
## Jackson County Officials wary as 'Floribama Shore' ask to film in area

Concerns over a production company's plan to shoot at least part of a "Floribama Shore" reality show episode on Spring Creek in Marianna have some county commissioners looking for a way to stop or control it.

One issue appears to be whether the county wants to be the backdrop for a reality program that focuses on the sometimes colorful adventures of eight college-aged housemates who live together in Panama City. Some of their exploits involve drinking, romances and such, frank conversations of an adult nature and what some regard as reckless, offensive or inadvisable behavior. Some fear that the cast's excursion into the county might encourage the public to believe that Jackson County is an open playground for the kinds of activities that frequently pop up on the show.

Jackson County Tourist Development Director Christy Andreasen approached commissioners after the show's producers got in touch with her to inquire whether the county had filming permits they needed to get. The coun-

ty doesn't have such a permit program and no policy on filming here.

However, board attorney Michelle Jordan advised the company that it must apply for a business license before it "engages in filming for non-personal uses on county owned lands." She further clarified, saying, "you may not engage in filming for profit (or the exchange of any consideration for your filming activities) without having applied for and received this license. It is an annual license, so you would not need to apply separately for future filming once the license has

A sign-up station for people who want to sell their land to the state was among the information booths set up in the Jackson County Agriculture Complex on Wednesday night, as another meeting was held to


update the public on the process of adopting a new plan to help clean up Jackson Blue Spring and Merritt's Mill Pond.

## County wants subdivision plat amended

The Jackson County Commission agree Tuesday to request a land development firm resubmit a corrected and amended subdivision plat for the county's official records.

The board, reflecting the advice of its attorney and a request from Tax Assessor Herbert Lockey, agreed to ask Compass Lake Hills Development Corporation to substitute a completely revised plat for recording.

Lockey told the board his office couldn't correctly evaluate the property for assessment purposes unless a new plat was filed, since it would be using the original plat for recording.

In 1933, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Emergency Conservation Work Act, which created the Civilian Conservation Corps.

In 1943, "Oklahoma," the first musical play by Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, opened on Broadway.

In 1958, the Chuck Berry single "Johnny B. Goode" was first released on the Chess label.

In 1976, the New Jersey Supreme Court ruled that Karen Ann Quinlan, a young woman in a persistent vegetative state, could be disconnected from her respirator. (Quinlan, who remained unconscious, died in 1985.)

In 1986, 167 people died when a Mexicana Airlines Boeing 727 crashed in a remote mountainous region of Mexico.

In 1993, actor Brandon Lee, 28, was accidentally shot to death during the filming of a movie in Wilmington, North Carolina, when he was hit by a bullet fragment that had been lodged inside a prop gun.

In 1995, Mexican-American singer Selena Quintanilla-Perez, 23, was shot to death in Corpus Christi, Texas, by the founder of her fan club, Yolanda Saldívar, who was convicted of murder and sentenced to life in prison.

In 2005, Terri Schiavo (SHIVOH), 41, died at a hospice in Pinellas Park, Florida, 13 days after her feeding tube was removed in a wrenching right-to-life dispute.

Ten years ago: HUD Secretary Alfonso Jackson announced his resignation amid the wreckage of the national housing crisis. A Bahamas jury ruled

that Anna Nicole Smith's son, Daniel, died from an accidental drug overdose, just like his mother. American movie director Jules Dassin, whose Greek wife, Melina Mercouri, starred in his hit movie "Never on Sunday" and six more of his films, died in Athens at age 96.

Five years ago: Pope Francis marked Christianity's most joyous day at the Vatican with a passionate plea for world peace as he celebrated his first Easter Sunday as pontiff. The Houston Astros, coming off consecutive 100-loss seasons, made an impressive debut in the American League, trouncing the Texas Rangers 8-2 on opening night.

One year ago: President Donald Trump signed a pair of executive orders focused on reducing the U.S. trade deficit; the first order gave the Commerce Department 90 days to assemble a report on the factors behind the trade deficit, while the second sought to increase collection of duties on imports. Evgenia Medvedeva of Russia retained her world figure skating title at the championship in Helsinki.

# Classroom laptops, note-taking and Laguna Beach

**I**nnovative communication devices are wonderful — until they aren't.

While searching for a restaurant in Laguna Beach, California, last summer, my husband and I pulled over in a parking lot and asked a lady if she knew the whereabouts of the eatery. She assured us that she had lived in Laguna her whole life and knew the town well. Then she pulled out her phone, punched at it for five minutes, and provided difficult, lengthy instructions.

We said thanks and left. Ultimately, we drove about a hundred yards, took one turn and went up a hill, and found the restaurant sitting in plain view of the parking lot. You could actually see the eating establishment from the very spot where we had inquired about its location. All that was required of our guide was for her to turn and gesture and say, "There it is. Turn right and drive up the hill."

It's as if folks have forgotten how to point without assistance from a smartphone. So I was not surprised to read recently that college professors all over the country are ban-

ning laptops as note-taking devices. The digital age is fascinating, and there's no denying that technology has revolutionized many businesses, including my own. On a personal level, I love texting with relatives and friends. But I am not joined at the hip with my phone. It's disconcerting and rude when people can't converse, watch a movie or outdoor event or engage in a business discussion without staring at a tablet or screen. We need human linkups in addition to technical ones.

Professors are weary of staring at the back of laptops in lieu of actually connecting visually with their classroom compatriots. The students hidden behind those screens may be focused on the lecture or they may be surfing the internet, but the teacher can't know without seeing those faces.

Early returns are in from the students. They're complaining

that taking notes by hand is tiring and, afterwards, sometimes they can't read their own writing. News flash: no one ever died from a hand cramp. Advice for the students with unreadable hieroglyphics instead of notes: Write more neatly. Develop your own shorthand. And organize your notes in outline form. They can serve as an effective study guide. Many students are recording their classes with cell phones instead of taking notes. What ever happened to paying attention?

One thing that classes without laptops may inspire is actual interaction and discussion among and between students and teachers. Listening to my classmates express themselves was part of our college education. I cannot imagine a more isolating and boring experience than sitting silently in a group where every individual is hidden behind a small computer screen.

## Florida State lifts ban on alcohol for Greek organizations

TALLAHASSEE — Florida State University has lifted its ban on alcohol and social functions by fraternities, sororities and student organizations, months after the death of a fraternity pledge at an off-campus party.

Vice President of Student Affairs Amy Hecht said the lifting of the ban with four weeks to go in the university's spring semester gives everyone a chance to assess the new rules and what changes might need to still be made before the fall semester begins in late August.

"The students have stepped up and shown responsible behavior over the past couple months. Now we'll see what happens over the next four weeks," Hecht said. "That gives the summer to refine things and have an even better system in place for the fall."

Florida State President John Thrasher suspended all fraternities and sororities Nov. 6, three days after the death from alcohol poisoning of 20-year old Andrew Coffey. Fraternities and sororities were reinstated Jan. 29. Besides Coffey, other similar deaths occurred last year at Penn State, Louisiana State and Texas State. The other three also suspended Greek activities but have reinstated them.

The alcohol ban was officially lifted Monday via an email sent by Hecht to students. Under new rules announced in January, events must be registered through the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life. They also are required to have security present as well as using a third-party vendor for food and alcohol. Social

events with alcohol are limited to four per chapter or organization during the fall semester and six in the spring, and include chapters taking risk management training.

Alan Levine, a member of Florida's Board of Governors, said during Wednesday's meeting in Jacksonville that he had reservations about Thrasher's initial steps but now has a greater understanding of what he did.

"We're on the precipice of losing the Greek system if this type of hazing keeps happening," Thrasher said. "I want to save the Greek system. When you have four of these events happen nationwide in one year, it is significant."

The lifting of the ban also comes as Florida's State Attorney's office awaits responses on plea offers from the attorneys of the nine members of the suspended Pi Kappa Phi fraternity that have been charged with felony hazing.

One offer would be to plead guilty to two counts of misdemeanor hazing with adjudication withheld along with 60 days in jail and two years of probation. The other would be to plead guilty to one count of felony hazing and 60 days in a county jail work camp. Both would include making an apology to Coffey's family.

The state medical examiner said Coffey had a blood alcohol level of .447 at the time of the autopsy. Coffey drank a lethal amount of bourbon and malt liquor at the fraternity's "Big Brother Night" party, which was held at an off-campus home.

All nine have entered not guilty pleas and are awaiting trial. They are also named in a civil suit filed by Coffey's family

## More advertisers drop Laura Ingraham after comments

MIAMI — More advertisers dropped Fox News personality Laura Ingraham on Friday, two days after she mocked a school shooting survivor online.

At least 11 companies had said by Friday that they would pull their ads from "The Ingraham Angle."

On Wednesday, Ingraham tweeted, "David Hogg Rejected By Four Colleges To Which He Applied and whines about it."

In response, Hogg, a student at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School who filmed students hiding from the gunman in their classrooms, was quick to respond, tweeting a list of

a dozen advertisers and encouraging followers to immediately call them and ask them to drop Ingraham.

"Soooo @IngrahamAngle what are your biggest advertisers ... Asking for a friend," he wrote.

Online home goods store Wayfair, food company Nestle, travel website TripAdvisor, video-streaming service Hulu and Rachel Ray's dog food Nutrish said they are removing their support from Ingraham. Though not mentioned in Hogg's initial tweet, Office Depot, Jenny Craig, Expedia, StitchFix, Johnson & Johnson and Atlantis, Paradise Island resort have also dropped Ingraham.

### Estimating wedding attendance

PENSACOLA — The young girl sat across from the little doggy Buster and read to him.

Every few seconds, you would hear a "Woof Woof."

Not from laid-back Buster — an 11-year-old Bichon Frise. But from 10-year-old Chancey Cogley.

"Woof Woof," she said, reading from the children's book "Biscuit Takes a Walk." "It's Grandpa." Then, she continued with the short story of the fictional dog Biscuit taking a walk with fictional grandpa.

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# Widow of Pulse nightclub gunman acquitted

ST. PETERSBURG — The widow of the gunman who slaughtered 49 people at a gay Orlando nightclub was acquitted Friday of helping her husband plot the attack and lying to the FBI afterward, ending the government's nearly two-year effort to hold someone accountable.

Noor Salman, 31, sobbed upon hearing the jury's verdict of not guilty of obstruction and providing material support to a terrorist organization, charges that could have brought life in prison. Her family gasped each time the words "not guilty" were pronounced.

On the other side of the courtroom, the families of the victims of the June 2016 Pulse nightclub shooting sat stone-faced and silent.

The stinging rejection of the case was a rare defeat for the government in a terrorism case.

Relying heavily on an alleged confession from Salman, federal prosecutors had charged that she and her husband, Omar Mateen, had scouted out potential targets together — including Disney World's shopping and entertainment complex — and that she knew he was buying ammunition for his AR-15 assault-style rifle for a jihadi attack.

The government contended also that she knew Mateen had a sick fascination with violent ji-

hadi videos and an affinity for Islamic State group websites, and that she gave him a "green light to commit terrorism."

But the defense portrayed her as an easily manipulated woman with a low IQ and argued that she signed a false confession because she was tired after extensive questioning and feared losing her young son.

And in a blow to prosecutors' case, the FBI itself found that receipts and cellphone signals

showed the couple was nowhere near the Pulse on the day Salman said they were.

After the verdict, prosecutors said they were disappointed in the jury's decision.

Defense attorney Linda Moreno said: "We're so grateful. Noor is so grateful. Her belief in the process was shown. She wants to get back to her son." Family spokeswoman Susan Clary said Salman's family "always thought that Noor was the first victim of

Omar Mateen."

"Noor Salman should never have been on trial," said Ahmed Bedier of the Council on American-Islamic Relations. "Let this verdict serve as a message to law enforcement and prosecutors who railroad and persecute innocent people on little evidence, the people of this great nation will not allow it."

David Weinstein, a defense attorney from Miami who was not involved in the case, said the lack

## School shooting suspect gets 'piles' of fan letters

FORT LAUDERDALE — The suspect in the Florida high school shooting that killed 17 is getting letters of support in jail including fan mail and pictures of scantily-clad women in addition to hundreds of dollars in contributions to his commissary account.

Teenage girls, women and men are sending letters and photographs of themselves and Facebook groups have been started to discuss how to help Nikolas Cruz, the South Florida Sun-Sentinel reports.

Cruz is charged in the killings of 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, and is being held in the Broward County Jail. Prosecutors said they are seeking the death penalty.


