County OKs FHP test track plan

Commission approves project, with conditions, by 4-1 vote

Florida Highway Patrol's plan to build a high-speed test track in Gadsden County has the white flag from Gadsden County Commissioners.

During the June 5 commission meeting, a 4-1 vote in a pair of back-to-back quasi-judicial public hearings, commissioners granted a special exception use for the project and approved gave the go-ahead for the conceptual and

preliminary site plan over the objection of a developer who wants to build homes close to the proposed track site. Commissioner Gene Morgan cast the dissenting vote.

"I just don't feel that this is the best spot for this particu-

lar track," he said.

The track will be built on a 109-acre portion of an 833-acre tract south of the Tallahassee Community College's Florida Public Safety Institute campus and about 4 miles east of Quincy. TCC

owns the property. The county's Future Land Use Map designates the property as "Public/Institutional," and Jill Jeglie, a principal planner in the county's planning department, said the project would not require a land use change subject to a Comprehensive Plan amendment, See TRACK/Page 7

Truck fire blocks traffic on I-10

Florida Highway Patrol responded at 5:27 p.m. Friday, June 8, to a report of a tractor-trailer on fire near mile marker 179 on Interstate 10 in Gadsden County.

According to an FHP report, the truck driver, Jacinto Hernandez Perez, 53, of West Palm Beach, had separated the trailer, which was fully engulfed, from the cab of the 2008 Volvo.

Westbound lanes of I-10 were shut down for over an hour as firefighters responded from Quincy Fire Department, Wetumpka Volunteer Fire Department, Gretna Fire Department and Sycamore Volunteer Fire Department. Firefighters extinguished the fire and one lane reopened as FDOT and tow personnel cleaned up the roadway.

Authorities believe a blown tire started the fire. The truck was carrying food supplies and miscellaneous household goods. No one was injured.

Want a walking tour of Quincy?

There's an app for that

Quincy Main Street Inc. has announced the launch of the updated Historic Quincy Walking Tour and audio app for Apple and Android phones and devices. The "talking" tour allows visitors to listen to professional audio narrations as they stroll the historic district and approach each location in the 36-block National Register Historic District covering the entire downtown and surrounding area. The tour includes information about the architectural style and history of each site, along with interesting stories about the builders and early occupants.

The tour is separated into three districts containing 71 individual "stops": the downtown commercial district, the Eastern residential district and Historic Eastern Cemetery, and the Western residential district and historic Western Cemetery. For a hands-free experience, the user has the option of selecting GPS triggers in the settings so the audio plays automatically as the listeners approach each "stop." The app also includes images, GPS points, text, and dynamic interactive maps.

In 2017, Quincy Main Street received grant funding from the state's Division of Historical Resources to produce the audio tour, update printed walking tour booklets and research, design and print brochures on the history of

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Former Gadsden property appraiser succumbs to cancer

George Bernard Hamilton, 76, of Quincy, died at home May 21, 2018, after a brief battle with cancer.

He spent a total of 44 years at the Gadsden County Property Appraisers office, first as an employee fresh out of high school and then leading the office after he was elected, unopposed, in 1980. He replaced Devane Mason as property appraiser after Mason retired.

In his first run with an opponent in 1984, a Gadsden County Times article states, "Hamilton Wins in a Landslide." In a typical Hamilton response to the victory, George was unavailable for comment after the election and was out of the office for a couple of days to relax, the article said.

He continued to win elections until he retired in 2004, having served for 24 years as the county's property appraiser.

Current tax collector Dale Summerford, who served in the same building with George, said he was a good friend to him all those years they worked together in the same building.

They met nearly every day over a cup of coffee, Summerford said.

"George was a great help to me when I first came into this office," Summerford added.

After he retired, George took advantage of his free time. When he wasn't helping his wife, Jo Ann, with her sewing projects, he loved to play golf. He was an official member of the ROMEO Club, (Retired Old Men Eating Out) and missed very few occasions to sit with his friends and talk about the old days and tell an occasional story.

George will be missed by those who knew him, and his wit and quick anecdotes will be remembered for a long time.

