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Sabal Trail identifies gas pipeline route

The Gilchrist County Commissioners learned on Monday that Sabal Trail has updated their intent to identify a location for a gas pipeline that will run through Gilchrist County. Sabal Trail submitted an updated map to the county administrator's office for the commissioners to review. Commissioner John Rance Thomas, representing District 4,

reported the updated location of the gas line is nothing more than Sabal Trail deciding to take the path of least resistance. The latest proposed route will actually come into Gilchrist County just east of the two natural gas pipelines put in by Florida Gas Transmission. "I understand the updated route will be 150-feet east of the Florida Gas Transmission existing right-of-way," Thomas said.

He further explained the gas line will travel south to just south of CR 340 and east for a short distance where it will then turn southeast into an existing utility easement. The preferred route will then travel into the alternative route, (identified in red on the map) through the southeast portion of Gilchrist County. "Sabal Trail took the high and dry route, instead of working through the wetlands, they will stay in the sandy

areas away from the less populated wetlands of the Waccasassa Flats," Commissioner Thomas said. Sabal Trail didn't pay any attention to the gas pipeline county committee, their going right where they wanted to from the beginning, Thomas said. It has also been reported that the proposed construction track will put the gas pipeline near the property recently purchased by Seminole Electric Cooperative, which is over

510 acres east of Bell, near the Waccasassa Flats. Kristin Bridges, senior vice president with Bascom Communications, representing Sabal Trail said, "Over the past several months, Sabal Trail has listened to various parties, including landowners, landowner association leaders and members, public officials, environmentally-minded organizations, local and state

geologists, environmental agencies, etc., regarding routing across the Santa Fe River and through Gilchrist County. Sabal Trail has conducted a great deal of analysis and surveying in the area. At this time and based on this analysis, the pipeline route that crosses the Santa Fe River and is adjacent to an existing pipeline corridor, as it follows the Florida Gas Transmission (FGT) pipeline, is proving to be favorable." 


Suwannee River Rescues

This week's recipe was tested and approved by the courthouse crew, so I know it is good! Our sweet daughter-in-law, Lyndsay, made this Nutella® Chocolate Torte recipe a few weeks back and took it in to work for everyone to enjoy. Lyndsay is not only a wonderful mother, she is a really good cook and baker. She is always coming up with a new recipe that pleases everyone's sweet tooth. Oh, by the way, Lyndsay will be celebrating her birthday this weekend.

This recipe made me wonder what the difference was between a cake

and a torte. A torte is a rich, usually multi-layered, cake that is filled with whipped cream, butter-creams, mousses, jams or fruits. So in other words, it's a fancy cake with lots of good rich filling and pretty stuff on top.

Lyndsay's Nutella® Chocolate Torte

For Cake:

- 1/2 cup Nutella®
1/2 cup milk
1/3 cup canola or vegetable oil
4 eggs
1 German Chocolate cake mix

For Nutella® Mousse:

- 8-ounce package cream cheese, softened
1 cup powdered sugar
3/4 cup Nutella
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
16 ounce container whipped topping
Garnish
Chocolate syrup, (I like Hershey's® in the can)
Chocolate candy bar, 4.25 ounces

Preheat oven to 350 degrees, grease and flour two 9-inch cake pans. Beat together Nutella, eggs, milk and oil. Add cake mix and beat for 30 seconds on low and then beat for 2 minutes on high. Pour batter into cake pans and bake for 25-30 minutes.

Allow cakes to cool for a few minutes in pan then remove and cool completely on wire racks.

To make mousse, beat softened cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add Nutella, powdered sugar and vanilla, beat until smooth. Fold in large container of whipped topping. Chill until ready to use.

To assemble cake, cut the cake layers in half horizontally. Place a cake layer on cake plate and spread 1/4 of the mousse over top of layer. Repeat until all the layers have been stacked with mousse in between each layer and on top. Drizzle chocolate syrup across the top of the cake and let it run down the sides of cake in several places. Slightly soften chocolate candy bar in microwave for a few seconds then run vegetable peeler along the edge of the chocolate to make curls. Sprinkle the chocolate curls across the top of the cake. Chill cake until ready to serve.

