Low key on tax reform

Like other Florida cities, the city of Venice has run the numbers in anticipation of the upcoming property tax reform measure and its probable fiscal impact.

If the proposed constitutional amendment passes, the city anticipates a minimum of \$450,000 less in revenue. That's equal to reducing city staff by as many as 20 to 25 positions.

And it could rise to as much as \$1 million if unintended consequences materialize.

The impact of granting portability for the homestead exemption under Amendment 1, in particular, is hard to measure, according to City Manager Marty Black.

"We looked at the county's (financial impact) model. There is no rational way to estimate the impact of portability," he said. "Trying to guess how people buy and sell here, whether they will move ... (is difficult). Worst case, it could double the impact of the homestead."

Unlike some other county officials, Black says he intends to follow closely the vote of Venice residents, and present a budget to city council based on local voter wishes.

"I think that's the wrong approach" to say we will

County may muddy up special election ballot

A proposed Sarasota County Charter change that would further limit the ability of local politicians to alter long-range growth plans without voter approval will go to referendum this spring, but not without some efforts to cloud the

The county commission reluctantly agreed to schedule a special election in either March or April on an initiative by Citizens for Sensible Growth that obtained more than 12,500 petition signatures and triggered a countywide vote within 60 days.

But commissioners threatened to load up the special election ballot with

other questions that would: minute debate. 1) require a financial analysis for future citizens' initiatives; 2) change the timetable for filing such initiatives; and 3) raise the cap on using surtax revenue to retire bonds.

"If anybody has anything else to put on a ballot, bring it on," Commission Chair Shannon Staub said at the conclusion of a 30-

Earlier, when it was suggested the citizens' group might challenge efforts to delay an election, Staub said, "Let 'em sue."

If approved, the group's proposed charter change would prohibit the commission from adjusting an urban service boundary in

One Dodge Neon northbound on Interstate 75 got a Christmas present last month from Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Ed Pope, worth maybe hundreds of dollars. And the driver didn't even know it.

Pope was scouting the pre-holiday traffic looking for aggressive drivers, and spotted the little Neon following too closely and weaving in and out of traffic. He sped up for a closer observation ... but then he saw a family by the side of the road, unloading their minivan to get to the spare tire.



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

Breaking down the tax amendment

All politics, they say, is local, and nothing is more local — or more personal than property taxes.

So, it's not surprising that Florida's Jan. 29 presidential primaries have been obscured by raging debate about a referendum on the same ballot that would overhaul the state's property tax system.

The 500-word proposal, widely labeled as confusing, would cut an estimated \$9.3 billion in property taxes statewide in the next five

If approved by 60 percent of the voters, it would be the second tax cut in two years for Florida landowners state legislators forced local governments to cut budgets 7 percent in 2007.

There are four components to the proposed amendment, which would: double the \$25,000 homestead exemption; make Save Our Homes benefits "portable"; cap property tax hikes at 10 percent a year for nonhomestead land; and allow a \$25,000 exemption for tangible property.

say the **Proponents** state's 4.45 million homesteaded homeowners will benefit immediately from the doubled homestead exemption, and by retaining Save Our Homes benefits should they move.

In addition to homeowners' groups, the measure is supported by a wide range of business interests, including Realtors, who believe adoption could help jumpstart a stalled real estate market.

Opposition

The proposal is opposed by local governments, school districts, education lobbyists, police and fire service representatives, among others.

Governments claim the measure would significantly reduce revenues and force cutbacks in services.

In December, the state's Office of Economic & Demographic Research released the results from its annual revenue estimating conference that forecast local governments in Charlotte, Sarasota, DeSoto, and Hardee counties would collect \$290 million less in tax revenue over the next five years if the proposal passes.

Sarasota County government, OEDR economists project, would see \$11.4 million less in tax revenue in fiscal year 2009, and \$83 million between now and 2012.

They estimate the Sarasota County School District would collect \$4.5 million less in tax revenue in fiscal year 2009, and \$45.6 million less over a five-year span.

Last week, Sarasota County's budget director said the state's forecasts underestimate revenue declines for counties, cities, schools and special taxing districts.