His friend Wilson Hinson summed it up best about his life when he said, "George was certainly one-of-a-kind."

According to information in his obituary, George was born in Moultrie, Ga., and moved to Quincy in 1949. He was a 1960 graduate of Quincy High School.

He played the position of left guard on the 1957, '58, and '59 Fighting Tiger Football Team under head coach Carlos Deason and assistant coach Jack McMillian.

After his father's death in 1956, George did everything he could to help support himself

and his mother.

While in high school, he pumped gas at Redmon's Store and worked in tobacco for Ben Duncan Sr.

George graduated from high school on a Friday and started working for the Gadsden County Property Appraiser the following Monday.

George had various hobbies and was one of the founding members of The Wetumpka Volunteer Fire Department, where he served as vice president for more than 20 years.

He loved bream fishing and also enjoyed the game of golf. No matter where he was or what he was doing, George would have the group laughing! He was a wonderful man who was never at a loss for words and had a keen sense of humor.

He married his clone in the creation of laughter, Jo Ann (Doss) Hamilton.

George will be missed by his family and many friends.

Survivors include one brother, Jim Hamilton (Becky) of Orlando, and their three children, Brady Hamilton, Denny Hamilton, and daughter, Tina (Hamilton) Legg. George is also survived by his and Jo Ann's dedicated friend and caregiver, Donna (Akins) Hosey and her wonderful helpers, Carolyn Covington and Jody Houck.

Countless friends and neighbors helped provide assistance and support to George in his time of need and were loyal until the end of his life.

He was preceded in death by his father, James Brady Hamilton; his mother, Ocie Eudora (Kennedy) Hamilton; his beloved wife, Jo Ann (Doss) Hamilton; his Doss family in-laws: William Denver and Frances Clay Doss; and their son, Denver Clayton Doss, all of Gadsden County.

Graveside services were held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, June 12, at Hillcrest Cemetery in Quincy with the Rev. Chris Erde officiating.

A reception for George's friends and family followed the service in the Fellowship Hall of First Presbyterian Church in Quincy.

Groundbreaking marks start of park expansion

Members of the Gadsden County community gathered Thursday, June 7, in Pat Thomas Park on Lake Talquin to celebrate the beginning of the expansion of the park and to officially break ground on the project.

A popular attraction in Gadsden County, the park has had to frequently turn away visitors who want to stay along the lake because of the lack of RV parking. This new expansion addresses that problem, while also promoting tourism.

Hoping to appeal to families and students in the surrounding counties, the expansion of the Pat Thomas Park seeks to

make the park a primary destination among tourists, which is already a recreational mainstay for the Gadsden County community, whether it's a family having a picnic and enjoying the playground or a solo angler hoping to snag a small catch of fish before dark.

A few of the frequent patrons of the park spoke during the groundbreaking about memories they had made at the park over the years, praising county staff for their hard work and dedication to the park and its visitors. They also expressed excitement about the expansion and the possibility of more people discovering this hidden gem in Gadsden County.

The expansion will cost \$50,000 to complete and will

add 13 additional acres to the property, allowing for more RV parking and more visitors to the park. The expansion was organized in a matter of four weeks. When the expansion is complete, it is estimated that the park will draw in more than \$30,000 in revenue.

The groundbreaking marks the beginning of a potential two-part expansion of the park. The first part of the expansion adds more RV parking in order to accommodate more visitors. The park is at 949 Hopkins Landing Road, Quincy. Amenities include RV and tent camping, a playground, restrooms, a picnic pavilion and boat ramp.

REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or about July 3, 2018 the Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners will submit a request to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) for the release of Community Development Block Grant funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development (HCD) Act of 1974, as amended, to undertake a project funded by the Florida Small Cities Community Development Block Grant program in the amount of \$750,000, plus \$50,000 in non-HUD local funds to be contributed by Gadsden County. The project is for multiple years, including 2018, 2019, and 2020 and will include the rehabilitation and/or demolition and replacement of housing occupied by very low, low, and moderate income persons. Project activities will also include temporary relocation and grant administration. All project activities will take place within the unincorporated area of Gadsden County.

