'Major meth distributor' busted

Downtown Perry's historic neighborhood district located along the west end of Green Street was awash in blue lights Friday morning, April 27, as members of the Taylor County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force executed a search warrant at the home of a suspected methamphetamine distributor.

Trafficking amounts of the illegal drug was seized at the residence, and one suspect, Joseph Brian Stafford, 48, was taken into custody.

It was 5:39 a.m. when officers from the Taylor County Sheriff's Office (TCSO), Perry Police

Department (PPD) and Madison County Sheriff's Office entered the home at 701 West Green St.

During their search, investigators found 61 grams of what field-tested positive as crystal methamphetamine.

Assorted drug paraphernalia, including glass pipes (some used and one new), scales and plastic baggies, was also discovered inside the home's master bedroom.

"All of the items, including the drugs, were concentrated in the master bedroom," TCSO Chief Chuck Mincy said. "The

Educators' Hall of Fame Collins, Lamb inducted Tuesday

The Taylor County School District's Educators' Hall of Fame will gain an additional 71 years of service to local students when teachers Walt Lamb Jr. and the late Ruby Nell Collins are officially inducted next week.

A ceremony honoring the newly inducted educators will be held Tuesday, May 8, at 3 p.m. at the Alton H. Wentworth Administrative Complex on Clark Street.

Lamb served the district for 31 years as a math teacher and coach of various sports, and after retirement, he rejoined the staff at Taylor County High School (TCHS) part-time to fill in as needed in the math department.

He was nominated by Don and Kathy Everett.

"In all sports he coached, he would give extra time to help athletes, as needed," they said in their nomination letter. "That same dedication stood as a math teacher.

"Walt Lamb's dedication to his students goes beyond any we've ever known. He held a very high standard

that was expected of his students as well as himself.

"He had a tough personality in the classroom and on the sports field, but was highly respected by his students and their parents," the Everetts continued. "Many of his students went on to be very successful bankers, accountants, stock brokers, engineers and business owners throughout the years. His dedication and contribution to the families and students he taught throughout his teaching and coaching career in Taylor County are immeasurable when you look at the impact he had on so many students' lives throughout the years.

That impact was seen in the letters accompanying Lamb's nomination from former students, parents and co-workers.

"Coach Lamb was my high school math teacher," said Robin Gardiner Poncia, TCHS class of 1979. "I was a little afraid of him. Actually, petrified is a better word.

Steinhatchee home is destroyed by fire

A widow on fixed income lost all of her belongings in a fire that destroyed her home and an adjoining dwelling Tuesday night, May 1 in Steinhatchee.

According to Taylor County Fire Chief Dan Cassel, Taylor County Fire Rescue (TCFR) was dispatched to a report of a structure fire at 2019 River Road in Steinhatchee at 9:29 p.m.

Fire fighting crews

responded from TCFR Station 7 (Steinhatchee), Station 1 (Perry) and Station 6 (Keaton Beach), along with mutual aid from Dixie County Fire Rescue.

The initial responding crew arrived to find the home fully engulfed in flames and threatening an adjoining dwelling.

Crews had the fire controlled within an hour of arrival, but were unable to stop the flames before

they advanced and spread through the entire building — damaging both the original dwelling and a second living space.

In total, 12 firefighters battled the blaze through the night, using approximately 12,000 gallons of water. Crews continued to work the scene until 3:12 a.m.

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Spradley, Devane join crowded race for District 3 seat

Two more people have entered the Taylor County Commission District 3 race, including newly-appointed Commissioner Steve Spradley and former commissioner Jody James DeVane.

Spradley was appointed to the District 3 seat by Florida Gov. Rick Scott to fill the vacancy left by the death of longtime Commissioner Frank Russell.

Spradley will serve as District 3 commissioner for the next seven months until the November election, when voters will decide who will serve out the remaining two years of the current term (2016-20).

DeVane held the District 3 seat from 2012 to 2016 before being unseated by Russell in the 2016 election.

Both have filed to run as "No Party Affiliation" (NPA), joining Patrick C. Whitt and Ursula P. Miller with that same designation in the District 3 race.