Sarasota County Chief Financial Officer Jeff Seward said Sarasota County's government would see \$14 million less in tax revenues — not \$11.4 million less, according to the OEDR — in fiscal year 2009.

So, it's no wonder voters are confused when it comes to weighing pros, cons, and tradeoffs of such a proposal.

Elements

And while the big-picture ramifications of tax reform will continue to be influenced by perspective, its small-picture application can be defined and analyzed through the eye of the homesteaded voter.

• Doubling the exemption: If approved, the \$25,000 exemption will be doubled to \$50,000 for properties with assessed value of \$75,000 or

This would result in an immediate saving for homesteaded properties beginning this year.

Statewide, the doubled exemption would save qualified landowners, on average, about \$200 a year.

In Sarasota County, it would cut about \$240 a year, on average, from homesteaded property taxes.

The saving would be significantly more if school districts weren't exempt.

Only the original \$25,000 exemption will apply to school district assessments, which are a significant component of aggregate millage rates levied on landowners.

In Sarasota County, for instance, school millage rates are higher than those of the county government.

 Save Our Homes portability: Save Our Homes caps the amount of taxable value a home can increase each year at 3 percent, so homeowners often pay taxes for a property assessed at significantly less than market value, especially as the years go by.

Locked in

In the 12 years since SOH was created, its influence on the assessed value of property has exceeded expectations.

In 2007, it reduced homesteaded assessed value statewide by \$432 billion — about 37 percent of the just value of homestead property in the

However, under the existing system, homeowners lose their SOH benefit when they move. Their new home is taxed at its market value, and the clock starts ticking from that point on building up the cushion.

Proponents of the Jan. 29 measure say this has "locked" some in their homes because they would incur a greater tax burden by moving, even to a smaller home in some area where property values have appreciated dramatically.

Allowing homeowners to transfer accumulated SOH benefits up to \$500,000 within two years, to a new property, would loosen this

prohibition. It works like this: If a homeowner owns a \$250,000 home assessed at \$150,000, the accumulated SOH bene-

fit is \$100,000. If that homeowner moves to \$300,000 house, rather than be assessed at its \$300,000 sales price, the transferred \$100,000 SOH benefit would lower that taxable value to \$200,000.

• 10-percent cap on nonhomesteaded land: This is intended to prevent dramatic leaps in property values for businesses, rental homes and investment properties that now have no ceil-

ing on annual appreciation. School districts, excluded from the homestead exemption increase to \$50,000, could be affected more by this component of the taxreform proposal than any other element.

• \$25,000 tangible personal property exemption. Businesses would get tax cuts for items such as office equipment. School districts are exempt.

Council felt it shouldn't become the homeowners responsibility to monitor city sidewalks. Existing ordinances, said some, were sufficient to pursue monetary damages caused by tree roots and falling limbs on city property.



ty tax reform measure on the statewide Jan. 29 ballot.

If you don't count the five presenters and county staff in attendance, less than a dozen citizens attended the discussion. Civic and county leaders' views varied widely.

There was no doubt where the school board stood on the issue. Sarasota County School Board member Caroline Zucker said a "yes" vote on Amendment 1 would trigger an increase in the county's local contribution rate because the education funding formula is based partly on property values.

'You will think we are raising your taxes. We aren't,' Zucker said. "The state is requiring it."

Zucker estimated the county education tax would increase next year by an estimated \$124 for the average property owner if Amendment 1 passes, negating much of the promised savings which the state has estimated, some say generously, at \$240 per property owner.

If fact, Zucker said, taxes could actually increase by \$36 per property owner, according to school district estimates, due to other anticipated millage increases.

"You are going to be very upset when you don't see a tax reduction ... and actually see a tax increase," Zucker

said.

Helen Sosso, president of Sarasota Association of Realtors, said she found that reality disappointing.

"I feel for the schools. Now, instead of a slight tax break, we have no tax break," Sosso said. She supports the ballot measure, if for no other reason than to spark housing

"The worst thing that can happen is to do nothing and sit there another year with no solution," she said.