Gadsden County has determined that the activities proposed in the Unspecified Site Strategy are categorically excluded under HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58 from the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) requirements. As eligible sites are located, a site specific checklist will be completed prior to the commitment of funds for each unit. Additional project information for review and/or copying is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at the Edward J. Butler Governmental Complex located at 9-B East Jefferson Street, Quincy, Florida 32353.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the Environmental Review Record (ERR) to Sonya Burns, Housing Program Coordinator at P.O. Box 1799, Quincy, Florida 32353. Additional project information is contained in the ERR on file at the Edward J. Butler Governmental Complex located at 9-B East Jefferson Street, Quincy, Florida 32353 and may be examined or copied weekdays 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. All comments must be received by July 2, 2018. Comments will be considered prior to Gadsden County requesting a release of funds.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

Gadsden County certifies to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity and HUD that Brenda Holt in her capacity as Chairperson of the Gadsden County Board of County Commissioners, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The State's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows Gadsden County to use the CDBG funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS

DEO will accept objections to its release of funds and Gadsden County's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of Gadsden County; (b) Gadsden County omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the County committed funds or incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by the State; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures at 24 CFR Part 58, Sec. 58.76 and shall be addressed to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, CDBG Program, MSC-400, 107 East Madison Street, Tallahassee, FL 32399-6508. 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FHP: Driver flees trooper, crashes into two cars

FHP patrol vehicle damaged in incident

A Florida Highway Patrol Trooper patrolling U.S. 27 south near Rich Bay Road at 2:20 p.m. Friday, June 10, spotted a gray Mazda 3 traveling northbound at 87 miles per hour in a 55 mph zone while weaving in

and out of traffic and making erratic lane changes around other vehicles.

The trooper attempted to conduct a traffic stop but, according to an FHP report, the Mazda increased speed and continued driving recklessly. The Mazda at-

tempted to turn right onto 4th Street Southwest as a 2007 black Ford Crown Victoria driven by 36-year-old Kenneth Macon of Havana approached the stop sign on 4th Street Southwest. The Mazda failed to stay in its lane while making the turn,


colliding with the front of the other car at an angle.

The Mazda continued to travel on the east shoulder after the crash. As the Mazda attempted to regain control and enter the roadway, the right rear of the Mazda collided with the front left push bumper of the FHP Trooper's patrol vehicle. The vehicle

continued south on 4th Street Southwest and turned left into a private driveway, continuing east and cutting through a dirt path into the woods, and then turning left onto 3rd Street Southwest. The Mazda continued north, turning right onto 16th Avenue West, heading east. The vehicle attempted to turn left into the park-

ing lot of the Havana Heights Apartments and failed to negotiate the turn. The front of the Mazda ran into a ditch, a concrete traffic pillar and traffic sign post. The driver fled the scene on foot and scaled the apartment fence. The investigation is ongoing and Macon was not injured, according to the FHP report.

In praise of dads and granddads

In celebration of Father's Day, I'm sharing this profile of three dads whose lives span over a century: my father, Chaim; my younger son, Josh; and an iconic Florida political leader.

The teenage Russian immigrant

Born on a frigid morning in February 1891 in a shtetl within the Byelo-Russia region of Eastern Europe, Chaim Tevya Levine was from his earliest years a valiant over-achiever. The life of an impoverished family in this desolate expanse of land, dotted with scores of small villages, required making the best of bad situations. The winters were harsh, the land was under-productive, and the children were uneducated in all but the basics of survival - sprinkled with a bit of religious seasoning.

Chaim learned work ethic as a boy, helping with his father Yakov's leather works, stitching together scraps of tanned hide cuttings to make shoe and boot components for the village shoemaker. His parents were illiterate, but he learned to read and write Yiddish and pray in Hebrew with the help of an older tutor who also led religious services on holidays. Later in life, Chaim would become fluent in six languages, rooted in his hunger for understanding history and business practices.

