## Local family works to find a cure for Cystic Fibrosis

Bryce Folds is just like many 6th grade boys at Trenton Middle-High School, he likes science and socializing, and dreams of playing trumpet in the Tiger Marching Band one day.

Unlike his 11-year-old peers, Bryce has Cystic Fibrosis. He was diagnosed with the life-threatening genetic disease when he was just 3 years old.

"After years of being 'sick' we finally had an answer to the 'why,'" Bryce's mother explained. "As heart breaking as the news was to hear that Bryce had a genetic disease that has no cure, we as his parents were

determined to keep him 'healthy.'"

Today, Bryce's parents Tim and Heather Folds say they are blessed that Bryce currently only has to take six prescriptions each day, along with vest therapy, which requires that he spend an hour to an hour and a half in a vest each day. Bryce takes Creon 24000, three with each meal and two with snacks. This means he takes up to 18 pills a day just in one of his six prescriptions.

Cystic Fibrosis is a life-threatening genetic disease that primarily affects the lungs and digestive system. An estimated 30,000 children and adults in the United States have Cystic Fibrosis. Of those, 75 percent are diagnosed by the age of 2. Cystic Fibrosis is a disease that people inherit from their parents.

In people with Cystic Fibrosis, a defective gene and its protein product cause the body to produce unusually thick, sticky mucus that clogs the lungs and leads to life-threatening lung infections and obstructs the pancreas and stops natural enzymes from helping the body break down food and absorb vital nutrients.

In the 1950s, few children with Cystic Fibrosis lived to attend elementary school. Since then, tremendous progress in understanding and treating Cystic Fibrosis has led to dramatic improvements in the length and quality of life for those living with Cystic Fibrosis. Many people

with the disease can now expect to live into their 30s, 40s and beyond.

Shortly after Bryce was diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis his family formed "TEAM BRYCE" to raise funds for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Since it's inception, Bryce's organization has raised \$12,000 to help fund research to find a cure for Cystic Fibrosis.

"A medication that treats Bryce's form of CF is on its way to the second trial phase," Heather Folds said. "This medication targets the defective gene. Praise God!"

Since learning that their son has a life-threatening disease, the Folds family has done a lot of praising God. Bryce has only been hospitalized once since his diagnosis and that is certainly cause for celebration.

"His pulmonary doctors want to know our secret to having a 'healthy CF'er' and our answer is always the same, prayers and lots of chocolate milk," Heather Folds said. "Bryce is a testimony of prayers. He has people as far away as Hawaii and South Korea praying for him."

Tim and Heather have three sons, Bryce, 11, Blake, 6, and Braden, 4. Blake is a carrier of Cystic Fibrosis just like Tim and Heather. When he marries, his wife will need to find out if she is a carrier of the Cystic Fibrosis gene as well. Braden is not a carrier of Cystic Fibrosis, nor does he have the genetic disease.

Team Bryce is working toward their goal, that CF will no longer stand for Cystic Fibrosis, but rather Cure Found.

## 'The Cookie Lady' bakes up a successful local business

With a warm smile and sparkly eyes, Lisa McDougal walks into a business with a basket of homemade cookies on her arm.

"The Cookie Lady" as Lisa is commonly referred to throughout the tri-county area, bakes and sells cookies twice a month.

McDougal operates "Nana's Kitchen" under the Florida Cottage Food Law, which was enacted by the Florida Legislature in July of 2011. The Cottage Food Law allows individuals like McDougal to make, sell and store certain types of cottage food products in an unlicensed home kitchen.

"I have always enjoyed cooking and baking," McDougal said. "I think it's in my DNA. My mom has always been a really good cook

and a few of my family members own Spanish restaurants down around the Tampa area."

With the encouragement of her family members, McDougal started baking and selling cookies in October 2012. On her first delivery day, McDougal took her signature ginger cookies to a few businesses where she knew people and sold 13 bags of cookies.

