Lang can vote on fees

City leaders were apprised this week that a quorum can be formed to vote on whether to pay the fees of private attornevs that some council members hired in connection to the Sunshine suit.

The suit was settled, with plaintiff Anthony Lorenzo agreeing to drop the case against individual defendants in return for the city's admission that it was guilty of violating the state's Government in the Sunshine law and the Public Records law. A September hearing is scheduled at which Judge Robert Bennett will determine how much the city will be required to pay Lorenzo in attorneys' fees and costs. Lorenzo has said he will



not receive a penny from the settlement.

Lorenzo's attorneys are expected to seek nearly \$1 million in fees, and possibly more with a multiplier. The city is also on the hook for an estimated \$700,000 in attorney fees for the city attorney and attorneys hired by the city's insurer to defend the case.

Whether to pay an additional \$200,000 in attorney fees for those who hired private attor-

neys has been a topic of debate lately. Mayor Ed Martin, council members Sue Lang, John Moore and John Simmonds, and former airport board member Paul Hollowell hired their own attorneys initially. Those council members would have a conflict of interest and could not vote on whether to pay the fees.

That left only three council members available to vote -Vicki Noren Taylor, Ernie Zavodnyik and Kit McKeon but the city charter requires a quorum of four members.

On Tuesday, City Attorney Bob Anderson informed council he received an informal opinion from the state Commission on Ethics that states Lang can vote on the issue —

City cool to new street vendors

City Manager Isaac Turner came to city council this week asking for direction on how to deal with an increasing number of people seeking permits to sell hot dogs in downtown Venice.

"I don't think we are interested in having any more hotdog and other vendors in downtown Venice," said Council Member John Moore, airing on opinion that appeared to be shared by a majority.

have any rules against the activity. In the past, council decided the issue on an caseby-case basis.

Council was cool to the idea of more vendors on city streets, but asked the city manager for more information before making any decisions.

Chief among its concerns is competition with existing businesses.

"We certainly wouldn't want

to be in competition with businesses paying taxes," Turner said.

Venice MainStreet Executive Director KC Quaretti-Lee agreed that the potential of mobile vendors could affect local businesses.

"I would hate to see local The city currently doesn't vendors jeopardize the shops around here," she said.

Currently the city has only two such vendors — a concession stand at the South Jetty that operates under a formal written agreement with the city and an ice cream truck whose route was approved by council. A second ice cream vendor was turned down last year.

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New rentals push council into action

Mayor Ed Martin persuaded his fellow city council members this week to break the logjam holding up passage of a new short-term rental ordinance.

News of three new short-term rentals that went into business over the past few weeks prompted Martin into action, he said.

Martin said he at least wanted to "stop the number from growing."

A new ordinance barring short-term rentals in single-family residential neighborhoods was drafted Martin

last year but stalled in negotiations with current rental owners over an amortization schedule that would put the rentals out of existence after a 12-month period.

The same policy also appears in the draft comprehensive plan that is still under review by council.

Martin asked council members to separate the amortization schedule from the main ordinance and pass the ordinance soon.

An amortization schedule could be added at a later date, he suggested.

"The time has come to pass the first part to prohibit future" short-

term rentals, Martin said. "It might be expeditious to get this passed and limit (the) use of those places in the future."

Council asked for an update on the ordinance at its May 26 meeting by policy consultants Depew and Associates and outside attorney Andrea Zelman, who is representing the city in a lawsuit over the rentals. Zelman asked for a "shade" (closed) session at the next council meeting to discuss a judgment requiring the city to pay legal fees and costs.

The rentals showed up on council's radar screen in 2005 when Jacksonville businessman Steve Milo converted more than a dozen homes into vacation rentals for durations of less than 30 days. He advertised the homes via the Internet as weekly rentals that accommodated up to 16 guests in some locations.

Complaints led the city to ban the rentals. That was successfully challenged in court by Milo.

A judge said the city didn't have an ordinance specifically banning the practice, therefore they are allowed until such time as the city adopts rules stating otherwise.

Milo has threatened to sue the city again if it passes an ordinance that would put him out of business.

Funds lined up for VHA affordable housing project

The city's decision two years ago to begin assisting the Venice Housing Authority both administratively and with funding—is beginning to pay dividends.

This week Venice City Council approved a number of administrative actions that will provide grants eventually totaling \$405,000 for VHA's low-income-housing project on Grove Street.

The much-needed funds will provide a kick start for planning and design of the Venetian Cove development, a mix of lowincome and some market-rate rentals.

Council agreed to give the authority \$24,000 in one-time stimulus funds for infrastructure design and permitting for

It gave city staff the go-ahead to file grant applications on behalf of VHA for Housing and Urban Development community development block grants for this year and next year at approximately \$90,000 per

Council is also dedicating pass-through grants from the county to the project. It agreed to earmark community block grants totaling \$67,000 for each of the next three years to the VHA. Council originally earmarked the funds for a stormwater replacement project in Venice Mobile Home Park. That project will still be funded — albeit three years down the road.

Most of the funds are to be spent on infrastructure, with 20 percent dedicated to administrative costs and a required \$5,000 contribution to local food banks, according to Val Raney, an engineer research analyst and the city's grant specialist.

'Near future'

Benjamin Bell, the HUD-appointed director of VHA, said the stimulus funds and existing funds provide a total of roughly \$180,000 to use on the redevelopment project "in the near future."

Earlier this year the housing authority agreed on building a minimum of 117 units with about 60 being low-income and the rest market-rate, but more if necessary to make the project successful.

Norstar/PriMerica, which the VHA selected as its developer, will first build a facility for low-income senior housing. If that's successful, it will build the remaining

family low-income units.



velop in 2006 failed when the developer pulled out.

When Sue Lang was elect-Lang ed to city council in 2007 and

appointed as liaison to the housing authority, she encouraged the city to use its grants, and its grant specialist, to help the struggling authority. Prior to that the city had provided no funding or administrative assistance.

Legislature fails on 9-1-1 certification

I t's no surprise that a bill calling for mandatory training of all 9-1-1 emergency call center dispatchers in the state was sponsored by local legislators.

We in Sarasota, Charlotte and DeSoto counties are all too aware of the potential horrors associated with a breakdown of the emergency call system.

However, the passion to provide a higher level of public safety apparently gets diluted with distance and time. It also can be hard to counterpunch past Tallahassee lobbyists. That's the way it goes in the capital.

Sen. Nancy Detert, R-Venice, who sponsored a Senate bill this year requiring state certification of all 9-1-1 operators, said the lobbyist for the state's emergency operators pushed hard for changes in the wording of the bill.

Rep. Paige Kreegel, R-Punta Gorda, who co-sponsored a House bill with freshman Rep. Ken Roberson, R-Port Charlotte, told Sun staff writer Ed Scott, "There are some lobbyists for the 9-1-1 operators who interfered with the process greatly."

The bill just didn't have the traction, or didn't get enough of a push, so it stalled in the final days of a session that concentrated so much on budget problems.

It was Kreegel who took the lead on 9-1-1 dispatcher certification last year in the wake of the murder of Denise Amber Lee.

By now, we know the story of how

Lee was kidnapped from her North Port home in January 2008. A witness saw the 21-year-old woman struggling in a car with a man and called 9-1-1, but no officers were dispatched to the scene by the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office.

This mistake led to a campaign by Lee's family for greater accountability and uniform standards that might help restore confidence in a system that failed them so badly.

Last year, Kreegel won passage of a bill that called for voluntary training, but it had no teeth and came with no funding, so it had little impact. This year, Roberson led the team effort, but still there was enough resistance and too many questions.

The bill will be back next year.

Kreegel thinks this year's effort might smooth the path to passage in 2010. We hope so.

