Sheriff: Body of Deena Zimmerman found

Boyfriend charged with murder, held without bond

Officials with the Washington County Sheriff's Office on Friday confirmed that the body of Deena Zimmerman had been found in the eastern part of that county.

Zimmerman, a former Marianna resident who was living in Caryville at the time of her disappearance, was reported missing by family members earlier in the week. Investiga-

tors say she was last seen leaving her Graceville Correctional Facility nursing job just after 12 a.m. Monday, May 28.

On Tuesday, WCSO investigators began looking into Zimmerman's reported disappearance. Officials say investigators received information that led them to a grave site in eastern Washington County and, late Thursday afternoon, a female body matching Zimmerman's description — and with nu-

merous injuries "consistent to stab wounds" — was uncovered.

Washington County authorities on Thursday announced the arrest of Zimmerman's live-in boyfriend, 48-year-old Sean Dowis, who is being held in the Washington County Jail, without bond, on an open count of murder.

Also arrested was the



Final Canoeing for Cancer is on, but delayed

The 10th annual — and final — Canoeing for Cancer adventure in Jackson County was supposed to be held June 2, but a rising river has the organizer worried. As a result, the event will be held later this year, probably in September or October.

Event founder Sheila Hayes says she wants to wrap things up on a high note and that the 10th year seemed like a nice, even number on which to anchor this most mobile fundraiser. She's afraid the trip might be ill-advised in the wake of sub-tropical storm Alberto. The Chipola River, which is part of the annual passage, is expected to

rise more this week, and could exceed the projected high point, just below flood stage, if rains continue to contribute to the body of water.

The Canoeing for Cancer fundraisers have easily gathered in more than \$30,000 over the years to help cancer victims in a number of ways, from buying the fuel it takes to get to treatment, to paying medical bills not covered by insurance. Participants give \$20 each to be part of the four-mile meander from Spring Creek Park, down the creek and into the Chipola River, to finish at the Magnolia Bridge boat ramp.

The set-up later this year will mirror the

Sneads

New councilman: On making history and shaping a future

In April, the Rev. Daryl Johnson made history in the town he and wife Angela have called home for more than 20 years. He was elected that month to serve on the Sneads Town Council, becoming the first African-American to hold a position on the board.

On May 21, he was sworn into office.

In his very first vote that night, via a successful motion he had seconded, Johnson helped set another precedent. As the board reorganized for the new political year, the action taken in that vote made long-time council member

Helen Grice the first-ever female chairperson of the council.

Roughly two weeks into his new post, Johnson is still getting congratulations and well-wishes in the community over his successful bid for office. One elderly constituent pulled over when she drove by his house and saw him working in his yard. She blew her horn, summoned him over, and in congratulating him said she was a long-time resident who knew and appreciates that he has made history in being the first person of color to serve on the board.

That his election carries

McCloskey asks Nixon ouster

A House discussion of whether President Nixon's actions in the Watergate affair are grounds for impeachment has been initiated by Rep. Paul N. McCloskey Jr., R-Calif., who stated in his letter that the President's May 22 statement constituted grounds for impeachment.

In that statement, Nixon said: "Therefore, I instructed Mr. (H.R.) Haldeman and Mr. (John) Ehrlichman to ensure that the investigation of the break-in not expose either an unrelated covert operation of the CIA or the activities of the White House investigations unit..." McCloskey said, "To take steps 'to ensure' that criminal activities not be exposed, under ordinary rules of criminal law, is to obstruct justice, a felony." — JACKSON COUNTY FLORIDIAN, TUESDAY, JUNE 5, 1973

Today in History

Today is **Saturday, June 2**, the 153rd day of 2018. There are 212 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On **June 2, 1953**, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place in London's Westminster Abbey, 16 months after the death of her father, King George VI.

On this date:

- In 1863**, during the Civil War, Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman wrote a letter to his wife, Ellen, in which he commented, "Vox populi, vox humbug" (The voice of the people is the voice of humbug).
- In 1886**, President Grover Cleveland, 49, married Frances Folsom, 21, in the Blue Room of the White House. (To date, Cleveland is the only president to marry in the executive mansion.)
- In 1897**, Mark Twain was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London that "the report of my death was an exaggeration." (Twain was responding to a report in the New York Herald that he was "grievously ill" and "possibly dying.")

- In 1924**, Congress passed, and President Calvin Coolidge signed, a measure guaranteeing full American citizenship for all Native Americans born within U.S. territorial limits.
- In 1941**, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, died in New York of a degenerative disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis; he was 37.
- In 1946**, Italy held a referendum which resulted in the Italian monarchy being abolished in favor of a republic.
- In 1966**, U.S. space probe Surveyor 1 landed on the moon and began transmitting detailed photographs of the lunar surface.
- In 1976**, Arizona Republic investigative reporter Don Bolles (bohlz) was mortally wounded by a bomb planted underneath his car; he died 11 days later.

- (Prosecutors believed Bolles was targeted because he had written stories that upset a liquor wholesaler; three men were convicted of the killing.)
- In 1983**, half of the 46 people aboard an Air Canada DC-9 were killed after fire broke out on board, forcing the jetliner to make an emergency landing at Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport.
- In 1986**, for the first time, the public could watch the proceedings of the U.S. Senate on television as a six-week experiment began.
- In 1997**, Timothy McVeigh was convicted of murder and conspiracy in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City that killed 168 people. (McVeigh was executed in June 2001.)
- In 2002**, a fire broke out at

Buckingham Palace, forcing the evacuation of hundreds of people and marring the four-day celebration of Queen Elizabeth II's 50 years on the throne.

- Ten years ago:** Massachusetts Sen. Edward M. Kennedy underwent 3 1/2 hours of risky and delicate surgery to cut out as much of his cancerous brain tumor as possible. The space shuttle Discovery linked up with the international space station, and the 10 space travelers immediately got ready to install the Japanese lab Kibo (KEE'-boh). Bo Diddley, 79, a founding father of rock 'n' roll, died in Archer, Florida, at age 79. Actor-director Mel Ferrer died in Santa Barbara, California, at age 90.
- Five years ago:** Egypt's highest court ruled that the nation's interim parliament was illegally elected, though it stopped short of dissolving the chamber immediately. Indiana Pacers center Roy Hibbert was fined \$75,000 by the NBA for using a gay slur and profanity during his news conference after Game 6 of the Eastern Conference finals; Hibbert apologized for the comments.

If you could go back to a pivotal age in your life, say 16 years old, and start over again, would you choose to do it?

Think about all the things we could choose to do differently. We could relive our lives and never say a bad word about anyone. We could do more listening and less talking. We could choose this career and discard that one. We could travel, learn to speak another language, take better care of our health. We could, well, be better, smarter people.

My husband and I fell into this conversation during a recent holiday respite. While both of us wish we could have avoided some mistakes and missteps and make better use of our time, neither of us said "Yes, I'd like to go back and relive most of my life."

My guess is that not all but most people would make the same choice, if granted the option of starting over.

Maybe we're happy with the way things turned out. Maybe we're just tired and can't envision pushing the rock up the hill again for decades. Heritage groups reflect on Memorial Day

Blue Springs Society, Children of the American Revolution and Chipola Junior American Citizens Club members recently learned details of the service of eight veterans who gave their lives while serving our nation.

After the May 27 program, as wind and light rain from the forward bands of Subtropical Storm Alberto swirled through historic St. Luke's Episcopal Church cemetery, members placed the Flag of the United States of America at the eight headstones of those who gave all while serving.

Of the eight, Lt. Col. William Hall Milton IV (Hal) has the most recent marker. He gave his life in 1998 when two helicopters collided during a night training mission from Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada. His marker is distinguished by an inscribed helicopter and two feet with six toes on each to signify that he was a member of the 66th Combat Search and Rescue Squadron. "That Others May Live" is the motto of the squadron. Hal was 41 and is also buried at Arlington National Cemetery with the members of both helicopter crews.

Douglas H. Herrin was a 2nd Lt. in the United States Marine Corps when he gave his life in 1945 during World War II. He was reburied in St. Luke's Churchyard (cemetery) in 1949. Douglas was 24.

Thaddeus Hentz Smith, a Lt. in the U.S. Army, died in Fleury-Sur-Aire, France in October 1918, just three weeks before the armistice on Nov. 11. He was 27.

Joseph B. G. Roulhac served as a 1st Lt. in Company B 15th Confederate Cavalry. He died in 1865 near the end of the Civil War at age 40.

On Sept. 27, 1864, Henry O. Bassett, John C. Carter, and Littleton Myrick died while defending Marianna. Capt. Henry Bassett was 39 and a former sheriff of Jackson County. He was home on leave from Company E 6th Florida Infantry when he volunteered with Norwood's "Cradle to Grave" to defend Marianna. He was bludgeoned to death on the banks of Stage Creek just south of St. Luke's Episcopal Church. Pvt. John C. Carter, of Company E 6th Florida Infantry, had fought in the Battle of Chickamauga where he was wounded and given a medical discharge. When the emergency alarm was sounded, the 22-year old volunteered to serve with Norwood's men to help defend Marianna. He was burned to death inside St. Luke's Episcopal Church. Pvt. Littleton Myrick, 20, also lost his life inside St. Luke's that day. He was home on leave from Company B 15th Confederate Cavalry.

Private John J. Pittman was serving with Company E 8th Florida Infantry when he died fighting for the Confederate States of America on Aug. 30, 1862. He was 19.

Knowing a little about each veteran being honored gave a greater significance to the placing of the flags.

C.A.R. and JAC have six regular meetings a year and take part in many special events. 

Senior Forester gives tips for establishing a pine forest this year

Are you considering establishing a pine plantation on your property this year? Or planting pines as part of a native plant community restoration? If you're not familiar with the process, the task can seem daunting. Calhoun County Senior Forester Philip Garrett, with the Florida Forest Service, offers tips for establishing your pine forest this year.

"There are many variables to consider when preparing to plant trees including, site prep, choosing the correct species, when to order and planting methods," Garrett said. "Contacting your local county foresters to help with these decisions can help you steer clear of costly unnecessary practices."

Planting pines begins with proper site preparation such as mulching, drum chopping, herbicide application, and burning. These initial steps are critical for seedling survival, but can be very expensive so choosing the appropriate method for your property will be essential. There are many cost-share opportunities available through state and federal programs to assist landowners with reforestation and management. It is important to explore these options and choose the program suitable to

meet the landowner's specific objectives.

Another important consideration is choosing the correct pine species for your soil type and management objectives. Some common species in our area are slash, longleaf and loblolly pine. Not only is the correct species critical but also planting at the correct density. For instance, higher densities are typically favored for pine straw operations, while a lower density is better if timber and/or wildlife is your top objective.

Also, it's important to order your seedlings early as nurseries sell out quickly. Depending on what type of seedling (bareroot or containerized) and the species you order, choosing the correct planting method (hand or machine) is very important. Improperly planted seedlings can result in poor survival — and a poor return on your investment.

A properly established and managed forest can be a great investment for you and your family. Another View

Gun owners should be held responsible for failing to secure firearms

A 17-year-old boy cannot legally walk into a sporting goods store and buy a .38 revolver. Not even in gun-loving Texas. Yet Dimitrios Pagourtzis was armed with a shotgun and revolver when he entered his Santa Fe high school last week and started shooting. His victims include a substitute teacher, a foreign exchange student and a football player. The guns Pagourtzis used to kill and injure nearly two dozen people belonged to the shooter's father, according to Texas Gov. Greg Abbott.

That father should be held responsible by law enforcement and the courts. Authorities should make an example of him to send a message to all gun owners about the importance of locking up firearms. Too often, the weapons used in school shootings come from the perpetrator's home, where adults failed to properly secure them. Adam Lanza's mother was a gun enthusiast before the 20-year-old used her guns to kill her, 26 people at Sandy Hook Elementary school and himself. The guns were acquired legally, registered, not adequately secured and used to massacre innocent children.

Then there are the so-called accidents that happen after young children have access to guns left in drawers, purses or glove boxes by adults. These children include Jayden Choate of Elgin, Iowa. In 2016, the 4-year-old picked up a gun in a neighbor's home, shot himself in the head and died.

Every single time a young person gets a gun and shoots himself or others, the firearm owner should be held responsible. Every single time.


Criminally charging these individuals and press conferences announcing charges may be the only way to get through to gun owners to secure firearms, regardless of whether they have children living in a home. Trigger locks can be purchased for as little as \$13 at Walmart. A search of the retailer's products online also returned dozens of gun safes for less than \$100.

Yet nearly 2 million American children live in homes with guns that are not stored properly, according to Everytown for Gun Safety, a nonprofit organization dedicated to reducing violence. It reports there is an unintentional shooting involving a child in this country every 34 hours. There have been at least 70 such shootings so far in 2018.

While the U.S. Congress and state officials bear much responsibility in failing to do more to prevent gun violence, individual Americans, including parents and prosecutors, can do more. There would be many fewer "accidents" involving small children and shootings by teens if gun-owning adults locked up their weapons.

Those who do not do so should be held criminally, and very publicly, accountable. That may be the only hope for saving children — and their classmates — from gun violence.



No, I'm not obstructing justice

When President Donald Trump was admonishing Attorney General Jeff Sessions to charge me with obstruction of justice recently, I was at Harvard University sharing how we intend to give every child from Oakland, California, the opportunity to attend college.

Like all cities, Oakland suffers from disparities. Our African-American and Latino children finish college at vastly lower rates than whites. That achievement gap is a tragic legacy of our country's racist history.

I sought elected office to fix that — to build an equitable city where every resident, from every neighborhood and background, has the same opportunity to thrive. I believe in the American promise of "justice for all."

Mr. President, I am not obstructing justice. I am seeking it.

The president takes issue with a tweet I posted in February in which I notified residents of an impending raid by Immigration and Customs Enforcement in the Bay Area, including Oakland. I wanted to make sure that people were prepared, not panicked, and that they understood their legal rights.

I did this for people such as Maria Mendoza-Sanchez, who immigrated to the United States from Mexico 24 years ago. She learned English, earned a degree and worked as a nurse in the

cancer ward of Oakland's public hospital. She and her husband, Eusebio, raised four children and bought a home.

"It's supposed to be that if you assimilate to the culture of the country, you pay taxes, you work, you graduate college, you have a better chance," Mendoza-Sanchez told the San Francisco Chronicle.

Last August, Mendoza-Sanchez and her husband were deported. They were ripped from their U.S.-born children — exiled to a country they had not set foot in for two decades. And they were taken from Oakland, where they had contributed to our community's collective health, well-being and safety.

Under the Obama administration, Mendoza-Sanchez's status — with a clean record, a good job and college-bound children — made her and her husband eligible for deferrals as they sought citizenship. But under the Trump administration, undocumented residents are vilified as "dangerous criminals" or, as of last week — simply "animals." Trump has more than doubled deportations of people without any criminal convictions.