Tip: When using cake mixes if you will sift the cake mix the cake will turn out lighter when baked.

Life and Times of Gilchrist native Thomas Bryant

"It will all come out in the wash." That is the wisdom filled proverb Thomas Bryant lives by.

Thomas Bryant was born on October 30, 1936 in his momma's bedroom in his family home just off County Road 232 in Bell.

Thomas is the son of George Clifton Bryant and Agnes Downing Bryant. Thomas is the eldest of three children: he has one brother, Paul Bryant and one sister, Joann Bryant Campbell. The Thomas family was not middle class, but yet not poor. They

were just as good as anybody; no one had money back in those days.

Thomas grew up in a two bedroom house that had one inch cracks in the floor. The only heat came from the fireplace and the air conditioner was manual, you had to open up the window. At night you could see the stars through the roof, but the roof never leaked when it rained. God blessed their simple, country home. It wasn't 'til the late 1940's that the Thomas family got electricity and television. The television had only two channels that came in on a good clear day and

were still fuzzy. His family lived on a farm where they had many different animals; hogs, cows, geese and about one-hundred turkeys.

One day, while pumping water by hand, Thomas was messing around with his Momma's geese and "they got a hold on him and took him down to the ground", he learned not to mess with the mean geese again. Thomas said that the turkey is the dumbest animal ever created, because every time it rained they had to hurry outside to round the turkeys up because if you didn't they would

drown. The turkeys would look up at the rain with an open mouth and the water would drown them. Some days when no one wanted to pump water for baths, his Momma took him and his siblings down to the springs to take a bath in the cold, clear water of Hart Springs or Otter Springs. The first toys Thomas can remember having were a tricycle and a wagon. Back in his day they didn't have many toys, the kids had to entertain themselves. On Christmas holidays, Thomas's family had a tradition, that the children always received fruit in their Christmas stockings. They did not have enough money to buy little toys and gadgets like kids get today. His momma would make fruit cakes for everyone. The family got together and ate a big Christmas meal and exchanged gifts with one another and ate fruit cake.

Growing up in a small county you didn't have many school choices. You either went to Bell or Trenton and the two schools were big rivals in sports, FFA and everything else, just like today. Thomas chose to go to school in Trenton, because it was closer to his house even though he had a Bell address. During his school years he was an average student, but math was just not his subject. The only other class he did badly in one time, was P.E., the teacher told him not to play volleyball over a certain line, and that if he did Thomas and his friends would get an F. Well sure enough, he didn't listen and crossed the line and failed P.E. Thomas didn't get involved in sports, but he loved to go watch the games. Instead he was active in the FFA. He was treasurer of the Trenton FFA Chapter and when he was a senior he received his State Farmer Degree while at the Florida State FFA Convention in Orlando. While a member of the FFA, Thomas got to go on many trips. Two of the biggest were to Kentucky and Mexico. The trip to Kentucky was to attend the National FFA Convention; the trip to Mexico was just an experience for the students. Between the two schools they took one bus with Trenton and Bell students. They went all over Mexico just checking out the sites and Mexican agriculture.

That was a big trip for a high school

We're unlikely friends, since she grew up 30 or so miles down the road from me in Alachua. I had never laid eyes on her until her family bought the large river house across the canal from our fish camp at Suwannee.

Other than a few spectacular fireworks shows on the 4th, we didn't see much of the O'Steen family. I started reading SaraBeth's blog and she started reading mine, but we didn't really form a kinship until we both had babies go to heaven.