The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office insists its requirements for dispatchers exceed national standards. Sarasota County announced last week that its communications center had won certification from a national accreditation agency.

That's comforting, but we need to know that emergency dispatch has consistent — and consistently high — standards throughout the state. We have seen what can go wrong.

As Detert told the Sun, "It's unbelievable that something with this much common sense could not pass the Legislature."

Unbelievable, yes. Unusual, no.

Comp plan being compromised

Do you understand or know what the Venice comprehensive plan is? If you are like most, you probably don't, but you should be aware of how this plan will affect the value of your home or business over the next seven years.

Developing a comp plan is a mandate from the state of Florida to local jurisdictions. In layman's terms, it a road map to aid and give guidance and direction over a period of seven years.

What's confusing about the Venice comp plan is all the zoning restrictions and land-development restrictions that have been added. They do not belong in a comp plan; they belong where they were intended to be: in the zoning code and in land-development regulations.

Let me take this opportunity to break down the plan into smaller elements. I will touch on the most cumbersome part.

The Future Land Use and Design Element is 168 pages, with maps, and would make average citizen get lost, confused and sleepy. Draft 5, which presently is on the table, is a product of city council refusing to recognize advisory board input. Council has shown it is not interested in input. This goes against all the good done through the Envision Venice process.

There is a lot of talk about going "green" and "green building practices," but again, a sound plan for that was not added to the comp plan. There needs to be a strong sense of place; walkability and transit alternatives are also extremely important. This plan, on the other hand, promotes sprawl, and goes totally against all of these things.

This plan casts aside all the hard work that went into the joint planning agreement between Sarasota County and the city. That was a joint effort to define densities and infrastructure improvements, while maintaining boundaries that were previously agreed to by both parties.

Simply put, what this plan hopes to accomplish is no growth or annexations within the city. That will be the death of Venice because the city will have no control over the surrounding areas.

Yes, there will still be growth, and yes, there will still be traffic, but Venice will have no control over it. This is like an ostrich that buries its head in the sand hoping nothing will happen. Can you afford higher taxes, and fewer services? Because that will be the logical outcome of nogrowth policies.

COMP PLAN MEETING

Venice City Council holds what could be its last comp plan workshop on Monday, May 18, at 9:30 a.m. at Venice City Hall, 401 W. Venice Ave. The public is welcome to comment.


Density — which, by the way, is not a bad word has been greatly reduced in this plan. Remember — density does not always equal height, as some would have you believe. There are a number of areas with only two and three stories that have densities up to 40 units per acre, something you probably did not know. They are on the manmade island of Venice as existing nonconforming uses today.

Which brings up another point: Draft 5 will through time create even more of these nonconformities, and it will also be the start of only two styles of architecture throughout the city.

It also restricts heights in single-family areas. While some may say this is good, it's not; it takes away creativity, changes the way height is measured and can possibly create more flat roofs. Flexibility has suffered through the lack of understanding and inability to make decisions.

This plan as written will restrict property rights and be burdensome, costly and a huge mistake if allowed by to go forward in its present state. It is not what "we the people" said at the

Working around the house and using my computer have changed somewhat after I went into "low vision," a nice way of saying I'm visually impaired due to dry macular degeneration.

Reading and watching TV required adjustments. Thanks again to the Lighthouse of Manasota's applied living skills classes, I am adjusting quite well.

In the kitchen, I remember to close the cupboard doors each time. Put the dishes back in the

same place each time. Keep sharp utensils face down with handles toward the front. Use plastic funnels to fill liquid containers. Easy lessons.

Put chairs back under the table — and for that matter, don't move furniture all around the house. That's easy for me because I was never the interior designer type.

I switched all electric cord items from wall outlets to power strips for safety.

The software on my computer now has Zoom Text so I can enlarge anything up to 24 points. Better yet, I can turn on the speakers and it will read to me what is written on the screen.

For draft work, my paper has half-inch lines and I print only (my beautiful penmanship is gone.) Telephone messages are written down on separate note paper, usually with my specially ordered 20/20 Sanford

marker pen.

Thanks to the Venice Lions Club, I received a Jordy low-vision reader system with CC TV capabilities. It enables me to magnify print and photos to any size I like. I use it extensively for smallprint instructions such as on medicine bottles, magazines and newsprint. You should see my Salvador Dali prints up close. The Jordy is next to my computer work station, and I can do almost as much as I could before the impaired vision hit

In my private quarters, relaxing with a good talking book gives me pleasure. Did you know that through the national Talking Books Library, I can receive — free of charge and free of postage — a selection from thousands of books, descriptive videos on DVDs, educational materials, language lessons, and daily news online?

I am able to watch regular TV programs by moving close to the screen. I also sleep, dress, bathe and make up in this room, all of which have tips I learned in class.

My volunteer time is filled with chairing the South Venice Beach Endowment Trust and the Venice chapter of Florida Council of the Blind. I put in another offer on a short-sale house and hope this one goes through. It is in South Venice again because I like it here.

Recent publicity about the subdivision lacking central water and sewer doesn't dissuade me, although I do feel we will be retrofitted before too long in the future.

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

Rose was born in Cleveland, Ohio, on July 8, 1912, the third of five children to August and Antoinetta Rini. She lived the next 96 years with a vigor that impressed everyone who met her.

Always an honor student, she also found time to be an all-star field hockey player. She graduated from Shaker Heights High School in 1930 and from Western Reserve University in 1934. She spent most of the next two decades as a part-time social worker and full-time mom.

In 1955 she was recruited by a friend who had a mentally retarded daughter to take over a floundering, part-time summer camp for mentally retarded children. Typically unafraid, she challenged the custodial care model of the day and showed both families and professionals that these children were capable of much more than they had been given credit for. That camp remained a love of hers for the rest of her life.

That experience led into her major life's work. At age 40, after a number of years of working days and taking courses at night, she received her master's degree in special education from Kent State University. Through her drive and devotion, she became the foremost pioneer in the greater Cleveland area in this fledgling field of special education. To this day she is remembered and beloved by many a family that she befriended and many a younger educator whose career she helped mold.

In Venice, she is known for her retirement years, which also were typically dynamic. Always an avid tennis player, in her 80s she routinely won matches against opponents 20 years younger. At age 84 she made the cover of the Venice Gondolier Sun, skydiving for her first time. Only in her 90s did age finally catch up with her, when she found she could no longer do the things she still loved. She died peacefully on Wednesday, May 13, 2009, at age 96.

She is survived by her three chil-

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Community reporter Jan Findley dies

Jan Findley, whose talents stretched from Madison Avenue to South Sarasota County, died Wednesday at TideWell Hospice and Palliative Care in Englewood, after a long illness.

For many years, she was a familiar face at community functions, snapping photographs, scribbling notes and conducting interviews.

"Jan was always there, especially for those nonprofit agencies that did not get a lot of publicity," said community volunteer Connie Ellis, a longtime friend.

Findley was born in Minneapolis, Minn., in the late 1920s. She received a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from the University of Minnesota, graduating when she was 22 years old.

According to her son, Del Findley of Pittsburgh, Pa., she first worked in advertising in her hometown, then moved east to New York. There, she began writing copy for some of the biggest firms

on Madison Avenue. "It was rather unusual for a woman," Del said

Wednesday. She is credited with some of the most enduring advertising slogans of the 20th century: "Choosy mothers choose Jif," and "Joy cleans clear down to the shine, and isn't that a nice reflection

on you?" In the late 1980s, she moved to Englewood and opened an art gallery. When that closed, she began freelance writ-

ing for local newspapers. She covered nonprofit organizations, church and community activities and the arts. She reviewed plays and concerts, always with an

elegant style, a sharp, knowledgeable eye and understated wit.

