Local farmer first recipient of award

Bishop is agency's Partner of the Year

Local farmer Craig Bishop on Thursday became the first-ever recipient of the Northwest Florida Water Management District's new Partner of the Year award.

Bishop received a plaque, and his name was the first to appear on a shining-silver trophy that will stay with the agency perpet-

ually as names are added. The plaque was presented and the trophy was revealed at a meeting of the Water Management District's governing board that afternoon on the Chipola College campus.

Agency representatives say Bishop, who farms several hundred acres in the Jackson Blue Springs watershed basin, was among the first and remains one of the most committed farmers to have embraced the state's

Sunland reaches out to Eastpoint

Sunland residents and staff over the years have helped out in a number of local causes and events. A short list includes Farm-City Day, Friends of Sunland Haute Seats fundraiser, food drives for the Chipola Ministry Center, food drives for needy families at Thanksgiving, donations of 100 backpacks filled with school supplies for local children, and provision of snacks for volunteers on Habitat for Humanity's work projects.

But their outreaching arms have now

stretched to encircle a wider patch of territory. When the small coastal town of Eastpoint was devastated by wildfire a few weeks ago, the Sunland community felt it in a personal way. The manager of William J. (Billy Joe) Rish Park in Cape San Blas, Victor Rowland, has family in Eastpoint.

Only individuals with disabilities and their family members and caregivers can rent cottages and dormitories or use the Rish facilities, and it has been a favorite summer getaway for residents of Sunland ever since it was established in 1978.

Grocery Outlet is in the final stages of negotiations to purchase the Marianna Save a Lot grocery operation, according to Grocery Outlet Vice President Bill Bradford.

He said Wednesday that, if the sale goes through as expected, a grand re-opening of the store will likely be held near the end of summer, to signal the transfer of the business.

Shipp seeks support in former hometown

John Shipp, Democratic contender for State Commissioner of Education, brought his campaign to Marianna yesterday and several local supporters gathered at the Holiday Inn for a "coffee" in his honor. Shipp, former Marianna resident and educator, was active in the local Jaycees and at one time was the president of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

"I feel very keenly that we must return to a common sense approach to education in this state and get back to giving the teachers the time to teach and quit robbing them of their precious teaching time by all the petty details that we ask them to attend to of record-keeping and non-teaching duties," Shipp said. —JACKSON COUNTY FLORIDAN, FRIDAY, JULY 19, 1974

Cobots, robots and recreating the Fab Four

Recently I read about a fast-food restaurant chain that is investing millions into computerized food service. The customer programs his food selection, then robots make each hamburger to order, adding desired condiments and even slicing whole pickles with millimeter precision.

Artificial intelligence has also been utilized recently in an attempt to recreate a Beatles song. Critics called the final product somewhat "emotionless", and noted that it sounded more like the Beach Boys than the Beatles, but the very fact that we've got the technology to attempt such an endeavor is disconcerting to human artists.

Our ability to control, regulate and direct AI represents a significant signpost toward a healthy economy in the 21st century. So the viability of using cobots, or collaborative robots, in the manufacturing sector is especially encouraging. A 2016 study by the International Federation of Robotics reveals that fewer than 10% of jobs can be completely automated. Of course, that statistic suggests that 90 percent of tasks can

be at least partially automated. Most of those jobs are currently filled by low wage, low skilled workers.

Traditional robots require extensive programming. They are often cumbersome, relatively immobile and dangerous for nearby workers, and many perform their functions locked away from employees. Perhaps most importantly, their presence was a threat to employees because they replaced human hands.

Cobots work in tandem with human workers and can help boost productivity, which then increases overall employment. Designed to shut down if a person crosses their path, cobots minimize worksite injury. Most require no sophisticated coding and are generally lighter and more mobile than traditional robots. Just under a quarter million global industrial robots were sold last year, and only five percent of these were cobots. But cobots,

sometimes called flexible robots, could soon become an important component of the profitability of small manufacturing plants.

As economist Gary Schilling has written, "Collaborative robots that work alongside humans...are getting cheaper and easier to program. And they're safer and more user-friendly than earlier models that had to be caged to protect humans...Cobots are being used in warehouses and are much cheaper in moving goods than miles of conveyor belts."

