Stay safe during weekend cold snap

Jackson County Emergency Management has issued a freeze watch for late tonight through Sunday morning.

The forecast is calling for temperatures to stay between 28 and 32 degrees for three-to-eight hours. The wind chill will be mid-to-upper 20s Sunday morning.

Freezing temperatures are dangerous for


pets, plants and people who are vulnerable to the cold, so taking precautions is advised.

Some cold-weather precautions recommended by the American Red Cross include wearing layers of lightweight clothing, gloves and a hat to stay warm; and bringing pets indoors or, if they can't come inside, making sure they have enough shelter to stay warm.

Another common bit of advice is to bring cold-vulnerable plants inside.

According to the National Weather Service, Sunday's weather will be sunny and temperatures will eventually reach 52, before dropping down to 31 degrees that night. Monday will also be sunny and the high will be near 61, before dropping down to 40 that night.



Hunting matters spark hot debate

"You're looking at five men who are damned if they do and damned if they don't." Jackson County Commission Chairman Don Price told a standing-room-only group of more than 140 persons on hand Friday in the circuit courtroom to argue — heatedly, as it turned out — the pros and cons of redistricting deer hunting in the county.

Tempers flared, but when it was all over — at least 30 people had their say — the only thing that had changed was the time of day.

The situation most recently emerged on Nov. 27, when about 15 property owners from the northeast part of the county appeared before the county commission and asked for help in controlling deer hunting. They complained of unsafe shooting, trespassing and the use of uncontrolled hunting dogs.

During follow-up at a Dec. 7 meeting, property owners' complaints were met with hunters arguing that most hunters respected others' rights and a small percentage of "black sheep" could be blamed for incidents described by owners.

An ordinance from Gadsden County was used as an example of what might be passed here, but J.M.

Rogers of the Jackson County Conservation Club said his group was opposed to it. Commissioner Fred Williams said he feared it would set a precedent toward restricting the right to bear arms.

A committee was formed to study the issue and possible solutions.

Americans facing the prospect of another "Gasless Sunday" filled their tanks Saturday and rearranged travel plans to avoid getting caught short on the highway.

An Association Press spot check showed the majority of service station owners again planned to comply with President Nixon's request for a voluntary ban on gasoline sales from 9 p.m. Saturday to midnight Sunday.

Last Sunday — the first since Nixon made his plea — about 80 percent of the nation's 220,000 service stations shut their pumps.

In 1958, the anti-communist John Birch Society was formed in Indianapolis.

Ten years ago: A young man once affiliated with a missionary school shot nine people at the school near Denver and a megachurch in Colorado Springs; four of the victims died and the gunman killed himself.

A British Columbia pig farmer accused of being Canada's worst serial killer was convicted of six counts of second-degree murder; he was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility

of parole for 25 years.

Five years ago: U.S. special forces rescued an American doctor captured by the Taliban in Afghanistan; a Navy SEAL, Petty Officer 1st Class Nicolas D. Checque, was killed during the rescue of Dr. Dilip Joseph. Same-sex couples in Washington state began exchanging vows just after midnight under a new state law allowing gay marriage. Mexican-American singer Jenni Rivera, 43, and six others were killed in a plane crash in northern Mexico.

One year ago: The White House said President Barack Obama had ordered intelligence officials to conduct a broad review of election-season cyberattacks, including the email hacks that rattled the presidential campaign and raised fresh concerns about Russia's meddling in U.S. elections. South Korean lawmakers impeached President Park Geun-hye over an explosive corruption scandal, a stunning and swift fall for the country's first female leader.

Aging workers, holiday pathos and Don Henley

During a rare fast food stop amidst a whirlwind day of holiday shopping, we waited while a gray-haired, elderly woman carried our order to us in the drive-thru lane. The woman was thin, almost brittle, but very attentive to her duties.

Though it was a chilly day, she stood patiently next to us as we quickly checked the order. The food was still hot and the order was exactly correct. She seemed pleased that we were well served.

I reached into my purse and found a bill and handed it toward her. She stepped back, raised her

hand, and said, "Oh no, this is part of my job." I pushed the bill at her. "I know," I said, "but we appreciate you, and besides, it's Christmas." Tentatively, she accepted the tip. Then she said, "Thank you so much. It's a wonderful gesture." She was genuinely grateful. I smiled and said, "Happy holidays."

All around us, every day, our peers labor in similar fashion. It is more than pathos; it is the new paradigm of American retirement. Few 70-year-olds working this type of service industry job envisioned that their golden years would include delivering fast food orders

to people parked in drive-thru lanes. But according to a 2017 study by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, almost ten percent of fast food workers are 65 or older. And the median age of fast food workers has climbed to 31.5.

To be sure, it is honorable and honest work. And I applaud anyone who performs a necessary and legal function in our economy. That said, it may not be the type of activity we picture for ourselves, our relatives or our friends at that age. For many, it may be the only job that they can get, or one would surmise they might be employed elsewhere. So what does that say about our economy?

It says that higher educa-

tion and constant retraining is a vital requirement of competing successfully in the job market for workers of all ages. It says that livable pensions are rapidly disappearing. It probably says that many of us haven't saved enough.

And it speaks to a broader economic issue. Every senior holding a fast food job is likely competing with a young person for the same position. That creates more unemployed youth who need to work and to begin paying into the Social Security system so they can earn their own retirement benefits years from now.

State-created property insurer will raise rates

TALLAHASSEE — Florida homeowners who insure their property through a state-created insurance company will see an average 6.6 percent increase in their multi-peril coverage next year, regulators announced Wednesday.

But thanks to Hurricane Irma, the increase will be pushed back three months to May 1. The state Office of Insurance Regulation was supposed to approve Citizen Property Insurance Corporation's rate request in

September, but delayed the decision after the state was slammed by Irma, the first major hurricane to hit Florida since 2005.

The degree to which the rates will increase depends on where property is located. Some of the most populated areas like Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach will see average increases topping 10 percent.

But regulators didn't increase rates in the Florida Keys, the area hit hardest by Irma, instead directing Citizens to analyze lessons learned after the storm.

"The Office of Insurance Regulation's 2018 rate order balances the needs of policyholders facing challenges from Irma with its responsibility to maintain a healthy property insurance market," Chris Gardner, chairman of Citizens' board of governors, said in a news release.

Citizens was created by state legislators to act as the state's insurer of last resort when Floridians cannot get coverage from private companies. Many of the corporations' customers live along the coast or in South Florida.

First black astronaut honored on 50th anniversary of death

CAPE CANAVERAL — America's first black astronaut, Air Force Maj. Robert Lawrence Jr., finally got full honors Friday on the 50th anniversary of his death.

Several hundred people gathered at Kennedy Space Center to commemorate Lawrence, who almost certainly would have gone on to fly in space had he not died in a plane crash on Dec. 8, 1967.

The crowd included NASA dignitaries, astronauts, fellow Omega Psi Phi fraternity members, schoolchildren, and relatives of Lawrence and other astronauts who have died in the line of duty.

Lawrence was part of a classified military space program in the 1960s called the Manned Orbiting Laboratory, meant to spy on the Soviet Union. He died when his F-104 Starfighter crashed at Edwards Air Force Base in California. He was 32.

Astronauts at Friday's two-hour ceremony said Lawrence would have gone on to fly NASA's space shuttles and that, after his death, he inspired all the African-American astronauts who followed him.

Like Lawrence, Robert Crippen was part of the Air Force's program. It was canceled in 1969 without a single manned spaceflight, prompting Crippen and other astronauts to move on to NASA. Crippen was pilot of the first space shuttle flight in 1981.

With a doctoral degree in physical chemistry — a rarity among test pilots — Lawrence was "definitely on the fast track," Crippen said. He graduated from high school at age 16 and college at 20.

"He had a great future ahead of him if he had not been lost 50 years ago today," Crippen said.

Lawrence paved the way for Guy Bluford, who became the first African-American in space in 1983, Dr. Mae Jemison, the first African-American woman in space in 1992, and Charles Bolden Jr., a space

shuttle commander who became NASA's first black administrator in 2009. Next year, the International Space Station is getting its first African-American resident: NASA astronaut Jeanette Epps.

Another former African-American astronaut, Winston Scott, said his own shuttle rides into orbit would not have happened if not for a trailblazers like Lawrence. In tribute to Lawrence, a jazz lover, Scott and his jazz band serenaded the crowd with "Fly Me to the Moon" and other tunes.

Moonlighting of legislative aides may pose conflicts

TALLAHASSEE — Dozens of employees with the Florida Legislature, including the spokesman for House Speaker Richard Corcoran, have been working at jobs outside their taxpayer-paid positions.

While some employees have worked afterhours and weekends as waitresses, tutors, photographers and flight instructors, others have taken the jobs that could raise questions about potential conflicts, according to a review of outside employment permission forms filed since November 2016.

Records requested by The Associated Press show that an aide to a Bradenton legislator was given permission to conduct "social media" work for a consulting company with ties to prominent Republicans such as Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, the leading GOP candidate for governor.

Rep. Jim Boyd said that his aide, Albert Kaminsky, is working after hours for the Sarasota firm Political Insights, on social media aimed at boosting Boyd's profile.

"He's boosting my reputation and presence in the social media sphere," said Boyd, a veteran House member who is leaving office next year but is expected to then run for the state Senate in 2020.

Campaign records show that Political Insights has been paid nearly \$11,000 this year by a political committee linked to Boyd. That same firm has been paid \$45,000 by either Putnam or his committee.

The permission forms show that legislative employees have taken positions with colleges and universities that seek money from the Florida Legislature. One employee in the House clerk's office works for a dog-grooming business owned by a lobbyist. Max Flugrath, who works in the House Democratic Office, got permission to do graphic design work, although in his application he

stated that the clients would be "all non political."

Fred Piccolo, the communications director for Corcoran, had been working until recently for the company that owns Florida Politics, a media organization that extensively covers state politics and the Legislature.

Legislative rules require employees to get approval to do outside work but Piccolo, who is paid \$110,000 a year, did not follow that rule.

