Happenings of Interest at This Institution During Week.

The conversation at the German table in the mess hall has improved noticeably during the past month. The students can now discuss in German almost any subject of conversation that may arise. The presence at the table of Dr. and Mrs. Berger, both of whom are of German descent, of Drs. Benton, Crow and Flinn, all of whom have spent several years in Germany, and of Herr Hess, who has but recently arrived from Stuttgart, has added much to the interest of the students. This German table is proving a valuable adjunct to the Department of Modern Languages.

On Saturday, May 4th, will be held the second of the series of contests being arranged by the committee on athletics. The event will be mainly of a military and aquatic nature. The contestants are practicing earnestly. At the swimming pool may be seen every afternoon a score of men practicing for the diving and swimming matches, and at the target range the crack of the pistol and of the rifle is heard incessantly during the hours freed from college duties. The privates in the corps of cadets are all eager to win a prize in the drilling contests, among which the "wall scaling" will perhaps prove most interesting to the spectators.

The College Battalion took part in the Confederate Memorial exercises held in Gainesville on the afternoon of April 26th, and marched into town in strictly military formation.

Released on Bail. San Francisco, April 29.—The only development Friday in the charges made by President D. H. McCarthy, of the building trades council against members of the electrical workers' union No. 6, of alleged conspiracy to abduct him, was the release on bail of M. H. Carmody and Harry Sullivan, the two men arrested Thursday night. Carmody was released on a \$1,000 bond and Sullivan on \$600. The police have not found any of the other men accused by McCarthy.

## MISS THOMAS DEAD. Well Known Young Woman Passes Away at Apalachicola Sunday.

A telegram was received in this city Sunday night announcing the death of Miss Lillian Maud, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. W. Thomas, which occurred in Apalachicola during Sunday, after a brief illness of Bright's disease.

Deceased was well known in this city and county, where she was born and reared. She was a young lady of fine intelligence, and her ambition in youth was to master the profession of teaching. She reached the point of her ambition, having been appointed a teacher. She conducted schools throughout the country for several years until failing health compelled her to retire from that vocation. As a teacher she was always a success, and was very popular among both patrons and pupils, all of whom regretted the necessity of her relinquishing her profession.

Deceased was a member of the Baptist Church, and a regular attendant at all services as long as her health would permit. At the time of her death she was in her thirty-first year. She is survived by her parents, two brothers, R. A. and Neill H. Thomas of Palatka, and two sisters, Mrs. M. L. Thompson of Romeo and Miss Ida May Thomas, who resides with her parents in this city.

The sympathy of the community is extended to the family in this hour of bereavement.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been made, but it was the expressed desire of deceased before her death that her remains be interred at the family burying ground in Windsor, and Mr. Thomas feels that this wish should be carried out. Announcement will be made tomorrow.

Violent Appeals Are Made. Paris, April 29.—Violent appeals to the military to refuse to act against strikers, and the laboring classes, which have recently been placarded in Paris, and the provincial towns, have been enforced by the determination of the government to prosecute their authors. The police have arrested seven of the twenty-one signers of the appeals. The prisoners include the secretary of the union of Seine unions.

Jefferson Descendant Dies. Charlottesville, Va., April 29.—Dr. Nelson C. Randolph, aged 73, a grandson of former Governor Thomas M. Randolph, and a great-grandson of Thomas Jefferson, died here Friday. For seventeen years he was a member of the board of visitors of the university of Virginia, and for eight years rector of that institution.

## LARGE SUIT SETTLED. Half Million Dollars Paid Paine, Webster & Co.

Boston, April 29.—The \$3,000,000 suit in equity brought by Paine, Webster & Co., against Albert C. Babbage, Thomas W. Lawson and others to recover on a contract involving 70,000 shares of stock in the Cooper Range Consolidated Mining company, was brought to a settlement on Friday.

Regarding the settlement of the suit William A. Paine made the following statement: "The case was settled by A. C. Babbage paying substantially the Tri-Mountain debt." The amount of this debt was \$540,000.