Integrating technology like cobots into industrial manufacturing makes imminent sense to me, from a human standpoint. We simply cannot afford to invent and program ourselves into a state of high unemployment. But using technology as a complimentary feature on the factory floor is an evolved solution that can simultaneously assist us in achieving maximum efficiency and high employment.

Another View

Suspense of Trump-Putin summit

Unlike his Singapore one-on-one with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, President Donald Trump's summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin, slated for July 16 in Helsinki, doesn't suggest history in the making. Trump and Putin have already met — twice. Russian and American leaders have been meeting for decades. By contrast, no U.S. president ever had met a North Korean leader.

Yet a sense of suspense hangs over the Trump-Putin summit. Or is it dread?

There's always merit to meeting with world leaders, even leaders of nations with hostile agendas. Common ground can be reached. Foundations for better relations can be forged. But as both countries' governments have anticipated a meeting, Trump has been hinting at concessions that ignore the Kremlin's track record for undermining American interests — abroad and on U.S. soil.

The Trump administration has floated the idea of creating a way for Russia to rejoin the Group of Seven, the club of industrialized democracies that kicked the Kremlin out after Russia pilfered Crimea from Ukraine in 2014. The G-7 — G-8 when Russia belonged — tackles world problems ranging from terrorism to global warming. Trump has said trade-offs could be negotiated with the Kremlin that would permit Russia's return to the group. There's only one trade-off that should be on the table: President Putin, give back Crimea to Ukraine.

Also atop Trump's summit agenda should be attempted Russian interference — past and quite possibly future — in the U.S. election process. The Kremlin has repeatedly denied meddling in the 2016 election cycle. Instead of denouncing that denial, Trump appears to sympathize with it. "Russia continues to say they had nothing do with Meddling in our Election!" Trump tweeted on Thursday. Trump should instead heed the view of his national security adviser, John Bolton, who has referred to Russia's meddling in the presidential campaign as "a true act of war."

There's a long list of other Russian transgressions over which Trump should confront Putin. They include the case of the former Russian spy who, along with his daughter, was poisoned in Britain with nerve gas — a poisoning British authorities say Russia orchestrated.

Also, Russia's sponsorship of Syrian autocrat Bashar Assad, a lethal leader who has used chemical weapons on fellow Syrian citizens. And the Kremlin's proxy war in eastern Ukraine, which keeps that country mired in a brutal separatist conflict.

If Trump challenges his Russian counterpart on these issues, the summit could be worthwhile. If he doesn't, he risks seeming, once again, like putty in the hands of Putin, a former KGB agent who knows all too well the levers of manipulation and how to deftly use them on his enemies.

The Kremlin would like nothing more than to wangle a path toward the easing — or even lifting — of U.S. and Western sanctions still in place because of Crimea, other Russian influence in Ukraine and the meddling in America's election process. We hope Trump's conciliatory vibe toward Russia in recent days doesn't foreshadow damaging giveaways. That would strengthen Putin in Russia and beyond — at the expense of the U.S., its western allies and the put-upon peoples of Ukraine and Syria.

Trump's mainstream immigration policy

Perhaps no Trump policy has provoked more emotional reaction than the practice of separating illegal border crossers from the children they brought with them to the United States. There's no need to recount the number of times critics have called the president a Nazi, or a fascist, or just plain cruel.

The administration has now stopped the separation policy. But it plans to continue prosecuting illegal border crossers and, when those crossers bring children illegally into the United States, will "detain families together during the pendency of immigration proceedings," according to an administration court filing in California.

That, of course, will not satisfy the critics, and legal challenges are sure to follow. But if a new poll is correct, it appears the Trump administration, after an enormously damaging few weeks, has ended up squarely on the side of the majority of American voters.

The new survey is a Harvard-Harris Poll, by former Clinton pollster and strategist Mark Penn. It was conducted in late June with 1,448 registered voters.

On the issue of separations, Penn began with a threshold question: "Do you think that people who make it across our border illegally should be allowed to stay in the country or sent home? Sixty-four percent said they should be sent home. Thirty-six percent said they should be allowed to stay."

Then Penn asked: "Do you think that parents with children who make it across our border illegally should be allowed to stay in the country or sent home?" The presence of children made little difference in the result: 61 percent said they should be sent home, while 39 percent said they should

be allowed to stay.

The vast majority — 88 percent — opposed separating illegal immigrant families while they are in the U.S., and they blamed the Trump administration for the policy. On the other hand, 55 percent said illegal immigrant families should be held in custody "until a judge reviews their case" — essentially the new Trump family detention policy.