Celeste Lewis, the deputy chief of staff for administration in the House, said that Piccolo had "failed to comply" with House policy, but that it "been addressed and corrected with the employee" and that "going forward" he would not engage in outside employment.

Corcoran, a Republican who is expected to run in governor and has at times had a combative relationship with the media, did not comment directly on Piccolo's outside employment.

Norman Lewis, a University of Florida professor of journalism who does research on media ethics, said Piccolo working for Florida Politics raises questions about the site's motives.

"If a political news site wants to be seen as impartial it would want to refrain from paying anyone who fills a political role in their day job," Lewis said. "It's best to leave that a hands-off relationship."

Peter Schorsch, whose company operates the Florida Politics website, said that for more than a year that Piccolo did basic graphic design work for including infographics and was only getting paid a "few hundred" dollars a month. But he said that his news organization did not enjoy a better relationship or have better access than other news organizations that cover Corcoran and the Florida House.

Schorsch also said it was "never my responsibility" to check with the speaker's office about Piccolo's employment status.


Interstate 10 ramp, there's a very large Christmas tree in the middle of a field, standing in isolated glory.

And residents along U.S. 90 in Grand Ridge are also in the spirit of the season. Several homes on the north and south side of that east-to-west track are lit and some running lights have been placed in the branches of natural trees along that route. A large lit cross is also of note on the south side of U.S. 90 not far from Faith Haven Assembly of God, which itself has a nativity scene. As the lighting season continues, the following tips provided by Gulf Power are offered to assist local residents in making sure their displays are safe.

"Whether our customers are following generations of family holiday traditions or starting new ones, it's always good to review safety precautions," said Rick DelaHaya, Gulf Power spokesperson. "If outdoor lighting is part of their holiday traditions, then it's important to know there are some things you can do to safely enjoy this tradition and save some energy."

Here are some basic safety and money-saving tips, courtesy of Gulf Power:

Outside lighting tips

» Make sure you examine all the lights and cords you're planning to use. If

they are damaged, frayed or have cracked wires, toss them or recycle them and buy replacements.

» Make sure your lights are rated for outdoor use. Only use lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, which indicates conformance with safety standards. Only use lights that have fused plugs.

» Make sure to have a plan for the placement of your holiday lighting so that no more than three strands are strung together unless using LEDs. Gulf Power recommends using LED lighting because they use less power, are more efficient and don't get hot, so they are a safer and more efficient choice for homeowners.

» While they may be more expensive, LED lights pay for themselves in the long run since they are cheaper to operate and last longer. Traditional lights such as the C-7 or C-9 lighting cost the most to operate, with each string costing up to \$1 a day

to power.

» Once you have a plan, arrange your decorations so that no outlet is overloaded and no cords will be pinched from going around corners. Be sure to plug lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). This type of outlet will shut the circuit down if there is overcurrent. We want your lights to shine, not sparks to fly!

» If you don't have a GFCI outlet, a qualified electrician can permanently install one outdoors for holiday seasons to come. Or, you can buy a portable outdoor unit from your local home improvement store.

» While decorating the outside of your home, never raise ladders, poles or other extended objects into or near power lines. If you are decorating an outside tree, check to make sure its limbs aren't near power lines. Remember that no power line is safe to touch—ever.

» You can also lower your holiday energy use by putting your lights on a timer. Be sure to use a durable timer that is made to withstand the elements.

» And finally, use caution when removing outdoor holiday lights. Never pull or tug on lights.

Moving the festivities indoors

» When you move the reindeer games inside, remember to do so safely.

While holiday lighting and electrical decorations do contribute to the splendor of the season, they can also significantly increase the risk of fires and electrical injuries if not used safely.

» Always purchase electrical decorations and lights from reputable retailers. Use lights approved for safe use by a nationally recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL).

Around 1890, strings of holiday lights were being mass-produced, but only the wealthy could afford them. At the turn of the 20th Century, they became popular in department stores and eventually, strings of lights were adorning retail shops and government buildings.

» Never connect more than three strands of incandescent lights together. Again, consider purchasing LED lights, which use less energy and run cooler than traditional incandescent lights.

» Before decorating, determine how many outlets are available and where they are located. Plan your displays accordingly. You don't want your guests or elves tripping over extension cords.

» Just like when you decorate outside, make sure you carefully inspect each inside electrical decoration. Cracked or damaged sockets, loose or bare wires and loose connections may cause a serious shock or start a fire.

» Avoid overloading electrical outlets with too many decorations or electrical devices. They can

overheat and cause a fire.

» Always unplug electrical decorations before replacing bulbs or fuses.

» For safety and to help save money, make sure to turn off all indoor electrical decorations before leaving home or going to sleep.

» For peace of mind, make sure to check the batteries in your smoke detectors throughout your house.

A history

While lighting up for winter holidays dates back to ancient times, the tradition of stringing electric lights dates back to 1895 when President Grover Cleveland sponsored the first electrically-lit Christmas tree in the White House.

Around 1890, strings of

also indicated that 73 percent said they wanted to do more about meeting those goals in the future.

AFF is a forest conservation organization that specializes in helping keep family-owned forests productive for wildlife and clean water, as well as for wood supply. Enviva is the world's largest manufacturer of industrial wood pellets.

"We are proud to partner with AFF, TNC, and others to help private forest owners certify their forests as sustainably managed and to restore longleaf pine forests," said Jennifer Jenkins, Enviva's Chief Sustainability Officer. "We have already helped small private forest owners certify more than 22,000 acres under the American Tree Farm System. We are excited to help increase Tree Farm certification and longleaf restoration on private lands in Florida."

The project will begin with a 38-acre demonstration site, created on The Nature Conservancy's Apalachicola Bluffs and Ravines Preserve, where landowners can learn more about the longleaf ecosystem and the practices needed to sustain it. In the surrounding area, landowners will be encouraged to create or improve longleaf pine forests, support forest biodiversity, and become certified in the American Tree Farm System. ATFS is a sustainable forestry certification program specifically designed for family and small forest owners, which is administered by AFF.

"The Conservancy is pleased to demonstrate the lessons we've learned in nearly 30 years of longleaf habitat restoration. Private landowners will be an important part of bringing this imperiled forest back to prominence and that starts with technical assistance," said Brian Pelc, Restoration Project Manager at The Nature Conservancy.

Last year, AFF released the Southern Wildlife At Risk: Family Forest Owners Offer a Solution report,

which found that family forest owners, which own nearly 60 percent of the forests across the South, including in the Florida panhandle, are key to ensuring the sustainability of these woodlands. The report included the percentages mentioned above related to landowner goals.

The research leading to the report also indicated that some landowners were uncertain about whether they are doing all the right things, and cited cost as a barrier to pursuing some of their habitat management goals.

In response to this, AFF launched a series of projects across the South to help landowners overcome these barriers to management, and address some of the major threats impacting wildlife habitat and forest health, such as invasive species, drought and watershed management.

"Landowners want to do right by the land; we hear this from them directly every day," said Tom Martin, president and CEO of AFF. "But not all landowners have the expertise or the funds to implement the practices needed to create healthy forest habitat. But when these barriers are removed – when we provide technical assistance through projects like this, or when they have the needed funds, whether from cost-share assistance or from markets for wood, such as Enviva has created - we see a significant increase in the landowners taking an active role in their forests and in creating the needed habitat for wildlife."

Enviva uses small trees and brush to make wood

pellets and in doing so provides a market for landowners who are working to improve forest health. The company says it needs more of that material, and that the available amount has declined in recent years.

The new partnership with AFF, The Nature Conservancy and other management experts is expected to be a win-win for Enviva and for landowners, those involved in the program say.

Enviva sees a way to help itself by helping landowners, for instance. The company needs lower-value trees to use in creating energy pellets. Landowners need a market for low-value trees.

The harvesting of lower-value trees in the proper manner can promote growth of high-grade trees because doing so leaves more resources available to the more valuable trees, company officials explained. Many stands of longleaf pine have become overgrown in the absence of that managed harvesting tool, they say. As a result, overgrowth shades out the plant community on the forest floor and reduces habitat value.

In helping landowners with this management aspect, Enviva can benefit because planned thinning puts more small-diameter and low-value wood in the marketplace. Landowners can use the income generated by selling their small-diameter and low-value wood to help pay the management costs associated with carrying out their habitat sustainability philosophies.

Enviva Holdings, LP, describes itself as the world's

largest producer of wood pellets, a renewable and sustainable energy source used to generate electricity and heat. Through its subsidiaries, the company owns and operates

plants in the Southeastern United States that produce nearly 3 million metric tons of wood pellets annually, Enviva representatives say. It exports its pellets primarily to power

plants in the United Kingdom and Europe that previously were fueled by coal. The company estimates that it employs roughly 600 people in the rural south.

KNOW before you go below!



The City of Marianna strives to provide safe, reliable natural gas service to our customers, and to ensure the safety of those living and/or working near our gas distribution lines. Because you may live or work in the vicinity of underground gas distribution lines or may be a natural gas customer, we are providing this safety information as part of our Public Awareness Plan.

A critical component of our overall safety program is the Sunshine State One-Call of Florida, Inc. (SSOCOF) system. Before excavation of any kind takes place, State law requires that you call SSOCOF toll free number 8-1-1 so that utility lines can be professionally marked prior to any digging. State law requires you to call at least two full business days (but not more than five) before excavation takes place. Business days exclude weekends and holidays. This service is free of charge and will provide location of ALL underground utilities, not just natural gas. Common excavations requiring notification can run the gamut from complex jobs involving demolition, grading, directional drilling, and other trenchless technologies, to jobs such as pot holes, landscaping, fence and post installation and stump grinding. Yellow flags and/or paint marked on the surface area will be used to identify underground gas lines.

DETECTING A NATURAL GAS LEAK


Natural gas is one of the safest, most reliable and environmentally friendly fuels in use today, but over time leaks can occur. Here are three ways to recognize a natural gas leak:

LOOK: blowing dirt, bubbling creeks or ponds, dry spots in moist areas or dead plants surrounded by green, live plants may indicate a natural gas leak.

LISTEN: An unusual hissing sound near gas lines or appliances may indicate a natural gas leak.

