HCSO: Internet Predator Jailed

A South Carolina man allegedly used an Internet chat room to prey on a vulnerable young Hardee County girl.

After being alerted to the alleged crime by the child's grandparents, detectives with the Hardee County Sheriff's Office investigated the matter and ultimately secured an arrest warrant for Freddie James Clark, 28, of Greenville, S.C.

Sheriff's Maj. Randy Dey said

Clark was arrested on the Hardee warrant by Greenville authorities last month. He was taken into custody on the third-degree felony charge of making obscene communications.

He has remained incarcerated in South Carolina, awaiting extradition to Florida and Hardee

County. Dey said he is expected to be booked into the Hardee County Jail by Friday of this week.

Dey said the Hardee County Sheriff's Office contracts with private transport providers for such out-of-state transfers, finding it the most economical

method of moving suspects outside of Florida.

According to a complaint affidavit filed by Det. David Drake, the 13-year-old Zolfo Springs girl accessed the Internet in search of help concerning her suicidal thoughts. She found, he said, a suicide help chat room

on Facebook.

There, Drake said, she first came into contact with Clark.

Investigation allegedly revealed contacts between the two spanning the period of time from May 4 to July 17, Drake said.

It's The Law!

New Laws Dealing With Schools, Crime Took Effect Oct. 1

Over two dozen Florida laws became effective on Wednesday.

While 158 other new laws, including the 2014-15 state budget, went into effect at the start of the state fiscal year on July 1, another 32 went into effect on Oct. 1. The only one vetoed by the governor was a proposed law allowing the Florida Department of Transportation to raise speed limits on some highways by five miles per hour.

Gov. Rick Scott signed a new law that prohibits schools from disciplining students who play with simulated weapons, including fashioning a gun from a Pop Tart, which got an 8-year-old Maryland boy suspended last fall.

State Sen. Greg Evers, who sponsored the new law, said it would prevent unnecessary suspensions. He cited an incident when two children were reading a book with a picture of a Wild West show and one person in it had a gun. One child said he had a cap gun at home that looked the same. He was sent to the principal and expelled.

Other recent laws also affect the schools. House Bill 485 significantly increases the penalties for teachers and other school authority figures who take advantage of students sexually.

Senate Bill 864, approved this summer, requires schools to set up a process through which parents can contest the selection

Slaughterhouse Hopes To Expand

A Zolfo Springs slaughterhouse is seeking a waiver to expand its facility to increase the number of animals that can be processed in the plant by about 25 percent.

Florida Beef is asking the Hardee County Commission to allow the company to add 3,500 square feet to its existing building, situated on 1.89 acres zoned for agriculture at 441 SR 64 E.

The facility, which has operated as a slaughterhouse on and off for a number of years with various owners, was reopened as Florida Beef under current owner Clay Lee in 2003.

It currently processes about 150 head of cattle per day.

It employs 70 people and could add an additional 10 employees if allowed to expand the business to slaughter up to 200 head per day.

The crowded facility cur-

rently limits the company from utilizing some portions of the carcass, which can amount to about \$65 per head of usable products being wasted.

Most of the expansion would increase the size of the cooler space by making it taller, and would not add to the overall footprint of the facility.

Neighboring property owners have some concerns about the expansion, mainly noise and odor related. Commissioners wanted more

time to think about the situation and continued the hearing until 10 a.m. today (Thursday).

Paul Cutchen, whose property adjoins Florida Beef, said sometimes when the wind blows out of the northwest it "smells like you pulled the lid off a septic tank." He feels increasing the number of animals going through the plant will only make the problem worse, unless the wastewater system is addressed. He said in the past he has

Lunn Wins In BG Election

Long time coach and educator Herbert C. "Cliff" Lunn, Jr. on Tuesday was elected city commissioner in Bowling Green, winning by a margin of 77-10 over minister Charles Ray "Chuck" Dixon.

Lunn will take office on Tuesday, October 14, the next regular city commission meeting. He will replace educator Stuart Durastanti who decided not to seek re-election after two terms. Durastanti is assistant principal at Bowling Green Elementary School.

The city has 1,100 registered voters. The turnout was just under eight percent. In the precinct west of Highway 17, Lunn won 43-8. In the precinct east of Highway 17, he won 34-2.

Lunn has lived in Bowling Green 38 years and resides at 4645 Freeman Ave. He and wife, Jeanette, have three children, Heidi, Clifton and William and two grandsons.

2 In The Running For ZS Seat

Another candidate has emerged for a single open seat on the Zolfo Springs Town Commission.

Now, the race is on between incumbent Juan Otero and Sergio Jimenez Jr.

The town, which switched to a four-day work week on Sept. 1, held a four-day qualifying period for potential candidates to fill Seat 1 on the commission.

By Wednesday morning of last week, only incumbent Otero had applied.

But before the close of the filing period at 5 p.m. on Thursday, Otero drew an opponent in Jimenez.

Otero is a long-time commissioner, and currently serves as the town's mayor as well.

Jimenez is a political newcomer in the town.

Both men will wage their campaigns in the next few weeks, trying to sway the town's registered voters into their respective camps.

That municipal election will be held on Monday, Oct. 27, at Town Hall.

of certain textbooks and classroom materials.

Another one involving schools mandates simplifying the formula for grading schools, and does away with penalties for grades in the 2014-15 school year, considering it a transitional year in school grading.

HB 989 increases the felony penalties for people who live off the proceeds of others through prostitution or when crimes involve the trafficking of children. The law prohibits minors from working in adult theaters, and requires adult theaters to verify the ages of all employees.

That law creates a new third-degree felony for those who permanently brand trafficking victims, and removes a Statute of Limitations for human-traf-

ficking violations.

SB 526 and SB 528 made wide-ranging changes at cracking down on sex offenders, including toughening sentences and strengthening registration and reporting requirements for sexual offenders. Two other laws targeting sexual predators and offenders went into effect on July 1.

Another key bill among the new ones effective Oct. 1 is HB 59, which calls for people who attack a pregnant woman to be charged with crimes against unborn children, regardless of the term of pregnancy.

SB 224 bans the sale of electronic cigarettes to minors, similar to bans on sale of other tobacco products to children.

