

County, school board talk more on new safety measures

The Jackson County School Board and Jackson County Sheriff Lou Roberts joined the Jackson County Commission at that board's meeting Tuesday night, to continue discussions about how the local school district will implement the requirements of new school safety legislation, the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School

Public Safety Act.

That legislation was put together in three short weeks. It may take much longer than that for officials to figure out how to implement it. Another meeting of the two boards and the sheriff may be in the offing. County commissioners said they'd be willing to set up another once school officials have more

Community remembers students killed in UTV crash

Jackson County students and parents are thinking of summer and what's to come, now that school is out and the caps and gowns have done their duty.

But for the Marianna community, the death on Tuesday of two of its brightest

students cast a painful shadow on what, for most, is a week of sweet relief and celebration.

On the afternoon of May 22, tragic circumstances unfolded when a side-by-side-style UTV driven by 12-year-old Cason Hatcher ran an Ontario Road stop sign and was hit by an oncoming car as

the UTV crossed the Martin Road intersection.

The crash drew officers from multiple agencies to the scene near Kynesville Road in Marianna. There, the UTV had overturned, caught fire and left

WW II vet Paramore gets hero's welcome in Belgium


Willie Earl Paramore was shocked at the reception he received when he visited a World War II museum in Belgium last month.

When the 91-year-old arrived at the museum he was met by a very large picture of himself set against an American flag. He was further wowed by the medal he was given that day.

The U.S. Veterans Friends, Luxembourg A.S.B.L. had bestowed the Medal of Honor "in recognition of his selfless services and brave achievements during World War II." The organization has dedicated itself to World War II U.S. veterans and their families. For them, Paramore's visit was a high honor, and the treatment he received reflected that feeling.

The Friends in 1992 adopted the graves of all 5,079 GIs buried at the U.S. Cemetery at Hamm (Luxembourg). Gen. George S. Patton is buried there, too, alongside his troops.

On Memorial Day each year, the organization's volunteers

lay a rose at the foot of each gravestone. Paramore was allowed to place a wreath in that cemetery himself, near an area

set aside for unknown soldiers. He saw that, too, and took a



Memorial Day services Monday in Marianna, Sneads

School Board breaks ground

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held yesterday morning for the new Jackson County School Board office, to be located where the old school board office burned in 1968, across from the Marianna Fire Department.

Superintendent Robert E. Childs and school board members lined up attired in gold hardhats and equipped with gold shovels, along with area citizens, to mark the beginning of the structure designed by architect Paul Donofro and to be built by Associated Contractors Inc. of Marianna.

Representing the firm at the ceremonies were Phil Briner and Jim Burleson. Construction will begin immediately for the 11,000-square-foot, single-story building and will hopefully be completed in January or February of 1981.

The reported building cost is a little over \$500,000.

U.S. marshals sent into Cuban 'tent city'

Hoping to calm angry residents living near a Cuban refugee "tent city," Air Force officials have called in U.S. marshals to help keep order at Eglin Air Force Base, in the wake of escapes and a weekend rock-throwing fracas.

An estimated 14 refugees scaled the west fence of the Eglin compound late Monday in the third night of es-

capes. All were recaptured within hours, Lt. Col. Richard Crist said early today.

Nearly 10,000 refugees have been sent to "Camp Liberty," a center on Eglin AFB property, for final processing before being resettled in U.S. communities.

The resettlement has gone slowly, however. On an average day, only 125 to 140 refugees are processed out of the camp.

France, began during World War II.

In 1954, explosions rocked the aircraft carrier USS Bennington off Rhode Island, killing 103 sailors. (The initial blast was blamed on leaking catapult fluid ignited by the flames of a jet.)

In 1960, U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge accused the Soviets during a meeting of the Security Council of hiding a microphone inside a wood carving of the Great Seal of the United States that had been presented to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev signed the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty in Moscow. (The U.S. withdrew from the treaty in 2002.)

In 1978, Resorts Casino Hotel,

the first legal U.S. casino outside Nevada, opened in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

In 1981, 14 people were killed when a Marine jet crashed onto the flight deck of the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz off Florida.

In 1998, the U.S. Supreme Court made it far more difficult for police to be sued by people hurt during high-speed chases. The Supreme Court ruled that Ellis Island, historic gateway for millions of immigrants, was mainly in New Jersey, not New York.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush paid a Memorial Day tribute to America's fighting men and women who died in battle, saying national leaders must have "the courage and character to follow their lead" in preserving peace and freedom. Chinese

officials said they would waive their one-child policy for families with a child who was killed, severely injured or disabled in the country's devastating earthquake. Oscar-winning movie director Sydney Pollack died in Los Angeles at age 73. Composer Earle H. Hagen, who wrote the themes for "The Andy Griffith Show," "I Spy," "The Mod Squad" and other TV shows, died in Rancho Mirage, California, at age 88.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama visited tornado-devastated Moore, Oklahoma, consoling people staggered by the loss of life and property and promising that the government will be behind them "every step of the way." A Nigerian tugboat carrying 12 crew members capsized and sank in about 100 feet of water; a sole survivor (Harrison Odjegba Okene) was miraculously rescued three days later. Tony Kanaan won the Indianapolis 500. Ten fans were injured during the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway won by Kevin Harvick when a nylon rope supporting a FOX Sports overhead television camera fell from the grandstands onto the track surface.

SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE INVESTING is a phrase garnering lots of attention in the financial world. Some investors exhibit great concern over the type of companies in which their money is invested; some do not.

Let's say you're an investor who prefers not to place your capital in oil and gas companies or in MLPs that transport oil or gas, because you are committed to the renewable energy movement. Or perhaps you choose not to invest in companies that produce tobacco or alcohol because you don't want to support industries that you believe produce harmful products. Your concerns are completely understandable.

Most folks can quickly decide for themselves if tobacco or alcohol-related investments are in their moral wheelhouse. More often than not investors who eschew ownership of these companies have some personal connection to the negative side effects produced by these types of products.

But what about companies that make soft drinks and junk food? If a company knows their products aren't healthy yet keeps producing them, is that company socially irresponsible? What about household goods companies that produce unnecessarily thick plastic containers for purely aesthetic reasons? Are media companies behaving in a socially irresponsible way when they repeatedly produce violent movies? If they produce a family-friendly movie for every violent one, does that make it more acceptable?

Like everything else in life, it's complicated.

Take a company that checks almost all your social boxes. They donate generously to causes you support; they pay their employees a living wage even though others in their industry may not; they recycle everything they can and take active measures to reduce their environmental footprint; and they genu-


inely try to do the right thing based on your definition of "the right thing." But what if they are extremely aggressive about avoiding taxes legally? They aren't breaking the law, but does pushing the tax boundary to the very limit of legality fit in your definition of being "good"? Head hurt yet?

Here's my take. I admire people who want to support ethical companies. Voting with your pocketbook is one of the truest forms of activism and those interested in a particular cause would naturally like to align their investments with their beliefs if possible. But for the average investor who just wants to enjoy a nice retirement, trying to only invest in companies you agree with socially, environmentally and politically is almost a full time job.

Isolating companies that are good investments is a challenge. Finding ones that are socially responsible is difficult as well. Doing both can sometimes be impossible.




Tropical system brings rain as hurricane season looms

A line of rainy weather associated with a developing tropical system is expected to continue here through Memorial Day, with possible flooding in Jackson County.

Early Friday morning, the system was named Sub-Tropical Storm Alberto. Strengthening and continued inward movement could potentially upgrade it to Tropical Storm status. It comes through on the threshold of hurricane season. June 1 signals its start in the U.S. and forecasters are predicting seven this year out of the Atlantic before hurricane season ends on Nov. 30.

Forecasters expect 14 named storms altogether, and say there's more than a 60 percent chance that a major hurricane will strike the nation's coastline. Officials say the Atlantic could produce one-to-four major hurricanes and five-to-nine less intense ones. The forecasts suggest it will be

Local forecast for Saturday-Wednesday

Saturday: Daytime and evening showers and thunderstorms likely.
Sunday: An 80 percent chance of rain in daytime, 60 percent chance that evening.
Monday: Memorial Day: A 70 percent chance of daytime rain, with a 50 percent chance in the evening hours.

Tuesday: A 70 percent chance of daytime rain, with a 50 percent chance at night.

Wednesday: More rain predicted, at a 60 percent chance.

an average or slightly higher-than-average hurricane year.

The current rainy period is not expected to bring much more than moisture, with little significant wind in the forecast, but Jackson County Emergency Management Director Rodney Andreasen said that could change and that locals should continue to monitor conditions. They should, in any case, expect to see the Chipola River rising. Four-to-five inches of rain is expected and Andreasen said a minor tropical storm is a possibility — and that would involve more wind.

Forecasters had varying predictions about the system's path, but more were lining it up for the Pensacola area as of Fri-

day morning. That would put Jackson County on the back side of the storm, where torrential rain could fall. No matter what the system ultimately does, locals should let it serve as a reminder to make sure household and business hurricane kits are ready to go and that evacuation plans have been firmed up for the coming hurricane season.

"Already this year we have seen the threat of several tropical systems impact Florida and this should act as a warning of the possibility of an active season," Andreasen said in a press release. "With that thought in mind, it is time to now make your plans for what may lie ahead for us here in Jackson County. We must realize that there is not one

location in the state of Florida that is further than 90 miles from a coast line. For residents in Jackson County, a storm making landfall anywhere near Panama City, and west, can have a devastating impact on the county. We don't have to have a direct hit from a storm to feel its impacts. We need only look back to Hurricane Ivan in 2004 that caused numerous deaths in the counties to the lay to the south of Jackson and also caused major damage to Jackson County. Hurricane Ivan passed south of the county but produced heavy rain and dangerous tornadoes that destroyed numerous structures and property."

If a hurricane makes landfall in the area of Panama City, the damage to

Jackson County could be major, he said. Hurricane Hugo in 1989 produced hurricane force winds miles inland after it made landfall; Jackson County could see the same from a major hurricane of Hurricane Ivan or Hugo size and strength.

"We must understand we are only about 50 inland from the coast," Andreasen stated. "One of the larger threats with a storm of this size would be the tornadoes that follow these type systems. The Jackson County Emergency Management Office cannot express enough that everybody should be prepared this season. If you have not done so, or have not already received a text message from the ALERT JACKSON system, you should sign up for the program. It is a free service provided by Jackson County Emergency Management and can alert you to severe weather, as well as other emergencies that may be affecting the area. You may sign

up for the alert at: <http://www.alertjackson.com/>."

Additionally, a NOAA Weather Radio is an added method for receiving emergency alerts, he said.

"We want all Jackson County residents to be prepared with enough supplies, food and medicine to last a minimum of 72 hours and beyond. In the aftermath of a major system, the primary focus will be on search and rescue. Individuals may be trapped in their home or cut off from rescue and emergency agencies will be responding to the most serious emergencies first. Again the 'first 72 is on you' and you must prepare. Please pay attention to all recommendations possible in case of a storm threat."

