Weekend promises special Father's Day for young dad

Jacob Kornegay is the daddy of two little girls and this Father's Day will be an especially joyful one for the young parent.

That's because the girls' mother, Carley, and 4-year-old Brylynn have come home to share the weekend with him and 2-year-old Addalynn. The family had not been able to count on that as a sure thing — Brylynn had a heart transplant back in early May, and the trip home from Shands in Gainesville for Father's Day in Jackson County would depend on how well she was getting along after the surgery. She and her mother are still shuttling back and forth to Jackson County in the aftercare period, but expect to be home for good in the coming weeks.

The youngster is recovering very nicely, indeed: Less than a week after doctors threaded in her new heart, Brylynn was sitting up in her hospital bed with a big smile on her face and excitement in her voice as she, via video, announced something to all the people in her world: "I'll be home soon, folks."

Brylynn's biggest difficulty, so far, is a pressure problem. She received the heart of a 6-year-old boy from Alabama. It's a bit big for her 4-year-old body, which leads to that pressure issue, but it will correct itself over time, doctors believe.

Jacob is counting his blessings these days. As he awaited the homecoming of his wife and older daughter this week, he reflected on some of those. He says they are beyond counting. Friends, family members and strangers have reached out in many ways, for instance. Fundraisers have been organized and heavily supported, to help the family with expenses. In some of the videos that the family shares on Facebook, Brylynn is seen pulling the names of winners from a big jar, for various drawings with prizes. She always says "thank you," after her mom calls out the name. Facebook pages for Jacob Kornegay, Carlotta (Carley) Kornegay and A Heart for Brylynn all have some information regarding the child's progress, and many people have responded with words of encouragement and pledges to pray for her. Jacob says those prayers have been important, appreciated, and effective. The money given has also helped tremendously.

Malls, Anchor Tenants and Downtown Revivals

Since the first shopping mall was built more than 60 years ago in Edina, Minnesota, malls have represented the apex of American retail and social culture. If we needed anything, from a prom dress to a lawn mower, we headed to the mall, left our car in a vast parking lot, and attempted to navigate an endless variety of stores. We negotiated long, well-lighted corridors amidst throngs of fellow customers in a shop-'til-you-drop mania.

I bought almost all my Christmas presents at a mall for several years; it was more convenient than driving from store to store. Everything was under one climate-controlled roof. Often our family would journey to the mall, separate and shop, and convene later at an onsite restaurant with our packages at our feet. We'd then compare purchases and talk about which stores were the most appealing. The mall was, simply put, part of our family's weekly experience and part of the larger Ameri-

can culture. Like everyone else, we stopped shopping on Main Street and headed to the mall instead.

I remember the first time I read about the Mall of America shortly after it opened in Bloomington, Minnesota in 1992. One of the first mega-malls, the MOA was the largest in the U.S. in total floor area and the third largest in North America in leasable space.

But like railroad travel, which gave way to planes and cars, malls are now being replaced by online retail and the new outdoor "walking retail" concept. Mall anchor tenants, some of them household names, are closing in droves. Many municipalities are attempting to revive their downtown and inner city regions with new, walker-friendly retail developments, often placed adjacent to apartments and lofts. The irony is obvious, as the trend comes full

circle. The advent of suburban malls hastened the decline of our inner-city shopping districts. Now, the return to walking retail in downtown areas is rendering the suburban mall obsolete.

So what are we doing with our mall space? In California, one mall now houses a prominent tech firm. In Tennessee, another has been converted to a skating rink, a recreation center, a community college and a library. One of the nation's oldest indoor retail spaces, located in Providence, Rhode Island, has been converted to small, one-bedroom apartments. Restaurants and other walk-in retail outlets now occupy abandoned malls.

Dozens of new schools and churches have utilized store space in malls. Once we worried that our kids were wasting too much time hanging out at the mall. Well, they're still there, only now they're attending class.

Apple stands up to the thought police

Tim Cook, the chief executive of Apple, has become something of an apostle for privacy and data encryption. Apple's iMessage system is encrypted end to end, meaning only the sender and user can access the information, which prevents a prying government from looking. "The only way to protect your data is to encrypt it," Cook declared recently. "There is no other way known today. And so, if I were you, I would do business with no one that wasn't doing that."

The messenger app Telegram is not an Apple product, but it embodies Cook's philosophy. Telegram was created by the digital innovator Pavel Durov, a Russian who left the country after he lost control of an earlier social media platform, VKontakte.

Telegram relies on encryption and has 200 million active users worldwide. It is popular and useful in places with nosy governments, such as Russia and Iran. Recently, Russia demanded that Telegram turn over keys to user data, and Telegram refused. As a result, for roughly a month and a half, Russia's communications regulator, Roskomnadzor, has been trying to shut down Telegram in the country.

So far, Durov has kept the service alive in a cat-and-mouse contest with the regulators, who blocked huge swaths of the Russian Internet in a failed attempt to catch and crush his app. By standing up against Russia, Durov appears to be translating Cook's advice into action.

It was curious last week to hear from Durov that the latest roadblock he confronted is at Apple, Cook's company. Russia has asked Apple to remove Telegram from its App Store in Russia and to prevent it from sending notifications to Russian users. According to Durov, since mid-April, Apple has restricted Telegram from updating its app worldwide, a setback that has, among other things, prevented it from meeting the new European data standards.

We understand that Apple is not going to cave in to the Russian thought police. Apple has not removed Telegram from the App Store nor blocked notifications, and on Friday, Apple pushed out an update of Telegram as Durov requested. We have been critical of Cook in the past for Apple's decisions in China, which has made no secret of its invasive surveillance practices and intentions. Cook has said Apple must follow local laws in the countries where it does business, but others have pointed out that those laws can often be written to serve the needs of authoritarian regimes.

In this case, Cook has quietly stood on principle and refused to give in to Russia's demands. This is an important development in the still-unsettled battle over freedom in the digital world. Telegram is an extremely significant test case. If Apple backs up Durov and resists pressure, as it appears to be doing, others may be encouraged to stand tall as well.



Alexa, spy on me

You've already heard the recent story: Amazon's voice-activated Echo device secretly recorded a couple's private conversations and then sent recordings to a random person. That's the short version, and it has several things wrong with it.

First, of course Alexa is listening to you. How would it hear the wake-up word "Alexa" if it didn't? It also records your every request — not to spy on you, but to get better at understanding what you want it to do. If you say, "Alexa, put Shredded Wheat on my shopping list" once a month, then even if you slur your words one day, it will ask, "Did you want to add Shredded Wheat to your shopping list?" You can just imagine what would happen if your enemies got ahold of that.

Before we get to the invasion of privacy, imagine if your health care provider or your bank had designed Alexa. You would say, "I want to speak to a representative," and it would answer, "Yes, we will find you a cheesecake." Compared to the average computer-voice interaction, asking Alexa to do something seems like magic. Even with my Southern accent, it only took a few days before it learned that when I say "Wendy" I don't mean "windy," and when I say "hair a cane," I mean "hurricane." I've also learned you can delete all those requests so no one can ever find out that I asked Alexa to play "Summer Wind" by

Frank Sinatra a few days ago.

But if you really don't want it to listen in the background, waiting for you to ask it something, there's a well-marked button on top of the device with a picture of a microphone with a line through it. It's the off button for the microphone. Very handy if you have someone named Alexa living in your house.

The second thing wrong with that story: The device didn't send the audio files to some random person, as widely reported. It sent them to someone in the family's contact list. You can use Alexa as a phone, but only if 1. The other person you're calling has an Echo device, and 2. They are on your contact list, and 3. They accept your invitation.

In short, you can set up Alexa so that all you have to do is say, "Call Mom," and just start talking. Most modern cars let you set up your phone the same way. It's not rocket science; it's wonderfully convenient.

Can unexpected things happen? Sure. Is it perfect? Well, that's a good question. What product is perfect, exactly? Is your car perfect? Your washing machine? Has your flight ever been delayed? Ever been stuck in traffic? Ever had a problem with your computer? Your phone? Or do they all work perfectly?

What is this fixation with being perfect? Does a month go by that

some product doesn't get recalled? This month it was romaine lettuce, 4.5 million cars and Spam. And those are just the ones we heard about. But with millions of devices out there, this is the first time Alexa seems to have made a mistake.

"That's not a fair comparison," you might say. "Alexa was invading their privacy." Really? That device just walked into their home without their knowing it? Its spy planted it in the house without their knowledge? That's kind of like complaining your refrigerator is keeping things cold without telling you.

And what is privacy in this day and age? If you have a loyalty card from a grocery store, an airline or a credit card, they already know more about you than the IRS. My gym membership form asked me for more personal details than my doctor. My electric company wants my Social Security number. Why? Are they afraid someone else will pay my bill?

When I Googled a few news sites to collect the details on this story, the first thing that popped up was "This site uses cookies, blah, blah, blah." The forgotten importance of manners

Perhaps because I am so helplessly enamored of Turner Classic Movies and its magical old films, I am one of those Americans who has found herself more enraged than normal by the, shall we say, "challenges" to our public manners posed by both Roseanne and Samantha Bee.

The old films not only had carefully constructed plots, fainting heroines desperate for a passionate kiss and heroes who would save you at the drop of a hint, but they were also paragons of an earlier America where innocence ruled the screen, where the Clark Gables and Jimmy Stewarts were the men you dreamed of, and where America itself was so very good that no foreigner could dare question even the slightest of its intentions.

Instead, today we have Roseanne Barr, a TV star of the right, sending a disgusting insult to a respectable African-American political leader; we have Samantha Bee, another spoiled television darling, this time of the left, throwing the most disgusting word for any woman against the president's daughter; and if you deign to look around cable TV almost any night, you'll find more "f-yous" for public consumption than in a Mafia bar on Chicago's South Side.

All right, you say, you don't like it (I don't), but is there anything more to do than "grin and bear it"? Well, yes; in fact, I think we might pause for a moment and see to what depths we have sunk with such language.

Let's start with what our wisest forefathers thought about the social purpose of manners and how we express ourselves in a moral universe. Here are some words to ponder from 18th-century British statesman, author and philosopher Edmund Burke:

"Manners are of more importance than laws. Manners are what vex or soothe, corrupt or purify, exalt or debase, barbarize or refine us, by a constant, steady, uniform, insensible operation, like that of the air we breathe in."

In short, bad manners lead to insult, and insult leads to hatred, and hatred leads to violence. Good manners, whether genuine or not, make it possible for humans to live together.

Such philosophers, of course, could hardly have seen where we were headed with social media, which can encourage anonymous hatred for "the different," or cable television, with fewer of the constraints of broadcast television networks, or the breakdown of society into rabid political party differences.

They could not have foreseen how a beautiful language like English could be so easily decimated by men and women of little moral sense, or how the

worst foul language now gains the most celebrity. Remember the liberal Women's March last year, with Madonna screaming at her enemies, "f-you"?

What I find interesting — and what has garnered virtually no attention — is the way swearing has changed since my youth.