SMELL: natural gas is colorless and odorless. Therefore, a chemical known as mercaptan is injected into the system in order to create a distinct odor, which is useful in leak detection.

If you have questions or concerns regarding the natural gas system in your neighborhood, or in the case of emergencies, please call the City of Marianna Public Works Department at 850-482-4129 Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00am and 4:30pm. After hours and weekends, calls are forwarded to the City of Marianna Police Dept. However, you may contact the Police Dept. directly after hours at 850-526-3125.





PENSACOLA, Florida — President Donald Trump on Friday reinforced his support for embattled Alabama Republican Senate candidate Roy Moore, telling voters four days before they go to the polls that the "LAST thing" he needs in the closely divided GOP-controlled Senate is a "Liberal Democrat" who opposes his agenda.

Trump tweeted that message hours before he touched down in Pensacola, Florida, for a Friday night rally in a state that helped propel him to the White House.

The White House has

said the rally is a campaign event for Trump. But the location, near the Alabama border and feeding television markets in the state, stoked speculation that the rally was a backdoor way for the president to give Moore's campaign a boost without actually setting foot in the state.

"It's not that he's not going to Alabama. It's that he is going to Pensacola," White House spokesman Raj Shah told reporters on board Air Force One Friday. "Pensacola's Trump country. This is a part of the state that voted overwhelmingly for the president in 2016. He'll be trav-

Trump promotes Roy Moore before Florida rally

PENSACOLA, Florida — President Donald Trump on Friday reinforced his support for embattled Alabama Republican Senate candidate Roy Moore, telling voters four days before they go to the polls that the "LAST thing" he needs in the closely divided GOP-controlled Senate is a "Liberal Democrat" who opposes his agenda.

Trump tweeted that message hours before he touched down in Pensacola, Florida, for a Friday night rally in a state that helped propel him to the White House.

The White House has

said the rally is a campaign event for Trump. But the location, near the Alabama border and feeding television markets in the state, stoked speculation that the rally was a backdoor way for the president to give Moore's campaign a boost without actually setting foot in the state.

Shah said Trump would be talking to voters about the Republican tax plan making its way through Congress. Trump has been trying to sell the plan as a boon to the middle class, despite criticism that it would disproportionately help businesses and the wealthy.

Moore, who is 70, has been dogged by multiple allegations of sexual misconduct, including accusations that he molested two teenage girls and pursued romantic relationships with several others while in his 30s. He has denied the allegations.

Shah said the president and White House have made clear they find the allegations "troubling and concerning" and believe they "should be taken seriously." But he said Moore has maintained his innocence, and that should be taken into account as well.

"Ultimately his endorsement is about the issues," said Shah. "He doesn't want to see Alabama elect a Nancy Pelosi/Chuck Schumer puppet who's going to be wrong on the issues and not support the agenda," he said, referring to top congressional Democrats Nancy Pelosi and Chuck Schumer.

California Wildfires

Flames force people to flee on a moment's notice

FALLBROOK, Calif. — Flames were practically on top of Dick and Joan Marsala's home when they got an urgent knock on the door and were told to leave.

The couple, in their mid-80s, grabbed only a change of clothes and medications before fleeing Thursday through wind gusts and smoke as fire swallowed the row of mobile homes behind their place in the Rancho Monserate Country Club north of San Diego.

It's a story that has played out in communities across much of Southern California this week as ferocious winds whipped sparks into massive infernos that have destroyed more than 500 buildings, killed dozens of horses and forced hundreds of thousands of people to run from fires that have burned nearly 250 square miles since Monday.

The flames that tore through Fallbrook, self-proclaimed "Avocado Capital of the World," and nearby Bonsall, home to a premier racehorse training facility, traveled so far that even people who found temporary refuge had to move again when the fires got too close.

Flames sprang up so quickly and moved so fast that three people were burned Thursday trying to escape. Many of those who managed to get out unscathed did so with only the clothes on their backs after abandoning a lifetime of possessions to fate.

The Marsalas and other unlucky homeowners returned Friday to find their homes in ruins.

Dick Marsala was too overwhelmed to speak as he searched through the smoldering remnants in search of his wallet. It was still too hot, so he climbed back out. Peering through a broken window, he spotted a framed photo still hanging on a blackened wall. It was a picture of him golfing.

"I'll be darned," he said, his eyes tearing up as he put on sunglasses.

The charred gray remains of much of the

55-and-over community stood in stark contrast to the bright green nine-hole golf course where Marsala and others in the community played regularly.

Many residents were on the course when the fire swept into the area, driven by dry desert Santa Ana winds that surpassed 35 mph (56 kph). That was too fast for firefighters to stop the flames.

"The crews were trying to stay out ahead of this as quickly as they could," said Capt. Kendal Bortisser of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Prevention. "As we know, when a tornado hits the Midwest, there's no stopping it. When a hurricane hits the East Coast, there's no stopping it. When Santa Ana winds come in, there's no stopping them."

Tom Metier was brushing his teeth to get ready

for a doctor's appointment when sheriff's deputies pulled up and yelled, "Get out now!"

He grabbed the key to his safety deposit box, prescription pills and some cash. Winds were howling outside, and flames leaped through the brush on a nearby hillside.

Metier, who expected to lose everything, was surprised to find his place intact Friday. He zipped through the mobile home park in a golf cart, fielding calls from neighbors and reporting whose homes survived and whose were gone.

More than a third of the community's 213 mobile homes burned as the fire zigzagged along a hillside, skipping some streets and razing others. On one street, all 24 mobile homes were gone, with only hulls of cars and stoves left.

"It's really horrible to see some of these little streets look like a moonscape," he told a friend whose home was reduced to black rubble.

The fire 50 miles (80 kilometers) north of San Diego ignited for unknown reasons and destroyed at least 85 structures as it burned 6 square miles (16 square kilometers).

Meanwhile, firefighters northwest of Los Angeles gained some control over the largest and most destructive fire in the state, which destroyed 430 buildings. The blaze in Ventura County grew to 206 square miles (533 square kilometers) since igniting Monday.

Along the coast between Ventura and Santa Barbara, tiny communities had so far survived close calls.

Slopes along U.S. 101 were blackened, but homes still

stood at La Conchita and Faria Beach. Sections of Carpinteria were under mandatory or voluntary evacuation orders, but no flames were in sight.

Fire crews made enough progress against other large fires around LA to lift most evacuation orders.

The Fallbrook fire broke

out along State Highway 76 and quickly jumped six lanes to the other side.

Horse trainers took stock of the damage at the elite San Luis Rey Downs training facility for thoroughbreds in Bonsall, where many of the more than 450 horses were cut loose to prevent them from being trapped in burning stables.

Frantic herds galloped through smoke and past flaming palm trees in a chaotic escape from a normally idyllic place.

"We almost got trampled to death," trainer Kim

Marrs said. "One gal got knocked down. I thought she was going to get crushed. You just had to stand there and pray they didn't hit you."

Most of the loose horses were corralled and taken to Del Mar Fairgrounds, but about 25 died as barns and pasture burned.

The fire, on the eastern border of the Marine Corps' Camp Pendleton, was uncontrolled, although winds subsided significantly overnight. Forecasters said they would return later in the day but be less widespread.

Authorities said 1,000 firefighters battled the flames with help from a fleet of air tankers and helicopters. Crews were also dispatched to stamp out a small new fire that began to the east in the Cleveland National Forest near the mountain town of Alpine.

New Mexico school shooter left note plotting attack, suicide

AZTEC, N.M. — A 21-year-old gunman who disguised himself as a student to get into a New Mexico high school where he killed two students had caught the attention of U.S. investigators more than a year ago, authorities said Friday.

William Atchison, a former student at small-town Aztec High School, had legally purchased a handgun at a local store a month ago and planned the attack, authorities said. He left a message on a thumb drive found on his body that detailed his plan to wait until the students got off buses and made their way to class.

He mingled with students, then walked into school with them and went into a second-floor bathroom to "gear up." Atchison's plan was to shoot up a classroom and then kill himself.

"Work sucks, school sucks, life sucks. I just want out of this (expletive)," he wrote.

More lives could have been lost had Francisco I. Fernandez not walked into the bathroom, authorities said. The gunman shot Fernandez, then walked out into the hallway and encountered the second victim, Casey J. Marquez. He immediately killed her.

Atchison then walked up and down the hall, firing randomly, before killing himself, authorities said.

"He was determined to create as much carnage as he possibly could," San Juan County Sheriff Ken Christensen said.

The shooter did not have a criminal record, much less a traffic ticket, officials said. The only contact with law enforcement was what they described as a generic message on an online gaming forum in 2016 in which he talked about what weapons might be used in a mass shooting.

The FBI said the posting was flagged and investigators talked with the gunman at his home in Aztec, where he lived with

his parents. At the time, he did not own any weapons other than an airsoft pellet gun and said he had no plans for an attack and just liked to troll sites online.

The shooting has rocked Aztec, a community of about 6,500 near the Colorado border. Hundreds gathered for prayer services and candlelight vigils and more gatherings are planned over the weekend as residents look for answers.

In one bright spot, authorities said heroes at the school helped save lives.

A substitute teacher heard the gunshots but didn't have a key to lock the door to the computer lab. So she took students into an office or storage area and barricaded the door with a couch.

Atchison came to the room and yelled that he knew they were in there and fired multiple shots into the room, authorities said.

A custodian also heard the gunshots and yelled for teachers to lock their doors.

State Police Chief Pete Kassetas said the two victims were not specific targets.

Marquez was a cheerleader and was planning to perform in the upcoming Orange Bowl. Her classmates said she came across as a student leader.

Brynn Divine, a senior at Aztec High School, remembered the victim being a vibrant and friendly student who often won dance contests at school events.

"She lit up pretty much any room we were all in," Divine said. "She was such a fun person to be around."

Fernandez was known for his interest in computers and his speed on the keyboard. His family has said he had a bright future ahead of him.

Gov. Susana Martinez said she has met with the teens' families and they talked about what great kids they were. Both of them also had jobs.

Martinez said the families are broken but are pulling together.

"I don't think anyone ever gets over this," she said.