The newspaper obtained copies of letters, including one from a woman who called Cruz "beautiful" and others with suggestive photos.

Cruz, who is on suicide watch, has not seen any of the letters, which are opened by the jail.

On March 15, a teenager sent a letter from Texas inside an envelope with happy faces and hearts.

"I'm 18-years-old. I'm a senior in high school. When I saw your picture on the television, something attracted me to you," the letter stated. "Your eyes are beautiful and the freckles on your face make you so handsome."

Another letter told Cruz to "Hang in there and keep your head up" and another

mailed six days after the shooting said "I reserve the right to care about you, Nikolas!"

Public Defender Howard Finkelstein, Cruz's lawyer, told the newspaper that his client has indeed received "piles of letters."

In addition, \$800 has been deposited into a commissary account which can be used by inmates to buy snacks, radios and personal hygiene products.

"In my 40 years as public defender, I've never seen this many letters to a defendant," Finkelstein said. "Everyone now and then gets a few, but nothing like this."

Finkelstein said they have read a "few religious ones to him" but will not read him any fan letters or share any photographs.

"The letters shake me up because they are written by regular, everyday teenage girls from across the nation," he said.

## Informant: Plot against Muslims began after Pulse nightclub attack

WICHITA, Kan. — A Kansas militia member started trying to recruit other members to kill Muslim immigrants after the 2016 attack on the Pulse nightclub in Orlando, an FBI informant testified Thursday.

Dan Day told jurors that Patrick Stein called him a couple of days after the Florida attack in which a man who had pledged allegiance to the Islamic State group killed 49 people. He said Stein told him he was "ready to take action" against Muslims and wanted to see who else in the militia group was with him and who wasn't.

"They were outraged that a Muslim was killing all these Americans," Day said. "I was outraged too."

As a precaution in case they were being monitored by law enforcement, Stein held the first recruitment meeting in a shack on the property of another member of the Kansas Security Force, Day said. That June 2016 meeting was the first one Day recorded as an FBI

informant.

Day, who was given the code name "Minuteman" by his FBI handlers, said that as he and Stein drove to that meeting, he worried that others might know he was working with the FBI and that his life could be in danger because there was nobody nearby who could help him.

Prosecutors say that over the next five months, Day gave the FBI secret recordings of other meetings and conversations in which a plot formed to bomb a mosque and an apartment complex where Somali immigrants lived in the meatpacking community of Garden City. They say the defendants planned to carry out the attack right after the 2016 presidential election and hoped it would inspire attacks on Muslims throughout the country.

Stein and two other militia members, Gavin Wright and Curtis Allen, were arrested in October 2016. They have pleaded not guilty to charges of conspiracy to use a weapon of mass destruction and conspiracy

against civil rights. Stein also faces two additional weapons-related charges and Wright faces a charge of lying to the FBI.

Day testified that Stein and Allen held two more meetings to try to recruit other members to their plot. He said that in other meetings, the group downloaded bomb-making instructions from the Internet and discussed writing a manifesto in the hopes of inspiring other Americans to join their cause.

He said Stein called himself "Orkin man" — a reference to the pest control chain — because he wanted to exterminate the Somalis, whom he referred to as "cockroaches." And he said the group called their plans "Crusades 2.0," because Stein likened them to a new Christian holy war.

Day recounted one recruitment meeting in the living room of a militia member's house in Lakin, Kansas, during which the homeowner, Trish Burch, adamantly refused to join them, arguing that militias are only for defensive actions.

### State Republicans remain quiet on voting rights case

TALLAHASSEE — A federal judge is ordering Florida to overhaul its system for restoring voting rights, but top Republican officials are remaining relatively quiet about whether they plan to go along with the ruling.

U.S. District Judge Mark Walker blocked the state's system of forcing ex-felons to wait at least five years before they can ask for the right to vote. Walker gave Gov. Rick Scott and state officials until April 26 to change the process.

Scott on Tuesday defended the system but did not say if he would appeal.

Two elected officials on the state's clemency board say they are reviewing the ruling.

Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis's office also said any changes should reflect the wishes of crime victims.

Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam maintains different standards should be in place for violent and non-violent offenders.

### Solar jobs on the rise in Florida

MIAMI — The Solar Foundation says solar jobs are on the rise in the Sunshine State.

The organization's 2017 census shows that solar employment declined 3.8 percent nationwide, from 260,077 jobs in 2016 to 250,271 in 2017. But solar jobs increased in 29 states and the District of Columbia, including Florida, Minnesota, Utah, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Georgia.

Florida added 330 jobs from 2016 to 2017.

The non-profit encouraged state officials to look at solar power as a key strategy for building local economies and supporting high-quality careers.

California remained the state with the leading number of solar jobs in 2017.

**University of Florida pays \$67K for white nationalist event**

GAINESVILLE — The University of Florida has paid a local county government more than

\$67,000 to cover security costs for a speaking event last fall featuring white nationalist Richard Spencer.

The Gainesville Sun reported Wednesday that UF sent Alachua County a check for \$67,461.11 that school officials felt covered costs for the event. The county previously billed UF \$302,000.

Protesters' chants drowned out Spencer's message Oct. 19. He called the protesters "babies" and "pathetic" before ending the event early.

The Sun has estimated the event's total cost at about \$793,000. Spencer and his group paid \$10,500. The city of Gainesville says it spent about \$224,000 on the event, while the Florida Highway Patrol spent \$266,000.

Gov. Rick Scott had declared a "state of emergency" over worries that the event would spark violence.

**UCF to get first new president in almost three decades**

ORLANDO — The University of Central Florida

will be getting a new president for the first time in 26 years.

The state Board of Governors approved Thursday the promotion of Provost Dale Whittaker. He will replace John Hitt, who is retiring June 30.

The Orlando Sentinel reports the board approved Whittaker's appointment unanimously. The 56-year-old academic has been provost since 2014 after being vice provost at Purdue University in Indiana.

As president, Whittaker will be paid \$506,000 annually, receive an \$800 per month car allowance and will be eligible for bonuses based on graduation and retention rates and donations.

UCF is one of the nation's largest schools, with 66,000 students.

From wire reports

of a recorded confession from Salman probably influenced the jury, which was shown only a written statement.

"As much as we don't want to admit it, this is the age of the cellphone. It's ingrained in the minds of jurors, if it's not recorded, it didn't happen," Weinstein said.

Prosecutors had also accused Salman of obstructing the investigation by lying to the FBI. She falsely claimed that her husband didn't use the internet in their home, that he had deactivated his Facebook account years earlier, that he had one gun when he had three, and that he wasn't radicalized, they said.

But the defense said Salman, who was born in California to Palestinian parents, was abused by her husband, who cheated on her with other women and concealed much of his life from her.

Defense attorney Charles Swift argued there was no way Salman knew that her husband would attack the nightclub because even he didn't know it until moments before.

According to prosecutors, Mateen intended to attack Disney World's shopping and entertainment complex by hiding a gun in a stroller but became spooked by police and chose a new target.

Mateen, the American-born son of Afghan immigrants, was killed by police in the nightclub attack.

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Like other tax credits, the saver's credit can increase a taxpayer's refund or reduce the tax owed. Though the maximum saver's credit is \$1,000 (\$2,000 for married couples), the IRS cautions that it is often much less and due in part to the impact of other deductions and credits, may, in fact, be zero for some taxpayers.

A taxpayer's credit amount is based on his or her filing status, adjusted gross income, tax liability and amount contributed to qualifying retirement programs. Form 8880 is used to claim the saver's credit, and its instructions have details on figuring the credit correctly.

The saver's credit supplements other tax benefits available to people who set money aside for retirement. For example, most workers may deduct their contributions to a traditional IRA.

Other special rules that apply to the saver's credit include the following: Eligible taxpayers must be at least 18 years of age; anyone claimed as a dependent on someone else's return cannot take the credit; and a student cannot take the credit (a person enrolled as a full-time student during any part of 5 calendar months during the year is considered a student).

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


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# Judge rules that coffee requires cancer warning


LOS ANGELES — Coffee sellers will have to post ominous warnings in California because each cup contains a chemical linked to cancer, a judge ruled.

The culprit is a byproduct of the bean roasting process that is a known carcinogen and has been at the heart of an eight-year legal struggle between a tiny nonprofit group and Big Coffee.

The Council for Education and Research on Toxics wanted the coffee industry to remove acrylamide from its processing — like potato chip makers did when it sued them years ago — or disclose the possible risk in signs or labels. The industry, led by Starbucks Corp., said the level of the chemical in coffee isn't harmful and any risks are outweighed by benefits.

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Elihu Berle said Wednesday that the coffee makers hadn't presented the proper grounds at trial to prevail.

"While plaintiff offered evidence that consumption of coffee increases the risk of harm to the fetus, to infants, to children and to adults, defendants' medical and epidemiology experts testified that they had no opinion on causation," Berle wrote in his proposed ruling. "Defendants failed to satisfy their burden of proving ... that consumption of coffee

confers a benefit to human health."

The suit was brought against Starbucks and 90 companies under a law passed by California voters in 1986 that has been credited with culling cancer-causing chemicals from myriad products and also criticized for leading to quick settlement shake-downs.

The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act, better known as Proposition 65, requires warn-

ing labels for about 900 chemicals known to cause cancer or birth defects. It allows private citizens, advocacy groups and attorneys to sue on behalf of the state and collect a portion of civil penalties for failure to provide warnings.

"This lawsuit has made a mockery of Prop. 65, has confused consumers, and does nothing to improve public health," said William Murray, president and CEO of the National Coffee Association, who

added that coffee had been shown to be a healthy beverage.

Scientific evidence on coffee has gone back and forth for a long time, but concerns have eased recently about possible dangers of coffee, with some studies finding health benefits.

In 2016, the cancer agency of the World Health Organization moved coffee off its "possible carcinogen" list.

Studies indicate coffee

is unlikely to cause breast, prostate or pancreatic cancer, and it seems to lower the risks for liver and uterine cancers, the agency said. Evidence is inadequate to determine its effect on dozens of other cancer types.

Coffee companies have said it's not feasible to remove acrylamide from their product without ruining the flavor.

But attorney Raphael Metzger, who brought the lawsuit and drinks a few cups of coffee a day, said the industry could remove the chemical without impairing taste.

"I firmly believe if the potato chip industry can do it, so can the coffee industry," Metzger said. "A warning won't be that effective because it's an addictive product."

Many coffee shops have already posted warnings that say acrylamide is cancer-causing chemical found in coffee. But signs that are supposed to be posted at the point of sale are often found in places not easily visible, such as below the counter where cream and sugar are available.

Customers at shops that post warnings are often unaware or unconcerned about them.

Afternoon coffee drinkers at a Los Angeles Starbucks said they might look into the warning or give coffee drinking a second thought after the ruling, but the cup of joe was like-

ly to win out.

"I just don't think it would stop me," said Jen Bitterman, a digital marketing technologist. "I love the taste, I love the ritual, I love the high, the energy, and I think I'm addicted to it."

Darlington Ibekwe, a lawyer in Los Angeles, said a cancer warning would be annoying but wouldn't stop him from treating himself to three lattes a week.

"It's like cigarettes. Like, damn, now I've got to see this?" he said. "Dude, I'm enjoying my coffee."

The defendants have a couple weeks to challenge the ruling before it is final and could seek relief from an appellate court.

If the ruling stands, it could come with a stiff financial penalty and could rattle consumers beyond state lines.

The judge can set another phase of trial to consider potential civil penalties up to \$2,500 per person exposed each day over eight years. That could be an astronomical sum in a state with close to 40 million residents, though such a massive fine is unlikely.

California's outsized market could make it difficult to tailor packaging with warning labels specifically to stores in the state.

That means out-of-state coffee drinkers could also take their coffee with a cancer warning. Cream and sugar would still be optional.

## Judge: Return Chinese drywall lawsuits to original states

NEW ORLEANS — Nine years after a judge began supervising a multitude of federal lawsuits that claim homes were damaged by Chinese drywall, he says it's time to return thousands of remaining cases for trial in the courts where they were filed.

The panel that put Judge Eldon Fallon in charge in 2009 said the first 1,700 would return to Florida's federal courts if no objections are filed by Thursday. At least three objection notices were filed Thursday by attorneys for about 750 clients. Objectors' briefs must be filed by April 12, with responses due May 3, according to the U.S. Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation's electronic docket.