Real estate attorney Jerilyn Hattendorf was undecided, but did say the "cons" outweighed the "pros" so far.

"I don't know if that will benefit my clients," said Hattendorf.

County Commissioner Nora Patterson rounded out the panel. She blasted the Legislature for crafting the ballot, and the governor for promoting it.

"I want to emphasize the disingenuousness of this plan," Patterson said. "This is going to cost (the county) a fortune."

She claims the measure will also put a lot of rural communities out of business, noting the hold harmless on rural counties only lasts one year.

"Once this is passed, it will be forever."

Fenced in at Venice Elementary School

A new fence surrounding Venice Elementary School is designed to help protect the community's youngest students, and it should help save costly repairs from vandalism, said Theresa Baus, principal.

While some parents have a little farther to walk their children into school grounds when they approach from the northeast, so far none has complained to the school about the additional fencing, she said.

Before fencing was stretched across the length of the property along Miami Avenue, parents were able to walk their children onto school property east of the entrance from Miami Avenue. Now they must cross traffic in and out of the entrance if they have parked in an area northeast of the driveway.

Baus said the fencing was part of the original design for the school, and the \$20,000 cost has been in the school district's capital budget.

Damage

Vandalism has been a

problem at the school, and Baus is hopeful the added fencing will cut down on damages.

"We have 12 security cameras on the campus, but one of the two \$20,000 sunshade structures was cut and sliced up within three days of installation over the summer and is out for repair," Baus said. She attributes the damage to vandals.

She said the school has had great support from the Venice Police Department, which patrols the campus regularly. But somehow, bike riders and skateboarders still manage to get on campus where they are not allowed, she said.

Other damage from vandals includes damage to doors, walls, benches and water fountains.

"Once, someone spread

cow manure on the building," Baus said.

When caught, violators have been charged with trespassing, and some have been stopped by the police. But Baus is happy with the added fencing.

"I feel it is important to protect the school that cost \$18 million," she said.

Sun and DayStar Communications, a Port Charlotte telecommunications provider.

Current business conditions are the most difficult the company has endured in its 30-year history, said Derek Dunn-Rankin, SCMG president, in a statement.

On the positive side, the circulation of SCMG newspapers continues to grow during a time when many daily newspapers are losing readers, Dunn-Rankin said. And DayStar, a relatively new addition to the SCMG companies, is enjoying substantial growth.

However, these encouraging trends are outweighed at least for the present by a serious downturn in retail advertising, Dunn-Rankin said.

SCMG had gradually reduced staff through attrition for about 18 months, Dunn-Rankin stated. However, the real estate and retail sectors of Southwest Florida have underperformed for longer than expected.

"The attempt was to identify positions that would least affect value to readers and advertisers," Dunn-Rankin said.

The company is anticipating the return of better business conditions in late 2008 or 2009.

"As a resident of Florida since 1936, I can say that we've seen a number of serious downturns," Dunn-Rankin said. "But in each case, the Florida economy and its newspaper industry have come out stronger."

increase local taxes if Amendment 1 passes, Black said.

No guarantee

Black said he had not received any direction from council to take a stand on the tax reform measure, one way or the other.

"We haven't gone out to spend money to fight (Amendment 1). We rely on an educated electorate find out what impacts are before they make a decision," he said. "I'm confident people will vote for what they believe is right for their own reasons. It's not really our place to tell them how to vote.

'We're not taking a hard stance on the vote. (One way or the other) there will be a message for our council to consider."

He did take issue with some of the promotions in support of the measure, particularly the billboards featuring Gov. Charlie Crist claiming residents of the state will receive a tax cut.

"It does not guarantee a tax reduction," Black said. "If they think that, they are making a mistake.

"If you think voting for this is going to fix tax problems in the state of Florida, you are wrong.

That's why this is a difficult piece. Amendment 1 has been portrayed as a savior of the real estate market. It doesn't (do that). The portability aspect actually continues the inequity. (All things being equal) why should someone pay a third of the property taxes of their neighbor? The system should be set up to be fair and pay an equitable amount.

