Area jobless figures up

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Bureau of Labor Market Statistics released on June 20 its unemployment rates for May 2014. These numbers reflect a small overall increase in unemployment since April; however, employment in Information, Leisure and Hospitality, and Trade, Transportation and Utilities grew faster in the region than statewide.

The unemployment rates in the three counties that CareerSource Capital Region serves were 6.9 percent in Gadsden, 5.4 percent in Leon and 4.8 percent in Wakulla. Gadsden County's unemployment rate is .5 percentage points higher than the April 2014 rate. Leon County's unemployment rate is .6 percentage points higher than the April 2014 rate. Wakulla County's unemployment rate is .2 percentage points higher than the April 2014 rate.

To be more competitive in their job search, CareerSource Capital Region leaders encourage job-seekers to attend the new "Organizing Your Job Campaign" workshop, which is open to the public. Held in the CareerSource Capital Region office at 2525 S. Monroe St. in Tallahassee each Monday from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., this workshop helps job seekers create a written plan of action to quickly become gainfully employed.

"Taking advantage of this valuable workshop will put job seekers in the driver's seat of their search for employment," stated Jim McShane, CEO of CareerSource Capital Region. "As they say, 'People don't plan to fail; they simply fail to plan.' There is no

Scott nixes one budget item for Gadsden

Florida Gov. Rick Scott released the 2014 budget early this month, along with a list of vetoed line items. This year, Scott has dubbed the spending plan the "It's Your Money Tax Cut Budget."

"The tax cuts in this Budget will also help Florida maintain positive economic mo-

mentum as our state's economy continues to add jobs and opportunities for families," wrote Gov. Scott in an open letter provided by his press office. "Florida's unemployment rate is down 6.2 percent and has remained below the national average for nine consecutive months. In a little over three years, Florida's private sec-

tor has created more than 600,400 jobs."

While speaking at the Gadsden County Chamber of Commerce meeting in May, Florida State Sen. Bill Montfort said he hoped Scott would concentrate his vetoes on line items involving expenses specifically for communities in central and south Florida — anywhere south of

Gainesville.

According to a list of Scott's budget vetoes provided by the governor's press office, the only nixed line item pertaining specifically to Gadsden County was \$110,000 marked for the Senior Energy Efficiency Program —

Gadsden County. This appropriation was one of the budgetary items pursued by Bill Montfort, senator for Florida's third district.

Little information about the program appears to be readily available. Despite this line item's

Reaching out

GCSO looks to partner with churches

With more than 300 churches in Gadsden County, local law enforcement leaders are looking for these faith-based organizations to help out in tough times.

Maj. Shawn Wood shared this during a June 19 meeting with some local pastors at the Gadsden County Sheriff's Office.

He said Sheriff Morris Young is interested in mobilizing churches and congregations across the county into a support network in the event of a disaster, such as a powerful hurricane or widespread forest fire.

Wood began by relating a story about two pastors who helped save the day by calming hundreds of frantic parents blocking the passage of ambulances after the recent school bus crash in Chattahoochee.

"I have what I do — my nature," said Wood. "I'm the guy you call when something really bad is happening, and you feel like you need a warrior on your side. That's me. That's my nature. That's who I am. But see, as a pastor, your call is different than mine."

Would also said local church involve-

ment could be relied on in ways unmatched by the government.

"I'm going to tell you something," said Wood. "The government isn't coming. They aren't coming."

According to Wood's presentation, the GCSO plan for church involvement includes several aspects. Wood presented the benefits of utilizing pastors as liaisons between the deputies and families of victims, channeling emergency information through the churches' internal sources of communication, staging rescue operations and housing displaced people in church buildings or on church properties, distributing necessities through

congregational outreach and developing an evacuation system by encouraging churches to establish two-way housing arrangements with sister churches.

In regard to this last point, Wood said, "Don't depend on the government to transport you, because it's going to be miserable and you're going to be put in a shelter."

Young said after becoming sheriff, he began viewing the church as one collective whole — rather than various denominations and isolated institutions. Now, he said, that collective whole can prepare to fill another critical role in the community.

According to Wood, the No. 1 thing the deputies talk about at the sheriff's

office is service — and part of serving the people is finding the best person for the job.