By my reading, public swearing began to change in the late 1960s with the youth rebellion centered around the Vietnam War. Vietnam damaged America's historical view of its innocence, and what came out was a change in the nature of its cursing.

American cursing became centered on the most vulgar parts of the body and its functions. Think about it. That's where Samantha's "c-word" comes in.

The finest political analyst in Chicago, Don Rose, wrote recently in the *Chicago Daily Observer* that there is "something strangely sick about a culture that celebrates sex on the one hand but uses the profanities for male and female sex organs as nasty epithets."

If this doesn't tell you how low we've sunk in the use of our beautiful language, what possibly could?

The widespread criticism of both Roseanne and Samantha are hopeful. The disgust among many Americans for this debasement of our language is encouraging. But do we care enough to turn it all around?

Ex-cop gets eight years for not telling girlfriend he has HIV

WEST PALM BEACH — A former Florida police officer received an eight-year prison sentence for failing to tell a sexual partner he is HIV-positive.

The Palm Beach Post reports that 41-year-old Ervans Saintclair apologized to the victim before he was sentenced Friday, saying he had made "some bad choices and because of those choices, I am here." The former Greenacres officer was convicted in April of uninformed HIV sexual intercourse, a felony under Florida law that carries a possible 30-year sentence.

The victim testified she and Saintclair had a sexual relationship between 2009 and 2013. A doctor testified Saintclair had been told in 2007 he is HIV positive.

The victim is not HIV positive. Saintclair's ex-wife had reported him to authorities and provided them with names of other women he'd had sex with.

Florida citrus growers blame Irma for worst year since 1940s

NAPLES — Florida's citrus growers are blaming Hurricane Irma for one of their worst seasons in decades.

In a Naples Daily News report, U.S. agriculture officials said Florida's orange production dropped nearly 35 percent from the previous season. Grapefruit production was half of what it was last year.

The 49.5 million boxes of citrus fruits produced in Florida was the smallest number recorded since the 1941-42 season.

Florida Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam said federal funding would help growers recover. Ron Hamel of the Gulf Citrus Growers Association said some growers are "cautiously optimistic" about next season.

Florida's Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has said Irma caused over \$1 billion in losses for the citrus industry. The hurricane uprooted trees and waterlogged many groves for weeks, damaging root systems and stunting growth.

Florida unemployment rate decreases slightly from last month

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's unemployment rate is ticking down slightly.

State officials released May's figures Friday and reported the unemployment rate is at 3.8 percent. That is 0.1 percent lower than it was in April and 0.4 percent

less than a year ago.

Florida's unemployment rate is the same as the national rate. The state's rate had held steady at 3.9 percent for the past four months.

Okaloosa and St. Johns counties had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.6 percent, followed by Monroe County (2.7 percent) and Walton County (2.8 percent).

Hendry and Sumter counties had the highest unemployment rate at 5.0 percent, followed by Citrus County (4.8 percent) and Putnam County (4.5 percent).

There are an estimated 391,000 jobless Floridians out of a workforce of 10.2 million people.

Florida: No 'red flags' from those improperly given permits

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam says nearly 300 people who improperly received concealed weapons permits from his department did not pose a risk to public safety.

Putnam's department last year revoked concealed weapons permits from 291 people after discovering an employee had failed to complete all of the required background checks. The error wasn't widely known until it was reported last week.

Putnam maintained there was no "red flags" with the 291 people. They had passed criminal background checks but had been flagged for other reasons.

He said that if any of the 291 people had been arrested after receiving their permits his department would have been notified by law enforcement.

Record-breaking spacewoman retires as astronaut

CAPE CANAVERAL — NASA's record-breaking astronaut, Peggy Whitson, retired Friday less than a year after returning from her last and longest spaceflight.

She's spent more time off the planet than any other American: 665 days over three space station missions. She's also the world's most experienced female spacewalker, with 10 under her spacesuit belt.

Whitson was the first woman to command the International Space Station, holding the position twice, and the oldest woman to fly in space. She was also the only woman to have served as chief of NASA's male-dominated astronaut corps.



Sky's the limit for academic all-star Tyler Armstrong

Tyler Armstrong is not your typical Jackson County 11-year-old.

While many of his peers spend a lot of time at a ball field, court or gym pursuing athletics, Tyler pursues a different discipline. He's played soccer, baseball, and basketball, but found them boring. His true passion is academics: reading, math and science.

Tyler's parents, Clay and Sue Armstrong, of Marianna, say their struggle isn't juggling practice and game schedules, but trying to keep enough books to read, scientific experiments to perform, brain teasers or puzzles to solve, and any other math- and/or science-related activities available for Tyler to devour.

Tyler could read before he entered Pre-K 4, so his parents knew he was special. He attended Sneads Elementary School for kindergarten through fifth grade and his parents "can't say enough wonderful things about the superb staff and teachers at SES." While their "A" school status speaks for itself, the Armstrongs say they don't get near the credit they deserve. They added that the SES faculty kept Tyler challenged and focused, creating an environment in which he could thrive.

His parents say Tyler's averages for grades 1-5 were 97.0 in Language Arts, 99.4 in math, 99.6 science, and 99.2 social studies. He was the top Accelerated Reader for his grade every year for six

years and read more than 500 books. The books he took the AR test for equate to 11,540,000 words read. He was a member of the SES Million Word Club every year, second-fifth grade.

Tyler scored a perfect score on the third-grade Florida Scholastic Achievement math test and received all 5s (top score) on all other elementary school FSA tests. And most recently scored a perfect score on the fifth-grade FSA math test and the fifth-grade FSA science test. He was a Beta Club member and a member of the SES fifth-grade academic team, which won first place over all other Jackson County district fifth-grade teams in May.

The Armstrongs say that, to ensure Tyler wouldn't get bored with school, he was tested for Jackson County's Project Venture program for gifted students, before the start of second grade. They say their son's entrance exam score was one of the highest ever recorded for Project Venture.

Over the past four years, Project Venture's outstanding teachers have provided many academic challenges for Tyler, according to his parents. While in the program, Tyler was awarded first place in the Perennial Math competition (fourth and fifth grade); first place in the Science Fair competition (fifth grade); third place in the Intermediate Perennial Math competition (fifth and sixth grade); and earned a medal for

scoring in the top 10 percent in the International Perennial Math online competition, in which six countries participated.

This summer, Tyler was selected from over 100 applicants to spend a week at Camp TESLA (Technology, Engineering, Science in a Laboratory Atmosphere) at the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory (AKA MagLab) in Tallahassee, where he will be exposed to a wide range of physics disciplines, labs, lectures, demonstrations, field trips and interactions with scientists and science educators. The world's largest and highest-powered magnet research facility, the MagLab is collaboratively operated for the National Science Foundation by Florida State University, University of Florida and Los Alamos National Laboratory.

But, his parents say, while he's not your typical 11-year-old, Tyler's not all academic work and no play. He loves to swim, fish, fly his drone, work on the farm and play computer games.

When the upcoming school year begins, Tyler will attend Jackson Virtual Instruction Program for sixth grade. For extracurricular activities, he'll mix in with Grand Ridge School.

Tyler, the son of Clay and Sue Armstrong, of Marianna, has a twin sister, Katelyn, and two older brothers, Stuart and Sean (both married), and is a first-time uncle to his 4-month-old nephew, Landon.

Move to redefine water rule threatens wetlands banks

GAINESVILLE — A private firm is making big money selling promises about some gator-infested Florida swampland.

The Panther Island Mitigation Bank isn't another land boondoggle, but part of a federal system designed to restore wetlands across the United States. Panther Island's owners preserved one of the nation's last stands of virgin bald cypress, 4 square miles on the western edge of the Everglades where they cleared away invasive plants and welcomed back wood storks, otters and other native flora and fauna.

Banks like this sell "wetlands mitigation credits" to developers for up to \$300,000 apiece, offsetting the destruction of marshes by construction projects elsewhere. It's a billion-dollar industry that has slowed the loss of U.S. wetlands, half of which are already gone.

This uniquely American mix of conservation and capitalism has been supported by every president since George H.W. Bush pledged a goal of "no net loss" of wetlands, growing a market for mitigation credits from about 40 banks in the early 1990s to nearly 1,500 today. Investors include Chevron and Wall Street firms, working alongside the Audubon Society and other environmental groups.

Now the market is at risk. Administrator Scott Pruitt's Environmental Protection Agency has completed a proposal for implementing President Donald Trump's executive order to replace the Waters of the United States rule, or WOTUS, with a much more limited definition of what constitutes a protected federal waterway.

The current definition is

an overreach that claims federal jurisdiction over "dry creek beds" and "prairie puddles" that are better regulated by the states, Pruitt told a group of farmers and businesspeople in Lincoln, Nebraska, Thursday night.

"We're going to say what it is, but we're also going to say what it isn't. We're proposing that prairie puddles in North Dakota are not waters of the United States and we're proposing that ground water is not water

of the United States," Pruitt said. "That's how you save the economy a billion dollars."

The EPA said the proposal now faces months of reviews before being released for public comment, but experts in mitigation are already alarmed.

"It would destroy wetland mitigation banking at the federal level," said Royal Gardner, a professor at Florida's Stetson University College of Law.

The Associated Press is

the first outlet to comprehensively report on the potential harm this proposal could bring to the billion-dollar wetlands mitigation banking industry. The EPA did not specifically address AP questions about how redefining waterways could affect it.

Wetlands are protected under the Clean Water Act because they are vital to the nation's water quality. Their dense vegetation helps filter out toxins as water flows through. Wet-

lands provide key fish and bird habitat, and protect coastal land from hurricanes.

Mitigation banks are not a panacea, but they are the government's preferred method of protecting wetlands from damage from development, a preference that has fueled the market for mitigation credits. The system began decades ago under the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, but it initially wasn't well designed, and the market failed to take off.

That began to change after 2001, when the National Research Council identified a chief problem: The Corps was letting developers who lacked the necessary expertise design and build the restoration projects. Some failed to replace what was lost or lacked plans to maintain them.

The Corps and EPA revamped the system in 2008, requiring developers to collaborate with conservation experts, and to get the science right before selling any credits. Since then, the market has seen its biggest growth, with innovative projects proving to be both profitable and ecologically sustainable.

Panther Island was designed with the help of Audubon, which manages the neighboring Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary, and the society will continue managing the land after all the credits have been sold.

"The devil's in the details with these mitigation banks and their offsetting impacts. If you're not doing it in a way that offsets the natural water storage losses, then you're passing the buck to future generations," sanctuary director Jason Lauritsen said. "What you see now is this beautiful landscape of diverse native species that have taken root and are filling in. We are showing that it can be done."

The country is still losing wetlands. There is no national-level data that shows how close mitigation banks are to achieving the "no net loss" goal. But Corps permit data show that from 2002-2015, when the agency allowed about 350 square miles of wetlands to be filled, developers were required to purchase about 800 square miles of compensatory mitigation credits, mostly from banks.

The Obama administration sought to include even more wetlands as protected waterways under the WOTUS rule, and investors responded positively, because sustained government support reduced the market's risk.