Finally, HB 427 increases the penalty for burglars who cross county lines to commit break-ins and then quickly flee to nearby counties.

County Manager Lex Albritton said he has made site visits to the facility during the night, and agrees there is an awful odor at times.

Albritton said the smell is from the wastewater system not functioning properly. "If you put the money into the system, you can fix it and eliminate the septic smell," he said.

Perry Knight, who was hired by Florida Beef in July to make the plant more efficient and compliant with industry audit standards, said the company began taking steps to address the wastewater system last week.

"I am going to work very hard to be a good neighbor," he said.

He went on to say he feels the issue can and will be corrected, in addition to some sort of barrier being put in place to cut down on the noise levels coming from the plant.

Knight said expanding the facility is imperative for the success of Florida Beef to continue in Hardee County. "We are going to grow, and we want it to be here," he said.

Commissioner Grady Johnson said he felt the company was very important to the local ranchers and would have devastating effects if it left the county.

"If there was no noise and smell I would be fine with it," Cutchen said, "I would like some sort of assurance things will be done properly."

Johnson made a motion last week to approve the requested waiver but could not get a second and the motion died.

Commissioner Mike Thompson then made a motion to delay the decision by a week and gather more information. He requested the company bring an engineer to assure the commission the odor problem can be controlled, and wanted the owner present to assure it will be done.

"We want to keep Florida Beef here," he said before making the motion to continue the meeting to 10 a.m. on Oct. 2.

The motion was passed by a 5-0 vote.

Maj. Dey alleged the man first portrayed himself as a 16-year-old while conversing with the young teen. Later, Clark reportedly said he was 17, and ultimately admitted — on May 27 — to being 28 years old.

Clark allegedly led the 13-year-old into sexually explicit messaging back and forth, the major charged. Conversations revolved around cutting themselves and each other, and licking the blood. They also involved sexual acts.

Further, sheriff's authorities here allege, Clark escalated the talks, telling the girl what he wanted to do with her if they were to meet in person. Then, Dey said, he asked where the closest bus station to the girl's home was, and talked about coming to be with her or sending her money for a bus or plane ticket for her to come to him.

Dey said the girl's grandparents became aware of the Facebook activity and alerted authorities. He said detectives here have attended schools on such Internet crimes, and have been trained in portraying a teenager online.

With detectives taking over conversations with Clark on Facebook, however, Clark became suspicious.

Dey said the suspect even called the child's home, telling the grandfater he was a Greenville law enforcement officer and then claiming that in South Carolina, if individuals "tell each other they loved each other, then the laws were null and void."

Dey said lacking sufficient

cause to obtain an arrest warrant for Clark, detectives Drake and Andrew McGuckin traveled to South Carolina to interview him. During that interview, he said, Clark confessed to the crime.

The detectives traveled back to Hardee County, where the arrest warrant was issued. It was served in Greenville and Clark was held for transport here.

"We sent people out of state because we thought this was very important," Dey said. He said the Sheriff's Office firmly believed Clark to be a threat to the child.

"If the communication had not been stopped by the grandparents, it is very likely Clark would have traveled here to meet the child or she would have ran away to meet him," Drake concluded in his report.

Dey said the Sheriff's Office is keenly aware of the dangers presented to children online, and continues to caution parents and grandparents to strictly monitor youngsters' Internet and Facebook activity.

- a proclamation declaring October as "Let's Talk Month."
- submitting a mosquito control grant for the fiscal year 2015, which began Oct. 1.

School Board May Add A 4th School Resource Officer

Hardee County schools are becoming safer and safer.

At Thursday's School Board meeting, members voted to approve a contract with the Hardee County Sheriff's Office to have two school resource officers at Hardee Senior High and one at Hardee Junior High.

Initially, one SRO was provided for HHS when the program first began in February of 2009. In October of that same year the board approved a second SRO at the school. It wasn't until March of 2012 that the board contracted a third SRO, this time for HJH.

Now the board has approved continuing with deputies Daniel Gibson and James Adler at HHS and Eric Harrison at HJH.

It will cost the board \$81,037 for HHS and \$40,518 for HJH. The contract started on Oct. 1 and continues until Sept. 30, 2015.

And thanks to a grant given to the HCSO, there is now a chance to have a fourth SRO as a "floater" for two of the elementary schools, Hilltop and North Wauchula. The "floater" would go between both schools periodically whenever needed.

The grant is for a total of \$25,000 over a course of three years.

Sheriff Arnold Lanier attended the meeting and said he would like to get the SRO in the schools by December, but needs additional funding from the board.

The board talked about the benefits of having another SRO patrol these elementary schools, and although Chairman Thomas Trevino said it is sad that SROs are necessary, he is glad that the schools are protected.

The members said they would review the sheriff's request and then make a decision at the next board meeting, scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 9.

Wauchula Elementary currently has an SRO, Ofc. Amy Drake, that is funded by the Wauchula Police Department. Zolfo Springs Elementary and Bowling Green Elementary do not have SROs, however the police departments in their towns regularly patrol the schools.

Gas Prices Stay At Same Level

Gas prices remained relatively stagnant last week, falling a mere three-hundredths of a cent nationwide.

Refinery outages in both Canada and Texas caused the steady decline in gasoline to come to a halt and even spike in some markets. The Pensacola metro area in Florida saw a six-cent rise in the average price of gas.

"Refinery maintenance, especially in the Gulf, is causing the tightening of supplies in some areas," said Josh Carrasco, spokesman, AAA - The Auto Club Group. "As a result of these refinery issues, the downward pressure on gas prices motorists saw earlier in the month has stopped."

Several companies in the Gulf region, home to over 40 percent of U.S. refining capacity, announced unplanned maintenance, significantly reducing output from the area. These outages come as other refineries in the region are conducting seasonal maintenance.

According to the U.S. Department of Commerce, the economy grew at its fastest rate in two years in the second quarter of 2014. The report helped oil prices rise for the second straight week. West Texas Intermediate crude rose \$1.13 this week to close at \$93.54 a barrel on Friday.

"Overall, motorists are still seeing value at the pump," said Carrasco. "Gas prices are at a seven-month low and we expect gasoline to continue trending downward in the coming months. High domestic oil production here in the U.S. should continue placing downward pressure on oil and gasoline."