"So what I'm trying to do is be the quarterback," he said, "and I want to hand you all the ball. I want you to do what you do. One, I don't like to do it. So I would rather you do it. And it's not that I can't do it. You do a better job than I do."

The meeting precedes this year's Rural County Summit, which will focus on community disaster and emergency response. The four-day event will include a final day, July 12, when anyone in the community interested in becoming involved with volunteer emergency response is invited.

Special GCSO team arrests suspects on drug charges

Two drug-related operations conducted by the Gadsden County Sheriff's Office

Special Response Team (SRT) yielded two recent arrests

in Chattahoochee.

The SRT conducted a saturated patrol in the area around the Happy Kash and Karry Convenience Store on June 17. Two deputies situated themselves near a path leading away from the store. According to the arrest report, in the past deputies had observed suspects fleeing along this path when law enforcement officers approached the front of the convenience store.

With the two deputies in position near the footpath, they stepped out and began walking toward the convenience store as SRT members in marked patrol cars pulled into the parking lot.

The deputies on the path spotted a then-identified man smoking something. According to an arrest report, they approached him. When they asked the man where the joint was, he said he dropped it. One of the deputies also observed the man, who told deputies his name is Chris Williams, drop a small paper bag.

When they began to cuff and detain Williams, a struggle began. With a cuff secured only on his left wrist, the suspect ran, according to the report. One deputy grabbed Williams while the other tried to secure the other





Public Hearing and Second Reading of Proposed Ordinance #2014-02

Town of Greensboro Small Scale Plan Amendment

The Town of Greensboro Town Council will hold a public hearing and second reading of Ordinance # 2014-02 which is an ordinance that adopts a small scale land use amendment to the Future Land Use Map of the Town of Greensboro Local Government Comprehensive Plan. The amendment, if adopted, will change approximately 9.1 acres from Residential to Public/Institutional and approximately one acre from Public/Institutional to Residential, as shown in the map below. The public hearing to consider the ordinance will be held on July 14, 2014 at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as may be heard, at the Greensboro Town Hall located at 150 E. 11th Street, Greensboro, Florida 32330. The proposed plan amendment will be adopted by Ordinance No.: 2014-02, entitled: **AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF GREENSBORO, FLORIDA, ADOPTING A SMALL SCALE AMENDMENT TO ITS COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FUTURE LAND USE MAP TO CORRECT A SCRIVENERS ERROR. THE AMENDMENT BEING A LAND USE CATEGORY CHANGE ON THE FUTURE LAND USE MAP OF PARCEL 3-16-2N-5W-0000-00221-0100 FROM RESIDENTIAL TO PUBLIC/ INSTITUTIONAL AND A CHANGE OF LAND USE OF PARCEL 3-16-2N-5W-0000-00212-0100 FROM PUBLIC/INSTITUTIONAL TO RESIDENTIAL AS DESCRIBED IN THE ATTACHMENT HERETO, INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE. PROVIDING FOR A CONFLICTS AND SEVERITY CLAUSE AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

The proposed plan amendment and ordinance are available at Town Hall for public inspection between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Comments may be voiced at the above mentioned meeting or in writing, addressed to the Town Manager at P.O. Box 66, Greensboro, Florida 32330. Be advised that any person wishing to appeal any decision made by the Council on any matter considered during the meeting will need a record of the proceedings, and may need to ensure that a verbatim record is made, which includes the testimony and evidence upon which the appeal is to be based. Along Twin Ponds Road

As we drove west on Route 212, I had a graphic visual image of Custer and his men being massacred at Little Bighorn. The closer we drove to the battlefield, the more anxious I became.

It was overcast early that morning when my wife, 7-year-old son and I started our drive to Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument. We had spent the night at some remote Montana motel the night before.

During the drive we discussed what we knew about the famous battle where Custer and his brave 7th Cavalry had met and suffered a devastating loss to a combined force of Lakota, Northern Cheyenne and Arapaho Indians.

It was still early in the morning when we arrived at that vast, desolate area known as Little Bighorn.

We turned off the car engine and climbed out to stretch and survey the terrain.

