



School board OKs deal with contractor

Rensselaerville Institute could take over high school

Last month, the Gadsden County School Board voted to accept a three-year external operator agreement with Rensselaerville Institute — a school turnaround organization that would be tasked with managing the high school on behalf of

the district if the school does not receive a “C” or higher letter grade from Florida’s department of education when school grades are released.

Florida Department of Education requires a public school that does not improve to a C or higher after two years to be turned over to a charter organization or exter-

nal operation by the school district. That organization will take over full operation of the school.

School board members decided to contract Rensselaerville Institute as an external operation. The school would still be run according to school board policy, and decisions regarding the school would

be made jointly between the organization and the school district.

Rensselaerville Institute would be responsible for running the school administration and developing the academic portion of school operations. They would also provide leadership and professional development training to teachers and staff.

School district officials have consulted with this organization during the course of this school year and feel this is the best model for the high school. The organization has had a successful turnaround rate in other states with schools similar in education level and demographics to Gadsden County High.

“We are hoping that they will institute changes in our school

that we can continue,” said School Board Chair Steve Scott.

At the end of the three-year agreement, the school district would have the option to continue the partnership for two more years based on the increase in student performance. Last year, the school received a “D” letter grade.

School grades for this year are scheduled to be released in July.

Unemployment rates show small decline

According to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, the regional unemployment rate for Gadsden, Leon, and Wakulla counties was 3.2 percent for May 2018.

Gadsden County's rate of 4.3 percent was the highest in the three-county Capital Region, though it was 1.1 percent lower than it was for the same month in 2017, according to Federal Reserve Economic Data (FRED) information available online at fred.stlouisfed.org/series/FL-GADS9URN/.

The lowest rate in the region was Wakulla County's, at 2.9 percent, followed by Leon County at 3.1 percent.

Working four weeks to put on a show from start to finish has to be hard to beat.



Homeless youth have advocates in Havana

Officials say services available

Eric Hinson wants Gadsden County's homeless children and their families to make use of all the services available to them.

That's why his wife, Tammy Hinson, spoke to members of the Havana Town Council at the June 12 meeting.

She discussed the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act and the Gadsden County School District's efforts in identifying the homeless youth in Havana and providing them with the resources and support necessary to succeed in their public education.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act is aimed at allowing homeless youths to have the opportunity to finish their public education and ultimately receive their high-school diplomas. The program was created to address and correct problems homeless kids face with enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school.

Homeless students are not just defined as youths living out on the streets. Students who will be eligible to take part in all of the opportunities provided by the program are also those living with friends, in motels, or in foster care. The term “homeless” also includes unaccompanied youths living without a guardian, as well as kids whose families lack a fixed residence.

Some of the resources that will be afforded to the eligible children classified as “homeless” include tutoring, transportation, school supplies, birth certificates, immunizations, assistance with rent, clothes, food, and much more.

Eric Hinson, the school district's homeless liaison, told the Times he wants

Quincy commission OKs removing tree

"It is with sadness that I recommend removing this grand old tree," Quincy Police Chief Glenn Sapp said about the tree located at the R. D. Edwards building now being renovated to once again house the Quincy Police Department.

The live oak tree, which is estimated to be more than 150 years old, has many issues, Sapp told Quincy commissioners in last week's meeting.

Because of its poor condition, Sapp said there is a high risk of failure, and the location of the police department building would be the likely target if the tree were to fall.

Once the building is occupied, having the potential threat of the aging tree also increases liability for the city.

An onsite inspection and evaluation of this tree was made by tree expert and forester F. Perry Odom, who is also the Electric Utility Forester for the City of Tallahassee. Odom said it is not a

matter of if but when this tree will split and fall.

"Sadly, Mr. Odom does recommend that this tree be removed," Sapp stated.

There are techniques available such as cabling and bracing, which could possibly prolong the life of this tree. This would involve extensive crown reduction to remove some of the heavy limbs. However, because of the cost involved and liability to the city, Odom did not recommend going forward with the extensive work, which would cost about \$10,000, to try to preserve the tree.

The large tree appears to be one large tree, but Odom explained that it was actually two trees that have grown together and are now starting to split and rot apart.

Two other tree experts have looked at the tree and agreed it would need to be removed, which would cost would be between \$3,500 and \$5,000.

Commissioner Andy Gay said he had planned to try and save the tree, but after about

its problems, he changed his mind.

The issue passed unanimously in a 4-0 vote. Mayor Angela Sapp was absent from the meeting.

In other business, the commission had a stalemate with a 2-2 vote on whether to allow a retiring employee to receive health insurance benefits.