The current national average for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline is \$3.340, down a fraction of a cent from last week. Prices fell one cent this week in Tennessee to \$3.127 a gallon. In Florida prices remained relatively the same, with gas averaging \$3.288 a gallon.

PORK CHOPS WITH APPLE PAN CHUTNEY

A crisp autumn evening is the perfect time to enjoy these sweet-and-sour apple pork chops. Accompanied by roasted potatoes, this dish becomes a comforting cool-weather meal.

- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 4 (about 5 ounces each) 3/4-inch thick boneless pork loin chops, trimmed
- Salt and ground black pepper
- 2 large (about 1 pound) Golden Delicious apples, cored, each cut into 12 wedges
- 1 medium yellow onion, sliced
- 1/4 cup dried cranberries
- 2 teaspoons peeled, grated fresh ginger
- 3/4 cup apple cider or apple juice
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar

1. In nonstick 12-inch skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat until hot. Add pork; sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cook pork about 8 minutes or until browned on the outside and still

slightly pink on the inside, turning over once. Transfer pork to platter; cover with foil to keep warm.

2. Reduce heat to medium-low. To same skillet, add apples, onion, dried cranberries, ginger, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cover skillet and cook mixture about 8 minutes or until apples and onion are tender and lightly browned, stirring occasionally.

3. Remove cover and add apple cider and vinegar; heat to boiling over medium-high heat and cook until juice reduces slightly, about 2 minutes. To serve, spoon apple chutney over pork. Serves 4.

Hardee Countians On 6 Rodeo Teams at Manatee

There are times when I think Fate is telling me not to attend a rodeo, and the Manatee County ranch rodeo held this past spring was one of those!

First, I missed the exit and went about 10 miles too far south. When I pulled in the parking area, they were already announcing the teams in the Grand Entry, as I had been given the wrong starting time. It was the day before Easter, and a cold breeze was coming off the water, leaving us all scrambling for jackets by the end of the first event — not only did I not have a jacket, I wore a short-sleeve shirt!

Fortunately, it was an action-packed ranch rodeo, and fun to watch!

Hardee County was present on six of the 15 teams that were competing.

Cummings Cattle had Cole Corson, Justin Peebles and Lacey Cumbee, and Switch Ranch had Peck Harris, Matt Carlton, Robert Fussell and Jesse Gattis. Brandon Dieter gave a helping hand to the SMR team, while Marshall Godsey did likewise for the Rocking KP team. Christy Newsome stepped in at the last minute as the cowgirl on the Audubon Ranch team (whose usual roster was not present, with Dennis Carlton Jr. out with a leg injury). Last (but certainly not least!) was Paula Scott on the OP Cattle team — she is the wife of FINR cowboy James Scott (who was one of the judges).

The first event was the team sorting. The bovines won this one, with only three teams being able to complete it, with Switch Ranch being one of them, having sorted out their three consecutively numbered calves in 1:04, good enough to win the event! This is where Matt Carlton gets to show off his talents!

Then the action changed over to roping — with the team doc-

toring, where they must both head and heel the steer, in order for the "doctoring" to be done (the female team member must mark its head with chalk).

The teams fared much better, with nine teams completing the event. Marshall's team (Rocking KP) had a time of 40 seconds flat, but had a penalty of five seconds for only heeling one hind leg. Switch Ranch was in at 47 seconds flat (also with a five-second penalty), but was then disqualified, as they failed to remove the rope from the saddle horn.

The roping and branding event was up next. This is one of the ones where the brander has to run out to the calf, brand it, then run back to the branding circle, when the time stops. Usually it is the female team member doing the branding, so if the cowboys have any smarts, they will lead the calf over to the branding circle once they have roped it!

With all the ropers on his usual team, Marshall Godsey rarely puts a rope in his hand, but for the Rocking KP team, he was helping out with the roping duties. And for this event, he led the team to a time of 56.0 seconds.

Also doing a lot of the roping was Paula Scott, but her team (OP Cattle) received a no-time in this event. The Cummings Cattle team likewise received a no-time, but it was fun to watch Justin Peebles hit the ground as he got pulled off of his horse! And Switch Ranch got the job done in 47.0 seconds.

Then came my favorite event, the double muggin'! OP Cattle

and Audubon Ranch each received a no-time, but all the others got down and dirty and got it done!

Brandon Dieter (who was also on roping duty for the day) and the SMR team had a time of 1:02, as did the Switch Ranch team, but they got beat out by a fraction of a second, with the winning time being 1 minute flat. Rocking KP had a time of 1:49, and Cummings Cattle 2:07. Once the steer is roped, I concentrate on the steer, and get to watch Robert Fussell overshoot the animal, as he somersaulted past it! Thanks, Robert, for the entertainment!

This ranch rodeo has its own special event for the finale — the woods-tying. A fence post is pounded into the ground, and the steer must be roped, led over to the post, then tied to it. I never did hear the times for Rocking KP and SMR, but OP Cattle's steer came untied. Cummings Cattle finally had a good run, with a time of 36.0 seconds, and Switch Ranch came in at 56.0 seconds.

Switch Ranch was our only winner for the day. And a three-year run was ended as the Top Hand award went to a Hendry County cowboy (with Peck Harris having won in 2013, Brandon Dieter in 2012, and Trae Adams in 2011).

- It was British Prime Minister Winston Churchill who made the following sage observation: "A lie gets halfway around the world before the truth has a chance to get its pants on."



In Other Action

The Hardee County School Board approved the following Action Agenda items during its 30-minute meeting. All members were present. The items included:

—the Hardee County Education Foundation's officers, which are Jerold Knight as president, Arnold Lanier as vice president, Gloria Davis as secretary and Carol Ackerly as treasurer.

—the Hardee County Education Foundation audit report for fiscal year 2013-14, which shows the net position decreased by \$13,682 to \$173,123.

—changes in the contract for the Wildcat Stadium press box renovations. The original price for renovations was \$82,393, but due to five change orders costing \$19,752, the final price increased to \$102,145.

The following items on the Consent Agenda were approved with a single vote:

—use of facilities requests from the Hardee YMCA for the old junior high gym from Oct. 13 to Jan. 11, 2015, and from the Fellowship of Christian Athletes for the HJH gym for the "Field of Faith" event on Oct. 8.

