Search on for EDC director

The newly organized Jackson County Economic Development Committee has prepared and issued a job description for its executive director position. For information on how to apply go to www.jacksonedc.com/news.

Some of the key steps listed on the website are summarized below.

To be considered, candidates

for the job must: Be registered with Employ Florida at www.employflorida.com; and forward a cover letter with specific salary requirements and a resume with three references to Jackson County EDC (ATTN: Director Applications), 4318 Lafayette St., Marianna, FL 32446.

Gilmore

The job is expected to pay a

minimum of \$50,000, with benefits. Applications will not be considered if they do not include hard salary requirements — and saying “negotiable” won't do. There will be a period of at least three weeks, during which applications will be accepted, or until the position is filled. Applicants who make the first cut will be contacted to make further arrangements as the hiring process continues.

The job is described as involving a variety of administrative, tech-

nical and professional work “in preparation and implementation of economic and community development plans, programs and services.”

Mickey Gilmore, chairman of the JCEDC, explained further:

“We are looking for someone that is a real team player that is up to date on the latest technologies being used to improve our economic development efforts.”

Man drives victim to sheriff's office, charged with 1st-degree murder

A man identified as Dan Belc drove to the Jackson County Sheriff's Office with the body of his estranged wife in the trunk of the vehicle he was driving early Friday morning, according to local authorities.

The 49-year-old turned himself in shortly after 7 a.m. He has been charged with first-degree premeditated murder, according to Calhoun County Sheriff Glenn Kimbrell, who identified the victim as Judith Yoder Belc, 49. She had been shot, Kimbrell said. She grew up in Calhoun County in a family well known and re-

spected, he said.

Kimbrell said Mr. Belc had been living in Germany and had come here sometime in March. Kimbrell said a family member indicated that Mr. Belc was having some issues that affected the marriage and had left the couple estranged.

Kimbrell didn't immediately know the full history of the couple's residency during their marriage, only that Mrs. Belc was at her brother's home when the incident began.

Armed suspect arrested after standoff in Rocky Creek

A Bay County Special Weapons and Tactics team helped the Jackson County Sheriff's Office bring an hours-long standoff to a peaceful end late Wednesday night and capture the man who had barricaded himself inside a home on Carter Loop Road, just off Rocky Creek Road, south of Marianna.

Ross Anthony Adams, 47, has been charged with aggravated assault with a firearm and possession of a weapon by a

convicted felon.

The Jackson County Sheriff's Office reports that on Wednesday, March 21, at approximately 3:35 p.m., JCSO received a call in reference to Adams threatening his ex-girlfriend with a firearm on Express Road. Adams had then reportedly left the scene driving his black Ford F150 truck.

Fiduciary rule, clean water and Ray Stevens

A recent 5th Circuit Court ruling has overturned a 2016 Department of Labor rule requiring use of the fiduciary standard by financial advisors in managing investors' retirement accounts. Based on this ruling, the U.S. Department of Labor will immediately cease enforcing the fiduciary rule passed two years ago. Thus, an investor's retirement account can now be managed by an advisor who is required to adhere only to the less stringent suitability standard and not the fiduciary standard.

In other words, an investment can be recommended for a client as long as it is deemed suitable.

Imagine our local water company is providing a product that is less than pure, but meets minimum "suitability" standards as prescribed by local environmental regulators. Would we be satisfied? What consumer would not balk at such an

arrangement? We all want the purest water available and, naturally, given a choice, we all would choose to work with an advisor who is required to serve our best interests and not his own.

We believe that all accounts, not just ERISA governed retirement accounts, should be managed according to the fiduciary standard. But the forces fighting against its uniform implementation have now gained the upper hand.

Several things could happen. The decision could be appealed. The SEC might offer its own fiduciary standard. A groundswell of public opinion could persuade the investment industry to voluntarily adopt the fiduciary standard. Or none of that might occur, and many investors might continue to work with advisors who are not required to adhere to the highest standard of client care in a "caveat emptor" scenario.

With the 5th Circuit ruling, an

advisor can sell or recommend products which are in his own best interests (and pay him a commission from a parent company) and not necessarily that of the client. That the investment vehicle may not be the best or most cost-efficient for the client is the price we pay for not operating under a fiduciary standard.

I remember overhearing an advisor at a conference years ago explaining why he could never consider leaving his parent company and serving as a fiduciary to his clients. "They sent my wife and me to Italy last year because of my annuity sales and for how many clients I placed in their mutual funds," he said. "Next year we're going to Alaska. I'd like to serve as a fiduciary, but we can't afford to give up free trips like these."

That advisor is compensated by his parent company, and works for them, not for his clients. It's hard to do both.

Chipola College announces April performing arts events







Gov. Scott signs child marriage ban, tax cut bill

TALLAHASSEE — It will soon be illegal in Florida for anyone under the age of 17 to get married under a bill signed into law by Gov. Rick Scott.

Scott on Friday signed 74 bills into law including the ban on child marriages and a tax cut package that authorizes a back-to-school sales tax holiday in August.

The ban takes effect in July.

The legislation was a compromise between the House and Senate. The Senate originally passed a bill that banned the marriage of anyone under 18, but the House wanted exceptions for some 16- and 17-year-olds when there's a pregnancy.

The bill signed by Scott would set limits on the marriage of 17-year-olds. While pregnancy won't be a factor, anyone marrying a 17-year-old couldn't be more than two years older and minors would need parental consent.

Optimists welcome Cindale Farms, Southern Craft Creamery owners

Free farm tours offered today

Recent guest speakers at the Marianna Optimist Club were Brad and Meghan Austin, owners of Cindale Farms and Southern Craft Creamery.

Meghan's parents, Dave and Cindy Eades, started in the dairy farming business in 1994. After several moves to grow the family business, they have settled across the road from Torbett's Dairy on Old U.S. Road. Their dairy cattle graze on a different patch of grass every day and are milked seasonally, meaning two months out of the year, they do not harvest milk. They are also bred seasonally with most of the new calves arriving in January. In 2009, they were named the Jackson County Farm Family of the Year. In 2010, they were named Conservationists of the Year and in 2014, they were named Ag Innovators of the Year. The Florida Farm Bureau bestowed the CARES award, which is for environmental leadership.

They decided several years ago to diversify and try their hand at the ice cream business. After a year of

hard work and many failures, they sold their first pint of ice cream in 2013 under the name Southern Craft Creamery. That same year, Meghan's sister entered them in "Garden & Gun" magazine's contest which featured over 900 artisans. Not only did they take first place the food category, but they were named the overall winner.

One of the unique things about their product is that they only use ingredients that can be obtained locally and those that are in season. Satsumas from Jackson County and caramel made in their own kitchen are just two examples. About the farthest they go for ingredients is Ocala for strawberries or Pensacola for pecans.

In 2014, they expanded their production facility, which was then housed in the old M & W warehouse on Franklin Street. That same year they were recognized by the Florida Cabinet and later Food and Wine Magazine. In 2015 and 2016 they were featured in "Southern Living" magazine and in 2017 they expanded again, moving into their current facility, which is in the building that previously housed A Wild Hair and Mia's at the corner of Market and Jefferson streets.

The building is not just a production facility, but an ice cream and

coffee shop. Beautifully decorated, it displays large canvas photographs of their "ladies," the cows from Cindale Farms. Also proudly displayed on the wall is a large canvas of their mission statement.

Several windows inside allow patrons a look inside the creamery's kitchen while production is underway. Their Grand Opening was held Saturday, Feb. 24 and was a huge success, causing them to sell out of ice cream. Being fulltime dairy farmers makes regular business hours difficult. Check their Facebook page at Southern Craft Creamery for hours of operation. Both Brad and Meghan have degrees from the University of Florida and Meghan is a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, which surely comes in handy on the farm. Please support our local businesses. Stop by Southern Craft Creamery and taste what they have to offer.

Leafy green packs a punch, UF expert says

You don't have to be Popeye to celebrate Spinach Day, March 26.

Packed with vitamins and minerals, this leafy green is a nutritional powerhouse, says a researcher at the University of Florida.

"Spinach is a rich source of nutrients, such as vitamin A, specifically beta-carotene; vitamin K, which helps with blood clotting and bone health; and folate, which reduces the risk of certain birth defects," said Mitch Knutson, professor of nutritional biochemistry with UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

But isn't spinach high in iron, too?

That's a myth, Knutson said. "Spinach has a fair amount of iron, but not really much more than other green leafy vegetables. The problem is that the iron in spinach is not very bioavailable."

Though spinach may not be high in iron, its strong nutritional profile makes it a great addition to a healthy diet, he said.

"There's a large amount of data in the scientific literature showing that people who consume a lot of vegetables, including dark green leafy vegetables, have lower risk of many diseases. So the more spinach and other vegetable foods you can eat, the better," Knutson said.

If you don't care for munching on leaves, think beyond the salad when it comes to sneaking spinach into your diet, he said.

"One easy way to incorporate spinach into your diet is to put it in smoothies. For example, I'll consume nearly two cups of raw spinach that I add to my breakfast fruit smoothie, and it tastes very good," Knutson said. "Or you can add it to cooked pasta by pureeing it into pasta sauce. I use this trick on my children because they generally don't like vegetables."

Some may wonder whether consuming spinach raw or cooked is healthier. "My answer is, if you like spinach raw, eat it raw; if you like it cooked, eat it cooked," Knutson said.

That's because it's hard to generalize about the nutritional benefits of raw versus cooked vegetables. Cooking foods breaks them down, making some nutrients more available. On the other hand, cooking can also destroy some nutrients, he explained.

At the end of the day, what's important is that you're eating your vegetables, he said.

In addition to spinach, you might try other dark, leafy green vegetables such as arugula, kale, collard greens and watercress, which pack a similar nutritional punch, Knutson said.

And if you are looking for foods that are in fact high in iron, animal protein such as meat, poultry and fish contain a type of iron that's easily absorbed by the human body. There are some good vegetable sources, too, such as soy beans and soy bean products like tofu, Knutson said.

Push to let Florida voters decide gun restrictions fails

TALLAHASSEE — Floridians won't get a chance to vote this fall on adding gun control restrictions to the state constitution.

A powerful but somewhat obscure state panel on Wednesday rejected several proposed restrictions — including a ban on types of semi-automatic rifles — on procedural grounds.

The move by the Florida Constitution Revision Commission comes more than a month after 17 people were shot and killed at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. The killings shook Gov. Rick Scott and the Republican-controlled Legislature into action. Legislators defied the National Rifle Association by passing a far-reaching law that raised the age limit to purchase a

rifle to 21 and put in waiting period for rifle purchases.

Some Stoneman students and family members of victims wanted voters to be able to weigh in as well. Tony Montalto, whose daughter was among those slain, had asked commissioners earlier this month to take action because the NRA filed a federal lawsuit against the new law.

The commission meets every 20 years and has the authority ask voters to make changes to the state constitution. Its members were appointed by Gov. Rick Scott, legislative leaders and the chief justice of the Supreme Court.

A majority of commissioners said it would be wrong to waive the panel's rules in order to consider the gun control measures since they were being attached to

another proposal that had nothing to do with guns.

"I do agree that ideas should not scare us, but not following the rule — the rules that we all share by being on this commission — should scare everyone," said Attorney General Pam Bondi, one of the commission's 37 members.

After the meeting, Bondi said she did not agree with placing any of the restrictions in the constitution because the Legislature had already acted.

A handful of commissioners pleaded with the panel to respond to the shootings and act now. They noted the Parkland massacre came after the deadline passed for most proposals to be considered.

Roberto Martinez, a former federal prosecutor, wanted the

commission to put before voters a proposal that would place in the constitution the same restrictions that were in the recently-enacted state law. He said he had recently met with some of the students who were at Marjory Stoneman Douglas on the day of the shootings.

"They're not gun-grabbers," Martinez said. "What these students and these young people are asking for are reasonable laws to make sure that guns don't get into the hands of the wrong people. That's all they want. And they want an opportunity to vote."

The procedural votes against the gun control measures came several hours after House Speaker Richard Corcoran sent a letter to the commission saying he had "grave concerns" about the mea-

sures. Corcoran, who has been sharply criticized by the NRA for backing the newly-enacted law, said in his letter that "all firearm policies flow" from the right to bear arms and "should remain policy matters for the Legislature."

Two of the proposals rejected on Wednesday would have asked voters whether they wanted to ban a type of semi-automatic rifle.

Hank Coxe, a Jacksonville attorney who backed the ban, said he could not understand how the commission was unwilling to waive its rules to consider having a full debate on the measure. He noted that the commission was currently considering other wide-ranging measures, including whether or not to eliminate greyhound racing in the state.

State Briefs

Florida's jobless rate remains steady

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's jobless rate is remaining steady.

State officials announced Friday that the state's unemployment rate for February was 3.9 percent. That's lower than the national rate of 4.1 percent.