Fallon ruled in 2010 that Chinese-made drywall released sulfur fumes into homes, sickening occupants, corroding metals in wiring, plumbing, appliances and electronics, and stinking up the houses. In 2013, he approved settlements involving thousands of homes and other buildings with drywall from German-owned Knauf Plasterboard Tianjin Co.

Remaining cases in-

volve a second company, Taishan Gypsum Co. Ltd., which didn't show up in court until Fallon found it in contempt and forbade any of its subsidiaries or affiliates to do business in this country until it participated in court proceedings.

Fallon told the panel he wants to transfer all remaining Chinese drywall cases that were sent to him.

Ann Saucer of the Baron & Budd law firm, which joined two others in an objection for 418 clients, said, "We're sort of confused as to why only these particular claims are being transferred back for trial."

Any requests to transfer are unusual. Supervising judges resolve the great majority of cases, mostly through settlements, according to a 2014 Louisiana Law Review article by Edward F. Sherman of Tulane University.

"The gold standard, I think, is to get everybody to a point where you can get global peace for everybody," said Louisiana State University law Professor Margaret Thomas.

But when that doesn't happen the cases must go to trial in the states where the suits were filed.

About 5,000 cases re-

main from eight states: Florida, Virginia, Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, North Carolina and California, attorney Arnold Levin, spokesman for the Plaintiffs Steering Committee in this case, said Thursday.

Fallon said in a March 12 order and request that he's dealt with all pretrial motions raising common questions, held "bellwether trials" to lead the way and has approved a formula for calculating property damages.

He wrote that his court "has worked diligently for the past nine years," producing abundant evidence and judicial opinions to enable the original courts and the parties in the lawsuits to steer any unresolved cases "to a fair and just conclusion."

His order and request was accompanied by a 118-page list identifying 1,734 cases comprising one Florida class action. There could be more than 1,000 additional cases in a separate group that includes Florida defendants, Levin said.

Plaintiffs whose cases would be transferred back include Jason and Heather Aner of Land O Lakes, Florida. Jason Aner said an inspector who

claimed to be a Chinese drywall expert told them their house was fine, but their air conditioner began failing within months after they moved in. Their drywall turned out to have been made by Taishan. Five months after moving in, Heather Aner became pregnant.

The couple left the house, stopped making payments on it and eventually declared bankruptcy.

"We don't know what to think," said Jason Aner. "All I know is it seems that definitely we will not have any kind of recourse."

He said that in Facebook groups of people affected by Taishan's drywall, people are asking how are individual trials going to do any good if the combined cases can't go forward.

That isn't so, Levin said.

"We as plaintiffs support what Judge Fallon has done," he said. "It's nine years, and the Chinese have tried every tactic to see to it that the people we represent either die or otherwise have their properties disposed of ... just trying to frustrate the process."

Levin said the steering committee's attorneys are ready to work with lawyers representing the remaining defendants.

"Ultimately, the only thing that leads a recalcitrant defendant to settle is a big verdict," he said.

Taishan and its subsidiaries and affiliates do a lot of business in the United States. One of them sells solar panels to Walmart and another buying tim-

ber in Oregon, he said. Levin said those companies' assets in this country can be attached if Taishan ignores court orders to pay damages, Levin said.

Once the cases return to their originating courts, he said, "The Chinese will be all over America trying cases."



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## Another View

### What if Trump's really serious about arming teachers?

**I**t's hard to know if President Donald Trump's plan to arm teachers is a real proposal or just noise to obscure his hapless response to the mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida. The idea of "firearms training for school personnel" is on a White House list of measures that patently falls short of being an actual policy to prevent shootings at schools or anywhere else. As if to confirm its pointlessness, the plan even includes that classic Washington side-step — a blue-ribbon commission to look into it all.


One can only hope that the idea does indeed come to nothing.

A Gallup poll released last week found 73 percent of U.S. teachers opposed to arming teachers and school staff. A majority of Americans agrees with the teachers, according to a recent NBC News/Survey Monkey poll. The history of guns in classrooms confirms that they're right. In Northern California last week, a teacher who is also a reserve officer in his local police force was conducting a public safety class when his gun discharged accidentally, injuring a student. Last month, a social studies teacher in Georgia barricaded himself in a classroom and then fired a gun out the window. Last year, another Georgia teacher shot himself in class. In 2014, an elementary school teacher in Utah accidentally shot herself in the leg while using the faculty restroom.

None of these things happened amid the chaos and stress of an armed assault on a school - the kind of event for which even highly trained professionals may find themselves unprepared. The chances are good that armed teachers or staff would increase not decrease the number of dead and wounded from such an attack. This simple rule is a pretty good guide: More guns means more violence.

Arming teachers would do nothing to reduce gun violence; on the other hand, it might serve the interests of the gun industry. Profits in that business have been slumping, and teachers represent a nice potential market. Hence there's political backing for the idea — and federal money for the purpose might be difficult for some hard-pressed school districts to resist. It can't be assumed, therefore, that Trump's plan is going nowhere. The idea shouldn't be lightly dismissed: It should be roundly repudiated as a cynical threat to children's safety.

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

## The lessons of My Lai still resonate

Fifty years ago this month, on March 16, 1968, around 200 U.S. soldiers from Charlie and Bravo companies burst into a Communist-dominated area in South Vietnam known to GIs as "Pinkville." In less than four hours, more than 500 Vietnamese civilians — including elderly men, women and children — were dead in the villages of My Lai 4, Binh Tay, Binh Dong and My Khe 4.

The American forces sustained one casualty that day; it was self-inflicted. Thirteen soldiers faced allegations of rape, but those cases were dismissed for lack of evidence. Thirty soldiers were accused of murder — but were never prosecuted. Only 2nd Lt. William L. Calley, leader of Charlie Company's 1st Platoon in My Lai 4, would be convicted of murder and sentenced to life in prison. Calley appealed the verdict and was later paroled in November 1974.

Historians have long acknowledged the significance of the My Lai massacre. Thomas E. Ricks argues that it marked "the low point of the 20th-century United States military." Max Hastings called it "the most notorious war crime of the Vietnam era."

How well have we learned its lessons? In 1970, the Pentagon launched a top-secret investigation (it was declassified in 1994) into numerous allegations of atrocities in Vietnam and concluded that more than 300 massacres had occurred — with My Lai the worst. No other crime, Gen. William Westmoreland wrote in his 1976 memoir, "even remotely approached the magnitude and horror of My Lai."

What happened at My Lai lays bare the type of war fought by Americans in Vietnam: one of attrition based on body counts, "search-and-destroy missions" and "free-fire zones" — euphemisms for blanket killings that often included noncombatants.

My Lai underscores the great

difficulty facing U.S. forces on the ground: how to distinguish between the enemy and the innocent. The fundamental reality to U.S. soldiers was that all Viet Cong were Vietnamese, yet not all Vietnamese were Viet Cong. How to resolve this problem? Kill every Vietnamese, even the children, Calley asserted in his 1971 memoir. Otherwise, he said, mothers of sons killed years later in the long war would yell at him, "Why didn't you kill those babies that day?"

The facts of My Lai force us to look at what the soldiers faced. Consider a 19-year-old who had never been outside the United States, knew little or nothing about Vietnam and had no real sense of why he was there. What should we expect him to do when, scared to death, he entered a Vietnamese village known as an enemy hot spot in which all its inhabitants wore peasant garb — whether they were noncombatants, Viet Cong sympathizers, or themselves Viet Cong?

Notably, Charlie Company had lost 28 soldiers during the recent Tet Offensive to land mines, booby traps and snipers. Numerous soldiers reported that, in the briefing the day before the My Lai operation, Capt. Ernest Medina told his three platoons they had a chance for revenge: The civilians would have departed for Quang Ngai City on that market day, and Army intelligence reported that more than 200 forces from the Viet Cong's 48th Local Force Battalion lay embedded at My Lai 4. When U.S. troops began their assault, they expected to encounter only the enemy. And they were driven by fear, frustration, vengeance, racial hatred and the determination to shoot first as the chief means to survive against a force twice their size.

As it turned out, Army intelligence was wrong: No Viet Cong were in the villages. Every victim of the massacre was a civilian.

In the midst of this carnage appeared a glimmer of human

decency and courage. Warrant Officer Hugh Thompson, accompanied in his small observation helicopter by 20-year-old crew chief Glenn Andreotta and 18-year-old gunner Lawrence Colburn, intervened to stop the killings and reported them to the command base, bringing about a ceasefire before noon that doubtless saved numerous Vietnamese lives.

After My Lai, the Army sought to restore its image by developing a volunteer force based on personal character, along with improved discipline and training, and led by officers who were taught combat ethics and the importance of enforcing the principle of restraint underlying the rules of land warfare, particularly in heavily populated areas. But the graphic abuses committed by U.S. forces decades later at Abu Ghraib prison during the war in Iraq, along with the CIA's torture of detainees, raise the question of whether any reform, no matter how effective, can ever fully eliminate the danger.

In terms of history, the significance of My Lai remains unambiguous. The massacre and its aftermath intensified a growing public call to end the war in Vietnam — and not only by antiwar groups. Calley's conviction and sentence led supporters of the war to insist that if their soldiers were not allowed the freedom to kill the enemy, they must pull out of Vietnam.

But My Lai transcends history. Its lessons are universal. Historian Roger Spiller declared that "the most frightening lesson" he has learned from military history is that "ordinary" people are capable of heinous crimes in the right circumstances. The key to ending atrocities in war is as obvious as it has been unattainable: End war or accept Spiller's conclusion that "we are all one step away from My Lai."

been issued. Importantly, the Board of County Commissioners issues the license, and their next meeting is scheduled for April 10, 2018."

The company could be assessed a civil fee ranging from \$50 to \$500, if it moves ahead without the license. There is not criminal penalty.

The county may soon have more specific regulations for filming. They authorized interim Administrator Wilanne Daniels and Jordan to draw a committee together to draft some recommended policies.

With no industry-specific regulations currently in place, commissioners concluded it may be too late to have an effect this time around — shooting could start soon as planned, with one property owner already having given the filmmaker permission to shoot on his or her property, and with nothing on the books to prevent the movie crew from using public places or to control their activities or the content and distribution of material shot there. But board members said news of the project made them realize they need to consider putting something in place to govern future film-making here. Local officials, while they want the county to be in the national spotlight as a destination for tourists, they also

don't want that light to cast an ugly shadow.

It may be difficult, board members learned, to control certain things.

During the board's discussion that day, some board members appeared to worry that Jackson County would be put in a bad light. Some were also worried that local footage might be used as stock for any number of films of all sorts, no matter what the original stated purpose for its use.

Several made it clear that they wanted to make sure no movie filmed here made Jackson County look bad. Some talked of imposing a rule that would give the county the right to review and approve or deny a company the right to distribute any footage it gathers here.

They talked some about trying to come up with policies to ensure a good image for the county. Commissioner Willie Spires, on the other hand, wondered why some of his fellow board members were so concerned.

"What do we have to hide?" he asked rhetorically. And Commissioner Chuck Lockey asked board attorney Michelle Jordan about whether there were any First Amendment issues to consider.

She said the freedoms insured by that constitutional provision are indeed to be protected. "People have the right to criticize the govern-

ment," she added.

When one board member asked whether the panel might simply disallow film-making in Spring Creek, perhaps by invoking right-of-way powers, Jordan indicated not, and briefly made mention of a current lawsuit involving that body of water. She was referencing the lawsuit which challenges the county's existing ordinance that outlaws the use of foam-style and glass containers on the creek. It was enacted a few years ago in an effort to control the disposal of trash into creek by those who use it recreationally.

Bear Paw Adventures owners Ricky and Anna McAlpin filed the suit in 2015, claiming that only the federal government has the right to enforce such civil regulations in the body of water. The couple claims that local law enforcement officers, in attempting to enforce the local ordinance, took measures which caused potential customers to shy away. The suit asks the court to shut down the county's enforcement efforts, determine the ordinance unlawful, and to award the plaintiffs damages in excess of \$15,000.

Jordan says she's confident the county can defend its right to police the body of water in this case and in all matters of health, safety and welfare, but things get murkier when trying to control use of the asset with a goal of trying to regulate perceptions created.

explained that wouldn't be possible, because fire rescue has a union set-up and Friday's subject matter might touch on fire-rescue union issues that the county is prevented from discussing in an open forum. Commissioners could only listen. Many people in the room had expected two-way discussion and some possible action that day.