There are people like Mendoza-Sanchez in communities across our country: hard-working, tax-paying, law-abiding. They are parents, neighbors and caretakers. Their stories may have begun in another country, but — to our blessing and advantage —

continue in ours.

They deserve justice too.

Far from the days when Trump's Scottish mother gained her naturalization so easily, today's immigration system is broken. It separates families, endangers our economy that relies on a substantial undocumented workforce and doesn't provide legal representation to those seeking political asylum.

As mayor, it's my duty to protect my residents — especially when our most vulnerable are unjustly attacked. As a leader, it's my duty to call out this administration's anti-immigrant fearmongering for what it is: a racist lie.

It's well documented that immigrants — even undocumented immigrants — commit fewer crimes than American-born citizens. And diverse, sanctuary cities such as Oakland are seeing dramatic decreases in crime.

Back at Harvard, I was proud to show how our community has increased the number of college-enrolled, African-American students by 14 percent and Latino students by 11 percent in just one year. We're determined to close the achievement gap one student, one family and one community at a time.

We call our plan the Oakland Promise. It exemplifies America's promise. Because Oakland doesn't obstruct justice, we seek it.

Is the Trump Tower meeting proof of collusion?

If there is an Exhibit A in the case that the Trump campaign colluded with Russia to fix the presidential election, it is the June 9, 2016, meeting in Trump Tower between three top campaign officials — Donald Trump Jr., Paul Manafort and Jared Kushner — and a group of Russians who promised dirt on Hillary Clinton.

And if there is a key document about the meeting — an Exhibit A of Exhibit A — it is the email from British music promoter Rob Goldstone to Trump Jr. proposing the get-together. Read in light of the accusations leveled against President Trump and his campaign after the election, the email almost screams: WE WANT TO COLLUDE WITH YOU.

But did it really? Newly released testimony from several participants in the Trump Tower meeting suggests the answer could well be no.

In the email, Goldstone told Trump Jr. that a powerful Russian had "offered to provide the Trump campaign with some official documents and information that would incriminate Hillary and her dealings with Russia and would be very useful to your father."

"This is obviously very high level and sensitive information," Goldstone continued, "but is part of Russia and its government's support for Mr. Trump."

Russia and its government's support for Mr. Trump — to some analysts, those were the key words of collusion, along with Trump Jr.'s response: "Seems we have some time and if it's what you say I love it."

But what, precisely, did the Goldstone email mean? What were the intentions behind it? Did it reveal a Russian campaign to assist Trump? Was it a key part of a collusion scheme to fix the 2016 election?

The just-released testimony, which includes transcripts of two interviews with Goldstone, is from the Senate Judiciary Committee's Trump-Russia investigation. It suggests that the language of the email — the words that electrified the political world when they were reported last year — were less an invitation to collusion than what Goldstone called "publicist puff," that is, inflated phrases

used to entice the candidate's top aides to accept a meeting.

And then, when Trump Jr. agreed to the meeting, the Russians, far from offering the promised dirt on Clinton, made a conventional, lobby-like pitch — not a surprise, given that the American law and lobbying firm Baker Hostetler was behind much of it — to win Trump support for getting rid of U.S. sanctions against Russia in the Magnitsky Act. There's no evidence that anyone proposed a deal; instead, the Russians got in the door, made their pitch and left when the Trump team wasn't interested.

Goldstone's email pitch made the meeting sound like something much bigger. But reality did not back it up.

Goldstone told the committee that on the morning of the day he sent the email, he received a call from his employer, a man named Emin Agalarov, who "said that a well-connected Russian attorney had met with his father that morning in his father's office and had told him that they had some interesting information that could potentially be damaging regarding funding by Russians to the Democrats and to its candidate, Hillary Clinton." (Emin Agalarov is a Russian singing star who is the son of Aras Agalarov, a billionaire who was Donald Trump's partner in the 2013 Miss Universe pageant in Moscow.)

Investigators asked Goldstone why he told Trump Jr. that the Russian government supported Trump. Goldstone explained that he had been to Russia several times, including during the 2013 pageant, and "I had seen and heard firsthand people of all levels, whether it was business people, whether it was friends of Emin, friends of his father, talk in very glowing terms about Mr. Trump. I had also seen on television in Russia many, many reports in which government officials,

including the president, Mr. Putin, had praised Mr. Trump, who, in turn, I had seen on CNN had praised Mr. Putin."

So, he basically just made up the stuff about Russia's support of Trump.

Goldstone was asked whether at the time he was aware of any Russian efforts to interfere in the U.S. presidential election. He said he was not. He was asked if he knew anything about the supposed documents that were being offered to Trump Jr. He said he did not.

So why did Goldstone choose the words he chose in the email? An answer came in a 2017 email provided to the committee. Shortly after the Trump Tower meeting was first reported in the media, Goldstone and Emin Agalarov exchanged emails on how best to address the story. Goldstone sent Agalarov a draft statement saying that in the email he used "the strongest hyperbolic language" to convince Trump Jr. to take the meeting. Asked by the Senate what he meant by "strongest hyperbolic language," Goldstone said, "That I had puffed it and used some keywords that I thought would attract Don Jr.'s attention."

"I mean, publicist puff is how they get meetings," Goldstone added.

Others in the room, including a translator thought to have an unbiased view of events, did not remember discussing the promised "dirt" on Clinton, nor anything involving Trump-Russia collusion.

The meeting came to nothing. Natalia Veselnitskaya, the Russian lawyer crusading against the Magnitsky Act, left disappointed, while the three Trump officials were apparently unhappy that 20 minutes of their time had been wasted. A year later, when news of the meeting broke, it became the most important 20 minutes of the Trump-Russia investigation.

And that is it. In the end, unless some startling new evidence appears, the notorious Trump Tower meeting seems more like a clumsy attempt at lobbying than a conspiracy to interfere with a presidential election.

Heroic Florida drama teacher to get special Tony Award

NEW YORK — The special Tony Award that honors educators this year will go to a drama teacher who picks her high school's shows, builds the sets, hems the costumes — and nurtured many of the young people demanding change following the school shooting in Parkland, Florida.

Melody Herzfeld, the one-woman drama department at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, will be presented with the award onstage June 10 at the Tony telecast.

"I'm overwhelmed," Herzfeld told The Associated Press. "But I hope that this award will remind everyone of how vital and important arts education is to our kids. Drama, music, art, creative writing — that's how you make good citizens."

Herzfeld saved 65 lives by barricading students into a small classroom closet on Valentine's Day when police say a former student

went on a school rampage, killing 17 people.

She then later cheered as many of her pupils led the nationwide movement for gun reform, including organizing the March For Our Lives demonstration and the charity single "Shine."

The annual honor bestowed by the Tony Awards

and Carnegie Mellon University recognizes U.S. educators from kindergarten to 12th grade who have "demonstrated monumental impact on the lives of students and who embodies the highest standards of the profession."

The award includes a \$10,000 prize and a pair of tickets to the Tony ceremony and gala. A panel of judges comprised of the American Theatre Wing, The Broadway League, Carnegie Mellon and other leaders from the theater industry selects the winner, based on candidates submitted by the public.

When Herzfeld was being considered for this year's honor — the fourth

— one Tony administration committee member commented: "Never has the drama department looked so cool."

Ever modest, Herzfeld said she should take little credit for shaping her teenage students. She said she just lays the foundation by insisting that honesty — onstage and off — be a guiding principle.

"These kids are so close to adulthood they can taste it, but they don't have all the responsibilities of adulthood yet. So it's important to give them a safe place where they can fail or experiment and it doesn't matter."

Truth is so ruthlessly important in her department that her students are as likely to brutally offer a critique that her outfit or hair isn't working as they are to decide that their dramatic scene isn't strong enough.

"I want them to feel confident enough to call out any adult, any bureaucrat, any politician, anyone, even their teacher," she said. "They need to speak truth to power."

Heather Hitchens, president and CEO of the American Theatre Wing, said Herzfeld is a great example of so many teachers doing great work under all kinds of difficult circumstances across the country.

"She does her work every day and she believes in it. What the kids are doing is enough that the idea that someone outside of that would recognize it has floored her," said Hitchens.

Herzfeld, the mother of two adult children, has been teaching drama at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School since 2003 and has led some 50 productions. She notes that drama can help students find their voice, teach teamwork and problem solve — features that arts administrators also stress.

"Arts education teaches leadership, teaches civic involvement, and brings out the best in people, helps them to be better citizens — more well-rounded and balanced citizens," said Charlotte St. Martin, president of The Broadway League.

Jury awards 4 cents to family of black man killed by deputy

FORT PIERCE — Jurors who awarded only 4 cents to the family of a black man fatally shot in his home by a deputy expressed confusion about the court's instructions as they struggled to reach a verdict.

Notes sent to the judge show the jurors said they couldn't reach a unanimous decision before finally finding 30-year-old Gregory Hill Jr. 99 percent responsible for his death, because he was drunk when a St. Lucie County Sheriff's deputy shot him.

Hill's fiancée called the verdict a "slap in the face," and the family's lawyer is preparing an appeal, saying he can't tell whether the jury was angry, or just confused.

Hill was in his garage in the South Florida city of Fort Pierce, listening to loud music when a parent picking a child up from an elementary school across the street called in the complaint in 2014.

According to court documents, deputies responded and Hill

eventually raised his garage door to answer them, then lowered it again. A deputy then fired through the door, hitting Hill three times. Deputies testified that they saw Hill holding a weapon. An unloaded gun was found in the dead man's back pocket.

The sheriff's office called in a SWAT team, who tear-gassed the home before officers went in and found Hill's body.

A sheriff's statement said Deputy Christopher Newman, who fired the fatal shots, was "placed in a very difficult situation, and like so many fellow law enforcement officers must do every day, he made the best decision he could for the safety of his partner, himself, and the public given the circumstances he faced."

A grand jury in Florida brought no charges, so Hill's family turned to federal court, filing a civil rights lawsuit against Newman and his department.

Attorney John Phillips said the jurors — one black man, two white men and five white women — seemed receptive to

the family's case during the trial, but confused by the instructions the judge gave for their deliberations last week.

"The jury smiled, cried and showed anger during the trial. They were normal, reactive people and seemed to understand both sides of the case," Phillips said.

There were two claims the jury had to decide: a federal civil rights claim, and a state-law claim of negligence. Phillips suggested that the wording of the instructions may have confused the jurors.

The instructions said they could award \$1 in "nominal damages" to the family if Hill's injuries weren't clearly the result of unjustifiable force. But that part of the instruction was supposed to apply only to the federal civil rights claim, which the jury decided entirely in the deputy's favor. On the state-law claim, they decided — in a very small way — in favor of the family by finding the sheriff's department 1 percent negligent.

Hours before the verdict, the jury sent the judge a note with

a question: "If we find minimal negligence, can the courts overrule monetary amounts presented by the jury?"

The judge replied that she did not understand, and asked them to clarify. They never did.

At another point, they said they were struggling to reach a unanimous decision. The judge told them to keep trying.

Finally, the jury awarded Hill's relatives \$1 for funeral expenses and \$1 for each of Hill's three children. That \$4 was then reduced to 4 cents — or 1 percent, representing the sheriff's liability. The other 99 percent was blamed on the dead man, under a Florida law that enables such decisions if a victim was under the influence of alcohol.

Hill's fiancée, Monique Davis said she had to leave the courtroom during the verdict so she wouldn't have an outburst.

"It was basically a slap in the face. You value someone's life as one dollar?"

Phillips said he's baffled. He's planning to ask for a new trial, and to file an appeal if that's denied.

"A finding of no negligence and no civil rights violations is one thing, but the series of one-dollar awards for these kids was shocking, upsetting and confusing."

University of Miami law professor Osamudia James says the option of nominal damages is given to juries as a way to acknowledge a wrong, even if they don't believe large damages are warranted. It's one tool juries are given to facilitate the difficult process of assigning monetary awards for injuries.

"In cases like this with nominal awards, juries are saying 'We don't like what happened, but we're not awarding a lot (of money) to it,'" James said.

Hill and Davis were high school sweethearts, engaged to be married. He had two kids with Davis and a third with another woman.

Davis called him a family man who loved working and fishing, and always provided for his children.

"He wasn't running the streets doing bad things," she said. "He was not perfect but he wasn't a bad guy."

Texas takes it: Dallas-area kids tops at spelling bee

OXON HILL, Md. — The end of the biggest Scripps National Spelling Bee in history came abruptly, and it wasn't the conclusion that many expected. Naysa Modi, a poised and charismatic four-time participant whose long spelling career seemed to be building toward triumph, sat next to a newcomer whom she had already beaten this year — at the county level.

But 12-year-old Naysa blinked immediately, mixing up the single and double "s" in the German-derived word "Bewusstseinslage" — a state of consciousness or a feeling devoid of sensory components — and 14-year-old Karthik Nemmani seized an opportunity that he wouldn't have had before this year.

"I didn't really think I'd be able to do it," the soft-spoken winner said. "I had confidence that I could do it, but I honestly didn't realistically think it could happen."

Karthik's victory Thursday night put the spotlight back onto the story of this bee week — the new wild-card program that Scripps launched to give a chance to spellers like him, who have to compete against some of the nation's best spellers at the local level. The field was expanded to 515 spellers to accommodate the

wild cards — there had never been more than 300 competitors previously — and four of the 16 prime-time finalists got in through the new program, known as "RSVBee."

When only three spellers remained, all were from the Dallas area, which has long been a hotbed of spelling talent.

Karthik is from McKinney, Texas — his family moved there specifically so he could go to a school that takes part in the Scripps program. Naysa is from Frisco, less than 15 miles to the west. And third-place finisher Abhijay Kodali lives in Flower Mound, another 40 miles west.

Naysa knocked off Abhijay in the Dallas regional bee after topping Karthik in their county bee. The region is one of a few that sponsors two spellers for a trip to nationals. The wild cards had to pay their own way — a \$750 entry fee, plus the costs of travel to Washington and lodging.

"I don't care," said Karthik's father, Krishna Nemmani. "I know his caliber."

Like many top spellers, Karthik was a precocious preschooler — he arranged block letters to spell "horse" at age 3 and won his first spelling bee at 4½, his dad said.

His winning word was

"koinonia," which means Christian fellowship or communion. He knew that one. He also knew the word Naysa missed. But he didn't pretend to be infallible, saying there were about eight or nine words in the prime-time finals he didn't know — a rare admission for a champion.

"She's a really, really good speller. She deserved the trophy as much as I did," Karthik said of Naysa. "I got lucky."

Karthik is the 14th consecutive Indian-American champion, and 19 of the past 23 winners have had Indian heritage. He takes home more than \$42,000 in cash and prizes.

His win was also a triumph for the burgeoning industry of spelling coaches — high-schoolers who've aged out of competition but share their wisdom with younger competitors, for a steep fee. He thanked his coach, 16-year-old Grace Walters, who had her own star-crossed history of never quite getting to the Scripps stage.