The unemployment rate started to edge upward at the end of last year but has remained unchanged for the last two months.

The latest estimates say there are about 398,000 unemployed people out of a workforce of nearly 10.2 million.

National data shows Florida remains among top states in job growth over the last year. The state added 167,800 total jobs since February 2017. California added nearly 384,000 jobs while Texas added more than 285,000.

Florida's overall growth rate for the last 12 months was 2 percent, which was the 10th highest rate in the nation.

Florida may vote to ban oil and gas drilling in state waters

TALLAHASSEE — Florida voters may get a chance to ban oil and gas drilling in waters near the state's coast.

A powerful panel that can alter the Florida Constitution gave preliminary

approval on Tuesday to a proposed ban. The Florida Constitution Revision Commission will take a final vote by May on whether to put it on the 2018 ballot.

Sixty-percent of voters must vote yes in order for the amendment to take effect. If adopted, oil and gas drilling would not be allowed up to nine miles off the coast in the Gulf of Mexico and up to three miles off the Atlantic coastline.

The 37-member panel meets every 20 years and is allowed to propose changes to the state constitution. The commission held its first meeting a year ago.

NASA's Mars rover Curiosity marks 2,000th day on red planet

CAPE CANAVERAL — NASA's Mars rover Curiosity has now marked 2,000 days on the red planet.

That's 2,000 days by Martian standards. A Martian sol, or solar day, is equivalent to 24 hours, 39 minutes and 35 seconds. So 2,000 days on Mars equal 2,055 days here on Earth.

Either way, it's a big milestone this week for scientists eager for Curiosity to begin drilling again, this time into potentially clay-rich rocks on the slopes of Mount Sharp. The six-wheeled rover has traveled 11.6 miles since its arrival in 2012.

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Parkland Shooting

How teens are pulling off a worldwide movement

PARKLAND — They can't buy a beer or rent a car and most aren't even old enough to vote, yet the students from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School have spearheaded what could become one of the largest marches in history with nearly 1 million people expected in Washington and more than 800 sister marches from California to Japan.

In the wake of a Valentine's Day shooting that killed 17, the teens have pulled all-nighters, scheduling speakers, petitioning city councils, renting stages and walking march routes with police in a grass-roots movement that has raised more than \$4 million. Students will walk down Pennsylvania Avenue during March for Our Lives on Saturday alongside pop stars Ariana Grande, Jennifer Hudson, Miley Cyrus and Demi Lovato.

They have requested 14 Jumbotrons, 2,000 chairs and 2,000 public restrooms.

"People don't think about all these little things, but they add up," said Marjory Stoneman Douglas senior Ryan Deitsch, who is 18.

Several student organizers have become main-

stays on national TV, promoting the marches, and they landed on the cover of Time magazine. In the first two weeks after the shooting, Deitsch worked 22-hour days, often sleeping in his clothes.

"I'd basically keep going until I shut down, like I'd just collapse, sometimes I'd be on the floor," Deitsch said.

Seasoned activists have marveled at what the students accomplished so far, including a sweeping gun bill in Florida and school walkouts attended by over a million students last week, according to organizers Women's March. Oprah Winfrey and George

and Amal Clooney have each donated \$500,000. The cast of "Modern Family" did a public service announcement, and Broadway stars Lin-Manuel Miranda and Ben Platt recorded a song for the march.

The Women's March, Everytown for Gun Safety and the gun violence prevention group founded by former Congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords provided heavy support for the march, opening the youths up to criticism that they are just pawns of left-wing organizations that have been fighting guns for years.

The students said, how-

ever, they are calling the shots, and have refused money and turned down support that doesn't align with their vision.

"They like to believe we're puppets, they like to believe that we're being controlled by someone else because ... they don't want to believe that human beings have this power because if they have this power then they might not need a gun," Deitsch said.

In Arizona, well over 20,000 people on social media promised to attend the student-led march, said leader Jordan Harb, a 17-year-old junior at Mountain View High School in Mesa. He coor-

inated vendors and met with police to talk about barricades and security as they expect counter-protesters to bring assault weapons.

They've raised roughly \$34,000 through T-Shirt sales and donations. The group Arizonans For Gun Safety is handling the money since the teens are underage.

"All of my waking hours are pretty much spent on the march right now," Harb said. "I'm in class and all I do in class in march stuff. I was in Spanish yesterday depositing \$10,000 in our bank account."

Marjory Stoneman Douglas student Casey Sherman spends most of her time in class working on a sister march in Parkland, where they're expecting more than 20,000 people. She and fellow students successfully petitioned city commissioners to get permits and she's learned about sponsorships and tax exemptions for charitable groups.

"Every day it's kind of cool because I'm learning things I don't learn in school," the 17-year-old said.

Broward County Property Appraiser Marty Kiar helped the students navigate local government but credited the rest to them,

saying "I've never seen anybody be able to bring so many stakeholders together in such a short period of time."

Riley Helberg, a 14-year-old freshman at Crescenta Valley High School, said the Los Angeles march could eclipse the Women's March there with more than 100,000 expected, along with a performance from singer Charlie Puth.

In New York, 17-year-old Winter Minisee, who spearheaded the student walkouts, dismissed criticisms that the teens don't have the credentials to change laws.

"Historically youth have led all the major movements in America, whether it was the civil rights movements, whether it was the movement against the Vietnam war," Minisee said.

The ultimate goal, the students said, is to harness the support into actual voters, with their sights set on November's midterms.

"The high-schoolers and the college students are sick of this normalcy in this environment that we live in where we have to live with mass shootings and code red drills," said Alex Wind, a junior at Stoneman Douglas.

911 calls show quick reaction to bridge collapse

MIAMI — Police and rescue workers arrived at the scene of a pedestrian bridge collapse near a Florida university campus even before witnesses could finish making 911 calls for help, according to audio files released Thursday.

Miami-Dade Police released 15 calls made to 911 dispatchers in the moments after the collapse on March 15.

Sirens could be heard blaring behind several frantic callers moments after the 950-ton (860-metric ton) structure fell into traffic.

"Oh, my gosh. A lot of cars are under the bridge," one woman told a 911 dispatcher.

She started crying and added, "Hurry up, please," before realizing police had arrived at the scene.

Another woman said in a shaken voice that she was driving to work when the bridge fell in front of her.

"There are dead people," she said in Spanish to the dispatcher.

A male caller told a dispatcher the bridge had collapsed across the whole eight-lane roadway.

"They just put it up, they

were working on it, and it collapsed into the middle of the road. We've got a big, big deal here," he said.

"It's a big, big, mess," he said, adding the police were already at the scene.

The dispatcher asked if anyone was injured.

"From what I see, it must have hurt somebody," he said.

The bridge was intended to span a busy roadway between Florida International University and the neighboring city of Sweetwater. The collapse killed six people.

The family of one of the victims filed a wrongful death lawsuit Thursday in state court. The lawsuit filed on behalf of the son and wife of victim Rolando Fraga seeks unspecified damages from Munilla Construction Management and FIGG Bridge Engineers, the two main entities involved in the bridge construction.

The lawsuit claims the two companies were negligent because they had warning that a public safety hazard existed and the flow of traffic beneath the bridge should have been shut down while work was being performed.

Several other lawsuits also have been filed since the collapse.

Newborn taken by tribe returns to mother, father

MIAMI — An infant girl taken from a Florida hospital by sovereign Indian nation officials has been reunited with her mother and father.

The mother's attorney Bradford Cohen said Friday the one-week old baby missed critical days to initiate breast-feeding.

The Miccosukee tribal court had issued an order of protection for the newborn on allegations the father was abusive. A Thursday statement didn't

say anything about mother Rebecca Sanders.

The baby was placed in custody of the grandmother for four days after Miami-Dade officers accompanied Miccosukee police to carry out the order Sunday at a Miami hospital outside the reservation.

Miami-Dade said its officers were misled.

U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio accused the Miccosukee of lying to police and hospital about having state or federal court approval to take the child.

Another View

Decline of public records

We've spotted an unwelcome trend in Florida politics, and, for once, it doesn't involve the usual suspects — such as guns, undocumented immigrants, tax cuts, or corporate welfare.

This time, it's a fundamental aspect of Florida's Constitution and operations at state and local government. Consider the following examples reported by various news outlets during just the past three months:

- » A state appellate court last month ruled that the St. Petersburg City Council violated the law by holding a closed-door meeting to discuss a contested ordinance related to shooing homeless people out of city parks;
 - » The city of St. Pete Beach settled a case alleging wrongful closed-door meetings over revisions to the city comprehensive land-use plan;
 - » The city of Bradenton Beach has spent more than \$52,000 so far defending itself against accusations that it wrongfully withheld public records;
 - » Four current or former members and the general counsel of the North Broward Hospital District Commission were indicted for conducting private meetings to discuss the ousting of the hospital CEO;
 - » Two Martin County commissioners and a former member were arrested for destroying public records related to a lawsuit involving a company that operates a rock quarry;
 - » A local TV station in Riviera Beach sued the city after city council members refused to turn over text messages that may indicate they discussed the firing of the city manager out of the public eye.
- If you haven't picked up on the theme yet, we're talking about Florida's Sunshine Laws, which govern, and guarantee, the public's access to government records and meetings of elected officials.
- We bring this up because last week was Sunshine Week, an annual initiative of the Florida Society of News Editors to call attention to the value of, and threats to, our open government laws.

Florida's laws and tradition of allowing its citizens access to records are among the oldest in America, dating to 1909. Measures providing for access to government meetings are a half-century old. Both have been reaffirmed by voters over the past 50 years.

For the most part, state and local officials comply without question, which makes Florida both progressive and unique when compared to other states.

But as shown by the disappointing cases above, some public officials still seek to sidestep the law.

Nor do state lawmakers tire of trying to push more of government into the shade. The First Amendment Foundation, an open government watchdog group in Tallahassee, notes that Florida lawmakers have enacted 1,122 exemptions to our Sunshine Laws over the years and entertained another 122 this session.

Which is why the media and the public must partner in remaining vigilant in defense of our right to know what are leaders are doing. We must not take this obligation lightly. Once government officials sense or believe we won't strive to protect this domain, we will soon lose it.

Sunshine Week, celebrated nationally each year since 2005, gives us the best opportunity to remember this. And it's important to understand we observe this moment around this time each year in order to recognize the birthday of James Madison on March 16. Madison's comment to William T. Barry, lieutenant governor of Kentucky, in August 1822 remains the theme for this week, and is well worth recalling:


"A popular Government, without popular information, or the means of acquiring it, is but a Prologue to a Farce or a Tragedy; or, perhaps both. Knowledge will forever govern ignorance: And a people who mean to be their own Governors, must arm themselves with the power which knowledge gives."

Let's walk in the sunshine.

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Secret debate tip for GOP

On a recent CBS "60 Minutes," Lesley Stahl asked Education Secretary Betsy DeVos about the "institutional racism" in school discipline.

It was like neither of them had ever heard of Nikolas Cruz. The Parkland, Florida, school shooter is our most recent case study of what happens when liberals start babbling about "institutional racism."

There's never been such an incredible paper trail as there is with Cruz, leading straight from idiotic liberal ideas directly to mass murder. We know that Broward County Public Schools knew about Cruz's felonies. We know that his behavior wasn't reported because it would negatively impact the record of a student of color. The school district bragged about the policy.

Perhaps having no criminal record would have helped Cruz get a good job someday. But it is a fact that one of the consequences of not reporting his crimes was that HE COULD GET A GUN.

Unless liberals are going to say that guns had nothing to do with the Parkland shooting, it was the racial bean-counting in school discipline that unleashed this psychotic on innocent students and teachers at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School four weeks ago.

Stahl treated as cold hard fact the idea that schools punish "students of color more harshly than their white classmates," citing this real-world example:

"Let's say" — lots of serious journalism begins with "let's say" — "there's a disruption in the classroom and a bunch of white kids are disruptive and they get punished, you know, go see the principal. But the black kids are, you know, they call in the cops. I mean, that's the issue: who and how the kids who disrupt are being punished."

I remember this plot on "Law & Order," but there aren't many examples of it in real life.

Teachers in St. Paul, Minnesota, have been hospitalized and permanently disabled by their "disruptive" African-American students, thanks to former St. Paul Public Schools Superintendent Valeria Silva's commitment to ending the "school-to-prison

pipeline."

One kid was "disruptive" by punching and strangling a science teacher, John Ekblad, giving him a concussion and permanent brain injuries. The African-American student walked away from

Ekblad's body splayed out on the floor, saying, "Did you see me slam that white-ass teacher?"

This "disruptive" rascal was sentenced to 90 days house arrest and probation. Luckily, he wasn't punished more severely, or he might have ended up on the "school-to-prison pipeline." I'm sure he's doing well now.