Put the numbers together, and a substantial majority said illegal border crossers, and the children they brought, should be returned to their home countries. To that end, 80 percent favored hiring more immigration judges "to process people in custody faster."

Penn's polling found other results broadly favorable to the Trump approach to immigration.

For example, Penn asked, "Do you think we need stricter or looser enforcement of our immigration laws?" Seventy percent said stricter, while 30 percent said looser.

Penn's polling also found overwhelming opposition to sanctuary cities. He asked: "Should cities that arrest illegal immigrants for crimes be required to notify immigration authorities they are in custody or be prohibited from notifying immigration authorities?" Eight-four percent — a huge number — said that cities should be required to notify immigration authorities. Just 16 percent said cities should be prohibited from

doing that.

Penn polled the newest progressive immigration proposal, the "Abolish ICE" campaign to disband U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. Sixty-nine percent of those surveyed said ICE should not be abolished, while 31 percent said it should.

Finally, Penn found widespread support for the fundamental provisions of the immigration bills, based on Trump's "four pillars," that were recently rejected by the House of Representatives. "Would you favor or oppose a congressional deal that gives undocumented immigrants brought here by their parents work permits and a path to citizenship in exchange for increasing merit preference over preference for relatives, eliminating the diversity visa lottery, and funding barrier security on the U.S.-Mexico border?" Penn asked. Sixty-three percent supported the plan, while 37 percent opposed.

"Overall, Americans want to show compassion for those that are here, but want much tougher enforcement of immigration laws," Penn said.

Reading Penn's questions, and the respondents' answers, it was hard not to think of the presidency of Bill Clinton, for whom Penn worked in the 1990s. Clinton's relatively tough stance on illegal immigration reflected Democratic thinking of the time. Penn's questions still do, at least in the way they are worded. "In these polls I try to be as detailed in the policy questions as I was polling for six years for President Clinton," Penn said, "because public opinion in America is far more nuanced than people realize — small changes in policy make a big difference."

3 ways to defeat dysfunction on the Hill

Four years ago this month, we joined with 27 other Americans to release recommendations to reform how our government works, improve the management of our elections, and promote more civic engagement.

At the time, the Commission on Political Reform, or CPR, was grappling with how to enable our institutions to better function in an era marked by hyperpartisanship. We did not think the tone and dysfunction in Washington could get worse — and yet it has.

There are, however, several reasons to hope that change could finally be on the horizon. Returning to traditional paths for legislating that foster consensus-building, committees in both chambers have passed a bipartisan Water Resources Development Act, the Senate marked up a bipartisan farm bill, the House approved bipartisan legislation to reform the federal prison system, and both chambers are moving to address the opioids epidemic. However, the most important signal may be the Senate's bipartisan agreement to move appropriations bills on the floor through so-called regular order rather than a massive, eleventh-hour spending package.

This would indeed be a significant accomplishment. Congress has failed to pass a budget resolution on time for seven of the last 10 years — compared to just four times in the previous 34 years. Further, Congress has passed all 12 appropriations bills by the annual

Oct. 1 deadline just four times in the last 40 years. From 2011 to 2016, not a single appropriations bill was passed by Oct. 1.

This year's hopes aside, to more systematically address the annual budget and appropriations debacle, Congress recently created the Joint Select Committee on Budget and Appropriations Process Reform. This panel will examine how procedural changes could help overcome the political barriers that have made temporary, stopgap resolutions to avoid government shutdowns and all-encompassing, last-minute "omnibus" appropriations bills the new normal. If the committee can arrive at consensus, it would report its recommendations and legislative language to Congress and the president by the end of November, and the Senate would have to vote on a motion to consider the bill before the conclusion of the 115th Congress.

As is evident from the joint committee's three public hearings, its task is herculean. We propose that the panel adopt three of our CPR recommendations to dramatically improve the budget and appropriations process.

First, Congress should codify its recent tendency toward approving biennial budgets, including two-year budget resolutions and appropriations bills. The traditional annual budgeting process leaves the bulk of members out of decision-making, is disconnected from the authorization process, and produces short-sighted policymaking. Additionally, moving to a two-year cycle would provide

more time for the Appropriations committees to conduct vital oversight of programs within their jurisdictions.

