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Canopy project stalls out over bid question

Any momentum gained by bidding out the downtown canopy project came to a screeching halt when officials -- at first pleased with the lower-than-expected-price tag -- realized the bidder failed to include one major element of the plan, which could drive the initial cost substantially higher.

Additional confusion set in when council members balked after learning of an additional estimated \$40,000 cost in maintenance for assuming ownership of Jefferson Street (a necessary step in order for the canopy project to proceed).

However, some council members breathed a little easier when new information emerged that the estimated cost should be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$5,000 a year -- rather than the \$40,000 initially misquoted.

Discussions regarding the project happened during a special council meeting held last week, after the lone bid received on the project was opened.

That bid totalled \$905,000 and was a welcome sight to officials

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Anonymous investors want to renovate former DMH building:

\$10,000 offered for old hospital

A group of anonymous investors -- represented by local attorney Ray Curtis -- has offered to purchase the former hospital building located on Ash Street as part of a plan to renovate and remodel the facility to house office suites and apartments.

Curtis attended the county's Monday night meeting to determine the county's interest level for a proposal he spelled out in a May 18 letter sent to County Administrator Ted Lakey:

"I represent a group of investors who, at present, wish to remain anonymous. They have asked me to meet with the board to gauge the board's receptiveness to selling the hospital building located at 407 East Ash Street," Curtis wrote.

"This group would be interested in purchasing the building from the county for \$10,000 with a seven-year property tax abatement. In exchange, the group would immediately assume any and all liability associated with the property," Curtis' letter said.

"The group would also begin a phased plan to make any structural repairs, remove and abate existing asbestos and ultimately remodel the building to contain office suites on the first floor and apartments

'Can I get a different lawyer?' Forsythe: 'I was confused at trial'

Obviously exasperated, attorney Shirley Bates entered the courtroom Tuesday morning in a flurry of outward emotions, cutting the silence that had fallen over the few individuals awaiting the sentencing hearing of Oriana Forsythe, 19.

"She doesn't want to talk to me," Bates huffed to Victim's Advocate Brandi Turner.

Forsythe -- one of two people charged in the murder of Steinhatchee resident Aaron Tappe -- entered the courtroom moments later, followed closely by two deputies.

The floral blouse and black slacks Forsythe wore during her first degree murder trial in March had been traded for a county-issued orange jumpsuit and handcuffs, the metal

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Ketring joins race for city council seat

Ward Eugene Ketring has filed to run for the Perry City Council District 5 seat just one day after incumbent Mayor David Sullivan announced he will not run for re-election.

Ketring joins Tonya B. Holton -- who filed to run on Monday -- in the District 5 city council race. Sullivan turned in his withdrawal document to Supervisor of Elections Dana Southerland on Tuesday, and Ketring filed to run on Wednesday.

Those wishing to run for a city council seat have until the end of qualifying on Monday, June 18, at noon

to file and complete the required paperwork.

Qualifying for county races will run from June 18 at noon through Friday, June 22, at noon. Those candidates can likewise file to run through the end of qualifying as long as they also complete the necessary paperwork prior to the deadline.

The city council's fee is calculated differently, also pay the qualifying fee, which is based on the salary of the position they are seeking. For partisan races, such as county commission, it is six percent of the annual salary (\$1,849.50), while for non-partisan races, such as the school board, it is four percent of the annual salary (\$1,083.16).

The city council's fee is calculated differently, consisting of \$25 plus a one-percent election assessment, totaling \$115.25. There is also an additional one-percent election assessment that city candidates must pay as required by the Florida Election Commission -- although if candidates cannot afford this assessment, they can provide a sworn statement attesting to such.

Candidates can qualify early, and as of Thursday afternoon, seven of the 20 local candidates currently filed to run had officially qualified by completing their paperwork, which includes the candidate oath and a financial statement.

The qualified candidates were Taylor County Commission District 2 incumbent Jim Moody and Taylor County School Board incumbents Bonnie Sue Agner (District 1) Brenda H. Carlton (District 2), as well as County Commission

New primary school takes shape

If you've been by the site of the new Perry Primary School lately, you may have noticed walls and roofing starting to go up.

"Last month we started putting on the roofing structures of the first classroom building," Scott Brewer, project executive with Allstate Construction, said during the Taylor County School Board's June 5 meeting.

During Brewer's brief update on the progress of construction, he explained how Allstate's "critical focus" will go from structural components to interior finishes. "So the roof comes on, the windows go in, the masonry work outside starts to progress, then our key focus is the 'guts and gears' inside the building, and finally finishes," Brewer explained. "Probably within this month we'll be focused on those finishes (of the first building) and the other buildings will be ongoing."