County Commission votes to adopt business incentives

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Jackson County Commissioners voted Tuesday to adopt a set of incentives that qualifying companies tap into if they are new to the county or are here already but expanding their operations.

They would have to meet certain requirements, like offering average annual salaries to their employers, providing a certain number of new full-time jobs or making a "proper" capital investment. The package as conditionally approved did not specify any numbers related to how many jobs would have to be created, or investment amounts required, or the exact salary considered average and qualifying.

The package is subject to review by Clerk of Courts Clay Rooks and his legal counsel, since he would be ultimately responsible for signing any ad valorem reimbursement checks that could result from some of the incentives in the package.

Board attorney Michele Jordan said during the discussion that she felt the county needed to let him and his legal advisors, in his capacity as clerk, review the provision in the document before its adoption, and the board as a result of her request made approval of the package contingent on a legal analysis.

The incentives were discussed in a special 3 p.m. meeting of the board,

and although not on the agenda for action in the 6 p.m. session, were taken up by Commissioner Jim Peacock during the final, round-table phase of the meeting.

The incentives, if ultimately passed as presented in the motion to accept, would be retroactive to January of this year. Initially, in his motion to approve the packet, Peacock specified that Miller and Miller should be retroactively made eligible in its current project establishing a new vehicle dealership on the east end of Marianna, indicating he felt that was proper since that the business had been a key reason that the incentives discussion gathered steam.

Peacock had mentioned Miller and Miller expenses at previous meetings of the board, as he pushed for an incentives program to drive economic growth in the county. He had expressed during some of those discussions that he felt some county fees were excessive and an overall discouragement to

growth, using Miller and Miller's fee totals as an example of that.

But after he specified Tuesday that Miller and Miller should be retroactively eligible for potential help through the new incentives when adopted, another board member, Chuck Lockey, suggested that the board make the deal retroactive to all others who have expanded or established during the same period of time. Peacock amended his motion to include all who had been engaged in such efforts since January.

The incentives package includes potentials for: Land acquisition

assistance, waived water and sewer tap fees, full or partial county ad valorem tax reimbursement for up to five years for new or expanding businesses, fast-track permitting, county assistance with development order fees and/or building permit fees, potential financial

assistance with recruitment and training funds, advertisements, job-applicant screening and testing, and assistance in working with Chipola College to develop customized programs tailored to meet employers' needs for technicians in the manufacturing realm.

17-year-old passenger Riley Torbett dead and Hatcher clinging to life. He would soon succumb to his injuries. The driver and passenger of the car were treated for minor injuries.

News of the crash spread quickly and by the next day, a memorial to the Hatcher and Torbett had been erected near the sight of the crash. Students gathered there to comfort each other through prayer and pay tribute to Hatcher, a student at Marianna Middle School, and Torbett, a senior at Marianna High School who was set to walk in the Class of 2018's commencement exercises just two days after

the crash.

Mourners found each other in school hallways, online, and at the churches the Hatcher and Torbett families attended, First Baptist Church and Evangel Worship Center, respectively.

students on Thursday morning were called to an intimate assembly to hear from their principal, who, like other teachers and administrators this week, bravely faced the daunting task of trying to help students cope with the loss of Hatcher, their

classmate and friend.

At MHS, Torbett's parking spot was lovingly decorated to commemorate an exceptionally bright student and athlete who had plans to pursue a medical degree after returning to Nicaragua this summer, to intern for an organization that provides humanitarian assistance and health education to areas in need.

Thursday evening, storms that lingered all week forced an overflow crowd indoors to watch the MHS commencement exercise. Proud family

members strained to see their newly minted graduates in the sea of purple gowns. For the friends and family of the one who could not march that night, and the one who no longer runs, the tears returned.

Marianna Middle School Principal Eddie Ellis assembled his students in gentle tones Thursday as they gathered in the gym to honor their lost schoolmate, Cason Hatcher.

Hatcher and 17-year-old Riley Torbett, who was to graduate from Marianna High School that evening, died together in traffic crash Tuesday afternoon.

"Let's come close," Ellis said to the youngsters as they approached the long row of bleachers. He directed them to start in the center and fill outward from there. "Let's come close," he repeated.

A few minutes later, he addressed the student body. He didn't use a microphone.

His talk was an echo of the words he'd said to the students as they made their way to the remembrance ceremony. He said he'd stayed up all night Wednesday, trying to find the right words to comfort the students and give them something meaningful to take from the gathering. He had no answers, he said, to the overwhelming question of "Why?" that must be running through the hearts and souls of so many.

Instead, he had a hope: That the family of MMS Bullpups could work through and emerge from their grief with a commitment inside to be kinder, to be more understanding of others, to be more sup-

portive human beings than they had ever been before. The loss they've suffered so young, Ellis said, has placed them in a position to realize something much earlier in life than many do: The present is all that is promised in life on Earth, and the only certain opportunity to make such choices in their interactions with others.

Hatcher was known around campus for his commitment to track and cross-country running and to the MMS Running Club. His coach, Katherine Scarlett, said he was clearly developing as a leader-by-example. He was always one to help with the tasks that come along with training sessions, things like making sure the water cooler and other materials were set up beforehand and then making sure they were back in place after practice was done.

She treasures the memories, and the photographs she has of Cason with his teammates, including his identical twin brother Clark, a fellow track runner.

She and many others are trying to make sure that all the youngsters affected by the loss have access to all the help they need to get through it.

Ministers Lavon Pettis and Gino Mayo also spoke to the students Tuesday, telling them to share their feelings, support each other and to rally around Cason's brother and other family members especially, by sharing memories with them and simply by being there to listen and engage.

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

Ebola comes calling, again

As the world learned in 2014, early action against a pandemic is absolutely critical to save lives. In the Ebola outbreak that year, the global response was abysmal and lethargic. The virus killed 11,314 people in Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea. This is why specialists are worried about a new outbreak in Congo, first discovered in a remote area but now at the doorstep of Mbandaka, a city of 1.2 million, where one case has been confirmed. This is not yet a wildfire, but rapid response is the best way to make sure it does not become one.

The World Health Organization came in for justified criticism after the 2014 pandemic. A subsequent study found that it fell down on all of its core functions: helping nations build health-care capacity, providing early warning, establishing technical norms and mobilizing resources. The WHO appears to have learned the lessons, and its director-general, Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, vows "decisive action" this time, although there are still funding shortfalls. Nothing less than a full-court press will do. One of the new tools available is more than 7,000 injections of an experimental vaccine being delivered from pharmaceutical firm Merck; the vaccine was shown to be effective in limited trials during the West Africa outbreak.

Ebola causes internal bleeding and spreads rapidly through contact with small amounts of bodily fluid. Endemic in Congo, it is often transmitted to humans by contact with an infected animal. The first reports of this outbreak were from Bikoro, a small town more than 90 miles from Mbandaka, where the WHO says health facilities have limited functionality and are difficult to reach. While it is no small challenge to stop the virus in such distant points, cities present a nightmare scenario. The WHO senior official fighting the outbreak, Peter Salama, said the spread to Mbandaka meant there was the potential for an "explosive increase" in cases. The toll so far is 45 cases, of which 10 are suspected, 21 probable and 14 confirmed; 25 people have died.

It is too easy to dismiss this as a faraway problem. In a world of globalized transportation, dangerous pathogens do not stop at passport control. Braking Ebola in Congo is essential to keeping it from Chicago. The Trump administration seems to get this point in theory — a recent report declared, "An infectious disease threat anywhere can be a threat everywhere." But in practice, the National Security Council is being reorganized, and responsibility for pandemic response is being given to those already burdened by other difficult issues, such as fighting the spread of weapons of mass destruction. What has long been needed is to treat Ebola and other pandemic risks like the singular national security danger they are, and to install a prominent coordinator who is devoted to marshaling resources for combating them before they wreak havoc on a wide scale. This was also a lesson of 2014. Have we not learned it?

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The White House's wishful thinking on Iran and North Korea

The Trump administration is feeling its oats. President Donald Trump and his lieutenants spent weeks applauding their strategy of "maximum pressure" on North Korea, which they believe forced Kim Jong Un to agree to a historic round of denuclearization talks on June 12. They also pointed to the absence of such pressure on Iran as the reason Tehran is supposedly wielding its malign influence across the Middle East, requiring the United States to scrap the nuclear deal.

On Monday, in a speech billed as his first major policy address, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo hailed "the coming pressure campaign on the Iranian regime." Echoing his boss, Pompeo painted an image of Iranian militias and agendas running rampant across the Middle East. And, like Trump, he denigrated the previous administration's diplomatic overtures to the Islamic Republic as a losing "bet."

"We will track down Iranian operatives and their Hezbollah proxies operating around the world and crush them. Iran will never again have carte blanche to dominate the Middle East," Pompeo said before outlining a list of blunt demands of the Iranian regime that included halting development of ballistic missiles and ending support for militant proxies.

While many American allies in Europe would also like to see the defanging of the Iranian regime, few would consider Pompeo's demands as part of a coherent strategy or a viable Plan B to compensate for the collapse of the nuclear deal.

"The list of requirements of the Iranians asks for everything but conversion to Christianity and reads more like a demand for unconditional surrender than an actual attempt at negotiation," Jeremy Shapiro, the research director at the European Council on Foreign Relations, said to my colleagues.

Iran's foreign minister, Javad Zarif, sneered at Pompeo's speech, calling it a "regression to old habits" by a bullying superpower.

Federica Mogherini, the European Union's foreign-policy chief, issued a more polite but no less stern rebuke.

"The JCPOA was never designed to address all issues in the relationship with Iran," Mogherini said in a statement, using the official abbreviation for the nuclear agreement.

"Secretary Pompeo's speech has not demonstrated how walking away from the JCPOA has made or will make the region safer from the threat of nuclear proliferation or how it puts us in a better position to influence Iran's conduct in areas outside the scope of JCPOA. There is no alternative to the JCPOA."

"This is the Trump administration making an offer Iran can only refuse, and was made in order for Iran to refuse," tweeted Rob Malley, the president of the International Crisis Group. "Risks of regional escalation, already high, just got higher."

Stephen Walt, a Harvard professor of international affairs, suggested Pompeo's demands echoed "the Austrian ultimatum to Serbia in 1914," which prefigured World War I.

Undeterred, Pompeo used the tough words of a hawk who bitterly opposed the nuclear deal and has a history of advocating regime change in Tehran. "The Iranian regime should know that this is just the beginning," he warned on Monday. "After our sanctions come into full force, it will be bat-tling to keep its economy alive."