Michael Elzie Newman is also running for the seat as a Democrat.

Taylor County Supervisor of Elections Dana Southerland reminds those wishing to run in the 2018 election that the May 21 deadline to qualify using the petition method is fast approaching.

"Any person interested in running for a local office and would like to qualify by the alternative method of petition signatures has until Monday, May 21, at noon to submit

Historical Society banquet dives into:

'Soggy Bottoms & Sandy Shores'

The Taylor County Historical Society is diving deep into the county's past for its 2018 banquet celebration — 14,000 years deep to be precise.

Florida State University (FSU) anthropologist Dr. Jessi Halligan, who discovered clues in the Aucilla River that humans occupied the southeastern United States 1,500 years earlier than previously thought, will be the keynote speaker for the Saturday, May 19, event.

The Midwest native is a geoarchaeologist and Paleoindian archaeologist who specializes in submerged and coastal settings. Dr. Halligan has been working in Florida sinkholes since 2007 and has spent several years working in the Aucilla

River at the Page-Ladson site. (This site is a 30-foot deep sink hole in the bed of the Aucilla that was discovered by a former U.S. Navy Seal named Buddy Page, who would SCUBA dive in the river to relax, and the Ladson family who owns the property.)

Her presentation for the banquet will be: "Soggy Bottoms and Sandy Shores: Florida's Paleoindians and Site Preservation."

"We know that the first people had settled in what we now call Florida by 14,500 years ago because of recent finds at the Page-Ladson site in the Aucilla River. By 11,000 years ago, people were widespread and well-adapted to life on the Florida peninsula.

HOSPITAL CERTIFIED

Doctors' Memorial Hospital of Perry was reaccredited for the three-year period beginning in January 1983, Administrator Mark Van Fleet announced.

A Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals' (JCAH) study was conducted at the Perry hospital in January. The hospital learned Friday, April 29, that the JCAH survey team passed the Perry hospital, making it one of only 37 percent of the hospitals its size to pass such a stringent test, according to Van Fleet.

The JCAH survey is tougher than the state's, tougher than Medicare's," Van Fleet said. "The standard is that if the JCAH approves you, then the state does." Of the 1,455 hospitals in the country similar in size to the Taylor County hospital, only 542 had passed JCAH inspection.

A NuGrape soda. A Butternut candy bar. And a can of Vienna sausage to eat with my glazed honey bun.

That was all the pay I received and, to be honest, that was all it took, to get me to spend half my day out in the woods, grunting and scooping earthworms for my grandfather's fishing bait business.

It didn't matter that I was afraid of my shadow and terrified of any and everything that lived in the bushes or wild. My grandfather could usually talk me into going with the promise of a NuGrape soda, a Butternut candy bar and a can of Vienna sausage to eat with my glazed honey bun.

But that didn't always work.

The "memory" of seeing or hearing something that sent me running on the last trip.

The "feeling" that the sun was planning to check out early and the moon would be checking in before we were out of the woods and back on the highway home.

And, the "fear" of getting lost in the wild -- day or night.

These were the main reasons why my grandfather's promise of a NuGrape soda, a Butternut candy bar and a can of Vienna sausage to eat with my glazed honey bun didn't always work.

When the "memory," the "feeling" and the "fear" overrode my desire for the best meal a child in the early-1970s could ask for, my grandfather usually forced me to go.

I'd try to retreat to the safety of my grandmother, which worked sometimes. Sometimes it didn't.

There was one time when my grandmother wasn't enough to stop my grandfather from making me pile in the back of his old Chevy with my uncles, cousins and brothers to go grunt earthworms. It happened after my grandfather received a call in the middle of the night about some people being lost in the woods.

I don't recall if the people had gotten lost while fishing or hunting, but I remember my grandfather's brother, Uncle Walter, driving up, then the two of them leaving to go help locate the lost people.

I couldn't sleep until my grandfather made it back home.

A day or two later, when it was time to go in the woods and grunt bait, the "fear" of being lost overrode the treats I would get for going. So, I told my grandfather I wasn't going because I was scared of getting lost.

He told me I was going.