Karthik also used study materials compiled by two well-regarded former Scripps spellers and fellow Texans, Shobha Dasari and her younger brother, Shourav, who finished fourth last year and won nearly every other bee he competed in. Six of the 16 top finishers, including Naysa, studied the Dasaris' hand-picked lists of more than 100,000 words.

"It definitely makes us feel great," 17-year-old Shobha said.

Naysa, who does taekwondo and performs stand-up comedy, will have to regroup after a bitter defeat and try again next year. She'll be in eighth grade, which is the final school year that spellers are eligible. She first competed in the bee as a cherubic 9-year-old.

After her defeat, she was swarmed by dozens of current and former spellers who wished her well, smiling throughout.

"She was just as graceful as she could be," bee program manager Corrie Loeffler said.



AILING SATELLITE PRODUCES SHARP SNAPSHOT OF EARTH

Facebook kills 'trending' topics, tests breaking news label

NEW YORK — Facebook is shutting down its ill-fated "trending" news section after four years, a company executive told The Associated Press.

The company claims the tool is outdated and wasn't popular. But the trending section also proved problematic in ways that would presage Facebook's later problems with fake news, political balance and the limitations of artificial intelligence in managing the messy human world.

When Facebook launched "trending" in 2014 as a list of headlines to the side of the main news feed, it was a straightforward move to steal users from Twitter by giving them a quick look at the most popular news of the moment. It fit nicely into CEO Mark Zuckerberg's pledge just a year earlier to make Facebook its users' "personal newspaper."

But that was then. "Fake news" wasn't yet a popular term, and no foreign country had been accused of trying to influence the U.S. elections through social media, as Russia later would be. Trending news that year included the death of Robin Williams, Ebola and the World Cup.

Testing new features

Facebook is now testing new features, including a "breaking news" label that publishers can add to stories to distinguish them from other chatter. Facebook also wants to make local news more prominent.

"It's very good to get rid of 'trending,'" said Frank Pasquale, a law professor at the University of Maryland and expert on algorithms and society. He said algorithms are good for very narrow, well-defined tasks. By contrast, he said, deciding what news stories should go in "trending" requires broad thinking, quick judgments about context and decisions about whether someone is trying to game the system.

In an interview ahead of Friday's announcement, Facebook's head of news products, Alex Hardiman, said the company is still committed to breaking and real-time news. But instead of having Facebook's moderators, human or otherwise, make editorial decisions, there's been a subtle shift to let news organizations do so. According to the Pew

Research Center, 44 percent of U.S. adults get some or all of their news through Facebook.

Troubles with the trending section began to emerge in 2016, when the company was accused of bias against conservatives, based on the words of an anonymous former contractor who said Facebook downplayed conservative issues in that feature and promoted liberal causes. Zuckerberg met with prominent right-wing leaders at the company's headquarters in an attempt at damage control. Yet two years later, Facebook still hasn't been able to shake the notion of bias.

In late 2016, Facebook fired the human editors who worked on the trending topics and replaced them with software that was supposed to be free of political bias. Instead, the software algorithm began to pick out posts that were getting the most attention, even if the information in them was bogus. In early 2017, Facebook made another attempt to fix the trending section, this time by including only topics covered by several news publishers. The thinking was that coverage by just one outlet could be a sign that the news is fake.

The troubles underscore the difficulty of relying on computers, even artificial intelligence, to make sense of the messy human world without committing obvious, sometimes embarrassing and occasionally disastrous errors.

Ultimately, Facebook appears to conclude that trying to fix the headaches around trending wasn't worth the meager benefit the company, users and news publishers saw in it.

"There are other ways for us to better invest our resources," Hardiman said. Pasquale said Facebook's new efforts represent "very slow steps" toward an acknowledgement that the company is making editorial judgments when it decides what news should be shown to users — and that it needs to empower journalists and editors to do so.

A broad shift

But what needs to happen now, he added, is a broad shift in the company's corporate culture, recognizing the expertise involved in journalistic judgment. The changes and features Facebook is putting out, he

said, are being treated as "bug fixes" — addressing single problems the way engineers do.

"What they are not doing is giving an overall account of their mission on how these fixes fit together," Pasquale said.

The "breaking news" label that Facebook is testing with 80 news publishers around the world will let outlets such as The Washington Post add a red label to indicate that a story is breaking news, highlighting it for users who want accurate information as things are happening.

"Breaking news has to look different than a recipe," Hardiman said.

Another feature, called "Today In," shows people breaking news in their area from local publishers, officials and organizations. It's being tested out in 30 markets in the U.S. Hardiman says the goal is to help "elevate great local journalism." The company is also funding news videos, created exclusively for Facebook by outside publishers it would not yet name. It plans to launch this feature in the next few months.

Facebook says the trending section wasn't a popular feature to begin with. It was available only in five countries and accounted for less than 1.5 percent of clicks to the websites of news publishers, according to the company.


While Facebook got outsized attention for the problems the trending section had — perhaps because it seemed popular with journalists and editors — neither its existence nor its removal makes much of a difference when it comes with Facebook's broader problems with news.

Hardiman said ending the trending section feels like letting a child go. But she said Facebook's focus now is prioritizing trustworthy, informative news that people find useful.

Apple set to preview updates for iPhones, Siri and more

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Apple is expected to preview new capabilities for its Siri digital assistant and showcase other upcoming software features to help build anticipation for the next iPhones.

The peek at the new software will come Monday at a gathering in San Jose, California, for thousands of app developers and other computer programmers looking to create their own features for making iPhones, iPads, Macs and other Apple products more useful.

Analysts believe Apple will try to inject more artificial intelligence and other new powers into Siri to make it more competitive with Google's digital assistant and Amazon's Alexa. Apple just gave its HomePod smart speaker new features, including calendar reminders — something Google and Amazon devices have long offered. Apple has been emphasizing the HomePod's high-fidelity

acoustics, including the ability to pair two devices in stereo mode, in an effort to distinguish its product from Google's and Amazon's speakers, which primarily serve as hubs for those companies' voice-activated assistants. Monday's preview could include more on that front.

Apple also may introduce new ways to help people manage their health and assist apps in the use of augmented reality — the blending of digital images and information with a physical setting through the camera.

Investors will be looking for more opportunities for the Cupertino, California, company to make money from the apps and other services baked into its devices. Apple's services division, which generates revenue from subscriptions, commissions and maintenance plans tied to Apple devices, already has become the fastest growing piece of the massive company. The

division's revenue surged by 31 percent from the previous year in Apple's most recent quarter. The growth comes as Apple's top-selling product, the iPhone, hasn't been selling as briskly as investors had hoped after last fall's much-anticipated release of the super-premium iPhone X.

Whatever Apple does, the software updates likely won't be available for a few months. The iPhone software update usually comes for free in September, shortly after the company unveils its latest iPhones.

Apple occasionally uses its annual software preview to release a new gadget or the latest version of an existing product line. The company may launch a wireless charging pad called the AirPower that it announced last year. A new Mac is also a possibility, though not considered likely.

The event comes a month after Google showed off its latest software.

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
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Florida Republican leader posts support for Roseanne's tweet

LEESBURG — A Republican leader in Florida has said he doesn't understand the anger generated by Roseanne Barr's tweet comparing a former adviser to President Barack Obama to an ape.

Lake County Republican Committeeman Ralph Smith posted an image of Valerie Jarrett and a character from "Planet of the Apes" on Facebook with the caption, "And the issue with Roseanne is?"

Barr's tweet likening Jarrett to a cross between the Muslim Brotherhood and a "Planet of the Apes" actor sparked nationwide criticism and prompted ABC to cancel its reboot of the comedy show "Roseanne."

The Daily Commercial in Leesburg published a story Wednesday quoting Smith as saying that he thought the comparison was "funny."

No one answered the phone

at Smith's home and business Thursday. The chairman of the Lake County Republicans didn't respond to email and phone messages.

Smith deleted his post Wednesday. On a radio show he hosts, he said he doesn't care about a person's color, only their values.

Separately, a Republican campaign operative in Georgia was criticized for tweeting a photo of Jarrett with the caption, "FYI, this is the 'African-American' that @therealroseanne offended. Questions?"

Weathers told The Associated Press his tweet was meant to imply he believed Barr's claim that she didn't know Jarrett was black.

Weathers headed Trump's state campaign in Georgia for a short time and he most recently managed the campaign of state Sen. Michael Williams in his failed run to be the GOP nominee for governor.

Alberto rains turn creek into raging river; cars swept away

Heavy rains generated by subtropical Storm Alberto unleashed flooding in Virginia that washed out bridges, damaged homes, closed schools and transformed a normally peaceful creek into a raging river that swept away cars with people still in them. At least one person was killed and rescuers were searching for others.

Rescue crews searching in and around Ivy Creek found the body of one of two occupants of a Toyota Prius that was washed off the road Wednesday night, Albemarle County police said. A search continued late Thursday afternoon for the second person, while farther north in Madison County, the sheriff's office said rescuers were searching for a female reported missing in water the night before.

The storm, already blamed for at least four deaths in the U.S. earlier in the week, was pushing across the Great Lakes on Thursday. But the National Weather Service said the potential for more rainfall and flash flooding would continue for the Southeast, the Ohio Valley and the mid-Atlantic through the end of the week.

Since making landfall on Memorial Day in the Florida Panhandle, Alberto's heavy rains have been widespread, with flooding reported from Alabama through Tennessee, Kentucky, Illinois, the Carolinas and West Virginia.

In Albemarle County, the Toyota Prius and a second car were swept into Ivy Creek around 9:30 p.m. Wednesday. The occupant of one car was able to swim to a safe location, police said in a news release. But witnesses saw a man and woman get swept away as they climbed out of the Prius, Albemarle County Fire Rescue Chief

Dan Eggleston said at a news conference.

"Ivy Creek is normally a very docile creek but with 8 to 10 inches of rain ... it turned into a swollen, raging river. And it just tossed and turned both of those vehicles," he said.

Authorities also responded to at least 10

other water rescues and received reports of damage to homes, the extent of which wasn't immediately clear, Eggleston said.

Schools in the county were closed due to poor road conditions. Authorities throughout the region posted photos of washed-out roads and bridges,

and they warned people to avoid unnecessary travel. One photo posted by the city of Charlottesville showed a playground partially submerged under floodwaters.

Eggleston warned of the possibility of more flooding as soon as Thursday evening, when there was a

one of those mudslides was blamed for a gas leak and explosion that destroyed a home Wednesday afternoon, killing two people.

Four North Carolina dams being closely watched by a state team of special engineers were holding up, Gov. Roy Cooper said Wednesday. But Cooper went ahead and declared a state of emergency for his hard-hit mountain counties, saying the forecast for the rest of the week calls for isolated heavy rain storms that could instantly cause flooding in areas that have had 20 inches of rain in the past 15 days.

"This storm isn't yet over. I'm urging people to keep a close eye on forecasts," Cooper said.

A photo posted by The Asheville Citizen-Times showed a popular park in the tourist-friendly city overrun by water from the French Broad River.

Two deaths had previously been reported in the U.S. during the storm's passage. A television news anchor and a photojournalist were killed Monday in North Carolina while covering the weather, when a tree became uprooted from rain-soaked ground and toppled onto their SUV, authorities said. WYFF-TV of Greenville, South Carolina, said news anchor Mike McCormick and photojournalist Aaron Smeltzer died.

Authorities in Cuba say Alberto left four people dead there as the storm drenched the island in heavy rain. Interior Minister Julio Cesar Gandarilla said late Tuesday they died as a result of "recklessness" during the storm. He gave no details. The deaths occurred as authorities worked to contain an oil spill in central Cuba's Cienfuegos Bay that followed the flooding of nearby oil refinery.

2 Jacksonville city council members indicted

JACKSONVILLE — Two members of Jacksonville's City Council have been indicted by a federal grand jury for fraud and money laundering, court documents unsealed Thursday revealed.

U.S. Attorney Maria Chapa Lopez said Katrina Brown, 37, and Reginald Brown, 56, each face up to 20 years in federal prison if convicted for a combined 38 counts.

The indictment says Katrina Brown obtained \$2.6 million in U.S. Small Business Administration loans to expand her family's barbecue business and create local manufacturing jobs for their sauce bottling business.

Katrina Brown's family venture also received a \$380,000 loan and \$260,000 grant from Jack-

sonville to help create local jobs. The business never created one job, according to the Florida Times-Union newspaper.

Instead, federal prosecutors say she and Reginald Brown, who is not a relative, incorporated two other businesses — A Plus Training and RB Packaging — that they used to submit fake invoices to their lender for services the businesses had not provided. The indictment said neither business was legitimate.

The indictment says Reginald Brown deposited the reimbursement checks into the businesses' bank accounts, which he and Katrina Brown controlled.

According to court documents, RB Packaging received one loan for \$251,919 from the SBA, and that at least \$166,500 of that was sent to

Katrina Brown. In all, at least \$754,613 was earned by the pair in

the fraudulent scheme, federal prosecutors said in the indictment.

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Silly Old Bear

Exhibition explores world of Winnie-the-Pooh

ATLANTA

A new exhibition in Atlanta celebrates Winnie-the-Pooh, wandering through his magical world and giving visitors a peek behind the scenes at the people, relationships and inspirations behind the “silly old bear” and his friends.

“Winnie-the-Pooh: Exploring a Classic” opens Sunday at the High Museum of Art. It highlights the intensely collaborative relationship between author A.A. Milne and illustrator E.H. Shepard, who brought the stories to life, and guides visitors through those tales and their lessons.

“It’s the idea that a writer can imagine a whole world but the written descriptions can only go so far, and then the illustrations take you the next step,” said Virginia Shearer, the High’s director of education.

Milne was inspired by his young son’s stuffed toys to create stories about a boy named Christopher Robin (his son’s first and middle names) and his beloved Winnie-the-Pooh, also known as Pooh Bear. The bear and his plush friends come to life on the page just as they do in the imagination of a child, animated by witty prose and playful drawings.

In a room hung with pale blue and white striped wallpaper to evoke a nursery, a faux window looks out on the imaginary world created by Milne and Shepard as the only known recording of Milne reading from the “Winnie-the-Pooh” book of stories plays in the background. A glass case houses replicas of the plush toys that inspired the characters.

Milne invited Shepard to his home to draw portraits of his son’s toy animals “from life” and hosted Shepard at his country home so he could observe and sketch the trees and landscapes that inspired the Hundred Acre Wood, where Pooh and friends live. Some of the pencil-sketch studies that resulted are on display in a part of the exhibition that explores their collaboration.

Drawings grouped by the chapters in “Winnie-

the-Pooh” and “The House at Pooh Corner” are the exhibition’s main focus. Story panels at adult eye-level give brief summaries of the chapters. Panels at child eye-level are written for beginning readers and encourage children think about the lessons learned.

The exhibition ends with a room filled with Winnie-the-Pooh merchandise,

ranging from the earliest days to the present, to illustrate the spread and growth of the brand. It includes the familiar plush bear with a red T-shirt reading “Pooh” marketed by Disney, which bought the character rights in 1961.