Trusses are also expected to go up on the cafeteria area next week, according to

Brewer. From the cafeteria, roofing will go up on the administration building and finally to the last classroom building.

While construction is steadily progressing, heavy rains have set the "substantial completion" date back. Originally, students were to move into their new school over the winter holiday in January 2019. According to Brewer, construction should now be completed in late January or early February, with

students moving into the new school in August.

"This gives us the summer to really 'polish and shine' the school, take care of things and get through a cycle in the summer months with the new air conditioning systems. I've seen it happen over the holidays, it's just pretty hectic," Brewer said.

The board will also be presented with their first change order on the project at the next board meeting, where they will sign off on

using LVT vinyl tile instead of VCT vinyl tile. Originally, the school district wanted a higher quality, more durable, low maintenance flooring -- LVT vinyl tile -- but opted for VCT vinyl to save money, with the hopes of being able to change to LVT if funds allowed. "That total (flooring) change costs \$217,000," Brewer said.

While the amount of 2018 funding for the project was reduced \$390,848 by the Department of Education (DOE), the school district has made up the deficit and then some. According to Taylor County School District Facilities and Maintenance Coordinator Dan Anderson, a total of \$450,000 was put back into the project through a number of cost-saving decisions, giving the district a surplus of \$60,000.

In 2015, before receiving state funding for the new school, the school district employed the services of

District 4 challenger Douglas Cruce and Perry City Council District 4 challenger Mary Williams. Holton and Ketring have also qualified.

On the school board, incumbents Agner (District

1) and Carlton (District 2) are unopposed in their respective bids for re-election -- the only local incumbents currently without a challenger. District 4 School Board incumbent Delton Danny Lundy is running against Eugenia L. Jolley.

As for the Perry City

Council, in addition to the District 5 race, incumbent Councilman Alan C. Hall is facing a challenge from Williams.

On the commission, Moody (R) is currently facing one challenger, Cassie Lucille Buckley (NPA), in his bid for re-election. Fellow incumbent,

District 4 Commissioner Pam Feagle (D), has two challengers: Cruce (R) and Ronald Glenn Ratliff (D).

The most crowded race of the 2018 election cycle is the District 3 county commission seat, with six hopefuls seeking election to serve out the remaining two years of the

late Commissioner Frank Russell's term. The longtime county commissioner died in February. Florida Gov. Rick Scott subsequently appointed Steve Spradley to fill the seat through the November election.

Those running for the District 3 seat include: Jody James DeVane (NPA),

Ursula P. Miller (NPA), Rhoda Ann Moehring (R), Michael Elzie Newman (D), Sean Andrew Murphy (R) and Spradley (NPA).

Finally, Lisa M. Dykes is currently running unopposed for Seat 2 on the Taylor County Soil and Water Board. No one is currently seeking Seats 1 and 4.

as she took a seat to the left of her defense attorney Shirley Bates.

"Can I say something to the judge?" Forsythe asked Bates, who sat with her arms crossed, appearing to ignore her client's question.

Forsythe asked again before Bates shrugged and replied "I don't know..."

When everyone rose for Circuit Court Judge Greg Parker as he entered, Bates announced her client would like to say something.

After being placed under oath by Parker, a visibly nervous Forsythe revealed not just one, but two announcements that changed the entire court proceeding.

"I would like to withdraw my plea...Am I allowed to do that?" Forsythe asked, her voice cracking during the second question.

"I have not heard from your counsel yet that you are seeking to have your plea set aside," Parker responded.

"As you are saying this, the first thing that crossed my mind is to go back to the jury verdict," Parker continued, before confirming the likelihood of reverting back to the previous guilty verdict with Assistant State Attorney James McCain.

"Yes sir," McCain agreed. Parker turned his attention back to Forsythe and asked if she was sure she wanted to withdraw her plea.

"I think that is what I need to do...And, I don't really know how to say this, but is there any way I can get a different lawyer?" Forsythe responded.

"My lawyer [Bates] came out to see me last week and I wasn't happy with some of the answers I got. I asked why didn't she do the things she told me she was going to do during trial, and she told me because she wasn't getting enough money," Forsythe alleged.

Forsythe continued her testimony by detailing her lack of understanding in her criminal case, ranging from the guilty verdict to the actions of her attorney.