My grandmother stepped in and said I didn't have to go if I didn't want to.

"He's got a choice," my grandfather responded. "He's going or he's gonna have to whip my behind."

I had a choice.

Love, respect and the possibility of my untimely death helped me on the back of the truck.

"You'll be okay," my grandmother said and waved bye. "I'll be here when you get back."

I was all right.

I had my NuGrape soda, my Butternut candy bar, a can of Vienna sausage to eat with my honey bun and the assurance that my grandfather wouldn't dare let me get lost or go home without me. Not with that little old lady at the house waiting for me to get back.

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County seeks grant to fund firefighter at beaches

With Taylor County Fire-Rescue having little luck finding additional volunteer firefighters for the Taylor Beaches area, the county's fire chief is recommending the county augment its existing volunteer firefighting force with a paid position to help cut down on response times and improve coverage in the coastal area.

Taylor County Fire-Rescue (TCFR) Fire Chief Dan Cassel delivered his recommendation to the Taylor County Commission last month, as he requested the board apply for a federal

grant to help cover the cost of the additional position.

Cassel told commissioners that the need is so great he will be including the position in his budget request to the commission for the next fiscal year – regardless of whether or not the county receives the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant funding.

"Once again, I'm here because we need more firefighters," Cassel began, as he addressed the board at its Tuesday, April 17, meeting.

"I'm sorry. I feel like that's all I ever talk about," he continued in a jovial manner, eliciting a few laughs from the room.

"As you remember, months and meetings past, we talked about (the need for more firefighters), especially in the Keaton Beach area. Since our last meeting, we said to go back and try to find more volunteers. We've continued to do that," he said.

According to Cassel, he has tried multiple methods to attract more volunteers, including using a portable

billboard and placing flyers at area businesses.

"No luck," he said. "Nothing."

"We are going to continue to try, but what we need to start looking at are additional ways to augment our volunteer staffing. We've looked at other options, and they're pricey. I'm not going to lie. So that being said, I've look at it and tried to think outside the box.

"Instead of hiring a 24/48 (shift) position, which is what we would traditionally do, what we're going to be presenting to you this year is trying to hire a Monday through Friday position. So, instead of having to hire three people to fill one (position), this is just one person who will work Monday through Friday, lowering our costs of having to hire this person.

"This way, we are also going to augment our volunteers – who traditionally go to work Monday through Friday and are not available. This way we can fill that gap while we're still trying to get more volunteers. We're trying to further augment the volunteers, not replace them."

According to the figures provided by Cassel, the position would pay \$12.78 per hour. When factoring in benefits and taxes, the position would cost the county around \$56,391 if they select individual insurance and \$69,503 for family insurance.

The Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant program is managed by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to "provide funding directly to fire departments and volunteer fire-interest organizations to assist in increasing the number of firefighters to help communities meet industry minimum standards and attain 24-hour staffing to provide adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards, and to fulfill the traditional missions of fire departments."

If the county were to receive the grant, which Cassel referred to as "highly competitive," it would fund 75 percent of the costs of the new position for the first two years, and 35 percent in the third year.

The county would not be under any obligation to keep the position beyond the third year, County Administrator Ted Lakey said.

Based on the figures for an employee electing family insurance coverage, the grant would cover \$52,127 in each of the first two years, leaving the county to cover the remaining \$17,375. In the third year, the grant would cover \$23,326, leaving \$45,176 for the county to fund. After the third year, the county would be responsible for the entire cost of the position.

In total, the grant would provide \$128,000 in funding to the county.

"Overall, it's a big savings to the county to have more coverage," Commission Chair Pam Feagle said.


"This is a position that with or without the SAFER grant I feel we need to start looking at adding this on for that area," Cassel said. "It's routinely been a coverage area where we don't have enough staffing. Call volumes are going up. It's not for a lack of trying. We are actively trying to get more volunteers.

"With a response time of well over 20 minutes, if you have somebody trapped in a vehicle or a house on fire. If we could have someone there in five minutes versus 20-25 minutes, we could be saving lives," Cassel added.

Commissioner Malcolm Page made a motion to apply for the grant, with Commissioner Thomas Demps offering a second. The measure passed 4-0.