The exhibition is a continuation of a series at the High that puts the spotlight on children’s book

authors and illustrators.

“I think with all of these projects we’re encouraging people to look closely at what they have at home and realize they have works of art in their own homes,” said co-presenting curator Ginia Sweeney. Another goal, she said, is to provide children with skills they can use to visit and enjoy the rest of the museum and to give

parents the tools to help them.

Shearer and Sweeney said they hope the exhibition inspires children to get outside, away from screens, to have adventures.

“Christopher Robin says his favorite thing to do is nothing because you have so many possibilities when you have nothing to do,”

Sweeney said.

The exhibition was organized by the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. After its U.S. premiere at the High Museum, where it will be on view from Sunday through Sept. 2, the exhibition is set to be on display at Boston’s Museum of Fine Arts from Sept. 22 through Jan. 6 before heading to Japan.

Throwdown’ focuses on healthy, cheap school lunches

HARTFORD, Conn. — Some top chefs from around the country are gathering to show that school lunches can be more than just chicken nuggets and tater tots.

The 10 chefs, including some James Beard award winners, will take part in the first “\$1.25 Throwdown” contest in New London, Connecticut, on Saturday, trying to create dishes that are tasty yet cost no more than \$1.25 apiece to make while adhering to federal nutritional regulations.

That’s the amount event organizer Dan Giusti and his team of fellow chefs are limited to when they prepare daily meals for New London’s 3,900 school children.

Giusti is best known as the former head chef of one of the world’s top-rated restaurants, Noma, in Copenhagen, Denmark. His company, Brigaid, has been making New London’s school meals for the past two years and partnered with New York City schools this year to begin serving six schools in

the Bronx. Giusti invited the 10 chefs to this weekend’s contest, which will serve both as a fundraiser for New London schools and an idea generator for Bri-

gaid. Each chef will compete for the best tasting dish as judged by students and food writers, and Giusti says he is hoping to add some of the recipes to the lunch rotation. A \$50

ticket will allow you to enjoy one of the meals.

Some of the expected dishes include a vegetable-only, sushi-like roll and a jerk Caribbean fish sandwich.

“The whole point of this is to bring some of the best culinary minds in the country to think about this,” Giusti said. “At the end of the day, hopefully we’ll come up with more recipes that are usable and that kids like.”

Some of the guest chefs include James Beard Award winners Stuart Briozza and Nate Appleman, “Top Chef” Season 12 winner Mei Lin and James Wayman, the 2016 Connecticut Restaurant Association Chef of the Year.

Giusti formed Brigaid to offer more wholesome food choices to students and ditch the frozen, processed meals that have dominated school menus — an idea pursued by other chefs and former first lady Michelle Obama.

More than half of New London students qualify for free or reduced-price meals and the federal government reimburses the school system for most of its food costs, Giusti said. That reimbursement is \$3.31 per meal. Subtracting labor and maintenance costs leaves \$1.25 for the food, he said.

“The budget is the most

challenging thing,” Giusti said. “There are legitimately things that you cannot get into using. As chefs, we like to use fresh herbs. That’s just something we can’t do.”

New London’s lunch menu includes only items made from scratch. Instead of frozen chicken tenders, fish sticks or sloppy joes, Giusti and his team offer up curry chicken with ginger brown rice, chicken gumbo, beef enchiladas and homemade cheese pizza. That’s in addition to the fruits, salads and sandwiches that are available every day.

The city’s program has been hit or miss with students sometimes. While they have liked the new barbecue chicken thighs, they just weren’t that interested in butternut squash soup or a sandwich containing roasted turkey, cranberry sauce and stuffing-flavored mayonnaise.

“A lot of this stuff is in the delivery of how it’s presented, how it’s communicated,” Giusti said. “You have to figure out ways to present it so that they’ll at least give it a shot.”

Comic Samantha Bee apologizes to Ivanka Trump for slur

NEW YORK — Comedian Samantha Bee apologized to Ivanka Trump and viewers on Thursday for using an obscenity to describe the president's daughter, an incident that quickly thrust her into the middle of the nation's political divide.

Her network, TBS, also said it was "our mistake, too," in allowing the language on Bee's show, "Full Frontal," on Wednesday. Her show is taped and not aired live.

Bee called Ivanka Trump a "feckless c—" toward the end of a segment about President Trump's immigration policies. She used the slur in urging Ivanka Trump to speak to her father about policies that separate children from their parents.

"Put on something tight and low-cut and tell your father to f---ing stop it," she said.

Bee, a former correspondent on "The Daily Show" with Jon Stewart whose own show has been one of TBS' big successes since it started in 2016, said that her language was "inappropriate and inexcusable."

"I crossed a line, and I deeply regret it," she said. Before the apology, White House press secretary

Sarah Sanders called Bee's language "vile and vicious" and said executives at TBS and corporate parent Time Warner needed to demonstrate that such explicit profanity about female members of the administration would not be condoned.

TBS said Bee had taken the right step in apologizing. The network made no mention of any disciplinary action.

The car company Auto-

trader said that it would pull its advertising sponsorship from "Full Frontal," calling Bee's language offensive and unacceptable. Bee's show is being honored Thursday by the Television Academy as one of the most "meaningful and relevant" on the air; the academy said the controversy over her language won't change that.

The academy said its event is "non-political" and that Bee's recognition is for

"her engagement in 2017 on the subject of sexual harassment and the #MeToo movement."

Coming two days after ABC canceled "Roseanne" following a racist tweet about former Obama adviser Valerie Jarrett, Bee's remark was immediately seized upon by culture warriors. Some conservatives upset about the "Roseanne" cancellation suggested Bee should meet the same fate, while lib-

erals wondered whether Bee's words were any worse than some used by President Trump, notably in the "Access Hollywood" tape.

"I dream of a life where we hold our president to a higher standard than we hold comedians," said another comic, Marie Connor, on Twitter.

Ari Fleischer, former press secretary to President George W. Bush, said there was a double standard when you compare media

reaction to Barr and Bee. He said the media would go "nuts" if a conservative Republican used the same slur that was used by Bee against Nancy Pelosi.

"The outrage would be instant and overwhelming," Fleischer said online.

Liberal filmmaker Michael Moore noted that President Trump and his aides had not condemned Barr's racism and tried to "confuse the issue by going after Samantha Bee's brilliant rant against Ivanka."

Bee's commentary had the potential to be a corporate headache. Time Warner, which owns channels including TBS, CNN and HBO, is in the process of being acquired by AT&T for \$85 billion. The Justice Department has sued to block the deal, however, due to monopoly concerns, and a decision on whether or not it will proceed is expected June 12.

One of the sharpest attacks against Bee came on corporate cousin CNN. Bee is no better than the behavior she sought to criticize in her immigration segment, said CNN anchor Brooke Baldwin.

"To use that word from a woman to another woman is offensive," Baldwin said. "Wrong is wrong, whether you're on the left or the right."

Kevin Bacon and his bro to sizzle your summer with new album

NEW YORK — You could easily call Friday "National Actors Releasing Albums Day": Kevin Bacon, Scarlett Johansson and Erza Miller are among the famous faces dropping new music.

But releasing music for those well-known for their roles in movies haven't always been accepting or a breeze.

"It's crazy how actors bring out some kind of hostility from a rock music crowd that rock (fans think), 'We have our idols and we don't want you to try to share that.' That kind of hero worship drives me crazy. I just find it such nonsense," Michael Bacon, Kevin's older brother and bandmate, said in an interview this week.

"I will say though that resistance to that idea comes from rock press and rock radio, but not from rock musicians. In my experience, when we play with musicians, musicians are incredibly welcoming of us. That's not just studio guys, guys we're paying, it's like big musicians," Kevin, 59, added.

"And the other thing is you've been accepted as a professional musician," Michael, 68, said looking to his brother. "It takes a while to do that."

"It takes 25 years," Kevin laughed.

The Bacon Brothers have been on the music scene for over two decades, releasing their debut album,

"Forosoco," in 1997. Their latest, a self-titled 10-track set, comes out on Friday, the same day they'll launch their three-month U.S. tour. (On Friday Johansson will release an EP with Pete Yorn and Miller's band, Sons of an Illustrious Father, will drop its sophomore album).

Kevin and Michael recall years ago using another name for their band when releasing music to see what attention they would get.

"What happened is they started distributing the record to FM radio and didn't say who it was and people really were playing it," Michael said. "We got a little traction from it but it's a lot of work to do that, too."

"The Bacon Brothers" was produced by G.E. Smith, the former "Saturday Night Live" music director and guitarist of Hall & Oates. It starts off with "Tom Petty T-Shirt," written shortly after the rock icon died.

Kevin said he wrote the song based off wanting to fix a problem in marriage, relationship or friendship.

"You want to make it better. You want to step in and make everything right. Sometimes that's a little out of your skill set, at least I find for myself when it comes to me and my relationship with my wife, or even with my relationship with my kids," he said. "I don't always say the right thing and do the right things exactly, to fix whatever that situation is. So it's a little bit like, 'Well,

I don't know if I can help, but here's my Tom Petty T-Shirt."

The album doesn't only feature the Bacon brothers: Kevin's famous wife and daughter — actresses Kyra Sedgwick and Sosie Bacon ("13 Reasons Why") — sing on the album.

The Philadelphia boys say because the band isn't their first priority — Kevin has been a successful actor since his 20s and Michael is an Emmy-winning composer and teacher — they are able to flourish as a musical group.

"It works out better that way then if we said, 'This is the only thing that we're going to do.' When we started the band, it was a very small thing," Michael said. "The band was originally put together for one gig in Philadelphia."

The duo's tour starts in Rocky Mount, Virginia, on Friday. They wrap on Aug. 11 in Glenside, Pennsylvania.

"What's unique about our band is most bands that have been around playing for 25 years are playing off hit singles from 20 years ago. We don't have anything. We have never had a record come off. It's a little different dynamic," Michael said. "When we're playing a gig most people have never heard any of the songs. In a funny way that gives us a little more creative freedom to go where we want the band to go rather than if we had five hits."

"Yeah, what a drag," Kevin, laughing, said.

Ella Brennan dies at 92, mentored chefs Prudhomme, Lagasse

NEW ORLEANS — Ella Brennan, who couldn't cook but played a major role in putting New Orleans on the world's culinary map, died Thursday. She was 92.

"Tonight, the iconic Commander's Palace sign will not be lit," said a statement emailed from the Commander's Family of Restaurants. It said Brennan died with family and friends by her side, and services will be private.

Ella Brennan was credited with creating nouvelle Creole cuisine, was the matriarch of a family that owns nearly two-dozen restaurants — more if you count every outlet of a local pizza and po'-boy chain — and, at Commander's Palace, cultivated many of the city's top chefs, including Paul Prudhomme and Emeril Lagasse. She won the James Beard Foundation's lifetime achievement award in 2009.

"Ella Brennan was an icon in the culinary industry, and she graciously shared her passion for New Orleans and our cuisine with the world," said Gov. John Bel Edwards in an emailed statement. "She was a trailblazer with a tenacious spirit who made it her mission to learn everything possible about the restaurant business from the ground up ... she set a standard of excellence that was unmatched."

Or, as Brennan summed up her life's experience in October 2015, "I had a barrel of fun and if anybody calls that work they're crazy."

Her speech when Commander's Palace won the second James Beard award for outstanding service was equally succinct and self-deprecating: "I accept this award for every damn captain and waiter in the country."

"The entire auditorium rose to its feet for a standing ovation as my mother endeared herself to anyone who has ever set a table or taken an order," her daughter, Ti Adelaide Martin, wrote in the introduction to their book "Miss Ella of Commander's Palace."

Brennan didn't inherit her mother's talent for cooking. "She can't really boil wa-

ter," Lagasse said days before Brennan's 90th birthday in November 2015. But, he said, "She's one of the greatest restaurateurs I've ever met. She has an incredible palate and an even more incredible mind. And she just has this way with people, of leading and showing the way of exceptional hospitality."

Brennan started in the restaurant business as a high school kid working in her oldest brother Owen's bar and restaurant. After graduating, she took a few secretarial classes but happily dropped out in the 1940s to work full-time for her brother. Mostly, she taught herself, reading books and magazines and asking questions of vendors, butchers, and just about anyone else who crossed her path.

Her mentoring took many forms: weekly "foodie meetings" to discuss any and all aspects of food and the restaurant business; trips to New York and abroad to learn from restaurants and stores; comments and notes.

Lagasse recalled one note handed to him during his early years at Commander's Palace: "When you come to work tomorrow, do me a favor and leave your ego at home."

They'd often sit at her desk together on Saturdays to thumb through menus and cookbooks, discussing their experiences and how to "creolize" dishes for Commander's customers.

Lagasse said Brennan also taught him his philosophy: "getting up every day and trying a little harder than the day before."

One of Brennan's mottos was "If it ain't broke, fix it anyway."

Brennan grew up with two sisters and three brothers, children of a shipyard supervisor and a woman who loved to cook and entertain.

Her first full-time job was at the Vieux Carre, the predecessor to Brennan's Restaurant. Owen Brennan was in the middle of planning for Brennan's when he died in 1955 at age 45. Plans for a bank loan fell through. The family took out new mortgages, borrowed from in-laws and friends, and the restaurant opened.

SKYPING THE DOCTOR?

Poll shows it's not just for the young

WASHINGTON — Every morning, 92-year-old Sidney Kramer wraps a blood pressure cuff around his arm and steps on a scale, and readings of his heart health beam to a team of nurses — and to his daughter's smartphone — miles from his Maryland home.

Red flags? A nurse immediately calls, a form of telemedicine that is helping Kramer live independently by keeping his congestive heart failure under tight control.

"It's reassuring both psychologically and physically. The way he's put it to me, it's like having a doctor appointment every morning," said Miriam Dubin, Kramer's daughter.

The vast majority of older Americans and their caregivers are ready to give virtual health care a try: Nearly 9 in 10 adults ages 40 and over would be comfortable using at least one type of telemedicine for themselves or an aging loved one, says a new poll from The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

But they want to make sure that an e-visit or other remote care is just as good as they'd get in person, and that their health information stays private, according to the survey released Thursday.

Long considered an option mainly for improving access to health care in rural areas with few doctors, telemedicine is gaining ground with tech-savvy younger consumers — they text their physician with questions or Skype with a mild complaint. For seniors with chronic illnesses or mobility problems that make simply reaching a doctor's office an ordeal, telehealth could be more than a convenience. The graying population is raising serious questions about how the nation will provide enough quality long-term care.

But while private insurance increasingly covers certain services such as a video visit, seniors have had a harder time because Medicare tightly restricts what it will pay for.

That's starting to change, with a law Congress passed last winter that expands Medicare coverage for such options as video visits to diagnose stroke symptoms or check on home dialysis patients. Also, Medicare Advantage programs used by a third of beneficiaries can start offering additional telehealth options.