My loss was sudden, and unexpected. Walker was alive and well, in my stomach one day and dead the next. And while it certainly rocked our world, my story is nothing like SaraBeth's. You see she was told that her baby was not perfect in the eyes of the world when she was just three months along, yet against numerous doctors' wishes she chose to not have an abortion. Instead, she carried her baby for six more months, with the full knowledge that Faith would likely die, but also knowing how mighty our God is. SaraBeth's story of her daughter Faith's short time on this earth is amazing. Here is a short excerpt from her blog:

"Though we are sad, and we feel an emptiness without you here with us, we rejoice to know that God is Good all of the time. We prayed that His will would be done. We prayed that it was His will that you go to heaven, that He would allow you to be peaceful, and that He would give us some time, no matter how short, to spend with you. He answered our prayers. He gave us the greatest gift in knowing that our Faith has been renewed. You are now in heaven, with no pain, no suffering and your body has been renewed. But our faith in God has also been renewed. Though this journey has not been easy, He has never left us alone. He has held true to His promises, and carried us through the storm. We now stand stronger with Him knowing that He loves us so much, and that He chose us to be your Mommy and Daddy. We are forever changed by the blessing of knowing you as our daughter. Our time on earth may seem like an eternity, but in reality it's only a snapshot. This life is not our home. We can rest assured that because of the gift that God gave as his son on the cross, we will see you again, and spend forever holding you in our arms. But we can promise that this is not the end of your story. God will continue to use us to share how you have changed us all, and we could not be more proud to do so."

Like so many others, I read SaraBeth's blog almost daily, soaking up details of her pregnancy. There were so many stories along the way of God's faithfulness in her family's journey. One day SaraBeth and I met up for lunch. We talked for three hours and almost shut down Texas Roadhouse. I will never forget that day, because her words really touched my heart.

I also won't forget the day SaraBeth called me up and asked me to read her book. She called my cell and I didn't answer because Whitt was getting a haircut and I had left my phone in the car. So she sent me a text, then she called the Journal. After that, she called my husband Adam. I was worried to death thinking something must be wrong, when I saw all the missed calls on my phone and texts saying CALL SARABETH! Finally, when we connected on the phone she asked me to read her book before it was published.

I told her I would be honored, and truly I was beyond humbled that she had asked me. Then the devil started working on me. I was plagued with

fear about reading the book and going back there to the heartbreaking days of losing a child. You see, I push so hard every single day to keep moving forward, soaking up every single moment I can with Allie Claire and Whitt, and that 'ol devil told me that if I went back and started thinking about Faith, which makes me think about Walker, then I would crumble. The scab would be ripped off and I would just hide out in my bed rather than get up and face the world, or worse yet, I would keep my children locked away in our house for fear something horrible might happen to them.

Fear is an ugly thing, y'all. And I struggle with it daily.


Finally, I just jumped on her book, determined to read it because I love my friend. In February, I read SaraBeth's book every free moment I had, soaking up each word. I laughed and cried (and cried some more). I hung on to her every word and was humbled by her passion for God and her ability to trust him in the face of every momma's nightmare. County OKs purchase of electronic poll books

Gilchrist County Supervisor of Elections Connie Sanchez addressed the Gilchrist County Commission on Monday to request the board approve the purchase of EVID Electronic Poll Books as sole source from VR Systems, Inc. for \$23,435.

Sanchez explained that the units are brand new and were traded in by Marion County. The Marion County Supervisor of Elections has purchased a newer, more compact unit for their poll precincts. Marion County traded in the new, larger models which made them available for sale to Gilchrist County.

Commissioner John Rance Thomas asked the supervisor how these new machines operate.

Sanchez explained that a registered voter will walk into a precinct and slide their driver's license through a machine just like they would operate a credit card. The machine will then designate the type of ballot needed for the voter.

Sanchez pointed out that this machine will provide more detailed electronic records of all those who voted during the primary elections in a timely manner.

Commissioner Todd Gray made the motion to approve the request for the \$23,435 to be taken from General Revenue Reserve and purchase as a sole source from VR Systems, Inc. Commissioner John Rance Thomas gave a second. The Commission then approved the purchase by a unanimous vote.

The supervisor of elections explained this new equipment will be in place for the 2014 elections.