But it's not clear how the new program of U.S. sanctions will be any more stifling than the ones slapped on Iran by the Obama administration to bring Tehran to the table. And few experts believe that the Trump administration can cobble together the same kind of multilateral front that coaxed Iran into curbing its uranium enrichment activities and submitting to international inspections.

John Bolton, Trump's new national security adviser, argued

in the Wall Street Journal in 2009 that sanctions on Iran wouldn't work because other major powers wouldn't sign up for them (he was proved quite wrong) and they wouldn't change the behavior of the regime's more hard-line elements (he may be on firmer ground here). Many of the administration's critics believe Bolton, as well as Pompeo, would rather skip straight to military action.

Bolton is also casting a shadow on the White House's North Korea gambit. Though Trump is keen on the potential publicity and TV buzz generated by the planned June 12 meeting with Kim, White House aides have started to fear what many analysts had assumed: North Korea is not actually serious about striking a deal in Singapore. Few Korea watchers or arms-control experts believed Pyongyang would actually surrender its nukes, and some worried that hawkish figures at the White House were deliberately setting up the talks to fail.

Bolton, in particular, has been singled out for his saber-rattling against North Korea — not just in Pyongyang, but also in Seoul. "In South Korea, many people, regardless of their political orientation, are not fond of John Bolton," a senior official close to the South Korean president told my colleague Anna Fifield. "He seems to think the U.S. can fight another war on the Korean Peninsula, so from our perspective, as the people living on the Korean Peninsula, he is very dangerous."

It's unclear what the maximalist stance struck by Bolton and Pompeo will achieve other than pushing the countries closer to military conflict. In the meantime, Trump may end up looking weak by meeting Kim.

"The White House might be talking about maximum pressure," wrote arms-control expert Jeffrey Lewis, "but what's really happening is that it is moving to accommodate Kim, offering him the recognition he always believed nuclear weapons would bring."

Trump warned of 'great danger' posed by Clinton's emails. But avoids security procedures for his own phone.

Basically nothing was sacred to Donald Trump during the 2016 campaign, except Hillary Clinton's email account. This was the one thing he insisted needed to be done by the book. And in Trump's telling, Clinton's choice to use a private email server had grave consequences. At one point Trump said he was "sure" China had hacked her server and that the whole thing was "putting all of America and our citizens in danger, great danger."

You'd think a guy who felt so strongly about that would go above and beyond to protect his personal communications once he became president. Apparently, you'd think wrong.

Politico is reporting that Trump has eschewed the normal security procedures when it comes to his personal cellphones. He has at least two — one for making calls and one for Twitter — but the call-capable phone has a camera and a microphone, which was against protocol in the Obama administration because those things could be used to monitor a president's activities and movements. As for the Twitter phone, Trump has reportedly gone as long as five months without having it checked by security experts, despite phones being checked every 30 days during the Obama administration.

Trump's reasoning for resisting

the regular security sweep? It's "too inconvenient," according to one official.

That sound you hear is 60 million Hillary Clinton supporters tearing their hair out. You might recall this was exactly the justification used by Clinton for her private server: convenience. "When I got to work as secretary of state, I opted for convenience to use my personal email account, which was allowed by the State Department, because I thought it would be easier to carry just one device for my work and for my personal emails instead of two."

Whether convenience was truly Clinton's reason for the private server is up for debate (it certainly seems possible she was attempting to avoid disclosure). But even if you set that aside, there are eerie parallels between what Trump attacked Clinton for and what he's doing now.

"Clinton's home email server that she lied to the American people about was a profound national security risk," Trump wrote in one Facebook post. "Hillary Clinton has bad judgment and is unfit to serve as President."

He added in July 2016 in a campaign speech: "This is not just extreme carelessness with classified material, which is

still totally disqualifying. This is calculated, deliberate, premeditated misconduct."

He added on the eve of the election: "It's believed that no less than five foreign intelligence agencies successfully hacked into Hillary's illegal insecure server. In other words, Hillary's corrupt criminal scheme put the safety of every American family in danger; that's what's happened."

A lack of regular security checks on his cellphone may not be on the same scale as a "home-brew" private email server, but the practical implications are similar — the possibility that foreign actors could gain access and use it against Trump and the United States. Trump seemed very bothered by that possibility as a candidate; he seems far less bothered as president — almost as if he wasn't really that concerned in the first place.

A White House aide insisted to Politico that technological advances have made for more secure devices and necessitate less procedural security. But Trump went big on the importance of taking every precaution as a candidate. Matching the Obama administration's protocols would seem a very basic way to avoid any possibility of the "great danger" Trump warned about as a candidate.

County OKs 100,000 tons of hurricane debris for Springhill

Jackson County Commissioners on Tuesday agreed to potentially accept roughly 100,000 tons of ground-up construction and demolition debris generated in the U.S. Virgin Islands as a result of Hurricanes Irma and Maria in 2017.

The vote was 4-1 to allow the material to be deposited in

Springhill Landfill. Commissioner Chuck Lockey cast the lone dissenting vote.

Waste Management representative Ronnie Bell appeared before the board that evening to advocate for the green light, saying that the company is bidding in a competitive process in an effort to be assigned the task of disposing of the material.

He assured the board that the material it's bidding to receive

is of a non-hazardous nature and said the project is being bid and overseen by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The material will be inspected, permitted and accepted through those agencies, the company says.

The county's okay was required because, under the current contract with the county, Waste Management can only

dump materials coming into Springhill from Florida, Georgia and Alabama, except by special permission. To bid on the job, the permission had to be secured.

According to the Waste Management letter seeking permission to put that in Springhill if its bid is successful, the company said the county would receive \$2.22 per ton in host fees, which would come to \$222,000 for the


county at 100,000 tons.

That's equivalent to an average two-month disposal rate into the landfill, although the numbers can fluctuate. For instance, the landfill in the last quarter of 2016 received 161,000 tons subject to the host fee, resulting in \$352,000 to the county, while in the second quarter of the year, it received 196,000 tons for roughly \$421,400 in county host fees.

Supermarket suspends political giving amid anti-NRA protest

PARKLAND — Survivors of the Parkland school shooting lay down in "die ins" at two Publix supermarkets Friday to protest the chain's support for a gubernatorial candidate aligned with the National Rifle Association, as the company announced a suspension of political contributions.

The students from Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School shouted "USA, not NRA!" and caused brief delays at the checkout as customers navigated carts around them on the floor. Pro-NRA counter-protesters also showed up at one store, and two men almost came to blows before police intervened.

"A lot of people don't support who Publix is supporting," said Haylee Shepherd, a 15-year-old sophomore at Stoneman Douglas, who joined 13 fellow protesters on the floor for about 10 minutes at one of the stores. "It's going to reflect on them as a brand and

people shopping there."

Publix has been criticized by the students for supporting Agriculture Commissioner and gubernatorial candidate Adam Putnam, a Republican who has called himself a "proud NRA sellout." The activists have called for a boycott of the supermarket.

Publix announced earlier this week that it would "reevaluate" its donations amid the outcry. In another statement Friday, company spokeswoman Maria Brous said the chain would halt its contributions for now as it continues that reevaluation.

Senior David Hogg, one of the most vocal student activists for gun reform and one of the founders of March for Our Lives, helped organize the protest. It came a week after 10 were killed at a high school in Santa Fe, Texas, and the same day that authorities said an Indiana middle school student opened fire inside his science classroom, wounding a classmate and a teacher.



Maui's Kapalua Bay Beach tops Dr. Beach's best list

A crescent-shaped beach on the Hawaiian island of Maui got the top slot Thursday on the list of best beaches issued annually by a Florida professor known as Dr. Beach.

Kapalua Bay Beach topped the list released by Stephen Leatherman, a coastal science professor at Florida International University in Miami.

And don't worry about that lava-spewing volcano impacting visits to the Kapalua beach. The Kilauea volcano is on a different Hawaiian island, the Big Island.

Leatherman's list even has a second Hawaiian beach on the same island as the volcano, Hapuna Beach State Park, coming in eighth on the list. But Hapuna is on the opposite side of the Big Island.

The other beaches on the top 10 list are Ocracoke Lifeguarded Beach on North Carolina's Outer Banks, coming in second, followed by Grayton Beach State Park in the Florida panhandle; Coopers Beach, Southampton, New York; Coast Guard Beach, Cape Cod, Massachusetts; Lighthouse Beach, Buxton, Outer Banks, North Carolina; Caladesi Island State Park, Dunedin-Clearwater, Florida; then Hapuna on the Big Island, with Coronado Beach, San Diego, California, in ninth place

and Kiawah Beachwalker Park, Kiawah Island, South Carolina, coming in 10th.

About That No. 1 Beach...

Leatherman told The Associated Press that Kapalua is one of his "favorite beaches. It's just an idyllic place to visit. What's interesting is a lot of beaches are beautiful but can be dangerous because of big waves. This beach has two arms of (hardened) lava flows, ancient lava flows,

which protect it. So it's a really calm waterway. You don't go there for surfing. You go there for swimming. The water is warm year-round."

Kapalua is also lined with palm trees, has white coral sand and colorful tropical fish, and is perfect for snorkeling. Leatherman says it's easy to reach from the main road by driving through a golf course, but parking is limited.

One small caveat on whether visitors to other parts of Hawaii will notice any ill effects from the volcano: Depending on wind conditions, other areas of the Big Island and the other Hawaiian islands could experience volcanic smog, known as vog. Right now winds are blowing most of it offshore. Vog is not a new

issue, by the way: The entire state has experienced vog on and off since 2008.

Criteria For The List

Leatherman has been compiling his annual list of top 10 beaches every year since 1991. He uses 50 criteria to evaluate beaches, with the most important categories being water cleanliness, safety (meaning no rip currents or drownings) and management of the beach environment and its facilities. He also looks for fine, soft sand, and gives extra points for beaches that prohibit smoking. He doesn't collect water from every beach in

test tubes himself, by the way, but he does use data from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to grade the beaches on water quality.

Leatherman's list has its origins in a class he taught at the University of Maryland. A student was writing an article for a travel magazine and asked him to come up with a list of the 10 best beaches based on his expertise as a coastal scientist. He began producing his official annual list in 1991 using his 50 criteria and his vast knowledge of U.S. ocean beaches. "I had visited every (ocean) beach in the U.S.

for a Department of Interior or study ... so that gave me the background data set to work from," he said.

His goal in producing the list each year, he says, "is to reward those beaches which maintain the high quality and the safety areas but also to encourage other beaches to do the same." He looks for beaches that "balance nature with the built environment."

But how come so many states with beloved beaches — in places like Maine, the DelMarva Peninsula, the Jersey shore, the Pacific Northwest and other coastal areas — never make the list, while the same names keep turning up year after year?

Leatherman says it's all about the math in his categories. Beaches lose points for water that's too chilly, sand that's too coarse, condo towers instead of dunes, riptides and drownings, erosion and limited public access.