"Her writing was fun.

She was always easy to read. It like was holding a conversation with her, said

North Port Sun Editor Lorraine Schneeberger, who worked with Find-

ley in Englewood. With community reporting, Schneeberger said, "half the battle is

loving it and knowing something about it, and she had that.'

Findley is survived by her son, four grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren. A memorial service is planned for a later date.

making a quorum, assuming they all show up – if she refuses to accept compensation in advance and in writing, and follows through on that written promise. Her private attorney fees have been reported at \$2,000.

On Wednesday, Anderson received Lang's signed waiver, paving the way for council to take a vote, if it chooses.

Council has yet to decide whether it will vote on paying the private attorney fees or hire a special magistrate to review the issue and make a decision.

Once that is resolved, Anderson said, council will need to address the equally perplexing question of whether to consider the matter before or after the September hearing.

Anderson said previously that paying the fees now could result in a higher award to the plaintiff in September. Moore, a retired judge, said it isn't supposed to. He wants the fees paid now.

The 6-year-old returned to school Monday. Parents with children at the affected school were notified via a recorded message from the school principal, and there are no plans for any school closures.

Local health officials are continually monitoring for any additional cases of influenza-like illness in the county.

According to a state press release, there were 69 confirmed cases and no probable cases in Florida as of Friday morning.

"We expect to see more confirmed cases of H1N1 (swine) flu," says Scott Pritchard, Sarasota County epidemiologist.

Those increased numbers are expected because there is a higher level of alert now, and more people are having themselves tested, Shipley said.

Sarasota County's first two confirmed cases of H1N1, the government name for swine flu, were announced Friday by the state health department.

The virus was contracted by a 10-year-old girl and her younger brother.

Pritchard said Friday that by the time the older child's case was confirmed, she already had been treated by a physician and returned to **Tuttle Elementary School** in Sarasota.

Pritchard said the younger boy is experiencing a normal course of the virus. Neither sibling was hospitalized.

Although these illnesses have been mild, people are urged to follow these precautions:

- Wash hands often with soap and water or use alcohol-based hand cleaners to reduce the spread of respiratory ill-
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Avoid close contact with people who are coughing or otherwise appear ill.
- People with a sore

throat, cough, fever of 100 degrees or higher and fatigue, possibly along with diarrhea and vomiting, should contact their health-care provider.

If you think you have influenza, call your doctor and discuss whether you need to be seen in the office or emergency department or stay home.

1-0 loss comes on controversial call

Venice's improbable run at the school's first-ever state softball title came to a disappointing end on Friday morning for the second straight year.

Defending state champion Jacksonville Bartram Trail scored a controversial run in the top of the seventh inning to ruin a dominating performance by senior pitcher Stephanie Sullivan as the Lady Bears pulled out a 1-0 win over the Lady Indians in the Class 5A state championship on Friday morning at Plant City Stadium.

"I feel for the kids. That's all I can say," a teary-eyed Venice coach Larry Sandburg said. "They fought hard to get here. It was tough. ... There is nothing our kids can be negative about. Bartram Trail won the game. We didn't lose it."

The championship was a rematch of last year's state title game — a 4-2 win by Bartram Trail

The final, which was originally scheduled for Thursday night, was delayed until Friday as the teams only played 11 minutes and were just four outs into it before rain and lightning stopped play.

Sullivan (21-4) was dominant against the Lady Bears (27-4). After an opening walk, she retired 19 straight batters and had a no-hitter for 6 1/3 innings with nine strikeouts.

"It was awesome," Sandburg said about Sullivan. "She adjusted well. She was making those mistakes earlier in the first inning. She worked hard to adjust her motion and she did it. She pitched a great game. A phenomenal game. They got two hits."

With one out in the top of the seventh inning, Bartram Trail's Christie Bailey, who batted left-handed in her first two at-bats, switched to bat righthanded. On a 0-1 count, Bailey lined a clean single into center field for the Lady Bears' first hit.

Libby Crowe, the cleanup hitter, lined the first pitch for a double down the left-field line advancing Bailey to third base.

Sandburg visited the mound to talk to Sullivan.

Venice decided to intentionally walk Abby Tewey to load the bases. However, on the second pitch, home plate umpire Chris Kroon called an illegal pitch and told Bailey to come home.

"The pitcher was on the rubber ready to pitch," Kroon said. "The catcher was in the catcher's box ready to receive the pitch. The pitcher started her pitch and stopped. That point we had an illegal pitch. Runners advance one base and it's a ball on the batter."

"He said it was a live ball and she stopped pitching and it was an illegal pitch," Sandburg said. "I just felt like the girl wasn't in the box and there shouldn't have been a pitch."

Was the batter out of the box?

"To my knowledge, no," Kroon said. "The catcher was ready to receive the ball. The pitcher was ready to pitch. At that point the ball was never dead. At that point when the pitcher started her windup

and stopped, it was illegal."

"We can't really say much about it," Venice catcher Chelsea Zgrabik said about the controversial run. "Things go the way things go. We just have to play how we play."

"First of all that has to be a heartbreaker," Bartram Trail coach Jen Harman said. "The pitcher was out there crying. I feel just as bad for her. ... She was upset. It really could have gone either way. We had some momentum anyways. I definitely felt we were going to score. I didn't know it was going to happen that way."

The umpires huddled after

Sandburg came out of the dugout and questioned Kroon.

"I just wanted to make sure what I had and my partners had also and after conferring we all three had the same thing," Kroon said.

Venice tried to come back in the bottom of the seventh inning.

With one out, Mindee Hasbrouck singled up the middle. After a foul out to the catcher produced the second out, Courtney Markusson kept the inning alive with a single into left field moving pinchrunner Kaytea Hatfield to second base.

The threat and the game ended on a foul out by Emily Parsons to Bartram Trail first baseman Tewey.

"As soon they got that run, I just brought everybody up in the circle and said, 'If you give up right now they walk off the field because we're not done.' I just kept telling them base hits, base hits because people kept trying to win the game themselves. We knew it was a team effort."

"I thought we came back pretty good," Sandburg said. "We got two base hits. One more hit. Emily has been hitting the ball so well for us. I felt pretty confident we could get that one run in. She just got under it and popped it up."

Venice (23-8-1) left six runners on base including four in the first six innings but only one in scoring position.

The Lady Indians did get their leadoff runners in the fourth and fifth innings but couldn't come up with the key hit.

Venice's best chance was the fourth inning when Zgrabik, who went 2-for-3, led off with a single between first and second base. After a fly out, a groundout to shortstop moved Zgrabik to second base. Zgrabik was awarded third base on an illegal pitch from Bartram Trail's Kalyn Loverich (22-4). However, a strikeout by Loverich ended the inning.

The fact Venice was playing in the state championship was something no one expected.

"We can only say it's unbelievable," Zgrabik said about the season. "We really didn't think we were going to make it past districts. This is a big accomplishment for us. It's how it ended but we had a great season."

Tuesday afternoon, Venice High School science students trashed the beach

The occasion was the third annual cardboard boat race, where members of the VHS Technology and Engineering Club raced boats of their own design out into the Gulf of Mexico as far as the swimmers boundary buoy and then back to shore. Two boats survived the ordeal. The others did not fare so well. Some seemed to melt almost as soon as they were pummeled by the heavy surf. Most started sinking almost as soon as they got to the halfway point in the water.

When one bright green variation on a catamaran literally became two halves of the whole, timer Charlie Powell, a Venice High School chemistry teacher,

Steve Case, an Advanced Placement physics teacher, is the driving force behind the contest, which he implemented for the first time two years ago. Fellow teacher Al Pfundtner works with him in advising the science club students and running the contest. This year, the two also collaborated on a boat

"The first year went pretty well," Case said. "Last year every boat went down."

