Are businesses meeting criteria?

Tax exemption criteria reviewed

County commissioners say they need to review the criteria in their own ordinance to ensure all requirements are being met before granting property tax exemptions for new and expanding businesses.

In the Aug. 28 Primary election, local voters overwhelmingly supported renewal of Taylor County's main economic development tool – voting 2,622 to 1,461 (64%) in favor of extending an "Economic Development

Ad Valorem Tax Exemption" referendum for another 10 years.

This will continue to allow county commissioners the option of granting full or partial property tax exemptions to new and

expanding businesses.

However, commissioners recently expressed some concerns about requirements in the ordinance being met and questioned if the Taylor County Development Authority (TCDA) is

adequately screening and analyzing applications prior to submitting a recommendation to the county for approval.

At a Sept. 10 meeting, Commissioner Pam Feagle shared information she

received from TCDA Director Scott Frederick concerning an application scheduled to come before the TCDA Board at a Sept. 13 meeting.

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Back the Blue concert rocks Rosehead Park this Saturday

It has been three months since Perry Police Department (PPD) K-9 Ptl. Timmy Murphy sustained serious burns during an accident at his home in late June.

Although each day brings him one step closer to a full recovery, Murphy still faces an extended period of time off work.

But he doesn't have to face those coming weeks and months alone – his brothers and sisters in blue are standing by his side. This Saturday, they will host one of their biggest events ever, a "Back the Blue Music Benefit."

Proceeds from the concert will benefit not only the Timmy Murphy Recovery

Fund, but also PPD's "Shop With a Cop" program and local Special Olympics athletes.

"We would like to see this turn into an annual event," PPD Chief Jamie Cruse said. "This is a community event, sponsored by the City of Perry."

The event will be held at Rosehead Park. The main

gate (located on Washington Street) opens at 4:30 p.m. and the music begins at 6 p.m. Admission is \$5 per person.

"The seafood vendor who participates at all of our local festivals – BBQ, bluegrass and the Forest Festival – will be set up at

City approves final budget, hesitates on contribution to Leadership Council

The Perry City Council adopted its final budget and millage rate for the coming fiscal year Tuesday with little fanfare and no public input.

With a 3-0 vote, the council set the upcoming millage rate at 6.0716 (a figure slightly lower than last year's rate of 6.12) and approved a proposed \$10.8 million budget that included a three-percent raise for city employees. (Councilwoman Venita Woodfaulk was not present due to a death in her family; Councilwoman Shirlye Hampton was not present due to health issues.)

There was no one from the public in attendance. Mayor Alan Hall, Councilman Mike Deming and Councilman Ward Ketring expressed some reservations regarding a \$5,000 "miscellaneous" line item that was tentatively earmarked to support a \$6,300 donation request from the Taylor County Leadership Council.

"There have been some changes -- \$2,500 taken out of the demolition budget like Councilwoman Hampton suggested and \$2,500 out of the entertainment budget like Councilwoman Woodfaulk asked. It was put into a miscellaneous account to possibly give to the Leadership Council," Finance Director Penny Staffney said.

"Did we vote on this?" Deming asked. "You did not vote on it, but I asked what you wanted me to do, and there seemed to be a consensus to move it," Staffney said.

"I don't mind helping them, but I am not in favor of taking it out of the entertainment budget, which goes for the whole community," Hall said.

"I would like to see them come back next May when we start the budget process for next year. They requested (money) to purchase furniture and I look around City Hall and see where we have needs too," Deming said.

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Who should maintain old cemeteries?

County Commissioner Steve Spradley has requested the county assume maintenance of the recently-recognized Cabbage Grove Cemetery site.

Spradley first brought up the subject at the county's Sept. 4 meeting and then again during a Sept. 13 workshop session He shared that the Cabbage Grove Cemetery was recently re-discovered as being located on property owned by Four Rivers Land & Timber.

In November 2017 the Taylor County Commission appointed a volunteer committee that worked to locate

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Spradley: 'We need to follow the guidelines'

"I just want to share with the board and make you aware the TCDA will meet this week and is being asked to vote on a tax abatement application for American Aluminum," Feagle stated.

"My fear is we may have opened up Pandora's box. I can see a lot of other businesses coming forward and wanting tax abatements," Feagle said. "I thought that this was primarily for new businesses, so I think this is something we need to address."