Heart Matters

This week we begin our attempt to become successful "peacemakers" (Matthew 5:9) by learning conflict resolution strategies and how to put them into practice. We have established that conflict is not only inevitable, but also a necessary part of our lives that can bring about needed change. Last week we defined conflict as a disagreement where people believe their interests are being threatened. Now, let's start by investigating one of the most popular conflict resolution strategies: avoidance. Two questions I hope we can answer this week are "What does this strategy look like in action?" and "Can it be used successfully?"



In conflict resolution, avoidance is the strategy that seeks to put off conflict indefinitely. By ignoring the problem, the avoider hopes the conflict will resolve itself without a confrontation. This strategy is a favorite among people who panic at any sign of conflict and see it only as a negative. Some go so far as to make avoiding confrontation the primary goal above resolving the conflict. People who favor this strategy will often say things like: "I just can't deal with it" and "I don't want to talk about it."

A prime example of avoidance in the Bible is found in the story of Jacob and Esau. (Genesis 25-33) Jacob and Esau were in conflict over the birthright of the firstborn and their father's deathbed blessing. Traditionally, both should have belonged to Esau as the oldest son. However, in a weak moment, Esau sold his birthright to Jacob for a bowl of stew. Later, Jacob tricked their dying father into giving him the blessing that should have been Esau's. Needless to say, Esau was not happy about this turn of events. Genesis 27:41 reports: "Esau held a grudge against Jacob because of the blessing his father had given him. He said to himself, 'The days of mourning for my father are near; then I will kill my brother Jacob.'" (NIV)

Obviously, now would not be the time to sit down and have a discussion with Esau. Likewise, Jacob was probably not mature enough to take responsibility for his wrong actions either. Avoidance is a good option in this moment.

So, Jacob runs. He packs up and leaves town in order to avoid facing Esau's wrath. This is what the avoidance strategy looks like in action. Stay away from the person or people with whom you have the conflict. Whether you block them on Facebook™, change your phone number, or simply refuse to have a conversation about what your differences are, avoidance dodges and escapes. Can this strategy be used successfully? That all depends on your goal: If your priority is to avoid conflict at all costs, then I suppose this will be your strategy of choice. However, avoiding conflict is a far cry from resolving it. In order to resolve conflict, there must be a time for both people/parties to come together and face the problem. Jacob and Esau were able to accomplish this after about twenty years had passed. (See Genesis 32-33)

In order to use avoidance successfully, it should be viewed as a temporary solution that gives time for both parties to cool their anger, or to consider the problem a little longer. Afterward, communication can hopefully pave the way for resolution. Permanent avoidance prevents resolution from occurring and fosters unforgiveness and grudges-not great options for peacemakers.



Food pantry, SRWMD lawsuits topics at county meeting

Rick Weder of The Children's Table Food Pantry and Bill Brown, the program founder, spoke at the Gilchrist County Commission meeting on Monday.

Brown told the Commission that the Children's Table Food Pantry provides 1,200 meals in Gilchrist County every month. This program began providing food service to the needy in 2002. Since that time the program has grown to seven counties and 14 locations and is always ready to provide service on an emergency need, Brown added.

The founder took the opportunity to acknowledge Rick Weder with the "Long Term Service Beyond Self" award, for his many years of service to the food pantry and the needy people of Gilchrist County. Brown explained the Children's Table Food Pantry program is returning to Gilchrist County in the Trenton area and soon to be expanding into Fanning Springs. The commission thanked Rick Weder and Bill Brown for providing food pantry services to the needy people in Gilchrist County.

In other news: Steve Minnis of Suwannee River Water Management District addressed the Commission asking for their support of the Districts Minimum Flows and Levels standards for the Santa Fe and Ichetucknee Rivers.

He explained that two lawsuits have been filed stipulating the District's MFLs are inaccurate. Minnis explained to the Commissioners that the MFL standards were adopted by the SRWMD after many years of study and science that went into these

regulations. "We are confident that our science will stand alone in supporting the Districts' MFL," Minnis said.

He went on to say the District governing board felt confident that the District would be found correct involving these petitions.