According to Cassel, the deadline to apply was April 27, and it will be several months before the county learns if it will be awarded the grant. From that time, the county would have 180 days to hire someone for the position, putting any expenses associated with the new employee into the next fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1.

The board did not take any formal action on whether to create the new position, and a decision on that is not expected prior to the board's budget discussions this summer.

when the fire started, and she was able to exit the home on her own without injury before fire crews arrived," Cassel said. "The American Red Cross was called in to provide assistance,

and the Florida State Fire Marshall's office is currently investigating the cause of the fire."

First Baptist Church in Steinhatchee is heading up relief efforts for the displaced widow, Ms. Louise Marshall.

"For those of you who can

help, Ms. Louise Marshall's house burned down last night. She lost everything. She is a widow on a fixed income. If anyone has any clothing (size 12-14) that could be donated, please let us know," First Baptist Church of Steinhatchee posted on its Facebook page.

Firefighter's 'March of the Bull' is pushing for cancer coverage

Members of the City of Perry and Taylor County Fire Rescue (TCFR) fire departments are rolling out the red carpet for a fellow firefighter walking from Key West to Tallahassee to raise awareness of the increased risk of cancer and post-traumatic stress disorder among firefighters, as well as for children who have died in fires.

Tom "Bull" Hill, a retired firefighter from Orange County, is walking 650 miles from Key West to the front steps of the Capitol – in what he calls the "March of the Bull" – sporting a backpack with shields and patches representing departments with firefighters who have died from cancer or suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder.

All along his path, local fire departments have joined in the walk – many in full bunker gear -- in support of his petition lobbying the Florida Legislature to pass a "Presumptive Cancer Law" that would compensate firefighters who develop certain cancers believed to

be caused by exposure to the sorts of carcinogens they encounter on the job.

TCFR Chief Dan Cassel said county firefighters will meet Hill at the Taylor County line on Hwy. 27 East and escort him into Perry before treating him and his entourage to a meal. City firefighters will join the escort at the city limits and have also offered Hill a bunk to sleep in at the City of Perry Fire Department Friday night before escorting him to the city limits on Hwy. 19 North as he continues his trek toward Tallahassee on Saturday morning.

The "March of the Bull" is averaging 16 miles per day and plans to complete the 650-mile trip on Saturday, May 5.

According to Hill, firefighters are twice as likely to die from cancer than the general public. Florida firefighters who contract cancers that are deemed job-related by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) do not receive the same benefits as firefighters in 39 other states.

For years, the Florida Legislature has failed to pass a law that would help firefighters who contract cancer from their exposure to toxic smoke provide for their families when they are gone.

Various versions of "presumptive cancer" bills have been introduced each legislative session for several years, however the bills are often opposed by special interest lobbyists and die in committee before they can be signed into law.

drugs were found in the nightstands located on each side of the bed."

"Based on the items we found at the residence, the suspect should be considered a major methamphetamine distributor," TCSO Capt. Jimmy Cash said.

Stafford was charged with trafficking methamphetamine and possession of drug

paraphernalia.

"The arrest was part of an on-going investigation and more arrests are expected," Mincy said.

"We are continuing to seek out individuals who are manufacturing, distributing and using illegal drugs in our community," Sheriff Wayne Padgett said.

"Those of you who haven't been arrested, get ready. Keep your head on a swivel. We're coming for you."

Florida 4-H alumnus Morris Steen says 4-H is one of his favorite things to talk about. His lifelong commitment to the program shows just how passionate he is about youth development.

"The tenets of 4-H have followed me throughout my life," he said, referring to the 4-H Pledge, which states: "I pledge my head to clearer thinking, My heart to greater loyalty, My hands to larger service, and my health to better living for my club, my community, my country and my world."

"Growing up in Shady Grove, almost all the children attended the Shady Grove School. And all were involved in the 4-H Club in some way. 4-H brought structure to our lives in that it taught us how to keep records, manage our projects, compete in livestock judging, public speaking and tractor driving

on the State 4-H Council. During my freshman year at UF, I was in the Collegiate 4-H Club on campus."