Leatherman adds that he doesn't make money from the list. He just finds "it interesting to do" and hopes that the standards he promotes will encourage other beaches "to do the right thing and improve their quality."

A good resource for getting advice is the Disney Parks Moms Panel. The 40 panelists provide customized, free answers to questions about Disney vacations (including parks, Disney Cruise Line, Disney resorts and more). Emailed questions are answered in about a week.

A member of the Disney Parks Moms Panel, Lindsey P. of Georgia, recently spoke to AP's weekly travel podcast "Get Outta Here!" (Disney identifies panelists only by first name, first initial of last name and home state.) Here are some excerpts from the podcast episode, edited for brevity and clarity.

Q: How far in advance should I book a Disney park trip?

Answer: The sweet spot for most guests is the seven- or eight-month window. You can choose your home resort, make your hotel reservation then. When that six-month window comes around, you'll be able to make your advance dining reservations for table service restaurants. When the 60 days before check-in window rolls around, you'll be able to make your FastPass reservations.

Q: What does the FastPass do?

Answer: It allows guests to choose three attractions (rides) per day to book in advance. ... The FastPass queue eliminates the wait.

Q: What's the ideal number of days for a Disney World visit?

Answer: I like to go for five "sleeps" (overnights) as my kids call it. That allows us to get in one

park (per day) for the four main parks. We also like to take a resort day to explore resort amenities, offerings and activities. ... But I've known guests from the U.K. that will stay up to two weeks. I've had friends go for a short weekend and concentrate on a couple of parks.

Q: What is the MagicBand?

Answer: It's a wonderful piece of technology worn on the wrist ... a tiny device, waterproof, that will hold all your information. It can serve as your room key, your FastPass, your tickets can be embedded in it.

Q: Is there a way to predict the parks' busiest days and times?

Answer: I never schedule a vacation myself without checking the UndercoverTourist.com crowd calendar. They have an uncanny knack to estimate a crowd level on scale of one to 10 ... at whatever park you might want to visit on any given day. You'll see a red X by a park that expects a large crowd due to a festival or an event.

Q: What are some advantages to staying at a Disney property versus off-site accommodations?

Answer: You get the option to use extra "magic hours" ... where a park may open an hour early

or stay open an hour later. Those are only available to Walt Disney World hotel guests. And I don't necessarily ever rent a car when I visit Walt Disney World because the transportation options are fairly seamless. There's a complimentary plush coach line back and forth to the airport. On resort property, the buses, the monorails are operating all hours of the day.

Q: Is it necessary to book restaurants ahead or can you wing it?

Answer: It depends on your family's style. I have a friend who can only deal with table service reservations. She loves a guaranteed place to sit down with her family. My family likes to do one table service reservation a day, sometimes breakfast, sometimes dinner. We like to take lunch on the fly. If you decide not to make those table service reservations, the MyDisneyExperience mobile app lets you order food in advance with a credit card. You arrive at the restaurant, push "I'm here" and your tray is ready. ... It's kind of like Uber Eats.

Q: How do you cope when kids have a meltdown in the park?

Answer: It happens. The four main theme parks offer baby care centers. You might say, 'I don't have a

baby,' but these areas offer an air-conditioned, quiet place to sit and take in a Disney cartoon ... and a


store with sundries and snacks. Some of them have restrooms for potty training. It's a place to rest,

relax and recuperate. You can also take Disney transportation back to your room for a nap, then come back later for fireworks or a meal. ... Also know your family's rhythm. If your kids are early risers, hop up, get that morning meal, head to the park. If your kids are late risers at home, that means you can have a more special lunch, engage in the afternoon parades.

Q: What do you think about using a travel agent to book a Disney visit?

Answer: I've used a travel agent myself. ... Figuring out which hotel, dining, reservations and the FastPass — a travel agent is well-versed in all those offerings.

Many cancer patients juggle care along with monetary difficulties

Josephine Rizo survived chemotherapy, surgery and radiation, but breast cancer treatment wrecked her finances.

Money was already tight when doctors told the Phoenix resident she had an aggressive form of the disease. Then she took a pay cut after going on disability leave, and eventually lost her job and insurance coverage. During treatment, Rizo got swamped with more than \$50,000 in medical bills.

"My concern was, 'Am I going to die?'" she said. "I had to kind of focus 100 percent on my health to make sure I was around for my kids."

As treatment costs soar and insurance coverage shrinks, hospitals and patient advocates around the U.S. are rushing to offer more help to patients like Rizo, who had no financial counseling. Cancer centers are hiring experts to help patients navigate the insurance system, while nonprofits are teaching people to think about handling costs when treatments starts instead of waiting for a financial crisis to hit.

"We know a lot of very solidly middle class families, they were fine and then ... their financial lives changed," said Jean Sachs, CEO of the nonprofit Living Beyond Breast Cancer. "They're not prepared for the cost of cancer, let alone the care."

Cancer has long been an ex-

pensive disease to treat, but several factors have made the financial sting more intense in recent years, prompting more patients to delay treatment or cut back on their medications.

Insurers are tightening their prescription drug coverage and raising patient costs like deductibles as treatment prices soar. That means patients may have to pay several thousand dollars a year for a drug like the leukemia treatment Gleevec — a pill taken daily, sometimes for the rest of a person's life.

The Affordable Care Act sets limits for how much people have to spend on care each year. But cancer treatments often extend beyond a year, and those limits don't apply to care sought outside the increasingly narrow network of doctors and hospitals that some insurers offer.

Patient costs also can rise because newer cancer treatments are more tolerable, so people can stay on them longer, said Dr. Yousaf Zafar, a Duke Cancer Institute oncologist who studies financial distress.

A few years ago, Zafar and colleagues surveyed 300 adult, insured patients at the cancer institute. Nearly 40 percent reported a higher-than-expected financial burden, while 16 percent dealt with what he called "overwhelming financial distress."

More than a quarter of that patient population said they didn't take their medicines as prescribed. That meant skipping

doses, taking smaller amounts or not filling prescriptions because of the cost.

Other research has found that cancer patients are more than twice as likely as those without the disease to declare bankruptcy.

More than 1.7 million new cancer cases will be diagnosed this year, according to the American Cancer Society. Who winds up in financial trouble will depend on factors like the patient's income, savings and insurance coverage.

It's not just the treatments that cause financial strain. Patients or parents of children with cancer often miss work or take on unexpected costs while traveling for care.

Shauna McLaughlin left her job as a dialysis technician the day her daughter, Madison, was diagnosed with leukemia. Doctors told the single mom that her 18-month-old would be hospitalized for at least a month.

McLaughlin lived for a while off credit cards, help from family and friends and income from odd jobs. But she fell behind on bills and eventually ran out of propane to heat her home in Massachusetts in the winter of 2012.

"You're learning about cancer and ... (chemotherapy) and all the side effects," McLaughlin said. "People don't understand that your whole life is falling apart around you as you're trying to worry about those other things."

McLaughlin, whose daughter has been cancer-free since De-

cember 2016, regrets brushing off a social worker's offer to help. She eventually turned to the nonprofit Family Reach for assistance with several bills.

Doctors say patients should meet shortly after diagnosis with someone who can guide them on paying for prescription drugs and other financial matters.

"A lot of times people don't realize there are resources available until they've already gone broke," said Dr. Veena Shankaran of the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle.

Patients and doctors need to keep talking throughout treatment about their ultimate goal. Eventually, that may include discussing whether an expensive drug that improves a patient's quality of life is worth the cost, said Dr. Ali Thaver of the University of Chicago Medical Center.

"There's no black-and-white solution ... and that's hard, but just because it's hard doesn't mean it shouldn't be done," Thaver said.

Most hospitals and cancer centers offer some help for patients facing financial challenges, and many are bolstering the assistance they provide. That help might include a counselor who finds drug coupons and connects patients with charities, or a financial planner who helps people scrutinize their income and debt levels.

Dan Sherman, a Grand Rapids, Michigan-based consultant, has helped launch some 35 patient navigation programs in U.S.

hospitals in the past six years to help people deal with problems like high deductibles or find better insurance coverage based on their prescriptions and medical needs.

Sherman noticed last year that one of his patients had surgery scheduled for Dec. 29. He arranged for it to be delayed a few days until after the patient's coverage reset. That saved her from having to pay a \$5,000 deductible for the surgery and then face a fresh deductible in the new year.

"This concept is let's try to fix the problems before they actually develop," he said.

Rizo, the 39-year-old Phoenix breast cancer patient would have welcomed more help. She didn't know that disability pay would amount to only 40 percent of her income when she went on leave from her job processing pre-authorization treatment requests for a health insurer. She also didn't realize she'd have an insurance coverage gap before qualifying for the government-funded Medicaid program for the poor.

Now, she says, she's basically starting life over.

"It was something that was out of my control and I didn't know how to fix it," she said.

Death rate up, US life expectancy likely down again

NEW YORK — The U.S. death rate rose last year, and 2017 likely will mark the third straight year of decline in American life expectancy, according to preliminary data.

Death rates rose for Alzheimer's disease, diabetes, flu and pneumonia, and three other leading causes of death, according to numbers posted online Wednesday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Full-year data is not yet available for drug overdoses, suicides or firearm deaths. But partial-year statistics in those categories showed continuing increases.

Just as important, there was little change in the death rate from the nation's No. 1 killer: heart disease. In the past, steady annual drops in heart disease death rates offset increases in other causes. But that offset is no longer happening, experts say.

The CDC's National Center for Health Statistics calculated the preliminary rates based on a first-pass review of death

certificates filed last year. There typically are delays in the filing of paperwork for causes of death that involve police investigations.

A more complete report is expected around the end of the year, including the number of deaths and a calculation of life

expectancy — the average lifespan based on year of birth, current death trends and other factors.

For decades, life expectancy increased, rising a few months nearly every year. But 2016 was the second year in a row in U.S. life expectancy fell, a rare event

that had occurred only twice before in the last century.

Health officials say there was one three-year decline. That occurred in 1916, 1917 and 1918, a period that included the worst flu pandemic in modern history.

"Looking at these numbers, it seems likely" the nation has

just tied that record, said Anne Case, a Princeton University researcher who's done influential work on deaths in middle-aged white Americans from suicides, drug overdose and alcohol abuse.

The overall death rate rose a little less than 1 percent, to about 734 deaths per 100,000 people. The rate dipped slightly in 2016 despite a record number of deaths that year, so its rise in 2017 is more reason to expect life expectancy will worsen, Case said.

There was some good news. The death rate for cancer, the nation's No. 2 killer, continued to drop. It fell 2 percent from 2016. Death rates from HIV and blood infections also declined.

The heart disease death rate fell too, but only by 0.3 percent. Experts think the nation's increasing obesity rate is probably a factor in the flattening of heart disease death rates.