Trump's order directs the EPA and Corps to consider adopting the late Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia's 2006 definition, which would limit Clean Water Act protections for non-navigable waterways to those that remain covered by water year-round and connected to navigable rivers, lakes or streams. This could remove many waters from federal oversight, and hit mitigation banking hard, experts say.

Protecting fewer wetlands and streams would mean fewer impacts to these resources will be regulated, and less mitigation required to compensate for them, said Jessica Wilkinson, a senior policy adviser at The Nature Conservancy, which sponsors 13 wetland and stream mitigation banks in five states.

"That's not good for trying to achieve the objectives of the Clean Water Act in general if we're no longer protecting these waters," Gardner said. "If the Trump administration goes forward with a definition of WOTUS that severely restricts what waters are protected, then their market evaporates."

WHAT GOES INTO A GO-BAG?

How to prepare an emergency kit

Heather Kretzer, a health consultant for the Florida Department of Health in Panama City, lives near the water. But the most recent call for an evacuation in her area wasn't because of a hurricane but because of an active shooter.

The incident, which did not result in any bystanders being injured but did lead to the temporary evacuation of an apartment complex, drove home to Kretzer the need for all families to have a survival bag they can grab in an emergency.

"You can be asked to evacuate your home for a number of emergencies — often with little warning and limited time to gather your possessions," she said.

No area in the country is immune from disaster and unexpected evacuation, said Jim Judge, emergency management director for Volusia County, Florida, and a member of the American Red Cross Scientific Advisory Council. Threats range from weather concerns and wildfires to hazardous material spills and police matters.

With hurricane and wildfire seasons under way, summer is a good time to consider packing a go-bag of emergency supplies.

Having a pre-packed bag or bin ready will help reduce the stress of a stressful situation, said Stuart Warshaw, whose company, VLESdesigns, sells stocked emergency bags. He and other safety experts also recommend having a plan about how to evacuate and where to go.

"You need a cool head when there's little time and potentially critical decisions to make," he said.

His bag includes wheels so it can be rolled through urban areas or airports, and it also has straps and a waist belt so it can be worn as a backpack.

Some families prefer an old suitcase or plastic tub stored under a bed or in a closet, Judge said. A duffel bag also works well, Kretzer said.

The contents of your kit should help you survive up to three days, she said. Be sure to think about every member of the family, including pets.

"It's like going camping — all the things you need to take with you," Judge said.

Kretzer, Judge and Warshaw offered the following suggestions on what to include in an emergency bag:

FOOD AND WATER

Remember that supplies should last the entire family three days. That includes 1 gallon of water per person per day. Include non-perishable food

that requires no water or cooking. Don't forget plates, silverware and a manual can opener. Protein bars make a good emergency food, Kretzer said.

Tip: Warshaw recommends water purification tablets in case the water supply becomes tainted.

PERSONAL NEEDS

This includes eyeglasses, contact solution, hygiene supplies, and prescription and over-the-

counter medicines that are taken regularly. If you have a young child, include diapers, baby food and formula.

Tip: If you are unable to pack prescription medications, tape a note to the bag reminding you to grab them, or prepare a checklist of last-minute additions that's kept with the bag.

CLOTHING

Three days' worth for every member of your family.

Tip: Include sturdy shoes and hats.

SAFETY SUPPLIES

A go-bag should include a first aid kit, flashlight, extra batteries, matches in a waterproof container and a whistle. It also may be helpful to have strong tape, plastic sheeting and a few tools.

Tip: Remove the batteries from the flashlight and other items to avoid corrosion.

COMMUNICATIONS TOOLS

The power may be out, so a battery-operated or hand-crank radio is essential, Judge said. Two-way radios also will be useful. Pack phone cords and chargers to use once power is restored.

Tip: Consider identifying an out-of-town relative as a contact point for everyone in the family, to relay important messages and updates.

PAPERWORK/CASH

Either include copies of birth certificates, IDs, insurance policies and prescriptions in the kit or save encrypted copies/photos of them on a secure online storage spot. A map with evacuation routes highlighted also will be helpful. Make sure you have cash — preferably smaller bills — in the kit, in case the power is out and you can't use credit cards and ATMs.

Tip: Print out a list of important phone numbers in case you can't access the contact list in your phone.

CREATURE COMFORTS

Consider taking blankets and pillows to make your stay at a shelter or other evacuation location more comfortable. Add a deck of cards, books, some games or other things that could amuse children in a shelter or hotel room.

PET PLANS

If you will be evacuating with a pet, identify in advance what shelters allow them, advises Pet Sitters International. Pack a copy of veterinary and vaccination records, pet food, water bowl and leash.

Tip: Be sure you have the right size carrier to transport your pet to a shelter.

NASA rover knocked out as gigantic dust storm envelops Mars

CAPE CANAVERAL — NASA's seemingly unstoppable Mars rover Opportunity has been knocked out by a gigantic dust storm that is enveloping the red planet and blotting out the sun.

Officials said Wednesday they're hopeful the rover will survive the storm, which already covers one-quarter of Mars and is expected to encircle the planet in another few days. It could be weeks or even months, though, until the sky clears enough for sunlight to reach the Martian surface and recharge Opportunity's batteries through its solar panels.

For now, Mars' oldest working rover is stuck in the middle of the raging storm, in round-the-clock darkness.

"By no means are we out of the woods here," said John Callas, the Opportunity project manager at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. "This storm is threatening, and we don't know how long it will last, and we don't know what the environment will be like once it clears."

Flight controllers tried late Tuesday night to contact Opportunity, but the rover did not respond. The storm has been growing since the end of May with unprecedented speed.

NASA launched the twin rovers Opportunity and Spirit in 2003 to study Martian rocks and soil.

They landed in 2004. Spirit hasn't worked for several years. Opportunity, however, has kept exploring well past its expected mission lifetime.

Scientists aren't nearly as concerned about the newer, nuclear-powered Curiosity rover on the other side of Mars, which is already seeing darkening skies.

Dust storms crop up every so often at Mars, sending dust tens of miles (kilometers) into the atmosphere and turning day into night. Spacecraft orbiting Mars are too high to be affected.

There's no chance of Opportunity being buried or getting a wheel stuck in dust. Even in the worst of storms, only a layer of fine dust is left behind. Managers said the main concern is that dust could temporarily cover its optical instruments.

The rover's batteries are likely so low that only a clock is still working, to wake the spacecraft for periodic power-level checks, according to officials. If the clock also goes offline, then the rover won't know what time it is when it comes back on and could send back signals at any time.

This isn't Opportunity's first major brush with dust.

In 2007, a massive dust storm kept Opportunity silent for a few days. It jumped back into action after awakening from its deep self-protecting slumber.

School shooting suspect's brother starts anti-bullying campaign

FORT LAUDERDALE — The younger brother of the Florida school shooting suspect launched an anti-bullying campaign Thursday, saying he witnessed mistreatment of Nikolas Cruz that may have been a key factor in the Feb. 14 massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

Zachary Cruz, 18, said the initiative will set up anti-bullying student chapters at schools across the country, create a 24-hour national telephone hotline for bullying victims to call for help and provide sustained attention to the problem. Nexus Services, the Virginia company that provided Zachary Cruz with a job and living quarters after his own scrape with the law, is sponsoring the effort.

The WIN initiative — "We Isolate No One" — was unveiled at a news conference at the National Press Club in Washington.

"I cannot sit by and watch another tragedy happen," Cruz told reporters. "At the end of the day, bullying and isolation is a national crisis. Kids are dying. The kids know. Since we know, it's our responsibility to make changes."

Zachary Cruz has said that he bullied his brother and others did so as well. Nikolas Cruz, 19, is charged with 17 counts of murder and 17 counts of attempted murder in the Stoneman Douglas shooting. His lawyers say he would plead guilty if guaranteed a life prison sentence, but prosecutors have not agreed to waive the death penalty.

In cellphone videos prosecutors say were recorded by Nikolas Cruz before the shooting, he makes reference to being bullied and ostracized during much of his life.

"I live a lone life. I live in seclusion and solitude. I hate everyone and everything. But the power of my (AR-15 rifle) you will all know who I am. I had enough of being told what

to do and when to do," he says. "I had enough of being told that I'm an idiot and a dumbass."

Zachary Cruz said he had no apologies to make for his brother's actions. But he said Nikolas is not alone.

"Our schools all over the country have ticking time bombs," he said.

The initiative is a marked shift in the life of Zachary Cruz, who in March was arrested for trespassing on a skateboard at the Parkland, Florida, high school and was placed on six months' probation after pleading no contest. Prosecutors said at the time that Zachary Cruz had "red flags" similar to his brother's in terms of behavioral problems that might lead him down a criminal path or worse.

After Zachary Cruz's probation was revoked when he drove his deceased mother's car without a license, Nexus Services stepped in with the job offer and housing, along with counseling and other services, at their property in Staunton, Virginia. Nexus Services specializes in helping people adjust after prison or treatment for mental problems or addiction, as well as free legal

services and assistance in immigration matters, including paying bail if immigrants agree to use the company's electronic ankle monitors.

It's not entirely clear why Nexus decided to back this particular anti-bullying initiative, although a company press release says its intent is to "create much-needed awareness for an issue that is all-too-often spoken about in embarrassed and hushed tones." Nexus CEO Mike Donovan said his company would provide up to \$1.2 million in initial funding and that the first school anti-bullying chapters were like to start in Florida, Virginia and Maryland.

"Sometimes from horrific tragedies come solutions. I want to be a part of it," Donovan said.

Zachary Cruz's job as a maintenance technician at Nexus pays \$13 an hour and he still faces a host of probation restrictions including no possession of weapons or ammunition, no drug or alcohol use and no visits to any school unless he is enrolled there. He recently posted a photo on social media of himself driving a car in Virginia after obtaining a driver's license.

Riders plunge 34 feet, six injured when roller coaster derails

ORLANDO — A roller coaster that derailed in Florida had been put out of service by state inspectors twice in the past year and a half because of problems with the ride.

Two riders fell 34 feet (10 meters) when their car derailed Thursday night and was left dangling from the track. Firefighters used ladders to pull eight others to safety high above the Daytona Beach Boardwalk.

"The front car which was holding four passengers completely came off the tracks," said Daytona Beach Fire spokeswoman Sasha Staton. The two riders who fell from the Sand Blaster ride suffered traumatic injuries, she said.

Of nine passengers taken to the hospital, all but two were discharged by Friday afternoon.

A month before the derailment, a state inspector had found problems with the ride, and the roller coaster was ordered to be taken out of service. State inspection reports released to The Associated Press on Friday show that an inspector last month found excessive corrosion, a damaged seat, and a crack in the track. Those

problems, though, were corrected by the time of a follow-up inspection Thursday, according to the reports.

"Deficiencies corrected," the inspector noted in the "comments" section of the report.

"Department inspectors conducted a thorough inspection of the ride, and it was found in compliance with state law," according to a statement Friday from Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services spokeswoman Jennifer Meale. "Anyone who should be held accountable will be held accountable."