"I don't think anyone is taking this serious. It is not some movie, it is my life," a distressed Forsythe cried, as she continued her view of the situation to Parker. "I was confused at trial. I didn't understand why I was found guilty in the first place...I feel like I was left with no options. I don't think that was fair for me. I got threatened with 40 years if I didn't take the plea. I was scared. I was just told I was guilty...I really don't want to

take this plea. I know I did, but if it's possible, I would like to withdraw it."

"This is the first that I have heard about you wanting to seek other counsel...Last time you were here, the court took, I think, patient and deliberate measures in approaching you entering the plea that day," Parker said.

"I am recalling your comments about satisfaction with your counsel, and you were quite conclusive that you thought the plea was in your best interest. The main point being that this is all somewhat thrust upon the court, and it is going to be as patient and deliberate to make sure we do what we need to do," Parker explained to Forsythe. "If you are wanting to go forward with your counsel today or not, I need to know."

Bates addressed Parker, asking the court to allow her to withdraw from representing Forsythe. She said that Forsythe had not informed her of her (Forsythe's) decision to dismiss her, nor had she relayed any concerns of a conflict.

"I would ask the court to allow me to withdraw at this time. Today is the first that I had heard she wanted to withdraw her plea. I do not feel comfortable with the

conflict now in representing her," Bates said.

Parker then asked McCain if the state had any objections to Forsythe dismissing her current counsel and seeking new counsel.

"No. The state would not normally get involved in the choice of lawyer issues. Certainly Forsythe has the right to an attorney of her choice," McCain responded before continuing to explain the potential results of requesting a change of counsel.

In dismissing Bates, McCain said, Forsythe has the option of seeking a private attorney, filing for a court-appointed attorney or acting pro se (one's own behalf) legal representation.

Due to the defendant being only 19 years old, Parker said it would be ill advised for Forsythe to select the third option of representing herself.

"One thing we do know is that Ms. Forsythe does not have replacement counsel at this time. If the court were to grant the motion to withdraw and impose new counsel, I am not in objection to the defendant. That might be better, rather than proceeding...What I am inclined to do is to grant the motion to withdraw and to continue this matter another

day to allow for counsel to be retained and for counsel to counsel Ms. Forsythe," Parker said.

Based on the preliminary questions asked of her at the hearing, Forsythe is eligible to fill out a court-appointed attorney application.

"You can retain your own counsel at any time, but at least have some type of counsel on board," Parker explained to Forsythe as the bailiff handed her an application.

"I am not considering the motion to withdraw the plea as accepted. It is denied without prejudice at this point. It is without prejudice to re-file," Parker ruled before dismissing the court.

When asked for a statement regarding Forsythe's request for new counsel and attempt to withdraw her plea, Bates said, "I believe that she is grasping at straws."

Forsythe and her new counsel -- court-appointed or privately retained -- will appear for her rescheduled sentencing hearing (and potential motion to withdraw her plea deal) on Tuesday, July 3.

In March, jury found Forsythe guilty of first degree murder, which carries a mandatory life sentence without parole.

However, shortly after the

jury returned its verdict, the state offered Forsythe a plea deal.

Forsythe was allowed to enter an "open plea deal" to vacate the "guilty" verdict of the jury. In doing so, the 19-year-old plead "no contest" and neither admitted nor denied guilt.

At that hearing, Parker placed Forsythe under oath to begin sentencing, then went through the stipulations of the plea deal, asking her questions to ensure she understood the contract she had signed.

"Do you understand what it means to plead "no contest"?" Judge Parker asked.

"No. I did not really read the whole thing before signing it," Forsythe responded.

"You did not read the whole document before you signed the agreement?" Parker repeated.

"No," Forsythe replied. Parker issued a recess, during which time Forsythe was instructed to read the document in its entirety.

When court resumed, Bates stated her client would be continuing with the plea deal.

"I have decided an open plea deal is in my best interest," Forsythe confirmed.

who feared it would fall in the \$1.25-\$1.4 million range.

"This came in about \$300,000 less than what we thought. We have a \$700,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and will fund the balance with proceeds from the one-percent sales tax revenue we start receiving this next fiscal year," Mayor David Sullivan said.

"So we will not have to pull anything from our

reserves," he said.

The canopy project is the last piece of the Master Downtown Improvement Plan adopted by the council six years ago. Phase I of the project calls for the installation of canopies and balconies on the city block that extends from Main Street to Green, along with the installation of crosswalk "bumpouts" at each intersection from Main Street to Ellis.

When the project was initially presented to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) --

which owns Jefferson Street -- officials there said it would not be allowed under current FDOT guidelines.