During the break, fire rescue spokesman Patrick Kane asked members of the crowd to keep their tempers in check and use the opportunity to air their concerns calmly.

And commissioners set another special meeting on the manpower issue, a session in which they could take action, for Wednesday at 1 p.m. That leaves time for the union and county leadership to potentially speak outside the public arena on issues related to salaries and other union-protected matters.

On Friday, fire rescue members complained of mandatory overtime that leaves them dangerously weary, and deprives them of important family time. The department is short 10 people now and two more vacancies are expected in coming days.

The people left have to work double- and sometimes triple-shifts.

Several members of the general public spoke on their behalf as well. So much overtime, some citizens said, was leaving the community with an exhausted crew that might not do as good a job as they could if they were fresh. They praised team and some gave examples of how the crew members' skills and caring attitude had helped in their personal lives.

Some said they were willing to pay an annual assessment or higher taxes in order to better fund the department and get salaries to a level that allows the county to be more competitive in recruiting and retaining paramedics and EMTs. Some thought a half-cent sales tax might be a better approach, and some others questioned whether the county was yet using all the resources at its disposal to fund this and other county operations. A few wondered whether the county might shift more focus to medical service funding and let volunteer firefighters handle more of the load on fire service.

Several speakers said they'd heard the county is contemplating privatization of the service and all of them implored the county to reject that option.

There was one suggestion that an

outside provider might be brought in to handle planned medical transfers in order to keep all ambulances inside the county for emergency-only service at all times, rather than on runs to facilities in Dothan, Panama City or Tallahassee.

There was also a suggestion that, to handle the most immediate crisis, the county might want to consider sidelining one ambulance for the time being in order to curtail some of the mandatory overtime the team is now facing.

If staffing was at normal levels, the medical- and fire-certified crew members would work 24 hours, have 48 hours off and repeat the pattern for a roughly 56-hour week with no overtime until they pass the 56th hour. That's another recruitment and retention problem, the team says, because many other fire rescue teams work a schedule in which overtime begins at end of the 40th hour.

Last year, the county paid \$325,057 in department overtime. In the first three months of this year, it has paid out \$92,214.

Attracting more people by increasing department wages and adding incentives might be less expensive and more efficient way to run the department, some speakers said.

# US 231 crash leaves 1 dead, 1 arrested

A crash on U.S. Route 231 in Jackson County left one dead Thursday, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

Officials say the incident happened at 5:28 a.m., near the intersection of US 231 and Douglas Road, in Marianna.

Ralph Edwards, 63, of Sardis, Alabama, was driving a 2015 Freightliner tractor

and 38-year-old James Adams, of Sneads, was driving a 1993 Subaru Legacy, both southbound in the outside lane of 231, according to the agency's homicide investigator.

FHP says the front of the Freightliner collided with the rear of the Subaru and continued south onto the west grassy shoulder of 231, where the truck then hit a wire fence and then multiple trees. Edwards' injuries

were listed as fatal and he was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash, according to the agency's homicide investigator.

has led more than one such session in Jackson County.

The plan continues to evolve as the mandatory plan adoption date of July 1 draws near, but Hansen said Wednesday that nothing has essentially changed since an update session earlier this month.

DEP is still tasked with bringing Jackson Blue back to an unimpaired state. It still plans to achieve that in several specific ways: Having those who farm in the basin sign up for and promise to abide by management practices that will limit their negative impact on the spring; funding a new central sewer system for the Indian Springs subdivision in order to eliminate the most concentrated number of septic tanks in the Jackson Blue recharge area; and for the rest of the basin adopting new standards for septic tanks and drain fields that will be installed in the future; encouraging owners of existing septic tanks to upgrade their systems even though their old systems will be grandfathered in; improving structures in Blue Springs Recreational Area in order to reduce infiltration of contaminants into the water; and buying farm lands so that the acreage can then be taken out of production and thereby eliminated as a contributor to the problem.

To help some of the stakeholders financially manage the things they're being asked to do, the state is offering grants or other types of assistance.

Farmers, for instance, can apply for funding to help retro-fit or replace their irrigation and fertilization equipment with more efficient models. The state is also offering assistance for those who agree to try crop rotation methods that are believed to be of benefit to Jackson Blue.

The Indian Springs central sewer system funding will save thousands of dollars for residents who hook into within a year of it becoming available in their particular area—it's being phased into the neighborhood

over a number of years.

Agriculture is identified as the primary contributor to the degradation of the spring because of the nutrients it introduces by way of fertilizer and pest control substances that make their way to the spring as surface waters seep into nature's underground water-storage layer known as the Floridan aquifer.

Septic tanks and their drain fields are identified as less-culpable contributors.

The state's mission and approach are not universally applauded.

Some in the Indian Springs subdivision continue to protest the coming central sewer system as an unnecessary intrusion and one that's too costly to be justified when the price is compared to the benefit.


Some mistrust the local government's motives in pursuing the project. Some believe the springs goal was simply used as an excuse to create a "cash cow" that will produce income for the government, since the county will be charging for the collection of the waste and the city of Marianna will benefit from its fees as the operator of the treatment facility where the waste will be sent.

Some, like Edd Sorenson, don't trust DEP or its numbers at all. Involved in measuring the contamination in Jackson Blue for many years, Sorenson was at first a willing partner. The cave diver installed contamination measuring tubes for the agency, for instance, but believes some of them were never uncapped and used. He

said he's been unable to get a satisfactory answer when he asks the state for proof that someone actually did measure. He said he believes the state is making up some of the data, adjusting numbers to artificially justify the Indian Springs sewer system. He outright accuses the agency of lying. And, he says, even if the numbers were correct, the state is spending too much money to address an aspect of the problem that—even using the numbers he doesn't trust—is so minuscule in the grand scheme of things that it's a foolish expenditure. That money, he believes, should be dedicated to helping on the agricultural side where the state's numbers show a far greater contribution to the problem.

On the agriculture side of the issue, some farmers complain that the numbers being used to assess the current health of the spring water can't really be accurate because of the age of the water. Because of nature's water flow and storage patterns, some of the data may be reflecting the pollution level in old water caused years ago when farming practices were less environmentally friendly than they are today. If that be the case, they say, some of the things they're being asked to do may be over-reaching and unnecessary because today's farming techniques are so far advanced than they were before.

Those attending the meeting Wednesday had a chance to air those and other concerns, and ask questions about the mis-

sion following Hansen's presentation.

The Florida Department of Agriculture, the state's Department of Environmental Protection, the Florida Department of Health and Northwest Florida Water Management District sent personnel to man the information points so that people could engage in one-on-one conversations about their specific concerns.

Cattleman Karl Kressman, for instance, wanted to know how the state intends to monitor compliance with the best management practices that agriculturists like himself have signed on for. The state says self-reported data will be used as one measure.

There aren't enough field officers to visit every farmer in the basin, the state acknowledges, and there will be some reliance on honesty. Although site visits will occur when possible, farmers will generally be given credit as they report their compliance and that credit will be assigned a numeric value. Those will be plugged into the equation as the state calculates progress toward the overall goal.

It's lofty: Within 20 years it wants to see numbers that show Jackson Blue is once again an unimpaired body of water as tested in the 1950s. The management plan will be revisited each five years and adjustments will be made based on the incremental progress made. New strategies could be added as technological advances come along, like the innovative irrigation methods possible now that weren't dreamed of decades ago.

# Labs still lead but French bulldogs leap in popularity

NEW YORK — Americans still love Labrador retrievers, but the nation's flirtation with French bulldogs has reached new heights.

Labs remain the country's most popular purebred dog for a 27th year, while German shepherds and golden retrievers have hung onto the second and third spots in new American Kennel Club rankings released Wednesday.

But Frenchies hit a highest-ever No. 4, and German shorthaired pointers cracked the top 10 for the first time.

### ♦♦♦ The rest of the Top 10

The bulldog is fifth, after notching a record No. 4 ranking last year. Sixth through 10th are the beagle, the poodle, the Rottweiler, the Yorkshire terrier and the German shorthaired pointer.

Initially bred for hunting, the handsome, athletic "GSP" is increasingly visible as a bomb-sniffing dog and in agility and other canine sports. A GSP also won the prestigious Westminster Kennel Club dog show in 2016.

"They're a dog that will do anything you want, except lay around," says Jeffrey Drogin, a longtime owner in New York.

The versatile, sociable Lab has had the longest-ever reign as top dog. It broke the record in 2013.

But you can't beat the beagle for consistency. It's the only breed to make the top 10 for every decade since the AKC's 1884 founding.

### ♦♦♦ The Frenchie surge

The French bulldog has bolted from 76th to fourth

in just 20 years. It previously peaked at sixth in the 1910s and again in 2015-2016.

Frenchie aficionados appreciate the interest but worry that it's drawing unscrupulous breeders and under-informed owners.

"It scares me that because it's popular, everybody wants it. But not every family is right for a French bulldog," says Kerry Boyd, a Natick, Massachusetts-based dog handler who breeds Frenchies.

The downsized bulldogs with the pointed ears and funny expressions have become favorites of city dwellers who value compact, relatively quiet dogs.

They've enjoyed exposure from movies, ads and celebrity owners. The late Carrie Fisher's Frenchie even inspired an alien creature in last year's "Star Wars: The Last Jedi."

Then the breed made headlines this month when a Frenchie puppy died after a flight attendant forced it into an overhead bin.

The death stirred discussion of breathing problems in French bulldogs and other short-snout breeds (though no pets belong in overhead compartments).

Flat-faced dogs can be prone to overheating and sometimes need nasal or palate surgery.

Frenchies and bulldogs also can be susceptible to certain spinal and eye problems. They are often born by cesarean section because of their big heads.

Given all that, New York's then-newsweekly *The Village Voice* devoted a 2015 cover to French bulldogs and urged: "Don't Buy This Dog."

Newton, Massachusetts-based veterinarian Dr. John de Jong sees Frenchies' problems

firsthand, but he notes that other breeds are prone to conditions of their own.

"I would say to anybody purchasing a breed of any kind: Do their homework," says de Jong, president-elect of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

### ♦♦♦ Other movers

The Siberian husky and Australian shepherd have jumped into the top 20 in the last decade. The Chihuahua, pug and Maltese have tumbled out.

### ♦♦♦ The rarest breed

It's the Norwegian lundehund, a six-toed, unusually flexible dog that historically hunted cliff-dwelling puffins.

Doodles, mixes and the big picture

The rankings reflect puppies and other dogs newly registered in 2017. The AKC, the nation's oldest purebred dog registry, doesn't release raw numbers of dogs.

The club doesn't chart such popular hybrids as Labradoodles and puggles, nor other mixed-breed dogs. However, they can register as AKC "canine partners" for dog sports.

Overall, the AVMA estimates there are about 70 million pet dogs nationwide (and over 74 million pet cats.)

### ♦♦♦ The debate

Whatever the rankings, animal-rights activists say purebred fads drive puppy mills, consign other dogs to shelters and prioritize

looks over health.

"The aesthetic standards of the AKC can leave dogs crippled and in near-constant pain," People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals wrote to the club this month.

Breeders such as Boyd

say they spend thousands of dollars on testing to propagate healthy dogs. The AKC argues that breeding preserves specific traits that can help police pick K-9s or households choose suitable pets.

Whether purebred or mixed breed, "the most important thing is that you love the dog that's yours and that you responsibly own it and care for it," says AKC spokeswoman Gina DiNardo.

## 'Genuine leather?' 'Real wood?' How to read furniture labels

Americans spend billions of dollars a year on furniture, but they're often not getting what they paid for. A big part of the problem is misleading labels, experts say.

Terms like "genuine leather" and "real wood," which seem straightforward enough, can be industry code-words for composite materials.

And once items arrive on your doorstep, furniture — unlike most other consumer goods — is often too cumbersome to return. It's also the type of product that people buy infrequently, and so they might be unsure what to look for.

"The language that companies sometimes use to sell their furniture is so funny and misleading that even I was duped by an online ad into thinking I was getting something made of solid wood," says Jen Levin, who owns the Maine-based Chilton Furniture Co. with her husband, Jared. They specialize in Shaker-style wood furniture.

"I am extremely particular about wood, and my husband laughed his head off when he learned I'd been fooled into buying furniture made of some kind of composite. And guess what? It would have been such a pain to return the chairs that I ended up keeping them," she says. "It's embarrassing to admit."