It was still overcast, but I was able to view the area plainly and was awed at its immensity and with how foreboding it seemed.

I had no difficulty with closing my eyes and becoming one with my surroundings in an attempt to obtain a sense of how it must have seemed to one of Custer's men waiting to do battle in this very place so many years ago.

One of the reasons I love history is that if I learn all I can about a battle and the sur-

rounding area, it's easy for me to imagine I was there, long ago, when actual history was being made.

When I was stationed with the military on Wake Island 20 years after World War II, I read much about the battle for Wake Island before my transfer there.

After reading vivid descriptions in books, it was so exciting to travel to a specific spot on the coastline of Wake and gaze out across the Pacific while going over in my mind a battle that had occurred close to the very spot upon which I was standing.

When I went over to Wilkes Island, a part of Wake, a part of the hulk of a rotting Japanese ship was still visible and made reliving the story of its sinking so much more realistic.

What made viewing the battlefield of Little Bighorn so poignant was that we were all alone; there were no other spectators at that time and place.

I was overcome with more anxiety as I thought to myself, "What if our car won't start, and we become stranded here?"

Would Indian warriors gradually emerge from the fog and overcome us as they had Custer and his men nearly 100 years ago?

For the life of me, I couldn't fathom why I didn't have my car's solenoid repaired before we started this cross-country trip.

It was completely out of character for me. I always took care

of my cars and any potential problems.

Before we had left Connecticut I had tried to explain to my trusted friend and mechanic, Andy, that I had had trouble starting the car a couple of times, but if I went out and lifted the hood and tapped on a certain device near the battery, the car would start.

Andy said it sounded like solenoid problems, but if tapping on that device did the trick, just be sure to take a small rock along with me.

A solenoid is a device that connects a circuit between the battery and the starter. I wondered why Andy just didn't go ahead and install a new one.

After we had taken in all that we desired of our surroundings that morning at the Little Bighorn battlefield, we climbed back into our maroon 1968 Ford Galaxie 500.

What a wonderful, reliable car she had been, and so nice to ride in.

I turned the key to start her, and there was nothing but a clicking sound.

My stomach turned. This could not be happening all these miles away from civilization with absolutely no other people around.

Reluctantly, I fished around for the stone with hopes that once again, a little tapping in the area of the car's solenoid would do the trick.

I lifted the hood of the car while looking around all sides of me for any signs of

imminent danger before I gently tapped on the area of the solenoid.

I instructed Millie to turn the key while I waited, almost in a panic.

"Click, click; click click."

I lowered the hood, my stomach churning, and sat down alongside Millie and Kent on the front seat.

I said a prayer, asking for help in order to get my family out of this predicament.

A few minutes later I went outside and reran the drill of tapping the solenoid; only this time I tapped a little harder.

While still pleading God's indulgence, Millie turned the key once again.

This time the engine started effortlessly. We couldn't wait to leave the loneliness and desolation of Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument on that dismal June morning.

Did you know that the Battle of Little Bighorn was fought over June 25 and 26 in 1876? We are about to witness the 138th anniversary of this significant day in history.

God bless you.

Give college grads freedom from debt

The U.S. Senate held a vote recently to bring up legislation allowing student debt-holders to refinance old loans at lower current interest rates. The motion to debate the "Bank on Students Emergency Loan Refinancing Act" (S. 2432) garnered a 56-38 majority but fell short of the 60 votes needed to open debate.

Republicans cast 37 of the 38 "no" votes. Only three Republicans joined 53 Democrats and Independents in voting to debate the bill.

For members of the college and high-school classes of 2014 and for past graduates, this effort to tackle the student debt issue is sorely needed. For whether their degrees are in math, science, history or English, our graduates are coming out of college schooled in something else entirely: the crushing weight of student loan debt.

With outstanding student debt now topping \$1.2 trillion, 40 million Americans are facing the consequences of our failing national commitment to higher education. This situation poses a threat to America's economic vitality and its promise of opportunity.

The Federal Reserve reports growing student loan debt is holding borrowers back from buying homes and cars. This is bad news for an economy still trying to get its mojo back since the Great Recession.

And student loans have turned into a big business for the U.S. Department of Education, which reportedly made a profit of \$41.3 billion from federal student loans last year. If the agency were a corporation, it would be one of the most profitable in the world.