—purchase orders greater than \$25,000 that include 7,422 gallons of diesel at \$3.38 for \$25,119; and classroom book sets for all elementary schools and HJH for \$31,704. These purchases, among others, totaled \$501,073.

—districtwide property inventory results for fiscal year 2013-14. The spring inventory check conducted from April through June saw that of the 1,764 property items, 1,615 were found. The board approved the inventory results in June, but asked to be updated again once more items were found. A list of remaining missing items will be sent to each school to try to account for them.

—the removal of property with a value of \$1,000 or more from inventory that included two items totaling \$9,166.80.

—supplemental financial information for the month of August which states the unassigned fund balance is estimated to be about \$5.3 million by June 30, 2015.

—the resignation of teacher Joan Risner from Hilltop Elementary, the hirings of teachers

Kanisha Blandin, Adam Cartwright and Mark Murray at HHS, and the transfer of Tammy Miller from HES to HJH.

—substitutes Mary Ann Decent, Eve Avila, Susan Cartwright, Mary Cimmino, Michelle Durrance, Anna Gardella, Yuri Gutierrez, Laura Hernandez, Belinda Malloy, Sylvia Martinez, Robin Ogg, Teretta Sconyers, Vickie Trammell and Josephine Valadez.



Wildcats Beat Bulldogs; Booker Awaits Thursday

The Hardee Wildcats beat the Frostproof Bulldogs on their Homecoming 21-14 in a rain-soaked game Friday night.

Hardee improved to 2-2 for the season after winning two in a row. The Cats begin District 13 competition in a rare Thursday night game at Sarasota Booker. Kickoff from Tornado Alley Stadium in Bradenton will be at 7:30.

In last week's game, the Cats scored first after Kaleel Gaines fumbled on the second play from scrimmage. Trequan Holley pounced on the loose ball at the Bulldogs' 30-yard line.

Keyonte Holley ripped off a 15-yard first-down run before quarterback Hayden Lindsey found senior fullback Tyler Bragg open in the end zone for a 6-yard touchdown. Rodrigo Rodriguez made the PAT. Hardee led 7-0 with 8:22 left in the first quarter.

Frostproof picked up one first down on its next possession before being forced to punt. A bad pitch cost the Wildcats 15 yards and ended the drive, forcing a punt back to the Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs took over at the Wildcat 44-yard line after a 35-yard punt.

After a 12-play drive, Frostproof got on the board with a D'Angelo Gaines 2-yard run up the middle on fourth down. The PAT tied the game at 7-7 with 10:58 left in the half as the rain began to intensify.

Both teams traded punts on their next two possessions before Hardee took over at its 45 with 5:31 left in the half.

Lindsey had an 11-yard run around left end and another for 10 yards to pick up two quick first downs.

Holley then broke free up the middle for a 27-yard touchdown. Rodriguez made the PAT. The Wildcats led 14-7 with 3:33 left in the second quarter.

The lead did not last long as Kaleel Gaines broke loose and ran down the left sideline for a

This time he got off a good kick but the returner could not hold onto the ball and Omar Santiago was there to recover it at the Bulldogs 17.

Holley ran up the middle and once again fumbled the wet ball and Frostproof recovered just before the third quarter came to a close.

The Bulldogs picked up one first down before Keyonte Holley, Trequan Holley and Ryan Ramirez teamed up to sack Gaines for an 8-yard loss and force another punt.

Hardee took over at its 33-yard line with 9:09 left in the game.

The Cats picked up two quick first downs on runs by Parker Carlton to move into Bulldog territory.

A personal foul penalty for a hit to the helmet gave the Cats another first down to the 24. Holley ran for another first down to the 10 before facing second-and-goal from the 6.

Holley ran up the middle and appeared to be stopped but the whistle never was blown and he kept driving toward the end zone. His teammates helped push the entire pile across the goal line for the touchdown.

Rodriguez made the PAT and Hardee led 21-14 with three minutes to go.

Frostproof drove into Hardee territory before fumbling with a few seconds left to preserve the victory.

Lozano Fights Friday Night

Bowling Green boxer Daniel Lozano hopes his fight Friday night will lead to a world championship bout.

Lozano is fighting Jonathan Vidal, the current World Boxing Organization Jr. Bantamweight Latino champion. Lozano recently won the Interim WBO Latino title. (The interim automatically moves up to champion if the champion defaults or loses).

Lozano, "El Alacron" wants to win the 115-pound Latino title outright and earn a shot at the WBO Jr. Bantamweight world champ Omar Narvaez of Argentina.

Friday night's fight will be the main event televised live on Boxeo Telemundo, available about 10:30 p.m. locally. It will be at the A La Carte Event Pavilion in Tampa under All-Star Pro-

motions. Lozano recently signed with All-Star Promotions and won his Aug. 1 bout with an eighth-round KO over Antonio "El Tostado" Garcia, who came in with a 13-2 record, 6 KOS against Lozano's 11-1, 8 KOs.

Interestingly, Vidal recently lost to Garcia, who had gone toe-to-toe against the champion Narvaez and lost.

With wins over Garcia and Vidal, the 24-year-old Lozano could well be in line for a bout against Narvaez, who will be 37 years old on Oct. 7. He carries a 42-1-2 record with 23 KOs. Lozano's is now 12-1 with 9 KOs.

The Bowling Green boxer has recently received new gear from both Amber Sports and GGG (Give God Glory) Sports, which he feels has helped improve his presentation.

His last bout on Boxeo Tele-

mando brought 529,000 viewers to the channel. Two years ago, it was bringing in only 100,000 to 150,000. Lozano hopes this week's fight will top the 700,000 mark and he will be able to demand a higher per fight amount during contract negotiations. "If they make more money, I should be able to get a bit more," he said.

Another local boxer, Edner "Cherry Bomb" Cherry also has an upcoming fight. He will be in Philadelphia on Oct. 18 to face Jerry Belmonte in a 10-round co-main event seen on NBC Sports about 9 p.m.

Belmonte comes in at 19-5 with 5 KOs, while Cherry is at 32-6 with 17 KOs. He also had two draws and one "no contest" when he knocked out his opponent as the bell rang and it was ruled after the bell but the other fighter could not continue.