A popular grade-school teacher, Debbie York, had to undergo repeated surgeries after an 85-pound first-grade student of color assaulted her when she tried to intervene as he was throwing furniture and biting other children. He threw a chair at York, missed her, then body-slammed her, causing permanent injuries.

While on sick leave after the incident, York emailed parents to explain why she was gone. For informing parents about the assault in class, she was promptly cashiered from her 30-year teaching career.

What matters isn't the safety of teachers and students. Nor is it whether anyone is learning anything. All that matters is that no one ever writes down the bad behavior of black and brown students.

When public school teachers — not a conservative bunch — in Minnesota — not a conservative state — are showing up in a boiling rage at school board meetings to complain about their African-American students having carte blanche to bully and defy them, the problem may not be that our schools are being run by Bull Connor.

One teacher, David McGill, complained that an out-of-control African-American fourth-grader had "significantly compromised an entire year of science instruction for the great majority of his classmates." He said there was nothing he could do about it because of the school's racial quotas

on student discipline.

Superintendent Silva's response was to get snippy about the teacher's word choice:

"You said they are 'infecting' other children. I almost fell out of my chair," Silva said.

"I didn't mean it —"

"Doesn't matter. You said it." Eventually, the school district had to buy off Silva with a \$800,000 severance agreement just to get her to leave. It was her or the teachers.

CBS's Stahl is either an ideologue, intentionally painting a picture that is the polar opposite of the truth by implying that students of color are the true victims here — or else she is so stupid and untutored in the subject that she has no business reporting on it. I could go either way. Your choice. (We need an expression for this sort of broadcast. Something like ... FAKE NEWS!)

A smart Republican would be dying for liberals to bring up the "school-to-prison pipeline." The more it is talked about, the more ripe the insanity becomes.

Even if we don't use those words, I think more and more older people are joining the YOLO movement. It is a puzzlement as to why the children of

the woman I overheard would think YOLO is a good idea for themselves, but not for their parents. Isn't what's good for the goose, good for the gander?

A bigger question for those who have any money to pass along

is: Why would you even think leaving money to your children is a good idea? Sure, it's tradition, but what makes you believe it would make your children happier, better or wiser people? Have you read a study that says it's a good idea? Is there a scientific paper that confirms it? Leaving money to your offspring seems like common sense, but so did the Domino Theory, not so very long ago.

We've all heard stories of great fortunes left to spoiled, unseasoned children who wasted it — or worse, created great evil with their unearned wealth. Most of us can name a family where money seemed to be a curse, not a blessing. The old TV show "The Millionaire" would show how receiving a million dollars, tax-free, seemed to wreck peoples lives, not improve them. Many successful people believe they are successful because they had tough, rocky, almost abusive childhoods. They wonder how

their own children will learn the lessons they need to know if they spend all their money giving them a "perfect" childhood. Will they be tough enough? Will they be street-smart? Will they value hard work if they don't have to work?

Any college administrator can tell you stories about parents who will do anything for their kids: do their homework for them, write their admissions essay for them, make sure they never hit a bump in the road. It's almost hard to imagine a better way to raise an unsuccessful, unhappy adult who won't be able to afford therapy. It would almost be like your personal trainer saying, "The less you train, the stronger you'll be."

YOLO encourages bad choices and risky behavior. A better philosophy for an adventure-filled life would be the old phrase, "You'll be dead for a long time." It leaves plenty of room for saying "yes" to all kinds of learning and enjoyable experiences, yet it has a built-in warning about trying the truly dangerous stunts. It discourages speeding and cherry bombs, but allows for eating worms and going on cruises.

YOLO doesn't leave room for a next life; the other phrase simply encourages us to make the most of this one. Don't waste it.

County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to the residence on Dessie Stone Rd. Upon arrival they interviewed the homeowner who stated that his sister and estranged husband were engaged in an argument and at some point he stated that he heard multiple gun shots. He then heard a vehicle leave. After the vehicle left, he could not locate his sister or her estranged husband.

"The two deputies identified more than one bullet casings on the ground and there was the presence of blood at the scene. A short time later information was reported to Calhoun County Law Enforcement stating that the estranged husband had contacted other family members and told them that he had shot his wife and placed her in the trunk of the

vehicle and intended to end his own life. Calhoun County Investigators and deputies attempted to locate his vehicle using various methods.

"Around 4 a.m. the subject reached out to one of his children by telephone and during those conversations, he was encouraged to turn himself in. At 7:11 a.m., we were contacted by the Jackson County Sheriff's Office, whereas they notified us that the subject had indeed turned himself in to them and was in custody. Charges are forthcoming."

Dessie Stone Road is a little more than two miles from Blountstown City Hall.

Kimbrel said Friday the Yoder family has a large and respected presence in Calhoun County.

"I don't know what I could say to make anything better for them, except that we certainly need to and will keep them in our thoughts and prayers," he said.

Law enforcement officers found Adams at the residence on Carter Loop, at approximately 4:55 p.m. that day.

Authorities say Adams was inside the residence and that several guns were

located inside the truck. Adams reportedly barricaded himself inside the home and had a handgun. When deputies tried to convince Adams to put the gun down and walk out, officials say, he fired a shot and told the officers he was serious. The Jackson County Sheriff's Office, at that point, requested the as-

sistance of the Bay County Sheriff's Office SWAT team. Once the SWAT team arrived, those officers attempted to reason with Adams to exit the house and turn himself in, authorities say. He allegedly fired two more shots inside the house. After more attempts to convince Adams to exit the house, the SWAT

team used less-than-lethal weapons to enter the house and take Adams into custody, officials say. At approximately 10:30 p.m., he was taken into custody with no one being injured.

Gilmore said in a press release about the search. "We need an energetic person that has a real passion to help us grow both as a county and as an organization. We will find someone that has the ability to have a great relationship with our partners and be a tremendous point person for our efforts."

The director would work closely with the JCEDC board of directors, county and city officials, utility providers, organizations such as Enterprise Florida, Opportunity Florida, Florida's Great Northwest, educational entities, the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, the local Tourist Development Council, existing businesses, site selectors for potential new-coming businesses, and other partners in an effort to market the area and its assets and provide guidance to those contemplating relocation to Jackson County or expanding their existing presence here.

The director will also need knowledge of social media and skill in using it, computer skills including the use

of major office programs and apps like spreadsheets, word processing and email, the ability to handle impromptu inquiries, and skills in written communications.

Candidates for the job should also know and be able to execute budgeting and money management, economic principles and concepts, standard office practices, and have skills in conflict management and resolution.

The first-hired person in the job will also need skills in helping develop initial policies and procedures necessary for the JCEDC to work successfully with private and public-sector entities to improve the economic health of the county and surrounding region.

The director will also be expected to develop a local team "to work projects that will result in the retention, expansion, or attraction of businesses" to the county, and promote a positive image of the county and region overall with the aim of creating jobs and spurring capital investment here.

arises. The job description seeks candidates with education equivalent to a baccalaureate degree in a field of study related to the requirements of the job.

PITTSBURGH — It was a beautiful day to honor Mister Rogers with a postage stamp.

The U.S. Postal Service on Friday released a stamp featuring Fred Rogers, the gentle TV host who entertained and educated generations of preschoolers on "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood."

The stamp pictures Rogers in his trademark cardigan along with King Friday, a puppet character from the show's Neighborhood of Make-Believe sketch.

A dedication ceremony was held at the Pittsburgh studio where Rogers filmed his beloved PBS show, which aired between 1968 and 2001. Rogers died in 2003 at age 74.

Among those attending were Rogers' widow, Joanne, and David Newell, who played Mr. McFeely, the deliveryman on "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood."

Joanne Rogers said that when she first saw the stamp, it was "love at first sight."

"I thought it was so beautiful. I think it is so festive," she said.

Postmaster General Megan Brennan said at the unveiling that Mister Rogers "made the ups and downs of life easier to understand for the youngest members of our society."

"He shaped generations with his kindness and compassion," she said.

Noting the stamp has the words "Forever USA,"

NYC firefighter dies battling Harlem blaze

NEW YORK — A New York City firefighter died early Friday battling a fierce blaze on a movie set in a former jazz club after getting separated from his fellow firefighters in the thick smoke.

The fire started in the cellar as the crew of "Motherless Brooklyn," directed by Edward Norton, was nearing the end of its working day at 11 p.m. Thursday. Flames poured out the windows as firefighters stormed into the five-story Harlem building, dumping water on the blaze to get it under control.

Firefighter Michael R. Davidson of Engine Co. 69 was assigned to the nozzle on the lead hose-line and pushed into the burning basement.

But the blaze was too much. Firefighters had to back out, and the 15-year veteran was separated from his colleagues. Firefighters searched desperately for him, and he was found unconscious after suffering severe smoke inhalation, Fire Commissioner Daniel Nigro said. Davidson was pronounced

dead at a hospital shortly after midnight.

Trump draws ire of farmers in trade war

DES MOINES, Iowa — From hog producers in Iowa to apple growers in Washington state and winemakers in California, farmers expressed deep disappointment Friday over being put in the middle of a potential trade war with China by the president many of them helped elect.

After President Donald Trump announced plans to impose tariffs on products including Chinese steel, Beijing responded Friday with a threat to slap an equal 25 percent charge on U.S. products such as pork, and a 15 percent tariff on such things as wine, apples, ethanol and stainless-steel pipe.

American farmers "should be not necessarily infuriated but close to it," said Wayne Humphreys, who farms corn and soybeans and raises hogs and cattle near Columbus Junction, Iowa. "We've invested a lot of time, talent and treasure in developing markets around the world, and with the stroke of a

pen, that investment has been jeopardized."

US charges Iranians in hacking scheme

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration announced criminal charges and sanctions Friday against Iranians accused in a hacking scheme to pilfer sensitive information from hundreds of universities, private companies and American government agencies.

The nine defendants, accused of working at the behest of the Iranian government-tied Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps, hacked the computer systems of about 320 universities in the United States and abroad to steal expensive science and engineering research that was then used by the government or sold for profit, prosecutors said.

The hackers also are accused of breaking into the networks of government organizations, such as the Department of Labor, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the United Nations, and private sector entities.

Trump signs \$1.3 trillion budget after 'reality show' drama

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump grudgingly signed a \$1.3 trillion federal spending measure Friday and averted a midnight government shutdown — but only after undercutting his own negotiators and setting off a mini-panic with a last-minute veto threat. The episode further eroded the already damaged credibility of both the president and a White House staff that had assured the nation he was onboard.

Trump said he was "very disappointed" in the package, in part because it did not fully pay for his planned border wall with Mexico and did not extend protection from deportation to some 700,000 "Dreamer" immigrants due to lose coverage under a program the president himself has moved to eliminate.

But Trump praised the bill's provisions to increase military spending and said he had "no choice but to fund our military."

"My highest duty is to keep America safe," he said.

The bill signing came a few hours after Trump created his latest round of last-minute drama by tweeting that he was "considering" a veto.

With Congress already on recess, and a government shutdown looming, he said that young immigrants now protected in the U.S. under Barack Obama's Delayed Action for Childhood Arrivals program "have been totally abandoned by the Democrats (not even mentioned in Bill) and the BORDER WALL, which is desperately needed for our National Defense, is not fully funded."

Trump's veto threat put him at odds with top members of his administration and Republican House Speaker Paul Ryan, who had said publicly that Trump supported the bill. Advisers inside and outside the White House said they never expected Trump to go through with his threat and believed he was likely still blowing off steam.

Finally, in made-for-TV scheduling, Trump took to twitter again to announce he'd be holding a news conference to talk about the bill. The drama was short-lived: An aide told reporters the signing was on. And it was a monologue by Trump, not a news conference.

He answered two questions called out to him as he left the room.

Asked why he'd made the threat, Trump said he'd "looked very seriously at the veto," but "because of the incredible gains that we've been able to make for the military that overrode any of our thinking."

He warned Congress: "I will never sign another bill like this again."

The giant spending bill, though, expires Sept. 30, and another funding measure will be needed. To boost the party-in-power's ability to muscle its agenda through Congress, he called for an overhaul of Senate rules to allow for simple-majority votes on all bills and appealed to Congress for line-item veto power to kill specific spending items he disagrees with. The Supreme Court ruled in 1998 that a congressionally passed line-item veto was unconstitutional.

The will-he, won't-he episode came hours after the Senate's early morning passage of the huge spending package aimed at keeping the government open past Friday midnight.

Trump backed the bill only reluctantly, and Republican lawmakers and aides acknowledged the deal involved trade-offs for Democratic votes that were needed despite the GOP majority lock on Congress.

The president had been especially frustrated in recent days by media coverage of the bill and by conservative Republican lawmakers, some of whom had been calling to harangue him and making their cases loudly on cable news shows he is known to watch.

Rep. Mark Meadows, R-N.C., chairman of the House Freedom Caucus and a friend of the president, said in a tweet that the group would "fully support" a veto, adding that Congress should pass a short-term budget resolution while Trump and congressional leaders "negotiate a better deal for the forgotten men and women of America."