"While the interest is huge, one of the big barriers remains reimbursement," said Johns Hopkins University telemedicine chief Dr.

Ingrid Zimmer-Galler, who has turned to grants to help fund such services as telepsychiatry for dementia patients. The new law "is really a huge step in the right direction. It certainly doesn't cover everything."

Costs are a major issue for people who need ongoing living assistance. Less than a third of adults age 40 and over have set aside any money for their future long term care needs, the AP-NORC survey shows, and more than half mistakenly think they'll be able to rely on Medicare to help cover nursing care or home health aides.

Telemedicine will have to replace in-person care, not add to it, to help with those costs, cautioned Zimmer-Galler.

As access for seniors promises to grow, the AP-NORC Center poll shows widespread interest in telehealth. More than half of adults of all ages would be com-

fortable with a video visit via Skype or FaceTime to discuss medications, for ongoing care of a chronic illness or even for an urgent health concern.

In fact, adults 40 and older are just as open to at least some forms of telemedicine as those under 40, with one exception: The older crowd is slightly less comfortable discussing health care by text.

Among caregivers, 87 percent say they'd be interested in using at least one form of telemedicine for that person's medical needs.

"I think the parents would be happier at home instead of being in the doctor's office waiting an hour to see a doctor for 15 minutes," said Don Withey of Cortland, New York, who helps his 92-year-old father and 89-year-old mother get to their appointments. But, "we don't know much more about it other than the fact you can talk to a doctor over the

computer or smartphone."

Just 12 percent of adults say they wouldn't use any form of telemedicine.

There are concerns. More than 30 percent of people worry about privacy or the security of health information. About half fear that telemedicine could lead to lower-quality care, the poll found.

"It's not about having a video screen or Skype in the home or even a blood pressure cuff in the home. It's about the team that's behind it and the clinicians who are supporting the care of that patient," said Rachel DeSantis, chief of staff at Johns Hopkins Home Care Group, which provides the 92-year-old Kramer's remote monitoring.

The Hopkins program provides no-cost monitoring for a month or two to select high-risk patients after a hospitalization because research found it reduces their chances of readmission.

When the monitor recorded Kramer's weight creeping up one week, nurses immediately knew it was fluid build-up, a heart failure symptom that needed quick treatment. The machine is programmed for some educational feedback, too.

Dubin says her dad learned quickly when to cut back. "If he enjoys a pastrami sandwich one day, he can see his numbers may be higher the next day."

Dubin says the reassurance was worth privately paying, about \$250 a month, to keep the monitoring once Kramer's initial time in the program ended.



The survey was conducted March 13 to April 5 by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research, with funding from the SCAN Foundation.

It involved interviews in English and Spanish with 1,945 adults, including 1,522 adults age 40 and over, who are members of NORC's probability-based AmeriSpeak panel, which is designed to be representative of the U.S. population. Results from the full survey have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.3 percentage points.

Cancer group says colon screening should start at 45, not 50



NEW YORK — New guidelines released Wednesday recommend U.S. adults start colon cancer screening earlier, at age 45 instead of 50.

The American Cancer Society's advice puts it out of sync with guidelines from an influential government advisory group, which kept the age at 50 in an update two years ago.

Cancer society officials acknowledge the shift to 45 could cause confusion for doctors and patients but felt strongly that they needed to act now. The advocacy group was influenced by its study, published last year, that found rising rates of colon cancer and deaths in people younger than 50. Experts aren't sure why there has been a 50 percent increase in cases since 1994.

The guidelines are for men and women ages 45 to 75 of average risk for colon cancer; recommendations are different for people with certain conditions, like Crohn's disease, or a

family history of colon cancer. The group endorses six kinds of screening exams, from inexpensive take-home stool tests performed every year to colonos-

copies done every 10.

"All of these tests are good tests, and the choice should be offered to patients," said the cancer society's Dr. Rich Wender.

"The best test is the test that gets done."

The same tests are recommended by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, a panel that reviews evidence and issues advice for a variety of screenings and treatments. It updated its colon cancer guidelines in 2016 and its next review isn't expected until around 2021.

That panel's recommendations drive what screening is covered by insurance under the Affordable Care Act, although 20 states have laws that link coverage to the cancer society guidelines. It's not uncommon for groups to have slightly different guidelines although those for colon cancer have been about the same for decades.

Most colon cancer occurs in adults 55 and older, and the good news is rates of cases and deaths have been falling for decades. Colon cancer, combined with rectal cancer, is the second leading cause of cancer death in the U.S. This year, more than 140,000 Americans are expected to be diagnosed with it, and

about 50,000 will die from it.

Doctors will probably look to specialty medical societies to sort out the different guidelines, said Dr. Marcus Plescia, of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials. But it may take a little while before they offer clear advice.

Some experts have worried about pre-50 risks of colon cancer in some racial and ethnic groups, and at least one specialty society for gastroenterologists has urged screening of black adults starting at age 45.

Others argue that instead of lowering the age for routine screening, more effort should be put into getting more people tested. Only about two-thirds of people 50 and older have been following screening guidelines.

"It's hard enough to get people to do it at all," Plescia noted.

Dr. Andrew Wolf, the lead author of the latest guidelines, said they considered and rejected that reasoning.

"We should be able to do both," said Wolf, a University of Virginia internist.

Florida woman gets 7 years for forcing surrogate pregnancy

JACKSONVILLE — A woman in Florida was sentenced to seven years in prison for the forced labor of a Mexican woman she hired as a pregnancy surrogate.

Esthela Clark also faces deportation to Mexico after serving the sentence she received Thursday in federal court in Jacksonville. She is a legal permanent resident.

Clark pleaded guilty last year. Federal prosecutors say she traveled to Guadalajara, Mexico where she met the victim in 2012, promising her thousands of dollars once a baby was born.

The woman was smuggled into the United States, and after she arrived in Jacksonville, Clark repeatedly tried to inseminate her with sperm retrieved from her boyfriend's condoms with a syringe.

Prosecutors say when that method failed, Clark forced the woman to have unprotected sex with strangers. She never became pregnant.

Florida officers who beat suspect with batons investigated

HALLANDALE BEACH — Two South Florida police officers are on administrative leave after a bystander recorded them beating a man with batons.

Officers Jaime Cerna and Richard Allen of the Hallandale Beach Police Department are now the subjects of an internal investigation. Cerna's police report says he fired two Taser shots, but switched to his baton when they appeared to be ineffective.

Police say they were arresting Daniel Dunkelberger on suspicion of burglary.

The video shows a strike to the head and a strike after Dunkelberger is on the ground. The Miami Herald reports the confrontation happened Wednesday.

The bystander who posted the video to Twitter says Dunkelberger is known to be mentally challenged.

City Manager Roger Carlton said at a news conference Thursday that what happened is "of serious concern."

Man faces 15 years for fatal DUI crash

BARTOW — A Florida man faces 15 years in prison after being convicted in a drunken driving crash.

The Ledger reports that 34-year-old Nick Nicholas pleaded guilty Thursday to DUI manslaughter. His sentencing is scheduled for Aug. 2.

The Florida Highway Patrol reports that Nicholas stopped his SUV in the left lane of westbound Interstate 4 near Lakeland on an early morning in February 2015. Investigators say 21-year-old Michael Jovanie Millan Perez crashed his car into the stopped SUV and died at the scene.

Authorities say Nicholas admitted to drinking two shots of alcohol at an Orlando restaurant several hours earlier. Nicholas

was arrested about nine months later.

Child hospitalized with marijuana, cocaine in system

PALMETTO — Authorities say a 2-year-old Florida boy was hospitalized with marijuana and cocaine in his system.

The Bradenton Herald reports that the boy's parents, 23-year-old Kierstyn Lapek and 28-year-old Devon Barendse, were arrested Wednesday. Manatee County Sheriff's Office detectives say they face charges of child neglect with great bodily harm.

Officials say the child's mother found him unresponsive and having a seizure on May 14 at their Palmetto home. He was taken to a nearby hospital, where the drugs were detected.

It wasn't immediately clear how the drugs got into the boy's system.

The toddler has since been released from the hospital.

Report: driver in crash that killed 2 was going 102 mph

TAMPA — An arrest warrant says a black Mustang that fatally hit a young mother and her infant daughter as they crossed a street in Florida was going 102 mph, then braked hard before impact.

The Tampa Bay Times obtained a copy of the report. Jessica Raubenolt and her daughter, 21-month-old Lillia, were struck on May 23, and died in the hospital.

Police arrested 18-year-old Cameron Herrin, and officials said he was the driver of the Mustang. They also arrested 17-year-old John Barrineau and said he was behind the wheel of another car. Witnesses told police they saw the Mustang and the Altima racing.

Court documents now say that electronic evidence taken from the Mustang during a police search showed that the car hit 102 mph before Cameron Herrin braked.

Millionaire, son plead guilty in South Fla. corruption case

MIAMI — The millionaire owner of a towing-and-scrap-yard business and his son pleaded guilty to bribing a South Florida politician in a wide-ranging corruption scandal.

Raul Sosa Sr., often called "the junkyard millionaire," and his son, Raul Sosa Jr., pleaded guilty Wednesday to paying \$10,000 to then-Opa-Locka Commissioner Luis Santiago and lobbyist Dante Starks.

The Miami Herald reports that the bribery was arranged after the city of Opa-Locka sought bids from towing contracts in 2015.

Sentencing is scheduled for August.

Earlier this year, Santiago was sentenced to four years and three months in prison following a wide-ranging corruption investigation by the FBI.

Local farmer accused of crop insurance fraud

An area farmer is alleged to have played a role in an extensive crop insurance fraud effort and federal authorities are seeking almost \$1 million in return upon his conviction, according to federal court documents.

According to court filings from U.S. District Court for the Middle District of Alabama, prosecutors believe Dexter Day Gilbert and/or others received funds from the federal Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program to which he was not legally entitled for crops planted in Houston County, Alabama, from Feb. 26, 2016, until Jan. 18, 2017.

The allegations were made in the form of a federal information filed Thursday morning. An information

is a formal criminal charge in lieu of an indictment. It is typically filed when the defendant wishes to expedite the process of a guilty plea.

A consent plea hearing is scheduled for June 4 in Montgomery, Alabama.

According to information filed Thursday, prosecutors believe Gilbert was not alone. The information alleges Gilbert was "aiding and abetting another" and was "aided and abetted by another" in the scheme. The government is seeking a money forfeiture of \$919,551 upon his conviction.

The Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program is administered by the Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency and was created to provide financial assistance to producers of non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory

or prevented planting occur due to natural disaster.

A Headland, Alabama, woman was arrested by federal authorities in February of this year on similar charges. Anna Marie Knowles, 36, was indicted on wire fraud and theft of public money or property, and aiding and abetting on both. She is currently set for trial Aug. 20.

In Knowles' indictment, authorities allege she fraudulently claimed a crop of squash she had planted was destroyed due to drought. She is alleged to have received \$116,500 in Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Funds.

Knowles also worked at the local USDA office in Dothan, Alabama, and was responsible for administering federal crop insurance programs in Houston County, according to prosecutors.

Bonifay woman charged in hit-and-run crash

A Bonifay woman has been arrested on a felony charge of leaving the scene of an accident that occurred May 26 and left the occupant of a wheelchair with minor injuries, according to the Bonifay Police Department.

Manhunt: Suspect captured Friday in slaying of Tennessee deputy

DICKSON, Tenn. — After a two-day manhunt, a trooper came across the suspect in the slaying of a sheriff's deputy not far from the scene of the crime, authorities said Friday.

The Tennessee Bureau of Investigation tweeted photos of a handcuffed Steven Joshua Wiggins, grimacing as he was placed into the back seat of a law enforcement vehicle Friday morning. His clothes were muddy and his jeans were ripped open.

Dickson County sheriff's Sgt. Daniel Baker was killed after responding to a call about a suspicious car on Wednesday, the state police agency said. Baker couldn't be contacted for some time, but the deputy's car was eventually tracked by GPS to a wooded area 2 or 3 miles (3 to 5 kilometers) away. The deputy was found dead inside of it.

The TBI said a video recording enabled them to identify the 31-year-old Wiggins as the suspect. Federal, state and local authorities searched for Wiggins over two days, checking into hundreds of tips. The TBI promised more information at a Friday news conference.

Wiggins was found by a Tennessee Highway Patrol trooper not far from where the shooting occurred, the Tennessean reported, citing Hick-

man County Sheriff Randal Ward. "From my understanding he was laying on the side of the road," Ward said.

Rewards totaling \$46,000 had been offered for information leading to his arrest.

Wiggins had been already wanted on charges that he assaulted a woman and stole her car when he was pulled over Wednesday, according to a report from the Kingston Springs Police Department.

Wiggins was in the car with that woman when he pulled the trigger, and is now jailed on a murder

charge in Baker's death, according to court documents.

The report says 38-year-old Erika Castro-Miles told police early Tuesday that Wiggins had slapped her in the face and pulled out some of her hair, then put a gun to her head and threatened to kill her if she called police. She said he then grabbed her keys and took her car without her permission.

Castro-Miles also told police Wiggins had been "doing meth all night and smoking marijuana." She told police she married Wiggins, the report said.

"Our worst fears were realized in this case. No family should ever have to endure a loss such as this and we are grateful for a community that has rallied around this family and our agency throughout this investigation."

such cultural significance to many is something he appreciates as his new responsibility sinks in. At the same time, he says, he feels that the bigger job lies ahead.

"Yes, my election made a mark in history: I've come to understand through talking with people that the fact has great import for many," Johnson said. "But I didn't run to make history, I ran to make a difference. It was more to me a matter of, okay, we're going to do a job, but I learned that it's more than that to others. To me, it's being a servant, helping the people, helping the city, and putting my hands to work where we see there's a need. It would mean more to me, not to just have the ball kicked to me, but to be able to run with the ball, to be able to do something would mean a whole lot to the Sneads community. That's all ahead of me and I'm ready to dig in."

Johnson said he believes one of his first obligations is to help the town shore up its financial condition by creating more events that will bring locals and outsiders in to enjoy what he considers two of the town's most valuable assets — the Adam Tucker Wilson Baseball Field and Park off Legion Road, and Sneads Park, which is just a short distance away and borders Lake Seminole at the end of that road.

And to do that, he says, the town must first build up its sense of unity.

Working together, Johnson said, is the answer to more than one challenge. He said he will be devoting himself to that task of unity-building in order to achieve the financial gains.

"Number one on my agenda is community unity, because with that you have a recipe for success," Johnson said. "When the community comes together, we're going to do some great things and, financially, Sneads is going to burst at the seams. When we start to feel it and act on the feeling, we'll see just a lot of things happening. I have two years in my term; I'm working like I'm starting my second year. I like to work ahead. We can help ourselves. We have the resources."