The shtetles were self-sufficient enclaves, populated primarily by Jewish families who were banned from living in cities by edict of the tsarist monarchy. They were forced to scratch out a life of subsistence, eating root vegetables (beets, potatoes and turnips), with occasional meager portions of chicken or beef. The play "Fiddler on the Roof," based on the short stories of Sholem Aleichem, tells the tale of that time, place and people. As Tevya the milkman opined, "While it's no sin to be poor, it's no great blessing either."

In 1905, the foment of revolt against the tsarist rule of Nicholas II included an assassination attempt. A bomb was thrown at the royal sleigh in Moscow, and while no member of the royal family was injured, the tsar turned his anger into action. By decree, he blamed the residents of the vast countryside as the guilty inciters of revolt. He ordered his Cossack Army to raid the villages, burn the shacks and buildings, murder the men and boys and

have license to rape and kill the women and girls. These pogroms were frequent and fierce over a period of years, forcing the populations of the shtetles to choose either passive acceptance of destruction and death or exile.

Many stayed to meet their demise, but hundreds of thousands

packed their burlap sacks and escaped to the West. Chaim and his friend Benny, both age 15, left for their trek through Poland to earn enough money to board a ship for America, arriving in November 1908, at Ellis Island, sailing in under the boldly beautiful majesty of Lady Liberty.

Chaim started an embroidery business in 1914, ran it for some 30 years and was involved in many social causes including supporting the Freedom Riders' quest for voter rights. He became blind at age 55, and five years later I was born.

My home tasks as a child and young teenager included helping my father, reading to him and leading him in unfamiliar places. He lived to age 85, fulfilling his wish to have me become a teacher. I realized many decades after his death that my father's blindness was a gift to me, providing me the opportunity to hone my reading, writing and speaking skills, leading to a 40-plus year career in advocacy.

This story of this one teenage boy is duplicated by the tens of millions of refugees, oppressed people from all continents, whose dream for safety and a sustaining life is one of the most compelling hallmarks of our nation and its generations of immigrant Americans. Many African-Americans, while their ancestors' enslavement was one of the great societal crimes in our collective national history, today work diligently to gain the freedoms and share the promise of equality. This nation's strength is in our diversity, but our power is in our unity.

An at-risk baby becomes a dad

The circumstances of the day of birth for our younger son, Josh, was less than ideal. We almost lost him. While Charlotte's pregnancy was full-term, the hours before delivery sparked a crisis as the baby was choking in utero due to ingestion of meconium.

Thanks to excellent medical diagnostics, precise C-section surgical action by a skilled obstetrician, and phenomenal

The team to beat was the Vampires, and believe me when I say that was next to impossible to do.



Tools, well-rounded education

What does a well-rounded education mean? I was pondering this question after spending many hours up on a roof trying to deal with a leak. (Successfully, I might add.)

Where did this skill come from? Equal parts research, consultation and experience. And I can tell you right now that without the experience of working various stages of construction, much of the research and consultation would have been a lot less helpful. So, where is a child going to get this badly needed experience, and what is the purpose of going to school in the first place?

These questions get to be more and more relevant as the nature of the modern school evolves. Electronic devices are becoming ever more prevalent and are changing the very nature of our society and how human beings react and interact with each other. By definition, they are also changing the school experience, with more and more time spent on some kind of electronic device and less and less time spent interacting with the real world.

I believe that schools should be set up to deliver the proverbial "well-rounded" education, and that should include teaching a child to function well interacting with the real, physical world. The school is the perfect place to give children a variety of experiences they might not otherwise have, and the experience of learning how to use tools

properly is as valuable a set of information in its own way as many other things learned in school. Geography and history are valuable and fascinating courses, but in staring at a leaky roof, geography is good for wishing you were in Bermuda and history makes you long for the pre-leak era.

Many, many practical problems faced by adults have to do with cars and houses, which include mechanics, carpentry, plumbing, painting, masonry, etc., including - yes - electronics and the practical application thereof, such as rewiring your ceiling fan.