During the discussion it was noted that the city has been inconsistent in applying the 62/10 health insurance provision.

According to the agenda, several employees in the fire department and at least one employee (58 years old) in the utilities department have received health insurance through the city without being either 62 or having 10 years of service.

The individual in question is 56 years-old and has health issues.

Gay and Commissioner Daniel McMillan both asked that the commission set a policy for this issue before going forward with a decision. McMillan said

he would like comments from the city's labor attorney as well.

Commissioner Ronte Harris and Mayor Pro-Tem Keith Dowdell agreed that the individual should receive the insurance. Harris made the

motion to allow the city to provide the insurance and Dowdell seconded the motion, which failed because of the tie.

Dowdell asked the interim city manager, Jack McClean, to put the issue on the next agenda.

The GAL Program works with local abused and neglected children and their families. The GAL Program, a community and volunteer based program, is a network of committed people who join with program staff to give abused and neglected children a voice in the court and community.

"Our program ensures every child in the child welfare system has their own advocate who, along with our staff, fights for them to be safe and have a place to thrive," said GAL Circuit Director Deborah Moore.

Everyday community members change these children's stories by ensuring a child's interest and needs are heard and served. They make sure the child is not

alone and does not get lost in the child welfare system. Whether it is ensuring the child gets the services they need to heal or getting the educational tools they need to succeed or providing support to the families, the GAL child advocates work hard to guarantee that child is taken care of. They work toward happier endings for these children and their families.

Statistics show that compared to children without GAL representation, children who have a GAL advocate are more likely to find a permanent safe home sooner, have a brighter, more successful future and be half as likely to cycle back into the child welfare system.

"I cannot think of a better way to spend my time than to help a child, especially one who is going through a difficult time," said volunteer Lynda Giordano. "They need someone to be there for them."

The program works with every volunteer so they can be an effective and powerful child advocate, giving them the power to change a child's life. Volunteers spend an average of eight to 10 hours per

month speaking up for the children in the court, schools and community.

The GAL program trains volunteers throughout the year. During the training, community members learn how to make a difference in the lives of local children who have been abused or neglected.

The training consists of an independent portion, classroom training and a fieldworks portion where the new volunteers work with a peer mentor. Prior to being accepted into the training, applicants complete the application process and all applicants must pass a background check.

Commissioners honor former Quincy mayor

The Quincy City Commission has named June 6, 2018, as Robert "Don" Chesser Day.

The proclamation presented at the June 12 Quincy Commission describes Chesser as a lifelong resident of Gadsden County. He was married to JoAnne Suber Chesser, and has two sons: Terry Chesser and Joe Chesser. He is the grandfather of Owen Chesser.

Chesser demonstrated outstanding coaching skills with his sons' Murphy Candler Baseball Teams in Atlanta, Ga., for more than 10 years and was dutifully with Atlanta Builders Exchange for 35 years.

Chesser was a member and deacon of First Baptist Church in Quincy, where he served as Chairman of the Deacons.

In addition, he

served on the Quincy City Commission from 1994-2003, and served as mayor when Quincy was named "All American City." He was also instrumental in ensuring the city evolved in technology.

He died Sunday, June 3. He was 83 years old.

The proclamation concluded by saying, "it is a privilege of all residents of the City of Quincy to honor and remember Don Chesser."

Senator offers legislative update

On June 7, Senator Nelson introduced an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act to extend the current moratorium on drilling in the Eastern Gulf of Mexico from 2022 until June 30, 2027. Drilling in the Gulf of Mexico poses many dangers to the Air Force's Eastern Gulf Test and Training Range. The Department of Defense has previously stated its opposition to allowing drilling activities east of the military mission line.

On May 31, Nelson sent a letter to Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke renewing his request for the Secretary to explain the exact meaning of Florida being "off the table" to new offshore oil drilling. The letter highlights recent comments by Secretary Zinke and Governor Rick Scott supporting a 125-mile barrier around Florida, which does not fully protect Florida or the military and would allow oil rigs to drill 110 miles closer to Tampa Bay than currently allowed. In the letter, Nelson asked the Secretary to both clarify and provide specific examples of how the Department of the Interior intends to protect Florida's coast and truly take it "off the table."

Fighting for funding on Caño Martín Peña

On May 31, Nelson was joined by Rubio and three other senators in sending a bipartisan letter to the Army Corps of Engineers and the Office of Management and Budget urging them to provide additional funding to expe-

dite the construction and completion of the Caño Martín Peña Ecosystem Restoration Project in Puerto Rico. After Hurricanes Irma and Maria devastated many parts of Puerto Rico, the one-navigable channel is severely polluted and clogged with debris, posing serious public health threats to nearby communities. The letter comes after Nelson visited the area to get a firsthand look at the Army Corp's ongoing work on the canal.