Second, the Senate filibuster has been the subject of much debate and maligning over the years. We support maintaining the current 60-vote threshold for legislation to preserve the Senate's unique, invaluable role as the body that protects the rights of the minority. At the same time, CPR recommended eliminating the ability to filibuster motions to move to consideration of legislation. The joint committee should apply this principle to the appropriations process.

Third, in exchange for limiting debate on the motion to proceed, we urged that each side of the aisle be accorded a minimum number of amendments to each piece of legislation. Both the House and Senate should adopt this provision for appropriations.

The Commission on Political Reform provides a blueprint around which the joint committee could get bipartisan consensus. Congress was right to establish the committee, and all members must now encourage those on the panel to come together around commonsense reforms.

In Senate race, Scott in balancing act with Trump

TALLAHASSEE — Asked this month whether President Donald Trump is doing a good job, Florida Gov. Rick Scott said he was happy with his friend's decisions on offshore drilling and willingness to accelerate repairs to the Lake Okeechobee dike.

Asked the question again, Scott paused and said, "I can tell you, what I want is results, and those are the results I like."

Scott's hesitance to directly answer the question about the Republican president is a small but telling indicator of the balancing act he has performed since deciding to challenge Democratic incumbent U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson.

Trump enjoys strong support among Republicans in the state he won two years ago. But Democrats, who have struggled with turnout in non-presidential elections, have been energized by Trump's actions and plan to flock to the polls this year.

Scott's current posture is a dramatic shift for the vocal critic of former President Barack Obama who enthusiastically backed Trump during the presidential election. Scott set up a Super PAC to help Trump during the cam-

paigned and has visited the president at the White House and Trump's Mar-A-Lago resort in Palm Beach.

Trump publicly urged Scott to run for U.S. Senate, but recently the GOP governor has picked a careful path as he mounts an aggressive push to deny Nelson a fourth term.

He has split with Trump on certain issues, including immigration, but without criticizing the president. At some political events, he has barely mentioned Trump by name.

In April, Scott skipped

a Trump round-table discussion of the tax-cut package in South Florida, heading out of state to raise money for his Senate campaign instead.

Brian Ballard, a top GOP lobbyist and fundraiser who knows both Scott and Trump well, said "very few people agree with the president 100 percent of the time." But he added that Scott is already well-liked by Republican voters in Florida and can afford to disagree with the president.

"The governor has his own brand; he doesn't

need to grab the president's coattails," Ballard said. "He doesn't have to disparage the president. He has a clean opportunity to be supportive of the president and continue to promote his own brand. If he disagrees, he will disagree in a way that is not disrespectful."

Democratic strategist Steve Schale, however, pointed out that Scott successfully campaigned for governor in 2010 by linking the Democratic nominee to Obama.

"Scott really can't run from Trump," Schale said.

"There's too many clips and too much video, and I'm sure it will be making its way to TV screens."

Scott, a former health care executive who is leaving the governor's office because of term limits, is deliberate and tends to stick closely to scripted talking points during public events.

Recently, he has been cautious when it comes to the president:

— During a visit to Puerto Rico, a reporter asked Scott what the federal government should have done differently after Hurricane Maria. Puerto Ricans have complained that the U.S. government responded slowly after the storm battered the American territory. Scott said he didn't know what he would have done differently but said communicating with federal authorities is important.

— Scott split with Trump over the administration's policy of separating families at the border but did not sharply criticize the president. Instead, he sent a letter to federal authorities calling for an immediate end to the policy and demanded that state officials be told about children brought into Florida.

— At the beginning of hurricane season, Scott sidestepped questions about a Trump budget

proposal to cut money for hurricane research. At an event in Miami, Scott said several federal agencies had been good partners.

After a meeting in Orlando with Puerto Rican hurricane evacuees, Democratic incumbent Nelson was asked about the governor's relationship to Trump.

"They are great friends," Nelson said. "Scott has been like two peas in a pod with Trump, and that is not going to serve Rick Scott very well when the people of Puerto Rico and other Hispanic cultures find out the closeness between the two of them, as evidenced by the Trump administration over and over again trying to put down Hispanics."

Rick Wilson, a veteran Republican strategist from Tallahassee whose unrelenting criticism of Trump has made him a national celebrity, said Scott is smart to try to distance himself from the president on issues such as the child separation policy. But he was skeptical of how successful it would be for him.