"Has it just been for new businesses in the past?" Commissioner Jim Moody asked.

"We did one for Michael Lynn's apartment complex after the fact," Commissioner Malcolm Page said.

When asked by Commissioner Jim Moody if he could answer specific questions about requirements in the ordinance, Frederick answered, "No sir, I cannot."

"I support it for anyone who is going to put more people to work and spread out the tax burden. They did it for Tom's," Commissioner Thomas Demps said. "Maybe not 100 percent (tax exemption), but we need to help those who have been here helping pay taxes too."

"Has the new owners of the chip plant applied?" Moody asked.

"They have the paperwork, but they have not filled it out yet. But, they do plan to submit an application," Frederick replied.

"I would call that a new business with new employees because that building was sitting empty," Moody replied.

"Did anyone promise them a tax abatement before they came?" Commissioner Steve Spradley asked.

"That is one of the only tools we have to attract new business here, so yes, it was discussed with them. There are several other companies we are aware of who are interested in applying. We don't go out and solicit them, but if they ask we have to tell them about it," Frederick stated.

"The people of Taylor County clearly supported this, as they are getting a better understanding of economic development and how this is a much-needed tool," Frederick added. "Eighty percent of new jobs are created by existing

industry, so we need to support business expansion as well."

"I was contacted by a TCDA board member who is a business owner and said that he could apply for it, but he would not because that is not why this was created and defeats the purpose," Page said. "He asked us to please revisit this ordinance, so this is a good time to go over it and see if we need to change anything."

"AMTEC Less-Lethal made a corporate decision not to apply. They certainly could have, but it was not in line with their corporate philosophy," Frederick stated.

"I agree with Mr. Demps that if you are an existing business and you have been paying taxes and you create a bunch of high-paying jobs, you should be able to qualify. But, you should not be able to wait seven or eight years to do it," Page added.

"You can grant different levels of exemptions up to 100 percent, depending on how much you want to do. Even if the TCDA Board votes in favor of an application, you have the final say," Frederick said.

"Ultimately, it is up to this board to decide who qualifies for these exemptions," Feagle agreed.

"I had two large local businesses owners who called me and said they would not apply for tax exemptions even though they could," Feagle stated.

"You can revisit this every year because your ordinance calls for an annual review to see if a business complied with the requirements and created all the jobs they said they would," County Administrator Ted Lakey said.

"I am willing to look at each one on a case-by-case basis and see what their plan is and what they will bring to the county," Spradley said.

"We need to look at our ordinance and clean it up to see if businesses are meeting the requirements – and not just rely on someone saying they are going to create 20 new jobs. We need to verify and see if that is done," Feagle added.

"There are guidelines in our ordinance, and we need to follow them," Spradley agreed.

During a county workshop meeting three days later, commissioners discussed the issue again.

"You wanted this item on

the agenda to discuss if the requirement in our ordinance needs tweaking," Lakey began.

"At the TCDA meeting today there were quite a few questions – even from TCDA board members – about an application that includes things from two or three years ago," Feagle said.

"The current process is that an application goes before the TCDA Board first and they are supposed to do a pre-screening where they review the application to see if it satisfies the requirements," Lakey informed the board.

"The application we looked at today had not been reviewed to see if it met those requirements," Lakey said. "The ordinance also requires the TCDA to perform an analysis and submit a recommendation to this board, but I have not seen that either."

Lakey quoted portions of the county's ordinance (see related story) and added, "It does not appear the TCDA has done what is required. The ordinance also states the property appraiser will review the application and provide the county with some additional information, including an estimate of the revenue that would be lost to the county if the exemption is granted."

"So, we need this information from the TCDA and the property appraiser as the ordinance requires. There is a process that needs to be followed before it comes before us," Lakey added.

"This was passed primarily to attract new businesses, but I think it does need to apply to existing businesses as well," Page said. "However, I don't think we need to allow it to go back 10-15 years."

"Several people have talked to me about this, and we need to head off any problems – like when someone buys a store and hires one person and then gets a 75% tax abatement," Page added. "If you expand your business, apply for it now and not five years down the road."

"We have an attorney hired to write these things up. Perhaps Conrad will be here next meeting and can help us out," Page said.

"There were a lot of things that were not clear at the TCDA meeting today. However, one thing that was cleared up for me is that this will not affect the amount of taxes homeowners pay. Any exemptions we grant will only affect new taxes and not reduced any existing taxes, and you must create new jobs," Feagle said.