Houseplants for the horticulturally impaired

Hints of impending spring weather might stir a desire to grow plants even in people not usually drawn in that direction. If you are one of them, yet your thumbs lack the slightest hint of green, take heart: There are houseplants even you can grow.

You'll have to forgo color if you require a truly tough houseplant. Flowering takes too much of a plant's energy, which comes from good (or at least reasonably good) growing conditions, including abundant light.

Don't look for color in leaves either, because plants with colorful leaves have them only when there's plenty of light so that they can do more with less green.



The ways houseplants are abused

Poor light is not the only abuse you might suffer upon a houseplant. Many people forget to water them, or water them too much.

Also, as plants grow, they need to be divided and repotted, or shifted to larger pots.

A houseplant for the horticulturally impaired should not grow so fast that frequent repotting is necessary.

Some houseplants tolerate abuse

Yes, there are plants that can survive, and even look perky, with little light, neglectful or excessive watering, and little other care. And they're not all cacti.

Take dumbcane and spider plant, for instance. Both are hard to kill, yet

keep up appearances with little attention. Spider plant can fill its pot rapidly and send out new "babies" all over the place, but that's only with good growing conditions.

For best results, grow an all-green variety of spider plant, rather than one with white stripes in its leaves. All green spider plants, with more chlo-

rophyll, tolerate low light better.

Geraniums also tolerate an amazing amount of abuse. They won't flower under these conditions, so in that case why not grow scented geraniums? Many have frilly foliage and, depending on the variety, their leaves carry aromas such as chocolate, rose or lemon. If in doubt about

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whether a geranium is thirsty, don't water.

Cyperus is a houseplant whose especially graceful appearance belies its tough-as-nails constitution. This is a water plant, closely related to papyrus, so it cannot tolerate drying out. But watering cyperus is a no-brainer; just set the pot in a deep saucer that you always keep filled with water.



Succulents

Succulent plants — which include but are not limited to cacti — are obvious houseplant candidates for non-gardeners. If you've killed them in the past, it was probably because of too much water, a situation easily avoided if, when you first get the plant, you repot it with an equal volume of perlite or sand mixed into the potting soil. The perlite or sand lets water run right through the mix, making it impossible to overwater. Alternatively, repot the plant in potting mix formulated especially for succulents.

Succulents present an amazing array of shapes and textures of greenery. In that well-drained potting mix, it would be almost impossible to kill

an aloe plant. Its leaves remain soft, fleshy and smooth, just as if you've been lavishing it with care. (I water mine about every six months, sometimes even less frequently!)

Kalanchoe hardly looks like a desert plant, yet it survives neglect in proper style.

The same could be said for burro's tail, ideal for hanging baskets with its rosy stems swathed in fat leaves.

Jade plants respond to good conditions by growing rapidly and flowering, but they look almost the same when grown in utter neglect. Grow this succulent as a bush or a small tree. When the plant grows too large for your likes or its pot, it'll get along fine for a long time with its stems just trimmed back to whatever size you want, rather than needing to be repotted.

You would think that plants called living stones would be tough houseplants — and they are. They do look like stones, however, so they might not satisfy the seasonal urge for lush greenery.

Then again, if you just need some kind of garden experience this time of year, you don't need greenery. Get a decorative tray and emulate in miniature the famous Zen landscape at Ryoan-ji in Kyoto, Japan; it consists of a rectangular plot of neatly raked quartz sand surrounding artistically clustered groups of rocks.

What's old is new again: Home decor rethinks its materials

The Earth is awash in garbage, and designers of home decor are looking at ways to reuse the waste. Among the many clever ideas emerging are tiles made out of blue jeans, and furniture made out of bottles.

Detritus from timber and agriculture is being reborn as building and design materials. Sea algae is being used to create dyes and fabrics.

These innovations signal a shift in our relationship with materials, says Caroline Till of the London-based design house Franklin Till. Her firm created "The Future is Urban" pavilion at Frankfurt's Heimtextil fair last year, which showcased trends in global materials.

"All over the world, an emerging generation (is) rethinking raw materials, repurposing waste, and presenting radical solutions to the challenges of designing and making," Till says.

"We're potentially on the brink of a materials revolution that could help rebalance our relationship with our planet and reshape society for the better. Consumers are looking for brands and companies to operate in a more responsible and conscious way."

While traditional raw materials can be expensive and in limited supply, household waste and industry scrap are abundant and cheap.

Plastic is one of modern life's most pervasive and polluting materials, Till says. But its innate durability, malleability and indestructibility can be used to create sound, hard-wearing materials.

"The petroleum age's equivalent of fashioning silk purses from sows' ears," she says.

Emeco, creator of an iconic 1944 aluminum Navy chair, has partnered with Coca-Cola to make the chair out of 111 plastic bottles. Its production keeps 3 million of them out of landfills annually.

IKEA has partnered with Stockholm studio Form Us With Love for the Kungsbacka range of kitchen cabinetry, made of recycled plastic bottles and reclaimed industrial wood. The retailer is also repurposing its own waste stream. Colorful Tanum flat-weave rugs are made from scraps from bed-linen production. The Tomat spray bottle is made of plastic left over from packing material. A swirly vase designed by Iina Vuorivirta started life as glass waste from other production.

IKEA spokesman Malin Nordin says that finding new and smarter ways to use materials is a company goal. The challenge is to develop materials that are safe, high-quality and easy to work with.

"We need to stop thinking outside of the box and start thinking in circles. Being circular means eliminating waste at every step of the way," she says.


"Unavoidable waste needs to be turned into resources, and IKEA needs to generate its own renewable energy. The goal of producing as much renewable energy as IKEA consumes has been set for 2020."

In London, designer Micaella Pedros is experimenting with melted plastic bottles as a replacement for bolts and screws for furniture repair.

Weaver Green, in Devonshire, England, has created yarn from recycled bottles that has the look and feel of wool. It's used to make durable rugs, cushions, footstools and blankets.

Designer WooJai Lee is experimenting with a brick made out of pulped newspaper that can be used to craft benches and tables. And a Danish firm, NewspaperWood BV, has developed a product that can be cut like wood, with grain and texture. Peugeot worked with it on a concept car; the material was used for door panels and dashboards.

Berlin-based material designer Sophie Rowley regards waste streams as

"a future quarry, a starting point rather than an end point." She re-engineers Styrofoam, glass, paper and textiles into items like side tables, with the waste materials transformed into beautiful flow patterns and textures. Nissan is considering a material she makes out of scrap denim for possible dashboards.

The clothing industry is providing a large supply of material — notably leath-

er, denim and cottons.

Danish startup Really worked with textile giant Kvadrat on reusing an enormous store of worn-out sheets, towels and uniforms from hospitality and hospitals. The results: a sturdy textile slab that can sub for wood or composite, as well as an acoustic felt with excellent sound-absorbing qualities.

Spanish designer Jorge Penades transforms scrap leather into lamps clad in

a colorful "structural skin."

The timber industry generates thousands of tons of waste pine needles annually. In Latvia, Tamara Orjola crushes, soaks, steams, binds and presses the needles into a material she calls Forest Wool, which she forms into stools, benches and carpet.

While working as a consultant to the Philippine leather goods industry, Spanish designer and

entrepreneur Carmen Hijosa developed a method of processing pineapple leaves into supple, textural faux leather she calls Pinatex. Farmers now benefit from two revenue streams.

"By using intelligent, sensitive, appealing design," says Caroline Till, "these waste pioneers are developing exciting and innovative ways to turn what's previously been unwanted into objects of desire."

New book explores the modern blacksmith

Asked what it feels like to forge iron, Robert Thomas has to pause for a moment and compose himself before plunging into a description of what, for him, is as much a passion as a livelihood.

"Forging has a way of taking hold of you until it becomes a part of who you are," Thomas says. "It not only links us to the millennia of blacksmiths who came before us, but in this age of Silicon Valley and computers, it's one thing that machines can't really do, at least easily anyway."

"The work of a blacksmith is not at all limited to Renaissance fairs," he continues. "It's very much alive today."

In his new book, "The Art and Craft of the Blacksmith: Techniques for the Modern Smith" (Quarto Publishing Group USA, 2018), Thomas explains the tools of the trade, offers a history of decorative iron, and discusses techniques for anyone from the novice to the accomplished blacksmith.

His love for the ancient craft is palpable as he describes the sensation of hammering heated metal until it can be molded like clay, becoming stronger in the process.

"Forging is completely addictive," says Thomas, who runs a studio in Charleston, South Carolina, that combines restoration work with more modern, artistic pieces. "The best thing is when I have a friend or craftsman in another discipline who comes to try it. The first time they shape hot metal, you can see it in their face. When you see that steel squish out like PlayDoh, the whole experience is ethereal."

Try being a smith, he says, and "you'll never look at metal the same way. And you'll look at bridges differently."

The permanence of the works also part of the attraction, he says. "When we install a beautifully forged gate in front of someone's home, we know it will last longer than absolutely anything else there."

JoAnn Bentley, an administrator for the Artist Blacksmith Association of North America, says many of the organization's estimated 4,000 members are young, and include some women.

"It's a thriving craft and is really coming back to life these days," she says. She partly credits the television show "Forged in Fire" on the

History Channel.

Thomas had tried a career in finance, but wasn't happy there. "So at 24, I decided I had to do something different. ... I knew I loved working with my hands, and I loved art, and when I tried blacksmithing I was certain it was for me," he says.

He went on to study the craft — long known as "the master trade" because of how essential it was in traditional village

life — at what he calls the "Harvard for blacksmiths," Hereford College of Arts, in Hereford, England. He became one of a handful of Americans inducted as a certified journeyman in Britain's Worshipful Company of Blacksmiths, a guild that dates to the 1300s.

There are places closer to home that a would-be blacksmith can study. The American College of Building Arts, in Charles-

ton, where Thomas is based, has a program, he says, as do several other institutions across the country. But they are rare.

His studio, Robert Thomas Iron Design, includes five other blacksmiths, plus a part-time engineer and designer. It's one of only about 30 studios like it in the United States, he says.

"It's great to work side by side with other blacksmiths. That amazing ca-

maraderie of blacksmiths around the world is one of the truly great things about this field," he says.

Thomas hopes his book conveys a sense of that community. "It's also meant as a primer for craftspeople who may have had a taste of basic blacksmithing and want to take it to the next level," he says.

"The goal is to present blacksmithing in a modern, professional context and offer some perspec-

tive on how to contribute to the world of design using blacksmithing techniques to create large and small pieces of functional art," he says.

Projects detailed in the book include bookends, a trivet, a door handle and a fireplace tool set.

In addition to historical restoration work, his studio makes furniture and a range of shelf brackets, which he says is their most popular item.

Store Help

Not handy? Walmart offers installers, builders

NEW YORK — Walmart doesn't just want to sell TVs and furniture — it wants to send a professional home to set them up, too.

The world's largest retailer said Monday that it is expanding a deal with on-demand online services platform Handy.com, allowing shoppers to hire helpers at 2,000 of its stores nationwide to mount a TV on their wall or assemble a bookcase.

Other retailers have offered similar services as they seek to make shopping more convenient to get customers to buy more and cut down on returns. Wayfair, the online furniture seller, also offers Handy's services. Amazon.com has its own on-demand services offering. And furniture seller Ikea bought Taskrabbit last year and is rolling out the service to its stores.

Walmart, which first tested Handy in 25 stores

in Atlanta, said shoppers can hire a Handy professional when they check out at a store or on its web-

site. Mounting a TV starts at \$79, while putting together furniture starts at \$69, Handy said.

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**TAX BENEFITS FOR
HIGHER EDUCATION**

Higher education costs paid in 2017 can mean tax savings when taxpayers file their tax returns. If taxpayers, their spouses or their dependents take post-high school coursework this year, they may be eligible for a tax credit or deduction. Here are some facts from the IRS about tax benefits for higher education.

The American Opportunity Credit (AOC) is:
Worth a maximum benefit up to \$2,500 per eligible student; only for the first four years at an eligible college or vocational school; and for students enrolled at least half time for at least one academic period during 2017. Taxpayers can claim the AOC for a student enrolled in the first three months of 2018 as long as they paid qualified expenses in 2017.

The Lifetime Learning Credit (LLC) is:
Worth a maximum benefit up to \$2,000 per tax return, per year, no matter how many students qualify; available for all years of postsecondary education and for courses to acquire or improve job skills; and available for an unlimited number of tax years.

The Tuition and Fees Deduction is:
Worth a maximum benefit up to \$4,000; claimed as an adjustment to income; available even if a taxpayer doesn't itemize deductions on Schedule A; and limited to tuition and certain related expenses required for enrollment or attendance at eligible postsecondary educational institutions.