A "stop order" also was issued for the ride in February 2017 because of corrosion and damaged handrails. The stop order continued through two following inspections. In May 2017, an inspector found damaged nuts and bolts. The next month, a seat was found damaged.

In videos posted on social media by witnesses, two people can be seen dangling from the car's seats and metal scaffolding beneath the track. Bystanders gathered under the passengers, stretching out their hands to assure them that help

was coming.

"Two people done fell out and clanked their head on the ground," Matt Campbell of Knoxville, Tennessee, said in a video of the scene that he posted online.

Campbell and some relatives had been planning

to ride the roller coaster, which looked fast but not too extreme for the younger children in the family. It had been raining but the storm seemed to have passed. As they walked toward the ride, they heard a loud bang and saw the front car jump off the

track, he said.

"The car was banging against the rails real hard as it came around the turn," Campbell said. "We noticed it wasn't just a normal banging of the roller coaster going down the track, that's what made us look up."

Campbell said he and his relatives dropped what was in their hands, breaking his sunglasses and spilling their sodas on the ground, to rush toward the ride. He said he saw two women fall from the front car, while a man and a woman appeared to be dangling and stuck between that car and the metal scaffolding under the track.

As some people warned those passengers not to move before rescuers arrived, Campbell said a ride worker grabbed a ladder to help the injured who were hanging above the ground. Firefighters climbed up to rescue them as well as six other passengers in two cars that were still on the track.

"They had to use the tower ladder to get to them and then bring them on board and guide them safely back down," Staton said.

Nine passengers were taken to the hospital, but

hospital officials wouldn't describe their injuries due to privacy concerns, said Tangel Boyd, a spokeswoman for Halifax Health Medical Center.

Two of the passengers work for a Kentucky company that provides services to people with mental disabilities, and they were on a business trip. One of them remained in the hospital and the other was discharged, said Jory Wells, an official with Alternative Outlook, LLC.

The accident is under investigation.

"We don't know what happened," Staton said.

Roller coaster databases show the Sand Blaster had operated in four other locations in its four-decade history. The ride opened at the Daytona Beach Boardwalk in 2013. Before that, it was at the Blue Diamond Amusement Park in New Castle, Delaware, where the ride was called the Blue Diamond Streak.

The coaster operated at DelGrosso's Amusement Park in Tipton, Pennsylvania, and before that, the coaster was at Legend City in Phoenix, Arizona. It originated at Adventureland Park in Addison, Illinois, according to Ultimate Rollercoaster.com.

Wells and even springs face brackish future

DAYTONA BEACH — When Arnoldo Valle-Levinson asks St. Augustine residents what they think of saltwater intrusion, he's often met with eyes as glassy as the Atlantic on a calm morning.

The term may be off the radar of some coastal residents but the process is happening, will accelerate and will cause expensive headaches for cities with water systems and for homeowners with wells.

"Municipalities should start preparing, and the way you start preparing is by understanding what is happening now and what can happen," said Valle-Levinson, a professor in the University of Florida's Civil and Coastal Engineering Department.

"I ask people in St. Augustine, 'Do you worry about saltwater intrusion?' They are not paying attention to it. When they start getting brackish water in their wells or in the city's water supply, it's going to be too late. They will not be able to act quickly."

Salt water can creep into the aquifer during droughts that deplete fresh water, allowing the salty liquid to flow in. It can also invade the aquifer when too much fresh water is pumped out.

But the saltwater intrusion the experts say is inevitable for Florida's coasts will be far more extensive and more expensive.

Salt water is heavier than fresh water. As the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico rise higher, salt water will push its way into the aquifer and then overtake the fresh water.

It will also push farther up rivers such as the St. Johns and Suwannee, changing their ecosystems and in some cases flowing into freshwater springs.

Already, salt water can sometimes be detected in the St. Johns at Palatka. That will become far more frequent.

Saltwater intrusion began years ago in wells along the coast of Volusia and Flagler counties. Salt water intruding into shallow wells used for irrigation means the wells, in some cases, can no longer be used to water lawns or shrubs.

"They have a world of trouble," said Mark Watkins, owner of Atlantic Drilling Corporation in Daytona Beach, speaking of the wells on the Flagler County coast. "The shallow wells on the peninsula

are all pretty salty."

The deep wells on the northern peninsula of Volusia County, around Ormond-by-the-Sea also have salt in them, Watkins said. It doesn't appear to be migrating, he said, "but I think maybe where it is, it may be getting a little stronger."

Some coastal utilities in St. Johns River Water Management District's 18-county region already are experiencing increased salinity in their public supply wells, said spokeswoman Teresa Monson said.

To address the challenges, Monson said the district is coordinating with the Florida Climate Institute and the Florida Water and Climate Alliance.

"We have seen water quality become more mineralized primarily in coastal areas but also in some interior areas," she stated. The intrusion or the upward movement of highly mineralized water into layers of fresh water has occurred in areas where there has been "excessive pumping at agricultural wells and public supply wellfields."

In the Panhandle, meanwhile, the Northwest Florida Water Management District is not concerned about saltwater intrusion. District Executive Director Brett Cyphers said the district has not spent a lot of time researching potential impacts of sea level rise on the aquifers relied upon for fresh water.

"We don't have the same level of saltwater intrusion other areas have," said Cyphers, who oversees a district that stretches across Florida's Panhandle from Escambia to Jefferson County. "From a resource perspective we're not going to have the pressures. The terrain here is different. Water flows downhill. We have elevations. Where the land sits flat the water moves slower."

In the rest of Florida, however, cities are taking notice.

Some cities have installed reverse osmosis systems in their municipal utilities. Among them are Cedar Key, Clearwater, Cape Coral and Jupiter. In reverse osmosis, water is forced through membranes that remove salt.

Utilities officials say their brushes with saltwater intrusion have given them foresight into the future and what will be needed as Atlantic and Gulf. It will come at a cost.

Cedar Key installed a

reverse osmosis system in 2012 when saltwater intrusion was caused by drought.

John McPherson, general manager of the Cedar Key Water and Sewer District, said the wells are 200 feet deep and several miles inland of the island off State Road 24. The district provides water to the island but is independent of Cedar Key city government.

McPherson said the reverse osmosis system is used only when salt water contaminates the well. The organic elements in fresh water make the system less efficient, so it is not run full time.

The wells are currently as deep as they can be — salt water lies below 200 feet — so digging deeper is not an option for future intrusion caused by sea level rise.

That means the reverse osmosis system will be pressed into service more often, driving up the cost of fresh water.

"It does cost more. When you put 100 gallons into a reverse osmosis system, 20 gallons gets discharged as waste. And that's if everything is working properly," McPherson said. "And there are additional electrical costs. But it's a mechanical solution we have already paid for."

NOT DOING A BODY GOOD?

Fewer US teens smoking, doing drugs and drinking milk

NEWYORK — Fewer U.S. teens are smoking, having sex and doing drugs these days. Oh, and they're drinking less milk, too.

Less than one-third of high school students drink a glass of milk a day, according to a large government survey released Thursday. About two decades ago, it was nearly half.

Last year's survey asked about 100 questions on a wide range of health topics, including smoking, drugs and diet. Researchers compared the results to similar questionnaires going back more than 25 years.

One trend that stood out was the drop in drinking milk, which started falling for all Americans after World War II. In recent decades, teens have shifted from milk to soda, then to Gatorade and other sports drinks and recently to energy drinks like Monster and Red Bull.

The survey showed slightly fewer kids are drinking soda and sports drinks now, compared to the last survey in 2015.

One caveat: Most students were not asked about energy drinks so how many kids drink them now isn't known. A study from a decade ago estimated that nearly a third of kids between the age of 12 and 17 were regularly drinking energy drinks.

Kids have shifted from a dairy product rich in calcium and vitamin D to beverages laden with sugar and caffeine, which is likely contributing to the nation's obesity problem, said Barry Popkin, a University of North Carolina researcher who studies how diets change.

"This is not a healthy trend for

our long-term health," he said.

For teens, the government recommends 3 cups daily of dairy products — milk, yogurt or cheese.

The survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is conducted every two years. About 15,000 students at 144 high schools were surveyed last year. The surveys are anonymous and voluntary, and there's no check of medical records or other documents to verify answers.

Some of the findings:

» Not as many teen are having sex, although there wasn't much change from the 2015 survey results. Last year, about 40 percent said they'd ever had sex, down from 48 percent a decade ago.

» There was no substantial recent change for cigarette smoking, either. About 9 percent are current smokers, down from more than 27 percent when the survey started in 1991. Ditto alcohol, with 30 percent saying they currently use alcohol, down from 51 percent in 1991.

» Marijuana use seems to be hovering, with about 36 percent of students saying they had ever tried it. But overall, illegal drug use seems to be falling, including for synthetic marijuana, ecstasy, heroin, inhalants, and LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs. For the first time, the survey asked if they had ever abused prescription opioid medications. About 14 percent did.

» Another first-time question: Have you had a concussion from a sport or physical activity at least once in the previous year? Nationally, 15 percent said they had. The finding may sound high but it's not far off from what's been reported by some other researchers, said Michael Collins, who runs a University of Pittsburgh-affiliated sports concussion program.

Low testosterone may make you a better father

(THE CONVERSATION) Many new parents know that a good night's sleep is tough to come by. What the new parents probably do not know is that a crying infant can trigger a testosterone dip in some men, which turns out to be a good thing. Less testosterone may make them more empathic and less aggressive, which may make them better fathers.

This new information on hormonal changes in men comes from a study I conducted with graduate student Patty Kuo at the University of Michigan. It provides a window into men's parenting, and it may help them become more nurturing fathers.

In both mothers and fathers, the sound of a crying baby can trigger a series of emotional responses, from empathy, to annoyance, to aggravation. The best response is empathy, as aggravation can lead to aggressive behaviors that put the child at risk.

We found that when the men saw their infants in distress and their testosterone declined, they were more nurturing and sensitive fathers when they had to interact with their infants.

We also found that when fathers described themselves as empathetic and when they reported having a loving relationship with the infant's mother, they were more sensitive fathers.

Looking for the hormonal link

Although men with children often have lower testosterone levels than men without children, earlier studies were not always successful in finding a link between fathers' direct involve-

ment with their children and their testosterone levels.

We knew that men experienced a decline in testosterone and reported more sympathy to the infant when hearing infant cries. But we wondered whether fathers would have a similar response if they had to interact with their own distressed infants.

To do this, we used a common research paradigm in the field to assess the infant's attachment relationship with their parents, called the Strange Situation. Fathers were separated from their infants for three-minute intervals and then later reunited with them. Infants often became visibly upset during the brief separation and sought comfort from their father upon his return.

Afterward, we asked fathers to interact with their infants for 15 minutes and teach their one-year-old how to do some difficult tasks. Then we observed how sensitive and intrusive they were while interacting with the child. We also collected saliva from men before the visit, after the separation episodes and after the teaching tasks to measure their testosterone levels so we could see how they changed over time.