FDOT then offered to transfer ownership to the road to the city, clearing the way for the canopy project.

Several months ago, the council voted to proceed in petitioning FDOT for Jefferson Street and received tentative approval at the federal level for the transfer.

But it was projected maintenance costs that alarmed council members Venita Woodfaulk and Shirlee Hampton during last

week's discussions.

"I just feel that Jefferson Street is going to bite us in the end," Woodfaulk said, noting that she had voted "no" on moving forward to seek ownership of the main thoroughway.

When the corrected projections of \$5,000 in yearly maintenance costs were given to the council by Brown (who participated by phone), Councilman Alan Hall said, "That's more breathable."

What wasn't "breathable" was the realization, as discussions continued, that

the bid for the project only covered construction of two bumpouts (at Main and Green streets), rather than the four total in the project (Drew and Ellis streets).

The council initially voted to continue the meeting until the following Tuesday, when the bidder could return with an amended figure.

However, that meeting was cancelled, and the council is expected to readdress the issue at its upcoming regular meeting set Tuesday, June 12.

"It's on the next agenda and we should have the recalculated price from the contractor," Brown said Thursday.

a design team at Clemons, Rutherford and Associates, Inc. (CRA). According to Greg Kelly with CRA, the district paid \$165,000 for the services. Once the district received state funding, the \$165,000 they paid "out of pocket" was re-applied back into the project, Kelly explained.

According to Anderson, the district cut the amount for fixtures, furniture and equipment from \$750,000 to \$601,000. "There are some items removed from

the furniture package that should have a high priority to be placed back into the package," Anderson stated. "These items include activity carpets for classrooms and portable risers for the media center. These items have a combined price of \$30,000."

The district accepted a bid for touch panels that "saves \$100,000 from the amount allocated for this item" and saved \$35,000 on building and permit fees (handled by the Taylor County Building Department), Anderson explained.

Anderson provided a list of items not included in the original contract, but that were expected to be included in Allstate's contract through change orders before funding was cut. LVT flooring, a PE pavilion and extra fencing were among items listed. According to Anderson's list, there is no money allocated for new computers or custodial and grounds equipment, but those are expected to be added in through change orders.

According to Anderson, \$30,000 is left from the furniture, fixture and

equipment allocation, \$201,000 is left in the contingency fund, \$45,000 was estimated in tax savings above what was allocated to fund the project and \$291,000 is left in "Classroom First" funds. This is money "that is available that can be used for change orders and to fund items on the previously given priority list."

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County waiting for asbestos abatement bids

on the second floor," Curtis wrote.

"My role at this stage is to have an open discussion with the board to gauge their interest in such a concept, and to hear their questions and concerns, then take those questions and concerns back to my clients for analysis and discussion," the letter states.

"Thereafter, assuming all questions and concerns can be adequately addressed by my clients, my clients would come back to the board with a more formal proposal for consideration, although my clients recognize that the board would likely then have to go through some sort of formal bid process," Curtis concluded.

County commissioners recently advertised a request for proposals (RFP) seeking bids for the removal of asbestos at the old Doctors' Memorial Hospital (DMH) facility.

"We would like to go out for bids to see what the prices will actually be to remove the asbestos so we can see what the potential uses of the building might be," County Administrator Ted Lakey told commissioners at the county's May 7 meeting.

"The previous estimate for asbestos removal was between \$500,000 and \$750,000," Clerk of Court Annie Mae Murphy stated.

"We had a group really interested in the building last year," Commissioner Jim Moody said. "They want to use the building as a training facility for military and law enforcement."

"With the way the guy talked to Ted about it, I think we could get rid of it. There are companies that could do it (asbestos removal) a lot cheaper than the estimates we have gotten in the past," Moody said.

"Research shows that those bids were way too high. I just want to see something done with that building," Moody added.

On a motion by Commissioner Malcolm Page and second by Moody, the board voted 5-0 in favor of advertising a request for proposals on the removal of asbestos last month.

According to a summary from Building Department Director Danny Griner, county staff was tasked with preparing bid specification for asbestos removal from both the two-story main old hospital building and the one-story support services building (original hospital) located at 407 E. Ash St.

Firms are required to submit an overview of their company, prior related work experience, scope of work, project timeline and proposed pricing for asbestos abatement and any required demolition.

Bids must be submitted by Friday, July 13 and will be opened on Monday, July 17.