ABERDEEN, S.D. — A Florida man has pleaded guilty in a crash in South Dakota last November that killed a woman.

Authorities say 24-year-old Cedric Beauvil, of Miami, was driving a semitrailer that failed to stop at a highway intersection in Beadle County and crashed into a pickup truck driven by 18-year-old Kennedy Tomsha, of Tulare. Tomsha died at a Huron hospital.

The American News reports that Beauvil pleaded guilty Tuesday to second-degree manslaughter, and prosecutors dismissed several other charges. He faces up to 10 years in prison.

Florida man charged with hate crimes in mosque bomb threat

FORT LAUDERDALE — A Florida man has been charged with federal hate crimes after allegedly phoning bomb threats to a mosque.

A grand jury indictment released Friday charges 26-year-old Dustin Allen Hughes with obstructing free exercise of religious beliefs and making threats by telephone. Hughes is set to enter a plea next week. He faces decades in prison if convicted.

Federal prosecutors say several voicemail messages were left earlier this month at the Jamaat ul Muttaqueen Mosque in Pembroke Pines.

The voicemails were laced with profanity and said things such as, "I planted a bomb in your temple. ... You guys are all gonna be up in flames after I'm done with you!"

Prosecutors say Hughes confessed to leaving the messages because he wanted to upset and frighten Muslims.

Man charged with threatening Egyptian exchange students

ST. AUGUSTINE — Four Egyptian exchange students say they were threatened by a man outside a Florida McDonald's, with him yelling "Get out of my country. You do not deserve to eat here."

St. Johns County sheriff's deputies arrested 60-year-old John Jay Smith early Wednesday on aggravated assault and other charges.

The students are between 18 and 23. They told deputies they were eating in the St. Augustine restaurant's parking lot when Smith approached. They say he flashed a pocket knife and threatened them with a stun gun before they fled in their cars.

Deputies say Smith told them, "they killed my son." He told them his son was a Marine killed in Afghanistan. That could not be confirmed.

George Zimmerman tells court he's \$2.5 million in debt

SANFORD — The ex-neighborhood watch volunteer who killed a

black teen in Florida in 2012 says he's \$2.5 million in debt and has no income.

George Zimmerman filed paperwork detailing his financial state as he fights a misdemeanor stalking charge.

The Orlando Sentinel reports a public defender filed a not-guilty plea for Zimmerman and a request for a jury trial.

Zimmerman is accused of sending threatening messages to private investigator Dennis Warren. Warren had contacted Zimmerman about a documentary series on the slain Trayvon Martin that's being produced by rapper Jay Z. A sheriff's report says Warren received numerous calls and texts from Zimmerman in December.

A judge earlier this month denied Warren's request for a restraining order against Zimmerman.

Zimmerman killed Martin in 2012. He was acquitted of criminal charges.

Florida deputy shoots man outside drug treatment facility

CITRA — Authorities say a Florida sheriff's deputy fatally shot a man outside a drug treatment facility.

In an Ocala Star-Banner report, Marion County Sheriff's Office spokesman Paul Bloom said deputies were called to the Phoenix House in Citra on Thursday about a man who had violated his drug-offender probation.

Bloom said the man fled as deputies and a probation officer arrived to arrest him.

Deputies followed the man into a wooded area behind the facility. Bloom said the man then violently confronted them, and one deputy shot him.

The man's name was not released, pending notification of his family. Officials said he had a criminal history of drug offenses and theft. Bloom said he was sent to Phoenix House as part of his probation.

The deputy who fired at the suspect was placed on administrative leave.

Hearing for accused Florida school shooter rescheduled

FORT LAUDERDALE — A court hearing for the teenager accused of fatally shooting 17 at a Florida high school has been rescheduled.

A status hearing on the murder and other charges facing 19-year-old Nicolas Cruz that had been scheduled Friday in Fort Lauderdale will now take place June 21.

Cruz is charged with killing 17 students and faculty and wounding 17 others Feb. 14 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

No trial date has been set for Cruz. He faces the death penalty if convicted. His attorneys have said he would plead guilty in exchange for a life sentence.

Prosecutors say the former Stoneman Douglas student used an AR-15 to kill people on the first and third floors of the freshman building. He then fled and was arrested about an hour later.

Civilians kill gunman after 3 shot at Oklahoma restaurant

OKLAHOMA CITY — A gunman opened fire inside an Oklahoma City restaurant during the dinner rush, wounding a woman and two girls before two armed citizens shot him dead outside, police said Friday.

The suspected gunman, 28-year-old Alexander Tilghman, was armed with a pistol when he entered Louie's On The Lake around 6:30 p.m. on Thursday. A 39-year-old woman and two juvenile girls were shot and wounded, while an unnamed man fell and broke his arm while fleeing, according to a statement from police.

Tilghman was then shot dead outside the restaurant by two citizens identified by police as Juan Carlos Nazario and Bryan Wittle.

All four victims were reported in good condition Friday, according to Oklahoma City police Capt. Bo Mathews. A suspected motive for

the shooting hasn't been released.

Dennis Will said his daughter and granddaughter were among those shot. Talking with reporters outside the hospital where the shooting victims were taken, Will said his daughter called him after the shooting and said they had been shot while entering the restaurant for a birthday dinner.

A woman who answered the phone at the home believed to belong to Tilghman's mother declined to comment when contacted by The Associated Press. Telephone and text messages seeking comment from Nazario and Wittle were not immediately returned.

The Hal Smith Restaurant Group, which owns the restaurant, released a statement saying the restaurant will be closed Friday and counselors will be available to employees and customers.

"We are extremely thankful the situation didn't escalate further,

and that injuries were not more widespread. However, our hearts are with the wounded during this incident," the statement read.

The statement referred other questions to police.

The National Rifle Association said in a tweet Friday that the shooting was an example of "how the best way to stop a bad guy with a gun is a good guy with a gun." The organization said it hopes the incident serves as a "wake-up call" for Republican Gov. Mary Fallin, who recently vetoed a so-called constitutional carry bill that would have allowed adults to carry firearms without a license or training in Oklahoma.

In April, a restaurant patron wrestled an assault-style rifle away from a gunman at a Waffle House in Nashville, Tennessee. Four people were killed in that shooting. Police have said there would have been far more casualties if it weren't for the patron's quick thinking.

Student: Teacher tackled school shooter

NOBLESVILLE, Ind. — A male student armed with two handguns opened fire at a suburban Indianapolis middle school Friday morning, wounding another student and a teacher before being taken into custody, authorities said.

Seventh-grader Ethan Stonebraker said his science teacher, Jason Seaman, likely prevented even more injuries by confronting the shooter, who he said pulled out a gun and opened fire while the class was taking a test.

"Our science teacher

immediately ran at him, swatted a gun out of his hand and tackled him to the ground," Stonebraker said. "If it weren't for him, more of us would have been injured for sure."

The attack at Noblesville West Middle School happened around 9 a.m., police Chief Kevin Jowitt said at a news conference. He said the suspect asked to be excused from class before returning with the guns, and investigators believe he acted alone.

"We do know the situation resolved extremely quickly," Jowitt said.

Seaman's brother, Jeremy Seaman, told The

Indianapolis Star that his brother was shot three times and was undergoing surgery. He said he was conscious after the shooting and talked with his wife, telling her he was OK.

Jeremy Seaman, who now lives in Arizona, said his brother was a defensive end for Southern Illinois University's football team and has never been a person to run away.

Authorities released no information about conditions of the two victims, who was taken to Indianapolis hospitals.

Indiana University Health spokeswoman

Danielle Sirilla said the teacher was taken to IU Health Methodist Hospital and the wounded student was taken to Riley Hospital for Children. She didn't know the seriousness of their injuries.

The attack comes a week after an attack at a high school in Santa Fe, Texas, that killed eight students and two teachers, and months after the school attack that killed 17 people in Parkland, Florida. The Florida attack inspired students from that school and others throughout the country to call for more restrictions on access to guns.

Former NAACP leader exposed as white faces charges

SPOKANE, Wash. — A former NAACP leader in Washington state whose life unraveled after she was exposed as a white woman pretending to be black has been charged with welfare fraud. She illegally received \$8,747 in food assistance and \$100 in child care assistance from August 2015 through November 2016, court documents said.

Nkechi Diallo, known as Rachel Dolezal before she

legally changed her name in 2016, was charged this week with theft by welfare fraud, perjury and false verification for public assistance, Spokane news station KHO-TV reported Thursday.

She illegally received \$8,747 in food assistance and \$100 in child care assistance from August 2015 through November 2016, court documents said.

A subpoena for her self-employment records, which included copies of her bank statements, showed Diallo had deposited nearly \$84,000 into her bank account between August 2015 and September 2017, without reporting most of it to the Department of Social and Health Services.

picture there.

Paramore received an honored hero's escort during that trip, too, traveling a full week to various key points associated with the war. The journey was made with five family members on a tour that also included The Netherlands.


He hadn't expected all that fuss when his daughter-in-law, Jolene Paramore, had suggested the trip. She made all the arrangements and kept some particulars as a surprise until the very end.

"I was very grateful for it, and humbled because I didn't deserve any of it, but I got it," Paramore said. "You wouldn't believe how they treated me, with great respect. They made hundreds of pictures of me, like I was Gen. Patton. I'll never forget it."

He said it meant a great deal to know that people abroad still remember and appreciate efforts Americans and others in the Allied Forces made to stand off Axis powers in the great war. Although he never saw combat, he did spend several months in the combat zone.

Paramore served a two-year tour in the Army, "invited," he said, by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, along with thousands of other draftees, to join the armed forces.

Although he never served in Belgium, Paramore did spend time guarding Nazi prisoners of war in the heart of Austria. He and his family had visited there last December. He had been in service six months when he received orders to join Company C, 11th Combat Engineers in the Glasenbach Kaserne outside Salzburg in the center of Austria, in April 1946. There, he guarded

German prisoners of war, many of them from the upper echelon of Adolf Hitler's SS forces.

Paramore visited many of his old haunts on last year's trip, including the restaurant of a hotel where, back in 1946, he'd received a "permanent" mess card entitling him to meals there. He still has that card, and presented it jokingly to the restaurant staff. Lots of pictures, and some new friends, were made that day.

On this trip, though, he was thinking more about the wartime trials and tribulations of his old friend and Jackson County native Judge Robert McCrary, now deceased.

McCrary had served in the Battle of the Bulge, one of the most famous, dangerous and unexpected victories the Allies ever forged against German forces. The stand against overwhelming odds in a surprise attack held German forces off key assets and forced the enemy to retreat. It was the largest and deadliest battle of the war, and was Germany's last major offensive effort on the Western Front.

Paramore said it was meaningful to step foot on the ground his friend helped defend all those

years ago.

Joining him on the trip were son Scott and daughter-in-law Donna, son John and his wife Jolene, and his cousin and fellow-retired pharmacist Don Parmer.