When fathers experienced a larger decline in their testosterone after the separations with their crying infant, they used more sensitive parenting in the teaching tasks. We looked at such things as whether fathers supported their infant's attempts to work on the tasks or stopped and responded to the infant if they were frustrated with the tasks.

In the process, we have uncovered another clue to promote good fathering, because previous research has shown that sensitive and responsive fathering is linked to young children's social, emotional and cognitive development. These findings have important implications for developing interventions to assist fathers in the care of their in-

fants because we now know how to help fathers cope with infant distress.

Why? Increases in testosterone in response to a crying infant combined with a father's inability to soothe the baby can lead to aggravation and aggressive tendencies that place the infant at risk for maltreatment.

Based on our study, we believe the fathers' empathy and declining testosterone level shaped how they responded. For example, if fathers interpret infant crying as a means of communicating distress and empathize with the infant, they will experience a decline in testosterone. This, in turn, facilitates a nurturing response.

Alternatively, when fathers interpret their infant's crying as aggravating and feel they are unable to comfort the infant, they may experience increases in testosterone, which facilitates an intrusive or negative response. Intervention efforts can be directed at helping fathers comfort their crying infants in a calming manner.

When fathers soothe, they feel better, too

Another study conducted with my colleague Carolyn Dayton at Wayne State University showed that fathers often used fewer strategies to soothe their infants (cuddling, rocking) when they cried than mothers over the first year after the infant was born.

We don't know if this is because fathers are just less involved in the infant's care than are mothers, or if fathers just don't have as many strategies in their repertoire to use because they haven't learned what to do. This is where health care providers could offer assistance and teach both mothers and fathers effective soothing techniques.

When fathers were more involved and shared equally with their partners in soothing the infant, men felt more effective as

fathers. Also, mothers were less upset by the infant's crying at one year. These findings suggest that involved fathers who are able to effectively soothe their infants contribute to the overall well-being of their families.

Hormonal changes begin in pregnancy — for men

Women undergo a series of changes during pregnancy, including weight gain, unique food cravings and reduced energy. For men, however, the transition is more subtle, and previous research has shown that most changes occur after childbirth.

A University of Michigan (UM) study led by psychologist Robin Edelstein reveals that men experience hormonal changes even before they become fathers. These changes could be a function of psychological changes that men experience as they prepare to become fathers, changes in their romantic relationships or even physical changes they experience along with their pregnant partners.

Nevertheless, fathers' hormonal changes could have important implications for paternal behavior once their babies are born. As part of this study, UM researchers examined saliva samples from 29 couples that were expecting their first child. Researchers tested for four prenatal hormones, including testosterone, at four separate times (12, 20, 28 and 36 weeks) throughout the pregnancy to measure any possible changes.

Men who showed larger declines in testosterone reported less hostile behavior with their infant, and their partners reported that they helped around the house more often. Meanwhile, women showed large prenatal increases in all four hormones, which coincides with previous research on expectant mothers.

Men, however, began to experience a dip in testosterone months before they entered the

delivery room, which could have important implications for their infant's development after the birth.

As noted earlier, because testosterone is often associated with aggression, men having lower levels of this hormone after their child is born may be better equipped to cope with their new responsibilities as a parent and provide the nurturant and responsive care that contributes to healthy infant development.

We need more research to bear this out. Right now, however, findings from these various studies indicate that biological changes are already underway as men prepare for fatherhood. The findings also show that they are clearly able to soothe and care for their crying infants. In addition, they show that empathetic fathers in loving relationships with their partners who also experience declines in testosterone in response to their distressed infants, provide infants with the care that enhances children's social, emotional and cognitive development.

Women may still spend a greater number of hours involved in childcare than men, but an accumulation of studies over the past 40 years has now clearly documented the role of fathers in children's health and development and the verdict is in.

Fathers are more involved now than in decades past in the care of their children, yet many research studies continue to see fathers as the secondary parent and optional in the lives of their children.

Fathers matter in their children's lives. Their caring and nurturing, instruction and teaching, as well as financial support, influence children's emotional health, social competence and cognitive development.

Driver, passenger arrested on multiple charges

During the course of the investigation, the deputy reportedly saw injuries "that would be consistent with that of a physical disturbance."

Baxter was arrested, charged with battery (domestic violence) and taken to the Jackson County jail to await his first appearance in court on that and the violation of probation charge.

Officials say further charges may be pending upon the completion of the state fire marshal's office's investigation.

charges are expected in connection to these cases, BCSO reports.

Deputy: Florida man chugged can of beer during DUI stop

BIG COPPIT KEY — Authorities say a 48-year-old Florida man raised a can of beer and chugged it after a sheriff's deputy stopped him on suspicion of drunk driving.

Daryl Royal Riedel told Monroe County Sheriff's investigators he was scared when he fled in his pickup truck as Deputy Anthony Lopez stepped out of his patrol car Thursday. Riedel drove for a short distance before stopping.

Riedel has three prior DUI convictions between 2003 and 2010 and a fourth is pending from 2017.

The report says Riedel got out of his truck, beer can in his hand and chugged it.

Riedel faces a numerous charges, including felony DUI, fleeing from a deputy, driving with a suspended license and failure to submit a breath test.

Man faces death penalty for shooting family members

BROOKSVILLE — A Florida man faces the death penalty for fatally shooting three family members and wounding another.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that a Hernando County jury on Wednesday found 46-year-old George Mason III guilty of three counts of first-degree murder and one of attempted first-degree murder. The panel will reconvene Monday to decide whether Mason should receive life in prison or execution.

Authorities say Mason went to a Brooksville home in August 2014 and killed his girlfriend, 37-year-old Tarasha Yata Townsend, his grandmother, 81-year-old Jannie Taylor and his half-brother, Ralph Peyton.

Grand Ridge man arrested during traffic stop

A Grand Ridge man is facing drug charges, according to the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

On Wednesday, June 6, investigators with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Division conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle off Birchwood Road, in the Shady Grove Community. The driver of the vehicle, identified as Grand Ridge resident John Christopher Stone, was advised of the reason for the traffic stop and provided investiga-

tors with his driver's license and vehicle information, officials say. The reason for the traffic stop was not given in the sheriff's office press release.

While speaking with Stone, investigators say they noticed he was extremely nervous and began making furtive movements inside the cab of the vehicle. Stone was subsequently asked to step out of the vehicle and a firearm was observed in plain view, inside the vehicle, next to

the driver's seat.

Investigators subsequently obtained consent from Stone to search the vehicle, authorities report. During the course of the search, investigators say, they located a series of items consistent with the use and manufacture of methamphetamine. These items included approximately 1 gram of finished methamphetamine, pseudoephedrine pills, lye, coffee filters, drain cleaner, tubing, disassembled lithium bat-

teries, ammonium nitrate, camp fuel, a butane torch, a pill grinder and smoking pipes.


At the conclusion of the search, Stone was placed under arrest and transported to the Jackson County Correctional Facility to await first appearance on charges of possession of listed chemicals, manufacture of methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Fugitive captured, faces multiple charges

The Bay County Sheriff's Office Warrants Division, in cooperation with the United States Marshal Florida Caribbean Regional Fugitive Task Force, has arrested Jeremy Scott Forward. He was wanted on multiple warrants involving illegal narcotics activity, according to officials with the BCSO.

He was located by surveillance units and observed getting out of a vehicle at a gas station in the Callaway area. Law enforcement moved in

and took Forward into custody in the parking lot.

A search was conducted and Forward was found to be in possession of methamphetamine and marijuana, as well as scales, authorities say. As a result, Forward, of 1505 Iowa Ave., Lynn Haven, now faces additional charges of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Chipley man accused of molestation

A Chipley man has been arrested after allegedly molesting a teen while he was at a residence to do yard work, according to the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Officials with the agency say that, on June 5, deputies were notified of a possible sex offense that had occurred. When deputies arrived on scene, the mother of the alleged victim told authorities that her child's demeanor was unusual, which caused her concern.

As the mother began to question her child about the day, she report-

ed, the teen stated, "I do not want Carl to mow our grass anymore."

The mother began to question her child further and the teen described a situation that reportedly happened earlier that morning.

Soon after Carl Marrion McCary, 67, arrived at the residence, he allegedly knocked on the door and advised the teen that he would be working in the yard. McCary then reportedly

let himself into the home, officials say. While inside, the teen told authorities, McCary began to touch her inappropriately. As the teen pushed McCary away, he reportedly left the house laughing.

During an investigation into the allegations, authorities obtained a statement from McCary, who reportedly admitted to touching the teen.

McCary was arrested and booked into the Washington County Jail on the charge of lewd and lascivious molestation.

Gamers plead not guilty in Kansas 'swatting' death

WICHITA, Kan. — Two online gamers whose dispute over a \$1.50 Call of Duty WWII video game bet allegedly led police to fatally shoot a Kansas man pleaded not guilty Wednesday to charges in a "swatting" case that drew national attention.

Casey Viner, 18, of North College Hill, Ohio, and Shane Gaskill, 19, of Wichita, are charged with conspiracy to obstruct justice, wire fraud and other counts.

Viner allegedly became upset at Gaskill while playing the popular online game. Authorities say he then asked 25-year-old Tyler Barriss of Los Angeles to "swat" Gaskill at an address that Gaskill had previously provided him. Swatting is a form of retaliation sometimes used

by gamers, who call police and make a false report to send first responders to an online opponent's address.

Barriss is accused of calling Wichita police from Los Angeles on Dec. 28 to report a shooting and kidnapping at a Wichita address. Authorities say Barriss researched the address Viner had given him for Gaskill and verified it was a home. When Gaskill noticed Barriss was following him on Twitter, he began communicating with Barriss through direct messages in which he also gave him that same old address and dared him to swat him.

"Please try some s---. I'll be waiting," Gaskill wrote in the direct messages cited in the indictment.

A police officer responding to the call fatally shot the new resident Andrew Finch, 28, after he opened

the door.

Viner and Gaskill have not been arrested and both were instead issued a summons to appear at Wednesday's hearing. They remain free on a \$10,000 bond each and were ordered to find a job and not to play online video games or have contact with witnesses.

Gaskill showed up in court dressed mostly in black down to his black tie and shirt and Viner wore a dark suit with a blue shirt and gray tie. They looked ashen as they sat with their attorneys and respectfully answered routine questions from the judge before quietly pleading not guilty, the only plea the magistrate told them he could accept at this point.

Barriss and Viner face federal charges of conspiracy to make false reports.

The understated affection of fathers

Men may not be from Mars, but — compared to women — they do communicate in very different ways.

Perhaps nowhere is this more evident than in the relationships of fathers and sons. Outwardly, many father and son pairs may appear distant and disengaged. A guy who wouldn't think twice about hugging and kissing his mom might offer his father only a stilted handshake. Dads who shower their daughters with affection may go years without telling their sons they love them. Men are often chided by their wives or mothers for not being willing to show more affection to their dads or their sons.