Ridge Area Arc will offer a SafeStaff Foodhandler Certificate program this month.

It will be held from 5:30 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 28, at Ridge Area Arc's main campus, 120 W. College Dr., Avon Park.

The Food Handler Training Program is a service provided to the community by Ridge Area Arc, which serves Hardee and Highlands counties.

The busy season is soon approaching for the food industry, and now is the time to make sure food handlers are properly trained and certified.

Anyone in the food service industry or those who are interested in working in the field and want to obtain a certificate can enroll in this class. It will be taught by a certified professional food manager.

Florida law requires all food service employees to be trained in an approved food safety program. A public food service establishment has 60 days from the date of hire to train its employees with a Florida-approved food safety training program. This includes all employees responsible for food storage, preparation, display or any service of food and beverages.

The class will cover the six mandated key food safety principles:

- 1.) Ensuring proper personal hygiene;
- 2.) Preventing cross-contamination;
- 3.) Controlling time and temperature when handling food;
- 4.) Proper cleaning and sanitizing;
- 5.) The causes and effects of

major foodborne illnesses; and 6.) Ensuring proper vermin control.

A study guide will be provided to each student. A certificate and an original wallet card will also be presented to the students at the end of the class and will be valid for three years. Students only need to bring to class a No. 2 pencil and a picture ID.

Cost is \$15 per student and must be paid in advance by 5 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 13. Checks can be made payable to Ridge Area Arc and mailed to 120 W. College Dr., Avon Park, FL 33825. Include your name, birthdate, address and phone number.

They won their home meet Sept. 16 against Frostproof. At a tri-meet at Avon Park on Sept. 18, the girls placed second and the boys tied for second. The meets of Sept. 23 and Sept. 25 were both rained out.

This week, there was a quad-meet at Sebring on Tuesday. Next week, it's a home meet on Oct. 7 for Senior Night with an unusual 6 p.m. start. The teams will participate in the two-day Heartland Invitational on Oct. 17-18, preparing for the District 9 meet in Avon Park on Oct. 27. Other teams in the district are Bayshore, Booker, Southeast, Lemon Bay, Sebring and Avon Park.

The Region 3 meet is at the Long Center at Gibbs High in St. Petersburg, with the diving on Nov. 7 and swimming on Nov. 8. The Class 2A state meet is on Nov. 14 at Sailfish Splash-part Aquatics Athletics Center in Stuart, hosted by Jensen Beach and South Fork high schools.

Boys

Hardee squads placed second and third in the opening event, the 200 medley relay. Mario Gomez, Vaughn Kirkland, Jared Scheel and Livingston Metayer were behind them for third place.

With Frostproof and Avon Park each using four lanes, it was a busy 200 freestyle, with Hardee taking second with Kyle Choate and third with Carlos Garcia. Scheel and Joseph Crawford were also in it.

In the 200 individual medley (I.M.), Zeigler placed second.

For the 50 free, it was again four apiece. Spencer won with the best time of .23 seconds and Brandon Franks was second in 27.44 seconds. Gomez and

Metayer were the other Hardee swimmers.

Franks was second in diving with 238.15 points, with Keith Choate third.

Lovett won the 100 butterfly in 59.21, with his Frostproof opponent at 1:18.82.

Hardee went ahead in the first event, the 200 medley, with Haley Edenfield, Brooke Conley, Alex Johnson and Desiree Ford getting first place and two other squads getting third and fifth.

Edenfield turned around and won the 200 free in a time of 2:39.88, with Caitlin Dufresne a close second in 2:49.93.

Ford won the 200 I.M. over four Frostproof girls. Johnson took the 50 free with Madison Marple second and Kaylee Hogenauer sixth among the seven swimmers.

Reyna Kirkland won the diving with 200.45 points, more than her three opponents.

Johnson was second in the 100 butterfly.

Victoria Borjas won the 100 free in 1:11.00 with Danielle Weeks in third place of six swimmers.

Dufresne turned around and won the 500 free, with Monica Graham in second place of six swimmers.

For the 200 freestyle, it was Edenfield, Conley, Johnson and Ford in first place and Marple, Weeks, Joley Plegler and Hogenauer second of four squads.

For the 100 back, Edenfield placed first, Dufresne third and Weeks fifth of the six swimmers.

Conley won the 100 breaststroke, with Ford third and Cheyenne Pohl fourth.

In the final event, Dufresne, Pohl, Borjas and Graham combined for first place, while Plegler, Marple, Hogenauer and Weeks placed third. Hardee won the meet 167-91.

Tri-Meet

As always, Lake Placid won the meet. For the girls it was 157, to Hardee's 93 and Avon Park's 82. For the boys, it was Lake Placid 141, and Hardee and Avon Park tied at 93 apiece. Hardee swimmers continued to lower their personal bests in several events.

Girls

Hardee placed fourth and fifth in the 200 medley relay, behind a pair of Lake Placid teams and one from Avon Park, but ahead of one from Avon Park and one from Lake Placid. Edenfield, Conley, Johnson and Ford came in at 2:22.83, with Dufresne, Pohl, Borjas and Kirkland in 27 seconds later.

In the 200 free, Edenfield placed fourth and Pohl was fifth. For the 200 IM, it was Ford with a strong second and Borjas placing sixth. Johnson was second in the 50 free, with Conley fifth of seven swimmers.

Kirkland was second in diving to Avon Park's Tammy Hutchins, but ahead of a pair of Lake Placid divers.

Johnson placed fourth in the 100 butterfly and Ford was second and Borjas fifth in the 100 free. Ford was less than three seconds off the winning time.

In the grueling 500 free, it was Dufresne fourth and Graham sixth. For the 200 freestyle relay, Johnson, Edenfield, Conley and Ford placed third and Kirkland, Marple, Hogenauer and Graham were sixth.

Edenfield and Dufresne went fourth and fifth in the 100 backstroke, while Conley and Pohl were third and fifth in the 100 breaststroke.

In the final event, Hardee's Dufresne, Borjas, Pohl and Graham combined for third in the 400 freestyle relay.

Boys

Lovett got the only first-place for Hardee in winning the 200 IM. Garcia placed sixth. Zeigler was second and Kyle Choate fourth of six swimmers in the 200 freestyle.