"I'm not trying to convince voters how to vote, (but don't) believe the billboards on the side of the interstate. You wouldn't believe you can lose 50 pounds in 20 days"

Get informed

Black prefers the state reconsider its overall tax system currently in place before moving forward with a referendum that he says will exacerbate current tax

His neighbor, for example, pays two times the amount he pays for the same services partly because the retired neighbor didn't realize for years she was eligible for a homestead exemption.

"I'll say this: Voters should get informed on the issue," he said. "If you want to benefit people who don't live here, then vote for it. If you are happy with the current level of services — and don't wish to see services diminished - you should probably should not vote for it.

"If the community wants a lower level of services by

lowering taxes, council has an obligation to weigh that."

Average homeowner savings if Amendment 1 passes, according to the state, will be around \$240.

Reconsidering services

Last year, anticipating a state funding cut, the city reduced 27 positions, including six active employees. The rest were unfilled positions that were eliminated or opened up through normal attrition.

A hiring freeze imposed during the 2006 fiscal year budget remains in place.

"We are really in a holding pattern right now," Black said. "If the electorate votes for it, most people are educated enough to know that means services will be impacted."

The choice, said Black, is whether you raise local taxes, accept the decrease in revenue or implement fees to make up the difference.

He noted local cities and counties have the option to raise taxes back up to make up for the loss of state funds, if they choose. And it's entirely probable some will.

Ultimately, it's up to the county, and local governing authorities to determine how much, if any, tax relief homeowners will receive, he said.

"Those decisions haven't been made," he said. "It's premature to judge that."

Potential reductions could affect parks, police and the fire department.

Black said city council will hold a workshop on tax reform in February if the Jan. 29 measure passes, at which it will consider making mid-year adjustments to the current budget, before considering additional cutbacks for the next fiscal year. ggiles@

the comprehensive plan that limits new growth east of Interstate 75 without seeking voter approval at a countywide referendum.

"It appears there's some county commission hostility toward the initiative," said Bill Earl, the organization's chair. "They are trying to make this more difficult. I look forward to votes on all the topics they place on the ballot. It's reasonable if done expeditiously."

'Bothersome'

Citizens for Sensible Growth began to chip away at the county commission's sweeping authority last autumn when it persuaded voters to require super-majority votes — at least four of the five commissioners — on comprehensive plan changes that would either increase population density or landuse intensity.

Elected commissioners

who object to such powerlimiting measures initially attempted to delay a vote on the latest charter proposal by referring it to a Charter Review Board, then shifted gears and began to express reservations about the expense of a special election

"We're operating in economic times we haven't faced before," Commissioner Nora Patterson said. "It doesn't seem responsible to spend \$400,000 on an

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election that pre-dates the August primary. I'm not sure the 12,500 petition signers want an election three months early."

Commissioner Paul Mercier said he found it "bothersome" that some citizens' petitions are either "sold" or 'slanted" and "not what people want." He suggested that special elections with low voter turnouts encourage representation by "minority"

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

From citations to breakfast

Soon, Pope headed back northbound and met some fellow troopers to conduct a red-light running detail in Port Charlotte. They started out at Kings Highway and Veterans Boulevard, with Pope watching the light and calling out the offending vehicles to his two chase cars -"two in the hole." It wasn't long before both were tied up with "customers."

Then Pope spotted a man trying to walk across Kings Highway. His clothing was tattered and dirty and he seemed disoriented.

"He could be homeless; he might be unstable and I might have to 'Baker Act' him," Pope said as he drove across to where the man stood in the middle of the driveway into the Burger King.

Florida's Baker Act allows for the involuntary commitment of a person to allow time for a mental health evaluation.

Pope and his colleagues talked to the man a few minutes, long enough to conclude he was not violent and probably just needed some food. So he went into the restaurant, bought a breakfast and a coffee out of his own pocket, and gave it to the fellow, along with a coupon for lunch later on. The man sat quietly on the curb and gratefully accepted the meal.

"That's what it's all about," Pope said. "We're here to help people, whether we're feeding a homeless guy or saving someone's life by

telling them to slow down."