During Monday's meeting, Curtis told commissioners the "loosely organized" group of investors approached him to relay the proposal, which includes a "very low" purchase price "with strings attached," in exchange for immediately assuming liability of the

building, carrying out an asbestos abatement plan and renovating the building to include office space on the first floor and apartments on the second floor.

"Me being here is primarily to gauge the interest of the board and to report back on this loose concept or proposal," Curtis said.

"There is probably a more formal process we need to follow, but there is no point in doing a lot of work now unless the board likes the concept," Curtis said. "Then, once we know what you have in mind, we will put together a solid proposal."

Page asked if the proposal included the entire eight-acre hospital property and all buildings.

"I don't believe so, because the property includes the health department building, and we are interested in just the old hospital building," Curtis said.

"What about the old wing located behind the old hospital building?" Page asked.

"I do not know the answer to that," Curtis replied.

"We have a request for proposals out now for asbestos removal and I would want to see what comes back from it before moving forward," Page said.

"Would we have to bid this out?" Page asked.

"Yes, the proper method would likely be to accept sealed bids," County Attorney Conrad Bishop answered.

"I want to know what the asbestos abatement project will cost, what acreage is being requested, what is the value of the property," Chairwoman Pam Feagle said, "I have many questions that need to be answered first, like how many jobs would this create, what would the wages be, a date certain for asbestos removal and when would construction begin?"

"We have someone wanting to purchase it for \$10,000, but do we really want to sell it for that? Or do we want to pay to have someone remove the asbestos and then sell the hospital building for a higher price?" Feagle continued. "I am in no hurry. I want to hear from the public and see what they have to say by calling or showing up at a meeting. This building does not belong to us, but to the taxpayers of Taylor County."

"My client is not in a big hurry either, but we need to know what the county wishes to keep or get rid of. You tell me so my client knows what you may be interested in," Curtis said. "My marching orders were to gauge interest. I do not have specifics tonight – just the general concept."

"I am not saying 'no' but I do want to see the asbestos proposals first, and I would like to see the one-story building behind the old hospital included in this – not just the two-story hospital building," Page said.

"Under Florida Statute 125.35 the county is authorized to sell. We all need to look at that statute," Bishop said. "If the value is under \$15,000 the board

can dispose of it through a private sale. It may be more expensive for the board to pay to get the asbestos out than what it is worth."

"You may need to get one or more appraisals, but I think we need to appreciate the interest being shown in this. But the prudent thing to do is to see how the bids come back. There has been a lot of discussion about this building in the community," Bishop added.

"I'd love to see this done. With as many people as we have breaking in and the liability concerns, I am all in favor of getting rid of this building as soon as we can," Moody said. "Asbestos removal is always expensive. I think we are going to be surprised at how high the bids come in."

"I am all in favor of telling your client that we are interested," Moody added. "I am ready to move ahead myself. We have talked this issue to death."

"I will relay this back to my client and we will wait to see what the reaction is to the asbestos removal bids are first at the county's July 17 meeting and then send a memo to the board," Curtis said.

"This may be the way out of us spending three quarters of a million in taxpayer dollars," Page commented.

"We are not shutting any doors," Feagle added.

DMH moved hospital services to its current location on Highway 19 more than a decade ago, leaving the county-owned building on Ash Street vacant and in a state of increasing disrepair.

The Taylor County Commission has on numerous occasions discussed possible uses for the building -- one of the largest vacant structures in Perry -- but each time the extremely high estimated costs to renovate the building have brought talks to a standstill.

In 2005, the commission paid for a feasibility study to determine what would be needed to convert the building into office space, either for government expansion from the courthouse or for private use. At that time, the study recommended the building be essentially gutted to its exterior walls due to the amount of outdated and medical-specific

infrastructure.

Even a decade ago, the cost was expected to run almost \$3 million, and the plan was never put into place.

Since then, several other

proposals were floated by the commission or interested community groups, but each time renovation costs shut down discussion.

In 2010, with the county looking again to either find a

use for the building or have it demolished, an asbestos study was commissioned, with the price tag for asbestos abatement coming in at approximately \$690,000.

The book closing date is the statewide deadline to register to vote or make any party changes. **The book closing date for the Primary Election is July 30, 2018.** If you need to register to vote or would like to make a party change, you may now do so by completing an online application. Just visit your Supervisor of Elections website at www.taylor-elections.com and choose the Register to Vote/Update Current Registration link on or before this book closing date. Once the registration books close, only updates to a voter's name, address and signature shall be permitted.