"Scott knows what everyone else knows: This Trump policy polls in the ditch," Wilson said. "It's poison. He's smart to do it now, but there's still a lot of video of Rick Scott and Trump swapping spit."

Man injured in fall from balcony on Panhandle beach

PENSACOLA BEACH — A man was taken to the hospital after falling from a second story balcony of a house on a Florida Panhandle beach.

The Pensacola News Journal reports the incident happened Thursday.

Escambia County spokeswoman Joy Tsubooka says the man was airlifted from the scene as a trauma alert. His condition was not available.

Police: Nursing home workers duct-taped patient to chair

BOYNTON BEACH — Two Florida nursing home employees are charged with using duct tape to restrain and quiet a patient with dementia.

Boynton Beach police said in a news release Friday that 52-year-old Lashron Williams and 44-year-old Phygelle Brudent duct-taped a 67-year-old woman to a chair and used tape to cover her mouth. They were arrested Thursday and charged with elder abuse and false imprisonment.

Detectives say Brudent confessed to duct-taping the victim July 3, telling them the woman wouldn't remain quiet.

Williams told police Brudent duct-taped the victim. She said she uncovered the patient's mouth to give her sleeping pills. She said she told Brudent it was wrong to duct-tape patients, but did not report her.

Army corps resumes flushing water from Lake Okeechobee

MIAMI — Goopy green water flowed Friday from both sides of Lake Okeechobee, carrying toxic algae toward Florida's coasts.

Col. Jason Kirk of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers says the pulsing water flows will simulate rainfall. By varying the flows, they hope to reduce environ-

mental problems.

Kirk says they need to flush the lake to reduce flood risks as water levels rise. Its aging dike was built after flooding unleashed by two hurricanes killed thousands of people in the 1920s.

Coastal communities say previous discharges spread toxic algae, threatening tourism and health. Both Republican and Democratic political candidates are making the discharges a campaign issue.

The Trump administration has approved a new reservoir to store more water south of the lake, but it awaits passage in Congress.

Authorities: Man told officer he only drank when car stopped

VERO BEACH — A Florida man told the officer who pulled him over that he was taking swigs of bourbon only when he stopped at traffic lights and stop signs — so he wasn't drinking and driving.

Indian River County Sheriff's deputies still arrested 69-year-old Earle Stevens Jr. on June 27 on charges of DUI and driving without a license.

TCPalm reports Stevens told investigators he's never had a valid Florida driver's license.

An arrest affidavit says Stevens smelled of booze. He told them he felt "pretty good" and that he wasn't drinking while the car was moving.

83-yr-old man charged with posing as Marine Corp vet

PENSACOLA — An 83-year-old Florida man has pleaded guilty to pretending to be a veteran so he could receive hundreds of thousands of dollars in benefits.

According to a statement from the U.S. attorney for the Northern District of Florida, Richard Kohl claimed to serve with the Marines in the Korean war, forging government documents so he could collect

\$220,000 in benefits. He alleged he received a Purple Heart after being shot. He first filed for benefits in 1996, but the Department of Veterans Affairs denied it, saying it couldn't find his medical records.

According to prosecutors, Kohl submitted a request for disability pension benefits nine years later and was accepted. They said he received more than \$110,000 in pension benefits plus costly medical care.

He faces up to 10 years in prison.

Man charged with attacking minion on Florida boardwalk

DAYTONA BEACH — A man has been charged with attacking a person dressed as a minion cartoon character along a popular Florida boardwalk.

Police say Jamie Roehm was costumed as a yellow, cylindrical minion and working outside Jungle George's on Daytona Beach's boardwalk Sunday evening when a man messing with him. According to the police report, Roehm says the man slammed him onto the pavement and kicked him when he tried to get back up.

Scott makes it clear: State isn't privatizing beaches

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Gov. Rick Scott signed an executive order Thursday responding to confusion over a new Florida law, and he's making it clear that it doesn't make public beaches private.

A law that went into effect July 1 makes clear the process local governments have to follow in order to allow public access to otherwise-privately owned beaches. It doesn't change beach ownership, though it did void a beach access ordinance passed in Walton County in the western Panhandle.

"Because Floridians and our visitors deserve to have access to our world-class beaches, and property owners deserve to have their property rights respected, it is critical that there be no room for confusion regarding access to public beaches in Florida," Scott said in the order.