Johnson envisions community members working together as volunteers to set up events so alluring and worthwhile that visitors

will be willing to spend their money on tickets to get in and shop with vendors as well during events that include that opportunity. He said gate proceeds and perhaps city-run booths inside could go into a fund for road improvements or other needs that constituents demand but for which the city simply doesn't have the money right now.

He also believes he and other council members should make grant-seeking a priority task for the city manager and perhaps other office employees at city hall.


Johnson said he feels the weight of what he's taking on. He likens it, to an extent, to his other big job in life other than those of being a husband and father, a barber/stylist for the troubled men and women who live at Florida State Hospital and as a small-business owner with an in-home, after-hours barbershop.

Johnson has been the pastor of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church on Old U.S. Road in Marianna for 15 years. While this new secular undertaking is far different in many ways, it, too, is a matter of service to humanity, he says.

"In a way, it felt like the church body had gotten larger, because in both cases, I'm to be a servant of the people. I know what it's like to be a representative and a servant, so that was what it felt like to me. It's an obligation that I welcome," he explained.

Johnson said he'd been asked more than once in recent years to take a stab at politics. He decided to throw his hat in the ring after completing an educational milestone this year: A 1984 graduate of Marianna High School, in 2017 he obtained his bachelor's degree in theology from Smith Bible College at its branch operation on the campus of 2nd West Baptist Association in Marianna. He'd expected to move forward to get his master's degree, as well, but said he couldn't concentrate on that with the pending election on his mind. After some prayer and some discussion with his wife, he set that goal aside for later.

"I'd kept saying I'd run, but this year it came to the point that I felt I had to make good on that," Johnson said. "It felt good, like the right thing to do. I've done what others have done: I've met with people, I've laughed and cried along the campaign trail, I wore myself out doing it and I had support. By the help and

grace of God, we won. Now making happen what we say we want to happen is the real story for me."

On Election Day, and throughout the campaign, Johnson often thought of his father, the late Chance Johnson, and a nightly ritual his father insisted upon in his youth.

"My dad had a third-grade education, and I'm still trying to measure up to be the husband and father he was. Back when I didn't know anything about anything, he would make us (his children) sit down and watch the evening news, back when we had only three channels," Johnson recalled of his earliest years. "There was no excuse, nothing else you could be doing that was more important than sitting down at 5 p.m. and bearing witness to what was happening in the world around you. And when we came of age, we all had to vote. Dad has been gone now some 20-plus years, but we still call each other and make sure we've all voted. It's always something that we pay attention to, because our father embedded that civic obligation in our consciousness, along with the obligation to stay informed."

Johnson feels certain his father would have felt immeasurable pride in his decision to step up to the political plate. He knows his mother does: At the age of 92, Josie Johnson rose from her wheelchair and, with the aid of a walker, made her way down the driveway at home to hitch a ride with her kids to town hall, where the votes were counted on May 21. Walking instead of riding in her wheelchair is a difficult and seldom-attempted task for her, because of severe

arthritis in her right leg, but she insisted on it. Although she couldn't make it all the way inside town hall, she sat in the car outside and waited to hear the results as soon as they were known.

Johnson said his parents' models are inspirations and that he expects them to be valuable purs to help him keep walking and stay committed when the going gets tough in his new role.

His wife of almost 30 years and their four children — Jacquetta Johnson, Brittany Johnson, Daryl Johnson Jr., and DeAndrea Johnson — will provide more underpinning, he said.

Whether he'd won by the numbers or not, he says, he feels that he won in a different way when he looks back and counts the other gains. "I'd won because I'd made new relationships, heard really meaningful stories and shared some of my own with other people," Johnson said. "There was a connection made, truly, and that's what matters most of all."

He said he's looking forward to a good working relationship with the fellow members of the town council.

"I like to think that I and the rest of the council — Tim Arnold, Greg Lewis, Danny Pettis and Helen Grice — will be working together as good people trying to reach common goals. It's not like we're on different boats, we're on one boat — and it's about what's right, not who's right. I think we will be able to accomplish a lot together. You can't get anything done when you're bickering, but when you're talking, you can make things happen. Once we come to an agreed-upon working plan, we'll accomplish it, I'm confident."

traditional way.

Most people pack a lunch, all are advised to bring bug spray and use sunscreen, some bring fishing gear, and all are issued garbage bags so that, if they choose, they can help clean debris from the river as they meander along. Many linger on the water far longer than the few hours it takes to make the run with no leisurely stops. A shuttle will await participants at the Magnolia Bridge boat ramp until noon to take them back to their vehicles in the lot at Spring Creek Park. If they stay on the water longer, they must arrange for their own transportation back. Although it's called Canoeing for Cancer, people can kayak, tube or float down on rafts.

Donations come, too, from folks who take a different route. Those folks usually skip the creek and head straight up river in the opposite direction below Magnolia Bridge to meet Hayes at her usual perch on her boat. It's always

anchored for the morning at Spring Creek, where Hayes collections the first donations, but by noon, Hayes and her husband will have shuttled out and re-launched her boat to the point where the creek and the river merge downriver. There, the crowd on the alternate route can hand over their contributions. Some people who can't or don't want to make any of the trip, but believe in the cause, will give Hayes their donations in chance encounters at Winn-Dixie in Marianna, where she works as a cashier, or elsewhere.

Hayes can't make the whole trip on the water herself anymore: A vehicle crash in 2009, the year after she started the fundraiser, left her unable to move from the waist down. The danger of something going wrong is too great to risk the full adventure, a fact that she finds more than a little frustrating.

Hayes, a self-described "river rat," started the canoeing adventure in 2008 to honor her mother, also named Sheila, who was diagnosed with cancer the year before. Her mother is living cancer-free these

days, and usually makes the canoeing trip. If she can't this time around, she will be cheering her daughter and the others on from home.

Hayes said she'll be thinking a lot this year about her friend Terry Wood, who died of cancer just after last year's Canoe for Cancer. Wood and her best friend had been long time participants in the event, long before she was diagnosed.

The event founder said that many on the trip will also be thinking of loved ones they've lost and that they may, as she does, find some healing element in nature that day.

The event has drawn as many 50 people some years and, when rain is seriously threatening in the forecast, as few as 12. Donations have ranged from \$2,000 to \$8,000 each year. The money has typically been distributed to one or more individuals each year, or

to a medical service group charged with making sure it is used to help those in need. Hayes estimates that 20 people have been directly assisted, not counting those selected on the few occasions when the money has gone to a team in charge of distributing it.

Hayes is hoping to set an all-time participation and donation record this year, to cap off the event she has held so dear and shepherded for so long.

Man gets 35 years for fatal DUI crash at school bus stop

BARTOW — A former law enforcement officer has been sentenced to 35 years in prison for killing one child and injuring four others in a drunken hit-and-run crash at a Florida bus stop.

The Ledger reports that 49-year-old John Camfield was sentenced Thursday. He pleaded no contest in February to DUI manslaughter and several other charges.

Authorities say Camfield hit five Dundee Ridge Middle Academy students walking along the shoulder of a Poinciana road last April. Witnesses say he tried to speed away but crashed into another vehicle. One boy died a day later.

Camfield's blood-alcohol level was measured at 0.147 percent after the crash. Florida law considers a driver impaired at 0.08 percent.

Warriors withstand James' 51 to win Game 1

OAKLAND, Calif. — The Golden State Warriors somehow withstood LeBron James' latest brilliance on the NBA Finals stage.

A costly blunder by J.R. Smith and a disputed foul call involving James himself sure helped.

Stephen Curry scored 29 points and the Warriors capitalized on Smith's mistake that sent the game into overtime, overcoming a 51-point performance by James to beat Cleveland 124-114 in Game 1 on Thursday night.

The game nearly over, James jawed with both Curry and Klay Thompson, then Tristan Thompson and Draymond Green tangled moments later and made contact. After replay review, Tristan Thompson received a Flagrant 2 foul and ejection with 2.6 seconds left.

James was in utter disbelief as regulation ended stunningly: George Hill made the first of two free throws with 4.7 seconds left after being fouled by Klay Thompson, but when Smith secured the rebound of the second, he dribbled back toward half-court instead of shooting, apparently thinking the Cavs had a lead.

"He thought it was over. He thought we were up one," coach Tyronn Lue said.

Yet Smith insisted he knew the score. Green figured Smith was simply looking for James, saying, "I would have looked for

LeBron, too."

"I just thought we were going to call a timeout. Be-

cause I got the rebound, I'm pretty sure I couldn't shoot it over KD," Smith

said of Kevin Durant. "If I thought we were ahead, I would have just held on to

the ball so they could foul me. Clearly that wasn't the case."

Instead, OT.

And why not? Both these teams were pushed to their limits in seven-game conference finals they each had to win on the road.

"I can't talk about a situation that way because I do some dumb stuff on the court," Durant said of how the fourth quarter finished. "I don't know what was going through J.R.'s head. He made a great rebound and gave them an opportunity to win the basketball game."

Game 2 is Sunday night back at Oracle Arena, where the Warriors have won 18 of their last 19 postseason games. In 2015, when the Golden State beat the Cavs to capture the franchise's first title in 40 years, the first two games of the series went to OT — Golden State winning the opener and Cleveland Game 2.

James shot 19 for 32 to go with eight assists and eight rebounds in the opener of his eighth straight NBA Finals and ninth overall, as well as Cavs-Warriors Take IV. James notched his eighth 40-point game during this playoff run to tie Hall of Famer Jerry West's feat in 1965 for most in a single postseason.

"We've got to move on," James said. "This game is over and done with. We had opportunities."

James drove past Curry for a three-point play with 50 seconds remaining in the fourth. But James was

given a foul following a review with 36.4 seconds left and Durant converted a pair of free throws to tie it at 104.

The call had initially been a charge on 2017 finals MVP Durant and James protested the change — while KD said afterward he thought it was the right decision because "I knew he was late on the drive and I knew I had my man beat and he came over a little late."

James called it a "huge play" and said "I knew I was outside the charge line."

"I read that play as well as I've read any play in my career, maybe in my life," James said.

Rules allow officials to go to replay in the final 2 minutes of regulation or in overtime to determine if a defender attempting to draw a charge was in the restricted area. When doing so, they can view if the defender was in a legal guarding position. They decided James wasn't and changed their original call.

Lue was disgusted to lose this way, saying of the overturned call: "It's never been done, ever in the history of the game. And then tonight in the finals on the biggest stage, when our team played well, played our (butt) off, man, it ain't right."

Lue added that the way James played, "to come up robbed, it's just not right."

Durant struggled to find his stroke but wound up with 26 points on 8-for-22 shooting and nine rebounds.

Young drivers struggling to find victory lane

LONG POND, Pa. — Kyle Busch tossed his son into the air at Texas. Clint Bowyer waited for his toddler to run toward him with open arms at Martinsville. Kevin Harvick rested his hands on his son's shoulders as they gazed at a trophy in Atlanta.

Hey, who says the young kids in NASCAR can't celebrate in victory lane?

OK, in the sagging sport's version of that story, it's the ballyhooed youth movement that would have paid dividends with checkered flags and publicity bursts as NASCAR nears the half-way point.

But NASCAR is still very much a veteran driver's game.

Ryan Blaney and Chase Elliott each won qualifying races in Speedweeks for the Daytona 500, seemingly setting the stage for the new generation to take the reins in 2018. And who won the pole for Daytona? Yup, 25-year-old Alex Bowman in his debut race for Hendrick Motorsports.

The sizzling starts haven't carried over as the season nears the midway point. Elliott, winless in 90 career starts, has three top-five finishes this season.

Bowman, 0 for 94, has

just one top five in '18.

"I haven't had one (car) feel like what I want so far this year because we haven't won yet," Bowman said. "I don't think I'm going to have one that I like until we win, but we are getting closer."

Bowman finished a solid ninth last week at the Coca-Cola 600 in his best career finish on an intermediate track. Bowman said he hasn't felt stress from replacing the retired Dale Earnhardt Jr. in the No. 88 Chevrolet. But rather, the burden comes from failing to bring home trophies for one of the most storied organizations in NASCAR history.

"Hendrick Motorsports is known for winning races and winning championships and that is what I'm expected to do," Bowman said. "I think most of my pressure comes from myself and the fact that I just want to win races and prove that I can do it."

As the series shifts to Pocono Raceway, Blaney's win for the Wood Brothers last June marked the last time a driver won his first career Cup race. Sure, there have been close calls and blown leads and bad breaks.

Darrell Wallace Jr., Erik Jones, William Byron, the

list goes on of 20-something drivers stuck with the 0 in the win column.

It's rare at Pocono for a driver to break through for his first career Cup victory.

Jeremy Mayfield (June 1998), Denny Hamlin (June 2006), Chris Buescher (August 2016) and Blaney all scored their first wins on the tri-oval track nestled in the mountains.

Blaney's win ended a five-race stretch last season that included first-time winners Ricky Stenhouse Jr. and Austin Dillon. Stenhouse and Dillon, the 2018 Daytona 500 champion, each won again.

The rest of the list reads like much like it has for most of the last five years; Harvick and Busch, Martin Truex Jr., Brad Keselowski and Denny Hamlin headline the drivers with multiple victories since last June.

The 42-year-old Harvick and 33-year-old Busch, each former series champions, have nine of the 13 wins in Cup this season.

The veterans aren't ready to pass the torch.

The so-called young guns are still shooting blanks.

Wallace, who made his first career Cup start last June at Pocono, energized

the sport when he finished second this year in the Daytona 500 for the best-ever finish in the race for a black driver. He hasn't finished better than 16th in any of his last five races.

Wallace said the struggles from the budding stars could be pinned on more than inexperience.

"The Chevrolets are kind of struggling as a whole," he said. "I think we're missing a little bit on the new body."

Dillon won Daytona in a Chevy — the only one for the manufacturer in its first year using the Camaro.

Seven-time champion

Jimmie Johnson is riding a career-worst losing streak in the No. 48 Chevy and Kyle Larson, with five career Cup wins, are among the winless veteran Chevy drivers.

Johnson, though, needed only 13 starts before he won his first Cup race, Harvick won in just his third start and Busch won two races his rookie year.

The O-fer streak won't last forever.

So who's next to crack the first-timer club?

Elliott, son of NASCAR Hall of Famer Bill Elliott, is the obvious choice. He had five runner-up finishes last season and was second

this year at Richmond.

"Erik Jones is running good and (Daniel) Suarez is running really well," Blaney said. "Those three stick out in my mind of the next ones who will get their first win pretty soon. I think their teams are good enough and them as drivers are plenty good enough. It just needs to all work out for them."

Bowyer, Busch, Dillon, Harvick, Joey Logano and Truex are locked into NASCAR's playoffs with their wins. Bowman, Jones and Elliott are teetering on making the 16-driver field and could use that victory to make the playoffs.

Colleges

SEC relaxes transfer rules, clearing path for UF's Jefferson

The Southeastern Conference has relaxed two rules regarding intra-league transfers, clearing the way for former Mississippi receiver Van Jefferson to play at Florida this fall and opening the door for Alabama offensive lineman Brandon Kennedy to be eligible for a rival school this season.