"The minute I pulled them out of the box I knew they were wrong. They were too lightweight, and if you look at where the chair leg meets the seat, there was a little space where the so-called 'wood grain' stopped and the leg

was just a pulpy white."

Levin and other furniture experts advise consumers to ask questions about what they're buying. The term "top-grain leather" indicates a higher quality product than "bonded" or "genuine" leather. "Solid wood," or better yet a specific type and quality of solid wood, indicates higher quality than "real wood" or, for example, "cherry colored wood," terms often used to misrepresent lower-quality wood furniture.

"The difference is truly in the details," says Tracy Paccione, senior vice president of merchandising for Ethan Allen furniture. But, she says, "there are some things you can look for to distinguish high-quality furniture from the rest."

### ♦♦♦ Wood

"We recommend looking

for quality construction details, such as dovetailed drawer corners, mortise-and-tenon joinery on furniture tops and rails, and floating anti-warp cleats on dining table tops and headboards," Paccione says. "Intricate wood carvings or hand-applied accents can only be achieved with great attention and skill. They are good indicators that the piece was made with care."

### ♦♦♦ Leather

When looking for leather furniture, ask if the piece is fully upholstered in genuine leather, Paccione says. Some upholstered leather pieces may be vinyl-matched, meaning they are partly upholstered in a vinyl that matches the leather. Paccione says Ethan Allen "only uses top-grain and

full-grain leather for its upholstered furniture pieces."

Know your leather lingo:

"Bonded leather" is a material that has been reprocessed from many leather pieces, which typically have been ground up, reconstituted and

glued together into a sheet. It is typically less resilient than hide, and is more likely to crack and peel.

"Genuine leather" is made from a hide, but the term doesn't necessarily mean it is well made. Bonded leather that contains only hide parts can be marketed as genuine leather.

"Top-grain leather" comes from the most durable part of the hide. It is lightly sanded or buffed to minimize natural markings and is often thicker and more durable.

### ♦♦♦ Fabric

When choosing upholstery, think about your lifestyle, Paccione says.

"Does it need to withstand pets and the kids on a sofa, or is it being used for an accent piece in the bedroom? Look for details about the fabric's wearability, or consider high-performance fabrics

that are specially treated with protective finishes," she says.


### ♦♦♦ Joinery

Joinery can be a tip-off to the quality and longevity of a piece of furniture. "Look for a smooth glide when operating the drawer, and be sure it doesn't tilt down and fall or pit when pulled out entirely," Paccione says.

Both she and Levin say features to look for include: dovetail joinery on all four drawer corners, dovetail guides and anti-tip rails to prevent the drawer from tilting downward when it's pulled out, and thicker drawer sides and back.

"Wood-on-wood joinery is top of the line," Levin says. "In the long run, metal will loosen in wood, and nothing is really going to fix that. ... but with wood-on-wood joinery, the joint becomes stronger over time."

"Details like that are important to look for because looks and description can be deceiving," Levin says.



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# For live 'Jesus Christ Superstar,' NBC turns to a Legend

NEW YORK — Most Easter Sundays, you can find John Legend at home, helping cook a big dinner for family and friends. Except this Easter. He'll be a little busy — being Jesus Christ in front of millions.

Legend leads a cast that includes Sara Bareilles and Alice Cooper in a live NBC version of the rock opera "Jesus Christ Superstar" by Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice.

It will be the latest addition to the prime-time lineup of live TV musical remakes that kicked off five years ago with "The Sound of Music" and includes "Peter Pan," "Grease," "The Wiz" and "Hairspray." While the shows often air at Christmas, this time it made sense for an Easter broadcast of the 47-year-old musical.

"It's an iconic show. It's meant a lot to a lot of people for a long time," Legend said. "You want people who are fans of it already to be excited by our rendition. But then also we want to attract new people to the show, too."

The musical explores the caustic intersection of politics and showbiz, using a pulsating guitar- and organ-driven score that includes "I Don't Know How to Love Him," "Everything's Alright" and "Superstar."

Live TV musicals have become progressively more complex, with the use of cars and multiple locations, sometimes outdoors. But "Jesus Christ Superstar" will be more stripped down, an attempt to capture a concert vibe. It will be staged inside an armory in Brooklyn with about 12 cameras.

The actors will be augmented by a 32-piece band

— including a mobile, all-woman string quartet — and 1,500 people will be in the audience, surrounding the action and interacting sometimes with the performers. The stage will be just 2 feet above a mosh pit.

"I'm so excited that we have a live audience to work with and to feel the energy of in the room because I think, as someone who's a concert performer and now in the theater, that's the missing link so much of the time," said Bareilles, who plays Mary Magdalene.

Director David Leveaux

is promising this version of the musical to be "very unpackaged, not neat, quite raw." The rest of the cast includes Brandon Victor Dixon as Judas, Cooper as King Herod and Norm Lewis as Caiaphas.

Costume designer Paul Tazewell, who dressed the "Hamilton" cast, has picked flowing tunics and modern, sexy silhouettes. Choreographer Camille A. Brown will mix traditional social dances with hip-hop. New Orleans-style second-line dancing and The Charleston.

Leveaux, who in a 2013 Broadway revival of "Ro-

meo and Juliet" put Orlando Bloom on a motorcycle with a set that spit fire, will use real flames and pyrotechnics for "Superstar." He'll also employ some low-tech tricks, like a white scarf that can have multiple uses.

"This is live. So you create ingredients that can combust because it's live," said Marc Platt, an executive producer. "In this instance, we have a live audience and an interactive concert, and live musicians — never done before. So we're not daunted by it. We welcome what's live and what's risky about

it because that's what's exciting."

Legend, who has won a Grammy, Tony and Oscar, knows he is just an Emmy away from winning the coveted EGOT, but he isn't planning that his portrayal of Jesus will add to his trophy haul. He made his acting debut in 2016's "La La Land."

"I have no presumptions about the idea that I'll be considered an award-winning actor in my second role as an actor," he said, laughing. "But I'm aware of the gap in my EGOT."

The annual live broadcasts have gradually dipped in viewership, with

the lowest being "A Christmas Story Live" last Christmas that attracted 4.5 million viewers — but they've become popular fodder for hate-tweeting.

"It's part of it. You just kind of do the best you can," said executive producer Neil Meron, who helped start the live TV trend with "The Sound of Music" broadcast in 2013. "They'll rip it apart, they'll praise it."

Leveaux has even coined a new term for the potential online hating this time, one that combines Twitter with crucifixion. He calls it death by "twitterfixon."

## Chrissy Metz calls focus on her stepdad's abuse 'clickbait'

NEW YORK — Chrissy Metz calls news stories focusing on abusive behavior by her stepfather while growing up mere "clickbait."

Metz is one of the stars of NBC's hit series "This Is Us" and has a new book out called "This Is Me" where she writes about her life, including growing up with a stepfather who sometimes would hit her and was critical of her weight.

"What they fail to leave out is that we have a relationship. I have forgiven him, he's apologized and I respect him and he was more of a father to me than my biological father."

Metz says the attention has caused tension in her family.

"I felt so many emotions about it and I still do because my sisters are getting involved... I want him to know that that was never my intention."

Her purpose, she says, is to share how she got to where she is.

"I didn't realize that all of these life lessons, these experiences were setting me up for where I'm at today and that's what I believe the universe does for us. And so by me going

through these experiences, I feel like I'm stronger and I can be an advocate for somebody who's gone through these things or been discriminated against."

Despite the fallout of sharing her family drama with the public, Metz believes it's important to be honest.

"I (spoke out) for myself but also, in turn, it's helping a lot of people and that's the cherry on top," she said.

Her stepfather has publicly denied her claims, which Metz says she understands. "It is so hard to accept responsibility for what you've done," said Metz.

Metz recently discussed with The Associated Press her "This Is Us" character, being a struggling actress and her future goals.

Q: Your character, Kate, on "This Is Us" has resonated with so many who can relate to her insecurities,

mother issues and bond with her dad. Do people think you are Kate?

**Metz:** Oh yeah. People think I'm Kate all the time. There are people who just run up and kiss me and I'm like, 'Oh, hi.' It takes some getting used to. It's funny because that's what they know me as. It's great that they're invested.

**Q:** What was life like for you when you got the role on "This Is Us"?

**Metz:** These cities (like LA and New York) are expensive to live in and to be an actress with classes and headshots, forget about it. It was always paycheck to paycheck. I was on unemployment for some time... When I booked the role, I was in between paychecks and didn't even have enough gas to get to the audition. I was living with a friend. (I had) 81 cents in my bank account.

**Q:** Why be so honest about your ups and downs?

**Metz:** I told my publicist when I started this whole thing, 'If I can't be who I am, I can't do this.' I can pretend and play another character on television but I can't be that in real life. It's too much. I want

to be authentically myself and honest. Sometimes it's probably to a fault but it is what it is. I want people to know that, yes, I have a great job and it looks very glamorous but I'm not any different. I just have a different job.

**Q:** You write about confidence struggles in your book. Where are you now with your self-esteem?

**Metz:** It took me awhile to cultivate a belief in myself and I'm still learning that. There are times I get on the set and I'm like, 'Am I gonna get fired today? I don't think I'm a good actress.' Sometimes it's just where you're at mentally and you've got to recalibrate.

**Q:** You've got the TV show and a book. What's on your list next, career-wise?

**Metz:** I'm the lead of a movie that begins shooting in April. It's based on a true story called "The Impossible Movie." I'm over the moon about that. Eventually I'd love to produce and maybe write an episode of "This Is Us." Maybe do some music and write music. Just help people who I believe in.

## Two Bay County men arrested in connection with thefts

The Bay County Sheriff's Office reports the arrest of two men in connection to seven theft and burglary cases.

The investigation continues into the activities of the two men arrested and additional charges are expected, officials said this week.

On Feb. 15, a complaint was filed that an 80-gallon air compressor and some copper wiring were stolen from a construction site on 24th Street in Lynn Haven. BCSO deputies arrived and, during a canvas of the neighborhood, contact was made with a man

living next door to the construction site. Charles Casey Locke spoke with deputies and told them that he had noticed that someone had stolen

some of his tools that day, too. Investigators later determined this was untrue, officials said.

The Lynn Haven Police Department later arrested Locke for stealing copper wire from numerous construction sites. BCSO Criminal investigators

spoke with Locke to determine if he was responsible for several similar cases they were working.

Investigators say Locke made several inconsistent statements during his interview, and that they found a large quantity of stripped wire insulation on Locke's property.

Subsequent investigation led authorities to believe that an acquaintance of Locke's named Roger McCann was working with

Locke as a partner and that together they were responsible for numerous thefts and burglaries in the Lynn Haven area where copper wire was taken. The men had previously met when they worked together at a construction company in Bay County, officials said. Investigators made contact with McCann and obtained consent to search his residence. Authorities say they found marijuana and drug paraphernalia there.

Working with the Lynn Haven Police Department, investigators also found tools reported stolen from

Locke's previous employer in a closed container in his truck.

Locke and McCann were arrested and charged with the original burglary on 24th Street, and six other cases, including a criminal mischief case involving a bulldozer in Southport with about \$100,000 in damages reported. When arrested, officials allege, Locke had methamphetamine on his person.

Roger McCann, 41, of 6911 Hayes Road, Panama City, was charged with grand theft, three counts of dealing in stolen

property, two counts of false verification of ownership, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, and criminal mischief.

## Sneads man charged with attempted murder

A Sneads man has been charged with attempted murder after an altercation on Friday that left the other individual in the fight with a gunshot wound to his leg. Both involved were charged with criminal offenses after the incident.

According to Sneads Police Chief Burt McAlpin, Daniell Durand Mathis, 35, is charged with attempted murder as well as with being a felon in possession of a firearm.

handgun originally in Tollar's possession had fallen to the ground and that Mathis picked it up and fired shots at Tollar.

Mathis was found, charged and taken to jail.

Tollar, also of Sneads, was released from the hospital and arrested on a charge of being a felon in possession of a firearm.

The gun used in the incident has been recovered, authorities say. It had been tossed into a creek off County Road 286, south of Sneads.

## Shooting suspect's brother pleads no contest to trespassing

**FORT LAUDERDALE** — The brother of the suspected Florida high school gunman pleaded no contest Thursday to trespassing on the campus where the deadly rampage occurred and was later released from jail after being sentenced to time served and six months of probation.