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Weinstein Co. files for bankruptcy protection


NEW YORK CITY — The Weinstein Co. filed for bankruptcy protection on Monday with a buyout offer in hand from a private equity firm, the latest twist in its efforts to survive the sexual misconduct scandal that brought down co-founder Harvey Weinstein, shook Hollywood and triggered a movement that spread out to convulse other industries.

The company also announced it was releasing any victims of or witnesses to Weinstein's alleged misconduct from non-disclosure agreements preventing them from speaking out. That step had long been sought by New York State Attorney General Eric Schneiderman, who filed a lawsuit against the company last month on behalf of its employees.

The Weinstein Co. said it has entered into a "stalking horse" agreement with an affiliate of Dallas-based Lantern Capital Partners as part of its bankruptcy protection filing in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Delaware. That means Lantern has agreed to buy the company, subject to approval from the court.

The company made the filing about two weeks after negotiations to sell the company to a group of investors fell apart. Lantern, which had been one of those investors, has now offered to buy most of the assets of the company and keep on its employees, the Weinstein Co. said.

Other bidders also could emerge, particularly those interested in the company's lucrative 277-film library, which includes award-winning films from big-name directors like Quentin Tarantino and horror releases from its Dimension label. Free of

liabilities, the company's assets could increase in value in a bankruptcy.

The movie and TV studio becomes the first high-profile company to be forced into bankruptcy in the nationwide outcry over workplace sexual misconduct. Dozens of prominent men in entertainment, media, finance, politics and other realms have seen their careers derailed, but no other company has seen its very survival as tightly intertwined with the fate of one man as the Weinstein Co.

In more fallout over the

scandal, New York's governor directed the state attorney general to review the 2015 decision by the Manhattan district attorney's office not to prosecute a 2015 case involving an Italian model who said Weinstein groped her.

Weinstein, who was fired as CEO of his company in October, has denied any allegations of non-consensual sex.

Hanging in the balance is the fate of more than 100 employees and several lawsuits filed by Weinstein's accusers.

Under bankruptcy pro-

tection, those lawsuits will be halted and no new legal claims can be brought against the company. Secured creditors will get priority for payment over the women suing the company.

However, the lawsuit filed by Schneiderman's office will not be automatically halted because it was filed by a law enforcement agency.

The bankruptcy process also will bring the company's finances into public view, including the extent of its debt. Negotiations to sell the company to a group of investors led by

businesswoman Maria Contreras-Sweet fell apart earlier this month after the buyers claimed they discovered up to \$64 million in undisclosed liabilities, including \$27 million in residuals and profit participation. Those liabilities come on top of \$225 million in debt, which the buyers had said they would be prepared to take on as part of a \$500 million acquisition deal.

The Weinstein Co. already had been struggling financially before the scandal erupted in October with a news stories in

The New York Times and The New Yorker. Brothers Harvey and Bob Weinstein started the company in 2005 after leaving Miramax, the company they founded in 1979 and which became a powerhouse in '90s indie film with hits like "Pulp Fiction." After finding success with Oscar winners "The Artist" and "The King's Speech," the Weinstein Co.'s output and relevance diminished in recent years. The company let go 50 employees in 2016 and continuously shuffled release dates while short of cash.

'Pacific Rim Uprising' is cheer-at-the-screen fun

At the end of the monsters-versus-robots flick "Pacific Rim," a breach at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean is closed, plugging a hole that allowed hellish creatures to emerge and terrorize the globe. But after the movie earned \$400 million worldwide, was that portal really going to stay closed?

No, of course not. And, with sincere apologies to the front-line cities on the Pacific Rim facing a mauling, we say thank goodness, because the new sequel "Pacific Rim Uprising" is a visually-stunning, expertly crafted dose of cheer-at-the-screen fun. It's the definition of what a blockbuster sequel should be.

"Pacific Rim Uprising" uses a lighter palette and is geared toward a younger audience than its 2013 predecessor, but it keeps all the key elements, upping the special effects and finding honest moments and humor in the midst of world-destroying carnage. It satisfies on every front.

Success wasn't foreordained for the sequel. Original writer Travis Beacham and director-writer Guillermo del Toro haven't returned (though del Toro is still a producer), nor have its original stars, Charlie Hunnam and Idris Elba. (Elba had a very good reason for not showing up: He blew himself up in the final moments of the original to keep the Pacific portal closed.)

Steven S. DeKnight, who created and ran the TV series "Spartacus" on Starz, was tapped to direct while del Toro focused on the smaller monster movie "Shape of Water." DeKnight also teamed up with Emily Carmichael, Kira Snyder and T.S. Nowlin to craft the new story, which champions outsiders and misfits as well as celebrates makeshift families and teamwork. Plus, some stuff gets pummeled.

First, a step back for anyone not familiar with this horrific near-future: Aliens have sent gi-

ant monsters called Kaiju to soften us humans up ahead of world domination. But we've created 270-foot tall robots called Jaegers to fight back. They're so big they need to be manned by pairs of operators who build a neural bridge between their minds so they can work together.

The new film opens in 2035, 10 years after the last Kaiju was defeated and the breach closed. It's the calm before the storm. Our heroes now are Jake (John Boyega), the rebellious son of Elba's character, and the teen orphan Amara (Cailee Spaeny), who builds her own Jaeger out of spare parts. They join together to help the military fight a new opponent — a rogue Jaeger that comes out of the sea and stomps around menacingly. It is soon clear there's a conspiracy afoot.

Boyega, fresh off his "Star Wars" gig, is great here, is a dashing rogue who struggles under his father's shadow but soon earns the respect of his peers. "We are a family now and we are Earth's last defense," he says. He and Spaeny have an easy rapport and some moments between them seem genuinely charming and goofy.

Charlie Day and Burn Gorman reprise their roles as squabbling scientists, and Rinko Kikuchi is back as the adopted daughter of Elba's character. The rest of the cast is multiethnic, competent and very sweaty. The robots now have hologram eyes and the monsters seem less homages to

past movie Kaijus and more designed to permanently upset our dreams.

If the first movie's fight sequences were often set in the rainy dark, "Pacific Rim Uprising" embraces the light. Cities are flattened during the day as monsters and robots slug it out. Skyscrapers get punched, debris cascades down and cars get swiped around. The connection between special effects and human actors is seamless and astonishing. The level of detail — from complex cityscapes like Shanghai and Tokyo to the icescapes of Siberia — is brilliant.

Part of the success of the "Pacific Rim" films is that they have cobbled together enough elements of other films to make them familiar yet newish. They owe "Blade Runner," "Independence Day," "Minority Report," "Star Wars" and, of course, "Transformers" — not to mention every Godzilla movie ever made — some residuals. But they also have defined and introduced their own world and language.

With Alicia Vikander leading, 'Tomb Raider' isn't half bad

In "Tomb Raider," which has elements of "Indiana Jones," "Batman" and even "Tron: Legacy," but with an angsty young woman at the center instead of an angsty young man, Alicia Vikander takes a lot of beatings. She is punched in the face, and in the stomach, she is thrown against rocks and sent careening through a forest, she is impaled, hit by a car, left in an impossible one-handed dead hang at least four times, and she is choked, really choked, by both men and women alike.

And she pulls it off! The movie itself is another, more complicated, story, but this video game adaption is better than most with set pieces that are both fun and ridiculous (like a high-stakes escape room) that actually seem to approximate the experience of playing a video game.

After two pretty lousy attempts, and a lot of terrible video game adaptations on the way, Hollywood has resurrected "Tomb Raider," and plucked the most recent supporting actress Oscar winner production could get their hands on. And like Angelina Jolie before her, Vikander has, exactly two years after her Academy Award win for an emotional drama, stepped into Lara Croft's combat boots and decided to raid some tombs.

Directed by Norwegian filmmaker Roar Uthaug ("The Wave"), Lara is introduced getting her butt kicked in a boxing ring. The gym membership that gives her access to these low-rent Rocky-esque facilities is one she can't afford to pay. She is scrappy and barely getting by on her bike courier service paycheck. She also isn't afraid to take on a challenge for a few hundred bucks, like, say, biking through the streets of London with a foxtail attached to her machine while two dozen guys try to catch her. But she's also not past seeing a random business man on the street, thinking that perhaps it is her long-lost and presumed to be dead father (Dominic West) and going into a hazy flashback dream that distracts her enough

to lose focus in the race and flip over a police car.

At the local police station, we learn the truth of Lara: This isn't some working class girl at all, this is someone who grew up wealthy but most could imagine and whose inheritance won't kick in until she signs some papers acknowledging that her father, who disappeared seven years ago, is dead. Just as she's about to concede to her father's deputy (Kristin Scott Thomas), she stumbles on a clue that sends her on a journey to find out what happened to her father on that remote island off the coast of Japan. He was looking for some ancient "death queen" named Himiko that we spend the next half of the film talking about and searching for.

Lara swings by Hong Kong first and gets the son of a man her father knew, Lu Ren (a compelling but underused Daniel Wu) to join her on this adventure. One harrowing boat ride later and they've smashed into the island and found themselves in the possession of Vogel (Walton Goggins), a mercenary who is trying to get the mummified Himiko off the island.

It's here that the film's set pieces really start to click, and Lara, whose bulging back muscles are shown off at every possible opportunity, is put through the ringer trying to escape from Vogel. That the production put her in cargo pants for the duration and not the Jolie short-shorts is perhaps a sign of progress too.

The film not-so-subtly borrows from a half dozen better films, but even so, there are definitely ways the story of "Tomb Raider" might have been improved. Lara is for all her gumption, a pretty passive protagonist, for one.

WCSO seizes drugs, thousands of dollars in cash, arrests four

Washington County Sheriff's deputies arrested four individuals after a traffic stop led to an investigation by Washington County Drug Task Force.

Just before 8 a.m. Tuesday, WCSO deputies stopped a vehicle near the Circle H convenience store in Vernon. During the stop, K9 Jet was deployed and alerted to the odor of narcotics in the vehicle, according to a press release from that agency.

After all its occupants were removed, a search of the vehicle yielded paraphernalia, including a tin can and hypodermic needle that both tested positive for methamphetamine, authorities said.

The driver, 41-year-old Vernon resident Christopher Dwight Ford, was arrested and booked into the Washington County Jail for possession of paraphernalia.

Following the arrest made in the traffic stop, Washington County Drug Task Force received information that sparked an investigation into the distribution of drugs in the area.

During this investigation, three additional arrests were made.

Officials say 33-year-old Clifton Antonio Patrick of DeFuniak Springs attempted to elude law enforcement as they conducted a traffic stop on State Road 20 in Ebro. Patrick allegedly, threw a black cloth lunch box from the window while traveling down Cowford Road, just before disabling his vehicle on a railroad tie.

Deputies located the lunch box and discovered the bag contained a large amount of marijuana,

more than 24 grams of methamphetamine, approximately 7 grams of cocaine, and multiple prescription pills, which included a controlled substance known as Lortab, officials say. Over \$8,000 in cash was found in Patrick's pants pockets, according to the release.

Patrick and a passenger of the vehicle, 55-year-old Mark John Maczick, of Freeland, Michigan, were both taken into custody and booked into the Washington County Jail on the charges of possession of cocaine, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, and possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute. Patrick was also booked on the charges of tampering with evidence and fleeing and eluding with disregard to the safety of persons and property.

Also arrested during the investigation was 32-year-old Bridgett Ortega, of DeFuniak Springs, on a charge of possession of methamphetamine, after investigators reportedly found a small bag of methamphetamine in her sock during a search.

Lawyer urges release of shooting suspect's brother

PARKLAND — An attorney for the brother of Florida school shooting suspect Nikolas Cruz said in court papers that a \$500,000 bond for trespassing at the school is excessive and that the brother should be released from jail.

Lawyer Joseph Kimok said in the documents Thursday that 18-year-old Zachary Cruz already paid the standard \$25 bond for a misdemeanor and should not be kept in custody.

"Zachary Cruz did not kill 17 people on a high school campus. He should not be treated as if he did," Kimok wrote. "There is no justice where the government seeks to hang a man for the crimes of his brother."

Zachary Cruz was arrested Monday while skateboarding on the campus of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, where authorities say his brother killed 17 people and wounded 17 others in the Valentine's Day massacre. Zachary Cruz had been warned not to visit the campus, but did so three times, authorities say.

Kimok also objected to several of the bond conditions imposed by a judge, including forcing Zachary Cruz to undergo a psychological evaluation, prohibiting him from visiting Broward County, putting him on house arrest with an ankle monitor if he is released, having the

home he is living in searched for weapons and having no contact with Nikolas Cruz.

"To take away that familial connection is inhumane," Kimok wrote.

Security at Stoneman Douglas High, already heightened, was bolstered Thursday with Gov. Rick Scott ordering eight highway patrol troopers to help secure the grounds. The move came after Zachary Cruz was arrested, two students were caught carrying knives and another made online threats.