It's time to address the student debt crisis and the toll it's taking on the economy. Allowing refinancing will save borrowers thousands of dollars in interest payments. That will free up disposable income, boost consumer spending and strengthen the economy.

However, to fix the overall student debt picture, we need to think even bigger — big enough to put "free college" back on the national agenda. Does free college sound like magical thinking? It's more like a walk down memory lane.

Fifty years ago in California, tuition-free college wasn't pie in the sky; it was state policy. In 1964, a world-class

When I conduct my community seminars, I like to ask participants who their greatest positive influence was in their childhood other than immediate family members. Invariably, a teacher springs to mind, usually with a smile of fond recognition.

I remember Miss Quinn (I learned years later her first name was Ann). As a fourth-grader, I was certainly not the most loquacious kid; I was kind of shy. I liked reading and feared math. I knew why the word number began "numb"!

I could smoothly skate my way through the most complex paragraph but slipped and stumbled when even the simplest math problem confronted me. I deeply dreaded the feeling of cold sweat when called to the board to divide or mul-

tiply in public!

Miss Quinn taught every fourth-grade subject in our suburban elementary school in my hometown, Long Beach, N.Y. My memory of her starts with her engaging smile; it shined and expressed that she really wanted to be with us.

But she was no pushover. If the wilder kids thought they could run over this seemingly kind person, she proved them wrong with a cold glance, a pursed lip, and if need be, a direct voice.

"Jeffrey, none of us appreciates your disruptive behavior, and we certainly expect more of you so we can all get on with today's work." That was Miss Quinn's style. Jeffrey was cornered by the collective voice of the rest of us, and none of us wanted to be designated as the focus of organized negativity — alone, separated and scorned. She taught the lesson of good attitude by instilling in us a fear of the alternative.

The teacher's art is clear and convincing communication so a love of learning is shared with all the children in the class. While most of us grew up with family expectation of educational success, it's not a goal that can ever be achieved without the engaging skills of good teachers.

We all know that great debates rage over health care and educational policies. What system reforms are needed to get the most benefit for the least cost is the usual focus of attention.

In my experience as a public policy advocate, I have come to learn the best path leads us to the most obvious conclusion. Investment in quality professionals is the key to success in all of the human services. We have to determine who knows what to do, when and how to do it best.

We will feel better and do better as the result of that wise investment in a skilled workforce of great benefit to all, across the generations.

Recognizing and acting upon that reality would bring us far forward in our health status, educational achievement, economic stability and quality of life.

The U.S. soccer team will be squaring off against Germany's team at noon June 26. The game will determine which team will move on from Group G. Both teams currently have one win and one draw against the other teams in

their group. The United States beat Ghana and tied Portugal — while Germany beat Portugal and tied Ghana. Jürgen Klinsman, the U.S. head coach, is a former captain of the German national team. Among other tournaments with other teams, he has

played for his homeland in three world cups: 1990, 1994 and 1998 — including a victory in 1990. Now, Klinsman will lead the U.S. against his former team. Locally, Matt Henely, president of the FSU boy's soccer club, weighed in on the upcoming game

during a Times interview. Despite the U.S. team's move away from a more defensive and reactive style of play, Henely said it seems likely they will revert back to it when faced with an opponent as skilled as Germany, on the

other hand, according to Henely, will likely employ more aggressive techniques, seeking to possess the ball and maneuver it widely enough in the midfield to create exploitable openings in the U.S. defense. To counter this tactic,

education in the public University of California system came with free tuition and fees totaling just \$220 for the year.

At the 1964 minimum wage of \$1.25 an hour, you could earn \$220 in four and a half weeks of full-time work. That means a University of California student 50 years ago could earn enough to pay for a year's college costs by flipping burgers for a month in the summer.

Today, even at in-state rates, with tuition and fees averaging \$8,893 for the 2013-2014 school year, it would take seven months of full-time work at the \$7.25 federal minimum wage to make that much.

What's changed since 1964? A massive public disinvestment from higher education has shifted the

costs of college onto students and families. Just in the past few years, state funding per student was cut by an average of 27 percent nationwide.