Teen charged in videotaped beating pleads to hate crime

CHICAGO — A Chicago woman involved in a beating of a mentally disabled man that was shown on Facebook Live has pleaded guilty to a hate crime and been placed on probation for four years.

Nineteen-year-old Brittany Covington entered her plea Friday in a case that received national attention because it involved a white victim and four blacks who taunted him with profanities against white people and now-President Donald Trump.

Covington has been in jail since January when the video, which she narrated, surfaced. Her three co-defendants remain in custody and their cases are pending.

In exchange for pleading guilty to committing a hate crime, aggravated battery and intimidation, prosecutors dropped a kidnapping charge and others.

The judge ordered Covington to not use social media for four years. She also must perform 200 hours of community service.

Jury sides with San Diego in Comic Con trademark battle

SAN DIEGO — A jury on Friday sided with San Diego Comic-Con in a court battle with a rival

pop-culture convention in Utah over rights to use the phrase "comic con."

The panel decided that Salt Lake Comic Con used the trademarked phrase without permission, though they didn't do so willfully. The panel awarded the California event \$20,000, far less than the \$12 million they'd sought.

Utah co-founder Dan Farr told Salt Lake City TV station KUTV they plan to appeal.

Sen. Warren critical of Trump decision on Jerusalem

BOSTON — U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren says she worries that President Donald Trump's

decision to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital will make it harder to achieve peace in the Middle East.

The Massachusetts Democrat spoke to several thousand attendees Friday at The Union For Reform Judaism convention in Boston.

Warren says she believes a two-state solution is the best hope for peace. She says Jerusalem is the capital of Israel, and diplomacy between Israelis and Palestinians should determine the final status of Jerusalem.

She says Trump should deliver a "comprehensive strategy" for negotiations.

Bascom man arrested after reported shooting

Sheriff: Victim may have interrupted domestic violence incident

A Jackson County man was taken into custody after a Thursday morning shooting in Bascom, according to the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

Arrested was Gregory Thomas

Layton, 48, of Bascom. He faces a charge of aggravated battery with firearm — domestic battery.

Just before 11 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 7, JCSO got a call about a shooting at a residence in the 4800 block of Basswood Road in

Bascom. At the scene, deputies say they learned that one victim, identified as Kenneth Ogle, had been shot in the facial area and sustained non-life-threatening injuries.

The shooting suspect, Layton, and another victim of domestic violence were inside the residence, authorities say, when Ogle reportedly came to the Basswood Road residence to

deliver something to the female victim. Authorities believe that, as a result, Ogle may have interrupted Layton battering her.

An argument occurred between the two males, according to officials, and Layton allegedly pushed Ogle twice, knocking him to the ground. Layton reportedly then pulled a large handgun and fired once in the direction of Ogle striking him in

the facial area.

Layton was arrested and lodged in the Jackson County Correctional Facility to await first appearance. According to court records, on Friday, he was released on \$55,000 bond and ordered to have no contact with Ogle or the female victim.

Ogle was treated for his injuries at Jackson Hospital and released.

Then the video surfaced. The bystander who shot it on his way to work at a barber shop said he was afraid to take it to police after the officer's narrative emerged, and instead shared it with Scott's family. When they released the images publicly, people could see the shooting themselves — and see that Slager was lying, Stewart and prosecutors have said.

The video doesn't capture the fight between the two men, but it shows Slager shoot Scott, run to retrieve his stun gun, then drop it by the man's lifeless body.

The images set off protests across the U.S. as demonstrators said it was another egregious example of police officers mistreating African-Americans. Many seized on the video as proof of what they'd argued for years: White officers too often use deadly force unnecessarily against black people.

Slager, 36, is one of only a few police officers to go to prison for a fatal shooting.

His sentence is by far the stiffer since the shootings came under scrutiny in recent years. He fired eight shots at Scott, hitting him five times in the back as he from a traffic stop.

Before sentencing, Scott's relatives urged a judge to mete out a significant punishment. Through tears, Scott's family told Slager they felt sorrow for him and the loss his young children would feel in his absence. In the end, a judge ruled the shoot-

ing had been a murder and sentenced Slager to 20 years in prison for violating Scott's civil rights, giving the Scott family the justice they had sought ever since that stranger came to them with the video.

"I forgive Michael Slager. I forgive you," Scott's mother, Judy, said as she turned toward her son's killer. "I pray for you, that you would repent and let Jesus come in your life."

Sitting just a few feet away, Slager wiped tears from his eyes and mouthed: "I'm sorry."

Slager's attorneys have continued to reiterate his self-defense claim, saying race didn't play a role in the shooting and Slager never had any "racial animus" toward minorities.

But the officer in May pleaded guilty to federal

civil rights violations, with prosecutors agreeing to drop state murder charges.

Slager apologized to the family, calling Scott's mother and brothers by their names.

"With my actions that day, Walter Scott is no longer with his family, and I am responsible for that," Slager said. Of their forgiveness, he added: "I am very grateful."

Slager's emotions stood in stark contrast to his stoic demeanor during his state murder trial when jurors deadlocked over a verdict. He has several weeks to appeal his federal sentence and will be housed at the Charleston County jail until assigned a federal prison.

When jurors failed to reach a verdict in the state murder case, many black people and others were shocked and distressed, because the video seemed to some to be an open-and-shut case. Some despaired of ever seeing justice with its names.

Even rarer.

South Carolina has been aggressive in charging white officers who shoot unarmed black people. Four have pleaded guilty in state or federal court in the past six years. But only Slager and former state trooper Sean Groubert, who shot a man as he tried to get his wallet during a seat-belt-violation check, will have been sent to prison. Groubert was sentenced to five years behind bars.

After the sentencing, Stewart said he hoped the punishment would give officers around the country pause.

"Stop and think, or you could end up 20 years behind bars," Stewart said.

"People are watching, and people are starting to actually care."

Life in prison for Florida man in child porn case

FORT PIERCE — A Florida man has been sentenced to life in prison for producing and distributing child pornography, with one victim only 2 years old.

Court records show a federal judge on Thursday imposed the sentence on 32-year-old Scott Joseph Trader of Port St. Lucie. Trader previously pleaded guilty to several child pornography production and distribution charges.

Investigators say since at least November 2014 through May 2017, Trader video recorded himself sexually abusing two minor girls entrusted to his care, including the 2-year-old.

Authorities also say Trader coerced dozens of minor vic-

tims online to send him child pornography via social media applications and collected child pornography from the internet, including abuse of infants and toddlers, sadism and masochism, and bestiality.

Trader distributed large amounts of these images to others online.

Teen caught on video stealing from police car turns self in

PEMBROKE PINES — A teenager says his family and friends urged him to turn himself in days after surveillance video captured the theft of an assault rifle and other items from a police cruiser parked outside a Florida home.

The video released by Pem-

broke Pines police showed the face of the thief as he took the rifle, a police vest, a stun gun and ammunition from the Opa-locka police car parked outside the officer's home early Tuesday morning.

An arrest report says the teen showed up at the Hallandale Beach Police Department on Thursday, telling investigators he threw away the stolen items — including the assault rifle. But he couldn't say where. He's charged with vehicle theft.

Florida authorities confiscate 41 dogs

DELTONA — Three Florida residents are under investigation after authorities confiscated 41 dogs from two locations.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reported Wednesday the city of Deltona is investigating whether or not three people violated a city cruelty to animals ordinance.

Deltona spokesman Lee Lopez said that after a monthlong investigation into complaints of sick pedigree dogs being sold, animal control officers on Monday confiscated 33 adult dogs and eight puppies from two locations.

Man posing as rideshare driver arrested in Florida

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Police say a man who posed as a ride-share driver to pick up women, including University of South Carolina students, and hold them against their will has been

arrested in a Miami suburb.

The State reports university spokesman Jeff Stensland confirmed 28-year-old Farris Kaloti of Miami was arrested Thursday. Pinecrest police arrested Kaloti on outstanding warrants for assault and domestic violence, which the university says are unrelated to any incident involving students.

Columbia police said Kaloti is accused of assaulting a woman who got out of his car Nov. 26 and tried to help her friend get out.

A campus alert said Kaloti would offer women rides, and take them to places other than their intended destinations and refuse to let them out.

Examining causes of cancer

Nearly half of US cancer deaths blamed on unhealthy behavior

NEW YORK — A new look at cancer in the U.S. finds that nearly half of cancer deaths are caused by smoking, poor diet and other unhealthy behaviors.

That's less than commonly-cited estimates from more than 35 years ago, a result of new research methods and changes in American society. Smoking rates have plummeted, for example, while obesity rates have risen dramatically.

The study found that 45 percent of cancer deaths and 42 percent of diagnosed cancer cases could be attributed to what the authors call "modifiable" risk factors. These are risks that are not inherited, and mostly the result of behavior that can be changed, like exposure to sun, not eating enough fruits and vegetables, drinking alcohol and, most importantly, smoking.

A British study conducted in 1981 attributed more than two-thirds of cancer deaths to these factors.

The study used 2014 data and was conducted by the American Cancer Society. It was published online Tuesday in CA: A Cancer Journal for Clinicians.

"We thought it was time to redo those estimates," said Dr. Otis Brawley, the cancer society's chief medical officer and one of the study's authors.

Smoking was the leading risk by far, accounting for 29 percent of deaths. Excess body weight was next at 6.5 percent, and alcohol consumption was third at 4 percent.

The authors ran separate calculations for different types of cancer by age group and gender to try to account for how risk factors affect different groups of people, then added them together to understand the national picture.

Cigarette smoking, over-eating and other unhealthy behaviors can be blamed for nearly half of U.S. cancer deaths each year, according to a new American Cancer Society study released Tuesday, Nov. 21.

Among the findings:

» Smoking accounted for 82 percent of lung cancers.

» Excess body weight was associated with 60 percent of uterine cancers and about one-third of liver cancers.

» Alcohol intake was associated with 25 percent of liver cancers in men and 12 percent in

women; 17 percent of colorectal cancers in men and 8 percent in women; and 16 percent of breast cancers in women.

» Exposure to ultraviolet radiation from sunlight or tanning beds was associated with 96 percent of skin cancers in men and 94 percent in women.