Providing vets with health care options

On June 7, Nelson introduced his legislation, the FAIR Heroes Act, as an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act. This bill allows military retirees to choose TRICARE health insurance coverage over more costly Medicare Part B options, based on their specific needs.

Ensuring ships remain in Florida

On June 7, Nelson introduced an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act to address the U.S. Navy's practice of repeatedly taking ships out of their homeport for maintenance in alternative locations. Current law requires certain, short-term ship repair and maintenance projects to be performed at a ship's homeport, helping to sustain the area's shipbuilding industrial base and allowing sailors more time at home with their families. Nelson's amendment requires the U.S. Navy to explain why it has repeatedly taken ships out of their home port for work.

Protecting service members from predatory lending

On June 7, Nelson filed an amendment

to the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act to make much-needed improvements to the Military Lending Act. The amendment would reduce the interest rate ceiling to 24 percent

to curb aggressive lending, extend MLA protections to veterans within one year of discharge from the military, and expand MLA applicability to auto loans and other secured loans for personal property.

Medicare gloom not new news

In just eight years, Medicare will no longer be able to fully cover projected medical bills.

That sobering news came from the program's trustees on Tuesday, alongside news that Social Security is still expected to become insolvent in 2034.

Now, that doesn't mean the programs will be kaput in those years — both are funded by payroll taxes, but not at a level high enough to sustain them.

It is a reminder that neither program is particularly healthy, or particularly sustainable at current funding levels — which isn't new news.

For Medicare, what it likely means is that providers like hospitals and nursing homes would only be paid a fraction of the Medicare fees they should receive.

That doesn't mean their costs are going to go down, however, and that debt burden will still exist. Shifting it onto patients isn't a viable solution, or we wouldn't need Medicare in the first place. It also doesn't necessarily mean the program is going to stop those payouts in 2026.

So what is going to happen? There are options, though none are popular, or a silver bullet: Increase the taxes that fund it, increase the amount of means testing in the program, change the age at which citizens qualify for benefits. But because the answer is ultimately up to Congress, we'll probably find out in 2026.

We shouldn't have to wait that long, though, and we're in this position because politicians have long used the program as a political football.

That's unfair to the 60 million or so Americans who make use of the program — a number that will swell as baby boomers live longer lives and gen Xers begin to find their way onto the rolls.

It's also unfair to the generations of Americans who will need to depend on the program as the cost of medical care continues to

outpace the growth of their salaries and retirement savings. Personal responsibility can only account for so many variables, and in America, a diagnosis shouldn't be a death sentence just because you can't afford to pay for treatment out of pocket — a situation many find themselves in even with insurance, as evidenced by the contributory effect medical debt has on personal bankruptcies in this country.

In 2016, the New York Times reported that 20 percent of Americans under 65 who had health insurance had trouble paying their medical bills during the prior year — and of those 63 percent said they used up all or most of their savings to cover medical bills, with 42 percent taking an extra job to help pay those bills.

Another way to think about it: Where would you be without Medicare?

If you don't like the answer, it's time to speak up. Regardless of whether we like it, people are going to have medical episodes and they're going to be expensive.

If we have a reasonable, solvent system in place to help pay for those costs, we can avoid the chaos and cost-shifting that comes when those people delay their care or seek it in sub-optimal ways — say by showing up to a hospital, where they can't be refused treatment, after delaying care until the episode became an emergency.

It's crucial that voters young and old, people who already benefit from Medicare and those who hope to, make it known to their representatives and to those who want to be their representatives — it is an election year — that keeping the program solvent and finding a reasonable way to fund it is of the utmost importance to them.

Unfortunately, we must depend on politicians to fix this problem — but fortunately, we can hold them to account at the ballot box.

That defines a person with dignity and may be the reason we are hearing less and less about it.

Another person who comes to mind whose life was one of dignity was Inez Todd. She was a kind and generous soul whose life was filled with caring for others.

For those of us who knew her, she lived a life of giving although she had faced many obstacles along the way. Few folks could have survived what she had to endure and still be able to have such a sharing heart. It was her faith in God and her Christian beliefs that

made her the kind of dignified person that I admired. She, too, was a teacher and a story I remember about her makes it easy to understand why she was such a person of dignity.