Florida is a **CLOSED PRIMARY** state, and therefore in a primary election, voters may only vote for candidates in their party of registration. By not selecting a party when you register, your vote is limited in the primaries to nonpartisan races and issues. The only exception to this is a Universal Primary Contest or "UPC". A Universal Primary Contest is a contest in a primary election in which all candidates have the same party affiliation and the winner will have no opposition in the general election. All qualified electors in the district that race represents may vote on a Universal Primary Contest regardless of party affiliation.

Any registered voter may request a vote by mail ballot. Request can be accepted only from the voter, a member of the voter's immediate family or legal guardian. Please call the elections office at 850-838-3515 to request a vote by mail ballot. The Supervisor of Elections office will mail vote by mail ballots to absent stateside and overseas uniformed service voters and overseas civilian voters for the Primary Election on July 13, 2018. All other vote by mail ballots will be mailed beginning July 24, 2018 per Florida Statute.

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
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Virgin cypress lumber

RESCUE AT SEA

Harry and Nancy Allison didn't catch any grouper when they headed out past Marker 18 on the "Miss Anclote." What they caught instead was three human beings -- and they were live ones. About 35 miles out from Keaton Beach on June 3, 1983, Nancy thought she saw something on the horizon about a mile or so away, she said. The Allisons were getting close to their favorite fishing spot, but they followed the blinking light instead. What they found astounded them. There, on a nine-foot by 12-foot remains of a boat bridge roof, were three very thirsty, very tired, very sore and very alive humans. Paul Odell, 57, of Pryor, Okla., Bill Weaver, 37, of Chouteau, Okla., and his son Billy, 12, were about to end three days of helplessly floating on the Gulf of Mexico. The Allisons hoisted the three aboard the "Miss Anclote" and headed back to Keaton Beach.

BUCKEYE MODERNIZED

The Buckeye Cellulose Corporation announced that the company had approved plans for a multi-million dollar modernization of its woodyard operation at the pulp mill.

According to *Plant Manager Charley Wertheimer*, the modernization project was to install state-of-the-art technology to insure that the Taylor County plant remained competitive with other cellulose manufacturers in the industry.

Wertheimer said new equipment planned for the operation would enable the mill to process incoming

My two brothers and I were as different as three brothers could be.

We didn't always get along, which was expected because of our very different personalities. But, even when we didn't, we were the only ones who could call the other "out their name" without a fight.

We did nearly everything together. We would not sit down for dinner until all three of us were present and ready to eat.

If one of us was sick and couldn't go to school, the other two suddenly came down with a similar ailment and pleaded with our mother and grandmother for a sick day.

And, if one of us got involved in something -- even if the other two didn't like it -- they felt obligated to participate as well.

This is why my brothers decided to participate in the talent show at the summer day camp one year.

The summer day camp program was run by Mrs. Shirley Scott and a few other black educators at the middle school, and throughout the summer we participated in arts, archery, gymnastics, dance and other programs. At the end of the summer, the camp sponsored a talent show so we could show our parents all the things we'd learned.

I was part of the gymnastics program and decided I would perform a floor exercise in the talent show.

Because I was participating in the talent show, my brothers signed up.

Ken joined a group of boys doing a dance that led to the formation of a pyramid.

Tony joined a group of boys performing a hula-hoop circus routine.

It wasn't long before preparation for the competition began to weaken the bonds that held us together and we became bitter rivals.

On the day of the talent show, our mother and grandmother sat together in the stands.

They cheered when I did my floor exercise to Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes' "Bad Luck." They cheered when Ken's group danced and formed a pyramid that fell as soon as Ken climbed on the very top. And they cheered when Tony and his group twisted and tossed hula-hoops in the air with the precision of a trained circus group.

While the judges prepared to announce their results, my brothers and I shot "angry rival" stares at each other from our respective corners.

They announced the third-place winner. It wasn't one of us.

They announced the second-place winner -- Nancy Jackson, who had performed a gymnastics floor exercise to the prettiest song in the world, Roberta Flacks' "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face."

Finally, they announced, "And the winner is..."

My brothers and I all stepped forward. "Anthony Flowers!" (I was Flowers back then.)

I didn't hear the winner's name, but I heard my mother and grandmother cheering. I heard my brother Ken cheering and my brother Tony cheering.

I wasn't sure who had won, until Ken and Tony ran over to me and pushed me out on the gym floor.

"You won!" they shouted

As I raised my trophy, I could hear my mother, my grandmother and my two bitter rivals cheering louder than everyone in the gym.

The water was very red and coffee-colored last week. I believe it was the darkest I have seen since the 30 inches of rain we received back in 2000.