Pope soon moved the redlight detail to U.S. 41 and Murdock Circle, where several violators were soon ticketed.

A real trooper

Pope once buried a 17year-old he knew. He understands teens believe they're invincible, that nothing bad can happen to them. It inspired him to write a poem, "I'm Only 18," and whenever he stops minors for a moving violation, he hands them a copy. He also calls their parents to let them know.

Pope received a call from a rookie trooper asking for advice on how to handle a situation. At the end of the conversation, he said, "You got her in tears. I look at those as tears of joy: they're saying, 'Thanks for saving my life.' You're a real trooper now, brother."

As his fellow troopers left for other duties, Pope heard of a motorcycle collision on I-75 near the Toledo Blade exit. Once again switching on the lights and sirens, he high-tailed it to the scene where North Port Fire Rescue and North Port police were already assisting.

A motorcyclist lost control of the bike when his steering failed, and he slid the bike to the shoulder. The driver suffered head trauma and was awaiting Bayflite to Lee Memorial Hospital, while passenger's injuries seemed less serious. Neither was wearing a helmet.

"People say it's their 'right' to ride a motorcycle without a helmet," Pope said. "I'm tired of hearing that. It's not a right—it's a privilege to ride a motorcycle or drive a car."

"I can't save everyone but I'm gonna try," he said. "I'm big on education."

FHP's jurisdiction is statewide.

"City police departments only have jurisdiction within the boundaries of the city; county sheriff's offices have authority in the county," Pope said. "But we have power statewide. If I go to Orlando and see a violation, I can write a ticket. I often get called for details in other areas like Miami.

"Do you know most of the fines for tickets go right to the county where they're written? red-light violation is \$183.50 in Charlotte. Of that, FHP gets only \$1. The county gets the rest," said Pope.

Florida's troopers remain among the lowest-paid law enforcement officers in the

Pope said, "Right now I'm making around \$34,000 just what I made when I joined FHP four years ago."

According to swz.salary .com, base salaries for highway patrol nationwide range from a low of \$33,869 to \$51,173. While most sheriff's offices and city police departments have built-in raises through their contract negotiations, there are no automatic raises for the roughly 2,000 troopers in Florida.

And they are stretched pretty thin. Troop F, where Pope works, includes about 190 troopers who cover Charlotte, DeSoto, Lee, Collier and Sarasota counties.

While law enforcement officers in a defined area — a city or county — may have backup pretty close, a trooper's closest backup may be 30 minutes away or more. And their lives are at risk: imagine being on I-75 with four crim-

Pope — who used to be with the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office — said the variety and excitement of his job make it worth accepting the lower pay.

ew events sharpen our focus on an unmet need more than an unnecessary death.

In the case of last week's 70-car pile-up on Interstate 4 in Polk County, the need for early-warning systems in vehicles, especially commercial tractor-trailers, has been known for decades and the technology available for nearly as long. It's tragically unfortunate, but the five deaths on that grisly stretch of fogand smoke-shrouded interstate may finally persuade lawmakers at the state and national level to do what traffic safety officials have been recommending for a dozen years.

In 1995, the National Transportation Safety Board issued recommendations that "intelligent transportation systems" be required in commercial vehicles that would warn drivers of slowed or stopped vehicles in front of them. The recommendation, reissued in 2001 and added to the agency's "Most Wanted List" last year, was based on a study that found 40 percent of rear-end collisions involved commercial trucks.

That figure is even more striking considering commercial vehicles make up only 3 percent of all vehicles on America's roadways. (It should be noted trucks make up a much higher percentage of vehicles and total travel miles on interstate highways.)

High-end passenger cars already come equipped with such features, including cruise-control adjusters that slow vehicles automatically when a slowing or stopped vehicle is detected and warning systems that alert motorists to slowing traffic. A 1991 study by the luxury-car manufacturer Daimler-Benz found that giving a driver one additional second of reaction time would eliminate 90 percent of all rear-end collisions.

The U.S. Department of Transporta-

tion recently launched a \$35 million program to devise and study prototypes for warning systems it says could cut in half the number of crashes related to rear-end and lane-change accidents.