Every child in school, from the earliest ages, male or female, should be exposed to the use of hammers, screw drivers, pliers, wrenches, ratchet wrenches, paint brushes, sand paper, wire cutters, saws, shovels, crimping tools, pry bars, trowels, electric wires, levels, plumb bobs, drills, screws, nuts, bolts, nails, wedges, clamps and anything else that would be found in grandpa's tool shed because grandpa, metaphorically speaking, is not going to be around forever and those of the younger generation have got to learn how to take of themselves, instead of growing up to be helpless in the face of many common, real-world problems.

This is what school is for. This is exactly what school is for: to train children to be capable adults. And the training children with the proper use

and purpose for tools and giving them the hands-on experience they will need in the future is blindingly easy - because they want to! Children are built for hands-on stuff. They crave to do things with their hands and bodies - it is sitting at a desk or in front of a computer for hours on end that is unnatural, that is in fact the birthplace for a lot of so-called behavior problems. Give a young child the choice between doing 100 math problems in preparation for the math test or tinkering with the broken air conditioner with the janitor, which one is the child going to choose? My personal suggestion is: Don't stand too close to the air-conditioner if you don't like mobs. And this is definitely not gender specific stuff - little Suzie has probably run over Kendrick, Julio and Steve to get there.

A well supervised, age-appropriate curriculum for giving children the exposure, experience and practice in building and repairing, learning about dozens of tools in the process will give a child a huge boost toward being a successful adult, including those who wish to become astronauts, chemists or financial wizards. Children working with their hands will pay off in other classes, for starters they should be able to sit still and focus better. The self-confidence alone generated in a child is worth the price of admission.

The care he was afforded was the best available, resulting in a clean bill of health paid for by valued medical insurance.

Josh resides in Washington, D.C., married to Natalie and about to celebrate his first Father's Day as dad to sweet Julianne, now six months old, a beautiful and a totally curious creature.

Charlotte and I are thrilled to watch our baby embrace fatherhood with passion and powerful dedication to the task. We have observed that he has taken every opportunity to be an involved and playful dad and helpmate to Natalie, keeping life balance of caring for himself so he can take good care of his family.

When we think of what young families need most, the appropriate sacrifice of self by caregivers for the benefit of their children comes to mind. That's a definition of dedicated parenting and is the formula for a successful family life, as long as the basics are taken care of - economically and emotionally.

So many young families struggle to provide the essentials of quality time and adequate financial support, leading to challenges, which can be the seeds of problem behaviors that heighten risk to family wellbeing.

On Father's Day, I'm reminded how vital the role of positive males can be in the lives of children. Taking their responsibilities seriously is an obligation of fatherhood, but in some situations, surrogate dads need to pitch in.

Either extended family members or others who are willing and able to be involved in the lives of children

can be transformational. I'm aware of the challenges, but I try to share the opportunity to be significant in the lives of children at a time when many frightening influences surround too many young people and reduce the likelihood for their success.

You can see we're brimming with pride that Josh is embracing his role as a dad with joyous and graceful exuberance.

The grandfather governor's leadership

Readers of my 4Gen essays are well aware that Pop Pop Jack is taking this "grandfather thing" in good stride. I hope I'm not considered too boring when I go on about the love and life-changing joy I feel in thinking about the growth and developmental progress of sweet Julianne.

Now at six months, her sensational smiles and adorable attitude surpasses all I imagined.

Oh, I know how haughty that sounds, but as the late great Lawton Chiles used to say, "Tis a sorry frog who can't croak loud in his own home pond."

The esteemed three-term U.S. Senator who was twice elected Florida Governor was as grandfatherly a leader who ever walked our state - and walking was his favorite campaigning style!

Born in the Great Depression's first year of 1930, the Lakeland native, son of a railroad conductor, became one of our most beloved public servants.

Lawton Chiles took on conventional politics by limiting campaign contributions to \$10 per person (later raised to \$100 in his 1990 gubernatorial run) as a symbol of his aversion to politicians being considered bought by wealthy special interests to the detriment of "regular working folks."

It was not just traditional partisan politics that he scorned, but his policy agenda staked new ground in advocating for prevention of problems before they became too expensive to afford a fix. "Investing in success is a lot smarter and cheaper than paying for failure" was one of his major themes.

