fish is important in marine fisheries management because it means more fish survive to potentially reproduce and be harvested in the future, officials said.

While venting tools can still be a useful way to increase chances of survival after being released, fish do not always need to be vented.

Venting tools have been required in Gulf state

and federal waters since 2008. This requirement was intended to increase survival rates of released red snapper, but applied to all species of Gulf reef fish. These tools are not required in Atlantic state or federal waters.

The use of non-stainless steel, non-offset circle hooks and dehooking devices will still be required in state and federal Gulf waters when fishing for reef fish. These tools minimize handling times for reef fish,

which aids in survival of the fish upon release.