Over the years her business route has grown to include as many as 30 to 32 stops. She leaves her home in Gilchrist County between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. depending on how late she stayed up the night before finishing up. Her mode of delivery is a tan minivan with 180,000 miles on it. Once the van is loaded with homemade cookies, McDougal travels to Trenton, Chiefland and

Cross City delivering cookies to customers who are always glad to see her. Typically McDougal sells 80 to 85 12-ounce bags of cookies.

A mother of five children, and a grandmother of two, McDougal is quite capable of managing her own business.

She bakes and sells cookies on a two week on, two week off rotation. On baking weeks, McDougal prints her bag labels and does her grocery shopping on Tuesdays. Some products she searches for the best price on, like flour, sugar and butter. While other ingredients she is strictly brand loyal to, like cloves for her ginger cookies, and brown sugar. On Wednesdays,

The sons of William Catesby Cocke, Bell's first train depot agent back in 1907, along with other family members gathered at Bell's train depot on Friday for a surprise birthday celebration.

Family members from as far as Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina and Washington D.C. gathered at the depot just before noon to surprise Willard H. Cocke, oldest living son of William Catesby Cocke, on his 95th birthday.

When the lights at the depot were flipped on and Willard H. Cocke saw his family members gathered to surprise him on his birthday, Mr. Cocke was so startled he dropped his walking cane.

Willard Cocke and his brother Joe Cocke, 93, were born in Bell. Dr. Philpot delivered both men. The Cocke family lived in Bell from 1907 to 1925 while William Catesby Cocke was the train depot agent. After leaving Bell, the family moved to Alachua.

This week I would like to share with you a delightful little find in Cedar Key. Bake My Day, Bakery and Deli is a very neat little home-owned bakery, sandwich and salad shop. Brenda, the owner, is a Cedar Key girl and she whips up great cupcakes in a variety of flavors, including key lime and mocha, not to mention all the cookies and bars that come out of her oven. If you have a sweet tooth be sure to stop by when visiting the island.

My favorite thing on the menu is a BLT on whole wheat with a side of really good potato salad. The potato salad at Bake My Day reminds me of the wonderful old Heron Restaurant that used to make the best Greek salad years ago. I often think of Ms. Coupe and her amazing food.

Also if you are a fan of iced coffee Bake My Day makes up a really rich mixture that is not too far from being classified as a dessert. My friend and I had an iced coffee the other day and we had lots of energy for sewing the rest of the morning.

If you happen to spend the morning in Cedar Key anytime soon you can slip into Bake My Day for breakfast or lunch. They stay open until 3 pm.

I found this charming little restaurant while visiting the local Cedar Key quilt shop, known as the Salty Needle. Several friends and I went down last week to visit the quilt shop, which happens to be in the same building as the bakery. We enjoyed a great, relaxing lunch on the porch. The weather was beautiful and as always Cedar Key is just a pretty place to spend the day.

Bake My Day is located at 434 2nd Street. I've always considered 2nd Street the main street of Cedar Key with all the quaint old two story buildings.

For dessert at Bake My Day we chose Mexican Cheesecake and it was so good. I didn't ask for the recipe but instead came home and looked online for it. This might not be Brenda's recipe but it's close and our crew really liked it. What I like most was that it was so easy to make. This recipe would be wonderful at a family get together, reunion, dinner on the grounds or even, as we like to say in the South, as funeral food.

The recipe I found online and

tested was called Sopapilla Cheese Cake, a sopapilla is a crispy Mexican flatbread that has been deep fried.

The amounts given in this recipe are for a 8x8 pan or Pyrex dish but you can double the ingredients and make a 9x13 size. The 8x8 size yielded 9 servings. It's a tad rich, wouldn't you know, so the serving sizes don't have to be too big.

### Sopapilla Cheese Cake Bar

1 8-ounce cream cheese, room temperature

1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 package of Pillsbury crescent rolls (original or butter)  
2 tablespoons melted butter  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 tablespoons sugar

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 8x8 pan or baking dish. Open the crescent rolls and seal the perforated marks in one sheet of dough and place in the bottom of baking dish. Beat the cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla beat until smooth and creamy. Spread cream cheese mixture over the dough. Open the second roll of dough and crimp the perforated marks closed and place over the cream cheese filling. Pour melted butter over dough evenly. I used a brush to even out the butter. Mix cinnamon and sugar sprinkle over the butter. Bake at 350 from 30-40 minutes. Cool in dish until room temperature. Chill in fridge for several hours before serving. This dessert is good the next day also.