Such criticisms overlook a larger truth, one that I've spent years exploring as a

communication researcher: Often for men, showing affection is more about what they do than what they say. Their ways of communicating love can be subtle. And while to outside observers they may seem like weak substitutes for genuine affection, to many fathers and sons they're every bit as meaningful as words, kisses and hugs.

Different ways of expressing love

Glenn, a 41-year-old participant in one of my studies, has what many people would call a typical relationship with his dad, R.J. On Sundays, Glenn and his wife often visit Glenn's parents. While Glenn's wife catches up with her mother-in-law, Glenn and R.J. watch television, tinker with R.J.'s car or tackle a household repair, barely saying a few dozen words to each other over the course of an hour.

In many relationships, these behaviors seem cold or distant. But in the case of Glenn and R.J., the two

simply favor actions over words.

My research on affectionate behavior has consistently shown that, in general, men are more likely to communicate affection by doing something supportive than by making verbal expressions, such as saying or writing "I love you."

While I've found that this is especially true in their relationships with other men, it's also true in their relationships with women. With his guy friends, a typical man is more likely to show his affection by organizing a road trip or helping with a roof repair than by saying "I care about you." Around his wife or mother, he may be more inclined to help with a task that needs doing — mowing the lawn or rotating the tires on the car — than sending a Hallmark card.

It's easy to devalue these types of behaviors as substitutes for "real" affection. For example, Glenn's wife believes that Glenn and his father prioritize shared

activities because they don't know how to express the way they feel about each other.

However, Glenn and his dad say that their favorite, most meaningful times together are spent sharing an activity or working on a specific task. To them, that is the expression of love: it signifies and reinforces how they feel about each other.

The tension between intimacy and masculinity

It's easy to understand why many dads and sons appear indifferent to each other. At least in our culture, affection is commonly communicated through verbal expressions and also through nonverbal gestures such as hugging.

Both of these are less common in relationships between men, making it seem as though there's something missing. But what's really at play is a misunderstanding about the complexity of father-son relationships.

Family communication

scholar Mark Morman and I have found that the father and son pair is complicated by the need to negotiate a complex tension between masculinity and intimacy.

On one hand, the bond between dads and sons is a family relationship. People tend to feel closer and more invested in their families than they do in many other social bonds.

On the other hand, the father and son pair is a relationship between two males — one that's subject to cultural expectations about how men are supposed to act toward each other. Traditional masculinity has tended to privilege qualities like competition, independence and self-sufficiency. This comes at the expense of outward expressions of intimacy, which can convey vulnerability.

Wishing for more

Glenn told me that his dad became less outwardly affectionate toward him once Glenn became a teenager. I've found this evolution in

the father and son relationship is quite common. At a certain point, many dads and sons will base their relationships on shared activities instead of shared words. Meanwhile, fathers tend not to curtail verbal displays of affection with their daughters in the same way, nor do mothers with their sons or daughters.

Like Glenn's wife and mother, many women wonder aloud why the men in their lives aren't more expressive and open.

As I explain in my book "The Loneliness Cure," there's nothing wrong with wanting a more expressive relationship. Indeed, many men do successfully become more verbally affectionate with their fathers or their sons.

There's an important lesson here, though: Many male relationships are already richer and more meaningful than they appear to be. And the unique way men relate to one another deserves to be honored rather than belittled.

with Addalynn, and trips to Gainesville.

He says he is also blessed by the fact that, as a result of pulling together through the crisis, he and Carley have grown stronger as a couple. Their bond has been close from the start, but now it's like reinforced steel, he said.

Carley says she knew she'd found the right life-mate well before Brylynn's heart condition was discovered. That became crystal clear when they found out they were going to be first-time parents four years ago. They hadn't planned it, and both were shocked to learn of Carley's pregnancy. She said she panicked a little because of being so young. She didn't know if she had what it took to be a good mom. "I was terrified," she said. "I thought, 'I'm not going to be a good mom, I'm a baby myself.'" Within a few hours of learning she was going to have a baby, she broke the news to Jacob and asked him: "You're not going to let me

go through this alone, are you?"

This is what he said: "I'm not going to let you go through anything alone."

From that point forward, their connection grew. Their commitment to each other was never in doubt, Carley said. He went to almost every one of her pre-birth doctor visits and was there to reassure her about her ability to be a great parent.

These days he meets with his daughter's medical team as often as he can. And back home in Jackson County, he's making sure their younger child is getting every bit of love, support and care she needs while big sister and mom are in Gainesville coping with the medical crisis.

Her husband's promise would be tested again and again, but it was never a contest, Carley says. He continues to fulfill it in amazing ways.

She was seven months pregnant with their second child when they found out about Brylynn's heart condition. It had been present at birth, but went undiscovered until Carley went on an aggres-

sive search for an answer to why her firstborn was not physically developing as she felt she should be. She wanted to know why her daughter was still so tiny. That relentless pursuit was one early clue that she did have an instinct for motherhood, after all. There would be others to come.

Carley, devastated by the answer that her new pediatrician found, was also hit with another agonizing fear: Would the child she was carrying face a similar crisis?

Jacob, she said, was there to comfort and reassure her through that dark unknown. They've since learned that Addalynn has a heart murmur, but not the kind that signals a faulty heart.

As for her husband's skill at fatherhood, she said he turned out to be a natural.

"He always takes time out for his girls," she explained. "If he's got some work to do and they want to play, he puts the work aside for later and takes time out for them. He makes sure they have what they want and need before he gets anything for himself. He puts himself

last on the list."

But Jacob turns the praise back on his wife. He said he's learned a lot about what it takes to be a mom over the past several months. Soon after doctors learned just how bad Brylynn's heart was, they admitted her into the hospital and said she would stay there until a heart donor was found and she had had the transplant. That took seven months. While Carley stayed with Brylynn in Gainesville, Jacob became mom and dad to Addalynn at home.

"I had no idea what it took to do all the things that Carley had been doing to get the girls up and ready to go in the morning, to get breakfast, to manage the household," Jacob said. "I've had to learn and do all that and it's been hard. I respect my wife and all that she has to do, 100 percent. I think this has made us grow up a lot sooner than a lot of people do, and it has made us stronger and closer."

There's evidence of their early wisdom in the way they're handling Brylynn's

eventual return home for good. She's still in the required aftercare program, living near Shands in a camper that Jacob's father bought for the purpose. She has doctor's appointments and such, but is no longer in the hospital 24 hours a day. She's so young, and has been in the hospital so long, that she considers the Shands ward "home." The doctors and nurses there, all highly praised by the Kornegays, have become like family members to her in a way.

The circumstances, for one so young, hold the danger of causing symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder as the family looks toward the long-awaited full transition back to her real home with her little sister and daddy. Carley came up with a plan to make that transition as stress-free as possible for the girls. Instead of rushing home immediately during the windows of opportunity they're given to do so, mother and child have been gradually working up to that. In the beginning,

although they took all their possible breaks back home, they came home for a slightly shorter period than they were allowed.

But this weekend, they headed here as soon as they could on Thursday afternoon, following a doctor's visit. Father's Day weekend needed to be as long as possible.

As Jacob awaited their return, he imagined what the weekend might be like. He doesn't need a new belt or tie or bottle of cologne. He's already got a Father's Day gift that he'll hold dear forever. One year, Carley created a piece of canvas art using his big work boots and prints of the children's tiny feet. Their prints are embedded in the image of his boots, with one girl's on his left boot and the other on his right.

All he really wants this time around is to have everybody home. He plans to hold his girls and his wife close. He wants to sit with them in the swing outside their home and watch the world go by together.

Florida begins repeat bid with 'very talented' staff

GAINESVILLE — Brady Singer knew the hook was coming. He passed behind

After a few words of encouragement from teammates, Singer handed the ball to O'Sullivan and headed to the dugout with a five-run lead. The Southeastern Conference pitcher of the year then received a long, loud, standing ovation as he exited the final home start of his college career. It was a special moment for the right-hander.

It's also become an annual occurrence for the Gators (47-19), who have established themselves as "Pitching U" while advancing to the College World Series for the fourth straight season and seventh time in nine years.

"Obviously, we're very talented," O'Sullivan said. Florida's staff features two first-round draft picks — Singer and fellow starter Jackson Kowar — and All-American closer Michael Byrne. Throw in budding freshmen Jack Leftwich and Tommy Mace along with wild card Tyler Dyson, and the defending national champions might be

as deep as anyone in the eight-team field.

Florida's pitching prowess will be on display when it begins play in Omaha, Nebraska against Texas Tech (44-18) on Sunday.

The staff was the main reason the Gators won it all last year. Florida gave up five runs in its five wins at TD Ameritrade Park in 2017, including two shutouts against TCU.

Pitching remains the backbone of O'Sullivan's team this time around. The Gators allowed nine runs in three regional victories and seven runs in a best-of-three super regional against Auburn.

Tigers coach Butch Thompson, whose team scored 40 times in three regional games the weekend before, summed up Florida's pitching performance in one word: "Elite."

"We did our best to try to match it," he added.

Few have. Since O'Sullivan took over in Gainesville in 2007, the Gators have posted an ERA inside the top 30 nationally eight times. And that's against the ultra-tough Southeastern Con-

ference and with powerhouse programs Florida State and Miami always on the schedule.

The mound commitment stems from O'Sullivan, a college catcher who learned early on how to handle pitchers and take care of arms.

At Florida, he's had 15 pitchers selected in the first four rounds of the MLB draft. Eight of those came in the last three years, including first-rounders A.J. Puk, Dane Dunning, Alex Faedo, Singer and Kowar.

Singer was selected 18th overall by Kansas City. Kowar went 33rd, also to the Royals.

The duo has been in Florida's weekend rotation the last two years and played key roles at the 2017 CWS.

Singer won both starts in Omaha, allowing four earned runs in 14 innings, and Kowar earned his first save in a 6-1 victory against LSU in the deciding game of the best-of-three championship series.

"They both pitched on the biggest stage and they should be able to pull from that experience last year," O'Sullivan said.

Young, Sexton headline list of point guards in draft

There's little question about where to start when looking at the top point guard prospects in the NBA draft: Trae Young and Collin Sexton.

Young was the national leader in both scoring and assists with the Sooners as a freshman, while Sexton provided an aggressive presence at the helm of the Crimson Tide's attack in his only year at Alabama.



Here's a look at the top prospects:

Trae Young

Young's scoring and playmaking ability drew comparisons to three-time NBA champion Stephen Curry.

Strengths: The 6-foot-2, 178-pound Young averaged 27.4 points and 8.7 assists while putting up his share of eye-popping numbers, including four 40-point games and a Division I record-tying 22 assists against Northwestern State.

Concerns: All the offensive stats were often fairly empty down the stretch as Oklahoma lost 13 of 18 before squeaking into the NCAA Tournament for a first-round loss. Young wasn't the most efficient scorer. He also had the smallest wingspan (6-3) of players at the combine.

Collin Sexton

Sexton led Alabama back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2012.

Strengths: Athleticism — the 6-2,

183-pound freshman has plenty of it. He averaged 19.2 points while shooting nearly 45 percent, offering a quick first step and the aggressive edge needed to get to the rim.