Also, Stoneman Douglas students will be given transparent backpacks they'll be required to use when they return from spring break on April 2. Broward County school district Superintendent Robert Runcie told parents in a two-page letter that metal detectors also may be installed soon, and he outlined other security upgrades including student ID badges and a district-wide effort to require all school visitors to enter through a single door.

The troopers will be stationed at the school indefinitely, along with Broward County deputies, leaving an armed guard at every campus entrance point, Scott said in a statement. Before the shooting, the school was patrolled by one armed deputy and unarmed guards. An unspecified number of deputies, some armed with rifles, were added after the school reopened.

Several callers have said they were instructed to send money via Money Gram, Western Union, or purchase an iTunes Gift Card, and scammers also claimed a

credit card number was needed in order to ensure the victim's freedom.

The Gadsden County Sheriff's Office states that under no circumstances will a citizen receive a call from the GCSO in which they're asked to release their credit card number or private information, or purchase a pre-paid card over the phone for payment of bonds or any other fees.

If anyone has questions regarding the scam alert issued, or about any call they've received about a possible Gadsden County warrant regarding a possible arrest, they should contact the Gadsden County Sheriff's Office Warrants Division at 850-875-8818 for verification.

Man convicted of killing woman over 'disrespect'

NAPLES — A Florida man faces a possible life sentence for fatally shooting a woman he said disrespected him.

A news release from the State Attorney's Office in Collier County says 27-year-old Aaron Reyna was convicted Thursday of second-degree murder. His sentencing is scheduled for April 20.

Authorities say 29-year-old Dana Fegueroa yelled at Reyna at an Immokalee home in October 2014 because he wouldn't drive her to work, prompting Reyna to shoot the woman in the head. The shooting led to a standoff with a police SWAT team, but Reyna eventually surrendered.

Reyna later told police that he wasn't going to take her disrespect.

Former Florida State attorney guilty in underage sex sting

TALLAHASSEE — A former Florida State University attorney has been convicted of trying to meet underage girls on the internet for sex.

A U.S. Department of Justice news release says 71-year-old Dayton Cramer was convicted in Tallahassee federal court Wednesday of attempted enticement of a minor. He faces up to life in prison at his June 5 sentencing.

The former FSU deputy general counsel was charged last February. Authorities say Cramer had responded to fake online ads in which investigators posed as a

14-year-old girl and also as the stepmother of a 13-year-old girl who was being offered for sex.

Authorities say Cramer discussed sexual activity with several undercover officers. He was arrested after going to meet what he thought was the 13-year-old girl's stepmother to arrange a sexual encounter.

Student charged with bringing gun to school

PALM BEACH GARDENS — A Florida high school student has been charged as an adult after he allegedly appeared in a video with a gun outside his school, threatening to shoot the principal.

Anthony L. Roberson of Riviera Beach is charged with possession of a gun on school property and was being held Thursday on \$115,000 bond.

The Palm Beach Post reports the 17-year-old William T. Dwyer High School student did a live online video March 6 outside the school while holding a gun, saying he brings it daily. He then made what authorities inferred to be a threat against the principal.

The video was reported to the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, which found a gun at his home the next day. Roberson told investigators he "was only kidding." He was arrested Tuesday.

Ex-police sergeant gets 120 years in child porn case

JACKSONVILLE — A former Florida police sergeant was sentenced to

120 years in federal prison for making and possessing child pornography, including images downloaded on his patrol car's computer.

U.S. District Judge Timothy Corrigan on Thursday sentenced former Live Oak police Sgt. Kyle Adam Kirby after a jury found him guilty of producing, possessing and accessing images of child sexual abuse.

Federal prosecutors say the 37-year-old Kirby used his patrol car's computer to download child pornography dating back to December 2014.

They also say Kirby used concealed cameras to film unsuspecting minors and transferred the pictures to his police computer. Prosecutors say he later tried to delete them.

No bond for man accused of stealing car with baby inside

WEST PALM BEACH, — A Florida judge has denied bond to a man accused of stealing a car with a baby inside.

Marquise Sharkear Hudson is accused of stealing a car parked with the engine running outside a West Palm Beach gas station Tuesday. Police said he dropped the baby at another gas station several minutes later. The clerk told police Hudson shouted, "Take the baby!" before driving away.

The Palm Beach Post reports Judge Ted Booras denied Hudson bond on Thursday. He will remain in jail until his next hearing.

Project had black men go to familiar faces in familiar places to reduce blood pressure

ORLANDO — Trim your hair, your beard, your blood pressure? Black men reduced one of their biggest medical risks through a novel project that shows the power of familiar faces and trusted places to improve health.

The project had pharmacists work with dozens of Los Angeles barbershops to test and treat clients. The results, reported Monday at a cardiology conference, have doctors planning to expand the project to more cities nationwide.

“There’s open communication in a barbershop. There’s a relationship, a trust,” said Eric Muhammad, owner of A New You Barbershop, one of the barbers who participated. “We have a lot more influence than just the doctor walking in the door.”

Black men have high rates of high blood pressure — a top reading over 130 or a bottom one over 80 — and the problems it can cause, such as strokes and heart attacks. Only half of Americans with

high pressure have it under control; many don’t even know they have the condition.

Churches, beauty salons and other community spots have been used to reach groups that often lack access to doctors, to promote cancer screenings and other services. Dr. Ronald Victor, a cardiologist at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, wanted to reach black men.

“Barbershops are a uniquely popular meeting place for African-Ameri-

can men,” and many have gone every other week to the same barber for many years, he said. “It almost has a social club feel to it, a delightful, friendly environment” that makes it ideal for improving health. Victor did a study in 17 Dallas barbershops a few years ago. In that one, barbers tested patrons and referred them to doctors. Improvements were modest.

In the new study, “we added a pharmacist into the mix” so medicines could be prescribed on the

spot, he said.

The new work involved 303 men and 52 barbershops. One group of customers just got pamphlets and blood pressure tips while they were getting haircuts. Another group met with pharmacists in the barbershops and could get treatment if their blood pressure was high.

At the start of the study, their top pressure number averaged 154. After six months, it fell by 9 points for customers just given advice and by 27 points for those

who saw pharmacists.

Nearly two-thirds of the men who saw pharmacists lowered their pressure to under 130 over 80 — the threshold for high blood pressure under new guidelines adopted last fall. Only 12 percent of the men who just got advice dropped to that level.

“This is a home run ... high-touch medicine,” said one independent expert, Eileen Handberg, a heart researcher at the University of Florida in Gainesville. Most drug trials only dream about such good results, yet they were achieved in a regular community setting, she said. Nineteen of Muhammad’s customers finished the program, and “all their blood pressures were down, every single one of them,” he said.

Marc Sims, a 43-year-old records clerk at a law firm, is one. He didn’t know he had high pressure — 175 over 125 — and the pharmacist said he was at risk of having a stroke.

“It woke me up,” said Sims, who has a young son. “All I could think about was me having a

stroke and not being here for him. It was time to get my health right.”

Medicines lowered his pressure to 125 over 95.

Treatment doesn’t always mean medicines; healthier lifestyles can do a lot. Poor diets, lack of exercise and other bad habits cause most high blood pressure.

The National Institutes of Health paid for the study. Results were discussed at an American College of Cardiology conference in Orlando and published by the New England Journal of Medicine.

The cost of doing this isn’t really known. Victor now aims to do a study of 3,000 men in many cities around the country that will include a look at that. He also hopes to tackle high cholesterol with a similar approach.

The results show that “you don’t need cardiologists” to improve things, said Dr. Willie Lawrence, an American Heart Association spokesman and blood pressure specialist in Kansas City, Missouri. “We can partner with others in the community and get this epidemic under control.”

Study: Medical bankruptcies may not be as common as thought

Medical bills can push patients over the financial cliff, but a new study says this may not happen as often as previous research suggests.

Hospitalizations cause only about 4 percent of personal bankruptcies among non-elderly U.S. adults, according to an analysis published Wednesday in the New England Journal of Medicine.

This contrasts with previous research by former Harvard professor and current U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren and others that pointed to medical reasons as the trigger for more than 60 percent of U.S. bankruptcies.

In the new study, researchers tracked the credit reports of more than a half million adults under 65 in California who had a hospitalization between 2003 and 2007 that wasn’t tied to childbirth. They found that hospitalizations clearly forced some patients into bankruptcy in the years following their stay, said study co-author Matthew Notowidigdo, a Northwestern University economist.

It just may not happen as frequently as the other research indicates.

“What causes bankruptcies is still somewhat unknown, but it appears that medical expenses are responsible for a much smaller share of them than previously thought,” said co-author Raymond Klunder of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Researchers also estimated that hospitalizations were responsible for only about 6 percent of bankruptcies among uninsured patients. They noted that hospitalization rates are lower in that patient group compared to the overall non-elderly population.

The new analysis included a broader range of people than earlier research, which focused on those who already had filed for bankruptcy protection.

Such a narrow focus makes it “impossible to infer the role of medical expenses in causing bankruptcy” without information on those who had big medical bills and didn’t sink financially, the

authors of Wednesday’s report noted.

Their study also had limitations: It focused only on adult patients from one

state who were hospitalized.

Klunder said hospital stays often are the first event that triggers a “chain

of struggles with medical expenses and medical debt.”

The research looked at hospitalizations that oc-

curred several years before the federal Affordable Care Act expanded insurance coverage to millions of Americans.

The Indians won, 17-0, after scoring five runs in the



Wolverines meet Seminoles with Final Four berth on the line

LOS ANGELES — Leonard Hamilton is well aware of the perception that Florida State is a football school. The coach also knows that the moniker is often applied to Michigan, the Seminoles' opponent Saturday night in a most unlikely NCAA Tournament regional final.

After a lifetime of coaching hoops, the 69-year-old Hamilton can't understand why anyone would think about football in March when his players and coach John Beilein's squad have earned the right to play the biggest game of their lives at Staples Center in Los Angeles.

"I think that's one of the most ridiculous phrases I've heard: football school," Hamilton said Friday. "I mean, gosh, (Michigan has) been to the Final Four on a consistent basis. ... Our baseball team has probably had as much success at Florida State as anyone, but nobody would call us a baseball school. Our soccer team does an outstanding job. Our volleyball team is good. I just think that's a cliché, and that's a phrase we need to eliminate."

One of these don't-call-them-football-schools will be eliminated in LA in the culmination of two wacky weeks out West.

Separated by conference and geography, third-seeded Michigan (31-7) and ninth-seeded Florida State (23-11) didn't know much at all about each other until this improbable NCAA Tournament left them as the only two teams standing in the West Region.

With 48 hours to cram

rout of A&M. Florida State has two impressive 7-foot interior defenders in Christ Koumadje and Ike Obiagu, but they typically don't venture to the perimeter.

EVERYBODY SHOOTS: Wagner isn't the only outside shooter in maize and blue: Eight Wolverines hit a 3-pointer against the Aggies, and Michigan had 14 total 3-pointers. Florida State's junkyard defense allowed that many 3-pointers only once in 34 games this season.

EVERYBODY SCORES: Florida State's impressive offensive balance showed up again while the Seminoles beat Gonzaga with just one double-digit scorer. If Michigan's semifinal performance was any indication, the Noles might need to score a whole lot more points to keep up — and they think they've got the versatility to do it. Florida State has scored at least 74 points in seven games since January. "When you get offense from every position, that makes it easier when somebody is getting shut down by the defense," said Terance Mann, who had 18 points to lead Florida State against Gonzaga. "We feel like everybody on the floor can score for us, and that gives us an advantage."

ANN ARBOR WEST: Florida State has plenty of fans in Southern California, but Michigan had a truly impressive crowd in the Staples stands for the victory over Texas A&M. Beilein expects more of the same Saturday. "Those people didn't travel here to see this game," he said. "They live here, and that's what's great about coaching at Michigan. We're everywhere."

for this final, the Wolverines and Seminoles have learned a few things about each other that sound oddly familiar.

"They have some similar characteristics that we have," Michigan's Charles Matthews said. "We have long players on this team, guys that like to get out in transition, and athletes as well. I feel like it's going to be a fun game. They're a very well-prepared team, and so are we."

The Wolverines also realize what's different and dangerous about the surprising Seminoles, who have upset three consecutive higher-seeded opponents to make an unlikely run to the third Elite Eight in school history.

With wins over top-seeded Xavier and national championship finalist Gonzaga already, Florida State is on the brink of an improbable achievement. The Seminoles went only 9-9 in ACC play and lost in the first round of the conference tournament, but after sweating out Selection Sunday, they've surged to the brink of the second Final Four in school history by hitting their stride just in time.

Michigan's presence in the Elite Eight is less of a surprise, since the Wolverines have made it three times in the last six years. Beilein's team has won 12 straight games since Feb. 6, streaking to the brink of their first Final Four since

2013. But after middling performances in their first two NCAA Tournament games, the Wolverines showed they're ready for the big time with a 99-72 thrashing of Texas A&M on Thursday, overshadowing their typically proficient defense with the school's highest-scoring NCAA Tournament performance since 1992.