The boys started with the 200

medley relay with Keith Choate, Roberts, Garcia and Franks placing fourth and Gomez, Kirkland, Scheel and Crawford sixth.

After the 200 free and 200 IM, Spencer placed second by 25 hundredths in the 50 free. Keith Choate was sixth.

Keith Choate was second with 151.25 in diving, with Franks third at 141.25.

Lovett was less than a second off the winning time in placing second in the 100 butterfly.

Spencer was second and Roberts sixth in the 100 free. Garcia was third in the 500 free.

Hog Hunter Permits Online

District land managers plan to hold a series of hog hunts on Southwest Florida Water Management District lands throughout the year to help reduce the wild hog population.

Wild hogs, which are not native to Florida, feed on roots, tubers and grubs by rooting with their broad snouts and can leave an area looking like a plowed field. They also prey on native wildlife, compete with native species for food and transmit diseases to other wild-life, livestock and humans. Additionally, hogs may facilitate the spread of exotic plant species by transporting seeds and/or providing germination sites through rooting.

The District will use a three-phase hunting system to alleviate and decrease these impacts.

"The three phases are designed to encourage attendance and maximize the effectiveness of the event," said Will Vangelder, the District's Land Management Supervisor.

The District allows hogs to be controlled through hunts when the damage they cause is at unacceptable levels. Damage from hogs is occurring more frequently and with increasing severity.

The first two phases of hunts will have separate registration processes. Top producers from Phase 1 will be awarded free hunts for Phase 2; top producers from Phase 2 will be asked to participate in hog management activities for Phase 3.

All hunts will adhere to the hog-dog format. No still hunts will be available. The program works like this:

Phase 1 Hunts

- Registration will occur 9 a.m. on Oct. 6, 2014.
- Includes six hunts that occur November through December 2014.

- Permits are transferable.
- Top two producers on each hunt will be awarded a non-transferable registration to the same hunt location in Phase 2, free of charge.
- Failure to follow rules or poor behavior issues will disqualify registrant for incentive consideration at the sole determination of District staff.

Phase 2 Hunts

- Registration will occur 9 a.m. on Dec. 15, 2014.
- Includes six hunts that occur January and February 2015.
- Permits are transferable.

- Top two producers on each hunt of Phase 2 will be placed on the District's "top producer" list and will be contacted between March and October 2015 to take part in feral hog management hunts on an as-needed basis, free of charge.

- Failure to follow rules or poor behavior issues will disqualify registrant for incentive consideration at the sole determination of District staff.

Phase 3 "As-Needed" Management Hunts

Management Hunts

- Includes management hunts that occur March through September 2015.

- Only those registrants that qualify as top producers following the Phase 2 hunts will be contacted to take part in management hunts during this period.

- Management hunts offered to top producers will be free of charge and non-transferable.
- All 12 Phase 2 top producers will be offered participation in a minimum of two management hunts throughout the non-hunting season.

The District-managed properties will be temporarily closed to the public during the hog hunts. Only permitted hunters will be allowed access.

Prospective hunters can purchase permits for Phase 1 hunts beginning 9 a.m. Oct. 6 on the District's hognhunts.watermatters.org. Permits will be available on a first-come, first-served basis until they are sold out. The cost is \$75 for each permit.

A complete list of hunts with locations and dates will be available at hognhunts.watermatters.org no later than Oct. 1, 2014. In addition, the site provides maps of the properties and rules of the hunt.

This is the sixth consecutive year for the hunts. Last year's hunts removed 938 hogs during 26 hunts on 11 different tracts of land throughout the District.



Top Wade-Fishing Tips For A Good Day's Catch

Before I became a Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission spokesman, I was a reporter. FWC public information coordinator Stan Kirkland was my lifeline to anything outdoors.

Ever helpful and straightforward, Kirkland exemplifies what it means to be an FWC public information specialist. Kirkland retires this winter after serving the state for just over 40 years.

Kirkland grew up freshwater fishing on Lake Seminole and the Apalachicola River in Jackson County. His saltwater experience was limited until 1978, when he moved to Panama City and met David Barnes, who would introduce him to the world of inshore wade-fishing.

"He showed me where to go, how to fish and the secrets," Kirkland said. "There are some things you need to pay attention

to, and that's what David taught me."

While wade-fishing has plenty of benefits — no-cost shoreline fishing license, anyone can do it, low cost — not needing a boat was a big sell for Kirkland. "I can't tell you how many offshore trips I've said 'thanks but no thanks' to," said Kirkland, who would love to go deep-sea fishing but struggles with intense seasickness.

Today, Kirkland wade-fishes nearly every weekend except during turkey hunting season. "I don't catch every time I go out, all things considered, I do OK," he said. On his most recent trip, he caught two spotted seatrout, five flounder, a Spanish mackerel, and three undersized red drum.

We asked Kirkland to share some of his top wade-fishing tips before he leaves the agency, and here is what he had to share:



Gone Coastal

Watch your tides. Never fish a low tide. High tides can be tricky as well. If the water isn't moving, the bait is not moving. Get a pair of wading shoes or diving boots and wear them religiously. There are a lot of stingrays out there.

Make sure you have a long stringer and let them float away from you. In 25 years, Kirkland only had one problem with a shark coming for his fish, but he says he sure was glad those fish weren't right next to him.

Think like a fly fisherman and "match for the hatch" by using bait on which fish are

feeding. Kirkland prefers finger mullet, alewives and bull minnows.

Don't overfill your bait bucket. You only need 10 to 20 specimens at a time. More than that can kill the bait.

Protect yourself from the sun. Kirkland wears long sleeves, a hat, a Buff and good polarizing sunglasses and says all are a must. Of course, make sure you have something to cover the buttons on your shirt if you plan to use a cast net for bait.

VETERANS' ID CARDS

Q. Where can I get a veteran ID card to use for discounts at restaurants and retailers?

A. Unfortunately, the federal government doesn't issue a veteran ID card for the purpose of discounts at retailers and restaurants. The Department of Defense only issues cards to active duty, current reservists, retired military personnel and their dependents. And the Department of Veterans Affairs only issues cards to veterans who are currently enrolled in the VA health-care system.