Unlike other area cardboard boat contests, the VHS contest is run in the Gulf of Mexico, where waves can be quite destructive. Last year, the waves won handily, trashing every boat in record time.

Also unlike other similar contests, VHS boat-builders are allowed to use cardboard carpet tubes to reinforce their boats.

"We need the forms because of the waves," Case said. "A lot of the other contests don't allow tubes, but we need them."

The youngest student in the contest was Chris Shall, 14, a freshman. He built a sturdy red boat that stayed afloat but failed to make it to the swim buoy as fast as the other boats. Time in the water seems to be an issue. Even the two win-

ning boats eventually succumbed to the ravages of the water and the surf after an hour or so in and out of the water.

The most complicated design was the work of Brandon Scarry, 16; Colton Gustin, 17; Amber Todoroft, 16; Eric Salaices, 17; Trent Roberts, 15; and John Barratt, 17. Christened Viva la fea (live the ugly), according to Gustin, the boat was painted white and featured two out-rigger hulls as well as its main hull.

"We did four sheets thick at the bow," Gustin said. "On the pontoons, we only used one thickness and we used four thicknesses at the back and in the mid-section too. This year our boat was so massive we had to get more glue so we needed an additional sponsor."

Diggin Paradise Inc. provided the additional glue, Gustin

"We were last year's victors," Gustin said.

They won a 10-pound chocolate bar for their efforts.

Neither their glue nor their luck held this year. Sailing in the first heat, their boat succumbed early. They were first in the water and first out and, when it was all over, the first car to leave and go home.

There were two heats, with Case and Pfundtner besting the other three boats in the first heat, making the round-trip out to the buoy and back to the beach in 5 minutes 9 seconds. The other three boats were all washed up before Case's boat had even turned around. Back on the beach, Case's boat looked almost as good as new, despite its 5-minute soaking.

In addition to the timer, there were two students out in the water in kayaks, ready to act as lifeguards and debris collectors. All of the students were conscientious about picking up the debris and getting the failed boats out of the water as quickly as they could.

In the second heat, the story was similar. Two of the boats practically self-destructed as soon as their paddlers were aboard. One failed because of weak paddling, although the design seemed sturdy enough. The fourth, and winner of the second heat, was the boat built by VHS salutatorian Amanda Basnight, 18, and her partner Sean O'Brien, 17. Its design was similar to the boat designed by Case and Pfundtner, even to the reinforced bow and the sea-foam green color although the student boat sported a lavender racing

It was clocked at 4 minutes 26 seconds, making it the clear winner, and it too looked good enough to race again.

Case decided there should be four students in each boat for the race-off, and when one student worried that the Case boat might not survive, Case simply said he could build another.

More than an hour had

elapsed since students and boats arrived at the North Jetty Park beach. With the trash mounting up as the soggy cardboard boats continued to disintegrate, eight students headed back into the surf on the two remaining boats.

By the time they were threefourths of the way to the swim buoy, Basnight had fallen off the stern of her boat and an interloper was entering the race lane. Oblivious to the students and their boat race, an older man came paddling along standing upright on a long surfboard, using a canoe paddle for propulsion. Somehow he managed to sail past all the students, including the two race contenders, without even noticing what was happening. He eventually sailed in toward the beach, hopped off the board and headed up on shore.

Meanwhile, the second battle of the waves was taking its toll on the two sea-foam green boats that were on their way back to shore. The Basnight and O'Brien boat was the first to take on water, but neither survived coming ashore. Although the teachers' boat appeared to be in one piece at water's edge, it very quickly began to disintegrate once its shell was torn. Within minutes there was no sea foam green paint—just a big pile of brown cardboard—shredded and torn and soggy brown cardboard.

Knowing the boat debris would fill at least one Dumpster at the park, Case brought two soccer nets to the beach, planning to use those to haul the debris to the Dumpster. The students combed the water for every scrap of cardboard, cleaning the beach they had so thoroughly trashed in the preceding hour. The cleanup took longer, but the memories and the learning experience should last a lifetime.

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

Asparagus encounters poetry (and beer) at a Lake Michigan coastal village

Asparagus is king at northern festival.

After a six-month winter, the arrival of spring can make people do strange things.

How else to explain the literary impulse that comes over residents of this tiny Lake Michigan coastal village every year when they see the first brave spears of spring asparagus pushing up

from the sandy earth?

Each May, residents of Empire, Mich., dress up in asparagus costumes and parade down their short three-block downtown. They hold huge asparagus cook-offs featuring everything from soups and soufflés to casseroles and crepes. They sing, dance, compete in athletic events, and consume respectable quantities of beer and wine. But the spotlight event of the threeday Empire Asparagus Festival is the annual Ode to Asparagus competition, where local bards outdo each other in paying homage to this beloved vegetable.

Consider, for example, the eloquence of Tom Ulrich, assistant superintendent of the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, who won the contest a year or two back:

I stand over the bed and imagine you arising Green and slender, uncurling towards me, Stretching with the pleasant ache of carbon, newly

It's been nearly a year since I've seen your face And a long winter since I've tasted anything that

astonished me The way you always seem to, no matter how you're

dressed.

The iron clouds skid by, hiding the sun in their pockets.

In this cold, flat light my fingers are pallid and numb,

Trembling until your emergence proves everyanew.

I blow into my cupped hands,

And wait for you.

Was ever a side dish so

sweetly serenaded? After California and Washington, Michigan is the nation's third-largest producer of commercial asparagus, a crop worth some \$29 million a year to the state. But Empire doesn't really have what you'd call an asparagus industry — just one local farmer named Harry Norconk, who has a 240acre operation about 2 miles south of town.

Named for an ill-fated schooner that briefly served as the village school after running aground on the beach in 1865, Empire is best known as an artsy summer resort in the heart of the Sleeping Bear Dunes.

Still, asparagus is an opportunistic vegetable, and every May its perky green spears start showing up in fields, ditches, meadows and hillsides all over this part of the region. That's all it took for the citizens of Empire - all 400 of them — to devise a celebration. (They already have a festival honoring a big anchor that was recovered from the bottom of the lake in 1977.)

"It's mainly just an excuse to get out and enjoy ourselves," said festival organizer Paul Skinner, a British expatriate who owns an antique store in the town. "We don't really need a big reason to have music or eat."

But the festivities do have their earnest savethe-world side, too. Like many other communities in the fruit-growing region around Michigan's Grand Traverse Bay, Empire is a hotbed of advocacy for small-scale local agriculture and regional cuisine.

Other towns in the area celebrate cherries, wines and wild mushrooms; Empire opted for the humble asparagus.

This year's festival includes such events as a 5K Kick Ass-paragus Fun Run/Walk, an asparagus recipe contest and cookoff, a tour of local art galleries and studios, the making of asparagusgarnished parade hats, the annual Asparagus Parade, an afternoon concert and dance, and a massive asparagus-based food, wine and beer tasting that includes such treats as asparagus focaccia, asparagus pizza, asparagus croissants, asparagus scones, asparagus bratwurst, asparagus slaw, asparagus and morel risotto, and asparagus beer. (Yes, it's true – asparagus beer from the too-creative-for-theirown-good brewers at Traverse City's Right Brain Brewery.)