Like airbags before it, such technology ought to become standard equipment in all passenger and commercial vehicles. That it is not already, even as most new cars come equipped with satellite radios and MP3 players, reminds us of our misplaced priorities. The same misplaced priorities give us erectile dysfunction drugs before we find cancer and Alzheimer's cures.

The Polk pile-up was the second smoke-and-fog-related situation in two weeks. On Jan. 2, a brush fire closed I-95 in St. Lucie County.

I-75 through Charlotte and Sarasota counties is no stranger to either brush fire- or fog-related accidents, not to men-

tion wrecks caused by a variety of other reasons. Just last week, I-75 northbound was a virtual parking lot for several hours after a wreck. Another crash occurred on an I-75 overpass a direct result of a car hitting another car that had slowed down in reaction to the interstate wreck.

Permanent warning signs in places where fog, smoke and high winds are common are another part of the safety solution, but it's neither practical nor affordable to outfit thousands of miles of roads with programmable signs. Existing strategies by law enforcement once a wreck has occurred serve to warn motorists of wreck or construction-related slowdowns.

After so many preventable deaths, invehicle warning systems seem like a nobrainer. The sad truth is many more will die before such systems are as obvious a part of traffic safety as seatbelts.

The YMCA: a treasure

Many people have still not ventured out to see the 55,000-square-foot Mike & Georgia Miller campus of the South County Family YMCA on Center Road.

I think there is a stereotype that a Y is a just a gym, a place where fatties like me go to try to get in shape and nothing else. While that is true in part, this Y is so very much more than that as it offers something for all ages.

It has hundreds of machines of all descriptions to work every muscle group one can imagine. You will be amazed by how much equipment there is.

It has a heated Olympicsize pool with many kinds of classes for people, from masters to people who want to do rehabilitation. It has experts like you would see at a college, such as a physiologist, a registered dietitian and a cardiac nurse, all to work with any needs, whether it is stroke recovery, coming back from an injury or a 12-week weight loss program.

The Y offers classes in a wide variety of things, including nutrition, stress relief and how to exercise no matter how old or out of shape you are. It has a program called YMCA Reads to get mentors to help children read. That fits in with all of the youth programs for infants to teens.

It has racquetball courts, even a small lunch spot for a healthful sandwich or wrap after a workout. The steam room, whirlpool and sauna are certainly great relaxers. There are more flat-screen TVs than anywhere in a several county area as almost ever piece of cardio equipment has its own TV.

There are macho classes, like **Colin**'s 5:30 a.m. Boot Camp that will flat get you in shape. I have the T-shirt from that one. That just started again and goes about six weeks.

There is more: massage, personal trainers, Pilates, yoga, kick boxing, aerobic classes, tae kwan do, Gut Busters and, of course, the strenuous spin classes. You can even learn ballroom dancing.

There is literally something for everyone, including child care. The Y also

houses the Sertoma Club's speech clinic for preschool kids who need speech therapy, and the local American Cancer Society base.

If you are undecided which presidential candidate best fits your feelings on issues, there is a way to find out. In fact, it will tell you who you match best.



Cowpen Slough plan is a regional effort

The recent editorial about Sarasota County's Cow Pen Slough and the Dona Bay Watershed Management Program contradicts the county's actions to promote regionalism.

Sarasota County has been working for six years and has invested nearly \$20 million to develop the Dona Bay Watershed Management Program. This initiative has the potential to deliver about 15 million gallons a day to the water supply, while restoring the estuarine habitat of Dona Bay, reducing sediment pollution to Dona Bay by nearly 90 percent and reducing flood levels along Cow Pen

Slough. We think the project will deliver benefits beyond Sarasota County boundaries to the region, which is why we agreed to have the project incorporated into the Peace River Authority's

Master Water Supply Plan. Sarasota County also has been very supportive of regional needs throughout the current drought. We have utilized reserve capacity within our own system and contracted with Manatee County to be able to send water from our Carlton Water Treatment Plant to the authority's plant for distribution to customers in North Port, Charlotte County and DeSoto County.