"We have a lot of flexibility in how much of an exemption we grant and how long we allow the tax abatement up to 10 years," Page said. "I am going to rely a lot on TCDA to come up here make a recommendation to us. My biggest headache with this would be allowing businesses to go too far into the past to apply."

"Our ordinance has everything spelled out in it already – the number of jobs that need to be created, etc.,"

Spradley said. "The biggest problem I see is the TCDA is not doing what is spelled out in the ordinance. The TCDA director should be doing these things and filling out the application and verifying it meets the requirements."

"The TCDA Board needs all that information to make a recommendation to this board. We just need to make sure the TCDA is following the guidelines in the ordinance and a lot of these problems go away. Perhaps the board went beyond what was allowed under the ordinance in the past, but I

don't see anything in there that allows businesses to go back in the past."

Feagle wrapped up the workshop discussion by asking each commissioner to review the county's existing "Economic Development Ad Valorem Tax Exemption" ordinance and bring back any proposed changes at the next meeting when County Attorney Conrad Bishop would be in attendance to weigh in.

Under the county's ordinance: "Pre-screening. The TCDA Director, or his/her designee, shall review the

application within 10 days of submission to determine whether the application has satisfied all the requirements of section 70-38. Once the application is determined to be complete, the director shall schedule a meeting of the TCDA Board. The meeting shall be held within 30 days of determining the application is complete, or as soon as practical thereafter."

Ordinance defines 'new' and 'expanding' business, as well as application process

County Ordinance No. 2009-08 states: "The board of county commissioners shall have the sole and absolute authority and discretion, as provided by law, to grant or deny economic development ad valorem tax exemptions pursuant to this article."

Excerpts include: "The following businesses are eligible for consideration of the economic development ad valorem tax exemption pursuant to this article:

(1) New businesses, which shall mean:

a. A business establishing 10 or more quality jobs to employ 10 or more full-time employees in Taylor County, which manufactures, processes, compounds, fabricates, or produces for sale items of tangible personal property at a fixed location and which comprises an industrial or manufacturing plant; or

b. A business establishing 25 or more quality jobs to employ 25 or more full-time employees in Taylor County, the sales factor of which, as defined by F.S. § 220.15(5), for the facility with respect to which it requests an economic development ad valorem tax exemption is less than 0.50 for each year the exemption is claimed; or

c. An office space in Taylor County owned and used by a business newly domiciled in Taylor County; provided such office space houses 50 or more full-time employees of such business; provided that such business or office first begins operation on a site clearly separate from any other commercial or industrial operation owned by the same business.

(2) Expansion of an existing business, which shall mean:

a. A business establishing 10 or more quality jobs to employ 10 or more full-time employees in Taylor County, which manufactures, processes, compounds, fabricates, or produces for sale items of tangible personal property at a fixed location and which comprises an industrial or manufacturing plant; or

b. A business establishing 25 or more quality jobs to employ 25 or more full-time employees in Taylor County, the sales factor of which, as defined by F.S. § 220.15(5), for the facility with respect to which it requests an economic development ad valorem tax exemption is less than 0.50 for each year the exemption is claimed; provided that such business increases operations on a site

collocated with a commercial or industrial operation owned by the same business, resulting in a net increase in employment of not less than ten percent or an increase in productive output of not less than ten percent.

Effective date. The exemptions shall not accrue to improvements to real property made by or for the use of new or expanding businesses when such improvements have been on the tax rolls prior to the effective date of the specific ordinance granting the ad valorem tax exemptions to the business.

Sec. 70-39. - Application process.

Upon receipt of an application for the economic development ad valorem tax exemption, the application shall be reviewed in the following manner:

(1) **Prescreening.** The Taylor County Development Authority (TCDA) Director, or his/her designee, shall review the application within 10 days of submission to determine whether the application has satisfied all the requirements of section 70-38. Once the application is determined to be complete, the director shall schedule a meeting of the TCDA board of directors.

(2) **Preliminary analysis.** No later than 10 days prior to the TCDA board meeting, the TCDA director shall prepare, in writing, a recommendation of the applicant's eligibility for an exemption and prepare an economic impact analysis of the application. The recommendation and analysis shall be forwarded to the TCDA board immediately upon completion.