In Florida, many homeowners own the sand down to the average high-water line, though some counties have passed local ordinances

that let the public use otherwise private beaches for sunbathing, fishing and walking if people have historically had access for those purposes.

The new law spells out the process for local governments to allow public access to those beaches, including providing notice to property owners and having the ordinances approved by a court. Walton County's ordinance didn't fit the state's process, but it is the only place in Florida where beach use changed when the law went into effect.

But there's been widespread confusion on what the law does, leaving some people afraid that they'd no longer have access to beaches around the state.

Scott, who owns a \$14 million beachfront home in Naples, is directing the state Department of Environmental Protection to establish a website

where the public can report any problems with gaining access to public beaches. The agency must review the complaints and issue a report to the Legislature on their findings.

The DEP will also serve as a liaison between the public and local governments about how the new law should be implemented.

Scott also ordered all agencies under his direction not to implement any rules restricting access to public beaches unless it's to protect safety.

He also urged any other government agencies to not pass ordinances to restrict access to public beaches and urged state attorneys "to take appropriate actions to ensure that the ability of the public to access Florida's public beaches in accordance with longstanding Florida law is preserved and is not infringed."

Official: Renewed Emmett Till probe prompted by book

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A 2017 book that revealed lies by a key figure in the Emmett Till case has prompted the U.S. government to renew its investigation into the brutal 1955 slaying, a federal official said Thursday.

The reopening of the case had stayed quiet until the contents of a federal report came to light earlier in the day. Till relatives and social justice activists welcomed a fresh look at the killing that shocked the country and stoked the civil rights movement, but acknowledged that the passage of time could hamper justice.

Hours after news broke about the renewed investigation, a federal official familiar with the matter told The Associated Press that information in the 2017 book was what led federal investigators to re-examine the case. The official wasn't authorized to discuss the matter publicly and spoke to AP on condition of anonymity.

The book "The Blood of Emmett Till" by Timothy B. Tyson quotes a white woman, Carolyn Donham, as saying during a 2008 interview that she wasn't truthful when she testified that the black teen grabbed her, whistled and made sexual advances at a Mississippi store six decades ago.

Tyson told reporters Thursday that he was contacted by the FBI weeks after his book was published in January 2017, and he furnished them interview recordings and other research materials. He doesn't think his research alone would support new charges but said investigators may be able to link it to other material in their possession.

"It's possible that the investigation will turn up something. But there's nothing that I know of, and nothing in my research, that is actionable, I don't think," he said. "But I'm not an attorney or a detective."

The reopening of the Till case was disclosed in a federal report sent to lawmakers in March that said the Justice Department

had received unspecified "new information." The report's contents weren't widely known until Thursday.

A potential witness with the 14-year-old Till in the store that day, cousin Wheeler Parker, said Thursday that he has talked with law enforcement about the case in recent months.

The prosecutor with jurisdiction over the Mississippi community where Till was abducted, District Attorney Dewayne Richardson, declined to comment on whether federal authorities had given him new information since they reopened the investigation. The Justice Department also declined to comment.

It's unclear what new charges could result from a renewed investigation, said Tucker Carlington, a professor at the University of Mississippi law school.

Conspiracy or murder charges could be filed if anyone still alive is shown to have been involved, he said, but too much time likely has passed to prosecute anyone for other crimes, such as lying to investigators or in court.

The case was closed in 2007 with authorities saying the suspects were dead.

Two white men — Donham's

then-husband, Roy Bryant, and his half brother, J.W. Milam — were charged with murder but acquitted in the slaying of Chicago teen Till, who had been staying with relatives in northern Mississippi at the time. The men later confessed to the crime in a magazine interview but weren't retried. Both are now dead.

Donham, who turns 84 this month, lives in Raleigh, North Carolina. A man who came to the door at her residence declined to comment about the FBI reopening the investigation.

The government has investigated 115 cases involving 128 victims under the "cold case" law named for Till, the March federal report said. Only one resulted in a federal conviction since the act became law.

Deborah Watts, co-founder of the Emmett Till Legacy Founda-

tion, said it's "wonderful" her cousin's killing is getting another look but she didn't want to discuss details.

"None of us wants to do anything that jeopardizes any investigation or impedes, but we are also very interested in justice being done," she said.