Private interests have filled the void, transforming college finance into a vehicle for financial industry profits. Private lenders have moved aggressively into the student loan market, offering loans with interest rates in the double digits. The explosion of student loan debt has also fueled a burgeoning student loan debt collection industry.

Translation: Wall Street has turned our college students into a new cash cow.

It doesn't have to be this way. If we're serious about giving our children and grandchildren real freedom — freedom from student debt — we need to reverse the trend of public disinvestment, put a stop to private profiteering and recommit to free col-

lege in America. Then we need to marshal the resources to make it happen. Ending offshore tax giveaways to multinational corporations and millionaires would be one way to get there.

Is solving the student debt crisis going to take a fight, given the political clout of the financial interests that are making big money off the status quo? Of course. But it's a fight worth having.

Let's make college in America what it should be: a free, shared vehicle for building an educated people, not another costly way for special interests to take us for a ride.

Holt takes fight to reopen local Social Security office to DC

Gadsden County Commissioner Brenda Holt traveled to Washington, D.C., to testify about the closure of the county's Social Security Office before the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, chaired by Sen. Bill Nelson, D-Fla.

Holt said in the meetings and conversations with leaders in the nation's capital, she was unable to find anyone who could explain what objective standard the Social Security Administration used when deciding to close the Social Security office in Gadsden County.

"There was no rubric," said Holt. "There were no guidelines. We could not determine why they closed our office."

When Holt voiced her frustrations with the Social Security Administration, she said

she could only be so upset by an organization that is being underfunded.

"They're talking about numbers, and I'm talking about people that we care about," said Holt. "It's a funding problem for them. It's a human problem for us."

Holt also said the committee asked her for specific case examples supporting the need for the county's Social Security Office.

According to the Senate's transcript of the Gadsden commissioner's statements, she gave them a case example:

"I can use the example of Mr. Kate Alexander, a gentleman whose cancer case is an example of how the elderly community in Gadsden County are treated. He had paid for his own insurance from the time he was 16 years old until he was 60. Mr. Alexander

was told he could not get chemotherapy because of his deductible, and his insurance would not cover the costs. He had to travel 54 miles to Tallahassee, FL from his home in Gadsden County, embarrassed and ashamed. Eventually, Mr. Alexander was able to receive treatment for his cancer after being signed up for Affordable Healthcare. Unfortunately, due to the timing of the issue, Mr. Alexander passed away from lack of chemotherapy treatments while waiting on insurance to cover costs."

After her entire testimony, Holt said the matter was not resolved. Nor was it abandoned.

"They responded very well," said the commissioner. "They were very sympathetic — and they thanked us for traveling so far."

Area gas prices in neutral

TALLAHASSEE - Average retail gasoline prices in Tallahassee have not moved in the past week, averaging \$3.63/g Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 201 gas outlets in Tallahassee. This compares with the national average that has increased 2.6 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.68/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Tallahassee during the past week, prices yesterday were 16.9 cents per gallon

higher than the same day one year ago and are 6.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has increased 4.6 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 10.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"While concerns in Iraq have led to higher prices in many areas across the nation in the last week, a new concern has come to light: a possible increase in the federal gasoline tax," said GasBuddy.com Senior Pe-

trolem Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "Suddenly, there are a few different situations that bear monitoring that could have an impact at the pump: Iraq, the Fed's (raising gas taxes), and the peak of hurricane season, which is coming soon. While this week at the pump could be a quiet one, especially if there's no major Iraq news, motorists still face the threat of higher prices later in the summer, and watching lawmakers debate raising gasoline taxes certainly is worth monitoring."

line item's label, the program is not a county government project. The county referred questions to city of Quincy and the city of Quincy directed a reporter to the Quincy Community Redevelopment Agency.

In a *Times* interview with CRA Director Regina Davis, she said the program was an idea she developed in an attempt to help local seniors. The plan involved sending city employees to make

minor improvements in homes of senior citizens, aiming to lower these elderly residents' cost of living by increasing the efficiency of their household utilities.

The program, according to Davis, has never received state funding in the past.

The new budget also directly affected a few of Gadsden County's neighbor when the governor vetoed line items specifically appropriated funds or projects in those counties. A \$1.5 million dredging expense was vetoed for Wakulla County, along

with a \$525,000 padding trail project in the same county.