Richard Clapp, a professor emeritus of environmental health at Boston University ex-

pects the new numbers to be widely cited and used to make decisions about how to spend money on cancer prevention, just as the influential British study from 1981 by researchers Richard Doll and Richard Peto has been.

Clapp said there is still room for improvement, however. He said the study doesn't address how two or more risk

factors, like smoking and drinking, might work together in some cancer cases and deaths.

Also, aside from second-hand cigarette smoke, the researchers did not to include outdoor or indoor air pollution because the data on the cancer risk from pollution is not detailed enough to understand the national impact, said the study's lead author, Dr. Farhad Islami.

Rise in teen suicide, social media coincide; is there link?



CHICAGO — An increase in suicide rates among U.S. teens occurred at the same time social media use surged and a new analysis suggests there may be a link.

Suicide rates for teens rose between 2010 and 2015 after they had declined for nearly two decades, according to data from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Why the rates went up isn't known.

The study doesn't answer the question, but it suggests that one factor could be rising social media use. Recent teen suicides have been blamed on cyberbullying, and social media posts depicting "perfect" lives may be taking a toll on teens' mental health, researchers say.

"After hours of scrolling through Instagram feeds, I just feel worse about myself because I feel left

out," said Caitlin Hearty, a 17-year-old Littleton, Colorado, high school senior who helped organize an offline campaign last month after several local teen suicides.

"No one posts the bad things they're going through," said Chloe Schilling, also 17, who helped with the campaign, in which hundreds of teens agreed not to use the inter-

net or social media for one month.

The study's authors looked at CDC suicide reports from 2009-15 and results of two surveys given to U.S. high school students to measure attitudes, behaviors and interests. About half a million teens ages 13 to 18 were involved. They were asked about use of electronic devices, social media, print

media, television and time spent with friends. Questions about mood included frequency of feeling hopeless and considering or attempting suicide.

The researchers didn't examine circumstances surrounding individual suicides. Dr. Christine Moutier, chief medical officer at the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, said the study provides weak evidence for a popular theory and that many factors influence teen suicide.

The study was published Tuesday in the journal Clinical Psychological Science.

Data highlighted in the study include:

» Teens' use of electronic devices including smartphones for at least five hours daily more than doubled, from 8 percent in 2009 to 19 percent in 2015. These teens were 70 percent more likely to have suicidal thoughts or actions than those who

reported one hour of daily use.

» In 2015, 36 percent of all teens reported feeling desperately sad or hopeless, or thinking about, planning or attempting suicide, up from 32 percent in 2009.

For girls, the rates were higher — 45 percent in 2015 versus 40 percent in 2009.

» In 2009, 58% of 12th grade girls used social media every day or nearly every day; by 2015, 87% used social media every day or nearly every day. They were 14% more likely to be depressed than those who used social media less frequently.

"We need to stop thinking of smartphones as harmless," said study author Jean Twenge, a psychology professor at San Diego State University who studies generational trends. "There's a tendency to say, 'Oh, teens are just communicating with their friends.' Monitoring kids' use of smart-

phones and social media is important, and so is setting reasonable limits, she said.

Dr. Victor Strasburger, a teen medicine specialist at the University of New Mexico, said the study only implies a connection between teen suicides, depression and social media. It shows the need for more research on new technology, Strasburger said.

He noted that skeptics who think social media is being unfairly criticized compare it with so-called vices of past generations: "When dime-store books came out, when comic books came out, when television came out, when rock and roll first started, people were saying 'This is the end of the world.'"

With its immediacy, anonymity, and potential for bullying, social media has a unique potential for causing real harm, he said.

"Parents don't really get that," Strasburger said.

Move over, dodgeball: Schools pump up phys ed with choices

You won't find gym class on the schedule in upstate New York's Victor school district.

What you will see: kayaking, rock climbing, mountain biking, dance, self-defense, archery and in-line skating — all under the heading of physical education. The teachers say it's a more fitting description of lessons meant to last well beyond the class bell.

"We want our kids as they walk out of these halls in grade 12 to be active for life," said Ron Whitcomb, the district's director of health, physical education and athletics.

With the childhood obesity rate at about 17 percent, the

federal education law passed in December 2015 to replace No Child Left Behind elevates health and fitness to rank among things like art, music, civics and science as elements of a well-rounded education and makes additional funding available.

At a time when schools are all about getting students ready for college or jobs, experts say it's a chance for more physical education teachers to look beyond graduation, too, and leave even the least competitive students with the will and skills to keep moving. In many places, that has meant more bike-riding, outdoor hikes and yoga, and less dodgeball and shimmying up a rope — more

choice about which activity to pursue, and less emphasis on who's the best at it.

"The most important job of a great physical education teacher is to appreciate every student in that class, not just the highly skilled," said Whitcomb, whose program pre-dates the new law and is among those considered models for the more modern approach.

Connecticut, Vermont and Michigan are among states that include physical education or fitness in their accountability plans for the U.S. Education Department under the new law. The more holistic view of school quality is a departure from the old law's heavy reliance on test scores.

In the shadow of Washington state's Mount Rainier, physical education teacher Tracy Krause's students have for several years been fly-fishing and rock climbing as part of an "Outdoor Academy" program that also incorporates English Language Arts and environmental science. All freshmen at Krause's Tahoma High School take a foundations class that lets them explore things like

dance, yoga, strength and conditioning.

"Our (school) motto is 'future ready.' We want kids to leave with a plan for the future, whether it's college or the military or going straight to the workforce, and I think the same needs to be true about their

health," Krause said.

Washington, D.C., teachers put all of the district's second-graders on bicycles to gain a lifelong skill. Fourth- and seventh-graders do parkour, in which students leap and vault over obstacles in a way that's more freewheeling than skill-specific gymnastics. D.C. sixth-graders learn orienteering, including how to read a compass and geocache. High schoolers swim.

"We want to teach a variety of these foundational movement skills with cycling, swimming, parkour. So that they're very individualized," said Miriam Kenyon, the district's director of health and physical education, "and when you have that, you can't take it away."

McCoy bags rare, 230-pound 'doe/buck' deer

It was a cold and windy day in Illinois when Tim McCoy shot a very strange deer.

At first glance the deer in question looked like a 230-pound buck with a set of 17-point antlers that scored 180 inches.

There were a few irregularities though. Its neck wasn't big enough and glands on its legs weren't doing what they should be doing during mating season. It was also light for a deer that McCoy believed was 7-to-8 years old.

McCoy's friend Andy Hall finally identified the problem while helping him to load the deer in his truck.

The 230-pound boy deer was actually a 230-pound

girl deer.

The things is, a doe doesn't have a big rack of hard antlers like this one did. They also don't weigh as much as this deer did.

The mystery was cleared up the next day by McCoy's taxidermist.

It was doe, but it had one testicle located in the lining of its belly and it was supplying enough testosterone to cause male traits as well.

For example, male deer shed their antlers and then regrow them larger the next year. Female deer don't do this.

This led McCoy to dub the deer the doe/buck. As you might imagine, doe/bucks are a rarity.

"It's not the first deer like this to be killed, but the

first with these kind of antlers," McCoy said. "I'm certain it's going to be breaking some records."

"It's super, crazy rare and the weight and score throw it to a whole other level," he added.

Once word got out about the deer on the internet, it spread like wildfire. He has had celebrity hunters that know him from his store call and congratulate him and has had even people who do not hunt ask him about the deer.

While he is sure someone would buy the deer from him he has other plans for his unusual trophy.

"I want the whole deer mounted," McCoy said. "I'm going to put him on display at my store McCloys, in Marianna."

The deer did cause some annoyance to McCoy though.

McCoy said that when he contacted the game wardens, they said to call it a buck even though it was a doe.

Because of the hunting laws, his doe/buck had to be listed as buck, because of the antlers.

This forced McCoy to use his buck tag for shotgun hunting.

Hunting limits are enforced by giving out a limited number of tags and when they kill a deer, they have to put the tag on it. When hunters run out of tags, they can't hunt anymore.

McCoy shot the deer at his farm in Macomd, Illinois.

'Outta the Woods'

We have a new Guide to Waterfowl Hunting in Florida publication that can be found at MyFWC.com/Duck. It's a valuable tool for beginning waterfowl hunters, but experienced waterfowlers will appreciate it, too.

It lists public duck hunting areas, illustrates several decoy placement setups, gives scouting and hunting tips, and provides duck identification photos of most of the ducks that you're likely to see in Florida.

Also, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's dove hunting webpage has received a facelift to make information you need easier to find. The updated page, MyFWC.com/Dove, offers dove hunting tips and lists all FWC-managed dove fields.

The new waterfowl guide and revamped dove hunting webpage are available for the second phase of waterfowl and coot season and the third phase of mourning and white-winged dove, which both open in December. Below is a recap of what you need to know to take part in these seasons.

License and permit requirements

The first thing you'll need to participate is a Florida hunting license. Residents pay just \$17 for

the year. Nonresidents have the choice of paying \$46.50 for a 10-day license or \$151.50 for 12 months. You also need a no-cost migratory bird permit. And if you plan to hunt one of Florida's many wildlife management areas, you must purchase a management area permit for \$26.50.

You can get a Lifetime Sportsman's License though. This license allows you to hunt and fish in Florida for the rest of your life, even if you move away.

All licenses and permits you need are available online at GoOutdoors-Florida.com, at county tax collectors' offices or license agents, or by calling 888-HUNT-FLORIDA.

Waterfowl and coot season

The second phase of the waterfowl and coot season starts statewide Dec. 9 and runs through Jan. 28. In addition to previously mentioned license and permit requirements, duck hunters also must get a Florida waterfowl permit (\$5) and a federal duck stamp.

The daily bag limit on ducks is six, but you need to know your ducks before heading afield because there are different daily limits for each species. For instance, within the six-bird limit there can be only one pintail, one mottled duck and one

fulvous whistling-duck. Only two of your six-bird limit can be canvasbacks, black ducks, scaup or redheads; and three may be wood ducks. And you may have no more than four scoters, four eiders, four long-tailed ducks and four mallards (of which only two can be female) in your bag.