Following graduation from the University of Florida, Morris entered the United States Navy and spent 27 years as a naval aviator, culminating in command of the Naval Air Station in Mayport.

He went on to become the president of North Florida Community College and was involved in Madison and Taylor counties' 4-H programs.

"My wife and I recently had the opportunity to participate as judges of local 4-H presentations

here in Taylor County. They were all excellent. It was an eye-opener to see what the 4-H members are doing today compared to what I did years ago. I would highly recommend it to any 4-H alum or any adult who enjoys and celebrates the success of our youth," he said.

Morris is currently chair of the Henry Davis Scholarship Committee in Taylor County.

The scholarship committee provides scholarships to deserving, financially needy 4-H members to attend Camp Cherry Lake in Madison County each summer.

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Cash, Mitchell go 'above and beyond' to help veterans

Taylor County is home to many hardworking healthcare professionals, two of whom were recently recognized for doing outstanding work.

Angela Cash, a licensed practical nurse with the Tallahassee Outpatient

Clinic, and Sonia Mitchell, a laboratory technician at the Perry VA Outpatient Clinic, were both awarded the prestigious Veteran Affairs (VA) Secretary's Award for Nursing Excellence for 2018.

Given annually, the

VA Secretary's Award in Nursing Excellence program honors four healthcare professionals in the region that have made a positive impact in the care of patients at a VA Medical Center.

Cash received the award after she supported a full-time provider, a full-time social worker and 19 Telehealth providers to deliver 3,854 encounters to 732 different veteran patients in 2017 and 929 encounters to 193 veterans from the year prior.

In addition to her duties at the Tallahassee Outpatient Clinic, Cash served the Perry VA Outpatient Clinic staff in many different ways, including assisting with

maintaining and backing up electronic healthcare data, and maintaining updated competency requirements many different fields.

Cash also earned a "Great Catch Award," designated for staff members who identify a potential error and prevent harm to a patient.

In Cash's instance, she was checking a veteran in for an appointment with the provider to receive a shoulder injection and, by going the extra mile to ask a few additional questions, discovered that the veteran had just received a knee steroid injection within the last seven days.

The veteran was diabetic and would have received

two large doses of steroid within a short time frame – which could have led to a negative medical outcome.

Mitchell, an Army Veteran who serves as a laboratory technician at the Perry VA Outpatient Clinic, was labeled "a dedicated and passionate contributor who goes above and beyond," when she was recognized.

Mitchell assisted nursing staff with calls to veterans before appointments and resolved patient care needs and issues.

She completed and processed more than 1,853 lab specimens without error in 2017. This was an increase of 335 (18%) of lab specimens processed

in Perry since the previous fiscal year.

She encouraged all veterans that were scheduled for labs to obtain their flu shot, complete an advanced directive or living will and to join the Perry Community Based Outpatient Clinic smoking cessation group.

Dedicated to the importance of maintaining confidentiality, Mitchell always went the extra mile to protect sensitive medical and mental health information – incorporating the use of 'white-noise' makers to decrease the possibility of people overhearing while passing by her door during the veteran's visit to her office.

"Not because he was mean, or unfair, but because he was larger than life. He was a living legend. Everybody loved...feared...respected Coach Lamb. He taught math, the subject in which I struggled. This strong-minded, sports-oriented (another area of weakness) teacher absolutely terrified me. How on Earth was I going to survive in Algebra 2 - then Geometry - with a teacher I perceived as the polar opposite of me?"

"Let's just say Coach Lamb got me through high school math," Poncia said. "I learned to relax as a math student, as best I could. He created an environment where I knew I could trust him to teach me. How funny, I came to reflect, the man I feared for being such a tour de force was actually kind. And caring. And even gentle in his approach."

"He, along with other excellent educators, sent me on to higher learning. I went on to earn my Master of Education and have spent my professional life in education. This was not a minor miracle on Coach's part," Poncia said.

"I am a 1977 graduate of Taylor County High School and had the good fortune to have Coach Lamb for multiple math courses," Barbara English said. "Coach Lamb was recognized by his students as a gifted math teacher, but he was also loved and respected by them as a teacher that cared about them and someone who wanted them to be successful in his class and in life."