As the grandfather of an under-weight preemie, Lawton IV, who survived and thrived, Chiles' advocacy of prenatal and infant health care sparked the creation of the Healthy Start network of community-based coalitions, resulting in a one-third reduction in infant mortality.

His abhorrence of the pervasive marketing of tobacco to teenagers led to the successful Truth Campaign, taking to task the flood of cigarette advertising aimed at youth.

In addition, he assembled a Dream Team of litigating attorneys to sue the tobacco industry and reclaim the costs of the diseases caused by smoking.

Yet one additional priority of our Grandfather Governor was to create a greater emphasis of the importance of the younger years of a child's educational future.

By expanding access to quality preschool, improving screenings for early detection of sensory and developmental challenges, and providing parental education to prevent child maltreatment through voluntary home visiting all became hallmarks of the Chiles Children's agenda.

While the Governor died suddenly at age 68, just weeks before completing his second term in December 1998, many of the seeds of success sown under his leadership have proven to be fruitful for the two decades since his passing and doubtlessly for decades to come.

It is the voices of our wise elders who can make a powerful difference in the lives of our children. We need to focus the attention and action of my fellow grandparents representing the diversity of gender, ethnicity, race, economic class, and political leanings to unite in the cause of advocacy for a new generation of healthy babies, educated children and productive youth.

My newfound feelings of love and devotion for our granddaughter is motivating me as never before to intensify the advocacy we need across the generations to leave a legacy worthy of our best and most beneficent selves.

Congress OKs renaming Tallahassee VA Clinic

Change would honor Sgt. Ernest 'Boots' Thomas

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congress approved legislation late last Thursday to rename the U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs Health Care Center, located at 2181 Orange Ave., Tallahassee, in honor of Marine Corps Sgt. Ernest "Boots" Thomas.

The legislation — introduced by U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson

(D-FL) and Rep. Al Lawson (D-FL) — was approved unanimously by the U.S. House of Representatives on Thursday. The bill, which the Senate approved back in February, now heads to the president's desk to be signed into law.

"Sgt. Thomas is an American hero," Nelson said when he introduced the bill. "I can think of no more fitting tribute

to his extraordinary service to our country than the renaming of this VA clinic in his honor."

"Sgt. Ernest 'Boots' Thomas exemplified selflessness and courage throughout his service, and I am proud to honor his legacy with the renaming of the VA clinic," Lawson said. "My hope is that future generations will see the name of

our local hero and recognize the sacrifices he made in defense of our nation's freedoms."

Thomas, a Florida native, was posthumously presented the Navy Cross for his extraordinary heroism during action in World War II and was part of the original American flag raising atop Iwo Jima's Mount Suribachi in 1945. He first joined the Marines in 1942, shortly after the U.S. was attacked at Pearl Harbor.

He was killed in action on March 3, 1945, just days after the now-famous flag raising on Iwo Jima. Thomas, who was born in Tampa before moving with his family to Monticello at the age of eight, was a graduate of Monticello High School in 1941. An image taken shortly after the second flag raising on Iwo Jima was used as the inspiration for the U.S. Marine Corps War Memorial that now overlooks the nation's capital in Arlington, Va.

and the land use map designation would also remain the same.

The special exception use was necessary because, according to land use code quoted in background material for the meeting agenda, the project was considered to be a use that, while not prohibited in the Future Land Use Category, might not be generally appropriate without special criteria and standards for location and operation.

Before approving the special exception use, commissioners added re-

quirements aimed at making the track a better fit for surrounding neighbors. The result was a set of conditions that had already been agreed upon in part by FHP and adjacent property owners after commissioners continued deliberation from the May 1 meeting to allow the applicant and neighbors time to reach an agreement.

Commissioner Anthony "Dr. V" Viegbesie said, "I was actually hoping that when this particular item was continued, that the parties involved would want to work towards becoming good neighbors for the good of Gadsden County."