All other species of ducks can be taken up to the six-bird limit, except harlequin ducks. It is prohibited to take harlequin ducks.

The daily limit on coots is 15, and there's a five-bird limit on mergansers, only two of which may be hooded.

You also may take light geese statewide during the waterfowl and coot season (Dec. 9–Jan. 28), which includes the taking of snow, blue and Ross's geese. There's a 15-bird daily bag limit on any combination of these geese.

When hunting ducks, geese or coots, hunters may use only nontoxic shotgun shells. No lead shot can be used or even be in your possession – only iron (steel), bismuth-tin and various tungsten alloys are permissible.

And in the Tallahassee area, I need to point out some outboard motor restrictions and a prohibition against hunting in permanent duck blinds:

• On Lake Iamonia

and Carr Lake (both in Leon County), the use of airboats and gasoline-run outboard motors are prohibited during the regular waterfowl and coot seasons.

• The maximum-allowed horsepower rating on outboard motors during the regular waterfowl and coot seasons on Lake Miccosukee in Leon and Jefferson counties is 10 hp.

• You may not hunt from or within 30 yards of a permanent duck blind structure on the four

Tallahassee-area lakes of Jackson, Iamonia, Miccosukee and Carr. You're allowed to pack in a portable blind and hunt from it, but make sure to break it down and take it with you when you're done. (However, there's no problem hunting within the concealment of any natural, rooted vegetation.)

Dove season

The third phase of the mourning and white-winged dove season always runs Dec. 12 through Jan. 15. The daily bag limit is 15.

The FWC even provides an online Dove Hunters' Hotline that gives up-to-date information on Florida's public dove fields. The web address is MyFWC.com/Dove, and it's updated every Thursday throughout the dove season. Information includes dove densities,

previous weeks' harvests and field conditions.

Migratory bird hunting regulations

Shooting hours for waterfowl and coot season, and during the last phase of dove season, are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The only firearm you are allowed to hunt migratory game birds with is a shotgun, although you're not permitted to use one larger than 10-gauge. Shotguns also must be plugged to a three-shell capacity (magazine and chamber combined).

Retrievers and bird dogs may be used to take migratory game birds and, if you're up for the challenge, you may even use a bow or crossbow. Artificial decoys, as well as manual or mouth-operated bird calls, also are legal gear for duck hunters. Birds of prey can even be used to take migratory birds by properly-permitted falconers.

You may hunt doves over an agricultural field as long as the grain has been distributed or scattered solely as a result of a normal agricultural operation.

However, you're not allowed to introduce grain or other feed over an area for the purpose of luring birds.

Baiting rules are even more restrictive regarding ducks, geese and coots. You cannot legally hunt

waterfowl over manipulated agricultural crops except after the field has been subject to a normal harvest and removal of grain.

However, you can hunt waterfowl in fields or flooded fields of unharvested standing crops. On lakes and rivers, feed – such as corn or wheat – cannot be used to attract birds, even if the bait is quite a distance from where you're hunting. And it doesn't matter if you aren't the one who scattered the bait. If you knew or should have known bait was present, you're breaking the law.

When hunting migratory game birds you can't use rifles, pistols, traps, snares, nets, sinkboxes, swivel guns, punt guns, battery guns, machine guns, fish hooks, poisons, drugs, explosive substances, live decoys, recorded bird calls or sounds, or electrically amplified bird-call imitations. Shooting from a moving automobile or boat, and herding or driving birds with vehicles or vessels also are against the law.

Here's wishing you happy holidays and a successful hunting season. If you can, remember to introduce someone new to hunting.

As always, have fun, hunt safely and ethically, and we'll talk at you next year.

Marlins' Dee Gordon traded to Mariners for 3 prospects

MIAMI — The Marlins' latest payroll purge began not with Giancarlo Stanton, but with Dee Gordon.

The two-time All-Star second baseman was traded Thursday to the Seattle Mariners for three prospects in the first big deal involving new Marlins CEO Derek Jeter. He wants to cut payroll by more than 20 percent to \$90 million or less, which is why NL MVP Stanton is also on the trading block.


Miami acquired right-hander Nick Neidert, the Mariners' No. 2 prospect, along with infielder Chris Torres and right-hander Robert Dugger. The Marlins haven't been to the playoffs since 2003, and they're anxious to bolster a farm system that ranks among baseball's worst.

"We need to add depth," president of baseball operations Michael Hill said. "We need to do things to give us an opportunity to build an organization that we feel can win consistently. In this deal we took an All-Star caliber player in Dee Gordon, and were able to add three very talented pieces to our minor league system."

The Mariners get \$1 million in international signing bonus pool allotment, boosting the amount they can offer Japanese star pitcher and outfielder Shohei Ohtani to a major league-high \$3,557,500, just ahead of the Texas Rangers (\$3,535,000). They assume Gordon's contract, which guarantees him \$38 million through 2020.

This is the Marlins' fourth dismantling since 1998 under three owners. They had a franchise-record payroll of \$116 million last season but lost 85 games and lots of money while finishing last in the National League in attendance for the 12th time in 13 years.

Jeter has warned of unpopular decisions this off-

season, and with fans anticipating them, he drew boos at a Miami Heat game this week.

The popular Gordon batted .308 in 158 games in 2016, and had 60 stolen bases to lead the major

leagues for the third time in the past four years. He won the NL batting title in 2015 when he hit .333, and also won a Gold Glove that year.

He made the All-Star team in 2014 and 2015, then served an 80-game sus-

pension the following year after a positive test for exogenous testosterone and Clostebol, substances he said he took unknowingly.

Gordon said he had anticipated being traded in the aftermath of ace Jose

Fernandez's fatal boat crash in September 2016.

"Bad things happened over there with the death of our good friend Jose," Gordon said. "Honestly there's kind of no way to rebound from that other

than start over. It was built on Giancarlo and Jose, and we lost the focal point for our pitching, a guy who we knew was going to give us a chance to win every day. Honestly in the major leagues, that's pretty tough to win that way."

The Marlins have agreed to the parameters of a potential Stanton trade with the San Francisco Giants. The St. Louis Cardinals have also sought the right fielder, with each team offering a package of prospects. The major league home run champion can veto any deal because his record \$325 million, 13-year contract includes a no-trade clause.

The Gordon trade increases the likelihood the Marlins will keep outfielders Christian Yelich and Marcell Ozuna, but with the winter meetings beginning Sunday, Hill wouldn't rule anything out.

"They'll be Marlins until they're not," he said. "We'll head into the winter meetings with open minds. ... We have good players. I talk to all of my counterparts about any number of our guys, and we'll continue to do so as we look for ways to improve."

Hill said the key acquisition in the Gordon deal was Neidert, who went 11-6 with a 3.45 ERA as a 20-year-old in 2017 and finished the season at Double-A Arkansas.

"We like all three players," Hill said, "but Neidert is probably the closest to the major leagues. We like his ceiling."

Gordon's contract calls for salaries of \$10.5 million, \$13 million and \$13.5 million in the next three seasons. His deal includes a \$14 million team option in 2021 with a \$1 million buyout, a salary that would become guaranteed if he has 600 plate appearances in 2020 or 1,200 in 2019-20 combined, and he finishes 2020 on the active major league roster.

Japanese pitcher-hitter Ohtani chooses the Angels

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Shohei Ohtani has decided he's on the side of the Angels.

The Japanese two-way star announced Friday he will sign with the Los Angeles Angels, ending the sweepstakes surrounding his move to the majors in a surprising destination.

Ohtani turned down interest from every other big-league club to join two-time MVP Mike Trout and slugger Albert Pujols with the Angels, who are coming off their second consecutive losing season and haven't won a playoff game since 2009.

But the Angels' combination of a promising core and a beautiful West Coast location clearly appealed to the 23-year-old Ohtani, who has confounded baseball experts at almost every step of his move to North America as one of the most coveted free agents in years.

Ohtani's agent, Nez Balelo, issued a statement Friday announcing the decision. Balelo said the 2016 Japanese MVP "felt a true bond with the Angels. He sees this as the best environment to develop and reach the next level and attain his career goals."

After his unusual courtship, Ohtani will attempt to chart an even more unique career path as the majors' first regular two-way player in several decades. Ohtani already has drawn numerous comparisons to Babe Ruth, who excelled as a hitter and a pitcher early in his Hall of Fame career.

Ohtani is expected to be both a starting pitcher and a left-handed designated

hitter for the Angels, who intend to give him ample playing time in both roles.

Many baseball observers have long assumed Ohtani would choose a higher-profile franchise such as the Yankees or Dodgers, who would have both welcomed him into their rotation and lineup. He received serious attention from Seattle and Texas, who both could have given him more money than the Angels.

Ohtani listened to final pitches from several teams in Los Angeles earlier this week before making his choice. The Angels play about 28 miles from downtown LA in laid-back Orange County, where most of the Angels live in coastal Newport Beach and enjoy a comfortable, warm-weather lifestyle with ample big-market media attention, but without the withering scrutiny of other top destinations.

But Angels general manager Billy Eppler is very serious about winning, and he has spent several years scouting Ohtani, ever since his previous job with the Yankees.

"We are honored Shohei Ohtani has decided to join the Angels organization," the franchise said in a brief statement. "We felt a unique connectivity with him throughout the process and are excited he will become an Angel. This is a special time for Angels fans."

Ohtani will be formally introduced at a news conference later in the month.

Ohtani has ample opportunity to fulfill his biggest ambitions with the Angels, who are in need of a top starting pitcher. They should also be able to fit

him into their lineup when he isn't pitching; Pujols has largely been a designated hitter for the past two seasons, but the three-time NL MVP is expected to be healthy enough to play first base more frequently in 2018.

Ohtani was coveted by every team because of his exceptional pitching talent and powerful bat, but also because he represents an extraordinary bargain due to baseball's rules around international players.

The Angels will have to pay the \$20 million posting fee to Ohtani's previous club, the Nippon Ham Fighters, but Ohtani will not be paid a huge salary for the next three seasons. Ohtani will sign a minor league contract and can receive up to \$2,315,000 in international bonus money from the Angels.