Similarly, neither Jefferson nor Calhoun counties will receive the \$200,000 state tax dollars legislators had marked for projects on the two counties' courthouses.

The most costly budget item vetoed by Scott was the proposal for a \$3.25 million addition to Stetson University's science facility at the small private institution's main campus in Deland — a Volusia County town south of Montford's desired line of north/south demarcation.



- 1 pound fresh strawberries, hulled and cut into quarters (or eighths if berries very large)
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 egg
- 1 package (14 ounces) refrigerated pie crusts

In small saucepan, stir together vinegar, water, 1 cup sugar, salt and peppercorns. Add thyme sprigs. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until boiling; let boil 3 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Pour over cut strawberries, until fully submerged in liquid. Cover and let sit at room temperature 4 to 8 hours. Preheat oven to 400°F. Line cookie pan with parchment paper. Strain strawberries from pickling liquid and discard peppercorns and thyme. Toss berries with cornstarch until evenly coated. In small bowl, whisk egg with 1 tablespoon water until smooth. Unroll pie crusts and cut with 3 1/2-inch round cutter. Each crust yields 8 rounds. To assemble pies, top half of rounds with about 3 tablespoons of berry mixture each. Brush edges of rounds with egg wash. Cut out a hole or pierce remaining rounds with fork. Place on top of berries. Using a fork, press edges of crusts together tightly to seal. Transfer to prepared cookie pan. Brush tops of pies with egg wash and sprinkle with granulated sugar. Bake 18 to 22 minutes, or until pies are lightly golden and filling is bubbling. Cool slightly before serving.



No-Bake Cheesecake Star Pops

Yield: 6 servings

- 1 envelope (2 1/4 teaspoons) unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 bag (12 ounces) royal blue Candy Melts candy

- 1 package (4.9 ounces) vanilla wafer cookies, for garnish
- Blueberries, raspberries or blackberries, for garnish

Line muffin pan with plastic wrap, pressing plastic into each cavity and letting plastic hang over edge of pan. In large skillet, combine mixed berries, sugar and lemon juice. Bring to a gentle boil over medium heat. Reduce heat to medium-low and continue simmering until berries soften and liquid reduces to 1 cup, about 20 to 25 minutes. Gently mash berries with wooden spoon. Transfer to medium bowl and cool completely. In large bowl, whip cream on medium-high speed until cream holds stiff peaks, about 4 to 5 minutes. Gently fold in berry mixture and zest until completely combined. Place whipped cream in decorating bag and cut off pointed end. To assemble, pipe small amount of whipped cream mixture into each muffin cavity. Lightly press a cookie into whipped cream. Continue layering whipped cream and cookies until cavities are full, finishing with whipped cream layer. You should have 3 layers of cookies. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight. Remove pan from refrigerator. Remove plastic wrap from top and carefully flip out onto serving platter. Remove wrap from mini cakes. Garnish with additional berries, if desired. Serve immediately.

Gadsden County to offer six different probation services

The Gadsden County Probation Division is offering an array of new services to improve the quality of those currently being offered. Six different programs have

been implemented within the division.

1. Alcohol Breath Test: This service is offered for court ordered breath tests. Breath tests are scheduled anywhere from

three to four days a week. The number of tests administered varies from three to 20 per day. Alcohol breath tests are court-ordered to be taken anywhere from daily,

to one to four times per week, or one to three times per month. Breath tests are ordered for defendants with alcohol-related charges such as DUI. The current cost per

test is \$5. Testing a bad check class, in addition to paying related to alcohol or high alcohol reading currently \$65 if the offender is court-ordered to attend.

2. Bad Check Class: Bad check offenders are required to attend

Secrets of Night Bass Fishing

By late June, most bass have moved to their summer hangouts. Dropoffs, weedlines and weedflats should be good, but the edges of humps and reefs will usually hold the most fish.

On hot days, bass hold tight to the bottom or hide in the thickest vegetation they can find to escape the hot sun and boat traffic. At night, they move away from cover and higher up in the water and begin to feed.