What else to do

Empire is the headquarters of the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, a breathtaking symphony of water, sky and towering sand dunes — some as much as 500 feet high — on the Lake Michigan shoreline of the Leelanau Peninsula. Part of the national park system since 1972, Sleeping Bear is one of America's most profoundly beautiful landscapes: a 64-mile curve of beaches, coves, islands, forests, meadows and lakes. Its grandeur can be viewed from wellplaced overlooks along the Pierce Stocking Scenic Drive — but it's even better to see the park close up and personal by visiting its fascinating museums, hiking its trails or even taking a ferryboat ride to the unspoiled

Manitou Islands. In most years, the Empire Asparagus Festival coincides with the arrival of spring blossoms in the cherry orchards of the nearby Leelanau and Old Mission peninsulas — one of America's most impressive (and least-known)

floral displays. It's quite a spectacle itself: 2.6 million blooming cherry trees climbing the steep glacial ridges like battalions of tidy white clouds, acres of yellow dandelions and the cobalt blue waters of Grand Traverse Bay.

May is also prime

bird-watching time.

Thanks to its coastal location along the northern shore of Lake Michigan and its many inland marshes and ponds, this region is also a favorite destination for thousands of migratory birds.

Like their human counterparts, some of these visitors are only stopping for a few days of relaxation and refreshment while others settle down for the whole sum-

Last week, I set out to write a column about reader e-mails. Instead, it was a column about reader e-mail — just one. There was a lot of good stuff in there.

So this week, we have some interesting questions left over. The first comes from Bill H., who writes: "Please give me your interpretation of the following construction. ... 'Pepsi-Cola is the second most largest soft drink company." question with this is, if Pepsi is the 'second most largest,' what is the first? In other words, are the words 'second most' really necessary?"

Those of you who read this column regularly may have noticed I have a penchant for long, involved, noncommittal answers to grammar questions. They're often structured like: "Well, traditionalists take a strict view blah blah but academics note that it's perfectly acceptable to blah

If that sounds familiar, you'll find my answer to Bill's question refreshing. It is: Nope. "Second most" is not necessary. I wouldn't even call it lucid. In fact, I'll go so far as to say, "Yucky poo."

To understand exactly why it's yucky poo, we need to revisit a topic we've discussed here

before: the idea of comparatives and superla-

"Largest" is in a form called superlative. "Larger," on the other hand, is a comparative. The form we use for plain-old garden-variety "large" called "positive."

Some words use the little endings -er and -est to form their comparatives and superlatives: taller, tallest; happier, happiest.

But other words, especially longer ones, have no such form. There is no intelligenter, fabulousest, oranger, consideratest, and on and on. Yet all adjectives can be comparative or superlative with the help of the little "more" words "most."

Your face may be the reddest, but your shoes would be the most

Your stories may be greater, but they could also be more incredible.

Your boyfriend may be the tallest man you know, but your neighbor is the most diminutive.

Of course, this brings us to a question that has perplexed many an English language user: How do I know which applies? Which words take those -er and -est endings and which need a "more" or "most" to form their superlatives?

Though most people don't know it, the answer is right at their fingertips.

Look up the word "large" in most dictionaries, and right next to the main word, you'll see usually in bold — "larger, largest." Look up "good" and you'll see "better, best." Look up "sad" and you'll see "sadder, saddest.'

But look up "extraordinary" and, lo and behold, no comparative or super-

lative forms are offered. So now we can get back to Bill's original question about the "second most largest" cola company. As we've seen, "most" and "largest" shouldn't be paired up this way. They reflect two different ways of forming a superlative. But together, they're nonsense. "Second largest" is, as a friend of mine used to say, "more better."

We have time for one more question, this one from Adele, who asks whether you should use "I" or "me" in "My mom, dad, sister Jane, brother Danny and I/me moved to Sarasota."

That one confuses a lot of people. But getting it right is simple. If it's a subject — that is, if it's performing the action in the verb, use "I." If it's an object, use "me."

When in doubt, drop all the other confusing nouns and pronouns: "Me moved to Sarasota" or "I moved to Sarasota"? Easy. It's "I." Or you can plug in the subject "we" and the object "us" and see which works better. "Us moved to Sarasota" or "We moved to Sarasota"? Clearly, it's "we."

The only trick is, don't get scared — and if you do, don't hesitate to ask your friendly neighborhood grammar colum-

How can we miss you if you won't go away?

This will be my first and final column about Brett Favre. Not a lot of people can make that claim.

As even nonfootball fans know, Favre is one of the most accomplished quarterbacks in the history of the National Football League. He holds most of the career passing records, was an absolute ironman in a vulnerable position in a rough sport and earned the undying love and admiration of Green Bay Packers fans for his athletic skill and derring-do.

Until he started his "I'm retiring, no I'm not" act a few years ago. The team kissed his, um, ring, for a couple of offseasons and he came back to play, almost taking them to the league championship two years ago.

Then he rode off into the sunset, tearfully and for good ... only to try yet another comeback, at which point the Packers said they had had enough. Their fans were outraged, but the team stuck to its guns. Favre signed with the New York Jets, started off great, hurt the biceps on his throwing arm, led the league in interceptions and the Jets missed the playoffs.

Time to retire again, of course. And to ask the Jets for his release, ostensibly

so he might sign with, and officially retire from, the Packers. Asked by former NFL QB and ESPN football analyst Trent Dilfer whether the request signaled a possible return to football, Favre reportedly responded "NO" in a text message.

Except he met with the coach of the Minnesota Vikings, a bitter division rival Favre was interested in playing for last year - and reportedly said he's not unretiring. Why he needed a meeting for that is a mystery. The Vikings have admitted they want him.

Perhaps that text message was actually "NOW" and the last letter got cut

Don't get me wrong. I have the utmost respect for Favre as a football player. He was a gunslinger, a trait that sometimes got him into trouble but that meant the Packers were rarely out of a game. You never knew what he might do, and might not believe it even after he did it.

But with all his records and accolades, he must be terribly insecure to have the need to be the center of attention like this every offseason. Even his likely ulterior motive if he plays sticking it to the Packers by playing for the Vikings, who are about a quarterback shy of contending for the Super Bowl — reveals a man with surprising self-esteem issues.

When Green Bay rejected him last year, public opinion was almost unanimously in his favor, if only because the team could have made the same decision with more respect for him. He lost some of that moral high ground — and some luster from his achievements by playing for the Jets and reportedly not being a great teammate.

He might be the piece the Vikings are missing, but if not — and there are dozens of reasons other than him they could have a bad year - he would come out a loser even if he had his best year ever.

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Church spreads spiritual stimulus plan

On a recent Sunday, the Rev. Will Bowen gave \$3,000 to his congregation at One Community Spiritual Center, formerly Christ Church Unity, in Kansas City, Mo.

Each adult received an envelope marked "Top Secret." Inside was a \$10 bill and instructions: "Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to change the consciousness of those about you who are feeling there is lack in our world." Members were to give away the \$10 and spread the word that "There is limitless abundance in and around us at all times."

Bowen has been in the news before. He's the Kansas City pastor who came up with the idea that has become a worldwide movement: to a wear a purple bracelet as a reminder to quit complaining.

The idea for the "Top Secret Spiritual

Stimulus Plan" came to him because he got tired of hearing people blame their woes on the economy.

"Consumer confidence has a big impact on the economy," he said. When people became convinced that the economy was troubled, they "started freaking out" and hoarding their

"Even the banks were freaking out, not lending money. It was a collective freak out. And there is this belief that the economy dictates our abundance."

Bowen wondered how his church could change some of the thinking about the economic crisis, to change their perceptions and beliefs about what they have. Then it came to him: Spread money.

"If all of a sudden money started being handed out, people may change their beliefs," he said. "So we are just doing our small part in showing Kansas City that there is not lack, but abundance."