If the Wolverines can come up with a fitting sequel, they'll end Florida State's best postseason run since 1993.

Here are more things to know about the West Region final between Michigan and Florida State:

DOGS IN THEM: Michigan is aware of the di-


lemma it faces with Florida State's pressing, shot-blocking "junkyard defense," which has deserved its colorful name. "Just really getting after it," Florida State's Phil Cofer said. "We say 94 feet. That's picking the ball up early and playing hard to exhaustion. That's one of the key things of our junkyard defense. When everybody is locked into that, we can take ourselves all the way to the top."

GUT GEMACHT, MORITZ: Florida State is paying particular attention to Moe Wagner, the Wolverines' 7-foot German star. Wagner scored 21 points and hit all three of his 3-pointers in Michigan's

Wayne Huizenga, who built his fortune from trash, dies at 80

MIAMI — H. Wayne Huizenga, a college dropout who built a business empire that included Blockbuster Entertainment, AutoNation and three professional sports franchises, has died. He was 80.

Huizenga died Thursday night at his home, said Valerie Hinkell, a longtime assistant. The cause was cancer, said Bob Henninger, executive vice president of Huizenga Holdings.

Starting with a single garbage truck in 1968, Huizenga built Waste Management Inc. into a Fortune 500 company. He purchased independent sanitation engineering companies, and by the time he took the company public in 1972, he had completed the acquisition of 133 small-time haulers. By 1983, Waste Management was the largest waste disposal company in the United States.

The business model worked again with Blockbuster Video, which he started in 1985 and built into the leading movie rental chain nine years later. In 1996, he formed AutoNation and built it into a Fortune 500 company.

Huizenga was founding owner of baseball's Florida Marlins and the NHL's Florida Panthers — expansion teams that played their first games in 1993. He bought the NFL's Miami Dolphins and their stadium for \$168 million in 1994 from the children of founder Joe Robbie but had sold all three teams by 2009.

"Wayne Huizenga was a seminal figure in the cultural history of South Florida," current Dolphins owner Stephen Ross said in a statement. "He completely changed the landscape of the region's sports scene. ... Sports fans throughout the region owe him a debt of thanks."

The Marlins won the 1997 World Series, and the Panthers reached the Stanley Cup Finals in 1996, but Huizenga's beloved Dolphins never reached a Super Bowl while he owned the team.

"If I have one disappointment, the disappointment would be that we did not bring a championship home," Huizenga said shortly after he sold the Dolphins to Ross. "It's something we failed to do."

Huizenga earned an almost cult-like following among business in-

vestors who watched him build Blockbuster Entertainment into the leading video rental chain by snapping up competitors. He cracked Forbes' list of the 100 richest Americans, becoming chairman of Republic Services, one of the nation's top waste management companies, and AutoNation, the nation's largest automotive retailer. In 2013, Forbes estimated his wealth at \$2.5 billion.

For a time, Huizenga was also a favorite with South Florida sports fans, drawing cheers and autograph seekers in public. The crowd roared when he danced the hokeypokey on the field during an early Marlins game. He went on a spending spree to build a veteran team that won the World Series in the franchise's fifth year.

But his popularity plummeted when he ordered the roster dismantled after that season. He was frustrated by poor attendance and his failure to swing a deal for a new ballpark built with taxpayer money.

Many South Florida fans never forgave him for breaking up the championship team. Huizenga drew boos when introduced at Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino's retirement celebration in 2000 and kept a lower public profile after that.

In 2009, Huizenga said he regretted ordering the Marlins' payroll purge.

"We lost \$34 million the year we won the World Series, and I just said, 'You know what, I'm not going to do that,'" Huizenga said. "If I had it to do over again, I'd say, 'OK, we'll go one more year.'"

He sold the Marlins in 1999 to John Henry, and sold the Panthers in 2001, unhappy with rising NHL player salaries and the stock price for the team's public company.

Tributes from three sports and beyond poured in, reflecting the range of his reach.

"Saddened to hear about the passing of successful entrepreneur and Great Floridian Wayne Huizenga," Gov. Rick Scott tweeted. "He had a tremendous impact on our state and the world of business."

The Marlins released a statement describing Huizenga as "the original Florida Marlin," and said he "will be remembered as much for his contributions to South Florida professional sports as he was for his many charitable endeavors in the surrounding community."

Huizenga's first sports love was the Dolphins — he had been a season-ticket holder since their first season in 1966. But he fared better in the NFL as a businessman than as a sports fan.

He turned a nifty profit by selling the Dolphins and their stadium for \$1.1 billion, nearly seven times what he paid to become sole owner. But he knew the bottom line in the NFL is championships, and his Dolphins perennially came up short.

Huizenga earned a reputation as a hands-off owner and won raves from many loyal employees, even though he made six coaching changes. He eased Pro Football Hall of Famer Don Shula into retirement in early 1996, and Jimmy Johnson, Dave Wannstedt, interim coach Jim Bates, Nick Saban, Cam Cameron and Tony Sparano followed as coach.

Johnson tweeted: "A great man, one of the nicest individuals I have ever known, Wayne Huizenga passed away. RIP"

Harry Wayne Huizenga was born in the Chicago suburbs on Dec. 29, 1937, to a family of garbage haulers. He began his business career in Pompano Beach in 1962, driving a garbage truck from 2 a.m. to noon each day for \$500 a month.

One customer successfully sued Huizenga, saying that in an argument over a delinquent account, Huizenga injured him by grabbing his testicles — an allegation Huizenga always denied.

"I never did that. The guy was a deputy cop. It was his word against mine, a young kid," he told Fortune magazine in 1996.

Huizenga was a five-time recipient of Financial World magazine's "CEO of the Year" award, and was the Ernst & Young "2005 World Entrepreneur of the Year."

Regarding his business acumen, Huizenga said: "You just have to be in the right place at the right time. It can only happen in America."

In 1960, he married Joyce Vander-Wagon. Together they had two children, Wayne Jr. and Scott. They divorced in 1966. Wayne married his second wife, Marti Goldsby, in 1972. She died in 2017.

A memorial service will be held Thursday — opening day for the Marlins, the team Huizenga founded 25 years ago.

QB Osweiler signs deal with Dolphins

MIAMI — Coach Adam Gase's new backup quarterback in Miami is his former backup quarterback in Denver.

Brock Osweiler signed a one-year contract Friday with the Dolphins to provide veteran insurance behind Ryan Tannehill, who is coming back from two knee operations.

Gase was an assistant with the Broncos when Osweiler was a young reserve for them in 2012-14. Osweiler went 0-4 as the Broncos' starter last season and has 25 career starts in six NFL seasons.

With the Dolphins he replaces Matt Moore, a free agent after seven years as their backup quarterback. Despite adding Osweiler, the Dolphins will consider drafting a quarterback next month.

Tannehill is expected to return after missing all of the 2017 season, but he has twice had surgery since his most recent game.

The Dolphins made two other moves to upgrade their offense. Five-time Pro Bowl running back Frank Gore finalized a deal with his hometown team after agreeing to terms Thursday. Tackle Sam Young agreed to terms on a one-year contract to remain with the Dolphins, two people familiar with the negotiations said.

Gore, who turns 35 next month, has rushed for 14,026 yards to rank fifth on the all-time list. He spent the past three seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, and ran for 961 yards last season.

Young, an eight-year NFL veteran, started six games at right tackle for the Dolphins last year after Ja'Wuan James was hurt. He's expected to be James' backup again this season.

Cowboys add former Jaguars WR Hurns

FRISCO, Texas — The Dallas Cowboys added another receiver in free agency Friday when Allen Hurns agreed to a two-year deal.

Hurns' deal with the Cowboys came three days after he was released by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Cowboys receiver Cole Beasley welcomed Hurns to the team in a Twitter message, ending that with "lets go to work!" Hurns responded, "Let's get it bro" on his account.

Hurns initially signed with the Jaguars as an undrafted rookie out of Miami in 2014. He got a \$40 million, four-year contract extension after the 2015 season, when he had 64 catches for 1,031 yards and 10 touchdowns in 15 games. But he has since been hampered by injuries.

Hurns missed 11 games because of injuries during the past two seasons with the Jaguars, who last week brought back receiver Marqise Lee and added Donte Moncrief in free agency.

In his four seasons with the Jaguars, Hurns had 189 receptions for 2,669 yards and 21 TDs. He caught just 74 passes for 961 yards and five scores the past two years while dealing with a sports hernia in 2016 and a high ankle sprain in 2017.

Cardinals send OT Veldheer to Broncos for 6th-round pick

TEMPE, Ariz. — The Arizona Cardinals have traded veteran offensive tackle Jared Veldheer to the Denver Broncos in exchange for a sixth-round pick in this year's draft.

The 30-year-old Veld-

heer, at 6-foot-8 and 322 pounds, started 53 games in four seasons with Arizona after coming to the team from Oakland, where he spent his first four NFL campaigns. Veldheer played left tackle the first four seasons and switched to the right side last year.

It was apparent Veldheer didn't figure in Arizona's plans under new coach Steve Wilks, especially after the team signed free agent and ex-New York Giant Justin Pugh, who figures to take the right tackle job with D.J. Humphries on the left side.

The move Friday saves Arizona \$6.9 million in salary cap space. The sixth-round pick is the 182nd overall.

Seahawks sign DT Johnson, bring back DE M. Smith

RENTON, Wash. — The Seattle Seahawks added needed depth on their defensive line by signing veteran defensive tackle Tom Johnson and bringing back defensive end Marcus Smith.

The Seahawks are thin up front with the trade of Michael Bennett to Philadelphia and the loss of Sheldon Richardson in free agency. Johnson provides the Seahawks a solid veteran at defensive tackle who played on one of the premier defenses in the NFL last season.

Johnson started 15 games for Minnesota in 2017 when the Vikings led the NFL in total defense and scoring defense. Johnson joined the Vikings in 2014 after three seasons with New Orleans. He had 32 tackles and two sacks last year for the Vikings while playing the third-most snaps of any of Minnesota's defensive linemen.

Smith was signed by Seattle last summer after the former first-round pick was a bust with Philadelphia. Smith appeared in 14 games and had 15 tackles and 2 ½ sacks.

Giants' Mauro suspended for 1st 4 games of this season

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — New York Giants defensive end Josh Mauro has been suspended by the NFL for the first four games of the season for violating the league's policy on performance-enhancers.

Mauro is eligible to participate in all offseason and preseason practices and games.

Mauro was released by the Arizona Cardinals on March 16 and signed with the Giants on Monday.

Mauro is being reunited with defensive coordinator James Bettcher with the Giants. He played his first four seasons for the Cardinals, the past three under Bettcher.

Undrafted coming out of Stanford, Mauro played in 47 games with 26 starts for the Cardinals. He had 92 tackles, two sacks, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. He started seven of the 13 games last season.

Packers bring back veteran cornerback Tramon Williams

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Tramon Williams is returning to the Green Bay Packers to help replenish the secondary.

The team signed the free agent cornerback on Friday. The 11-year veteran spent the first eight seasons of his career in Green Bay, interceding 28 passes in 127 games including 99 starts.

Eagles' Michael Bennett charged with injury to elderly paraplegic

HOUSTON — Authorities issued a warrant Friday for the arrest of three-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Bennett, who is accused of injuring a paraplegic woman as he tried get onto the field at last year's Super Bowl to celebrate with his brother.

The Harris County district attorney's office said a grand jury indicted the 32-year-old Bennett, acquired earlier this month by the Philadelphia Eagles, on a felony count of injury to the elderly.

Bennett was a spectator at the game at NRG Stadium in Houston in February 2017 when he tried to get onto the field immediately afterward to see his brother, Martellus Bennett, a tight end for the Patriots at the time. Prosecutors allege he

pushed through security personnel, including a 66-year-old woman in a wheelchair who was a stadium employee and who had told him to use a different entrance to access the field. Bennett is also accused of pushing two other people, including another woman, and ignoring a request by a police officer to stop as he made his way onto the field.

Houston Police Chief Art Acevedo said Bennett allegedly told the people he had pushed, "You all must know who I am and I can own this (expletive). I'm going down to the field, whether you like it or not."

Acevedo called Bennett "morally bankrupt" for pushing the two women. Police said the disabled woman suffered a sprained shoulder when she was allegedly pushed by Bennett, hitting the back of her 800-pound, motorized wheelchair.

"Mr. Bennett may think that because he's an NFL player and some time passed ... he may have thought that, number one, rules don't apply to him, number two, he doesn't have to respect the dignity of a paraplegic woman who's trying to earn a living," Acevedo said at a news conference.

Acevedo said a detective did not actively start working the case until September because the police department had prioritized more serious cases.