Circuit Judge Melinda Kirsch Brown also ordered Zachary Cruz, 18, to enroll in therapy, wear an ankle monitor and said he cannot possess firearms or ammunition. The judge also said Cruz must be tested to make sure he isn't consuming drugs or alcohol and must stay at least 1 mile from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School during probation. He can never visit the school again and must not contact any victims or their families.


He was arrested March 19 and held on \$500,000 bond after police found him skateboarding at Stoneman Douglas after school, 33 days after his 19-year-old brother, Nikolas Cruz, is accused

of killing 17 students and staff members and was wounded 17 others during a Valentine's Day shooting. Broward sheriff's deputies say school officials had told him not to come on campus, but his attorney, Joseph Kimok, denied that.

His arrest created concern in the Stoneman Douglas community and caused Florida Gov. Rick Scott to order highway patrol troopers on campus to bolster already heightened security provided by the sheriff's office.

Zachary Cruz had spent the last 10 days in custody after his extraordinary bond was ordered by a different judge. The typical bond in Broward County for trespassing, a second-degree misdemeanor, is \$25.

But this was not a typical trespassing case. Cruz, shackled at the wrists and ankles and wearing a tan prison jumpsuit, was led into court by six deputies Thursday as numerous reporters and TV cameras

looked on. Prosecutor Sarahnell Murphy announced a plea deal had been reached, the conditions were read and the judge asked if he understood.

"Yes, ma'am." After the judge accepted his plea and pronounced sentence, Kimok read an apology from Cruz, saying he was sorry if he scared anyone by visiting the school.

"Zachary has experienced, and continues to experience, a trauma unlike anything any of us could imagine," Kimok told the judge.

He pointed out that the Cruzes' mother died in November, forcing him to live with a guardian miles away. "Then in February, the only family member he had left, his brother, murdered 17 people in cold blood." That put Zachary Cruz's history, which has included counseling and calls about him to police, on national display, Kimok said.

The brothers shared the same biological mother but had different fathers. Both were adopted at very young ages by Roger and Lynda Cruz. Lynda Cruz died in November and their father died some years earlier.

Murphy, the prosecutor, left court without comment.

The attorneys for Nikolas Cruz have admitted he committed the shooting and have said he would plead guilty in exchange for a life sentence. Prosecutors have said they will seek the death penalty.

ORLANDO — A Florida police officer who fired into a house after being sent to a wrong address will not have to serve any jail time.


Local media reports that Ocoee officer Carlos Anglero was sentenced Thursday to three years of probation and 100 hours

## Phone apps push people to take their pills

**SEATTLE** — Take two tablets and a selfie? Your doctor's orders may one day include a smartphone video to make sure you took your medicine.

Smartphone apps that monitor pill-taking are now available, and researchers are testing how well they work when medication matters. Experts praise the efficiency, but some say the technology raises privacy and data security concerns.

Selfie medicine works like this: Open an app on your phone, show your pills, put them in your mouth and swallow. Don't forget to show your empty mouth to the camera to prove today's dose is on its way. Then upload the video proof to the clinic.

Fans say the technology addresses a big problem: About half of drugs for chronic conditions aren't taken as prescribed because of cost, side effects or patient forgetfulness.

With treatment for opioid addiction, a skipped dose can mean a dangerous relapse. The National Institute on Drug Abuse is funding research to tailor a smartphone app for those patients and see if they'll use it.

"If we can keep patients engaged, we can keep them in

treatment longer," said lead researcher Dr. Judith Tsui of the University of Washington School of Medicine in Seattle.

The next phase of her research will compare a group of patients who use the monitoring app called emocha (ee-MOH-kuh) with those who don't to see if there's a difference.

At one Tennessee treatment center, some patients with opioid addiction are already using the app to upload selfies of their daily dose and answer questions about how they're doing.

"Every time they sign on, it allows us to capture data. Are they having cravings? Suicidal tendencies?" said Scott Olson, CEO of Dallas-based Pathway Healthcare, which is trying the app at its Jackson, Tennessee, site.

"Maybe a phone call from a counselor might make the difference between staying clean and a relapse."

Olson thinks insurers will pay for the service with more evidence. For monitoring tuberculosis patients, health departments pay roughly \$35 to \$50 per patient each month for systems that include encrypted data storage. A small health department might pay as little as \$500 a month.

The idea of watching someone take their medicine — called

directly observed therapy or DOT — has roots in tuberculosis where one person's forgetfulness can be serious for everyone. If patients don't take all their antibiotics, their infectious TB germs can get stronger, developing drug resistance and endangering the broader community.

But taking a handful of pills daily for up to a year is difficult, so public health departments traditionally sent workers to people's homes and workplaces to watch them take their doses. Today, many TB patients prefer remote monitoring. Nurses like it too.

Nurse Peggy Cooley has used Skype for years to chat live with patients taking TB medicine.

"We can accomplish in a two-minute phone call something that might have taken an hour to do and most of that hour was in the car," said Cooley, who works for the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department in Washington state.

The new uploaded selfies don't need an appointment. They are a daily routine for many tuberculosis patients in Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Houston, where savings on mileage and worker time amounted to \$100,000 in a recent year.

In Boston, Albuquerque and five other cities, researchers are

studying whether the technology works for hepatitis C, a blood-borne virus that's surging among a new generation of injection drug users. New drugs for hepatitis C can cure, but they're expensive — \$75,000 for a 12-week course of treatment — so insurers want to make sure patients take them.

"I think it holds a lot of promise," said researcher Dr. Alain Litwin of University of South Carolina School of Medicine, who's testing whether patients do better when someone watches them take their pills.

What's next? An insurer in Maryland plans to use the technology in diabetes and high blood pressure to make sure Medicare and Medicaid patients take their medicine. Startups selling the apps say they could be used by faraway adult children monitoring an elderly parent's daily pill-taking.

Experts worry about privacy, data security and penalties for poor pill-taking.

"That's the biggest ick factor," said Carolyn Neuhaus, a medical ethicist at the Hastings Center in New York. "You can imagine a program where benefits are tied to compliance and the insurer says, 'We won't pay for medication anymore unless you're tak-

ing it correctly.'"

Globally, the rapid spread of smartphones creates an opportunity to eradicate TB, say the app developers.

But eliminating TB may take simpler, cheaper technologies that can be scaled for millions of cases, said Dr. Daniel Chin, who leads TB efforts for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

The group supports research in China and India on two home-grown technologies. China's tool, about the size of a child's shoebox, reminds patients to take their pills and saves data for review. In India, the government favors a blister pill pack printed with phone numbers; a patient punches out a daily pill, then calls the revealed number.

Worldwide, TB kills more than 1.6 million people annually, even though most deaths are preventable with treatment.

"If we are going to eliminate the disease, we need technology," said Dr. Richard Garfein of the University of California, San Diego School of Medicine, who helped develop one of the smartphone apps, SureAdhere.

## Lawsuit challenges FDA delay of e-cigarette review

**WASHINGTON** — Several anti-smoking groups are suing the Food and Drug Administration over a decision by Trump administration officials to delay the review of e-cigarettes.

The lawsuit filed Tuesday in federal court argues that the FDA didn't follow proper requirements last year when it decided to push back the deadline for makers of e-cigarettes to submit their products for review. The groups say the delay poses a threat to children's health.

"The FDA offered no meaningful justification for ripping a hole in the statutory framework," according to the lawsuit filed by the American Heart Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids and others.

An FDA spokesman declined to comment.

E-cigarettes are vapor-emitting devices that have grown into a \$4-billion

FDA would soon take action against "products that are being marketed in kid-appealing ways," including e-cigarettes.

But he also emphasized that he doesn't want to eliminate e-cigarettes and other alternative products might have a role in steering adult smokers away from cigarettes.

"What we don't want to do is snuff out the potential for that innovation before we really have the opportunity to properly evaluate it," Gottlieb said.

The FDA is in the process of rolling out a sweeping anti-smoking designed to make it easier for smokers to quit by cutting the nicotine levels in cigarettes.

As part of that plan, Gottlieb has suggested some smokers could be directed toward alternative products that deliver nicotine without the carcinogens of burning tobacco. To date, the FDA has not granted any company permission to market its product as "reduced-risk" compared to traditional tobacco.

dollar industry in the U.S. despite little research on their long-term effects, including whether they are helpful in helping smokers quit cigarettes.

Health advocates have worried about the popularity of vaping products among kids and the potential impact on adult smoking rates in the future. A government-commissioned report in January found "substantial evidence" that young people who use e-cigarettes are more likely to try cigarettes. About 10 percent of high school students report using vaping products, according to the latest federal figures.

The FDA gained author-

ity to regulate e-cigarettes in 2016 after years of pushback from the industry. Under regulations developed by the Obama administration, manufacturers were supposed to submit their products for review by August. But last year FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb said he would delay the deadline until 2022. He

said both the agency and industry needed more time to prepare.

The decision was criti-

cized by anti-smoking groups who have argued that some e-cigarette makers target kids with candy and fruit flavors.

Gottlieb told the Associated Press in an interview earlier this month that the

# Judge hints he may not allow Cosby quaalude testimony

NORRISTOWN, Pa. — The judge in Bill Cosby's sexual assault retrial hinted Friday that he could keep jurors from hearing the comedian's prior testimony about giving quaaludes to women before sex, a potential blow to the prosecution's plans to portray him as a serial predator.

Judge Steven O'Neill said at a pretrial hearing that he won't rule on the testimony until it's brought up at the retrial, which is scheduled to begin April 9 in suburban Philadelphia.

"This defendant is not on trial for what he said in his deposition," O'Neill said.

Jury selection is scheduled to begin Monday as the 80-year-old Cosby faces charges he drugged and molested former Temple University athletics administrator Andrea Constand at his suburban Philadelphia home in 2004.

The quaalude testimony came from a deposition that was part of Constand's civil suit against Cosby. It

was included in the first trial that ended with a hung jury and prosecutors contend it is more evidence of his prior bad acts.

Cosby admitted in the testimony he gave quaaludes to a 19-year-old before having sex in the 1970s, but his lawyers say it's irrelevant to the trial because there's no evidence he gave his accuser the drug.

"The '70s isn't relevant in this case," said defense

lawyer Becky James, calling quaaludes use then widespread. "It was not to assault them. It was not to make them incapacitated. It was never with the purpose or intent of having sex with unconsenting women."

District Attorney Kevin Steele said the testimony, along with the testimony of up to five additional accusers, bolsters their plan to portray Cosby as a

serial predator. Those women weren't allowed to testify at the first trial.

Prosecutors say they want O'Neill to allow the drug testimony, because otherwise they'd only be able to use it to cross-examine Cosby if he testifies. Cosby did not testify in the first trial.

Constand says Cosby gave her three blue pills. His lawyers say quaaludes never came in that color.

The comedian contends he gave her the over-the-counter antihistamine Benadryl.

Assistant District Attorney Stewart Ryan argued Cosby's deposition testimony is important because it shows he had an awareness of the effects that central nervous system depressants, such as quaaludes, have on women, and it shows his admitted intent for using such drugs.

While O'Neill dealt Cosby's lawyers a blow by allowing the testimony from additional accusers, Cosby's lawyers are counting on him to make rulings critical to their plan to portray the accuser as a greedy liar who framed the comedian.

O'Neill said he will rule Friday on whether the defense can call a witness who claims Constand spoke about falsely accusing a celebrity before going to police.

The judge also has to decide how much jurors will hear about Cosby's financial settlement with Constand. His lawyers say the amount will show "just how

greedy" she was.

Prosecutors said the theory that Constand wanted to set Cosby up is undermined by his testimony in a 2005 deposition that she only visited his home when invited and that he gave her pills without her asking.

Cosby's lawyers also argued in court papers Friday that the retrial should be postponed if prosecutors are allowed to bring in more witnesses in a bid to bolster the accounts of the five additional accusers.

They argued that the 14 proposed supporting witnesses, including celebrity doctor Drew Pinsky and book publisher Judith Regan, are irrelevant and would only further confuse and distract the jury.

O'Neill said he'll decide on the supporting witnesses one-by-one during the trial. Prosecutors say they'll be used in a limited role to describe the accusers' demeanor after the alleged assaults and buttress criticism of them for failing to go to the authorities in a timely fashion.

## Heaven sent: Chat with Sister Jean brightens up men's Final Four

SAN ANTONIO — Who needs "One Shining Moment" when you've got Sister Jean?

The 98-year-old nun who has become the face of this most-inspiring NCAA Tournament held court on Good Friday in one of the best-attended news conferences ever held at the Final Four.