Minnis explained the counties of Bradford, Alachua, and Suwannee have adopted information for the Minimum Flows and Levels supporting the SRWMD data. Gilchrist County attorney Duke Lang was asked if he would meet and represent Gilchrist County involving these lawsuits.

Lang said he felt the county commission chairman would have to attend these meetings to also answer questions involving Gilchrist County. Minnis pointed out that the commission chairman would not be required to attend the hearings, but it would be helpful if the Commission would have a legal representative in attendance.

Lang went on to point out that he thought it was out of his field of expertise, but if the Commission wanted him to represent the county, he estimated 40 additional hours of work would be involved in this undertaking which would be outside of his approved legal contract to the Board of County Commission.

Commissioner Sharon Langford asked the SRWMD representative if the governing board would cover the costs of the county's attorney attending these meetings. Minnis explained that SRWMD could not pay for Gilchrist County legal counsel to represent the county in this manner.

student back then. After school and on the weekends Thomas went to work as a farmhand. The pay for teenage labor was not very much; he received fifty cents an hour. On the occasional weekend Thomas would go to the movies in town, Trenton had a movie theater right next to the dentist office in town. Thomas and friends would go see movies that featured Hop Along Cassidy, John Wayne and were usually westerns. Other than the occasional movie on the weekend, all Thomas ever really did was work, work and work some more.

When asked about old girlfriends in the presence of his wife, Thomas said that he had a few here and there; Gail, Maggie Lou and he took some redhead to the prom; she must not have made a big impression on him. When asked about his first kiss, he just said his Momma was his first kiss and true love. Thomas graduated from Trenton High in 1954. He was one of fifteen in his graduating class. There were ten boys and five girls, a big class at that time. A year after graduation, Thomas bought his first car, a 1949 Ford and it was jet black. He paid \$375, which was a good penny back in the day. It wasn't a new car, but it got him around when he needed it.

On March 15, 1957, Thomas joined the US Air Force. He was stationed in Homestead, Florida where he was a jet plane mechanic. Before going to Homestead, Thomas went to Illinois for four months to jet mechanic school. Joining the Air Force turned out to be great for Thomas, because that is where he met his future wife, Hazel Lee Norris. Hazel and her friend were coming on a bus from Tennessee to live with some family in Homestead. On the bus ride Hazel met one of Thomas's friends. When they arrived in Homestead, Hazel and her friend needed a ride to the home they were staying at so Thomas gave them a ride. A few days later, Hazel

needed a car so she asked Thomas if she could borrow his. He let her borrow his car and then he realized that he didn't even know her name. Hazel said after that she couldn't get him to go home. On March 14, 1961 Thomas was discharged from the Air Force and went back home to Trenton and brought Hazel with him. From there they took a trip to visit Hazel's family in Tennessee, that's when Thomas asked her father for her hand in marriage. Thomas will tell you that if you ask his father-in-law who his favorite son-in-law is, he will tell you Thomas. The thing he will forget to tell you, is that he is the only son-in-law. Thomas and Hazel were married on February 5th, 1962. They were married on a Monday night at his Momma's house. It was a simple country wedding, with Thomas, Hazel and the preacher, Lee Roberts. The wedding was inside and there were around one-hundred and fifty people outside. I asked Thomas what he thought when he first saw Hazel walking in and he said that she looked the same as she did earlier that day when he picked her up from the beauty shop and then went and got the wedding cake.

After getting married, Thomas started working for the Division of Forestry for the state of Florida in 1962. He worked for the fire control division and whenever there was a fire he would go and help put it out. He would operate a bulldozer. He worked for the Division of Forestry for thirty-three years. In 1995 he retired at the age of fifty-eight. He will tell you that he would have rather been farming all those years, but he enjoyed his job in forestry.

Thomas said that getting married to his beautiful wife was his greatest success ever, but second would be when his daughter was born. Dale Leona Bryant was born on June 25th, 1963 and was given the nickname "watermelon" because Thomas

paid for her hospital stay with the money he made off his watermelons. Thomas's daughter is now married to George Anderson, she works for the Gilchrist Property Appraiser and is very active in supporting many efforts in Gilchrist County, just like her parents.