The charge of injury to the elderly can be filed if a person intentionally or knowingly causes injury to a person 65 or older. It carries a penalty of up to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. County authorities say they're talking with Bennett's legal team about surrendering on the charge.

Martinsville kind to Wallace, so far

While Darrell "Bubba" Wallace ran four races in the NASCAR Cup Series last season, the driver of the legendary No. 43 car is officially a rookie this year after taking over for Richard Petty's old car full time last October.

Wallace had a strong start to his inaugural campaign, finishing second at the Daytona 500. While he's struggled since with just one other top 20 finish this season, he's looking to turn things around at Martinsville, a track where he's won twice in the Camping World Truck Series.

Wallace spoke with the Martinsville Bulletin before the 2018 season began. Here are some excerpts:

Q: Looking at Martinsville, you've had a lot of success there in a truck. Have you gotten a chance to test there in a Cup car?

Wallace: I have not. So it'll be four years since I've been there. I've not gotten any Cup experience there, which I'm excited about.

I'm excited about every track on the schedule just going there for the first time in a Cup car. So it'll be good to get back there. I have

a lot of history from there, a lot of success from there, it's one of my favorite places to go to.

Q: Where are the clocks you've won?

Wallace: My first one is at my house. And my second one, my mom took it. As soon as I was in Victory Lane my mom snagged it up.

Q: Do you feel like there's anything that will translate from Trucks to Cups there?

Wallace: I'm not sure. That's one of the things after the first round of practice to figure out. I'll definitely go there and try to remember what I have done in my two truck wins and see how that carries over. It'll be somewhat similar but I think with the speed and the handling of the cars nowadays it's going to be a little bit different for us.

Q: When you go to these tracks you've never been to in a Cup car, what's the biggest thing you're looking for when you get on the track for the first time?

Wallace: I think you've just got to get your marks down. You've got to hit your lines, get into that rhythm, get into that routine at every racetrack. So we're going

to try to execute that as best we can since it'll be all new to me. So watching plenty of videos, heading into each race will definitely help out.

Q: Does having so much success here help you confidence-wise?

Wallace: It does. It definitely does. It's one of those races that gets circled on the schedule twice to make sure I go there and have a really good run because I'll just be so giddy and so excited just to be there and be back at Martinsville. It's definitely one of my favorite places to race at, and the history shows that for sure. So we'll see how the first round of practice goes for that and then settle in and get through the rest of the weekend.

Q: What are you most excited for this season?

Wallace: Just getting to experience these Cup cars. ... Every track on the schedule now is new for me. Especially going to Sonoma and not having any experience there besides video games, so that'll be a real challenge for us. But the first big, exciting race for us is Martinsville. Having STP on the car — STP is the sponsor of the race for the STP 500 so we're all excited about it.

Local gag grouper season starts soon

Recreational gag grouper season will open in state waters off of Franklin, Wakulla, Jefferson and Taylor counties on April 1. The regional fishing season will go through June 30 and includes Apalachicola Bay and Indian Pass as well as the Steinhatchee River, including the parts in Dixie County. Gag grouper can be caught on the Gulf County side of Indian Pass and the Dixie County side of the Steinhatchee River, but may not be taken ashore in areas that are closed to harvest. For example, a gag grouper caught April 1 in state waters off Jefferson County cannot be taken

ashore in Levy County or parts of Dixie County outside of the Steinhatchee River. To see maps of these areas, go to MyFWC.com/Fishing and select "Saltwater Fishing," "Recreational Regulations" and "Groupers." Grouper must be 24 inches long and there is a bag limit of two grouper per person. You can catch up to four, but you are only allowed to keep two. While one season is opening, another is closing. Spiny lobster season is closing for recreational and commercial fisherman on April 1. There will be a two-day recreational season July 25-26 before the regular season reopens on Aug. 6.

Roseanne Barr stars in "Roseanne"



Conner family returns to the airwaves in 'Roseanne' reboot

Television's earliest moms were impeccably coiffed happy homemakers. In the late 1980s, however, a new TV mom broke the mold and took over prime time. Roseanne Conner (Roseanne Barr, "The Roseanne Show") was no June Cleaver. She wasn't even Wilma Flintstone — and that seemed to be the reason people identified with her. Far from a perfect housewife, Roseanne was a much more realistic representation of the blue-collar mother, wife, sister and friend.

Now, she's returning to prime time to deliver another slice of honest American life as Barr reunites with her TV family in the premiere of the nine-episode reboot of "Roseanne," airing Tuesday, March 27, on ABC. The working class Conner family once again faces economic challenges as they live paycheck to paycheck in the small town of Lanford, Ill.

The original "Roseanne" was a huge hit, thanks to its gritty yet witty portrayal of average America, and it

ran for nine successful seasons between 1988 and 1997. In the original series finale, it was revealed that the whole show had been a story written by Roseanne Conner about her life. It was a controversial ending, and one that will be addressed throughout the new run of the series, as Barr had always hoped.

"In the original series, I always wanted to have the 10th year so I could do exactly what I did in these nine [episodes], which was to finish and complete the story of this family," Barr explained at the 2018 Television Critics Association Winter Press Tour.

The entire main cast is back for the reboot. John Goodman ("The Big Lebowski," 1998) co-stars as Roseanne's husband, Dan Conner. Sara Gilbert ("The Talk"), who also serves as an executive producer on the series alongside Barr, plays daughter Darlene, and Alicia Goranson ("Boys Don't Cry," 1999) returns as eldest

daughter Becky. Sarah Chalke ("Scrubs"), who portrayed Becky in later seasons of the original series, also appears in the new show as a different character, Andrea. Michael Fishman ("Undrafted," 2016) reprises his role as Roseanne and Dan's son, D.J., and Emmy winner Laurie Metcalf ("Lady Bird," 2017) steps back into the role of Roseanne's sister, Jackie Harris.

Fans of the original series might have been surprised to see Goodman's name on the roster, as his death was revealed at the end of the original series run. Goodman seemed satisfied with how Dan's death is addressed when we spoke at the TCA Press Tour: "I thought it was a clever way to do it, handle it and get it out of the way," the actor said.

In addition to the main cast, other favorites from the show's first run are also slated to return. American Theatre Hall of Famer Estelle Parsons ("Bonnie and Clyde," 1967) stars as Roseanne's mother, Beverly Harris. Comedian Sandra Bernhard ("Brooklyn Nine-Nine") reprises her role as Roseanne's friend, Nancy Bartlett. Natalie West ("Nate and Margaret," 2012) once again appears as Roseanne's friend and Dan's stepmother, Crystal Anderson.

"Grey's Anatomy's" James Pickens Jr. stars as Chuck Mitchell, and Adilah Barnes ("Tracy Takes On...") returns as his wife, Anne-Marie. Johnny Galecki ("The Big Bang Theory") returns for one episode to reprise his role as David.

Also of note is Christopher Lloyd's ("Back to the Future," 1985) guest-starring role as Bev's boyfriend, Lou. He won't be the only new face in Lanford. The revival welcomes new cast members

Emma Kenney ("Shameless") as Harris Conner, Ames McNamara ("At Home With Amy Sedaris") as Mark, and Jayden Rey ("Unforgettable") as Mary.

Beyond the familiar and new faces, "Roseanne" fans can also look forward to the intricately recreated set. From the plaid sofa to the crocheted afghan, things haven't changed much in the Conner house — even the dated wallpaper was recreated from photos from the original series. Goodman recalled that walking onto the set for the first time felt like coming home, and that's exactly how viewers are sure to feel when the show returns.

The original series was immensely popular in its heyday and has graced many prestigious "best of" lists over the years as a result. The show and its stars won Emmys, Golden Globes, People's Choice Awards and even a Peabody Award for

Excellence in Television Broadcasting. Not only that, it reached the No. 1 spot in the Nielsen ratings in its second season, and often ranked in the top 20 throughout its run.

It remains to be seen whether ABC's new version will live up to the original, but millions of TV viewers are eager to find out. If there's one thing fans can be sure of, it's that, much like the original, the new "Roseanne" won't shy away from controversial topics. The show is expected to address topics such as health care, the opioid crisis, gender and illegal immigration. Many TV comedies tend to avoid such hot-button issues, but Barr will tackle them head on in an effort to represent the many different opinions held by Americans, just as she did in the '80s and '90s.

Check out the special one-hour premiere of "Roseanne," airing Tuesday, March 27, on ABC.

First, she makes a one-pot meal that's quick and easy to throw together but big and hearty enough to feed an entire dinner party: tender lamb shanks and orzo. Then pizza is on the menu as she whips up smoked salmon pizzas while sharing the trick to making foolproof homemade dough for the crust. A roast chicken cobb

salad is a lighter but no less tasty option for a one-dish meal, and she finishes off the lesson with mouthwatering

baked polenta with mushrooms and blue cheese.

Through every dish, Garten patiently explains each step and the reasoning behind it—there's nothing archaic or mysterious here. Being self-trained herself, she knows exactly what steps and techniques can trip up a home cook but also knows how to tackle them.



Q: Soap opera characters are always drinking wine that looks genuine, but is it? I can't imagine producers allowing them to do so on set.

A: For the most part it's not genuine, but according to "Young and the Restless" and "Days of Our Lives" star Eileen Davidson, that hasn't always been the case.

Davidson has played "Y&R's" Ashley Abbott, off and on, for 34 years, and in an interview on Bravo's "Watch What Happens Live," she said the '80s were a decade of decadence on soap sets. Stars did cocaine and got frisky with each other in their dressing rooms, and they sneaked real alcohol into the prop glasses that were supposed to hold water or some other booze stand-in.

Note, however, that it really was sneaking. The generally accepted, and followed, rule has always been to use some kind of fake. And not just because they're told to — soap stars are on set for long hours doing numerous takes, often of the same scene. If you had to do a few

takes of wine-drinking in the morning and used real wine, you wouldn't make it to the evening.

Prop masters have a range of tricks for faking various drinks, from simple solutions such as cranberry juice for wine or straight fizzy water for gin and tonics, to more complicated ones such as root beer with Mentos mints dropped in and then sprayed with hair spray to stand in for a foamy beer (the hair-spray preserves the foam so it lasts for more than one take).

As you can imagine, the stakes are particularly high on a soap like English institution "Coronation Street," which is basically built around a bar — the famous Rover's Return.

John Michie, who played Rover's bartender Karl Munro from 2011 to 2013, said that it's doubly hard to pretend to sell pretend alcohol.

"It's taking the drink order, pulling the pint, getting the ice in the vodka and tonic, checking the till, taking the money, giving the change — and on top of all that getting all your lines out. I'd say that's been the big challenge for me. It'd maybe be easier if you got to drink real booze."

Q: I enjoyed "Monk," especially when Bitty Schram played Sharona, his sidekick. What's she doing these days since leaving that show?

A: Oddly enough in the oversharing era of social media, we don't know what Bitty Schram is doing.

Stars often keep up accounts on Twitter or Instagram to let fans know what they're up to, and to plug whatever new projects they're working on, even after they leave the limelight. But Schram has not.

It's possible, though, that she's glad to be out of the limelight.

She's only appeared in one thing since the end of "Monk" in 2009, and she didn't even audition for it. She had a bit part in the 2013 indie comedy "Moments of Clarity," which she said resulted from the producers calling her up. "They

just gave it to me, which was very nice," she said in a 2015 interview with the Vallejo Times-Herald. This suggests she isn't actively chasing new roles these days.

She may have become embittered toward the whole acting business after her experience on "Monk." It's no secret that she left the show on bad terms partway through its third season in 2004.

The rumors at the time said that she and co-supporting stars Ted Levine and Jason Gray-Stanford were all due for a contract renewal, and all three were asking for more money. The other two returned to the show but Schram did not, which, if the rumors are true, would certainly have made things awkward on set. That said, whatever feelings she had weren't bad enough to stop her from returning for a guest turn in the show's final season in 2009.

Apart from her part in "Monk," she's most famous for her role in the classic baseball comedy "A League of Their Own" (1992) — her character's tears were the set-up for the film's enduring line, "There's no crying in baseball!"

That role has led to the only other post-"Monk" appearance I could find for Bitty Schram, and it's a weird one: she's scheduled to be the celebrity guest on June 2 at Canal Park in Akron, Ohio, for a "League of Their Own" night held by the minor-league ball team the Akron Rubber Ducks. The first 1,000 fans will receive a bobblehead doll shaped like her character from the film (for the record, I'm not making this up).

It seems that "Trucks" kicked off the killer-automobile meme with its plot about autonomous (and murderous) tractor-trailers targeting humans at a truck stop.

It first appeared in a magazine and was later included in the horror author's 1978 short story collection "Night Shift." However, it really popularized when King adapted it into the cult-favorite 1986 film "Maximum Overdrive."

The killer-truck idea caught on after that and was repeated in various other places, including, as you say, in such disparate shows as the teen-oriented fantasy/sci-fi hit "Supernatural" and the goofy grown-up cartoon "Futurama."