In a one-room schoolhouse in Mt. Pleasant, Inez Todd taught school to a room full of poor students. In those days there were no lunch rooms and kids had to bring lunch with them.

Some of those children didn't have much to eat, so she devised a way to feed them. She managed to get a big pot and told each of the children to bring a handful of beans to school.

She provided the stock for the bean soup and each child dumped a handful of beans into the pot.

Sometimes she said they had held onto the beans so tightly that they would stick to their hands.

Inez Todd never quit giving back to her community and even into her 90s, she would drive to Florida State Hospital, where she would work with those less fortunate than herself.

It is my prayer that we do not lose the word "dignity" to the ages and hear less and less of its use. But I am afraid keeping dignity in our society may become a rare quality to associate with someone's life.

How sad that such a good-looking, strong athlete should become an invalid.

Later he had his own show as Bomba, the Jungle Boy. He was a bomb, the young climbing tree to the very end. He was up in a tree trimming limbs and fell off the ladder and had a heart attack and died. He was 79 years old.

There have been two recent Tarzan films that have been quite good, including 1984's "Greystoke: the Legend of Tar-

zan, Lord of the Apes." There have been a lot of bad movies made about Tarzan by people who just didn't get it, so you have to pick and choose.



RETHINKING EDUCATION Science in the summer stars

One of the main thrills for children on summer vacation is that they get to stay up later at night instead of going to bed at sunset to be ready for school at sunrise.

Parents, this is a perfect opportunity for an incredible amount of learning, and it is simple: Just wait until the night sky is real dark, take the children outside and tell them to look up. You don't even have to say anything, because a child staring at the cosmos laid out in front of him will be awestruck at its beauty and vastness and latent meaning, and the brain will undergo a wildly almost religious/spiritual experience. It happens automatically, and once it happens, just open your mouth and let the teaching begin.

The magic of the night sky is a gift to any child, but is not readily accessible to many. Light pollution is rampant in cities, and there are millions of children who don't get the full effect of seeing the universe on a dark and clear night because it is never truly dark. Parents, make a concerted effort to give your child this experience and travel, if need be, somewhere out in the country and set up shop at night. This is what picnics are for.

The other reason children don't see the night sky is because they are constantly bent over staring at their glowing screens. Looking up is unnatural. In this case, the phone is OK because it has an app on it called "sky map" where you simply aim the phone at the stars and it will identify the constellations, stars and planets. It is way cool. You can even aim the "sky map" at your feet and it will reveal the constellations that appear on the other side of the Earth. Let the games begin!

Before any teaching starts, it is very valuable for the child to just soak in the experience of staring at the cosmos. It sets off a series of internal questions that mankind has been pondering for centuries and the unfathomable vastness of it all puts life on this planet in a very different perspective. The questions will come tumbling out from the child — why, what, how, when, where? — and the

scientific answers a parent can provide doesn't erase the mystery of it all; it just deepens it, because the scientific reality of what is going on just makes us shake our heads in disbelief, and I'm talking adults here.

"The stars are just like our sun — they are huge bright balls of burning gas, which is why you can see them. Planets are like the Earth — they are not burning, so they don't put out their own light, so you can't see them from real far away. The closer ones, just like the moon, can sometimes be seen because the sunlight reflects off of them."

So far, so good. The child can digest this. Now the child should fasten her mental seat-belt. "There are trillions of stars — more than all of the sand on all of the beaches of the Earth." ("What?") Around those stars revolve an unknown number of planets, some of which may have life, depending on the definition of "life." Even bacteria is a life form. "Light travels at 186,282 miles per second, or 670,616,629 miles per hour." ("What?") "The universe is so vast that a new math had to be invented — many of those stars are light years apart." (What?!?!?) "The light you see coming from some stars may have been traveling for millions of years to reach your eye and the star may not even exist anymore." ("WHAT?!?!?!")

As you approach the speed of light, time slows down, so somehow time, space and speed are all interrelated. Einstein called it space-time. ("Dad, have you been drinking?") Space is a vacuum, which is why you can see everything ... There are black holes in different parts of the universe that act as a gigantic cosmic recycling machine..." ("Mom!!") "OK, let's talk some history — Romans and Greeks. See that set of stars there? That is called Orion's Belt. And there is his sword. He was a great hunter slain by Artemis in Greek mythology. Now, when the Chinese considered the stars..."

area agencies and organizations that offer services to homeless children to become more aware of each other and what they have to offer. In order to facilitate this, he said there are regular breakfast meetings intended to bring various groups together to collaborate and become more familiar with area services avail-

able. He said there are about 300 homeless children in the school district.