Paramore comes from a military family out of Midland City, Ala. He had two brothers who served in the Army, as well, doing time in the Pacific Theatre, and they saw much combat but survived the war.

He and his wife Carrie, now deceased, had established Paramore's Pharmacy in Marianna back in 1958. They built their lives here. Paramore sold the business to his son Scott a few years back, but he still helps out if he's needed and if he's not too busy—he has a few irons in the fire, himself. He has bee hives, conducts or oversees controlled burns in the loblolly pine stands he established some years back, and he engages in some land conservation efforts. And he can sometimes be lured away by his daughter-in-law for a family trip to honor the history of his nation's heroism in war and the bravery of his fellow American soldiers.

information on some lingering unknowns.

The school board, county commissioners and the sheriff have existing year-to-year agreements regarding five current school resource officers and school officials are trying to work out something with them and some other agencies for the additional officers needed. The school board has state funding to pay \$191,027 of the \$261,406 it takes to pay and provide benefits for five deputy SROs for 190 days, and absorbs the rest, \$70,379, by tapping into its reserves. The county pays all the additional benefits and salaries for the officers over the remaining days of their work year, that time spent in service to the sheriff, and also pays the costs of training and outfitting the officers.

Manpower and school facility safety improvements are the two major components that must be addressed in rethinking the SRO program to meet the new requirements. It's the people problem they're most concerned about right now.

The school board is getting enough state money to hire the estimated eight additional people needed to have a school resource officer at every school in the county—but there's a snag.

They can only use those funds to pay the SROs' employment and benefits for 190 days, the amount of time they'd be dedicated to the schools. That period stretches over about 10 months' time, at roughly five days a week, minus holidays, when school is not in session and teachers aren't on campus. That leaves 70 or so work days in the normal cycle for a full-time

employee in most fields.

Foreseeing difficulty in finding people willing to work for a short year of pay, and having to compete with as many as 66 other counties in the search for additional safety officers in general, has led the school board to approach the county and some municipalities to see if it can work out deals, in which the officers could work for those agencies for the remaining days of the calendar year, in order to give the officers full-time employment. But the clock is ticking.

The new officers are supposed to be in place by the start of the new school year, in August. The time it takes to recruit, hire, train and outfit those offices makes officials worry about being able to meet the deadline. Roberts is worried, too, about that time frame.

Jackson County Commissioners have made but one commitment so far: On Tuesday, board chairman Eric Hill informally assured the school board that the county would continue to honor its existing joint contract, which already covers five of the existing SROs serving at county schools.

County board member Chuck Lockey and county board attorney Michelle Jordan stressed in the meeting that the new law makes it clear: The school board, not the county commission, is responsible for carrying out the mandate.

The county commission is not obligated, but school officials continue to hope that the county board will help in some additional way with some of the burden. The officers will have to be equipped with cars, for instance, and be outfitted with about \$5,500 worth of equipment, including guns and body gear. The county typically builds those expenses into

the sheriff's budget.

No vote was taken to affirm Hill's reassurances about continuing to fund a portion of the salaries, benefits and other expenses associated with the five existing SROs, and Hill said after the meeting that he was speaking only about a continued commitment for this fiscal year, which ends at the close of September. When asked after the session, two other commissioners—Lockey and Willie Spires—also agreed that Hill's reassurance should only be taken as a commitment for the current fiscal year.

According to those three, any contracts beyond 2017-2018 would have to be taken up in county budget talks, which begin soon, to sort out spending for the 2018-2019 fiscal year.

The school board wants to extend its contract with Jackson County Sheriff Lou Roberts, and the Jackson County Commission as his funding source, in the agreements that put five county deputies in district schools. The school board is also looking at extending its contract with Marianna Police Chief Hayes Baggett and the City of Marianna.

MPD provides two officers to the school system and is considering adding one more. But as of Tuesday, the city hadn't decided. The school board wants to continue its agreement with Graceville Police Department, which provides one SRO officer but expresses no interest in adding any others. It's also looking to possibly begin a contract with the Sneads Police Department. That agency has expressed a desire to provide one officer, but no final decision has been made by that city, either.

officials say.

The school board is also looking down the road at some school consolidations, which could reduce the number of officers needed. For instance, school representatives spoke of potentially having a Pre-K-12 school in Graceville, rather than the current elementary and middle/high school campuses there.

A new K-8 school is also planned in Marianna,

which would fold into one school the student populations of Golson and Riverside elementary schools and Marianna Middle School.

With so many decisions still up in the air with municipalities, and with county commissioners wanting more certain information before considering much beyond this year's existing commitment, school board officials continue to run numbers in hopes that those answers—and some help—may be forthcoming.

Lockey, as he has in a previous joint session, reminded school officials on Tuesday that the school board is a taxing authority in its own right and may have to make some tough decisions as a body in order to carry out the mandate.

Hurricanes are generally tracked for weeks before reaching land. Fortunately, hurricanes are predictable and can be tracked with early warnings, so that families often have a chance to prepare and evacuate if necessary. The family should have designated supplies ready including provisions for rapid evacuation. Practicing evacuations as a family will help insure that you are all prepared in the event of a hurricane.

- Assemble a Disaster Supply Kit in a large backpack or duffel bag or an easy-to-carry covered trash container.
- Make sure family members know what to do. Designate an emergency meeting spot and have a plan for your pets.
- Give younger children factual information about hurricanes in simple terms.
- Show adult and teen family members where electrical, gas and water shut-offs are located and how to turn them off. Make sure the proper tools are nearby.
- Make certain your doors have at least three hinges and a dead-bolt lock with a bolt at least 1 inch long.
- Install impact-resistant windows.
- Install permanent wood or metal stiffeners on your garage door. Or contact the door manufacturer about temporary supports you can easily attach and remove.
- Consider replacing gravel and rock landscaping with mulch or shredded bark, which can be less deadly in high winds.
- Make sure your roof covering and sheathing beneath it can resist high winds.
- Install straps or additional clips to securely fasten your roof to the frame structure.
- Trim trees and shrubbery. Pay particular attention to weak or dead branches that could fall on your home or your neighbor's.
- Learn the elevation level of your property and whether the land is flood-prone. This will help you know how your property will be affected from flooding.
- Identify levees and dams in your area and determine whether they pose a hazard to you.
- Learn hurricane evacuation routes. Determine where you would go and how you would get there if you needed to

Gulf of Mexico fishing season about to gear up

Gag grouper season will be opening for most of Florida the counties along the Gulf of Mexico and in all federal area starting June 1. The season runs through Dec. 31.

Franklin, Wakulla, Taylor and Jefferson counties are excluded because their season runs from April 1-June 30 and Sept. 1-Dec. 31. Monroe County is also out because it follows the Atlantic state season.

State waters are from shore

to 9 nautical miles out. Federal waters begin where state waters end and extend out to 200 nautical miles.

The minimum size limit for gag grouper in Gulf waters is 24 inches total length, and the daily bag limit is two

fish per person within the four grouper per person aggregate limit.

If you plan to fish for gag grouper in state or federal waters from a private recreational vessel, you must sign up as a gulf reef fish angler. To learn more,


Cofer missed most of the 2015-16 season due to a

Part-timers Danica, Helio garner full attention at Indy 500

INDIANAPOLIS — Part-time drivers and one-off rides are usually afterthoughts at the Indianapolis 500, where the sport's brightest stars tend to shine in the hot sun on the final Sunday of May.

This year, the part-time driver is Helio Castroneves.

And the one-off is Danica Patrick.

Throw in a deep, four-car stable from newly minted NASCAR Hall of Fame owner Roger Penske, the race favorite starting from the back row and a big name sitting out the race and the 102nd edition of the "Greatest Spectacle in Racing" has every expectation of living up to its nickname.

Yes, Castroneves can win this race for a record-tying fourth time. He's been chasing that mark since 2010 and has finished second three times, including last year when he was beaten by Takuma Sato, the first Japanese winner in race history.

Castroneves will have Penske calling his race as "The Captain" seeks his 17th Indy 500 victory. But this is so very different for the popular Brazilian. Penske needed him in sports cars this year so he moved Castroneves out of IndyCar, but promised him a seat in the race for a shot at that fourth jug of milk.

Castroneves is part of the talented Penske lineup that put all four of its Chevrolets in the front nine of the starting grid. He was the favorite to win the pole but didn't get the run he needed and wound up eighth, right behind Patrick.

Her return to racing's biggest stage comes seven years after Patrick left for NASCAR. The only woman to lead laps in both the Indy 500 and the Daytona 500

has no plans to race again after Sunday. Like Castroneves, she returned to Indy with a car capable of winning.

Chevrolet, winner of only two Indy 500s since its 2012 return to IndyCar, came to Indianapolis Motor Speedway intent on ending Honda's two-year winning streak. With the fastest cars in the field, there are Chevys in seven of the first nine starting spots. Four went to Penske drivers and three to Ed Carpenter Racing, which is fielding a car for Patrick and put team owner Ed Carpenter on the pole.

Everyone knows she can win her finale, but not many believe she will actually pull it off. Patrick believes in herself, though, and her peers have no doubt she will impress again at Indy.

"Not enough people give enough credit to her," Castroneves said. "She's not only stayed away so many years from IndyCar, and come back, not only to be in a race ... it shows that she's an amazing talent."

Kyle Busch looks to check off box, win at Charlotte

CONCORD, N.C. — Kyle Busch has won a Cup points race at every track on the NASCAR circuit except one — Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Twenty-eight starts, no checkered flags — and plenty of frustration.

The 33-year-old Busch is looking to check off that final box on his racing resume Sunday in the Coca-Cola 600, considered a crown jewel race in NASCAR.

Busch will start from the pole in the No. 18 Toyota, just as he has two other times at this track.

But bad breaks, often entirely out of his control, have kept him from making a trip to victory lane in Cup races and has become a source of irritation for him.

"It's important to me, but I'm not sure it's important in the grand scheme of things," Busch said Thursday night after turning a lap 191.836 mph on the 1 1/2-mile track. "It's certainly important to me and I would love to get that knocked out of the way and to be finished with it until another new track comes up on the circuit."

While there is the matter of completion in winning at every track, Busch is quick to point out that he has won a Cup race here.

He captured the All-Star race here in 2017 and the \$1 million prize that comes along with it. But the All-Star race is considered an exhibition and does not count toward season points.

"The last time I checked I have a trophy at home that says, 'winner at Charlotte Motor Speedway,' so I'll take that to my grave with me if I do never get a points win here," Busch said. "That will be my saving grace I guess."

This could be the year that Busch gets

it done.

He's the Cup points leader with nine top-10 finishes and seven top-fives in 12 starts this year. He also has won three races.

His chief competitor, Kevin Harvick, who has a series-best five Cup victories, will start at the back of the field after failing inspection three times prior to qualifying.