However, many states such as Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Texas, North Carolina, Virginia and Michigan have veteran ID cards that can be used to receive discounts from retailers and restaurants. Veterans can request the ID cards from their local Department of Motor Vehicles. The following information is oftentimes required:

- An honorable discharge status from the U.S. Armed Forces.
- A DD214 proving military service that displays branch of service and discharge date and status.
- A valid, unexpired driver license.

Florida also honors Florida veterans with a designation to their driver license or identification card. This feature gives veterans an easy way to show proof of their veteran status, which is not always an easy task. It is "hoped" that retailers and restaurants that offer discounts to military will accept the license with the "V" on it as proof that someone is a veteran.

To add the blue "V" to a Florida license or ID card, veterans can visit any Florida driver license office, to include those operated by county tax collectors.

The Veteran Health Identification Card, issued by the Veterans Administration, is for identification and check-in at VA appointments. It cannot be used as a credit card or an insurance card, and it does not authorize or pay for care at non-VA facilities.

In February 2014, VA began issuing the Veteran Health Identification Card to newly enrolled veterans and enrolled veterans who were not previously issued the old VIC but requested an identification card. As of May, VA has been mailing VHIC to six million enrolled veterans.

Enrolled veterans who do not have the old VIC may contact their local VA medical center's enrollment coordinator to arrange to have their pictures taken for the new cards, or they may request a VHIC at their next VA health care appointment. Veterans must provide proper identification in order to receive the new cards.

Bowden then put green crosses with MU on the back of the helmets to honor the 75 deceased.



Bear Workshops Set Next Week

The Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission is hosting three public workshops this month to discuss management of black bears in south-central Florida.

Under the FWC's Florida Black Bear Management Plan, approved in 2012, seven Bear Management Units will be established throughout the state.

The BMU approach will allow the FWC to manage bears based on the characteristics of bears, people and habitat in different parts of Florida. The first steps are being taken to create the South-Central BMU to manage the bear subpopulation on the Lake Wales Ridge and surrounding areas.

Workshops will offer the public a chance to provide input on local bear issues and allow interested people to sign up to be active members of the South-Central Bear Stakeholder Group. The meetings will be held from 6:30 to 8 p.m. at the following locations:

- Sebring — Tuesday, Oct. 7, Highlands County IFAS Extension Auditorium, 4509 George Blvd.
- Lakeland — Wednesday, Oct. 8, Circle B Bar Reserve, 4399 Winter Lake Road.
- Punta Gorda — Thursday,

Oct. 9, Charlotte Harbor Event Center, 75 Taylor St.

"The workshops will give the FWC a better understanding of the local perspective on bear management in south-central Florida," said Dave Telesco, FWC Bear Management Program coordinator. "Participants at the workshops will have the opportunity to interact more directly with FWC staff than during typical meetings. We will be listening more than talking."

The South-Central BMU includes Charlotte, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee, Highlands, Hillsborough, Indian River, Manatee, Martin, Okeechobee, Osceola, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota and St. Lucie counties.

Five BMUs already have been initiated: West Panhandle, Central, East Panhandle, South and North. Immediately following the completion of the South-Central BMU workshops, the FWC will start the final BMU in the Big Bend.

Florida Crop Update

Week Ending: September 28, 2014
Wet Week for Florida

Weather Summary: According to Florida's Automated Weather Network (FAWN), rainfall ranged from no rain to 7.21 inches this past week. North Port (Sarasota County) received the most rain with 7.21 inches, followed by Bronson (Levy County) with 6.44 inches. Seven locations received five inches of rain, seven locations received four inches of rain, and three locations received three inches of rain. Per the U.S. Drought Monitor, Florida was 59 percent drought free this past week. Temperatures ranged from 57 to 92 across the State. The highest temperature was 92 degrees in Sebring (Highlands County). The lowest temperature in the State was 57 degrees in Jay (Santa Rosa County) and Marianna (Jackson County).

Field Crops: There was an average of 5.8 days suitable for field work, down slightly from the previous week. The frequent rain made field work difficult. Peanut harvest continued in the Panhandle and north Florida but was delayed by heavy rain. Peanut condition was mostly good for the State. Hay was cut in the Panhandle, north, and central Florida this past week. However, the hay could not be baled in locations due to wet conditions. The quality of the hay was lower due to the wet conditions during haying.

Citrus: Rainfall in the citrus producing area this past week was widespread and generally heavy. All stations received some precipitation. Twenty-six stations received more than an inch and four received more than five inches. North Port (Sarasota County) received the most at 7.21 inches, followed by Ona (Hardee County) with 5.47 inches. Wellington (Palm Beach County) recorded the least precipitation with 0.48 inches. Daytime high temperatures were warm, reaching the upper 80s to low 90s in all citrus producing counties. As per the U.S. Drought Monitor, last updated September 23, 2014, abnormally dry conditions exist in the central and western production areas. All other citrus producing regions in Florida remain drought free.

Next season's crop is progressing well. Growers and caretakers are performing irrigation repair, pushing trees, and spraying.

Fruit and Vegetables: Tomato harvest was in full swing in Gadsden County. In Bradford County, strawberries were being planted. Vegetable growers in southwest Florida were running pumps hard to pump water out of fields to maintain favorable conditions. Rain delays caused disruptions in planting schedules.

Fruits and vegetables being planted in Miami-Dade County included green beans, squash, peppers, tomato, bitter melon, boniato, and malanga; being harvested included boniato, malanga, okra, and avocado. Palm Beach County farmers began planting sweet corn, snap beans, and lettuce.

Livestock and Pastures: Pastures in various areas of the State had standing water. Heavy rains in the southern counties of Brevard, Charlotte, Collier, Glades, Hendry, and Lee resulted in significantly flooded pastures. Statewide, the cattle and pasture condition was mostly good.

ZS Tax Millage Stays The Same

Not one citizen of Zolfo Springs attended the public hearing for the town's 2014-15 tentative budget.

All town commissioners were present for the hearing, which took place just before the regularly scheduled commission meeting on Sept. 15. They approved the tentative budget.

The budget for the 2014-15 fiscal year, which began Oct. 1, totals \$1,418,812. This is \$17,298 less than the prior fiscal year. The tax millage rate for the town will remain at 8.5540 mills, which is greater than the rolled-back rate of 8.5263 mills.