In order to make services to homeless children a part of the community of Havana, Mrs. Hinson stated that they would need collaborative partners in the community to help with after school activities, tutoring and identifying students who would be eligible to receive assistance from the Homeless Education Act. Mrs. Hinson said Ha-

vana currently does not have the resources available to house the majority of the homeless population in the town. She said most of the homeless residents of Havana are forced to utilize the shelters and programs in Tallahassee as a result of the town's lack of resources.







Popcorn and Peanut Truffles

Yield: About 30 pieces

- 6 cups popped popcorn
- 1 cup roasted and salted peanuts
- 1 package (12 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup honey

In large bowl, stir popcorn and peanuts together; set aside.

In microwave-safe bowl, heat chocolate chips 10 seconds. Stir chips and repeat, stirring after each 10 seconds, until chips are melted. Warm honey in microwave 10 seconds and stir into chocolate until well blended.

Pour chocolate mixture over popcorn mixture and stir until popcorn is evenly coated. With small ice cream scoop, push popcorn mixture into scoop and release onto wax paper to form truffles. Refrigerate until firm.

Note: Truffles can be stored in an airtight container up to 5 days.

Toasted Coconut and Chocolate Popcorn

Yield: 10 cups

- 10 cups popped popcorn
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon coconut extract (optional)
- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil
- 1 bag (7 ounces) shredded coconut, toasted

Place popcorn in large bowl; set aside.

In small saucepan, combine butter, brown sugar and coconut extract; stir until melted and combined.

Pour over popcorn, coating well. Spread popcorn onto large cookie sheet.

In glass measuring cup, melt chocolate chips and vegetable oil in microwave on low heat until smooth. Drizzle over popcorn. Immediately sprinkle coconut over popcorn mixture; cool. Break into pieces and serve.

Yield: 12 cups

- 12 cups popped popcorn
- 1 package (11 ounces) white chocolate chips
- 2 teaspoons coconut oil
- 15 Oreo cookies, coarsely chopped

Place popcorn in large bowl; set aside.

In medium saucepan on low heat, melt chocolate chips and coconut oil; stir until blended.

Pour melted chocolate over popcorn, stirring until well-coated. Stir in chopped Oreos.

Spread mixture on baking sheet and chill until chocolate has set. Break into pieces to serve.

Yield: 8 slices

- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 bag (10.5 ounces) mini marshmallows
- 2 quarts popped popcorn
- 1 tube (.68 ounces) red piping gel
- 1 package red raspberry fruit roll-ups
- green jelly beans
- coconut
- candy-coated chocolate pieces

Spray 12-inch pizza pan with cooking spray; set aside.

In large saucepan over medium heat, heat butter.

Stir in marshmallows until melted.

Stir in popcorn until well coated.

Spread mixture evenly onto prepared pizza pan.

Drizzle red piping gel over "pizza" to make "sauce."

Cut small circles (about 1 1/4 inches in diameter) from fruit roll-up and place on pizza for "pepperoni" slices.

Decorate as desired with jelly beans, coconut and candies.

Allow to cool completely before cutting into wedges to serve.

The program will train individuals interested in digital music and becoming an audio technician or broadcast technician. The coursework covers sound and acoustic theory, music engineering, entrepreneurial business, film production, budgeting, talent management and marketing.

According to Stephen Dumnivant, dean of TCC's Business, Industry and Technology Division, the program will open doors for careers in the music recording, independent film, and multimedia and internet industries, including live events.

"This is a growing field in our area, especially with the expansion of live concerts and events at The Centre of Tallahassee, Cascades Park and the newly renovated Leon County Civic Center," said Dumnivant.

"Whether you are an aspiring musician and want to create your own YouTube channel or interested in a career in independent film, this is a great place to start."

The curriculum includes six courses and a total of 17 credit hours. It will take one year to complete, and classes will be offered in the afternoons, evenings and online to provide flexibility for

working students. Scholarships are available.

The program will be led by TCC faculty member Carlos Miranda, who teaches digital audio, video production, 3D animation and photography. Miranda is an active member of the Tallahassee film community and has worked on both the Tallahassee Film Festival and the Tally Shorts Film Festival and is a successful cinematographer. He holds a master's degree in fine arts from FSU, with a concentration in performance video art.

"This program is a great fit for students who have a background in music performance and want to combine that with recording technology skills," said Miranda. "It's also a great option for individuals who already work in the film or recording industry and want to increase their skills and earning power."

TCC projects the Digital Media and Multimedia Presentation program will produce approximately 75 graduates during its first five years.