Concerns: Sexton is capable of hitting from outside, such as when he hit six 3-pointers against Auburn and had five other games with at least three made 3s. The trick now is becoming a more consistent threat after making just 34 percent (44 of 131) for the season.

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander

Kentucky's latest one-and-done talent wasn't the Wildcats' top recruit but thrived after becoming a full-time starter in January.

Strengths: He offers good size at the point after checking in at 6-6 at the combine with a nearly 7-foot wingspan.

Concerns: He'll need to add bulk to a lean 180-pound frame to handle physical play.

Others to watch

» **Jalen Brunson:** The Associated Press national player of the year doesn't have eye-popping athleticism, but he's a steady and efficient performer who led Villanova to a second NCAA title in three seasons. The junior is a potential first-round pick.

» **Jevon Carter:** West Virginia's floor leader and two-time Big 12 defensive player of the year could sneak into the first round.

» **Trevon Duval:** After one year at Duke, he is likely a second-round pick with good athleticism (third at the combine in max vertical leap at 41.5 inches) but a suspect outside shot (29 percent on 3s).



Thrills can bloom from race day rain

I know I'm going against the grain here, but I'm starting to really enjoy stock car races threatened by rain.

I know, I know, even a slight threat of precipitation is the last thing any NASCAR promoter wants to see these days. The anticipation of unpleasant weather of any kind has become a major factor in attendance.

For nearly all the 36 races on NASCAR's Monster Energy Cup Series schedule, the heady days of advance sellouts are long gone.

A decade or so ago, some tracks around the circuit had sellout streaks and waiting lists of fans who wanted tickets. Now many of those same tracks have removed tens of thousands of seats and still can't fill the stands.

A significant percentage of the NASCAR ticket-buying public is a walk-up crowd, ready to scrap the idea of going to the races if their cell phones tell them it might be uncomfortable outdoors on race day.

Too hot? Never mind. Too cold? Maybe a movie instead. Rain in the forecast? Let's just stay home and maybe check the TV coverage to see how things are going.

So, yeah, my apologies, but a day with rain lurking and threatening to cut a race short can produce either a breathtaking thriller or a head-shaking upset.

Here are examples — one current and one from decades ago.

Last Sunday's race at Michigan International Speedway turned into the Watch the Radar 400 or Less. Scheduled for 400 miles, it lasted just 266.

The race was delayed a couple of hours by rain, and when the green flag finally flew the main question was whether the next wave of showers would hold off long enough to finish the first two of the event's three stages. If not, the race would have to be finished Monday.

Once the second stage was done, drivers were racing hard to put themselves in the lead. Teams were making strategic moves to get the front spot, however briefly, in hopes

that the lowering clouds would open up at just the opportune time.

Clint Bowyer had been fast all day but a step behind the leaders. On his last pit stop his team gave him two fresh tires instead of four. That quicker stop put his Ford ahead of the two drivers who had dominated the race, Kevin Harvick and Kyle Busch, each of whom had four fresh tires.

As the approaching showers loomed just beyond the track parking lot, Bowyer had to survive a two-abreast restart with Harvick beside him. Bowyer, as the leader, had the preferred high line and after a back-and-forth battle for a full lap he pushed ahead.

Bowyer stayed in front for eight laps — the only ones he led all day. The rain finally reached the speedway, ending the race and setting off Bowyer's exuberant celebration.

That was your thriller. A race made exponentially more urgent by the when-will-it-arise rain.

And here is the did-that-really-happen example. We go back to 1982 at the old half-mile Richmond Fairgrounds Raceway. It was a dreary, chilly February day for the Richmond 400.

As was the case this week at Michigan, the Richmond race was official and rain threatened. Race leader Joe Ruttman had just lapped fifth-place Dave Marcis when he blew a tire and crashed. Marcis avoided the crash and went back into the lead lap, running distant fourth to Richard Petty, Benny Parsons

and Dale Earnhardt.

Those three all pitted for tires and fuel, but Marcis stayed on track and inherited the lead.

At that moment the rain hit, cold and steady. Of the three drivers who had pitted, Petty had been the first to emerge, and there was confusion. Why was Marcis' number, 71, in the top spot on the electronic scoreboard? Why not Petty's 43?

But Petty's team realized what had happened and had no complaints.

Marcis, a journeyman driver, was one of NASCAR's "independents," low-budget teams with volunteer help.

Marcis, who had built his own engine for the race, had not won in five full seasons before that Richmond 400. In the rain-drenched aftermath, he celebrated the fifth and final win of his Cup racing career, which would last two more decades.

He hadn't prayed for rain, Marcis said, but as he had waited to see whether NASCAR would try to wait out the rain, dry the track and resume the race he told his crew "if the good Lord wanted to help an independent, this was his chance."

When I think about it, Bowyer's on-the-edge gamble at Michigan last Sunday and Marcis' serendipitous timing at Richmond 36 years ago rank high among the races that have made following the sport a blast for me.

So if your smartphone tells you rain is possible on race day, that might be one you don't want to miss.

College World Series

Beavers' Heimlich: 'Fans can cheer me. They can boo'


OMAHA, Neb. — Oregon State pitcher Luke Heimlich is the probable starter in the opening game of the College World Series on Saturday, and he said he is ready for any kind of reception he receives from the fans on the sport's biggest stage.

Heimlich, 22, is in Omaha a year after it was disclosed he had pleaded guilty to sexually abusing a young relative when he was 15. He has denied wrongdoing in recent interviews with Sports Illustrated and The New York Times, saying he entered the guilty plea to spare his family the ordeal of a trial.

Heimlich received a standing ovation when he walked off the mound at his home ballpark for the last time last week. But left-handed ace will be at the college game's premier event — 1,700 miles from Corvallis, Oregon — when the Beavers face North Carolina at TD Ameritrade Park.

"I'm not worried about the fans. I play baseball on the field," Heimlich said in the Oregon State clubhouse Friday. "People and the fans can cheer me on. They can boo. They can do what they want. I'm here to play baseball."

Heimlich has played a major role in the Beavers making it to the CWS for

the second year in a row. He leads the nation in wins with a school-record 16-1 record and 151 strikeouts in 120 1/3 innings. He was named Pac-12 pitcher of the year for the second straight season.

Last year, after The Oregonian newspaper first reported Heimlich's juvenile record, Heimlich opted to

sit out the super regional and did not make the trip to Omaha.

"It wasn't fun," Heimlich said. "I watched some of it from home. One of the games I went on a hike, the other I was on a beach somewhere. I definitely was following (it)."

Brenda Tracy, a rape survivor and activist who

speaks to college sports teams around the country, said Heimlich should not have been allowed to rejoin the team this season. The Heimlich story hits close to home for her. Tracy alleged she was gang raped by four men, including three Oregon State football players, when she was a student at OSU in 1998.

"It's long past time for universities and athletic departments to ban violent athletes," she said. "There are consequences for your behavior, and playing sports is a privilege."

Tracy said the NCAA should adopt the rule passed this month by the Big Sky Conference that prevents individuals with

a history of convicted violence to receive athletic-related financial aid or participate in practice or competition. The misconduct includes any act of sexual violence, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and assault with a deadly weapon.

Heimlich, a senior from Puyallup, Washington, initially was charged with two counts of molestation. He ultimately pleaded guilty to one count of molestation between February 2011 and December 2011, a period during which he was 15. Prosecutors dismissed the other charge.

He entered a diversion program, received two years of probation and was ordered to attend sex offender treatment for two years, according to court records. He was ordered to serve 40 weeks of detention at a juvenile facility, but that sentence was suspended and he served no time because he successfully completed probation.

Heimlich deflected questions touching on his history with a stock answer: "I'm focused on continuing to help my team win games."

His future after the CWS is to be determined. Widely considered a first-round talent, he went undrafted two straight years. He still could sign with a major league club as an undrafted free agent, play in an independent league or overseas.

Anibal Sanchez throws 7 scoreless innings, Braves top Padres

ATLANTA — Another strong effort from Anibal Sanchez has the first-place Atlanta Braves facing a sudden surplus of starting pitchers.

Sanchez allowed only four hits in seven scoreless innings, Ender Inciarte homered and scored two runs and the Braves, helped by a strange replay ruling, beat the San Diego Padres 4-2 on Thursday night.

The Braves (40-28) moved 12 games over .500 for the first time since ending the 2013 season on top of the NL East. They haven't been back to the playoffs since 2013, but now they're again leading the division.

Sanchez has won two straight starts. With the emergence of rookie Mike Soroka and the expected return of Julio Teheran from the DL this weekend, Braves manager Brian Snitker could soon face difficult decisions in his rotation.

"We've got a good problem because we've got more starters than we can probably use right now," Snitker said. "That's something that not a lot of teams can say. So it's going to be some tough decisions going forward."

Sanchez (3-0) did not walk a batter as he earned his first win in six career starts against San Diego. The 34-year-old right-hander lowered his ERA to 1.93 in seven games, including six starts. He signed with Atlanta in spring training following his release from Minnesota.

"He's been a man on a mission," catcher Tyler Flowers said.

Sanchez outpitched Tyson Ross (5-4), who allowed only three hits and three runs in six-plus innings.

Ozzie Albies added a run-scoring double for Atlanta. Inciarte, who singled and scored in the third, had two hits.

Atlanta led 3-0 before Eric Hosmer's

double off Dan Winkler in the eighth drove in Jose Pirela and Cory Spangenberg, cutting the lead to one run.

Freddie Freeman doubled and scored on Adam Cimber's throwing error on Flowers' grounder in the bottom of the eighth to cap the scoring.

Arodys Vizcaino pitched the ninth for his 13th save in 15 chances.

The Padres were upset a video review affirmed the ruling from home plate umpire Mark Ripperger that Flowers was hit by a pitch from Sanchez in the seventh. The review lasted 2 minutes, 39 seconds.

Flowers said he told Ripperger he didn't think he was hit by the pitch.

"The more I thought about it sitting there, and then seeing the replay, I know it hit something," Flowers said. "It might have been me. I don't know. I wear so many guards and stuff, it might have been one of those."

TV replays seemed to show the ball didn't hit Flowers or his bat.

San Diego manager Andy Green said the call changed the game because Flowers scored on Inciarte's groundout against Robbie Erlin.

"In those moments as a manager I'm not even sure why you have replay," Green said. "I mean, it's blatantly obvious it didn't hit him. There's no situation where that hit him and it changed the game. ... Every single way you look at that one they blew it and that cost us."

Inciarte pulled a pitch from Ross over the first level of right-field seats and into the open doors of a restaurant in the fifth. It was Inciarte's fifth homer and his first since May 15.

Sanchez escaped sixth-inning trouble after the Padres had runners on first and third with one out, following a double by A.J. Ellis and an infield single by Pirela. Spangenberg and Hosmer ended the inning with infield popups.

World Cup Roundup

Spain, Portugal tie 3-3

SOCHI, Russia — Cristiano Ronaldo completed a hat trick with a perfectly timed free kick in the 88th minute to give Portugal a 3-3 draw against Spain on Friday at the World Cup.