Color of the bait isn't as important now as shape and size. A large lure tends to produce more vibration and bass pick that up on their lateral line. Big baits are also easier to see. They don't see lure details like during the day, but they see the big outline and that's what they go after.

Topwater baits are also a great choice for bass at night. A big bass exploding out of the water to smash a topwater in the dark of night is something every fisherman needs to experience.

cuff. Both Williams and the restraining deputy tumbled to the ground. The cuffing deputy deployed his Taser and told Williams he would discharge the weapon if he did not cease resisting and begin complying — but Williams continued to scuffle with the deputy on the ground.

According to the report the standing deputy then utilized his Taser for a five-second cycle, aiming at Williams' stomach. The action was ineffective and Williams continued to struggle. So the deputy employed his Taser again, delivering another five-second cycle. But Williams still resisted.

Williams managed to get to his feet and begin making another attempt to flee — but, according to the arrest report, one of the deputies gained a grip on Williams' T-shirt and the two began to fight.

At this point, another two deputies arrived. The four deputies were able to subdue and cuff Williams.

According to the arrest report, they searched Williams and found \$340 and several bags of marijuana packaged for resale. They also recovered the dropped bag, which contained a rocklike substance similar to

crack cocaine. Deputies then asked Williams if he had anything illegal in his vehicle. According to the arrest report, Williams said he had a scale in the trunk for weighing narcotics. He told a deputy to open the trunk and retrieve it. He also told deputies they could search the rest of the vehicle. Tucked inside a cigar package in the glove box, a deputy found three small bags of suspected cocaine, which Williams said were his.

The vehicle was then impounded and Williams, 24, of Sneads, was placed under arrest. He is charged with resisting an officer, cocaine possession, marijuana possession, and drug equipment possession. His bond was set at \$45,250.

The next night, June 18, when SRT deputies appeared at a Morgan Avenue home to issue a search warrant, suspect **Brian L. Cherry** greeted law enforcement at the front door. According to the GCSO arrest report, after being read the search warrant, the deputies told Cherry to tell them if anything illegal was in the residence.

Cherry said he was unaware of anything illegal — and the search began. According to the re-

class consists of two sessions on a bi-monthly basis for a total of four to five hours. Both sessions are required and must be attended on consecutive evenings in order to complete the class. The classes will be at the William A. "Bill" McGill Library.

3. Theft Class: Theft classes are for petty theft, retail theft, or can be court-ordered as the courts see fit. The class consists of two sessions held on a bi-monthly basis for a total of four to five hours. Both sessions are required and must be attended on consecutive evenings in order to complete the class. The classes will be at the William A. "Bill" McGill Library. The class holds offenders accountable for their actions by looking at why the crime was committed and how to prevent it from happening again. The fee is currently \$65.

4. Vehicle Impoundment: Under Florida Statute Section 316.193 (6)(d), after a DUI conviction the court is required to issue an order for the immobilization or impoundment of a vehicle. Vehicle impoundment can be court ordered for 10, 30 or 90 days. The cost of the impoundment is \$10 per day. The vehicle cannot be impounded while a person is in jail or due to specific situations outlined in the Florida Statutes and must occur concurrently with the driver's license revocation imposed.

5. Victim Impact Panel: The Victim Impact Panel is a quarterly class that began Feb. 20. Law enforcement personnel, EMS, Victims Advocate personnel (from the state attorney's office), victims or family members of victims, and videos are used to educate those in attendance on the impact DUI crimes can have on victims. Individuals with DUI charges are court-ordered to take this course. It is an educational class that encourages feedback. Spanish translation is available. The

cost is \$20 for one class, which lasts approximately two hours. The meeting is at the William A. "Bill" McGill Library.

6. Gadsden County Work Program: The Gadsden County Work Program is a joint effort between Gadsden County Probation Division and Gadsden County Public Works for individuals who are court-ordered to perform Work Program days or hours. There is a \$20 fee up front for this program. All men are sent to Public Works and women are sent to the Gadsden County Building Department or Emergency Medical Services.

This program helps relieve overcrowding at the jail. Offenders are ordered to the County Work Program in lieu of serving jail time. However, if the probationer does not successfully complete the Work Program, they will be required to serve a jail sentence.