Commissioner Sherrie

Taylor expressed a similar opinion, saying, "I am in favor of seeing this track developed, but I also am concerned about the residences that may be back there at some time in the future because I wouldn't want all this in the backyard myself, either."

She said commissioners could set some conditions and then move forward with the project.

Commission Chair Brenda Holt said she wanted the plan to move forward.

"I am in favor of this project," she said. The conditions added by commissioners include restrictions to hours of operation, no external

lighting except for restrooms, sirens only used during hours of operation, and FHP will install and maintain a vegetative hedge along the berm, which will be built along the eastern perimeter of the track as a buffer.

During the quasi-judicial public hearing before commissioners voted on the conceptual and preliminary site plan, attorney Doug Hall told commissioners that adjacent property owners are concerned that their property will not be able to be developed with the track there.

"You wouldn't want to live next to this," he said. "I wouldn't. No one else would."

HOME ON THE RANGE

Loading and a sore thumb

Whether you just purchased your first handgun, or whether it's your steenth one to go in your filled gun safe, there's something special about opening that brand new case.

You cut the tape and open the box. Your gun might have a plastic or cardboard case, but it's nested in foam and is, oh, so new!

First, of course, you read that manual that sits on top of the gun. Then you take what you learn from reading and field strip it. You use your solvents and clean out any packing goop. Then you grease as indicated in the manual. Not too much — too much collects dirt and shooting debris.

Put it back together and jack the slide a few times to make sure the grease is well spread.

Then, put it into a carrier and it's off to the range.

Women come to the Wakulla County Sheriff's Office range usually on Wednesday mornings. They come other days, too, but this is a special morning when women practice safe shooting skills and share what they know with friends and those new to shooting.

When the range is "hot" and nobody is down range putting up targets, we take our handguns in their pouches and put them on the shooting bench. The shooting bench is really like a counter-height table. We take the guns out of their carriers and begin to fill magazines.

Filling those magazines is a breeze. If you have a 9-, 40- or 45-caliber handgun, you take the mag and hold it on the bench so the open top is facing up as you're looking down.

One side of this opening is lower than the other. From the wide side, you press a round with its brass head sliding downward toward that narrower side with your thumb.

Piece o' cake.

You might think your thumb is pressing fairly hard, but it's not. Just wait until you have to put in a second, third and fourth bullet. And then fill up the rest of the magazine.

That first round going

in is really easy compared to the rest. As you push the next rounds in, the magazine spring gets more and more compressed, which means you have to press harder and harder with each subsequent round.

Pretty soon, your thumb is complaining big time. Especially if you are, well, sort of mature. Joints just don't seem to get sturdier as we celebrate more birthdays.

This is a real problem. If you're at the range to become proficient with your new gun, you'll probably want to shoot several magazine loads. How will you do that when the tip of your thumb is sore and the two joints are getting stiff and red?

This is where the UpLula or the Maglula comes in handy. It helps you load your magazine

Oh, sure, you got a loader with your gun. But it's not the same thing at all. I haven't met many people who like or use those loaders.

But the UpLula, well, this is something different altogether. Put the base of the magazine on the shooting bench. Slide the UpLula over the top of the magazine with the lock (pictured on the top of the UpLula) over the narrow portion of the mag's opening.

Grab and squeeze the UpLula. Now, press down. The projection on the UpLula will push down on that mag's spring. Now you drop in a round over that projectile of the Lula, brass-casing side first.

Open the hand holding the Lula, and the Lula springs open, leaving the round in the mag. Presto! And the second time you perform this, it's still pretty easy. You could probably do this all day.

Easy loading means you'll fill more magazines. More filled mags means more practice. More practice means you'll shoot better, and you'll learn how to handle your new gun.

In fact, it may be the perfect chance to teach your old man a thing or two with these tips from Omaha Steaks Executive Chef Grant Hon.



Choose Your Protein

Selecting quality protein is the starting place for an exceptional grilled meal. For example, the ribeye is the most well-marbled steak, meaning it's super juicy, rich with beefy flavor and excellent on the grill.

Prepare the Grill

Always start with clean grill grates. Heat your gas grill to high or start your charcoal 10-15 minutes before you grill. Dip a paper towel in oil using tongs and oil your grill grates before adding steaks for a great sear.