SEC presidents and chancellors passed legislation Friday in Destin, Florida, that allows players at a

school under NCAA sanctions to transfer to another institution within the conference without sitting out a season. Florida and Texas A&M sponsored the proposal, with Jefferson reaping the immediate benefits.

Jefferson, a fourth-year junior, caught 42 passes for 456 yards and a touchdown in 2017 for Ole Miss. He had 999 yards receiving in two seasons before transferring to Florida this offseason. He still has to gain clearance

from the NCAA.

The SEC also passed a rule that allows players who have received their degrees from SEC schools to transfer within the conference and play right away, without the need for a waiver. Previously, the SEC required grad transfers to sit out a season if they switched to another SEC school. NCAA rules allow athletes who have graduated to transfer without sitting out a season, but the SEC rule trumped the NCAA bylaw.

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French Open

Call it a comeback: Serena Williams to 3rd round

PARIS — Eventually, this looked a little bit like one of those Serena Williams comebacks of old, filled with top-notch strokes and full-throated screams of “Come on!”

For the first half-hour in the French Open's second round Wednesday, the 23-time Grand Slam champion generally played the way you would expect from someone competing at her first Grand Slam tournament in 16 months — and first since she gave birth to a daughter last September.

And then, suddenly, Williams was back. Animated. Determined. Dominant, even. Erasing a deficit of a set and a break, Williams recalibrated her shots and beat 17th-seeded Ashleigh Barty of Australia 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 in a match that ended shortly before dusk.

“I lost the first set, and I thought, ‘I’ve got to try harder. I’ve got to just try harder.’ And Serena came out,” Williams told the crowd, leaning forward and breaking into laughter.

“Every day is a great day for me,” said Williams, who is also entered in doubles, with her older sister, Venus. “I’m going to be here, fighting my heart out. It’s such a great feeling.”

Williams had all sorts of trouble in the opening set, compiling 12 unforced

errors. By the time the second set was merely one game old, she had been broken twice in the match, each time at love, a rather surprising development for the owner of one of her sport's most dangerous serves.

But then she started letting herself be heard, yell-

ing and pumping her fist after pretty much every point that went her way. It woke up Williams' game. Might have startled Barty, too. As big a hitter as Barty is in her own right, she is hardly in Williams' class — who is? — and never has been past the third round at a major tournament.

Exhorting herself and

celebrating key moments along the path back, Williams grabbed four consecutive games over a span of less than 15 minutes to lead 4-1 in the second set, which soon enough would be hers. She gained control of the third almost immediately, breaking to go ahead 2-1, then holding for 3-1.

When Williams served out the victory with a backhand winner down the line, she raised both arms overhead and held up her left fist as she approached the net to meet Barty. In the stands, Williams' coach, Patrick Mouratoglou, shook his fist.

After statistics that were so negatively lopsided in

that initial set, in which she managed to produce only three winners, Williams straightened things out, to the tune of 25 winners the rest of the way.

Not bad for someone who hasn't played in one of tennis' four most important events since January 2017, when she won the Australian Open while pregnant.

Williams is ranked only 451st this week, because of her extended absence from the tour. She had played only four matches — going 2-2 — all season until this week.

Next for Williams is a third-round match against 11th-seeded Julia Goerges of Germany.

Get through that, and Williams would face either five-time major champion Maria Sharapova or 2016 U.S. Open runner-up Karolina Pliskova. Williams beat Pliskova's twin sister, Kristyna, in the first round in Paris.

There were, to be sure, plenty of other big names in action Wednesday, including victories for Sharapova, No. 1-ranked Simona Halep and 10-time men's champion Rafael Nadal.

But the 2018 French Open is, first and foremost, about Williams and her return to a Grand Slam stage.

She is assured of taking at least one more bow in the singles draw.

Florida turns to Billy D for help before NCAA regional play

GAINESVILLE — With his baseball program mired in its worst slump in five years, Florida coach Kevin O'Sullivan wanted a different voice to talk to his players.

Thumbing through his phone, one name stood out: Former Gators basketball coach Billy Donovan.

Donovan happened to be in town, too, so O'Sullivan lined up the high-profile guest to speak to the team Wednesday.

The Oklahoma City Thunder coach delivered a clear message about dealing with adversity. Donovan used an example from his time in Gainesville, when the defending national champion Gators dropped three of four down the stretch in 2007 — all by double digits — and then regrouped in the postseason by winning 10 straight and the second of back-to-back titles.

“I thought there were a lot of similarities,” O'Sullivan said. “I think he was really helpful.”

O'Sullivan's team is hoping for the same sort of turnaround that Donovan experienced.

The top-seeded and defending national champion Gators (42-17) begin regional play Friday having lost six of their last seven, all since clinching the Southeastern Conference's regular-season title.

O'Sullivan figures it's human nature to have a let-

down, especially during a pressure-packed season, but he's hoping to avoid a total collapse. Florida opens against Ivy League champion Columbia (20-28), one of two teams in the tournament with a losing record. Jacksonville (39-19) and Florida Atlantic (40-17) round out the four-team regional.

But the Gators will garner most of the attention, and for good reason.

Ace Brady Singer, expected to be a top-five pick in next week's MLB draft, is scheduled to return Saturday after missing two weeks with a strained left hamstring. All-SEC catcher JJ Schwarz, a senior and the team's sole captain, remains sidelined with a broken bone in his right hand. And SEC Player of the Year Jonathan India is in a slump, hitting .190 with two RBIs over the last six games. The usually sure-handed third baseman also had made five errors in the last four outings.

“Basically a clean slate,” said India, also projected to be a first-round selection. “Just forget about the past and play like it's a new season, start over. ... We didn't really battle much adversity this year, so every team is going to go through it at one point. We're going through it now. It's just the cards we've been dealt. We've got to get that focus back and play like we did at the beginning of the year.”

The Gators looked like a lock to make it to the College World Series just a few weeks ago. They won 19 consecutive weekend series, the last one coming against Georgia that clinched the SEC title.

Little has gone right since.

Singer tweaked his hamstring just a few minutes before a Thursday night start at Mississippi State in the final regular-season series, forcing O'Sullivan to shuffle his starting rotation and go with freshman Tommy Mace. Schwarz broke his hand a couple of hours later, the inning before O'Sullivan planned to pull him for some rest. India's slump started that same night.

Florida's mostly reliable bullpen also got knocked around by the Bulldogs, with All-American closer Michael Byrne giving up four earned runs in 1 2/3 innings and setup man Jordan Butler surrendering four walks and six earned runs in 2 1/3 innings.

The Gators didn't play much better in the SEC Tournament, getting outscored 19-2 in consecutive losses to LSU and Arkansas.

“We're fine,” Byrne insisted. “It happens in baseball. We've gone through a stretch, but we know how good we are and what we're capable of doing.”

Still, O'Sullivan was concerned enough to turn to Donovan for some outside help.

Louisville hitting road after going 15-0 in last 5 regionals

OMAHA, Neb. — The NCAA baseball tournament opens Friday with play in 16 regionals. Regional winners advance to super regionals next week, and the final eight go to the College World Series in Omaha beginning June 16. Some of the top story lines:

Regal in Regionals

No one in the 64-team field has had more success in recent regionals than Louisville. The Cardinals must travel to Lubbock, Texas, as a No. 2 regional seed, so we'll see if they can keep it up. They've hosted regionals each of the last five years and have gone 15-0. Their five straight appearances in super regionals mark the longest active streak.

Four other teams have won three straight regionals. Texas A&M is 9-0 over the stretch, all at home, but must go to Austin this week. Florida State is 10-1, and Florida and LSU are 9-1, all at home. FSU and Florida State are at home again this week and LSU plays in Corvallis, Oregon.

North Carolina State, on the other hand, has lost regional finals each of the last three years.

Who's hot

Stetson is a host for the first time and owns the nation's longest active winning streak at 15 games. The Hatters haven't lost since April 22 against NJIT. Other notable current streaks are Minnesota (nine straight) and Wright State and Canisius (eight each). Wright State has won 15 of 17, Missouri State 12 of 13, Coastal Carolina and Florida State 11 of 12 and Saint Louis nine of 10.

Who's not

No team is colder than Oklahoma State, which was in first place in the Big 12 after sweeping rival Oklahoma in late April. Since then the Cowboys have lost 10 of 12, including the last six. Defending national champion Florida has lost six of seven and Ohio State has dropped six of 10.

Feeling a draft

Nineteen of D1Baseball.com's projected first-round picks in the Major League Baseball draft are in the tournament. Some of the top prospects are Auburn pitcher and possible No. 1 overall pick Casey Mize, Florida third baseman Jonathan India, Oregon State second baseman Nick Madrigal; pitchers Brady Singer and Jackson Kowar of Florida, Ryan Rolison of Mississippi, Shane McClanahan of South Florida and Logan Gilbert of Stetson; and outfielders Trevor Larnach of Oregon State, Jameson Hannah of Dallas Baptist

and Steele Walker of Oklahoma.

Bringing the metal

Dallas Baptist senior right fielder and leadoff man Devlin Granberg has the highest batting average in the tournament. At .426, he's on his way to winning a second straight Missouri Valley Conference batting title. Other .400 hitters are Tennessee Tech's Kevin Strohschein (.406), East Carolina's Bryant Packard (.403), Tennessee Tech's Chris Chambers (.400) and Southern Mississippi's Luke Reynolds (.400).

Making their pitch

The top six ERA teams in the nation are in regionals: Stetson (2.58), Stanford (2.85), UCLA (2.94), St. John's (2.95), Indiana (2.95) and Gonzaga (2.96). Nick Sandlin of Southern Miss brings in a 1.13 ERA, Oregon State's Luke Heimlich has 14 wins against one loss and USF's McClanahan averages 14.76 strikeouts per nine innings — all nation-leading numbers.

Double play

Oklahoma center fielder and cleanup hitter Kyler Murray is favored to win the Sooners' starting quarterback job after backing up Baker Mayfield. Murray is batting .296 with 10 homers, 47 RBIs, a .556 slugging percentage and 10 stolen bases. He missed most of the Big 12 Tournament with a left hamstring injury. About the only thing that would keep Murray from playing football this fall would be if he's drafted in baseball and decides to take the immediate money.

Martin's year?

Florida State is making its 41st straight appearance, and Mike Martin has been head coach for 39 of them. With each one comes the question: Will this be the year Martin and the Seminoles win their first national championship? Martin, 74, became the NCAA's all-time wins leader on May 5, and the Seminoles are hot after sweeping through the ACC Tournament.

But the path to Omaha is treacherous. The No. 2 seed in the Tallahassee Regional, Mississippi State, has had a knack for knocking off heavyweights. If seeds hold, the Seminoles would host a super regional against a Clemson team they split four games with in the ACC.


That pesky No. 1 seed

The last No. 1 national seed to win the championship was Miami in 1999, the first year of the current tournament structure. Florida was a No. 3 seed when it won the title last year. The most recent No. 1 to reach the College World Series finals was Texas in 2009.




Dubious playoff could spoil Kevin, Kyle show

Anybody else notice that NASCAR has the makings of a historically great two-driver battle for the championship?

Kevin Harvick and Kyle Busch, between them, have won nine of the season's first 13 races — Harvick five and Busch four. So far, the rest of the field is picking up scraps.

At this pace, they will win about 26 of the season's 36 races. Savvy fans are waiting for the two of them to duel to the finish. Last Sunday's 600-miler in Charlotte would have been the perfect time for that to happen.

As it turned out, Busch dominated, leading 377 of the 400 laps and winning with ease. But for much of the race, Harvick, who started on the back row, was moving steadily forward. He appeared to have the one car capable of offering a challenge — until a tire failure sent him crashing into the wall and ended his race.

Maybe the two of them will continue their blistering seasons; maybe not. Lots of other scenarios can unfold in a long stock car racing season, but for the sake of argument, let's say they continue to dominate.

Let's imagine they come to the final race with about a dozen wins apiece, both running well, first and second in the standings with only a handful of points separating them. Wow! What a fantastic setup for the season finale — two deserving, talented drivers with great cars and great crews settling the championship.

Just one problem. In today's NASCAR, there can never be a two-driver showdown.

(Uh-oh, Hallman is cutting loose with another of his I-don't-like-the-NASCAR-playoff-system columns.)

By the way, did I tell you I don't like the NASCAR playoff system?

The first 13 races of this season, projected through the full racing year, offer the perfect demonstration of the weakness of the playoffs devised for the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series.

No matter how dominant two drivers have been — no matter how many races they have won, no matter how many laps they have led, no matter how much they have shut out the other drivers in the series — the championship will be a tossup among four drivers in the final race. Four drivers. Not two.

If Harvick and Busch continue their great seasons, either or both could have a miserable three-race stretch and be eliminated, which would make the championship event a farce. But let's say they both do well down the stretch and are eligible to win in the season's last race.

But two other drivers also will be eligible. Maybe the two interlopers have a couple of wins each. Maybe one of them has scraped by on points and has no wins at all. NASCAR's playoff system wipes out all that has gone before and makes all four equal at the start of the finale. The driver who finishes best of the four in that one race will be champ.

Let's just imagine the worst case, because

that's what I keep imagining whenever I think about this system.

So, Harvick and Busch make it to the finale. Both have their cars running well at the 1.5-mile Homestead-Miami Speedway, where the title is decided.

They race hard. They trade the lead frequently. Their pit crews serve them well. They're way ahead of the rest of the field, including the other two championship-eligible drivers, one of whom is chugging along in eighth place, the other of whom has mechanical problems and is several laps down in 23rd.

With four laps to go in their battle, Harvick and Busch are racing side by side for the lead. One of them tries just that much too hard in a turn, slides into the other and both crash.

And, guess what, here comes a driver who has won, say, two races all year inheriting the championship by running eighth. Well, he's in sixth place now because the two legitimate contenders — who have won, say, 12 and 13 races respectively — are climbing out of their wasted cars.

Your new champion has been so far behind for the whole race, indeed for the whole season, that he needed his high heels just to get a glimpse of the leaders.

Congratulations, champ. Yes, the odds of this particular thing happening are steep. But the odds that NASCAR's four-car title race will someday yield a bogus champ are not that steep.

NASCAR should be concerned that it could happen at all.



Alabama line: Payne joins Allen to help Redskins

ASHBURN, Va. — The Washington Redskins have paired two Alabama defensive linemen in an effort to upgrade their run defense, drafting Daron Payne to join Jonathan Allen in consecutive year first-round picks.

Allen showed star potential until a foot injury cut his rookie season short in the fifth game. Four picks ahead of where they got Allen, the Redskins thought it best to roll with another Crimson Tide big man by taking Payne.

"The more Alabama guys, the better," Allen said during Redskins organized team activities on Wednesday. "I was super excited about. I knew what kind of guy we were getting. I knew he was going to fit in and help us reach our goals."