We did this without any threat of a water war, without negative publicity and without even a contract with the authority. We understand the importance of a regional, interconnected system.

Sarasota County submitted the Dona Bay Watershed Management Program (including Cow Pen Slough) to the Southwest Florida Water Management District for cooperative funding for two reasons.

First, we believe the project should be eligible for Swiftmud funds earmarked to improve estuaries. By tapping into multiple funding sources, we can reduce the impact to any one fund and to ratepayers overall.

Second, the deadline for grant applications to be awarded in September 2008 was Dec. 7. We have talked with authority staff about a cooperative approach to develop the project in a regional context and will continue those discussions. However, we didn't want to miss any funding opportunities because we didn't meet an application dead-

Still, we would like to see the authority move more quickly at identifying the next regional source and get a project started. Authority staff has stated that the next water source is needed on line in 2014. It will have taken eight years to move the current project from preliminary design through construction based upon current construction schedules.

Our concern is that the longer the region waits, and the more condensed the project schedule becomes, that prices will skyrocket affecting ratepayers and risking shortfalls in supply.

Sarasota County will continue to work with the region for water supply needs. We would like for the region to improve environmental benefits, rate stability and drought tolerance, and meet future demands, with greater assurance than Sarasota County can provide alone.

We think that these are the true benefits of a regional approach, and that our own water customers, as well as other authority customers, should see those benefits from a regional approach.



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Indians pound Pirates, face Manatee in semifinal

It was almost a formality. The second-seed Venice

Indians break slump with win over Port Charlotte



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

Learning a new sport like sailing with a group of active and outgoing women can be a confidence-building experience.

That is what the learn-to-sail classes taught by the women of the Venice Sailing Squadron of Venice have been offering for more than 30 years.

Penny Washburn is typical of the women who have opted to learn to sail with the group, which is equally well known by the nick-

name the Bitter Ends.

She had taken a few lessons from her husband but wanted to find her own way on the water.

Not wanting second-hand instruction, she took advantage of

"My husband told me what to do, but he wouldn't actually let me do anything when we were sailing," she said.

classes offered by the Bitter Ends.

Washburn figured that she had more skipper skills than just "getting the beer" once she got out on the boat. Having moved to Venice from Vermont, she missed the excitement of skiing, and thought sailing could replace that sport

"I wasn't really learning how to handle the sail," she said, "I wanted someone to teach me to do it the 'women's' way."

First time

Participants learn in one-person prams. This type of boat is perfect for sailing around a harbor, racing or towing to an island. Once the women become more proficient, they graduate to sailing a sunfish, a slightly larger boat that also can be used for racing.

"That still doesn't stop you from being scared to death the first time out on the water," Dena Kohlbecker said.

She joined the squad shortly after arriving in Venice a few years ago. A North Carolina native, she was eager to meet new female friends

"I specifically wanted to become part of the community and meet some local people," she

Kohlbecker said that her sailing experiences taught her a lot about friendships. She said a person has to put her trust in her teacher — the boats only hold one person, so

you are out there on your own.

"It's a great feeling of accomplishment when you learn to handle the boat," she said.

Women sailors have no age limit. As long as you are physically able to lift the boat in and out of the water, and then hose it down after sailing, you are strong enough to learn to sail.

Margaret O'Connor, 90, an original member of the squadron, still sails. Mary Jane Park, also a longtime member, has retired from sailing but remains a member of the club.

"Even if you don't go out on the water, we have parties, outings and picnics to go to," she said.

History

The squadron was formed in the 1976. Members chose the nickname Bitter Ends. Women who had previous sailing experience helped others learn how to sail.

Their first boats were International Optimist prams, 8 feet long and designed decades earlier. The boats were trailered and launched weekly from a member's waterfront home.

Shortly after the group formed, it decided to offer a basic sailing course to women in the Venice area. It was so popular that the course has been offered every year.

Membership in the squadron is offered only after successful completion of the class series held in the fall.

Eventually the Bitter Ends joined the Florida Women's Sailing Association, and its members started sailing in interclub events and in an annual Rainbow Regatta with other member clubs on Florida's west coast.