(3) **Economic development committee review.** The TCDA board shall review the application and the director's recommendation and analysis to determine whether the applicant is eligible for an exemption and shall recommend to the commission approval or denial of the application.

Final review/adoption by commission. Upon receipt of the property appraiser's report, the TCDA director shall schedule the application on the next available commission meeting. At that meeting, the commission shall consider the application, recommendation and analysis of the TCDA director, and the property appraiser's report to determine whether or not to consider the adoption of an ordinance granting an economic development ad valorem tax exemption to the applicant.

Work is scheduled to begin in the coming days, and milling and paving operations are scheduled to begin Monday, Oct. 1, weather permitting.

In addition to resurfacing, the project will include installation of pipe in the median of the roadway to improve drainage issues, as well as other incidental construction.

The project will consist of predominantly daytime

work, and motorists traveling on U.S. 19 can expect to see reduced travel lanes while work is taking place. However, no lane closures will be allowed during 6:30 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. daily.

Work is tentatively set to be completed Spring 2019.

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Commissioners seek opinion from county attorney

restore the historic cemetery.

Maps, photos and personal interviews with former Cabbage Grove residents helped narrow the search.

In early March 2018, Dr. Mary Glowacki, state archaeologist and chief of the Florida Bureau of Archaeological Research, and members of her staff met with the committee, helping them secure the assistance of the Department of State in locating and reestablishing the recognition of the Cabbage Grove Cemetery.

A few weeks later, volunteers met at the cemetery site with Suzi Goodhope and cadaver dogs, which "hit" on possible gravesites.

Further investigation with a mobile ground penetration radar confirmed the presence of 11 casket signals.

Four Rivers has since deeded the historical site to Oakland Church. Volunteers collected private donations to pay to place a fence around the borders of the cemetery. On Sept. 16, during the Oakland Church annual reunion and homecoming, a dedication ceremony was held in which Cabbage Grove Cemetery volunteer committee member Rodney Lee presented the deed to Oakland Church Pastor Danny Lundy.

A granite slab has been set at the site to mark the final resting place of Taylor County's earliest pioneers.

"The county does not have to take ownership, but Oakland Church is not willing to take over maintenance," Spradley told his fellow commissioners. "Pastor Danny Lundy has asked if the county would be willing to assume maintenance because they already pay to mow their own cemetery."

"We have other cemeteries that have been identified - just like this one - that are being maintained by the county. I want to know what law prevents us from maintaining this cemetery if it has been declared one of historical significance," Spradley said.

"We need an interpretation to see if this law applies to Cabbage Grove," Spradley said.

Commissioner Malcolm Page agreed, and Chairwoman Pam Feagle agreed to place the item on the agenda for the county's workshop session.

"Our ordinance allows for the board to authorize county staff or a contractor to maintain certain church grounds that are open to the

public," Spradley said at the workshop.

Spradley also cited a 1967 Florida House of Representatives bill (No. 3291) authorizing the county to use county equipment to maintain cemeteries and church grounds, declaring such purposes to be "public and county purposes" if the church grounds are open to the public and "such maintenance of church property shall be performed for any and all churches upon request from said church."

"This is a special act just for Taylor County. No other county asked for it," Clerk of Court Annie Mae Murphy pointed out.

Spradley also admitted that he could not longer find the language online in Florida Statutes archives, adding "There is no such chapter any longer. It is probably an administrative code. A special legislative act," Spradley said.

"But, I would guess that Chapter 497 would apply to this and an abandoned cemetery like Springhill," Spradley said.

Spradley cited Chapter 497 of Florida Statutes, which spells out what actions a city or county may take when an abandoned cemetery has not been reasonably maintained for a period in excess of six months. "I don't see where it would be that big of a deal to take over mowing it three or four times a year," Page said, adding that the Cabbage Grove Cemetery site is only .27 acres.

Commissioner Thomas Demps then brought up

acre cemetery to the five cemeteries we already maintain?" Page asked.

"If it is not open to the public, don't we need to get our attorney to give us an opinion on this?" Feagle asked.

"The difference between this (Cabbage Grove) and Springhill is that this one

is already cleared and maintained, where Springhill would need a lot of trees to be cleared. It is not the same type of situation," Murphy said.

"I am all for doing it, if it is legal, but it sounds like we need to get (County Attorney) Conrad Bishop's opinion," Commissioner Jim

Moody said.