The Redskins know they must improve their run defense. They finished worst in the NFL last season at 134.1 yards allowed a game — hurt by injuries to Allen and others.

Considering how the group performed when Allen was on the field, allowing just 88 rushing yards a game, Washington could be in store for a massive upgrade.

"(Jonathan) was a key component in the run game and the pass game," linebacker Preston Smith said. "He helped collapse the pocket. He helped stop the run. He's a multi-talented guy."

He is also a healthy guy. Allen, who had 22.5

sacks during his final two seasons at Alabama, deemed himself "100 percent" and pain-free following Wednesday's session.

"I think he did a great job of rehabbing in the offseason," defensive coordinator Greg Manusky said of

Allen, who had a Lisfranc injury to his left foot. "We were kind of a little bit hesitant early on when he was here just taking reps and stuff, but looks like he's just keeps on progressing from where he kind of left off last year. The sky's the limit for him."

Allen's presence helped a defensive front that otherwise lacked playmakers. The hope is Payne makes two.

Though not in Allen's class as a pass rusher, Payne's ferocious work helped spark Alabama's win for the national title

against Georgia. Early reviews suggest that version of Payne is causing havoc on the Redskins practice field.


"I've seen Payne these few days of practice being really disruptive in the run game and he can pass rush," Smith said. "He's a really athletic big guy. I don't know if a lot of people slept on him, but we're thankful for him, that he was there when we got the chance to draft him. We're glad to get him."

Now Payne lines up yet again next to his fellow disruptor and friend. Two other former Alabama teammates — outside linebacker Ryan Anderson and rookie inside linebacker Shaun Dion Hamilton — also may contribute along the front seven.

Allen sees the defensive line making major moves and genuinely believed the pieces existed for success last season.

Now there's a second Alabama defensive lineman at the point of attack to add to promising holdovers Matt Ioannidis and Anthony Lanier, who are entering their third seasons.

"I really think we're going to be a dominant defense," Allen said. "If we can stay healthy and do what I know we can, there's nothing stopping us."

Kobe Bryant visits Patriots practice; Brady, Gronk not there

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — The New England Patriots were thrilled to have a five-time champion with them at practice this week.

Not Tom Brady, Kobe Bryant.

With their quarterback skipping organized team activities along with tight end Rob Gronkowski, the Patriots returned to Gillette Stadium for offseason workouts this week. After Bryant visited the team on Wednesday, several New England players noted the similarities between him and Brady.

"They're both highly competitive guys," defensive back Devin McCourty said Thursday. "I think everybody sees that."

Although the Patriots wouldn't elaborate on what Bryant said to them, McCourty came away impressed with his attention to detail with everything involved in basketball — not just shooting, but practice and working out and his relationship with his teammates.

Several Patriots posted pictures of themselves on Wednesday. Bryant on social media on Wednesday. Belichick said he has a lot of respect for the 2008 NBA MVP

and thought his team could learn from meeting him.

"It was a cool experience," running back James White said. "It's an honor to meet a guy who's one of the greatest athletes of all time."

Of course, White knows another guy like that.

But Brady has reportedly been working out with his personal trainer instead of with his teammates. A three-time NFL MVP who will turn 41 in August, Brady is said to be upset with coach Bill Belichick over his attempts to speed up the succession plan at quarterback and move Jimmy Garoppolo into the starting job before Brady was ready to give it up.

Garoppolo was traded to the San Francisco 49ers midseason, reportedly on a mandate from owner Robert Kraft.

"(No.) 12 is a big part of this team, and he means a lot to us in the locker room. But as far as the culture goes, it's always been 'next man up,'" linebacker Dont'a Hightower said. "We're not going to work harder just because 12's not here or because Gronk's not here. ... Whenever he gets back, we'll be glad to have them both, but it's not going to stop us from working."

No Julio? No problem, say Falcons, carrying on without him

FLOWERY BRANCH, Ga. — Matt Ryan barked out a play, took the snap and zipped a pass to the receiver who played his college ball at Alabama.

Nope, it wasn't Julio Jones. He's sitting out the team's voluntary offseason program. So it was Calvin Ridley — a first-round draft pick from the Crimson Tide — who got a chance to shine during a 90-minute practice Wednesday.

But, for a team with Super Bowl aspirations, it was impossible to ignore the absence of No. 11.

So, where's Julio?

The Falcons say it's no big deal, even as they talk constantly about the importance building camaraderie and trust in each other during the voluntary offseason workouts, a big part of coach Dan Quinn's much-ballyhooed "Brotherhood."

Jones said his absence has nothing to do with any hard feelings toward the only team he's played with in the NFL, but he's vague about his reasons for staying away and it seems fairly obvious that he's trying to send a message about his desire for a new contract.

While Jones still has three seasons remaining on the last deal he signed — a five-year, \$71.3 million extension with \$47 million in guaranteed money — his average salary is now less than at least a half-dozen receivers around the league. Most tellingly, recent deals with Tampa Bay's Mike Evans and Cleveland's Jarvis Landry seemed to set a whole new financial bar for the NFL's top pass catchers, a list that certainly includes Jones.

In addition, he surely took note when the Falcons made quarterback Matt Ryan the league's NFL's first \$100 million man, agreeing to a new deal that assures the quarterback of at least that much in guaranteed money and could average out to as much as \$30 million annually over five seasons.

Rarely flustered, Ryan got a bit testy when asked about missing out on a chance to

work with his favorite receiver during OTAs.

"We'll have our chances to work together," the QB said. "I'm not going to go into it more than that. It's not really anybody else's business."

Jones has gone silent on social media and hasn't spoken in months to the Atlanta media, but he did provide some reassuring words to Falcons fans when the gossip site TMZ caught up with him last weekend as he was leaving a swanky restaurant in West Hollywood.

"Everyone wants a story right now. There's no story to be told," Jones insisted. "I'm just working on getting myself better. I'm just working on myself right now. That's all that is. There's no bad blood between me and the team or anything like that."

Jones insisted that he plans to remain with the Falcons for the rest of his career, echoing a sentiment expressed by owner Arthur Blank.

"Everybody on the outside (is) trying to look in and trying to destroy what we built

there," Jones said. "I'm not going nowhere. I'll be there. I love the team. I love the organization. I love everybody there. I'm good."

Still, Jones' decision to skip OTAs has been a major topic of conversation around Atlanta, with fans and sports talk radio weighing in almost daily on his future with a team that reached the Super Bowl during the 2016 season and the second round of the playoffs last season.

Everyone can rest easy, Quinn insisted.

Jones has assured his coach that he'll be at the team's mandatory minicamp, which is scheduled for June 12-14.

"The guys who are really close to him, obviously they keep up," Quinn said outside the locker room after practice. "It's not like they don't hang out and talk on the phone and do stuff together. They may not be spending the amount of time here, in the building, that they normally do. But that doesn't mean they don't spend time away from here. So, no issues on our end."



Father knows best: An aging patriarch fights for his company in HBO's 'Succession'

WEalthy families make for excellent prime-time viewing, especially dysfunctional ones. Leave it to HBO to elevate the ensemble family drama to new heights as the cable giant takes a look at a family battling for control of a media empire in a new high-profile series.

Brian Cox ("Troy," 2004) stars as Logan Roy, a self-made billionaire who sits at the top of family-controlled media conglomerate Waystar Royco in the new series "Succession," which begins its 10-episode run on Sunday, June 3, on HBO. As the aging patriarch approaches his twilight years, his potential heirs jockey for a position at the head of one of the biggest media and entertainment organizations in the world.

The series was created by Oscar nominee Jesse Armstrong ("In the Loop," 2009), who also penned the script for the pilot and serves as an executive producer on a team that includes Will Ferrell ("Saturday Night Live"), Adam McKay ("The Big Short," 2015) and Frank Rich ("Veep"). McKay, who directed the pilot, explained the focus of the series in an HBO news release.

"There's no question that 'Succession,' at its root, is a family story," McKay noted. "There's also a tragic side to it, where you see how massive wealth and power distorts and twists and wounds this family."

Set in New York City, HBO's newest drama takes a look at politics, money and power as the characters consider what the future might hold for them when Logan steps down from Waystar. Kendall Roy (Jeremy Strong, "Parkland," 2013) is Logan's oldest son from his second marriage and heir apparent to the family business. Already a division president within the company, he seems poised to take over when Logan takes a step

back. Kendall's younger brother, Roman (Kieran Culkin, " Fargo"), still sits on the board of directors at Waystar, though he no longer works there.

Meanwhile, Logan's sole daughter, Shiv ("Sarah Snook," "Predestination," 2014), has been focusing on her political career. Her ambitious partner, Tom (Matthew Macfadyen, "Pride & Prejudice" 2005), works as a senior executive at the firm.

Alan Ruck ("Spin City") stars as Connor, Logan's only child from his first marriage. He, too, sits on Waystar's board of directors, but he's left the family firm to make his own way in New Mexico. The main cast also features Hiam Abbass ("Lemon Tree," 2008) as Logan's third wife, Marcy, a formidable force in her own right.

The remaining staff includes COO Frank (Peter Friedman, "Safe," 1995), who acts as a mentor for Kendall. Alessandro (Parker Sawyers, "Southside With You," 2016) is an up-and-coming executive at the firm. In the debut episode of "Succession," the Roy siblings welcome cousin Greg (Nicholas Braun, "Sky High," 2005) to the fold as he moves from Canada to New York to work in the theme park division. Other key players include Rava Roy (Natalie Gold, "Rubicon"), Kendall's estranged wife and the mother of his two children. As Kendall works to solidify his takeover of Waystar, he wheels and deals with Lawrence

(Rob Yang, "The Americans"), the founder and CEO of a digital media outfit.

The ensemble cast is supported by a top-notch team behind the scenes, from an Oscar winner to television veterans. Creator Armstrong has been better known for his comedy work across the pond. Early on in his career, he wrote for the Channel 4 sketch show "Smack the Pony" with writing partner Sam Bain, with whom he went on to create "Peep Show," "The Old Guys," "Fresh Meat" and "Babylon." Armstrong's other notable writing credits include the Oscar-nominated film "In the Loop" (2009) and the BAFTA-winning comedy "The Thick of It." He also wrote an episode of the popular British anthology series "Black Mirror" and authored the 2015 novel "Love, Sex and Other Foreign Policy Goals."

Like Armstrong, McKay's background is in comedy. He served as head writer for two

seasons of NBC's legendary sketch comedy series "Saturday Night Live," and he's directed a number of big-screen comedies, including "Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy" (2004), "Step Brothers" (2008) and "The Other Guys" (2010). He and creative partner Ferrell founded the comedy website Funny or Die in 2007, along with Michael Kvamme and Chris Henchy. However, McKay has had success with his dramatic work as well, winning an Oscar for his work on the film "The Big Short" (2015).

Of course, TV fans have come to expect comedy from funnyman Ferrell, but "Succession" isn't his first foray into more dramatic territory. He surprised audiences in his first major dramatic role in the

2006 film "Stranger Than Fiction," and has been cast in the comedy-drama film "Zeroville," which is expected to be released in 2018 or 2019.

With a stellar ensemble cast and a strong crew behind the scenes, "Succession" seems to be poised for success, but it isn't the only series about ailing patriarchs and strife within wealthy families. FX's "Trust" followed the story of the Gettys, oil tycoons dealing with the kidnapping of J. Paul Getty's (Donald Sutherland, "M.A.S.H.," 1970) grandson. Fox's "Empire" has been chronicling the saga of hip-hop mogul Lucious Lyon (Terrence Howard, "Hustle & Flow," 2005) for four seasons. Now that both of those series have wrapped up for the season, viewers in search of more wealthy family drama can tune in to "Succession," premiering Sunday, June 3, on HBO.







Q: I've seen Jemaine in a lot of things since "Flight of the Conchords" ended, but what's the other one been up to?

A: The "other one" in "Flight of the Conchords," the HBO series about a New Zealand folk duo trying to make it big in New York, is Bret McKenzie, and he's definitely been keeping a lower profile than co-star Jemaine Clement.

The show was a cult hit when it aired on HBO from 2007 to 2009, with fans taking to its somewhat innovative musical-comedy format. It seems that McKenzie leaned more toward the musical side of that combination; most of his work since the

end of the show has been behind the scenes as a composer.

His two biggest projects allowed him to continue the sort of work he was doing on "Conchords," and indeed put his name among the musical-comedy greats of our time: he worked on Muppet movies.

He was the musical mind behind 2011's "The Muppet Movie" and 2014's "Muppets Most Wanted," serving as music supervisor and penning numerous original tunes for Kermit and company to perform.

Among the company of performers in "Muppets Most Wanted" was his old partner Clement, who appeared in the film as the Prison King.

McKenzie also wrote music for 2012's "The Pirates! Band of Misfits" and the 2016 straight-

to-video comedy "Sainsburys: The Greatest Gift."

He hasn't just been behind the scenes, though. He had one notable on-screen appearance in a little movie called "The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey" (2012), the smash-hit adventure movie filmed in his native New Zealand.

On the other hand, Clement's face, or at least his voice, has been on camera quite a bit since 2009. He's appeared in such big-screen hits as "Dinner for Schmucks" (2010) and "Men in Black 3" (2012), and had voice roles in even bigger hits such as "Rio" (2011), "Rio 2" (2014) and "Moana" (2016).

Their diverging career paths might converge again soon, though: Clement has suggested there may be a "Flight of the Conchords" reunion movie coming up at some point.

Q: When is "The Wall" coming back? It's fun and exciting. I've not seen it being promoted as a summer replacement and hope it hasn't been dropped.

A: I'm going to assume your use of "dropped" was an intentional pun, and I love it. And so, you've earned the good news you're about to receive: the show, in which contestants' success is measured in balls being dropped down a towering wall, has been renewed for another season.

The problem is, the return date might well be as hard to predict as the game itself.

NBC announced the renewal in March without giving a date. The last season was already airing by this point last year, so the network isn't following a pattern at which we can guess.

Indeed, when the renewal was announced, the Hollywood Reporter said this ability to be moved around the schedule is what makes the show valuable to NBC.

"Unlike flagship alternative series 'The Voice' and 'America's Got Talent,' 'The Wall' has done NBC a service in its ability to fill scheduling holes where needed."

It was first needed in the winter of 2017, which is when the freshman season aired. The second was split between the summer of 2017 and the winter of 2018, and it has switched nights repeatedly over that time as well.

All that means it could pop up pretty well any time. It'll likely happen sometime this summer, though — they started casting for the new season at the beginning of April.

The end was maybe a bit too definitive for some characters — without giving away too much, quite a few major characters died at the end of the series.

"We really wanted to close the book on it," creator/writer Jim Kouf told Deadline.com.

That said, the world they created was pretty rich and wide — the sort of mythology-building that lends itself to spinoffs. And while nothing like that is being planned, Kouf wouldn't rule it out in the future: "We leave all our options open. You just never know."