Participants were asked to e-mail their results of their giveaway to the church. "It has been thrilling to read the feedback," Bowen said. Everyone loved the project and found many different people to help, he said. Among them:

Fast food drive-throughs were great spots to ambush unsuspecting \$10 recipients. Terry Hale of Kansas City was in a drive-through lane when she looked in her rearview mirror and saw in the car behind her a young woman, her hair in a ponytail, and behind her a child's car seat. She could make out a bit of wiggling from the seat. Hale paid for her meal at the window and after the young man returned her change, she handed him the \$10 bill to pay for the meal for the car behind her.

You see, we live in an abundant world and I am paying it forward," she said. "Thanks and have a great day." The young man muttered, "OK," with a look of confusion.

As Hale was receiving her food at the

second window, she saw the attendant explaining to the young mother that her meal was paid for. "A surprised smile was forming on her face," Hale said. "I drove away with a gigantic smile on my own face, and then I wished I'd thought to give the guy working there \$10, too."

Kelly Seymour of Parkville, Mo., ordered a drink and was in a long line at a drive-through when a teenager walked out in the rain and cold to bring out her order. "There's no sense in you waiting so long for just a drink," he said. Seymour handed him the \$10, and he said he'd be right back with the change.

"No," she said. "You keep it."
"Seriously?" he asked. "Seriously,"
Seymour replied. "I want you to know when you put kindness and generosity out there, it comes back to you in greater abundance."

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

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Scholarships help local children make art projects

FROM VENICE ART CENTER

When 7-year-old Grace Stanish visited the Venice Art Center last week, she had just one thing in mind, finding her friend's paper sculpture of a green spider among the 863 South County Schools student art works on display. Before she left, Grace was trying to decide which art class she wants to take this summer.

Some kids in the Venice area are not so lucky. Their families are suffering economic hardships that can make simply putting food on the table each day a challenge.

But the art center is resolved to continue supplying the community's children with the artistic classes that will help shape them for the future. Board of directors Chair Tonya Sauppe recently sent out an urgent plea for donations, trusting to the generosity of members to fund children's scholarships. The goal: to have no child turned away from art classes for lack of funding.

"We are expecting more requests for financial aid this summer than ever before," Sauppe said. "In some of our local families, one parent has been downsized, or there is more than one child per family wanting to take classes. Now, it's more important than ever not to let the children down."

Last year the art center offered 64 classes designed for youngsters age 4 through 18. More than 330 children in the Venice community took classes in painting, pottery, and photography.

This year, a donation of \$40 sponsors one student in the Mix It Up one-day class; \$70 sponsors one student age 4 through 18 in one of 17 different classes; \$75 sponsors one student aged 9 and up in the Stained Glass/Fused Glass class; \$80 sponsors one student age 8 and up in the Pottery & Raku Class; and \$95 sponsors one student age 8 and up in the Photography class.



John Westlie of Liberty immediately knew he wanted to give his money to the lady who cleans his office building at William Jewell College. He described her as a hard worker with boundless cheer and optimism. But \$10 didn't seem to be enough for her, so Westlie matched it with \$10 of his own. He then asked other faculty

members in the office if they wanted to match his \$10.

"Several people engaged me in lengthy conversations and were fascinated by the concept that a church would simply give money away, confident that there was enough abundance and that the loss to the budget would not matter."

In the end, the \$10 became

\$180, and Westlie gave it to the cleaning lady in a thank-you card. "We had tears and hugs," he said.

While Bowen knows that many people are facing real challenges, he said a lot is perception. For example, he was at the airport and overheard a conversation between two real estate agents. "The first one

said, 'In this economy my business is in the tank.' The woman Realtor said, 'I've chosen not to participate in the down economy, and my business is as strong as ever."

"People are complaining about the economy, and one of the main reasons people complain is to remove themselves from responsibility. The first Realtor may not have been working as hard, may have unintentionally been slowing down. Whereas the woman was seeing lots of abundance."

DEAR BENNY:

About six months ago we refinanced our home. We are starting to receive solicitations from the mortgage lender asking us to sign up for their mortgage protection program. The program offers to pay off our loan upon death, or make payments upon disability or unemployment. This sounds too good to be true. What is your experience with these programs? Are they a scam? — Lisa

DEAR LISA:

I would not call them a scam, but because they are a moneymaker for your lender, you are getting those solicitations.

Read the fine print carefully. Exactly what does it cover? Are there any exclusions in the plan?

Compare the proposed benefits to your own insurance policies. You may already be covered and don't need additional insurance.

Many of these policies require you to pay the same yearly premium throughout the life of your mortgage loan, despite the fact that your loan will decrease in value over the years.

I don't recommend these policies. If you need — or want — such mortgage protection, talk with an insurance agent (or search the Web) and do a lot of comparison shopping before you make any commitments.

WHAT DO I NEED TO HAVE IN ORDER TO REFINANCE MY HOME?

DEAR BENNY:

What do I need in order to refinance my property?
— Frank

DEAR FRANK:

I am never to busy to respond to questions that I receive, although I cannot promise to answer all of the many inquiries I receive on a daily basis.

You want to refinance. Everyone's situation is different. For example, I would need to know your income, and your credit (FICO) score. I would need to know how much money you currently owe, and how much equity you have in your house.

These are the kinds of questions that mortgage lenders will want to know in order to analyze your situation and provide you with some alternative mortgage programs.

In my opinion, the best way to proceed is to discuss your situation with several lenders.
There is no harm — and no shame — in shopping around for the best deal.

Take notes, get quotes, and then decide what is best for you. If you are having trouble making that decision, I suggest that you talk with a financial advisor — although that usually is not necessary.

HURRICANE STRIPS OWNERS OF RENTAL RIGHTS: CAN INSURER'S MANDATE TRUMP ASSOCIATION BYLAWS?

DEAR BENNY:

I purchased a condo in Florida in 1990. I lived there for 17 years, and then moved with the assumption that I would be able to rent it, as was the case all the time. After Hurricane Charlie, the board said that the insurance company was going to charge too much of a premium if we had rental units. Only if your unit was rented at the time of this ruling could you rent it, and when the leases ran out, it could be rented for only four months in a calendar year. Is this allowed for original owners? We knew circumstances might change in our life, and that is why we bought it. Your opinion is greatly appreciated. —Kathleen

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

30-year mortgages up slightly

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rates on 30-year fixed mortgages rose slightly for the second straight week, but still remained below 5 percent, Freddie Mac said Thursday.

The average rate for a 30-year fixed mortgage was 4.86 percent, up from 4.84 percent last week. Rates have been below 5 percent for nine straight

weeks. Last year at this time, the average rate for a 30-year fixed mortgage — the most popular loan among home buyers -

was 6.01 percent. A record low of 4.78 percent for a 30-year fixed rate mortgage was first recorded on the week of April 2, and again on the week of April 30. Freddie Mac's survey

dates back to 1971.

Mortgage rates fell significantly over the winter. They slid again after the Federal Reserve said in March that it would buy \$1.2 trillion in mortgage-backed securities and \$300 billion in long-term government debt, which traditionally influences rates on 30year home loans.

Freddie Mac collects mortgage rates on Monday through Wednesday of each week from lenders around the country. Rates often fluctuate, even within a given day. The low rates have spurred refinancing activity, though consumers must have solid credit to get the best rates.

The mortgage finance giant said the average rate on a 15-year fixedrate mortgage averaged 4.52 percent, up just slightly from 4.51 percent last week.

Rates on five-year, adjustable-rate mortgages averaged 4.82 percent this week, down from 4.9 percent last week, Freddie Mac said.

Rates on one-year, adjustable-rate mortgages fell to 4.71 percent, compared with an average of 4.78 percent last week.

The rates do not include add-on fees known as points. The nationwide fee averaged 0.6 point for the loans covered in Freddie Mac's report.

to settlement (escrow in some parts of the country) you signed a large number of papers. One of them was an agreement that should there be clerical errors, you agree to allow those errors to be corrected by the lender.