Abducted from the home where he was staying, Till was beaten and shot, and his body was found weighted down with a cotton gin fan in a river. His mother, Mamie Till Mobley, had his casket left open. Images of his mutilated body gave witness to the depth of racial hatred in the Deep South and inspired civil rights campaigns.

Donham, then 21 and known as Carolyn Bryant, testified in 1955 as a prospective defense witness in the trial of Bryant and Milam. With jurors out of the courtroom,

she said a "nigger man" she didn't know took her by the arm in the store.

"He said, 'How about a date, baby?'" she testified, according to a trial transcript released by the FBI a decade ago. Bryant said she pulled away, and moments later the young man "caught me at the cash register," grasping her around the waist with both hands and pulling her toward him.

A judge ruled the testimony inadmissible. An all-white jury freed her husband and the other man even without it.

In the book, author Tyson wrote that Donham told him her testimony about Till accosting her wasn't true.

"Nothing that boy did could ever justify what happened to him," the book quotes her as saying.

US Attorney General Sessions discusses opioid crisis

PORTLAND, Maine — U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions put in a plug for President Donald Trump's Supreme Court nominee on Friday as he touted the role of law enforcement in reducing addiction and overdose deaths plaguing Maine and New England.

Sessions said Brett Kavanaugh is the son of a prosecutor who understands the role of judges and respects the role of law enforcement. He added that courts shouldn't be seen "as an opportunity to advance an agenda."

"We're in safer hands in my view when a judge calls balls and strikes and doesn't take sides in games," he said.

Sessions was joined in Portland by Uttam Dhillon, the new acting director of the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the U.S. attorney for Maine, Halsey Frank, as about 200 demonstrators gathered outside.

He noted that approximately 64,000 people nationwide died from drug overdoses in 2016, roughly the population of Portland, Maine's largest city.

Sessions says that the drug crisis is a "top priority" for the Trump administration as powerful fentanyl increases the stakes.

The attorney general discussed Operation Synthetic Opioid Surge, which he announced the day before in Concord, New Hampshire. The program will focus on Maine, New Hampshire and six other states with high rates of opioid deaths.

Addressing Maine, Sessions marveled at how the state is the second-safest in the country when it comes to reported crime rates while overdose deaths are double the national rate.

He said Maine already received another three federal prosecutors, and a fourth is being added under the new program.

Law enforcement can help to reduce drug addiction by disrupting the supply chain and, ultimately, saving lives, he said.

"Together we can break the vicious cycle of drug abuse, addiction and overdose that has devastated countless American families," he said.

'Downton Abbey' movie to shoot this summer

NEW YORK — Three years after going off the air, "Downton Abbey" is coming back as a movie.

Focus Features said Friday that it will this summer begin production on a "Downton" film that will reunite the Crawley family on the big screen. Series creator Julian Fellowes wrote the screenplay and will produce.

The long-rumored film adaptation is likely to be released next year. The primary cast members are all set to return.

Over six seasons, "Downton Abbey" became a global hit, airing in at least 150 countries, and setting a record for non-U.S. television shows with 69 Emmy nominations.

Brian Percival, who directed the series' pilot, will direct the film.

Russians accused of hacking Democrats in 2016 US election

WASHINGTON — Twelve Russian military intelligence officers hacked into the Clinton presidential campaign and Democratic Party, releasing tens of thousands of stolen communications, in a sweeping effort by a foreign government to meddle in the 2016 U.S. election, according to a grand jury indictment announced days before President Donald Trump's summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The indictment stands as the clearest Justice Department allegation yet of Russian efforts to interfere, through illegal hacking, in the U.S. presidential election before Americans went to the polls — and the first to implicate the Russian government directly. It had been sought by special counsel Robert Mueller.

U.S. intelligence agencies have said the meddling was aimed at helping the Trump campaign and harming the election bid of his Democratic opponent, Hillary Clinton. The effort also included bogus Facebook ads and social media postings that prosecutors say were aimed at influencing public opinion and sowing discord on hot-button social issues.

The indictment lays out a sweeping effort starting in March 2016 to break into key Democratic email accounts, such as those belonging to the Democratic National Committee, the Clinton campaign and the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. Among those targeted was John Podesta, the Clinton campaign chairman.

The Kremlin denied

anew that it tried to sway the election. "The Russian state has never interfered and has no intention of interfering in the U.S. elections," Putin's foreign affairs adviser, Yuri Ushakov, said Friday.