Well, we managed some fishing around the darkest-colored water, but not in it. The lines move daily, but Monday it was dark from the Spring Warrior humps all the way to...well, maybe St. Marks?

I gave up on trying to find

out how far to the northwest it was that color.

You could get out past it in 6-7 feet of water or you had to stop before you got that far north.

With the w-i-n-d moving out of the west, it is a prescription for the darker water to begin to settle and should make for some fantastic fishing.

Did I mention I saw 88-degree water temperatures on Monday? Whew! That is warm for the first week in June!

Expect the reds to run from the fresh water in the creeks

and set up on the outside bars or just move out on the flats in this 88-degree water.

We had eight nice trout last Saturday, including a beautiful 25.5-inch trout for Phillip Meredith of Dothan, Ala.

Yes, he caught it on a live pinfish under a Back Bay Thunder in 5.5 feet of water just before the squall got there.

I had two nice trout on Assassin's plastics -- one on a 5-inch Croaker Shad and one 19-inch trout while bouncing a 5-inch Stinky Pink shad.

Freshwater fish without a license

No fishing license? No problem, at least for this weekend.

This Saturday and Sunday, June 9 and 10, Florida residents and visitors can

fish in Florida's freshwater fisheries without having to purchase a license.

The weekend is part of eight license-free fishing days approved by Governor

Rick Scott and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) for 2018.

While the fishing license requirement is waived for the weekend, all other rules, such as season, bag, and size limits, still apply, FWC officials said.

This weekend will be the last freshwater license free weekend of 2018.

There will be two more license free fishing days for saltwater on Sept. 1 and Nov. 24.

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'Upgrade' is a visually fun, but extremely violent, revenge flick

As soon as I saw the trailer for "Upgrade," I was immediately intrigued by the ultra-violent movie from writer/director Leigh Whannell, who wrote the first three "Saw" movies, as well as the "Insidious" franchise, before making his directorial debut with "Insidious: Chapter 3."

I haven't seen any of those movies, but the trailer for "Upgrade" pulled me in with some really interesting cinematography and cool visuals surrounding what appeared to be a pretty run-of-the-mill revenge flick.

Many action movies today, regardless of the story being told, tend to use the same tired methods as far as how they visually tell that story: a lot of quick cuts and shaky cam.

If you think this makes it hard to figure out what's going on, well, that is the point. The filmmakers are not trying to show you what is happening on the screen. Instead, they're trying to obscure it, because most of the actors can't actually do what their characters are attempting. In a world where it took more than a dozen cuts and about five or six camera angles for Liam Neeson to hop a fence in "Taken 3," you can understand why fans of the "John Wick" franchise -- myself included -- loved the long takes and wonderful cinematography.

So the idea of another action movie with potentially solid camera work -- and a science-fiction angle to it, no less -- immediately hooked me. Having now seen the movie, I can say it is just as violent as advertised and, with a few exceptions, the cinematography is quite good as well. What surprised me, however, was how much I enjoyed the story -- and the world created around it -- as well as the spectacular performance from Logan Marshall-Green ("Spider-Man: Homecoming").

The film is set in the near future where technology has become even more ever-present than it is today, although Grey Trace (Marshall-Green) does his best to ignore it, content to build old muscle cars (for clients who can afford them), while letting his tech-

savvy wife wear the pants in the family. After she is killed in an attack that leaves him a quadriplegic, however, he will become intimately aware of the power of technology when he is offered the chance to undergo a secret, experimental surgery to implant a chip called STEM into his body. If it works, it will allow him to control his body once again.

What he wasn't told was the chip has a mind of its own, and as Grey searches for the men who killed his wife, he will have to partner with STEM because it can do things he never could, including killing people with ruthless efficiency.

The film's cinematographer, Stefan Duscio, tries a lot of unique ways to depict the action, and they mostly work. He also avoids the shaky cam, and -- with one noticeable exception -- the quick cuts. There is a fight involving Grey and someone with similar abilities, when unfortunately the film resorts to old habits there, but it's more the exception than the rule. Do be aware that the violence is extremely graphic, but honestly not as gratuitous as I was expecting.

As I mentioned before, I really enjoyed the story. Sure, it's your typical revenge plot, but Whannell takes some time to flesh out the world around Grey, and the science-fiction elements were done well, giving a pretty light story some unexpected weight.