She learns to walk and before I know it she's old enough to actually play outside-riding bikes, scrawling her name across the driveway in sidewalk chalk, and fluttering around the yard with her sisters, all three pretending to be fairies. I'm not describing one of my daughters in particular-it could be any of my three, because the first years of their lives were all nearly identical. I am raising three daughters, and I am trying my best to raise them to be young ladies."

What is it about a size 6 that has led anyone to believe that a child that fits in that size should be wearing the same outfit that a 12 year old would wear? Is there some imaginary milestone that we hit? We're talking about little girls, not tweens. Where are the ruffles? The puffy sleeves? The flowing dresses? My 5 year old still wears princess dresses nearly every day. She's having tea parties with her baby dolls, she's pretending to be a mermaid in the bath tub, she's wearing fairy wings and tutus. So, I ask you, why would I dress her the same as a girl more than twice her age?? Why is she banished to a department that has pleather jackets, mini skirts and padded training bras?! I have a 5 year old that still wears pigtails, bows in her hair, and loves nothing more than a dress she can twirl in. My daughter, my sweet, innocent, little girl, is not a runway model. She is not a tiny adult and she is no where near being a "tween".

My solution? Well, I buy the least expensive and least trashy of the trash that is available. And I let her play in it. 

# Community Character Education Forum

Education was the theme chosen for the 9th annual Character Community Forum.

Hosted by the Character Council of Gilchrist County, the event was held on Thursday, Aug. 28 at Otter Springs Lodge.

Attendees heard presentations from Todd Bryant, who led the Trenton High School baseball team to a 2013 state championship victory. Bryant spoke on the need to relate to teens in such a way as to give them opportunities to display good character and teamwork.

Mrs. Kathy Weaver, guidance counselor at Bell Elementary School, related her many years of experience in the school system. Mrs. Weaver spoke on the importance of children having good character as they mature and grow in relationships with each other.

Dr. Geneva Cornwell, director of Victory Christian School, was

## Heart Matters

While standing in line at the grocery store recently, I noticed the headlines on several magazines warning about how our troubled economy is negatively affecting families and relationships. According to these sources, money is the number one relationship killer. On one hand, I have to agree: family members quarrel over money and go years without speaking; friendships end over loans not given or not repaid, and marriages experience huge struggles when both sides aren't working together toward a common financial goal. But on the other hand, let's be careful to see the real problem here: money itself is amoral: it can be a blessing or curse, depending on its use. It is the nature of the person using the money that determines its morality.

The Bible speaks often to the issue of money because it is a fact of life: we need money to live. I Timothy 6:7-10 records some basic truths:

"For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. People who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil..."

I once heard a joke about a greedy, miser of a man who hoarded money his entire life and was bound and determined to take it with him when he died. He instructed his wife to place his wealth in the casket when he passed away. He wanted no one, including her, to enjoy his money after he was gone. After his funeral, friends and family were curious to know whether she carried out his wishes: "Of course", she replied, "but instead of handling all that cash, it was much more convenient to write him a check!" One thing is for sure—you can't take it with you!

The word "content" is defined as "quietness of mind; satisfaction". When we are struggling with financial issues, isn't "quietness of mind" the first thing to go? This is even more the case if our struggle includes other people! But notice the last part of this scripture: it tells us that the root of the problem is not money, but the love of money is where all kinds of problems begin: Constantly overextended on your budget? Continually arguing with your spouse over money? Tempted to make dishonest deals? A workaholic with no time for your family? These are just a few of the "temptations and traps that plunge men into ruin." One of the biggest traps here is to think that more money will solve these problems. In Luke 16:10 the Bible says, "Whoever can







# City of Trenton

The city manager explained that Mittauer and Associates, Inc. are compiling information about the needed water system improvements in hopes that the city will receive grant funding for the projects.