Hundreds of reporters and cameramen jammed in, elbow-to-elbow, in an interview room that would normally draw two dozen journalists for a player.

"I walked by, and I thought it looked like Tom Brady at the Super Bowl," Loyola-Chicago coach Porter Moser said.

It was more monumental than that.

This was the No. 1 fan of Moser and the Ramblers — the 11th-seeded team whose magical, miraculous run to the cusp of the title would've made for great theater, even without a nun.

Sister Jean Dolores-Schmidt has added a completely new, unexpected and, yes, wonderful twist to the proceedings. Her 15-minute Q&A on the eve of Loyola's game against Michigan illustrated precisely why.

She fielded questions about everything from whether God cares about basketball — "more the NCAA than the NBA" — some light trash talk with former Michigan star Jalen Rose's 100-year-old grandma — "Somebody said, 'Maybe you need a pair of boxing gloves' and I said, 'Well, we'll see what happens'" — and what it takes to really have your prayer heard — "God always hears, but maybe He thinks it's better for us to do the 'L' instead of the 'W,' and we have to accept that."

A lot has changed, Sister Jean says, since the Ramblers last made history — back in 1963 when they completed an equally unexpected run by knocking off Cincinnati for the national championship.

"I watched it on a little 11-inch black-and-white TV, and the game was (tape) delayed," she said. "And then everybody got out of the house and walked down the line on Sheridan Road, men and women together."

Sister Jean has been on a whirlwind since the Ramblers started this un-

expected return to the college basketball promised land.

That this is all happening on Easter weekend makes it that much more hectic. But, as she has shown time and again over the past three weeks, sports and religion really can mix, so long as you keep everything in perspective.

"We're having a university Mass together on Easter Sunday," she said. "You know, I said Easter Sunday because we hope to stay, and we're confident enough we will."

Sister Jean is far from the only Catholic going for glory at this Final Four. On the other side of the bracket, the Catholic school, Villanova, is represented by Rev. Rob Hagan — aka Father Rob — who told The Associated Press the matchup is "kind of like fighting with your brothers and sisters. We're all in the same family."

Michigan coach John Beilein used a question posed to him about Sister Jean to remind folks that he, like the Loyola-Chicago players, is a product of a Jesuit education.

"And I had a priest, not even at my own parish, stop Mass and say, 'They have Sister Jean, you have everybody here praying for you,'" Beilein said. "It's been a lot of fun and it's great."

Not that this mix of sports and religion is particularly groundbreaking. Players thank God all the time, and more often than not, their prayers and thanks go largely ignored by the mainstream media and the fans.

But college basketball is going through some rough times these days, filled with dirty coaches and agents, payoffs to players and an FBI investigation that has unmasked corruption in many corners of the game.

Change is coming.

Sister Jean's presence has reminded everyone that the game is about more than slam dunks, busted brackets, big money and the glossy "One Shining Moment" video that wraps things up at the end.

"It's just cool that everybody in the world knows who she is now, and they're starting to get to see how cool she is, and how amazing she is," Ramblers guard Clayton Custer said.


Seeded No. 14, Isner is

## Prepare for a 3-point heavy Final Four

**SAN ANTONIO**—These days, the Final Four is all about the 3s.

Gone are the days when the long-range shot was the low-percentage bet in college basketball compared with layups and midrange jumper. Now—much like its record usage in the NBA—it's an indispensable piece of the arsenal for any team with serious hopes of winning the national championship.

Look no further than the last four teams at the Alamodome still contending for the NCAA title. Villanova, Kansas, Michigan and Loyola-Chicago all can knock down 3s at high rates and won't hesitate to launch them—which could mean a big leap from past Final Fours when 3s weren't quite so plentiful.

"It's a huge part of our offense, and the other teams as well," said the Wolverines' Moe Wagner, a 6-foot-11 forward who shoots just shy of 40 percent from behind the arc. "It's really a big part of college basketball to be honest with you. There are no good teams out there anymore that can't shoot."

The 3-point production jumps out in each team's stats:

» Villanova (34-4) shoots 40 percent from behind the arc and has made 436 3s, putting the Wildcats six away from matching the NCAA Division I record set by VMI in 2007 entering Saturday's national semifinal against fellow 1-seed Kansas.

» The Jayhawks (31-7) rank 11th nationally in 3-point percentage (.403) with an unusually guard-

heavy lineup.

» Michigan (32-7) has five players shooting at least 37 percent from behind the arc.

» Loyola-Chicago (32-5) averages the fewest of the four (7.5) but has made 30 of 72 (.417) attempts in four NCAA games.

And don't forget, the only reason Loyola-Chicago and Michigan are even meeting in Saturday's first semifinal is because both made a miss-and-go-home 3 in the tournament.

The Ramblers got one just before the buzzer from Donte Ingram to beat Miami in the first round, while the Wolverines needed Jordan Poole to beat the horn to survive against Houston in the second.

Only one team—Oklahoma in 2016—had averaged at least nine made 3s per game in the past eight Final Fours, but there are three this weekend alone: Villanova at 11.5, Kansas at 10.1 and Michigan at 9.0.

There was a common refrain among players Friday about their use of the 3s.

"We just try to lean on the best shot," said Loyola-Chicago freshman Lucas Williamson, who is shooting 42 percent on 3s.

"We're not really banking on just winning the game by 3s."

Still, it's easy to see where some of that influence is coming from: the NBA.

As the quartet bring the potential for a 3-heavy weekend on college basketball's biggest stage, the NBA was set Friday night to set a league-wide record for made 3s for the sixth straight season. And

the Golden State Warriors have spent the past three-plus seasons putting on a small-ball show full of 3-point barrages, winning two championships and playing for a third.

Now recruits watch Stephen Curry and James Harden repeatedly launching 3s and arrive in college looking to emulate that free-flowing style that is only growing in popularity. And in the college game, 3s are easier because the line is a good 3 feet closer to the basket than in the pros (though Associated Press All-American Devonte' Graham of Kansas spent time during Friday's open practice shooting corner 3s from out of bounds).

The influence of the pro game isn't lost on coaches. "We all learn from those guys; they're the best—players and coaches," Villanova coach Jay Wright said. "And then I think the rules ... the emphasis on freedom of movement, lack of physicality is making that the evolution of the game—skill, perimeter shooting."

"And that's where I think this is going to continue to be a big part of the game. And then in college we all look and see who gets to the Final Four and what they're doing. And a lot of us emulate that."

Sometimes it's borne out of necessity—or in Kansas coach Bill Self's case, desperation.

The Jayhawks have long had inside-out post play to go with gritty defense. But this year's team didn't have a lot of size outside of 7-foot sophomore Udoka Azubuike, then lost 6-10 freshman Billy Preston to an NCAA eligibility

issue that ended with him signing with a professional team in Bosnia without playing a game for the Jayhawks.

Instead, the offense is built around Graham, Mississippi State transfer Malik Newman, Svi Mykhailiuk and Lagerald Vick in a strong backcourt.

The result? Kansas' 10.1 made 3s per game is easily the highest of Self's 15-year tenure.

"You've got to coach to your personnel and coach to your roster," Self said. "And with our situation, the only chance that we felt and certainly the best chance for us to have a good year would be to get guards to be tough enough to defend a big."

"And if you can do that and you can stretch and play around one guy that can score (inside), that's usually hard to guard."

## Up-and-coming trainer seeks a breakout in Florida

**HALLANDALE BEACH**—No trainers have sent more horses to the Kentucky Derby than D. Wayne Lukas and Todd Pletcher, which may bode well for Jonathan Thomas.

Lukas mentored Pletcher—a Hall of Famer teaching a sure-fire future Hall of Famer.

And then Pletcher mentored Thomas, who now finds himself in position for a breakout moment.

Thomas will send Catholic Boy out against eight other hopefuls in Saturday's \$1 million Florida Derby—trainer and horse are both seeking what would be the most significant result of their careers. A good showing over Gulfstream Park's dirt almost certainly would be enough to send them to the Kentucky Derby in five weeks.

"Listen, we're very one step one step at a time," said Thomas, explaining why he's hesitant to start talking about anything past the Florida Derby.

"This is an important race. It can almost solidify a horse's career as a stallion which is very important. One step at a time. I mean, this race is very important to us.... You can't get ahead of your horse. You really have to take it day by day."

Catholic Boy is the third choice in the morning line, with early odds of 7-2. The 9-5 favorite is Audible, the winner of the Grade 2 Holy Bull at Gulfstream eight weeks ago. Promises Fulfilled, who won the Fountain of Youth at Gulfstream, is the second choice at 3-1.

Audible is trained by Pletcher. Promises Fulfilled is trained by Dale Romans, another conditioner that Thomas worked under, albeit briefly.

"And you can't do it without the owners who support you. You know, I'm a spoke in a wheel with a lot of spokes. And ultimately you have to have the horse flesh, the athlete to compete at these levels. It's not lost on me what we're doing."

Pletcher and Lukas have both sent 48 horses to the Kentucky Derby. They've combined to win more than \$630 million in purses, prevailing in more than 9,300 races.

They are titans.

Thomas isn't anywhere near that yet. He has 32 victories as a trainer, with about \$1 million in purses. But Pletcher has long raved about his former protege, and it's easy to see what a win on Saturday could do for his career.

"He always exceeded expectations that we had," Pletcher said last year, when Thomas was just getting started on his own.

A win in the Florida Derby might even exceed Thomas' own expectations.

He's overcome plenty as a horseman, including a nasty fall as a steeplechase rider that left him with a broken back and briefly paralyzed. He fought back and now doesn't even reflect much on those days, with the lone reminder being occasional back pain when he gets out of bed in the morning before heading to the barn.

Now he's trying to win a race where his mentor is going to be favored. Thomas speaks only with reverence for Pletcher, but can't wait for Saturday.



## Clock ticking for Bowyer

**T**hrowback racetrack, throwback trophy, throwback locale — seems appropriate, doesn't it, that the winner was a throwback driver.

Clint Bowyer, who's about to turn 39 and has an even older persona, won Martinsville Speedway's STP 500 (even a throwback sponsor) in dominant fashion, sending yet another bulletin that the sport's old-guard drivers intend to hold ground against the wave of younger competitors.

Everybody gets to process that for an extra week, given NASCAR's traditional Easter break, then it's on to aerosensitive competition at the 1.5-mile Texas Motor Speedway before the tour comes back to grittier short-track racing at Bristol Motor Speedway on April 15 and Richmond Raceway on April 21.

Bowyer, whose once blossoming career had gone desert-dry with a 190-race losing streak, in one race restored himself to the conversation of drivers who could have an impressive season.

It was a veteran driver's tour de force. Bowyer started ninth, drove his Ford with restraint while other competitors charged to the front. Ryan Blaney, 15 years Bowyer's junior and one of those youngsters establishing himself as a rising star, led 145 laps and seemed to be in command during the middle of the race.

But it's the end of the race that counts. And that's when Bowyer got serious, gaining steadily on Blaney and passing him — without any trouble — to take the lead for the first time on Lap 285 of the 500.

Bowyer led all but one lap the rest of the way, winning by a little more than a second over Kyle Busch's Toyota.

Bowyer's win comes at a time when his four-car team, Stewart-Haas Racing, is

ascendant, winning four of the first six races this season. Besides Bowyer's return to victory lane, Kevin Harvick has racked up three wins this season. Kurt Busch is running well. And the team's newest member, Aric Almirola, is having more success than did the driver he replaced, Danica Patrick.

Nobody appreciates a win more than Bowyer.

In 2012, when he was 33, he seemed to have hit his stride. Driving for a second-tier team, he recorded three wins that season, one on a 1.5-mile track, one on a road course and one on a short track — Richmond Raceway.

He finished second in the championship standings that year, and the three victories gave him a total of eight. His career seemed about to take off.

But his momentum stalled the next season, and that September at a race in Richmond he got mired in controversy when he spun his car, apparently deliberately, to bring out a caution flag that helped one of his teammates qualify for the series playoffs.

NASCAR penalized the team and announced a zero-tolerance policy for any such action in the future. The multi-car team fell into disfavor with sponsors and struggled. Bowyer's losing streak set in, and his 2014-17 finishes in the championship standings were 19th, 16th, 27th and 18th.

It was easy to ask if he would ever win again, or even be a frequent contender to win. But this year, his second with Stewart-Haas, Bowyer appears to have solved his troubles. The win was his third top-10 finish

of 2018, and he has been consistently among the drivers with impressive lap times.