"You can only do so much with the stuff that you've got and everybody at Joe Gibbs Racing has been doing a great job and working hard to put together some better stuff each and every week and to get us closer to those other guys that are a bit faster," Busch said. "That's all we can do is put our heads together and try to make the most of it."

Maybe Busch is just snake-bitten here.

In 2013, a Fox Sports cable camera broke and fell on the track from overhead head in the first half of the race with Busch leading. The nylon rope severely damaged his car, which was traveling at 195 mph.

Still, Busch has mostly good thoughts about coming to Charlotte, where he has won eight Xfinity and seven Truck Series races.

"This is a race that you always enjoy coming to at Charlotte," Busch said. "I haven't won here in a points-paying event here I guess so it would certainly be nice to get that done here this weekend with the 600."

Busch feels like he has a great car heading into the weekend.

"Overall with the speed in our race car right now, once you get the balance right, the car has speed so you just got to keep it there," Busch said. "It seems like our box might be a little bit smaller than some other guys, but when we do get it there, it shows up."

Mariners land Denard Span, Alex Colome in deal with Rays

The Rays also sent for minor league right-hander Peter Bayer to Oakland for right-hander Wilmer Font. Oakland acquired Font from the Los Angeles Dodgers on April 25, and designated him for assignment Wednesday.

Warriors facing elimination but undaunted entering Game 6

HOUSTON — If the Golden State Warriors are worried as they head into Game 6 of the Western Conference finals on the brink of elimination, they aren't showing it.

"We have a chance to tie the series at home. That's a pretty good position to be in," coach Steve Kerr said. "We've got to win two basketball games and we've done that an awful lot, so we're very confident."

The defending champions trail Houston 3-2 in the best-of-seven series after consecutive wins by the Rockets, capped by Thursday night's 98-94 victory. Now the series shifts to Oracle Arena, a place where the Warriors have lost just one time in their last 17 playoff games.

Stephen Curry said the Warriors are encouraged despite falling behind in the series because they believe both games could have gone their way and that a few simple corrections will get them back on track.

The Rockets believe they can absorb this loss and don't seem daunted by the setback, noting that they found ways to win in the regular season in many games where Paul sat out with injuries.

"I don't have a doubt," D'Antoni said. "They see the challenge ... whether CP's there or not, it's a heck of a challenge, and they're up to it. They're looking forward to it."

James Harden, who has struggled offensively in the last two games and went 0 for 11 on 3s in Game 5,

There is pressure on everybody."

While that may be true, the onus is on Harden to step up and deliver an MVP-caliber performance if the

Rockets hope to close out this series. Harden has had plenty of playoff disappointments in the last few years and embraces the chance to get Houston back into the finals.

"It's an opportunity that a lot of people never had and probably won't ever have," he said. "It's our job to go out there and have fun with it and do the same thing we've been doing. We want to take advantage of it."

While the Rockets will be down a starter, the Warriors could get one back if Andre Iguodala can return on Saturday. The Warriors have missed the defensive presence of Iguodala who has missed the last two games with a bruised left knee.

Iguodala is listed on the injury report as questionable for Game 6 and Kerr said he didn't have an update on his condition on Friday. But he did address what it would mean to Golden State if he's healthy enough to go on Saturday.

"He's a great player," Kerr said. "He's one of our keys,

and we've missed him the last two games. But we can't count on it. Injuries happen, and you've just got to play with whoever's out there. So we're hoping he's back, and we'll see what happens."

Iguodala's absence has been magnified in this series that has morphed into a defensive slugfest instead of the high-scoring shootout that most expected when it began. The Rockets take great pride in the fact that they've limited Golden State to less than 100 points in the last two games and think continuing to play great defense is the only way they'll advance.

"It's something we talked about building up all year," Houston's P.J. Tucker said.



But admitting that it might not have been all that safe to begin with, NASCAR blinked.



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



LeBron, Cavs facing win-or-else Game 6 vs. Celtics

CLEVELAND — Cavaliers coach Tyronn Lue was answering a question about Boston's defense on LeBron James during a teleconference when he tripped the security system at his home.

A piercing alarm sounded.

"Uh-oh," Lue said Thursday day as he punched in a code to silence the screaming siren.

While Lue and his home were clearly safe, and the light-hearted moment passed quickly, it was also symbolic of Cleveland's urgent situation.

The Cavs are in a dangerous spot.

Beaten for the third time in Boston in these home-sweet-home Eastern Conference finals, Cleveland will face its second elimination game of the postseason on Friday night at Quicken Loans Arena.

Game 6 is for everything.

Except, of course, if there's a Game 7 on Sunday in Boston.

Fueled by fueled-up Boston fans who must feel some sort of birth-right to see their cherished

team play in the Finals, the youthful Celtics again showed zero fear or hesitation on their parquet floor on Wednesday night during a 96-83 win in Game 5 that was never in any doubt.

Despite shooting only 36 percent, the Celtics improved to 10-0 at home in the playoffs as coach Brad Stevens changed his starting lineup, shortened his rotation to seven and re-

leased waves of defenders at James, who looked worn down as he attempts to advance to the NBA Finals for the eighth consecutive year.

Lue noticed early in Game 5 that James was dragging, but he's confident the 33-year-old, who was chosen All-NBA first team for a record 12th time, will be ready to save his season and prolong what could be his final games with the Cavs.

"I know he'll be ready to play Game 6, so fatigue won't be a problem and an issue," Lue said. "I'm pretty sure a lot of guys are tired during this stretch of the year. If I had to pick one guy and choose one guy to prevail, it would be LeBron. I know he'll be great come tomorrow."

Stevens started center Aron Baynes for the first time in the series and the move helped slow James, who had been crushing the Celtics when guard Terry Rozier switched on him.

Rozier fronted James and got help from Baynes, the 6-foot-10, 254-pound Australian who contributed seven rebounds, six points and attitude.

"We've got a lot of tough guys on our team," Stevens said. "But I think they all will tell you Baynes is one of the toughest we've all been around."

Now Stevens needs his team to show that same tenacity on the road, where Boston is just 1-6.

The Cavs, on the other hand, are counting on James to rebound.

He pushed as hard as he could in Game 5, but for one of the only times in what has been a transcendent 13th postseason, he couldn't summon greatness.

He didn't have his usual burst. He bent at the waist grabbing his shorts, his breathing labored. During timeouts, he wiped sweat and perhaps some frustration from his forehead.

Body camera video is latest setback for Milwaukee police

MILWAUKEE — Body camera video showing police using a stun gun on an NBA player over a parking violation is just the latest setback for efforts to improve relations between Milwaukee officers and the city's black population.

The confrontation involving Sterling Brown of the Milwaukee Bucks also represents the first major challenge for new Police Chief Alfonso Morales, who took the job in February promising to restore public trust in a department besieged in recent years by excessive-force lawsuits.

"Milwaukee has all the ingredients to be a great city, but each time an incident like this occurs, we are reminded of how much work we still have to do," the city's Common Council said in a statement Thursday.

Morales, a lifelong Milwaukee resident born to Mexican immigrants, pledged to be more transparent with cases of police misconduct, and he's already faced TV cameras twice this month to apologize for his officers' actions. The other case involved four officers caught on video kicking and punching an African-American man while he was restrained on the ground.

The Jan. 26 video of Brown showed how a simple interaction quickly escalated after an officer approached him about parking in a handicap spot around 2 a.m. at a Walgreens drug store. When their conversation became tenser, the officer called more squad cars for help. As Brown is surrounded by four officers, he's asked to take his hands out of his pockets and a scuffle ensues. Within seconds, one officer yelled "Taser! Taser! Taser!"

The video became public after the department finished its internal investigation.

The officers were disciplined because they "acted inappropriately," Morales said. Brown was not charged with anything.

The chief did not name the officers or say how they were disciplined. The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, citing unidentified sources, said three officers received suspensions ranging from two to 15 days.

"I am sorry this incident escalated to this level," said Morales, who left a news conference Wednesday without taking questions.

The police department did not identify the races of the officers, but most of them in the video appeared to be white. Brown is black.

Morales' predecessor, Edward Flynn, had a combative relationship with some city officials during his decade on the job. The Common Council became so frustrated with him that members passed a resolution asking the state to empower the council to fire him. On Thursday, a council member repeated that

Brown has indicated he will file a lawsuit against the police. If he does, the complaint will add to a long list of litigation the

city has faced over officer misconduct.

Last year, Milwaukee paid \$2.3 million to settle a lawsuit over the death of Don-

tre Hamilton, a mentally ill black man fatally shot by a police officer after the officer roused him from a park bench downtown.

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

NFL sparks new questions over anthem

ATLANTA — With its popularity threatened and critics stretching all the way to the White House, the NFL just wanted to get past the debate over taking a knee during the national anthem.

Put the focus back on football.

Instead, the league seemed to muddle the divisive issue even more with a new policy that stirred up defenders of free speech, prompted a couple of owners to quickly backtrack and raised all sorts of potential questions heading into next season.

After a tumultuous season, NFL owners wrapped up their spring meeting in Atlanta by announcing Wednesday that players

would be required to stand for the national anthem if they're on the field before a game, but gave them the option of staying in the locker room if they wanted to carry on the Colin Kaepernick-inspired campaign

sacred part of the American experience to those who believe the right to protest during the anthem is also in the best tradition of a free but imperfect society.

Yet, it was clear to everyone that the owners wanted

to quell a firestorm by moving any further protests away from the public eye — especially if it lured back disgruntled fans while appeasing President Donald Trump and his vocal base of support.

Kneel if you like.

But stay out of sight.

"This is a fear of the diminished bottom line," said defensive end Chris Long of the Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles.

"It's also fear of a president turning his base against a corporation. This is not patriotism. Don't get it confused. These owners don't love America more than the players demonstrating and taking real action to improve it."

Trump stoked the issue during a political campaign, saying the NFL

should fire any players who kneel during the anthem. During an interview that aired Thursday morning on "Fox & Friends," he praised the league for doing "the right thing."

"You have to stand proudly for the national anthem," Trump said. Or "you shouldn't be playing, you shouldn't be there. Maybe they shouldn't be in the country."

Vice President Mike Pence called it "a win for the fans, a win for (the president), and a win for America."

The NFL didn't consult the players' union on its new policy, though Goodell stressed that the league had talked to countless players over the past year and was committed both financially and philosophically to the fight for social justice.

Penske: Guarantee full-time guys Indy 500 starting spots

INDIANAPOLIS — Roger Penske has a very simple solution for the predicament the Indianapolis 500 created when one of its most popular drivers, James Hinchcliffe, was bumped from the field during qualifying last weekend.

Teams that run the entire season should be guaranteed spots in the biggest race of the year.

"As I look at it now," the Hall of Fame team owner said, "with sponsors being so important and the teams building up for Indianapolis, and that really being the hallmark of probably your sponsorship running at Indy, it's a real tough pill to take if you don't make the race."