"It was during those high school years that I developed a love for math and the mental challenges that come with solving problems. After graduating from high school, I attended Auburn University and graduated with a degree in Industrial Engineering."

My pursuit of an engineering degree, though rather rare for a female at the time, was largely due to this love for math and to the solid foundation in mathematics that I received under Coach Lamb's teaching."

Ruby Nell Collins was nominated by George A. Collins, Charlotte Collins, John Dane Collins and Robin Collins, as well as Sonny Bishop, Walt Evans and George Mixon.

She served the Taylor County School District for 40 of her 41 years in education. She worked at Foley Junior High School from 1939 to 1956 teaching first grade and coaching girls' basketball. From 1956 to 1979, she taught first grade at Perry Elementary School and started the first Gifted Children's program at Perry Primary School.

"A trepid little 6-year-old boy walked into the classroom of Mrs. Collins at the Foley School in the

fall of 1950," Mixon said. "He could not read, write, perform math or tell time. Mrs. Collins assigned him a desk and presented him with a cigar box. He found inside that box pencils, crayons, scissors, glue, eraser, protractor and a ruler. The treasures in that cigar box and Mrs. Collins changed his life forever. That little boy was me. Every time I smell a cigar I am brought back to this exciting and pivotal day."

"In 1950, I spent more time with Mrs. Collins than I spent with my parents and siblings," Mixon said. "She never raised her voice to scold me. Mrs. Collins' impact on my life was positive, profound and long-lasting."

"Since leaving Foley School, I have graduated from four universities with exposure to teachers, instructors and professors in classrooms in universities in the United States and around the world. During these educational endeavors, I have not experienced a teacher of the caliber and professionalism of Mrs. Collins. Firm, caring, inspirational and knowledgeable, Mrs. Collins' teachings and influence comes into play each time I strive to learn something new. Mrs. Collins was the guiding light and burning catalyst in my life-long endeavor seeking knowledge, a light that still burns bright 68 years later."

Another student with fond memories is Bishop, who was part of Collins' Gifted Children program.

"The first debate I ever participated in was in Mrs. Collins' gifted class," he

continued. "She taught us then it wasn't enough to say 'because.' We had to have a reason to back up our beliefs and thoughts. And she would challenge us on that, a skill which I have never stopped using to this day."

"Although I am 40 years removed from Ruby Nell Collins' classroom - essentially a classroom without walls - in the gifted program, I hold vivid memories of my half-dozen years under her expertise and loving care," Evans said. "In our lives, each of us has fond memories of perhaps two or three teachers who had an enduring impact. This influence can take several forms -- from a special interpersonal connection through to masterful classroom instruction. For

example, helping a student reach an 'aha' moment when something clicks, or when one reaches a new level of understanding. Mrs. Collins was that rare educator who possessed all the attributes, from personal to professional, that our society most highly values."

"Mrs. Collins possessed a rare insight and ability to understand how each student's mind worked, and perceived individuals' learning styles, to help students excel. As a former middle school teacher myself, I can attest to her rare level of achievement and expertise in the profession. As with many of our very best and most effective educators, teaching was clearly a life calling for Mrs. Collins," Evans said.

Much of what we know about these first people, known as Paleoindians, has been discovered in sites that were drowned in freshwater environments, where fragile materials were perfectly preserved," she said.

"Terrestrial sites, however, suffer from numerous problems that hamper our understanding of Paleoindian lifeways. Further, much of the Paleoindian record was submerged by sea level rise, so we know little about any early coastal adaptations. Even so, a century of research has revealed some significant patterns about early Floridians," Halligan said.

Many local residents and amateur archaeologists are familiar with the Page-Ladson site from excavations in the 1990s

that turned up a handful of stone tools and some mastodon bones that appeared to have been butchered. Radiocarbon-dating suggested the tools and bones were 14,400 years old, but the results weren't conclusive, and many archaeologists remained unconvinced.

So when one of Halligan's team members uncovered an ancient stone tool called a biface, she was ready - Halligan and her team collected more than 70 samples of organic material around the tool, as well as the areas above and below it.