Under a 2008 ordinance (2008-10), the county currently contracts out maintenance (mowing and weedeating) on eight local cemeteries, including: Springhill, New Hope, Poor Spot, Pisgah, Spring Warrior, Waters, Shiloh and Stanaland.

"I'm not against helping them with improvements," Ketring said. He also pointed out that when the Boys & Girls Club had a satellite club location at the Jerkins Community Center, "many people from the community donated toward that."

"You don't have to make a decision tonight on how that miscellaneous fund is used," Staffney noted.

The council agreed and

moved forward with adopting the budget as presented.

At its last meeting, representatives from the Leadership Council asked the city for \$6,300 to fund additional improvements at the Jerkins Community Center. The budget for that project is \$25,000.

The request came on the heels of the Taylor County Board of Commissioners giving the group a \$30,000 contribution to assist with a separate project to upgrade the bathrooms at the community facility.

FIRES RAVAGED HOMES

Three fires did a large amount of damage to three occupied homes in Taylor County the week of Sept. 28, 1983.

There was \$10,000 worth of damage to the home of **Danny Lundy** off Slaughter Road Thursday, Sept. 21, 1983, according to a report filed with the Perry Fire Department. Two fire trucks responded to the 9:35 a.m. blaze that possible started because of an electrical short circuit in a window air

conditioning unit.

What happened to Mr. A.J.?

One day they were here. The next they were gone.

Just like that.

Maybe, its just conjecture, but I'm not the only person from my old neighborhood who wonders whatever happened to some of the elderly neighbors from our childhood.

It seems a few of my elderly neighbors just disappeared. Vanished. And, no one from the neighborhood -- at least the people I've spoken to about it -- seems to know what really happened to them.

One of those neighbors was an elderly man we called Mr. A.J.

One day, the neighborhood kids were running and "pretending" to be scared of Mr. A.J. The next day -- actually, a few years later -- Mr. A.J. was gone. He didn't die suddenly. It was more like, one day we looked up and suddenly missed seeing him.

Although we never heard anything about Mr. A.J. harming anyone, all of the kids in the neighborhood were scared of him because he often walked around talking to himself. And, to be honest, his physical presence was a bit fear-provoking for children under 25.

Whenever we saw him walking up the road, we would play scared and run or walk on the grass so he could have the entire road.

My brothers and I weren't scared of Mr. A.J. because we were used to him stopping by the house whenever he saw my grandfather outside. But, we went along with the other kids and pretended we were scared

of him.

I knew Mr. A.J. had a mental disability, but I thought his behavior was more likely attributed to him being lonely because people were scared of him. At least that's what my grandmother said.

So, when I wasn't with the other kids, I didn't pretend to be scared of Mr. A.J. Instead of walking by on the other side of the street or speeding up when I saw him, I went out of my way to be nice to him.

"Hey, Mr. A.J.," I greeted him.

"Hey," he would respond in a gravelly voice that was enough to scare the wits out you.

"How are you?" I'd ask.

He would answer with a nod of the head, then speed up to keep me from asking another question.

After my grandfather passed, I saw Mr. A.J. around the neighborhood, but he no longer stopped by our house.

And then one day he was gone.

A story began circulating around the neighborhood that Mr. A.J. had gotten on a Greyhound bus bound for New York. Supposedly, his luggage arrived in New York, but he didn't. No one has seen or heard from him since.

Another story I heard was he woke up one morning and simply walked away.

I'm sure there are other stories.

I never knew Mr. A.J.'s last name or who he was related to, so I haven't been able to find out what really happened to him. But, after nearly 40 years, I would still like to know.

Nine from Taylor help with hurricane clean-up, recovery in North Carolina

After Hurricane Florence had passed and the water receded enough to allow access, nine volunteers left Perry Monday morning traveling to Whiteville, N.C., as part of the Florida Baptist Disaster Relief Team.

Western Prong Baptist Church in Whiteville is one of the staging areas for clean-up and recovery teams, as well as feeding and shower units.

The Taylor Baptist Association chipped in and provided a trailer with the equipment needed for a clean-up and recovery team. Another volunteer carried

a tractor and a dump trailer to help in tree and debris removal.

According to updates sent to volunteers, the groups has provided 10 mobile kitchens from several southeastern states.

As of this past Sunday (Day 6 of the response), the kitchens had served more than 4,700 meals across the state.