When asked if he thought he had any failures in his life, he told me that "I wouldn't have done anything if I thought it was going to be a failure and if something turned out wrong, it just did and it would all come out in the wash anyway". I asked if he ever had a midlife crisis and he just laughed, and said he didn't have the time or money to have a midlife crisis. He was always working to keep his family's needs met and that was his job to help them not himself. Thomas attends Cherry Sink Church of Christ, not far from his home.

In 1999, Thomas, his wife and daughter Dale received the "Family of the Year Award", this award was given out by the Gilchrist Chamber of Commerce to a family that shows; character, kindness, support and is active in the community. Anyone in this county will tell you that if you need help or anything, Thomas is the man to go to. He will help you out in a heartbeat because that is what he loves to do, help people. Thomas is a trustworthy friend and his wife says that he only sees the good in people. If only the rest of the world looked at things like that we would all be better off. Thomas is a man with no enemies, because if someone does not like him he tries to figure out the problem so he can fix it, and he always seems to succeed.

Since Thomas retired he does whatever he wants to do. An average day for Thomas, has him eating breakfast and lunch in town so he can socialize with other town folks. After breakfast he piddles around and then after lunch he goes to visit those at the nursing home. He talks with them of the old times when everything was easy and simple and the world wasn't such a mess. Thomas says he misses those days, but things do have to go on, grow and change. When Thomas gets done visiting at the nursing home, he goes home to see his still beautiful wife, Hazel. He says that sometimes she cooks and sometimes she doesn't. He said he gets to take a lot of naps and catch-up on all the sleep he missed as a teenager having to work all the time. Thomas enjoys listening to bluegrass and country music. He still likes to watch old western movies on his television that all the channels come in crystal clear, unlike the television he had growing up.

Thomas Clifton Bryant has enjoyed his life, asked for words of wisdom what would they be and why, he said "time takes care of everything" and "it will all come out in the wash". He said people don't want to wait or work for things, but most great things take time.

If you are riding through town and want to meet a fine man that, look for him in the local restaurant socializing or he may be visiting the nursing home and talking about the good ole days, he may tell you a cool story. You just might find him taking a nap at home or talking to his beautiful wife.

SRWMD partners with grower to implement surface drip irrigation

Suwannee River Water Management District (District) staff recently participated in a demonstration at a local farm that is using subsurface drip irrigation to grow corn.

Subsurface drip irrigation is a highly efficient water savings technology that enables growers to reduce water use by 25-30 percent while maintaining current crop yields.

Gary Cone explained the successfulness of his subsurface drip irrigation system that is used to water and fertilize more than 50 acres of corn on his Hamilton County farm. Cone received cost-share funds from the District to assist with the costs of the drip tape and an on-site computer system, which allows him to program the system to irrigate only when needed. This is the second year Cone will be using the technology to irrigate.

With this technology, plants are watered using drip tape that is buried underground.

Subsurface drip irrigation allows growers to deliver irrigation and fertilizer at the root zone. This method prevents evaporative losses that may occur with other types of irrigation methods and reduces the leaching of fertilizers into the aquifer. "This has been a successful project for me. It allows me to save water and fertilizer, cut energy costs, and maintain the same crop yield of corn that I was getting with center pivot irrigation," Cone said. "I appreciate the District contributing to the cost of this technology." Additionally, Cone said this technology has enabled him to increase the number of acres he is farming by allowing him to irrigate a piece of land that is too compact for a center pivot irrigation system. Subsurface drip irrigation is fairly new to growers in north Florida,

but the District hopes to increase implementation of this technology throughout the region. "The District appreciates the opportunity to partner with Mr. Cone to demonstrate the effectiveness of subsurface drip irrigation as a pilot project for reducing water use in our area," said District Executive Director Ann Shortelle. "We hope that other farmers within the District can learn about and benefit from the demonstration of this irrigation method."