"It helped that the sediments contained 'literal craps tons' of mastodon dung, a rich source of organic matter that was perfect for dating," according to reports of the finds.

When they radiocarbon-dated the samples, they found that the biface was in

a layer dated to 14,550 years ago. The team published their findings in 2016 and made headlines around the world.

"Dr. Halligan was a special guest speaker at the Historical Society shortly after the findings were published. We are happy to welcome her back for our banquet. Please join us for a program that is sure to be engaging and informative," President J.T. Davis said.

“We have a great eighth

grade group coming up, and they seem to be eager to learn and have a great work ethic. Head Coach David Gray and the rest of the Taylor County Middle School (TCMS) coaching staff have done a tremendous job of preparing the upcoming ninth graders,” said Jones.

“Myself and the coaching staff are proud and excited to put this group on the field. The 2018 team may not be as flashy as you saw in 2017, but physicality, determination and leadership will not be an issue with this squad,” assured Jones.

Jones also added, “We are very appreciative of the community’s support this past season, as well as in the future, because without the support from families

and local businesses nothing this football program does would be possible.”





'Infinity War' packs an amazing payoff 18 movies in the making

With now 19 movies in just 10 years, the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU) is the king of the box office, and for fans of the movies, a constant source of entertaining films. Some are more stand-alone than others, but each movie -- and more importantly, the mid- and post-credit scenes after each -- have been building toward something... something really big.

It all began with the mid-credits sequence in 2012's "The Avengers," which gave us our first glimpse at the galactic destroyer Thanos. Although he sent Loki (Tom Hiddleston) to Earth to conquer it, we knew nothing at the time of his motives. Then, after "Thor: Dark World," we learned of the Infinity Stones, powerful artifacts that were further explained in "Guardians of the Galaxy." During the same movie, we also learned that Thanos is trying to collect them, a feat that would give him ultimate power -- and that's in a universe that already has super soldiers, magic users and gods.

Now, after 18 movies, we have "Avengers: Infinity War," and Thanos is finally ready to take charge, collect the Infinity Stones and put his ultimate plan into motion, wiping out half of the universe's population to bring balance and save life from itself. The only ones standing in his way? Just 18 movies' worth of superheroes, who will have to come together and save the day -- or at least die trying.

There's never been a movie that has had so much setup, so many characters and so much expectation, at least not in the MCU. Fortunately, directors Anthony and Joe Russo ("Captain America: Winter Solider," "Captain America: Civil War") deliver an amazing movie that somehow finds time during its meaty 149-minute runtime to not only give each of the various heroes at least a moment or two to shine, but also develop the franchise's best villain to date. With so much build-up, Thanos (voiced by Josh Brolin) couldn't just be a big purple brute, and he is not. In many ways, "Infinity War" is Thanos' movie and the Avengers are just there trying to stop him.

With Marvel and DC pumping out comic book movies at an unprecedented clip, people like to talk about comic book fatigue. I don't suffer from it, but even if you do, "Infinity War" is something new and all the more satisfying because of it. Yes, there is wanton destruction and mayhem, but there is always emotion behind it. We care about these characters and these places, even if some of them are computer-generated. That is what the MCU has been able to create, and "Infinity War" makes great use of it.

Just about all of the MCU heroes are in this movie, including Iron Man (Robert Downey Jr.), Captain America (Chris Evans), Thor (Chris Hemsworth), Hulk (Mark Ruffalo), Black Widow (Scarlett Johansson), Black Panther (Chadwick Boseman), Spider-Man (Tom Holland), Doctor Strange (Benedict Cumberbatch), Falcon (Anthony Mackie), War Machine (Don Cheadle), Scarlet Witch (Elizabeth Olsen), Vision (Paul Bettany) and Bucky (Sebastian Stan), as

well as the Guardians of the Galaxy: Peter Quill (Chris Pratt), Gamora (Zoe Saldana), Drax (Dave Bautista), Groot (Vin Diesel), Rocket (Bradley Cooper) and Mantis (Pam Klementieff).