Five additional recovery sites are being staged as the water recedes, with some areas ready for chainsaws. Of the 83 requests for help so far, 21 have been assessed, and 11 have been completed at this time.

Coordinators expect to have enough weekly

volunteers to cover the next four to six weeks, with the Taylor team serving this week. Those who volunteered for this week included: David Beigle, Bill Carrier, Jerry Durden, Ernie Eakins, Robert Eddings, Cecile Hance, David Harden, Steve Ruff and Jeff Stading. Other volunteers from Taylor County will be heading out in the coming weeks. Volunteers can be recognized on the job by their yellow caps and shirts with their state's Baptist Disaster Response Team emblems.

"The goal is to offer help to those in need in the name of Jesus," team members said.

Keaton Beach Fishing Report

Trout limits are coming easy

Trout fishing has been "off the chain" as the kids say.

I would call the bite "outstanding," with limits of trout being easily caught, including one fish over 20 inches per angler on each of three trips this past week.

We are catching our fish on live pinfish under Back Bay Thunders in water ranging from 4.0 ft. to 6.0 feet deep.

The key depth is 4.5 to 5.0 feet and the best overall bite is happening during the middle two hours (hours 2-4) of the six-hour incoming tide cycle.

I have continued to use a 32-inch leader of TrikFish 30 lb. clear mono despite the stained water. If you move into water with less than 12 to 15 inches of clarity, you

would need to shorten your leaders.

I had Billy Pillow, of Woods 'n Water Fishing Team fame, out Friday last, and it took less than an hour-and-a-half of fishing time to land our 10 trout. We had two over 20 inches as well!

Sunday, I had David Abrams of Tallahassee out with his two buddies, Mike Abrams and Clifford Dunaway. We brought in 11 trout measuring up to 23 inches, but released well over a dozen more keepers -- including four over 20 inches and one over 24 inches that I figured weighed 4.5 pounds.

Apparently, the trout heard we were releasing them and just had to have our baits!

We caught them on live pinfish under Thunders in

4.5 -5.0 feet. We managed one red, but struggled to not find any more in an hour-plus of fishing time.

Monday, I took Don Garner and Kent Thornton of Valdosta, Ga. out and again we took a quick limit of 15 quality trout with three over 20 inches in just over two hours fishing time. We also had one redfish.

We saw more ballyhoo on the surface this week than I had seen in a long time.

This weekend the key will be to work the early-morning incoming tides for trout, then hope for a redfish or two during the falling tide. Since the water has been clearing up a little, our reds may have pulled back in closer to the hill to find them some crabs to eat!

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'The House with a Clock in Its Walls' delivers genuine frights and laughs

Like myself, my best friend through much of my school days was a voracious reader. Although there are plenty of books I read that he didn't, and vice versa, it's rare that we didn't at least talk about them. So I was surprised when he messaged me about his excitement (and trepidation) over an adaptation of "The House with a Clock in Its Walls," a 1973 book by author John Bellairs I had never heard of before.

I then saw the trailer for the movie, which stars Jack Black ("Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle") and Cate Blanchett ("Thor: Ragnarok"). It intrigued me, but that was more due to his interest than because of the actual trailer. Sure, it looked fine, but I didn't have any vested interest in the source material.

At the time, I also didn't know it was directed by Eli Roth, none of whose films I have seen, because of their shocking levels of violence and gore. Still, his appearance only served to pique my interest for the film.

Having now seen it, I have to say it is quite enjoyable, presenting a fun mystery, interesting characters, plenty of laughs and more frights and thrills than you typically find in scary movies targeting youth. Sure there are a few jump scares (although not nearly as many as you might expect), but where the film really succeeds is in creating a sense of danger in both the ordinary and the strange. This eventually builds to a high level of tension as we begin to believe that our heroes are not guaranteed victory, something really hard to accomplish in most kids' movies.

The story follows young Lewis Barnavelt (Owen Vaccaro, "Daddy's Home"), who was recently orphaned and is now on his way to stay with his Uncle Jonathan (Black). The

eccentric man lives in a strange house and verbally spars with his neighbor Florence Zimmerman (Blanchett). Soon, Lewis learns that Jonathan is a warlock and Florence is a witch, and the pair begin to train him in magic. However, Jonathan does keep a secret, namely that the house used to be owned by the late Isaac Izard (Kyle MacLachlan, "Twin Peaks"), an evil warlock who left behind a hidden clock somewhere in the house counting down to something horrible.