The real star, however, is Marshall-Green, who essentially plays two roles. His head remains Grey, but once STEM is implanted, the rest of his body is the machine. This leads to some humorous moments as Grey watches helplessly as his body mows through the bad guys. A lot of care went into his mannerisms, so you never forget when Grey is not in control of his body. It's the kind of performance that won't get a lot of notice -- but it should.

Overall, "Upgrade" is not a great movie, but it is an entertaining one, and, quite frankly, a lot better than it had any right being.

The film is rated R for strong violence, grisly images, and language.

THIS WEEKEND AT THE MOVIES

Welcome back for another busy weekend at the movies. None of last week's new releases seemed to catch on with audiences, despite the less-than-stellar returns of "Solo," but this time around we have at least one high-profile project that should take charge of the box office.

Up first, however, is "Hereditary," the latest small-budget horror film from A24, which has become one of the most prominent studios for disturbing horror films and edgy independent movies. It is written and directed by Ari Aster, who makes his feature debut with this project about Annie (Toni Collette, "Krampus"), who is dealing with the death of her mother as well as the increasingly bizarre behavior of her daughter (newcomer Milly Shapiro). Like with most trailers for A24 films, they didn't give much of the story away, but apparently Annie discovers her family has some terrible secrets. The cast also includes Gabriel Byrne ("The Usual Suspects") and Alex Wolff ("Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle"). The trailers look really disturbing, and based on the early buzz, that is a quite accurate description of the film.

The movie is rated R for horror violence, disturbing images, language, drug use and brief graphic nudity.

"Hotel Artemis" is another weekend release with a director making his feature debut, although Drew Pearce, who also wrote the movie, has helped pen several major projects, such as "Iron Man 2" and "Mission: Impossible -- Rogue Nation." This movie, set in a riot-torn Los Angeles in the near future, follows the Nurse (Jodie Foster, "Panic Room"), who runs a secret, members-only hospital for criminals that features a series of hard-and-fast rules, including no violence within its walls. When a thief (Sterling K. Brown, "This Is Us") arrives at the hospital looking for treatment for his brother and carrying a very valuable item, the rules will soon be broken. Despite the obvious similarities to the Continental Hotel from the "John Wick" movies, this one looks quite interesting, even if it's just for the all-star cast, which also includes Jeff Goldblum ("Thor: Ragnarok"), Sofia Boutella ("Atomic Blonde"), Dave Bautista ("Avengers: Infinity War"), Zachary Quinto ("Star Trek"), Charlie Day ("Pacific Rim: Uprising") and Jenny Slate ("Gifted").

Rounding out the weekend's wide releases is "Ocean's 8," a spin-off of sorts from director Steven Soderbergh's trilogy of heist films, this time following Danny Ocean's sister Debbie (Sandra Bullock, "Gravity"), who will lead an all-female crew in the biggest caper of their careers, robbing the annual Met Gala. The film is directed and co-written by Gary Ross ("The Hunger Games," "Seabiscuit"), although Soderbergh is on board as producer. Unlike another high-profile summer film that gender-swapped the main cast and was met with massive backlash -- I'm looking at you, "Ghostbusters" -- this is not a remake throwing out everything fans had come to love, but instead a new story set in the same world as all our favorite characters. Joining that pantheon of entertaining criminals is a cast that includes Cate Blanchett ("Thor: Ragnarok"), Mindy Kaling



Ragnarok"), Sofia Boutella ("Atomic Blonde"), Dave Bautista ("Avengers: Infinity War"), Zachary Quinto ("Star Trek"), Charlie Day ("Pacific Rim: Uprising") and Jenny Slate ("Gifted").

The film is rated R for violence and language throughout, some sexual references and brief drug use.

Finally, expanding into our area in limited release is "First Reformed," the latest film from writer/director Paul Schrader ("City Hall," "American Gigolo"), who has also penned some extremely well-known films such as "Taxi Driver" and "Raging Bull." This film follows Toller (Ethan Hawke, "The Magnificent Seven"), a priest who recently suffered a great personal tragedy. One of his parishioners (Amanda Seyfried, "Les Misérables") brings him information about a potential crime, and he must decide what to do when it seems nobody else will act. Based on the trailers, this looks to be a showcase for Hawke, as he delivers several powerful moments in just two and a half minutes. I hadn't heard of this one until now, but fans of Hawke and Schrader should consider checking this one out if you have the chance.

The movie is rated R for some disturbing violent images.

Teens practice safety techniques on each other as they learn life-saving skills such as wound care, search and rescue and fire extinguisher use.


Ondash recognized for STEM accomplishments

Pedestrian and bike plan in works