I suspect that you signed a similar document in favor of the title or escrow company.

You state that this was not your error. While you are correct, there is a valuable lesson to be learned from your experience: When you go to closing, don't sign any documents until you have fully reviewed and understand — them. To some extent, you were just as much at fault.

But, although you will have to repay the escrow, perhaps you can use the error as leverage in order to negotiate a more comfortable payment schedule — say two years instead of one.

CONDO BOARD CAN VOTE TO HAVE A MANAGEMENT **COMPANY**

DEAR BENNY:

I live in a 16-unit condominium, of which around half of the owners rent out their units. The absentee owners are never involved, resulting in a few owners doing all of the board work, etc. Can the association vote and elect to charge the absentee owners — as a class — higher monthly dues to help cover the true cost of properly running things? Or on the other hand, do we all have to pay equally more dues and hire a management company to do everything? It seems like involved owners are penalized either way. -John

DEAR JOHN:

The general rule of law in community associations is that you cannot treat one owner different from another. All owners have to pay assessments based on the percentage interest of their unit. This percentage interest is generally found in your legal documents at the end of the declaration.

Do you have a legal board? Has it been properly elected? Did all owners — including the eight absentees — have an opportunity to vote for the current board of directors?

If the answer to these questions is positive, then the elected board should give serious thought to hiring a management company. This would, unfortunately, raise all of your monthly assessments, but would relieve the eight of you from having to do all of the work.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMNT ADDS TO VALUE OF HOME, **PROLONGS ITS USEFUL LIFE, OR ADAPTS IT** TO NEW USES

DEAR BENNY:

I am having trouble figuring out what constitutes an improvement and what is ordinary maintenance. Thinking ahead to selling my house in a few years when the market

rebounds, I have been keeping accurate records so that I can deduct these costs to lower the capital gains. Recently, I remodeled a bathroom, replaced a deck, replaced and upgraded the spa filter and motor, replaced the front door with a fiberglass model guaranteed to last more than my lifetime, and replaced a roof and rain gutters. Which of these can I safely regard as improvements, and which are just maintenance? — Deanne

DEAR DEANNE:

If memory serves me correctly, I believe I have already answered this question, but it is both timely and important, so I will respond again.

The best reference in this area can be found in IRS Publication 523, entitled "Selling your Home."

According to the IRS, improvements will increase your tax basis which means that your profit will be lower. Thus, if you have to pay any capital gains tax, that tax will also be lower. The IRS definition of a capital improvement is that which "adds to the value of your home, prolongs its useful life, or adapts it to new uses."

Examples of improvements provides by the IRS include "putting an addition on your home, replacing an entire roof, paving your driveway, installing air conditioning, or rewiring your home.'

The court cases are all over the place in this area. My definition is that if the work that you do has a useful life of more than one year, it probably will be considered an improvement. However, just fixing a toilet is maintenance, not an improvement.

I also suggest that all taxpayers obtain from the IRS a free copy of Publication 17, entitled "Your Federal Income Tax — for use in preparing 2008 tax returns." You can download this document (it is 296 pages long) or get a free paper copy from the IRS.

HOW TITLE IS HELD DETERMINES WHETHER YOU **NEED A WILL**

DEAR BENNY:

If I have real estate and have it in my son's name and my step-daughter's name, do I have to list this property in my will? —Judy

DEAR JUDY:

I am a little confused about your question. If only your son and stepdaughter are on title to the property, then you don't own it and it does not have to be included in your will.

But if you have any interest in the property, then it depends on how title is held. This answer must be general in nature, as different states have different rules and you should consult your own attorney for specific

advice. If you and the other two own the property as joint tenants with rights of survivorship, then on your death, the property will automatically go to the survivors. No probate is needed and you do not

have to list the property

in your will. On the other hand, if title is held as tenants in common, that means that you have a separate interest in the property. That also means that your interest must be probated. And that also means that you must have a will; otherwise, a judge will have to rely on the intestacy laws in your state — and that may not be your desire.

RETIREE'S NEW LIFESTYLE REQUIRES **SMART TAX MOVE** WHICH IS BETTER: **SELLING PRIMARY** OR RENTAL HOME?

DEAR BENNY:

My aunt is 76 years old and lives in her home. She also owns a detached rental property nearby. Her primary residence has been the same property for more than 10 years. She would like to move into a retirement community this year, but to afford this new lifestyle she would have to sell one of her properties soon. Would it be more cost-effective from a tax perspective to sell her primary residence or her rental property? Are there any tax benefits to selling rental property vs. one's primary residence?

I have heard about a one-time tax exemption on the proceeds of selling one's primary residence, but I do not understand the rules of this exemption. I was thinking it would be better to sell the rental property first to avoid inconveniencing my aunt's daily routines, and later convert the primary residence into rental property after she moves. She could wait to sell one of the houses until the housing market improves in a few years. However, I would not want her to lose a tax exemption or tax benefit by making the wrong decision. — Arlene

DEAR ARLENE:

If you aunt is married and files a joint tax return with her spouse, she can exclude up to \$500,000 of any gain (profit) that she will make in the house. If she is not married — or files a separate tax return — she can exclude only up to \$250,000 of gain.

În order to take advantage of this gain exclusion, there are two tests: (1) ownership — you must be on title; and (2) use — you have to have lived in (used) the property for two out of the five years before it is

In your aunt's case, she currently meets both tests: She owns the property and has lived there for a long time. However, if she rents it out and cannot sell within three years from the date she moved out, she will lose that tax benefit.

You (or your aunt) should consult a tax advisor, who will prepare an analysis of the pros and cons of selling each house. Everyone's financial situation is different, so I can provide only general advice.

I suspect that your aunt has an accountant who has been preparing her tax returns each and every year. He/she should be able to quickly project the tax consequences regarding each house.



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A car like the Beach Boys song

'hat you see here is a really bright red 1962 Chevy Impala, fully restored and built to specs described in a very popular song of its time by owner Rich Fagan of Port Charlotte. This "ragtop" has it all, dual quad, four speed, positraction 409 — just like the words used in their record. Very good, but there is much more, such as a 425 h.p., four-wheel disc brakes, digital dash, air conditioning, 10 bolt rear, etc. The interior is almost SS style. However, Fagan says, "This is my special baby, so lots of things are not stock, including suspension, wheels and tires."

Nor has his life been a "cookie cutter" design. The interest in cars goes back to when he was 10 years old and hanging around a body shop helping out as a cleanup boy, followed by learning the trade. At age 14, a job pumping gas (at \$0.21 9/10 per gallon) kept this young man busy when not in school. Quickly, two years went by, and there was enough money to get that first automobile of his very own, a 1957 Chevrolet CV with a fast 283cubic-inch engine, plus a floor shifter. It stayed



with him through high school, up to



graduation. Shortly after all that studying and part-time work, into the Navy he went. An assignment to the Jacksonville Naval Base changed his mind about life in Western Pennsylvania, with its bitter cold weather. Nevertheless, in 1968 when discharged, he moved back, bought a 1962 Chevy with a powerful 327 engine, painted it gold, and added chrome rims. All the time, he stayed in the body/fender line of work, settling down as a married man with wife, Kathy, who gave him two children: Mandi and Brian.

That warm Florida came into his mind each winter, enough so to convince the wife to pack up and move to Charlotte County in 1976. Palm Chevrolet hired him as their body shop manager. (They had only one dealership at that time.) Seeing the need for a paint supplier, Rich and store owner Bill Wetzel of Fort Myers

teamed up to start B&R color and supply in 1979. Raising a family and running a new business left little time to play with fancy cars.