The club's partnership with the Venice Yacht Club began in 1979. The club allowed the Bitter Ends to store its fleet of boats at the club and to hold weekly meetings on the property. Next came the club's liaison with the Venice Youth Boating Association.

The 400

By its 10th anniversary, the club had 135 women who had graduated from the learn-to-sail course. By its 20th anniversary 150 additional women had passed the course and joined the group. Today, the list of trained women sailors has grown to 400 women.

In October each year, the Crow's Nest Restaurant sponsors a regatta and distributes sailing trophies to the women of the group, with proceeds benefiting the Venice Youth Boating Association. Entry fees of more than \$600 were matched by the Crow's Nest Regatta Fund at the Community Foundation of Sarasota County for the 2007 regatta. A total of \$1,220 was presented to the VYBA last year.

Eve Hill, who was captain of the group for 10 years, said she has never met such a friendly and warm group of women.

"Being a member," she said, "you have a great group of spirited friends who love to go out on the water."



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

What do you bid now?

A - First let's rule out two hearts. That's a reverse, showing a minimum of a good 17 points. Next forget about rebidding such a weak five-card minor suit. That leaves just one option: Bid one no trump despite your slightly off-shape holding.

What do you bid now?

- A An awkward hand. You don't want to jump to game with threecard support, even with such an excellent fragment — you won't like having to ruff diamonds. You will have to choose between a jump to two spades and have partner expect an unbalanced hand from you, or two no trump without a diamond stopper. We have a slight preference for two spades.




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Don't tease him — Tase him



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
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Man feels guilt after hiding truth of teacher's molestation

DEAR ABBY: I am ashamed and angry at myself because I think I have made a mistake that is impossible to correct.

Two detectives came to my home about two years ago to ask me about a teacher I'd had in high school. He was being investigated for molesting boys. I told them, my wife and my parents that

nothing had happened to me. In fact, he had molested me for more than two years. He was charged with molesting some boys and taking pictures of them performing sexual acts, but I learned recently that those charges were dropped because of some legal techni-

One of my friends from high school nearly committed suicide because of what this man did. I feel awful about having lied, and now this man is free to do it to others.

Abby, that teacher took pictures and made movies of me. That's how he made me do things with him. He told me if I didn't, he'd send them to my parents and my friends.

The guilt is killing me. Please tell me what you would do in my situation. Please do not reveal my name or location. — DID-N'T TELL THE TRUTH

DEAR DIDN'T TELL: There may be a way to correct your mistake. If more men step forward and reveal how this predator molested and blackmailed them, other charges could be filed. Of course, this will require honesty and courage from you and more of his other victims.

Here is what I'd do: I would ask my doctor for a referral to a psychotherapist who specializes in victims of sexual abuse. Then I would contact the district attorney, give an honest statement, and have that office help you locate your classmate who "almost committed suicide" to see if he will finally reveal what happened. It was not his

fault, and perhaps knowing that may help him come forward. The crimes that were committed against you both are appalling, and the perpetrator belongs behind bars.

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



Q. My husband's hearing aids "whistle" or "squeal" when he turns his head to the side or looks up. When this happens, I have to tell him to turn his hearing aid down because he does not hear it himself. Sometimes his hearing aid will whistle in church where everyone can hear it. This is so embarrassing for both of us that he no longer wears his hearing aids in church and cannot enjoy the service. Is there anything we can do to prevent the hearing aids "whistling"?

A. "Whistling" is known as

acoustic feedback and it occurs when sound from the hearing aid speaker returns to the microphone inlet creating a loop called the feedback path. This is typically the result of sound escaping from the ear canal through the earmold or through the vent. The escaped sound re-enters the microphone and is reamplified beyond maximum output capabilities of the instrument. The result is a loud "whistle" which the wearer and those around them can hear. Most approaches to managing feedback usually result in reducing the power (or gain) the hearing aid produces and this can greatly interfere with the wear's ability to hear clearly. New feedback management techniques can now avoid this problem. The new technology constantly monitors the hearing aid for the presence of feedback and automatically eliminates it before it becomes audible! Audiologists Woodmere Hearing

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
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