The gross taxable value for the town was certified by the Property Appraiser's Office at \$22,394,985.

In the budget, the ad-valorem tax revenue will increase from the 2014 year by \$2,073 to \$181,988. The capital outlay

fund increased significantly, from \$41,031 to \$66,291.

Under the expenses part of the budget, it shows that \$15,800 is expected to pay for overtime, a decrease from last year's \$20,000. Health insurance also decreased, from \$102,465 to \$99,360, and Worker's Compensation lowered from \$10,300 to \$9,317.

Telephone expenses decreased by \$1,300 to \$13,200 while utilities increased by \$11,031 to \$134,800. Office supplies saw a slight increase of \$50 to \$3,050. Postage increased by \$400 to \$4,500, and advertising maintained at \$3,000.

Gasoline saw an \$8,000 decrease at \$22,100 while books and schooling increased from \$5,200 to \$6,600.

Expenses for Hardee Disposal and County Landfill remain at \$59,500 and \$62,500, respectively.

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I'm a bit leery about taking my year-old Lab "Trip" anywhere besides the dog park. But my girlfriend prefers hiking in some of the nearby state parks and keeps inviting me and the dog along. What's your take?

—Chuck in Cleveland

DEAR CHUCK: My take? Grab Trip's leash and go! As long as there are no outright prohibitions on bringing dogs into parks and forest reserves, take advantage of the opportunity to introduce your dog to a new environment.

Go to the park's website before the hike to review any rules regarding dogs. Most of the time you'll be required to keep Trip on his leash while on a trail. Use your discretion in other areas, and make sure Trip is trained well enough to respond to your verbal commands when he's off-leash.

With any hike, but especially

in fall, check the weather forecast. A chilly day may mean putting a pet sweater on Trip, and of course if it's raining you may want to reschedule. Bring water for you and for him, and a disposable or folding bowl (available at camping stores) for him to drink from.

"Central Florida boasts the highest density of bears in the state and can truly be called bear country. But that distinction comes with the responsibility of learning about safely coexisting with bears," Con-nolly said. "Our challenge is getting people to securely store their garbage, so bears don't develop the habit of coming into neighborhoods for an easy meal and instead stay in the forest where they belong."

The free, family-oriented festival at Caldwell Park begins at 9 a.m. and lasts until 4 p.m.

Chocolate With an Accent on Savory

The origins of mole — that famous Mexican sauce that is really a stew — are as deep, complex and rich as the spicy, sweet, nutty multilayered mixture itself. It's rumored that the Spaniards gave mole its name when they misheard the Aztecs refer to the stew as a "mulli." Another story goes that in the 17th century, Dominican sisters in Puebla scrambled to put a meal together for the visiting archbishop. They used the ingredients that they had on hand, such as dried chilies, chocolate and stale bread, to make a sauce for turkey.

Mole can be any or all of those ingredients. The often-intimidating concoction represents a delicious and gorgeous pinnacle of the many cultures that influenced Mexican cuisine, with many pieces of it coming together in one glorious sauce that has many incarnations.

One debated aspect of mole lore is just where in Mexico it originated, and of course, who makes it the best. The fact is, mole is served all over Mexico, and takes on different characteristics depending on where in the country it is made and, ultimately, the taste preferences of the cook preparing it.

Mole is most common in Puebla, relating back to the story of the nuns. But Oaxaca is not to be outdone. It's also the home of complex, distinctive moles. And while there are countless mole variations, there is agreement among most Mexican cooks that there are seven notable recipes. These recipes represent the different colors and tastes of the foundation of every mole, which are chilies. It's also agreed that the traditional Mexican mole is a

special occasion dish, as it takes time and care to create.

Mole Negro is probably the most famous recipe. The almost-black, spicy sauce is what most people have tasted if they've eaten dishes from interior Mexico. Like the Mexican cooks for centuries, you can make your unique rendition of this fascinating dish that celebrates the ingredients of this colorful country. Mole also can be purchased ready-made as a paste or powder, or in jars or cans, but homemade is best.

GINA'S MEXICAN MOLE ENCHILADAS WITH SAUCE

For the Mexican Mole Sauce:
3 tablespoons Ancho chili powder
1/2 teaspoon cumin
1/4 cup peanuts or pine nuts
1/2 medium onion, cut into small chunks
1 clove garlic
1 can vegetable broth or water
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1/4 cup tomato sauce
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 ounce bittersweet chocolate, broken into small pieces

1. Lightly toast chili powder and cumin in dry skillet. Mix toasted spices with the peanuts, onions and garlic in a food processor or blender. Add enough vegetable broth or water to make a thick paste. Set aside.

2. Heat vegetable oil in saucepan. Add the tomato sauce, the processed onion-peanut-spice mixture and the remainder of the vegetable broth or water. Add sugar and cloves. When mixture is heated through, add chocolate.

3. Simmer for 20 minutes on

low heat. Thin with a small amount of water if desired. Set aside for topping enchiladas.

To prepare the Cheese Enchiladas:

1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1/2 cup green onions, sliced
1 teaspoon garlic, minced
3 tomatillos, peeled, washed and diced
4 ounces canned green chilies, chopped
1/2 cup fresh cilantro, chopped
1 tablespoon dried oregano
1 cup vegetable broth
12 large whole-wheat tortillas
1 (15 ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained
1 cup queso fresco or ricotta cheese
8 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, shredded, plus more for sprinkling

1. Heat oven to 350 F.

2. In a large pan, cook the green onions, garlic and tomatillos in the oil until tender. Add the green chilies, the cilantro and the oregano. Continue cooking until the sauce comes to a boil. Reduce the heat to low and continue cooking for 8 to 10 minutes. Pour the sauce into a blender container. Cover and blend on high speed until smooth. Return to saucepan and stir in broth. Cook over medium heat about 15 minutes.

3. Dip each tortilla into sauce. Spoon about 1-1/2 tablespoons black beans, 2 tablespoons of queso fresco or ricotta cheese, and 2/3 ounce Monterey Jack onto each tortilla. Roll tortilla around filling. Place seam side down in 13-by-9-inch baking dish sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Drizzle remaining Mole Sauce over enchiladas. Sprinkle with remaining Monterey Jack cheese.

4. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes until cheese is melted and filling is hot.