Ronaldo had twice given Portugal the lead with first-half goals, but Diego Costa equalized for Spain with a goal in each half. Nacho Fernandez then put 2010 champions ahead with a one-timer from outside the area in the Group B match.

Spain looked to have successfully overcome its dramatic coaching change one the eve of the tournament but Ronaldo curled a late shot over the wall to force the draw.

Ronaldo's opening goal from the penalty spot allowed him to become the fourth player to score in four World Cups, joining Pele, Miroslav Klose and Uwe Seeler.

His second goal came after a blunder by Spain goalkeeper David de Gea, who let the ball bounce off his hands and into the net.

Uruguay 1, Egypt 0

YEKATERINBURG, Russia — In a team that

boasts one of the World Cup's most potent attacks, two defenders combined to give Uruguay a late victory over Egypt on Friday.

Uruguay captain Diego Godin and teammate Jose Gimenez, who anchor the back line at Atletico Madrid as well as the national team's traditionally solid defense, did their job in front of their own goalkeeper and then combined for the winning strike in the 89th minute.

Godin, who was making his 117th international appearance, sent a free kick from the right into the area. Gimenez jumped and got his head to the ball, directing it into the net and giving Uruguay its first opening-match victory at the World Cup in 48 years.

Uruguay now has three points in Group A, but still trails Russia on goal difference after the host nation's 5-0 victory over Saudi Arabia on Thursday.

Egypt forward Mohamed Salah was on the bench for his country's first World Cup match since 1990 after injuring his shoulder while playing for Liverpool in last month's Champions League final. Salah was the Premier League's player of the season after scoring a league-leading 32 goals,

with 44 in all competitions.

He left the Champions League final in tears on May 26 after he was injured during a collision with Real Madrid defender Sergio Ramos.

"He didn't play today because we didn't want to have any risk or danger," Egypt coach Hector Cuper said. "But I think he will be OK for the next match."

Iran 1, Morocco 0

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia — An own-goal in the fifth minute of injury time gifted Iran a victory over Morocco on Friday at the World Cup.

Only on the field as a 77th-minute substitute, Morocco striker Aziz Bouhaddouz dived to reach a curling cross from the left but headed the ball past his own goalkeeper.

While Bouhaddouz buried his face in the turf and was consoled by some teammates, there was an explosion of joy among the Iran squad as coaching staff and substitutes sprinted onto the field and jumped for joy.

It was Iran's second win in 13 matches at the World Cup, and Asia's first since the 2010 tournament in South Africa.





Guts and grit: Harlee reveals all in crime drama's final season

For an informant, withholding and manipulating the truth can be a matter of life and death. Keeping secrets and telling white lies can be hard enough for the average citizen and harder still for a mobster, but for a cop? Well, no greater challenge can exist than to try to delude those trained to detect such deception.

Amidst a sea of badges and blue on prime-time television, one series has managed to make huge waves, combining the drama of a mafioso series with the action of a gritty cop show. Despite an exciting run, this year marks the final season of the star-heavy series, as season 3 of "Shades of Blue" premieres Sunday, June 17, on NBC.

"Shades of Blue" explores the lives of the Street Crimes detective squad of the 64th precinct in New York City, focusing on Det. Harlee Santos (Jennifer Lopez, "Lila & Eve," 2015) and her supervisor, Lt. Matt Wozniak (Ray Liotta, "Goodfellas," 1990), with whom Harlee has a 15-year history and a deep, familial relationship. The crew is a tight-knit group of dirty cops who do what is necessary in order to make a crime scene or criminal work in their favor. Other members of the crew include Tess Nazario (Drea de Matteo, "The Sopranos"), Marcus Tufo (Hampton Fluker, "Major Crimes") and Carlos Espada (Vincent Laresca, "Graceland").

After being set up in the series premiere, Harlee had a difficult decision to make, and it's one with which she continues to grapple. She's brought in by the FBI and confronted by Agent Robert Stahl (Warren Kole, "Stalker"), who needs her to act as an informant so that his anti-corruption task force can finally reveal the unsavory underbelly of the 64th. Given that Harlee is

a single mother, down on her luck and desperate to give her daughter, Cristina (Sarah Jeffery, "Rogue"), a better future, she has little choice but to agree, realizing that compliance with the FBI could give her a second chance instead of jail time, while simultaneously knowing that even the smallest misstep could spell tragedy for her and her child.

Season 2 of "Shades of Blue" saw Harlee's loyalties increasingly torn. She had suspected that Wozniak would be through with her, having learned of her informant ways, but he revealed some truths of his own and decided to take advantage of his new-found knowledge. He enlisted Harlee as a double agent of sorts, feeding misinformation to Stahl as a means to continue helping the crew. As the season intensified, fans were constantly immersed in the tension, with a finale that left the fates of both Harlee and Wozniak in perilous uncertainty. Thankfully, early trailers for the new season indicate that Harlee will be able to testify in court, hinting that all of the betrayal and lies of sea-

sons past will come to light, putting corruption from all sides on public display.

Beyond a compelling plot and intense screenwriting, the show's popularity owes a great deal to its

phenomenal casting. Since the early 2000s, there has been an increasing shift from the big screen to television for many of Hollywood's A and B list actors. Claire Danes has shone on the small screen in "Homeland." Colin Farrell and Matthew McConaughey made waves with "True Detective," a show that's boasted more than its fair share of big-screen talent in regular and recurring roles. It's no wonder, then, that

when NBC decided to option "Shades of Blue," it wasn't such a difficult sell, with stars Lopez and Liotta ea-

ger to get involved in the burgeoning quality TV market.

In an interview for BUILD Series, Lopez and Liotta expressed their excitement and passion for the series. Lopez didn't shy away from addressing the shift for many actors from the big screen to the small screen, noting that "six, seven years ago ... it just seemed like the movie business was not doing as well if you didn't have a big blockbuster." As more niche or unique stories became difficult to pitch to cinematic studios, Lopez believes that "great writers" made the move to television because they'd be able "to do the stories they wanted to do," with the financial freedom and stability to do so. For Lopez — and Liotta, who nodded in approval — "the best movies right now are on TV."

Creative freedom aside, the challenge of television's demanding schedules brings more depth to "Shades of Blue," or so

Lopez and Liotta believe. "[The show] is emotionally taxing. It seems, to me, like in every scene, it's life or death ... to keep at that level, for five and a half, six months straight, every day for 12 hours a day ... it's a tough, grueling process," Lopez states. Neither believes they're holding back for network programming, with both admitting to the difficulties of shaking Harlee and Wozniak after a long day of shooting.

Sadly, this is the final season of the series, but perhaps it's fitting, given that "Shades of Blue" will conclude on its own terms and be able to maintain the tension that has made it so successful throughout its run. Catch up if you can, get to know the crew and what's at stake, and prepare for the final 10 episodes of NBC's gritty crime drama. The season premiere of "Shades of Blue" airs Sunday, June 17, on NBC.

There are basically two types of shows on Food Network. 



hollywood Q&A

Q: I haven't been able to find out anything online about whether there will be another "Sing-Off" a capella competition on TV anytime in the future. It was so incredibly entertaining the several times it aired, I think on NBC. I wondered if you knew more.

A: The only thing I know is you can never say never with "The Sing-Off."

NBC has seemed to have canceled the series twice, only to revive it and then cancel it again. That said, the most recent cancellation, which wasn't all that recent at all, seems to have stuck.

The capella singing-competition series debuted in 2009, aired for three seasons, and then was seemingly canceled in 2012. NBC revived it a year later for a fourth season, let it disappear again, but then brought it back again for a

one-night Christmas special in 2014.

It hasn't been seen since, though, which suggests NBC is finally done with the series.

However, "The Sing-Off's" concept is such that it could be brought back at any time. The moment the network finds a big enough batch of promising young singers, and is able to get a hold of the often-underemployed Nick Lachey, it could come out with a new season — the format doesn't get old.

Proof of that can be found in the surprising success of the Pentatonix. The group, which won season 3 of "The Sing-Off," has sustained its popularity in the subsequent years, winning a Grammy in 2017, five years after the "Sing-Off" victory.

But as I said before, as things stand, there's no hint of another season.

Q: I'm old-fashioned and still buy DVDs, but I can't find the

fourth season of "Turn: Washington's Spies." Why are the first three seasons available but not the last one?

A: It would appear that, in defiance of "old-fashioned" people like yourself, AMC is delaying the disc release while it chases new-fashioned streaming revenue.

Season 4 was available on Netflix, Amazon Prime Video, iTunes and elsewhere starting in late 2017, but it's still not available on DVD (nor mid-fashioned Blu-Ray).

Many industry watchers argue that studios favor streaming releases for a number of reasons, in which case it makes sense that they'd give the release-date advantage to streaming over disc. The retail numbers certainly favor streaming: streaming revenues bypassed discs for the first time in 2016 in the U.S., leaving them even further in the dust last year.

Meanwhile, the Blockbusters and HMVs of the world are disappearing — it's getting harder to buy DVDs, while subscribing to a streaming service is getting easier.

As for whether we'll ever see a disc release of "Turn" season 4, it's hard to say. It seems likely, since the first three were released already, and the fourth season was the last one. If the studio releases the fourth on disc, it can come back again in a year with a boxed set that collects all four together, which would squeeze a bit more cash out of the series.

However, gone are the days when every series eventually got a DVD release. Fox stunned a lot of people back in 2015 when it announced that seasons of "The Simpsons" would no longer be released on disc. "Simpsons" showrunner Al Jean gave basically the

same reason — studios prefer streaming to discs.

Q: I love the book "The Great Gatsby," and I thought Leonardo DiCaprio did a great job playing him. I know that was a remake of an earlier film — who played Gatsby in the original?

A: Technically, Leo DiCaprio was reprising the role pioneered by silent-film great Warner Baxter, who died 23 years before DiCaprio was born, but that's probably not the version you're thinking of.

DiCaprio's "Great Gatsby" was actually the fourth film version of the classic novel by F. Scott Fitzgerald. The first, Baxter's, was released in 1926. It was remade in 1949 with legendary tough-guy actor Alan Ladd in the role.

The version you're probably thinking of came in 1974, starring the even-more-legendary screen great Robert Redford in the title role.

His was considered the definitive screen version, at least until DiCaprio's version came out in 2013. Whether that one will eclipse Redford's in the cultural memory remains to be seen — five years does not a classic make.

DiCaprio's version was certainly made on a grander scale, though.

Its budget was more than \$100 million and it earned \$350 million in global revenue.

Redford's looks modest by comparison. It was made for \$6.5 million, which in today's dollars would be about \$35 million — still only a third of DiCaprio's budget. However, the 1974 version's return on investment was a little better, percentage-wise — it earned \$27 million at the box office, which would be about \$150 million today.

In terms of acclaim, the two are about tied. Both won two Oscars, but none of those statues went to the stars — the 1974 version won for its music and costumes, while 2013's won for its production design and, again, for its costumes.