According to Mittauer's estimates, the city needs over \$6 million to fund the work that needs to be done to the water system including water line replacement and about \$4 million for the sewer collection system rehabilitation.

The city manager explained that he feels the waterlines are the most critical need at this time. Brown reported that about 65 percent of the water the city is pumping is being lost to leaking water lines.

Commissioner Randy Rutter also mentioned that the water meters in parts of the City need replacing. Rutter suggested the older meters might not be accounting for the actual amount of water being used.

The 2014-15 budget for water

and sewer reflects a slight increase from last year's budget. At this time, the water and sewer budget is set at \$1,139,387. This budget amount includes a 2.1 percent rate increase planned for the 2014-15 budget year. In 2013-14, 17 percent of the City's water and sewer fund budget was returned, which equals \$181,821.

After the commissioners discussed the work that needed to be done, they instructed the city manager to come back with a budget for the water and sewer department that includes a 5 percent increase in rates at the next meeting, which will be held September 9.

At that meeting the commissioners will give their final approval to the budget for the upcoming year. Commissioner Rutter said that he felt that increasing the water and sewer rates was the fairest way to spread the cost throughout the city so everyone pays a little and the larger burden will not be paid by the 30 percent of taxpay-

ers who actually pay property taxes in the city. Rutter went on to say he felt it was unfair to raise the ad valorem millage rate to obtain the extra funds needed for the infrastructure work because so few actually pay taxes.

The work in progress budget for the city's general fund is based on 3.5 mills which would make the new budget about \$1,018,393, up from last year's budget of \$977,615. Commissioners did not seem to be in favor of raising the ad valorem tax rate from 3.1055 to 3.5 mills. So the commissioners requested that Brown come back with a budget using the current ad valorem rate of 3.1055 at the September meeting.

Brown announced during the meeting that all employees of the City would be receiving 2.1 percent raise and several employees had received merit raises because of their job performance.

Mayor Glen Thigpen passed the gavel to Vice Mayor Randy Rutter during the meeting to make a motion to give Police Chief Tracy Taylor a \$2,000 raise. Chief Taylor's annual salary increased from \$36,000 to \$38,000. The mayor said he believed Chief Taylor had earned the raise and that he was pleased with his performance in the position.

"It has been a good transition and our police department has a good working relationship with the county sheriff's department," Thigpen said.

The raise for Chief Taylor was passed unanimously.

The Commission also agreed to give City Manager Taylor Brown a three percent raise. Brown's annual salary is currently \$54,075. At the meeting, each commissioner assured the city manager that they are pleased with his management of the City of Trenton.



## Mr. James Marshall Futch


Mr. James Marshall Futch, 85, of Crawfordville, went to be with the Lord on Saturday, Aug. 30, 2014.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF TRENTON, FLORIDA AMENDING ORDINANCE NUMBER 2013-05 ESTABLISHING THE RATES AND EXEMPTIONS FOR REFUSE PICK-UP; REQUIRING CUSTOMERS TO UTILIZE 96 GALLON UNIFORM CONTAINERS FOR ALL RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL HAND COLLECTION PICK-UP AS PROVIDED TO THE CUSTOMERS BY THE GARBAGE CONTRACTOR FOR THE CITY; SPECIFICALLY REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 2013-05, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

**WHEREAS,** the Board of Commissioners of the City of Trenton, Florida following discussion in regular meeting duly assembled, has determined that it is necessary to establish new garbage fees charged to its customers in order to keep pace with the garbage collection fees charged to the City by its garbage collection contractor; and

**WHEREAS,** establishment of such new garbage rates requires enactment of an ordinance prescribing such rates to be charged;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF TRENTON, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:**

**Section 1. Levy of garbage collection fees:**

There is hereby imposed and levied upon users of services provided by the City of Trenton, fees for the collection of garbage as follows:

(A) Residential and churches hand collection pick-up, two (2) pick-ups per week, 96 gallon cans **\$23.65** per month;

(1) All residential account holders who are 65 years old or older and whose total household income does not exceed the Federal poverty level guidelines shall be exempt from payment of the garbage collection fee.