Ohtani likely could have received a deal worth more than \$100 million if he had waited two years to move stateside, but Ohtani wasn't interested in delaying his progress for money.

Ohtani is likely to have an immediate spot in the front of the rotation for the Angels, who have endured brutal injuries to their starting pitchers for two seasons.

Los Angeles' ostensible ace is Garrett Richards, but he has been limited to 62 1/3 innings over the past two seasons due to major injuries. The rotation also currently includes Matt Shoemaker, Andrew Heaney and Tyler Skaggs, who have all dealt with major injury setbacks recently.

Ohtani was 3-2 with a 3.20 ERA this year, but was slowed by thigh and ankle injuries. He hit .332 in 65

games with eight homers and 31 RBIs.

But those numbers don't indicate the incredible potential seen in Ohtani, whose fastball has been clocked above 100 mph. While he has occasionally struggled with control, Ohtani is widely thought to be a surefire big-league pitching prospect.

The Angels have missed the playoffs in seven of the last eight seasons, but

Ohtani's arrival is only the latest in a series of big moves for Eppler, who is determined to build a World Series contender during the remaining three years on Trout's contract.

Shortly after the World Series ended, the Angels secured a five-year, \$106 million deal with left fielder Justin Upton, a late-season trade acquisition. Upton is an ideal solution to years of under-

performance in left field for the Angels, who have been carried offensively by Trout.

Earlier this week, Eppler bolstered his much-improved farm system by signing 17-year-old Venezuelan shortstop Kevin Maitan, a coveted prospect considered the best of 13 players recently taken away from the Atlanta Braves for violating international signing rules.

Pruitt leading Tennessee while helping Tide

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Alabama once again is making a postseason run with help from an assistant coach on his way out the door.

Only this time, there's a twist.

The arrival of a December signing period this year makes it imperative that new Tennessee coach Jeremy Pruitt work to salvage his new program's recruiting class the next couple of weeks while also continuing his duties as a defensive coordinator on Alabama coach Nick Saban's staff.

Pruitt says he owes it to Alabama's players that he coach them throughout the postseason. As the No. 4 seed, Alabama (11-1) faces No. 1 seed Clemson (12-1) in a Jan. 1 Sugar Bowl semifinal at New Orleans.

"I also have a commitment to the kids whose homes I sat in with their parents and recruited them to go to the University of Alabama," Pruitt said. "Coach Saban has been wonderful to me. I would not be here today without his help, so I am going to go back as soon as the dead period starts and coach those kids. At the end of the day, it's about those guys. Those kids are the reason we're here."

Alabama's dealt with this situation before.

Two years ago, Kirby Smart remained Alabama's defensive coordinator throughout the Crimson Tide's national championship run after Georgia named him head coach. Jim McElwain was hired at Colorado State in December 2011 but stayed on as Alabama's offensive coordinator for its BCS championship game victory over LSU.

"At the time, I was always concerned," Smart recalled

Thursday at a news conference for playoff teams. "Am I doing the right thing? Am I doing the right thing for Georgia? Am I doing the right thing for Alabama? It was very concerning to me because I wanted to do what was best for both."

Alabama went through it again last year when Florida Atlantic hired Alabama

offensive coordinator Lane Kiffin. After Kiffin stayed with Alabama for its Peach Bowl semifinal triumph over Washington, Steve Sarkisian took over as offensive coordinator for the championship game loss to Clemson in what the school described as a mutual decision.

Saban is confident Pruitt

can handle dual responsibilities and noted his own experience in balancing two jobs when he remained the Cleveland Browns' defensive coordinator throughout the 1994 season after Michigan State hired him as head coach.

"Most of the really good coaches that have great

competitive character are always going to do what's best for the players," Saban said. "I mentioned earlier Kirby certainly did a good job of that (in 2015). I'm sure Jeremy will do a good job of that this year."

Smart says Pruitt's situation is "even more challenging" than what he encountered due to the early

signing period.

Starting this year, high school seniors can finalize their college decisions Dec. 20-22 as well as during the traditional February signing period. A dead period in which coaches can't have face-to-face contact with recruits begins Dec. 18.

Until that dead period starts, Pruitt will concentrate on shoring up Tennessee's recruiting class, which has been hit hard in the wake of a 4-8 season and the firing of former coach Butch Jones.

Eight high school seniors have backed out of verbal commitments to Tennessee since October. A composite ranking of recruiting sites compiled by 247Sports has Tennessee's 2018 class ranked 27th after being rated in the top 10 for much of the year.

"I work for the University of Tennessee, and I am all in for the university," Pruitt said. "Until the dead period, we are going to recruit. I am going to work as the head football coach of Tennessee and we are going to do the best we can to start going in the right direction."

Pruitt has been part of four national championship teams as an assistant at Alabama (2009, 2011, 2012) and Florida State (2013). He'd love to have one more national championship ring to show Tennessee prospects, even if it means working overtime these next few weeks.

He only needs to look at one of his new SEC East coaching rivals to see how this strategy can pay off.

"I'm glad, now looking back, that I did what I did because it was the right thing to do," Smart said. "It certainly helped that we won the (title). But it was a very challenging 30-day period, for sure."

Transfers from Division II find homes in Big East

Manny Suarez always believed he was capable of playing Division I basketball, and he did for one season before unforeseen circumstances led him to the Division II ranks for a couple of years.

Once he graduated from Adelphi University in New York, he knew he would regret it if he didn't try to return to Division I for his final year of eligibility.

Creighton, it turned out, was looking for someone just like him — a big man with a nice shot who could help cushion the blow of losing underclassman Justin Patton to the NBA.

At fellow Big East program DePaul, the Blue Demons might be getting more than they bargained for from their Division II transfer from Lewis University near Chicago. Guard Max Strus is averaging a team-best 15.6 points and shooting 92 percent on free throws while playing 34 minutes a game.

"The fact they are jumping to power conference programs and a guy like Max Strus is the go-to guy for DePaul, that is a giant leap and it kind of speaks volumes about that kid as a ballplayer in general. It has to be a special, unique case for it to happen," Rivals national recruiting analyst Corey Evans said.

According to the NCAA, only 11 of the 768 players who transferred this year moved from Division II to Division I; 189 went from D1 to D2. A player going from D2 to D1 must sit out one season before becoming eligible unless he's a graduate transfer; a D1 transfer is immediately eligible in D2.

One of the biggest D2-to-D1 success stories is Derrick White. He transferred from Colorado Springs to Colorado, where he was the Buffaloes' leading scorer

last season and was a first-round draft pick by the San Antonio Spurs.

This season, fewer than 10 active players in Division I came from a lower NCAA division. That includes Michigan's Duncan Robinson, who transferred from Division III Williams College three years ago.

Creighton's Suarez began his career at Fordham of the mid-major Atlantic 10. The 6-foot-10, 250-pounder from Cliffside Park, New Jersey, redshirted his first season, got limited minutes his second and saw no future for himself after the Rams made a coaching change. Adelphi was a natural landing spot for Suarez because the coach, Dave Duke, previously was an assistant at Fordham and had recruited Suarez.

Suarez averaged 15

points and 8.6 rebounds over two seasons for Adelphi, but he wasn't satisfied.

"People doubted I could play in Division I," he said. "After my old coach got fired, I went down to Division II, so some people felt as if they were proven right even though they didn't understand the full story."

Making this transition, a lot of people think I cannot compete at this level. I might be a fluke. I don't know yet. But I'm going to play hard and I'm going to give it my all because it's all I can do."

Creighton coach Greg McDermott said he didn't remember how Suarez's name came across his desk, but he watched video and liked what he saw: big body, scrappy under the basket, ability to shoot the

3-pointer. Suarez played a season-high 18 minutes off the bench in a win over UCLA and is averaging 11 minutes, 4.6 points and 2.9 rebounds.

"He's certainly impacted us winning some games already," McDermott said, "and hopefully he continues to improve and helps us in the future."

DePaul's Strus already has established himself as a rising star in the Big East. Coming out of high school he was undersized and had one Division I offer, from Chicago State.

His brother had played at Lewis, near the Strus' home in Hickory Hills, Illinois, and he figured he would be happy there. He scored 1,000 points in two seasons, earned All-America honors and began looking for a new chal-

lenge in the spring of 2016. He told Lewis coach Scott Trost that he would leave only if he could transfer to a program in the Big East, Big Ten or Atlantic Coast Conference.

"He thought he needed a little more exposure," Trost said.

"I think he may have thought he accomplished whatever he could here. He decided to do what was best for him. No hard feelings. Glad to see he's doing well."

Strus used the year he sat out to acclimate himself to the faster tempo and more physical players in Division I, and now he's filling the minutes played by Billy Garrett Jr. last season.

"In Division II there are guys who can shoot 3s and guys who can handle the ball, but there aren't that many that can do it."

all," Strus said. "Here guys have an overall game. It's a more physical game at this level. We didn't have a weight program at Lewis and didn't have strength coaches. That's a big thing here."

Strus, who has scored in double figures in all seven games, is happy with his move but has no regrets about his experience at Lewis.

"People think Division II is kind of a joke," he said.

"It's really good basketball. The guys are still skilled, and there are a bunch of Division I transfers who come down and play right away. If I was playing that well at that level, I knew I could make the jump to this one and be competitive still. I believed in myself and knew I could do it."

Tennessee basketball teams are good news to angry fans

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Amid the chaos of Tennessee's search for a football coach, comes good news for frustrated fans: basketball.

The Tennessee men's team is back in the Top 25 for the first time since December 2010 and carries a No. 24 ranking into its Saturday home game with Lipscomb.

The 11th-ranked Lady Vols host No. 2 Texas on Sunday in a matchup of unbeaten teams.

Now that the Vols finally found a football coach with the selection of Alabama defensive coordinator Jeremy Pruitt, Tennessee fans can focus on basketball. They'll find a couple of programs that still aren't satisfied with their early success.

"We want to be a program that's ranked all the time - ranked higher," Tennessee men's coach Rick Barnes said. "But to do that, you've got to earn that respect. You've got to earn it. I think where we are right now, we've done some good things, but if that (ranking) looks big to us, we won't be there very long."