About 1990, his longtime friend Rick Treworgy talked him into doing body work and paint on a 1967 Corvette, which turned out to be the first Vette in his collection. It still looks good and is on display at the new Muscle Car City Museum in Punta Gorda. You guessed it, this rekindled the

desire to own a special vehicle again: a 1978 El Camino, in which a "454" with a turbo 400 tranny, very quality paint job and lots of detail items resulted in its being a show winner twice in its class at Super Chevy Shows, even getting a photo in a magazine.

The time had come to move on to getting an auto he really wanted, a 1962 Chevrolet Impala. Thus the El Camino was taken to a "Turkey Run" event at Daytona Raceway and sold. A friend who bought and sold cars found the car that appears in today's column. One thing led to another and a full restoration took place, plus much more, as described in the paragraph at the start of today's column.

B&R Color is still going strong in Whidden Industrial Park, along with their other successful business — Glass Doctor. Kathy runs B&R while Rich oversees the glass operation. They have many employees, but I only met Hal, Larry, Brian and Wayne I believe it's safe to say their paint products are on at least 95 percent of all cars, trucks and motorcycles that have been repaired or customized from Fort Myers up past North Port. This couple also owns a 1967 M.G.B. roadster he restored, and now is rebuilding a rare 1953 Ferguson Tractor. You can see this red Chevy tomorrow during the grand opening show of the Muscle Car City Museum in Punt Gorda. This will be the place to be if you are interested in the old car hobby. These tires should be full of

hot air, but aren't

Dear Tom and Ray: I have a 2000 Toyota Sienna van. My van tires lose air on a regular basis. The tire-trouble indicator on the dash is on most of the time. The front desk personnel — who have had some mechanical training — say I only need to have the tire rims cleaned and sealed, and they should hold for two years. One of the mechanics, who seems to be knowledgeable, says it's because my rims are aluminum, and aluminum rims collect residue that gets between the tire and the rim. He recommended getting stainless-steel rims. Who is right? — Jean-Marie

TOM: Well, there are millions of cars with aluminum-alloy rims out there, and their tires are all holding air. So I don't think it's the type of rims

you have, Jean-Marie. **RAY:** There are two things I'd look at. One is your valve stems. The valve stem is the black rubber thing that sticks out of the wheel. It's where you put the air when you fill up the

tires. Valve stems can

porous, and allow air to

sometimes crack, or

deteriorate and get

slowly leak out. TOM: In fact, some 30 million Chinese-made valve stems were recently recalled because they may fail. They were manufactured for a company named Dill and distributed by Tech International all over the country. If you have those, you can get them

replaced for free. **RAY:** The other possibility is what the front desk personnel suggested that you have oxidation on the inside of the rims, and that's preventing the bead of the tire from sealing tightly against the rims. That's also a common source of slow leaks.

TOM: So, my suggestion would be to have your mechanic remove all of the tires, clean up the rims, replace the valve stems and remount the tires. I'll bet that fixes it.

RAY: And if he happens to notice any huge nail holes while he's at it, have him patch those up, too. Good luck, Jean-Marie.

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Audi's entry car good, except for price

Audi's A3 entry-level car is small, but not too small. It's a premium European model but not plush. And, it's fun to drive and sporty with impeccable poise.

For 2009, every A3 fivedoor hatchback comes with standard leathertrimmed seats and satellite radio. Quattro allwheel-drive now is available on the most popular version of A3 the model with the base, turbocharged fourcylinder engine.

Also new this model year are subtle design updates outside that include eye-catching fiber optics in the taillamps. There's a new, optional magnetic ride suspension, too, that provides advanced ride damping and control from new adaptive shock absorbers.

Best of all, the A3 is a top safety pick by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, following a good performance in the institute's front, side and rear crash tests. The federal government has not crash tested the A3.

It's just too bad the A3 isn't within the price reach of many more car buyers.

Starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, for a 2009 A3 with manual transmission is \$27,745. The lowestpriced A3 with a transmission that can shift itselfin this case, an S-tronic dual-clutch transmission — is \$29,225. These prices are competitive with many small, entry-level European luxury cars. For example, the 2009 Volvo C30 hatchback starts at \$24,695, while the 2009 BMW 1-Series starts at \$30,225.

But the A3 is no bargain, given it's about the same size inside as a Honda Civic, and it's a hatchback, which many Americans equate with an "economy" label.

Also, the A3's reliability rating at Consumer Reports magazine is only "fair."

Still, driving the A3 shows just how pleasing a stable, buttoned-down hatchback can be. The A3 is an easy car for most people to drive comfortably. Note: Large-sized adults may feel a bit confined in the optional front sport seats that were in the test car.

But the seat support is among the best out there, and the lengthy seat track and height adjustment allow for a wide range of seat positions. The steering wheel also tilts and telescopes to allow for more driver position flexibility.

Steering and brakes are precise in their quick responses, giving the A3 high marks for accident avoidance. There's a distinctly nimble feel in all maneuvers, and the A3 seems to handle as one piece of metal with none of the sloppiness seen in some other vehicles.

The addition of Audi's all-wheel drive system on the test car added to the

enjoyment as the car moved efficiently through mountain twisties. It stayed on course and confidently poised, even when driven aggressively. The grippy summer performance tires that were on the tester helped.

There was nary any wind noise, and road noise was muted as I traveled. The noisiest the interior got was on rough, recently scraped highway concrete that was being

groomed for resurfacing. The biggest frustration on the road was that I couldn't see very far ahead when vehicles were in front of me. I looked up at, but not through, sport utility vehicles and other tall vehicles.

The 200-horsepower, 2liter, double overhead cam, turbocharged and intercooled four cylinder engine is a carryover from the previous year and moves the A3 in sprightly fashion. I loved how the car zoomed forward with purposeful gusto. Torque peaks at 207 foot-pounds early in the rev band — at 1,800 rpm — and is available to 5,000 rpm.

With the S-tronic sixspeed tranny, I could shift from gear to gear myself or let the computer software do it for me. Both were pleasing experiences. The A3 also is available with a six-speed manual. It's mated only to the turbo four. The A3's other engine - a 250-horsepower, 3.2liter, non-turbo six cylinder — comes only with the S-tronic.

Obviously, fuel economy is best with the fourcylinder engine, but there's no boasting about the A3's combined city/highway rating of 24 miles per gallon. A four-cylinder Honda Civic can get a federal government rating of 29 mpg. Also, be aware that premium gasoline is required for the A3.

Still, there's something about the sporty exhaust note of the A3 test car that sticks with me.

The car looks good, too. The modern Audi styling conveys the look of a ground-hugging, premium car. It doesn't seem to matter that the look is on a vehicle that's shorter, from bumper to bumper, than the already smallish 2009 Volvo C30 hatchback and shorter than a Civic.

Audi's new wheels for the A3 this year add pizzazz. The test car wore optional 18-inch, alloy wheels that nicely complemented the exterior Meteor Gray paint with pearlescent effects. In fact, even the lowestpriced Audi like the A3, has the automaker's

special paints that can look so deep and special, you'd swear the car is wearing 75 coats of paint.

Don't let the short size of the A3 fool you. This car has more cargo space behind the rear seats -19.5 cubic feet — than does the BMW 1-Series. And if the rear seats are folded down, the luggage space grows to a nearly SUV-like 55 cubic feet of room.

But the rear seat is a tight squeeze for three adults. Two people back there do OK.

Drivers must watch for the sizable, metal pillar at the side of the back window. The pillar obscures views. Also be aware that adding options to the A3 can quickly scale up the price to well over \$30,000. The test car topped out at more than \$41,000.

Lastly, Audi officials announced plans to add a fuel-thrifty diesel engine to the A3 in early calendar 2010. The 2-liter diesel will provide more than 40 mpg in highway driving.