(B) Commercial and churches with Schools/Soup Kitchens:

(1) Hand collection, two (2) pick-ups per week, 96 gallon cans **\$34.06** per month;

(2) Dumpsters:

1-8 yd. container 2 times a week = **\$580.74** per month;

1-8 yd. container 1 time a week = **\$311.32** per month;

1-6 yd. container 2 times a week = **\$456.68** per month;

1-6 yd. container 1 time a week = **\$228.35** per month;

1-4 yd. container 2 times a week = **\$310.10** per month;

1-4 yd. container 1 time a week = **\$155.04** per month;

1-2 yd. container 2 times a week = **\$155.04** per month;

1-2 yd. container 1 time a week = **\$77.52** per month;

(3) The following services are offered on an elective basis for use with a commercial dumpster at the following designated fees:

a. Locking device **\$7.00** per month;

b. Deodorizing 1 time a week **\$1.00** per container,

per month.

**Section 2. Customers Required To Utilize 96 Gallon Uniform Containers for**

**Hand Collection Pick-up.**

Each customer of Trenton's garbage service, both residential and commercial, are hereby required to utilize 96 gallon uniform containers for all residential and commercial hand collection pick-up, and such containers shall be provided to the customer by the garbage contractor for the City. Following delivery and placement of such uniform containers into service, no other type of container shall be allowed, utilized, or placed for hand collection pick-up by the City garbage contractor.

**Section 3. Penalties for violation.**

Any person violating or refusing to comply or to pay the fee levied shall be penalized by the City discontinuing all services to such person or the property of such person, firm or corporation, until all back payments are made in full and the account is brought to a current status. Upon any such default the City shall also require a deposit equal to the estimated average of one and one-half months for such service, or payment in advance at the option of the City, where the owner or occupant has refused or failed to pay for such services within thirty (30) days after the same becomes due. Additionally, the City may refer any violation of this ordinance to its Code Enforcement Officer for enforcement proceedings through the City Code Enforcement Board System, or the City may at its option discontinue any other utility service to the customer until compliance with this ordinance.

**Section 4. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances.**

This Ordinance repeals Ordinance Number 2013-05, and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

**Section 5. Severability.**

If any provision or portion of this Ordinance is declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be void, unconstitutional, or unenforceable, then all remaining provisions and portions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

**Section 6. Effective date.**

This Ordinance shall become effective upon final reading and approval by the City Commission of the City of Trenton, Florida, on October 1, 2014 as provided by law.



The Trenton Tigers knew they would be in a battle Friday night when the Lafayette Hornets brought wet and rainy conditions to "The Jungle".

It was a hard fought game and the Tigers were victorious.

Head coach Andrew Thomas complimented the team as they knelt at midfield following the 17-14 victory.

"Tonight you came through, played tough and are winners," Thomas said.

In the third period Mayo's Bryce Lee connected with Logan Hewett on a 30-yard pass to get the Hornets on the scoreboard. The Hornets fans were raging as their team made the score 10-6. The Tigers offense was reduced to the run and yardage was tough when Cheevers slipped through the heart of the Hornets defense as he became wide open by himself as he ran 41 yards for the score of the game. Mannerstedt added the kick to give the Tigers a more comfortable 17-6 lead.

Midway through the final period Lee and Hewett connected again for a second score. The Hornets' Will Boney ran for the 2-point conversion to close the Tiger's lead to 17-14.

With just over 2 minutes left in this game, Lee attempted an offense push through the air. The Mayo quarterback was looking for an open receiver when freshman linebacker Randy Fuller intercepted the pass to seal the victory for the Tigers. The Tigers sideline and fans were in an uproar as the hope of victory became a reality.

Andrew Thomas told the Tigers they did a great job tonight, this was a tough game and the Tigers came out on top.