Prepare the Meat

Pat steaks dry with a clean paper towel and season them before they

hit the grill. You can't go wrong with simple sea salt and cracked pepper, but creative recipes like this Dukkah Rub can add a special twist.

Sear and Crust

Cook steaks directly over your heat source to get a tasty, crunchy sear on the outside of the steak. This is where the best flavor comes from, and it offers a delicious contrast to the rich, juicy inside of the cut.

Control Your Cook

Keep the grill cover closed as much as possible to maintain a

temperature of around 450 F. This helps lock in flavor and prevent flare-ups. Remember the marbling on a ribeye means more fat, which melts during cooking. This is a good thing, but you may experience more dripping or flare-ups if you're used to grilling leaner steaks.

To minimize the need to open the grill cover, determine the amount of time you'll need to reach your desired doneness then use the 60-40 grilling method. Grill 60 percent on the first side then 40 percent after you turn the steak over for an even cook.

Let it Rest

UF experts provide facts, tips for National Dairy Month

GAINESVILLE — “Milk Does a Body Good” is not just an advertising slogan. It’s a way to get people to drink the dairy product, because it offers so many nutrients, says a University of Florida expert. But first, cows must produce milk.

Some UF Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences experts tout the benefits of dairy in the daily diet, while other UF/IFAS researchers help ensure cattle produce ample dairy to fill consumers’ needs.

Milk and other dairy foods are loaded with calcium and vitamin D as well as protein and other essential nutrients such as phosphorus, potassium, magnesium and vitamins A, B12, and riboflavin, said Nan Jensen, a family and consumer sciences agent for UF/IFAS Extension Pinellas County.

“These nutrients help keep us healthy,” Jensen said. “Calcium builds and maintains strong bones and teeth and helps reduce the risk of fractures and osteoporosis later in life. Phosphorus and vitamin D partner with calcium to keep bones strong as well.”

Dairy products provide these additional benefits, according to Jensen:

- Calcium combined with potassium and magnesium play an important role in maintaining normal blood pressure.
- Milk nutrients can help maintain weight. Studies show that people who consume calcium and dairy products weigh less or have less

body fat than those who don’t.

- Cultured dairy products like kefir and yogurt provide “friendly bacteria” that help promote a healthy gut.

- Dairy nutrients provide a source of protein to build and maintain lean muscle.

Those who can’t tolerate dairy or don’t like it can choose from an array of non-dairy choices, including soy, almond, rice, hemp and oat milk, Jensen said. She suggests consumers read the ingredient list and nutrition facts label to compare these and other non-dairy alternatives.

Consumers can enjoy dairy products only if cows are producing them.

Some UF/IFAS animal scientists help ensure dairy products get to the grocery store. For example, Jimena Laporta, an assistant professor of animal sciences, studies mammary glands and lactation, primarily in dairy cows. Heat provides the cows’ biggest obstacle to milk production.

“Even though dairy cows are very good at producing large amounts of milk, there are some challenges the industry faces that compromise the efficiency and sustainability of milk production,” Laporta said. “One of my research areas is tackling the substantial decline in milk production associated with environmental heat stress.”

“So, while consumers and producers celebrate National Dairy Month, we are looking at the beginning of Florida’s summer and the start our heat-stress research season,” Laporta said.

Dairy cows that get too hot during the summer eat less and produce less milk, she said. If they get too hot and they’re pregnant, their offspring weigh less and are more likely to get sick and leave the herd prematurely, Laporta said. Those factors can cause substantial economic losses for dairy farmers, she said.

Working with her colleagues in animal sciences, Laporta develops strategies to combat dairy cattle heat stress. For instance, they cool cattle with fans and soakers at strategic times during the lactation cycle to overcome negative impacts of heat stress on current and future generations.

“Our research goals are to enable dairy cattle to produce higher quantity and quality milk, despite rising temperatures,” Laporta said. “That way, we fulfill our role in feeding the world’s growing population while promoting dairy farm sustainability.”