As part of the program, Cone is also implementing best management practices (BMPs) to conserve water and protect water quality and is participating in the District's water use monitoring program. Some of the BMPs he is using include no till practices, which prevents the soils from losing organic matter and reduces soil erosion, and sap testing of plants to prevent the over-application of nitrogen.

County, the river meanders six miles through hammock and swamp before joining the Santa Fe River.

The Ichetucknee River receives nearly all of its flow from the springs. Nine named springs and many unnamed springs discharge an average of 230 million gallons of groundwater per day into the river. Because of the prevalence of springs along the Ichetucknee River, the entire river maintains a cool spring-like temperature year round, and it supports habitats for aquatic plants and animals typical of springs and springruns. Additionally, parts of the river boast the blue and aqua color due to the significant spring inputs. The Ichetucknee is rich in history and culture. It was home to one of the major interior missions serving the Spanish settlement of St. Augustine, the Mission de San Martin de Timucua, established in 1608. The Ichetucknee served as the lifeblood for Native Americans and later for settlers and the surrounding communities. It eventually became a popular gathering place for the locals. In the 1950s, tubing the river gained popularity. In 1970, Loncala Phosphate Company sold the property surrounding the Ichetucknee to the state of Florida to be developed as a state park, and in 1972 the U.S. Department of Interior declared the Ichetucknee a National Natural Landmark. Today, locals and visitors alike are drawn to these crystal clear waters to be refreshed and enjoy recreation. In fact, the Ichetucknee is one of the most popular tubing destinations in the world, drawing an average of 140,000 or more visitors annually, according to the Ichetucknee Springs State Park. Canoeing and kayaking are also popular activities. The District is actively taking steps to improve spring flows and water quality in the Ichetucknee through aquifer recharge and water quality improvement projects throughout the region. Also, the District measures water quality and spring flow along the Ichetucknee to monitor conditions and trends. Additionally, the District is working with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the St. Johns River Water Management District to establish cross-boundary minimum flows and levels (MFLs) for the Lower Santa Fe and Ichetucknee Rivers and Priority Springs. The District has joined with the Florida Legislature in recognizing April as Springs Protection Awareness Month to increase public awareness of springs and the need to protect them. In conjunction with that effort, the District is highlighting various keystone springs to promote spring protection and restoration through a series of articles.

Gilchrist Health Dept. reminds teens and parents to consider sun safety

The Florida Department of Health in Gilchrist County reminds teenagers, their parents, and others who may be considering tanning indoors or out, exposure to all ultra violet radiation has the potential to cause skin cancer.

Overexposure to the sun or artificial (UV) radiation can often lead to skin cancer, the most common type of cancer in the United States, with an estimated 1.2 million cases diagnosed each year. There are three primary types of skin cancer: squamous, basal and melanoma. Squamous type skin cancer is the least dangerous and the most easily treated. Basal type skin cancer is the most common form of skin cancer. Malignant melanoma is cancer which has proliferated below the dermal surfaces and can be life threatening.

A common misconception about sun exposure is that the risk of developing skin cancer is only increased if the skin is burned. Despite whether skin is burned or not, exposure to both the sun and indoor tanning facilities raises the risk of receiving damaging UV rays, which also increases the risk of developing skin cancer. Skin cancer is becoming increasingly more common in the US, a trend which aligns with the recent popularity of tanning and using tanning beds.

To lower your skin cancer risk and protect your skin, follow these guidelines:

- Minimize sun exposure.
- Wear SPF 15 or higher and apply sunscreen at least 15 minutes before exposure to the sun. Reapply sunscreen every 2 hours to ensure skin will not be burned.
- Use protective barriers such as

hats, sunglasses, and clothing to block full exposure.

• Use heightened precaution if you possess any of the following traits: pale skin; blonde, red or light brown hair; if you've been previously treated for skin cancer; or if a family member has had skin cancer.

With prom season almost underway and summer right behind it, teenagers, especially teenage girls, may be interested in getting noticeably tanned.