Martinsville has been holding Cup races since 1949, and for most of those years the winner's swag has been a splendid grandfather clock, among the most coveted trophies in the sport.

Bowyer, a Kansas native, has been racing machines with wheels since he was 5 years old. In victory lane, he asked for a beer, drank deeply and then waxed poetic about Martinsville's place in motorsports.

"I wanted to win this grandfather clock so bad," he said, recalling that he had finished in the top five at Martinsville five times before.

"It's such a cool place to be able to drive up through the countryside on a two-lane road and think about the race," Bowyer said, holding his 3-year-old son, Cash, in his arms. "I told my son this morning, I was like, 'Dammit, we've got to get our picture in victory lane.' He told me he wanted a checkered flag."


Ending the victory drought, he said, "is just a weight off the shoulders. It's been a long time. You start to question if you can get it done or not. To have it come at this place meant a lot."

So, now we'll see if some of that pre-2013 karma has returned for Bowyer. Racing is always in part about luck. With good luck, a good team can become a great team.

Bowyer could have one of those years — maybe two or three. He still has time.

But if he's going to have a run, the kind that makes him championship material again, he'd better not wait long. He's 39, after all, and very few drivers have great seasons into their mid-40s.

That grandfather clock is ticking.

## Sunday's son: 'Jesus Christ Superstar' gets Legend-ary treatment

In the late 1960s, musical theater was getting a complete makeover. For years, the genre did its best to avoid serious subjects, keeping joy and whimsy in the forefront. While it seemed for a time that interest in this form of theater was waning, a new breed of musical theater would resurrect the genre. Rock was woven into the pages of fresh, new takes on biblical narratives and, in 1970, "Jesus Christ Superstar" was born. On Sunday, April 1, NBC brings this legendary rock musical

to audiences across North America, when "Jesus Christ Superstar Live in Concert" takes over prime time.

Initially a concept album, "Jesus Christ Superstar" delves into the last days of Jesus Christ, with particular focus on the relationships between Jesus and some well-known biblical figures, including Judas, Mary Magdalene and King Herod. The show plays fast and loose with depictions of these figures, as the musical's creators, Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice, look to humanize them and make them relatable. The lines between God and man are blurred, with Je-

sus unafraid to confront modern-day social issues.

While the musical has no doubt been performed in countless high schools and independent theaters around the globe, its professional runs have been consistent since the concept album's creation, with more than 19 productions, including four on Broadway.

For NBC's live, prime-time adaptation, some major star power has been recruited. In the titular role of Jesus Christ is singer, songwriter and actor John Legend ("La La Land," 2016). Not only is Legend the star of the production, he is also co-producer. When asked by The

Paley Center for Media to express why he was intrigued by the opportunity, Legend's answer was amusingly simple: "Bottom line is, they offered me the chance to play Jesus Christ... I was like, let's do it."

While this is Legend's first leading role in a televised musical, it's not his first screen gig — he played the role of Keith in the multiple award-winning feature musical film "La La Land" in 2016. He also co-wrote and recorded a song with the film, "Start a Fire," enjoying a rare opportunity to contribute to a musical's score.

Joining Legend onstage — and on screen — is singer-songwriter Sara Bareilles as Mary Magdalene, a notable follower of Jesus, according to biblical records. Sadly, she was known less for her witnessing of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection and more so for her profession as a sex worker, a depiction not entirely present in the gospels or other biblical texts. Another key player in the musical, one well familiar with its story and lyrical content, is legendary rocker Alice Cooper. Cooper takes on the role of King Herod, a ruler who lives for excess and decadence and fails to see the divinity of Christ, declaring him a liar.

This isn't Cooper's first time in the role: a 1996 cast recording of "Jesus Christ Superstar" also featured him as the king. Sitting at The Paley Center's discussion on this anticipated televised production with his fellow cast and crew, Cooper expressed his feelings about returning to the role. According to Cooper, Tim Rice is an "old friend of [his]," and it was Rice who long believed Cooper had the "[cynicism] and dangerous" nature required for the part.

Despite finding the same appeal as Legend with regard to being cast as Jesus, Cooper admits that "[he] never gets cast as Jesus," though he's not surprised and fairly certain he knows why. His stage persona as a rock musician doesn't really give that Christ-like vibe.

This all-new, one-time production of "Jesus Christ Superstar Live

" in Concert" is not the first television special of its kind. Many viewers may be familiar with recent small-screen live adaptations of other musicals by NBC, including "The Sound of Music Live," "The Wiz Live," "Hairspray Live!" and "Grease: Live."

While these offerings may seem to be a recent phenomenon, NBC is no stranger to the teleplay. Both 1955 and 1956 found the musical adaptation of J. M. Barrie's classic "Peter Pan" making waves on TVs across America — notably the first time that a Broadway musical had ever been televised as a complete production, at that time also including almost the entire stage cast. Fittingly, "Peter Pan Live!" was also a recent NBC production, with the adaptation airing Dec. 4, 2014.

"Jesus Christ Superstar" made a name for itself in the early '70s for its infusion of rock 'n' roll with the Bible's foremost narrative. At once daring and mesmerizing, the

production, which also received cinematic treatment in 1973, wasn't afraid to challenge preconceived notions and depictions of Christ and the figures that surrounded him.

At its core, though, much like the variability of the characters portrayed and the depths of their personas, Legend sees the production's music as not merely one-note. To him, the musical is "kind of a genre-bending and expanding piece," one that, "for those ... who love music and those ... who love to perform," does not have "as many boundaries as some would suggest."

Take a break from the quiet contemplation of Easter weekend and rejoice, for a renowned rock musical is about to shake up prime time. Catch John Legend, Sarah Bareilles and Alice Cooper as they're joined by an incredible cast for "Jesus Christ Superstar Live in Concert," airing Sunday, April 1, on NBC.

**Challenge accepted: Seven skilled chefs aim for the ultimate culinary prize**

**I**t's time to throw down: one of the biggest and most coveted prizes in culinary television is once again up for grabs, and seven incredibly talented chefs are bringing their A games to seize it. "Iron Chef Gauntlet" returns for a second season on Wednesday, April 4, on Food Network. A companion show of sorts to "Iron Chef Showdown" (which itself is a reboot of the venerable "Iron Chef America"), "Gauntlet" brings together some of the industry's top chefs, who are all hoping to be named the next Iron Chef and adding their names to

the ranks of Michael Symon, Alex Guarnaschelli, Bobby Flay and last season's "Gauntlet" winner, Stephanie Izard.

"Gauntlet's" ultimate goal is to find a chef worthy of the Iron Chef title, but there's no guarantee that the accolade will even be handed out — that's where the real suspense comes in. Through several weeks of competition overseen by the incomparable Alton Brown ("Cutthroat Kitchen"), the seven competitors will be whittled down until only one remains, but making it that far is the easy part of the battle.

In that final episode, the sole remaining chef will face three culinary battles in quick succession

against Iron Chefs Guarnaschelli, Symon and Izard. Only if the challenger's total score, as determined by a panel of judges, tops that of the reigning Iron Chefs will he or she join their ranks — and presumably the next season of "Iron Chef Showdown."

The fact that the top prize isn't even guaranteed to be handed out is definitely outside of the norm for a cooking competition, but that's a big part of what sets "Iron Chef Gauntlet" apart from its peers. The chefs looking to take that title run the gamut of culinary styles, and this season there are even two Canadians in the mix. Nicole Gomes and Dale Mackay are both "Top Chef Canada" winners, and they join Miami's Timon Balloo; David LeFevre of Manhattan Beach, California; Jeanie Roland of Punta Gorda, Florida; New York's Hong Thaimee; and Kevin Tien of Washington, D.C., in competing for that sweet chef's jacket.

"Iron Chef Gauntlet" is a fun twist on cooking competitions, with one of the biggest prizes in the industry up for grabs. The second season premieres Wednesday, April 4, on Food Network.

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

With two anachronisms to deal with, the timeline is barely stable in this new episode. Meanwhile, Nate (Nick Zano) and Wally (Keiynan Lonsdale) try to prevent another Legend from changing her future. Brandon Routh and Dominic Purcell also star.

## hollywood Q&A

**Q:** I just heard that Abby is leaving "NCIS." Why is she leaving? What is she doing next? What will "NCIS" do without her?

**A:** Unfortunately, all we really have so far is a growing list of things that are not making her leave. No. 1 on that list is a skincare line.

Last year, Pauley Perrette's likeness was used in ads for a skincare product. It was later revealed the ads were frauds — the product's producers had used a number of celebrity names without their permission. Unfortunately, the timing of the ads, which were making the rounds shortly before Perrette announced her departure from the show, fed rumors that she was leaving to pursue a career as a skincare shill.

Apparently the rumors have persisted. The scam was exposed in November, but Perrette was still de-

nying it in January, when she posted on Twitter, "Just for the BILLIONTHIME! I DO NOT HAVE A SKIN CARE LINE! ... And that's not why I'm leaving the show."

Another thing that's not a factor is her relationship with the show's producers and CBS. When she first announced her departure (again on Twitter), she made a point of saying (again in all-caps), "NO MY NETWORK AND MY SHOWARE NOT MAD AT ME!"

Indeed, the producers said they've known since 2016 and are planning a "special send-off" for her at the end of this season, the show's 15th.

Despite a huge amount of fan consternation, "NCIS" star Mark Harmon was generous and upbeat about the decision. "Fifteen years is a long time. People do what they do, and they move on and they do other things and that's part of life," he told Entertainment Tonight. "It's given us, as a show, an opportunity for rebirth, to rejuvenate, to try new things, to grow. We adjust."

**Q:** Whatever happened to the reboot of "Cash Cab"? I've seen three episodes and nothing else.

**A:** How you take the answer to your question will say a lot about whether you're a glass-half-empty or glass-half-full kind of person. "Cash Cab" came and went from the Discovery schedule over the course of three weeks, but that was the plan all along.

An optimist will hear this and think it's good news because it means the show wasn't canceled (again). But a pessimist will hear this and be disappointed there are no more episodes in the immediate future.

However, there's a chance you don't have to be either. You say you've seen three episodes, but in fact six were produced for this new season. They aired over three nights, though, so it's possible you

took the evening's two half-hour episodes as a single one-hour episode. But it's also possible you somehow only saw three and have three more new ones still to go.

Brace yourself for some undeniably bad news, though: the ratings for the new season were . . . not great.

The show was once a mighty fixture on Discovery's schedule, running for seven years (from 2005 to 2012), airing more than 200 episodes and raking in multiple Emmys. However, the new season, which the network clearly had high hopes for, did poorly against its competition.

None of its final four episodes (which aired on Dec. 10 and 17) drew even a million viewers, and they were beaten in their time-slots by such ratings lightweights as HGTV's "Beachfront Bargain Hunt" and Investigation Discovery's "Peo-

ple Magazine Investigates" (no offense to either of those shows — indeed, congratulations to them on beating a well-known TV brand).

This is bad news for "Cash Cab's" chances of getting another season, though perhaps those past years of success will make Discovery a little more patient. And perhaps it will realize that three nights might not have been enough to get people back into the "Cash Cab" habit.

**Q:** Who voiced Bambi's father in "Bambi II"?

**A:** Disney didn't splurge on "Bambi II" (2006), opting to release it straight to video instead of going for a theatrical run. But it did go big when casting the biggest addition to the Bambi universe.

The sequel, which was released 64 years after the original, is about Bambi finding his father, a mighty stag known as the Great Prince of the Forest. When you're putting a voice to a mighty stag, you go with Patrick Stewart.

The great British thespian established his authoritative voice by playing Prof. Charles Xavier in the recent X-Men films, and of course Capt. Jean-Luc Picard in "Star Trek: The Next Generation."

He's since had some fun with his most famous asset, taking on a se-

ries of voice-acting roles that generally lean more toward humor than gravitas. Most notably, perhaps, he voiced the Poop emoji in 2017's "The Emoji Movie." But he also narrated the delightfully juvenile comedies "Ted" (2012) and "Ted 2" (2015), and had a bit of self-referential fun by voicing great British playwright Bill Shakespeare in 2011's "Gnomeo & Juliet."

Another voice you might have recognized in "Bambi II" was that of Bambi himself. The voice actor from the 1942 original is, of course, long gone, so Disney went with someone from its more recent catalog: Alexander Gould, who voiced Nemo in 2003's "Finding Nemo."