The film does a solid job mixing the scares and the humor, which shouldn't be a huge surprise since screenwriter Eric Kripke created the long-running series "Supernatural." Not all of the jokes or humor hits, but the script does well avoiding throwing in jokes in inappropriate moments, and instead the film tends to give the somber or scary scenes time to marinate.

I don't believe this will be a film that's going to send kids home with nightmares, but it also doesn't pander to them, giving them enough credit to handle interesting story decisions and some genuinely creepy moments.

Black and Blanchett both deliver great performances, somehow managing to take what could have easily been two cartoonish characters and giving them some real emotion (and humor). With the exception of one early scene, Vaccaro is also solid in his role.

"The House with a Clock in Its Walls" is a fun film that delivers quality dread with enjoyable humor and combines the two for a scary family movie that will likely be a Halloween staple for years to come.

The film is rated PG for thematic elements, including sorcery, some action, scary images, rude humor and language.

'The Long Goodbye' will turn a dream into reality

For Taylor County native Anthony Lamarr White, it has been a dream to have his play "The Long Goodbye" performed at the Monticello Opera House. Not only is the play set in the town of Monticello, but the Opera House is the setting of several its scenes.

This November, that dream will become reality thanks to a partnership between the Monticello Opera House and Florida A&M University's (FAMU) Essential Theatre.

FAMU will host a staged reading of "The Long Goodbye" on Nov. 2-3, followed by a full stage production -- featuring the same cast -- at the Opera House on Nov. 30 through Dec. 9. Both the staged reading and the stage production will be directed by FAMU Assistant Professor Evelyn Tyler.

"I'm excited about working with the Monticello Opera House and FAMU Essential Theatre on the world premiere of 'The Long Goodbye,'" White said. "It's a dream come true for me. The play is set in Monticello, and my vision while writing the play was to see it performed at the Monticello Opera House."

"We are very excited to host 'The Long Goodbye,' both because it is written by a local author with connections to Monticello and the region, and because it is a wonderful play and script," Monticello Opera House Executive Director Michael J. Herrin said.


"It's interesting because not only is the play by a local author, but it's set in Monticello and the Opera House is in the play, with several scenes taking place in the Opera House. It is an honor for us to be included in such a fine script and for us to host the Florida premiere of the play," Herrin said.

"It was always Anthony Lamarr White's dream for the play to be shown at the Monticello Opera House," he said. "He contacted me earlier this year and sent me the script. Originally, it was going to be a staged reading, but then he changed it to a full-stage production. Once we read the script, we were delighted to have a slot open during the holidays. It seemed like a perfect fit."

As for Tyler, she first met White last year at the National Black Theatre Festival, where he was staging "The Long Goodbye" for a reading. A friend asked Tyler to play a role in the reading, which also included Vanessa Bell Calloway, known for her role in the hit film "Coming to America."

"That was my first time being introduced to the work," Tyler said. "The reading was packed wall to wall, and the play was very well received."

Describing herself as "attracted" to the play, Tyler used the work in her oral

interpretation curriculum at FAMU, with students presenting Act 1 and Act 2 in groups during class.

But even then, Tyler was not finished with "The Long Goodbye." Next, she made a request to the theatre program to host a staged reading as part of the current 2018-19 season.

"They said yes," she said. "Shortly thereafter, I got a call from Anthony asking if I could direct a stage production at the Monticello Opera House."

Thanks to the partnership with Essential Theatre and the Monticello Opera House, the actors performing in the staged reading at FAMU will also be assuming the same roles in the stage production in Monticello.

According to Tyler, the majority of the cast consists of FAMU students and FAMU alumni.

Rehearsals begin in Tallahassee next week, during which time the play's designers will present their ideas on how the production will look when it takes the stage in Monticello, Tyler said.

"The Long Goodbye" is a story of love, of hope and having to let go, with the story following Mrs. Pet, for whom disbelief is the easiest way to deal with the death of her only child, 30-year-old Amy.

For Clarence, Mrs. Pet's husband, and Terry, her son-in-law, time is the best medicine. It's been nearly two years since Amy died on Christmas morning, and for two years, Mrs. Pet has patiently waited for her return, believing that Amy really didn't die -- she just went away until her illness is cured. Mrs. Pet has been trapped in time since that morning, refusing to remove her Christmas décor. It's Christmas year-round at Mrs. Pet's.