The MCU hasn't been perfect, and there have been rightful complaints levied against various installments. The most common issue has been the lack of solid villains, but as I mentioned before, Thanos shatters that trend like he does so many things in the movie. From the opening scene, the movie establishes Thanos as a villain unlike any we have seen before, and one that we should rightfully fear. The film also gives him a surprisingly large amount of emotion. I never expected I would feel for someone trying to destroy half the universe, but he is truly the hero of his own story.

Another issue with the MCU has been its unwillingness to kill its characters, which makes sense from a financial standpoint, but again, from the opening scene of this movie, there is a palpable sense of dread that anyone can die at any moment. Even IF it doesn't eventually happen (no spoilers in this review!), the fact that the movie made me feel it could happen proves it succeeded.

"Infinity War" is also not perfect, and I did have a few issues with it, some bigger than others. While the special effects are amazing, especially in bringing Thanos to life on the screen and delivering some of the best action sequences of the entire franchise, there are a few moments where the effects don't hold up. They are few and far between, but that only makes them stand out even more.

I also had a problem with some of the characters' decisions, as they seem a bit hypocritical, but unfortunately, I can't really get into that without spoilers. If you've seen the movie and would like to hear my unfiltered thoughts, check out my spoiler-filled review on my YouTube channel by visiting goo.gl/4PwJKk or searching for Mark Viola on YouTube.

Finally, this may be a bit obvious, but "Infinity War," despite some valiant attempts to fill in some blanks, is not the movie you should use to start your journey into the MCU. The film draws on plot points and characters set up through nearly all of the previous 18 movies. As someone who has seen them all, I'm honestly glad they didn't spend a lot of time reestablishing things fans would already know. There simply isn't space for that with so many characters needing their moments. If you pressed me to narrow the list down to the most essential films to see before "Infinity War," I'd say the first two "Avengers" films, "Guardians of the Galaxy" and "Captain America: Civil War," with "Thor: Ragnarok" and "Black Panther" as the next tier.

"Infinity War" is an amazingly entertaining movie, and actually delivers the pay-off that the previous films were building up to, at least until we get the next "Avengers" film in 2019.

The movie is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of sci-fi violence and action throughout, language and some crude references.

In the first weekend after the record-breaking release of "Avengers: Infinity War," we get three films looking to find a little space at the box office.

Up first is "Bad Samaritan," a thriller about two burglars who pick the wrong house to rob, discovering that the owner (David Tennant, "Jessica Jones") has a woman chained in a room. When the police can't help, they try themselves, but only manage to become his next targets. Tennant, best known as the plucky Doctor in BBC's "Doctor Who," showed a very different side in "Jessica Jones," and seems to be making the best of it by playing another evil killer. The film is directed by Dean Devlin ("Geostorm"), who is better known as a producer of films like "Independence Day" and television series such as "Leverage" and "The Librarians." With "A



Quiet Place" nearing the end of its run, there's room for another horror thriller at the movies.

The film is rated R for violence, language throughout, some drug use and brief nudity.

"Overboard" is a remake of the 1987 comedy starring Goldie Hawn and Kurt Russell about a rich socialite who is struck with a case of amnesia and the blue-collar single father who lies about her being his wife after she treated him horribly prior to her accident. The new version reverses the genders, with Eugenio Derbez ("How to Be a Latin Lover") as the rich Leonardo who is taken in by the down-on-her-luck single mother Kate (Anna Faris, "Mom"). Of all the 1980s comedies out there, "Overboard," a favorite of my mom's at the time, was not one I expected, or truthfully had any interest in there being a remake.

The movie is rated PG-13 for suggestive material, partial nudity and some language.

Finally we have "Tully," which reunites director Jason Reitman and screenwriter Diablo Cody after their previous collaborations "Juno" and "Young Adult." This time the story follows Marlo (Charlize Theron, "Atomic Blonde"), an overworked mother of two small children and a newborn. Her brother hires a night nanny (Mackenzie Davis, "The Martian") to help her, and while Marlo doesn't like the idea at first, she develops a bond with the younger woman. Reitman and Cody make interesting movies, and this looks like another one, or at least something different from the summer's blockbusters.