The Tennessee men's basketball program was dealing with its own instability before Barnes took over.

Barnes was Tennessee's third coach in as many years when he arrived at Tennessee in 2015. Although Barnes' teams had earned 19 NCAA Tournament invitations in the 20 seasons before his arrival, he has needed time to get the Vols playing the way he wants.

The breakthrough has come this year, thanks to

an improved defense.

"The biggest difference is when you watch film with our team from last year and watch film from this year, we take so much pride on defense, stopping teams defensively," junior forward Kyle Alexander said.

The Vols (6-1) have made these strides while attention around campus has been elsewhere. During a victory over Mercer last week, fans started chanting "Fire Currie" a handful of times to express their anger over athletic director John Currie's handling of the football coaching search. Currie was forced out two days later.

Through it all, the men's and women's basketball teams have kept winning.

"There were some tough things that happened," said Barnes, who has grown accustomed to working at football-oriented schools as a former coach at Clemson and Texas and former assistant at Alabama and Ohio State.

"Now going forward, we've just got to move forward. Everybody does. When all that was going on, we just tried to do what we'd do regardless, whether it was normal or not normal. I give our guys credit for just really trying to stay focused on what we had to do."

The fans are catching on. Tickets are already gone for Tennessee's Dec. 17 game with No. 11 North Carolina, which represents the first sellout at the 21,678-seat Thompson-Boling Arena since a February 2015 loss to Kentucky.

While the Tennessee men are back in the Top 25 for the first time in seven years, the Lady Vols are

used to lofty rankings. But the Lady Vols entered this season with more questions than usual after an inconsistent 2016-17 campaign that ended with a second-round NCAA Tournament exit.

Tennessee has looked

much better so far this year, thanks to improved chemistry. With seniors Mercedes Russell and Jaime Nared leading a roster that features four freshmen, the Lady Vols (9-0) have scored 100-plus points in consecutive games for the first

time since 2001-02.

The Lady Vols' biggest challenge thus far was a 101-99 Cancun Challenge overtime triumph over Marquette, which was ranked 20th at the time.

"We know Texas is a different beast," Lady Vols

coach Holly Warlick said. "They can't be ranked No. 2 in the country without being outstanding, and we understand that. It's going to be a great challenge for us and something that I think our kids are looking forward to."







NEW YORK — J.K. Rowling voiced her support for Johnny Depp and his casting in an upcoming sequel to "Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them," following earlier domestic abuse allegations made against the actor.

The author published a statement on her website Thursday, breaking her silence on what had been a simmering controversy for the franchise. Some Harry Potter fans have said they would boycott "Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald" after Depp's ex-wife Amber Heard in May 2016 said that Depp was "verbally and physically abusive" to her during their marriage. Depp earlier called that claim and others "salacious false stories, gossip, misinformation and lies." The two settled their divorce last year.

Rowling acknowledged that the reports "deeply concerned" her and others behind the production, and that she and director David Yates considered re-

casting Depp's role. While Depp had a brief cameo in "Fantastic Beasts," he has a starring role as the Dark wizard Gellert Grindelwald in the follow-up film, and potentially future installments

in the pre-Potter franchise. "For me personally, the inability to speak openly to fans about this issue has been difficult, frustrating and at times painful. However, the agree-

ments that have been put in place to protect the privacy of two people, both of whom have expressed a desire to get on with their lives, must be respected," wrote Rowling.

"Based on our understanding of the circumstances, the filmmakers and I are not only comfortable sticking with our original casting, but genuinely happy to have Johnny playing a major character in the movies."

Rowling added: "I accept that there will be those who are not satisfied with our choice of actor in the title role. However, conscience isn't governable by committee. Within the fictional world and outside it, we all have to do what we believe to be the right thing."

Warner Bros. said it supported the decision.

"This matter has been jointly addressed by both parties, in a statement in which they said 'there was never any intent of physical or emotional harm,'" said the studio in a statement. "Based on the circumstances and the information available to us, we, along with the filmmakers, continue to support the decision to proceed with Johnny Depp in the role of Grindelwald in this and future films."

John Boyega talks 'Last Jedi,' personal parallels with Finn

LOS ANGELES — John Boyega may have a lot in common with Finn, the character he plays in "Star Wars: The Last Jedi," but a trip to a London toy store left the actor floored.

Boyega said one of the most surprising experiences he had while making the film was seeing his own larger-than-life likeness at the Toys "R" Us store he frequented as a kid. The actor had gone to find a gift for his newborn nephew when he came face to face with a giant cardboard cutout of himself as Finn.

"There were toys everywhere, and I was just like, 'Wow,'" Boyega said in a recent interview. "I'm on

the shelf. It's strange." While he has gotten more accustomed to his place in the Star Wars universe after making his debut as Finn in "The Force Awakens," both he

and his character remain awed by the scope of that world.

A former Stormtrooper

emboldened to discover where he fits into the fight,

Boyega said.

"It creates a very brave Finn and he's eager to do anything to find out and prove that this is my position," said Boyega.

The 25-year-old actor is poised to do the same in Hollywood. His work in Star Wars has led to other high-profile roles, including a part in Kathryn Bigelow's "Detroit" and in next year's "Pacific Rim Uprising."

"I feel like during the filming of 'The Last Jedi,' we were kind of living parallels to our characters in a sense," Boyega said. "Because Finn is now well known in the Star Wars universe, and for me, I'm known within the industry and our plan-

et and whatever. Now he has this reputation and it's hard for him to keep that up while still figuring himself out because he's been labeled as a hero."

Finn's onscreen heroics in "The Last Jedi" include an epic battle with Captain Phasma (Gwendoline Christie) that took months of training and preparation.

Off-screen, Boyega was

a hero to newcomer Kelly Marie Tran, who plays Rose Tico. The two met while she was auditioning for the role, and he has advocated for her ever since.

"He's so generous in terms of being an actor and really kind of teaching me the ropes because I was new to this," Tran said. "I truly feel like I

couldn't have had a better partner in this whole experience."

As for Boyega, he's had some time to get used to the idea of seeing himself as an action figure. But that was only the beginning of "The Last Jedi" branding.

"I recently went to the grocery store and saw myself on water," he said. "That's the biggest it gets for me. Everybody needs water, you know what I mean?"



Q: Can you tell me more about a couple of the young women hosts on MSNBC: Nicolle Wallace, Stephanie Ruhle and Katy Tur?

A: Saying they're all accomplished journalists seems a little obvious — they're hosts on a major national news network, after all — but they are. With that out of the way, they do have interesting, diverse backgrounds.

Nicolle Wallace, host of MSNBC's "Deadline: White House" and occasional fill-in host for "The 11th Hour," has a political background, which, again, may not be a huge surprise. But where she got it might be.

She was the White House communications director for George W. Bush and went on to work for his would-be successor, as senior adviser to John McCa-

in's presidential campaign in 2008 — perhaps a surprising choice for the notoriously lefty network. Another unlikely fact: She's also a bestselling novelist, having penned a series of fictional novels about political life in Washington.

Stephanie Ruhle, host of "MSNBC Live" and co-host of "Velshi & Ruhle," comes from a finance background. She worked in sales/marketing for global finance giants Credit Suisse and Deutsche Bank before becoming a journalist (getting her start, suitably, with the business news chain Bloomberg).

Ruhle also has a philanthropic side, working with a number of groups that aim to advance women in business, government and media.

As I say, both of their backgrounds match up with their current journalistic work, but nothing about Katy Tur's work on "MSNBC Live" would suggest that she used to be a storm chaser for The Weather Network.

This is, again, all outside their more traditional work as journalists, which is impressive, though a bit predictable given their current day jobs.

Q: Who played the original sailor in the Old Spice commercials?

A: If by "original" you mean the 1972 spot, which is now considered an advertising industry classic, the man was John Bennett Perry, Broadway star and, more notably today, father of future "Friends" star Matthew Perry.

The classic Old Spice ad featured Perry (senior) as a sailor

coming into port on a ship that was supposed to suggest the old-timey sailboat that has been the Old Spice logo seemingly forever. He disembarks and starts doling out bottles of Old Spice to various, very disparate men in need — first a hippy type in what looks like San Francisco, then a farmer/cowboy type out in the country. The message is that Old Spice is for any man who wants to smell like a man.

Perry appeared as the sailor in more ads after this one, but it is still considered the best. It was listed as one of the "classic ads" by Ad Age magazine. It's still what Perry is best remembered for, despite a long stage, film and TV career.

Well, it was until his son became so famous — now that's

what he's best remembered for. To be fair, he doesn't seem to mind. He even leaned into it a little, playing Matthew's father on screen twice — once in a 2004 episode of "Scrubs" they both guested on, and once in the 1997 big-screen comedy "Fools Rush In," in which Matthew starred.

His Old Spice ads have been overshadowed by the next generation as well. The new ones starting in 2010, featuring Isaia Mustafa as "the man your man

Mantzoukas brought his aggressively friendly shtick to "Brooklyn Nine-Nine" for a little longer, playing former undercover cop Adrian Pimento in eight episodes across two seasons of the hit Fox sitcom.

He also pops up now and again in the critically acclaimed Amazon series "Transparent" and the IFC talk show parody "Comedy Bang Bang."

He's probably still best known as Rafi in "The League," which

could smell like," have received even more industry and popular accolades.

Q: I feel like I recognized the guy who played Derek, the boyfriend Janet invented for herself in "The Good Place," but I can't remember why. Can you help?

A: The somewhat manic and uncomfortably forward Derek was pure Jason Mantzoukas — indeed, that's fast becoming his trademark.

Unfortunately, for fans at least, another of his trademarks is short arcs — he appeared in just two episodes of "The Good Place" this season.

was more than an arc, but still not a starring gig — he appeared in 30 of the FX show's 84 episodes.

This is just his TV work, though. He's also done significant supporting roles in a number of big-screen comedies, including "The Dictator" (2012) and "Dirty Grandpa" (2016). Most recently, he had a significant role (third-billed, after stars Will Ferrell and Amy Poehler) in the summer comedy "The House" (2017).

All this is just a sample — he's done dozens of films and shows since arriving on the TV scene in the early 2000s.