Tyler said she hopes that if audiences take anything away from the play, it is that "love is unfailing."

"Love never fails when it's constant. The character in the play is in denial, but her family doesn't push her away or call her crazy. They embrace her."

"Love helps things to heal and to be resurrected and to grow," Tyler said. "I hope audiences will see a part of themselves or their family members and take away something good from it."

The Monticello Opera House is located in the historic Perkins building, which was constructed in 1890 on the courthouse square in Monticello. The 300-seat theatre is located on the second floor, with retail establishments on the first.

At the time, so much traffic was passing through the area on trains that a three-story hotel was located next door. When the rails shifted directions, however, the visitors stopped arriving and the theatre closed.

Then, in the 1970s, the theatre was saved from demolition and now regularly presents shows, including plays, dinner theatre, murder mysteries and concerts.

"We do a variety of shows at the Opera House," Herrin said. "Many of them are fairly mainstream, but we do love to feature not only new works but also ones from other cultures, such as another play we're featuring this fall with the Tallahassee Hispanic Theatre."

That play is "Happily Ever After," which will run Nov. 9-10 and Nov. 16-17 at the Opera House.

"We love having a variety of shows to present to our patrons and the region," Herrin said.

"I hope this production and the support we are receiving from my hometown can be the catalyst for establishing a community theatre in Taylor County," White said.

THIS WEEKEND AT THE MOVIES

As September keeps rolling on, the final weekend of the month delivers four new films in wide (or semi-wide) release.

Up first is "Hell Fest," a new horror film set within an amusement park celebrating horror films. When a group of friends arrive for a night of thrills and scares, they find themselves the target of a serial killer, but everyone else just thinks it's part of the show. The film is directed by Gregory Plotkin ("Paranormal Activity: The Ghost Dimension"), and the cast includes Bex Taylor-Klaus ("Scream: The TV Series"), Reign Edwards ("The Bold and the Beautiful") and Amy Forsyth ("Rise"). With Universal Studios' Halloween Horror Nights and others becoming massive draws, it is surprising that it's taken this long for someone to jump on the possibility of using one as the basis of a horror film. The key is whether or not the director and writers can turn an interesting concept into an enjoyable movie.

The movie is rated R for horror violence, and language including some sexual references.

"Little Women" arrives on the 150th anniversary of the classic novel, only this film brings the beloved characters and their story into modern day. The story follows four sisters, Meg (Melanie Stone, "Mythica: A Quest for Heroes"), Jo (Sarah Davenport, "Stitchers"), Beth (Allie Jennings, "Once I Was a Beehive") and Amy March (newcomer Elise Jones) through the trials and tribulations of life. I'm not sure if anyone was asking for a modern retelling of "Little Women," but if you ever wondered what one would look like, now is your chance. In case you prefer the original time period, director Greta Gerwig ("Lady Bird") has another adaptation scheduled for



release next year featuring Saoirse Ronan, Emma Watson, Meryl Streep and Timothée Chalamet.

The modern version opening this weekend is rated PG-13 for some thematic elements and teen drinking.

"Night School" combines the comedy might of Kevin Hart ("Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle") and Tiffany Haddish ("Girls Trip"). Hart plays a man who must attend night school to earn his GED, while Haddish is his teacher. The film is directed by Malcolm D. Lee ("Girls Trip") with a script featuring six credited screenwriters, including Hart. It seems you can't turn around without bumping into a film featuring either Hart or Haddish, so it will be interesting to see how the combination fares at the box office. The trailers look funny, and fans of both actors should consider giving this one a chance. Hopefully, it earns the right grade.

The movie is rated PG-13



for crude and sexual content throughout, language, some drug references and violence.

Finally, we have "Smallfoot," the latest film from Warner Animation Group ("The LEGO Movie," "Storks"), this time following a Big Foot who is facing banishment from his tribe over his belief in the fabled Small Foot (a.k.a. humans). It is a role reversal type of story reminiscent of the "Hotel Transylvania" franchise in which monsters are more scared of us than we are of them. The all-star voice cast includes Channing Tatum, James Corden, Zendaya, Common, LeBron James, Danny Devito, Gina Rodriguez and more. Fortunately for the movie, there are no other animated releases scheduled until November, so it should have time to bring in the family business.

The movie is rated PG for some action, rude humor, and thematic elements.