Indeed, one of the largest tents on the infield of Indianapolis Motor Speedway carries the logo of Arrow Electronics, the primary sponsor on Hinchcliffe's car for Schmidt Peterson Motorsports.

Hinchcliffe is also one of the faces of IndyCar, not to mention engine supplier Honda and several other sponsors, and commercials featuring him continued to air even after he missed the field.

"I think we need to step back and look at this and be sure that people who commit for a full season know they have a place in the Indy 500," Penske said, "because the world has changed."

NASCAR learned long ago the importance of keeping sponsors happy. So while it's common to have more cars attempt to qualify on a week-to-week basis than could fit in its field, the sanctioning organization implemented a charter system that assures a spot for the full-time teams.

Purists might argue that bump day is a part of the Indy 500 mystique, and that it adds a crucial wrinkle of drama to qualifying weekend. The race against the clock to make the field of 33 can be just as heart-

breaking as anything that happens when the green flag drops Memorial Day weekend.

Penske has experienced that heartache, missing out on the field entirely one year.

He understands the importance of keeping bump day alive, and the fact that 35 cars were vying for 33 spots shows the health of the sport. But he also thinks there could be a compromise where perhaps the last 10 or so spots — after the full-time teams get theirs — would be left open for anyone to grab.

"I don't think anybody would think we're breaking with tradition," said Penske, adding that already he's spoken with Hulman & Company CEO Mark Miles and IndyCar President Jay Frye about potential changes.

"In '94 we didn't make the race. I remember walking out of pit lane with 100,000 people qualification day and going back to my garage and it was a real blow," Penske said. "On the other hand it made us better going forward. This is a place you want to race and you have to be there going in."

Guaranteed spots isn't the only idea that has floated through the garage area.

Several drivers mentioned eliminating double points for the Indy 500 — or eliminating points entirely — which would have made the blow to Hinchcliffe's team a bit more palatable. Others said they wanted a true bump day to return to Indy, where the field is set Saturday with the last few spots available Sunday.

That would also make it more likely for the top teams to survive.

"It's so exciting to watch, just unbelievable," 2014 series champ Will Power said. "Very sad for Hinchcliffe. He's in the championship and it's a double points race and he doesn't get to race. But on the other hand, you can't take all this lightly. There are serious consequences for small mistakes."

Perilous pursuit: The hunt is on for The Prince in season 2 of 'SIX'

For much of the western world, war is either something of the past or something happening far away. Acts of wartime heroism and sacrifice are honored periodically throughout the year, but seldom are they deeply reflected upon.

Television and films have long tried to bring the realities of war to those who will never experience it themselves. Notable small-screen attempts include "M*A*S*H" and "Band of Brothers," but these seldom possess the grit found in big-screen depictions. 2017 saw the

exception to this, with the premiere of History's "SIX," which has its season 2 premiere appropriately airing on Monday, May 28: Memorial Day.

"SIX" is a high-intensity, high-stakes drama that takes its inspiration from the real-life SEAL Team Six, a prominent component of the U.S. Armed Forces' military division focused on counterterrorism. Each episode delves into the split-second decisions that members of SEAL Team must make, and how those decisions have a lasting effect both for the team members involved and for the surrounding community. Although the team isn't adverse to

providing aid if possible, the mission at hand is always top of mind, with the nation's security of primary importance.

SEAL Team Six is comprised of quite a diverse cast. Barry Sloane ("Longmire") is Joe "Bear" Graves, the team's senior chief special warfare operator. Providing support are Kyle Schmid ("Being Human") as Alex Caulder and Juan Pablo Raba ("Narcos") as Ricky "Buddha" Ortiz. Rounding out the cast are Jaylen Moore ("Bad Moms," 2016) as Armin Khan and Edwin Hodge ("Sleepy Hollow") as Robert Chase III, fellow special warfare operators. After the events of season 1, SEAL Team Six re-

quired a new member, found in Eric Ladin's ("Bosch") role as special warfare operator first class, Trevor.

Season 1 of "SIX" wasted little time wading into the moral grey zone of war, with senior chief special warfare operator Richard "Rip" Taggart (Walton Goggins, "The Hateful Eight," 2015) quickly reduced to former senior chief special warfare operator after shooting a man who had claimed to have American citizenship. A few years later, while earning a living working in private security at a Nigerian school for girls, Rip was taken hostage, prompting his former team to find and rescue him. The team's relentless hunt did not go unrewarded, but a betrayal ultimately resulted in a violent assault on Rip, filling fans with unease as they desperately longed to know the character's fate.

If the trailers and promos are any indication, it does appear that Rip is still alive — for now, at least, as he appears to be comatose. Season 2 finds the team on the hunt for the man behind Rip's shooter, a powerful figure known as "The Prince" (Nikolai Nikolaeff, "Daredevil"). The Prince is fully aware of SEAL Team's quest for vengeance, but he will not hold back or compromise on his own personal desires, seemingly fearless in the face of the six.

While Trevor may be the latest member of the SEAL team, Laden isn't the only fresh face in season 2. Olivia Munn ("Miles from Tomorrowland") plays the role of CIA operations officer Gina Cline, who seemingly has a tense past with some members of the team. While little is known about Gina pre-premiere, she appears to be a means of communication for the team, able to press captive terrorists into providing the information required to help locate and take down The Prince. Her fearless, determined spirit makes her a formidable ally for the team, but for them to truly succeed together, trust must be established.

Much of the show's success thus far stems from its gritty and authentic portrayal of covert military operations, particularly in terms of how the characters battle with their own sense of duty and morality. Rip's actions right at the start of the series exemplifies this. During a promo spot for "SIX," Goggins noted that Rip's decision to shoot was merely him "reacting to the trauma he's been under over the course of his time in the service." Additionally, "SIX" doesn't shy away from complicating traditional notions of friend and foe.

Even those initially seen as villainous can have understandable motives, and for Goggins this is essential. Viewers may have wanted to side with Rip, but Goggins believes that it was "as important to him to tell [his captor's] story" as it was to tell [his own] story. Fleshing out both the terrorists and the SEAL Team members are put some at odds with


the show, but such an act holds much significance in times like ours, when hero and villain are often simply a matter of circumstance and perspective.

In humanizing warfare and conflict, "SIX" challenges viewers not to forgive the violent actions of others, but to perhaps consider the trauma that may have led to someone committing such acts. The story always keeps SEAL Team Six at the forefront, but in doing so, it also reveals that even the toughest of soldiers battle internal emotions and are weighed down by the endless onslaught of despair, doubt and aggression. Redeeming moments are found when the team can conquer its tasked mission, validating the uncertainty of actions past and promising a more rewarding future.

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

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

hollywood Q&A

Q: Is it my imagination, or do I hear Tim Allen narrating the advertisements for Michigan?

A: It's not your imagination: the voice behind the popular ad series is pure Tim Allen.

Allen has been voicing the ads for the "Pure Michigan" campaign since its launch in 2008. It wasn't a tough decision for him—he's a (near) lifelong Michigander, and is passionate about his beloved state getting the recognition it deserves.

"I have been here since I was 11 years old," he told Ad Age magazine in an interview about the campaign. "I'm a big car freak and was a big Michigan booster when I was a kid. I came from Colorado, which is a nice state, but when we came here there were cars and lakes and it was just really an excit-

ing place to be, and it never got any recognition."

Indeed, Allen's real passion for the state is credited as the source of the campaign's success.

In an interview with Forbes magazine about the campaign, David West, who worked for the Michigan Economic Development Corporation when it was commissioning the ads, ranked Allen's importance at "maybe 11, on a scale of one to 10."

"It's really authentic sentiment about Michigan, and you can hear it in him," West said.

Allen is, of course, no stranger to voice work. He's still best remembered for his on-screen role in "Home Improvement," but his next biggest role has probably been the voice of Buzz Lightyear in the Toy Story movies.

It's also not his only commercial work. You may also have heard the

"big car freak's" voice in ads for Chevrolet.

Q: Is it true they overdubbed Bob Hoskins' voice in "The Long Good Friday"? It sounds like his voice to me.

A: It's not true, actually, but it almost was.

This may seem incredible, since it's now revered as a gangster film classic, but the producers of "The Long Good Friday" (1980) were pretty sure it would be a failure and were trying to cut their losses before it was even released.

They were afraid that star Bob Hoskins' thick, London accent would be unintelligible to other audiences, so they planned to bring in an actor with a slightly more proper accent to overdub his parts.

Hoskins was furious and sued the company to stop it. He drummed up support from some

famous acting friends to back his case: Alec Guinness, Richard Burton and Warren Beatty all went on record insisting on the actor's right to keep his voice in the film.

Ironically, this legal fight might have been the thing that got the film released. Even before the suit, the production company, ITC, had doubts about the film. Hoskins' suit brought the attention of another company, Handmade Films (co-owned by former Beatle George Harrison), which bought the rights from ITC and released the film, with Hoskins' voice intact.

Hoskins' voice wasn't the only thing threatening the film's success—it was also nearly sunk by politics. The film's plot involved Irish Republican terrorists, but the real-world Irish Republican Army was intensifying its bombing activities around the time the film was being finished. ITC felt these real-world

events would hurt the box office, so they wanted to "dump" it on TV instead of in the cinemas.

Fortunately, Handmade had no such concerns and gave the film a wide release. The film was, of course, a huge hit. It was received ecstatically by critics, too—including American ones, who supposedly shouldn't have been able to understand the dialogue.

Q: Did Robin Williams do the singing parts for the genie in "Aladdin"? It sounds like him, but Disney usually has different people doing the speaking and singing voices, especially when "Aladdin" came out.

A: Robin Williams did most of the singing parts for the genie in "Aladdin" (1992), but not all.

The musical numbers that feature the genie—"Arabian Nights," "Friend Like Me" and "Prince Ali"—are also comedic bits, and we all know that when it comes to comedy, no one can imitate Robin Williams. Well, no one except Bruce Adler, apparently.

Williams' shortcomings as a singer showed when it came time to record "Arabian Nights." He was unable to hit some of the high notes, so the producers hired Adler (who had previously done some singing in 1991's "Beauty and the

Beast") to fill in. "He was able to imitate Williams' voice so well that it is difficult to tell where the comic stops and Adler starts," Thomas S. Hischak, author of "Disney Voice Actors: A Biographical Dictionary," said.

Indeed, Adler repeated his feat in the sequel, "Aladdin and the King of Thieves" (1996).

As you point out, having the same actor do both the talking and singing for a character was uncommon for Disney at the time, and you don't have to look far for proof. "Aladdin's" main characters, Aladdin and Jasmine, had separate dialogue actors (Scott Weinger and Linda Larkin) and singing actors (Brad Kane and Lea Salonga).

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