To protect minors from making tanning decisions that may irreversibly harm their skin, Florida law requires the following for indoor tanning facilities:

- Each tanning facility must be licensed in Florida.
- Minors under the age of 18 must have the signature of a parent or legal guardian to use an indoor tanning device.
- Children under the age of 14 must be accompanied by an adult in order to use a tanning device.
- Every person using a tanning device must wear protective eyewear approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.
- The operator of each tanning facility must be certified through a course approved by the Florida Department of Health.
- Each tanning facility operation must maintain client records for 4 years.
- The operator of the facility is responsible for the sanitary maintenance of all devices and supporting equipment.

Mrs. Elizabeth U. (Betty) Hitchcock


Elizabeth U. (Betty) Hitchcock, age 85, passed away on April 29, 2014. Mrs. Hitchcock was born in Paho-

UF 711 is an easy-to-peel mandarin, while RBB 7-34 is a new navel orange-like variety with much more color and flavor than ordinary Florida navels, Gmitter said. Both varieties were deemed to be good-tasting, as well.

UF 711 and RBB 7-34 will be released under the UF/IFAS Citrus Fast Track Release Option, which means they will be made available to growers and, thus, the market, 10-15 years faster than the 15 to 20 years typically required to breed and release such cultivars.

The panel also approved for release five sweet sorghum cultivars. Sorghum has traditionally been used to produce syrup, sugar and molasses but can be used to produce renewable chemicals and biofuels. The new cultivars are F4-45-3-1, F4-28-4-1, F4-20-2-1, F4-15-2-1 and F4-1-2-1.

Two renewable fuel companies, Fort Lauderdale-based Southeast Renewable Fuels and Riverview-based Highlands EnviroFuels, have expressed interest in the cultivars, said Wilfred Vermerris, a UF/IFAS associate professor in microbiology and cell science.

Southeast Renewable Fuels is building a biorefinery that will use sweet sorghum as a feedstock for fuel ethanol. Highlands EnviroFuels plans to build a biorefinery near Lake Placid.

"As the first expected commercial-scale sweet sorghum-to-ethanol plant in the U.S., Southeast Renewable Fuels is excited to be working with the University of Florida," said company CEO Aaron Pepper. "We are awaiting the results of our field trials and are looking forward to including UF's sweet sorghum cultivars in our planting cycle."

The sorghum cultivars were developed partly as a result of a \$5.4 million United States Department of Agriculture grant awarded in 2011 to UF/IFAS to develop sweet sorghum for energy fuels and chemicals.

Scientists at the North Florida Research and Education Center in Marianna received approval on two new cultivars.

A peanut cultivar, 297, has shown superior yield to current peanut cultivars and good resistance to tomato spotted wilt virus and white mold disease. Seed from 297 will be marketed under the TUFRunner(tm) brand.

A new awnless triticale, FL01143, also was approved. Triticale, relatively new as a Florida forage, came from crossing wheat and cereal rye. It has wheat's quality and rye's disease resistance. Florida's dairy and beef industries have used triticale for winter grazing for cattle and for silage and have seen excellent results, said Ann Blount, professor of forage breeding and genetics at NFREC.

Two limpograsses, 4F Hybrid and 10Hybrid, were also approved. These warm-season cultivars serve as forage primarily for the beef industry.

Limpograsses have been increasingly adopted by ranchers for their digestibility, adaptation to seasonal floods and light-frost tolerance. These new hybrids were selected for improved persistence under grazing and maintenance of nutritive value when used as stockpiled forage.

Two ryegrasses were approved for release.

FL PE 2X is a diploid ryegrass with excellent cold tolerance and resistance to crown rust, a disease that reduces yield and forage quality. Because of its cold tolerance, it can be produced in the northern transition zone, an area of the U.S. where both cool- and warm-season plants can be grown. FL PE 2X has a mid-late maturity that will provide slightly extended forage production. Also approved was a tetraploid ryegrass, FL RED 4X Late, which is a highly disease-resistant, late-maturing ryegrass. It has shown consistently high yields in many locations and is expected to perform well in the southern annual ryegrass belt.