But the indictment identifies the defendants as officers with Russia's Main Intelligence Directorate of the General Staff, also known as GRU. It accuses them of covertly monitoring the computers of dozens of Democratic officials and volunteers, implanting malicious computer code known as malware and using spearphishing emails to gain control of the accounts of people associated with the Clinton campaign.

By June 2016, the defendants began planning the release of tens of thousands of stolen emails and documents, the indictment alleges. The messages were released through fictitious perso-

nas like DCLeaks and Guccifer 2.0.

The charges come as Mueller continues to investigate potential coordination between Russia and the Trump campaign to influence the presidential election. The indictment does not allege that Trump campaign associates were involved in the hacking efforts or that any American was knowingly in contact with Russian intelligence officers.

The indictment also does not allege that any vote tallies were altered by hacking.

Still, Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein said the internet "allows foreign adversaries to attack Americans in new and unexpected ways.

Free and fair elections are hard-fought and contentious and there will always be adversaries who work to exacerbate domestic differences and try to confuse, divide and conquer

us." Before Friday, 20 people and three companies had been charged in the Mueller investigation. The 20 are four former Trump campaign and White House aides, three of whom have pleaded guilty to different crimes and agreed to cooperate, and 13 Russians accused of participating in a hidden but powerful social media campaign to sway U.S. public opinion in the 2016 election.

If the involvement of the GRU officers in the hacking effort is proved, it would shatter the Kremlin denials of the Russian state's involvement in the U.S. elections.

The GRU, which answers to the Russian Staff, is part of the state machine and its involvement would indicate that the orders to interfere in the U.S. election came from the very top.

Streaming rules as Netflix snaps HBO streak

LOS ANGELES — When Netflix snapped HBO's 17-year streak as Emmy nominations leader, more than bragging rights switched hands. It represented the breathtaking change in how audiences get and watch TV and the threat to traditional TV networks from streaming services.

Especially one like Netflix, whose multibillion-dollar investment in programming allowed it to rocket Thursday to 112 nominations just five years after launching its first original series, "House of Cards." That's double the total of nods it earned in 2016 and just ahead of HBO's 108 nods (down two from 2017).

Another streamed series, Hulu's "The Handmaid's Tale," earned 20 nominations and a chance to defend its title as best drama series at the 70th Primetime Emmy ceremony airing Sept. 17 on NBC.

HBO still boasts the year's most-nominated series, "Game of Thrones" (22 nods) and "Westworld" (20), while Netflix fielded "The Crown" (13 nods) and "Stranger Things" (12).

"The more distribution platforms, the more content's getting created, the more people are going to be working. ... It's good news for us in the industry," said Maury McIntyre, TV academy president. It's also good news for viewers, he said, who will "always be able to find something they're going to like."

"It all about niche broadcasting now. You can make a show and find an audience. It may not be a core audience, but it can be a hard-core audience," he said.

Ted Sarandos, Netflix's chief content officer, saluted "our creative partners on their unprecedented success today" in a statement noting that the nominations were gained across a wide variety of categories, including scripted, documentary and

comedy specials.

Netflix's deep-pockets approach has lured a number of TV's biggest creative stars, including Shonda Rhimes and Ryan Murphy, away from traditional outlets.

Broadcast networks are taking the hardest blow, with their ratings as well as awards diminishing as viewers search out the more distinctive — and edgy — programming on unregulated cable and streaming outlets. Police procedurals and the current network rage for sitcom revivals certainly failed to impress Emmy voters.

The short-lived revival of "Roseanne," canceled because of star Roseanne Barr's racist tweet, drew only one major nomination, a supporting actress nod for Laurie Metcalf. Another revival, "Will & Grace," got Emmy love for nominees Megan Mullally and Molly Shannon but the main stars and series itself

were snubbed.

In the drama and comedies series categories, NBC drama "This Is Us" and ABC sitcom "black-ish" are the sole network contenders. NBC topped the broadcast tally with 78 nominations, fueled by 21 bids for "Saturday Night Live," still on a satiric tear against the Trump administration.

Donald Glover's "Atlanta" was the top comedy series nominee with 16 bids, poised to take advantage of the absence this time around of three-time winner "Veep." "Atlanta" will face newcomers including "The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel," "GLOW" and "Barry." Others in the category include "black-ish," "Silicon Valley," "Curb Your Enthusiasm" and "Unbreakable Kimmy Schmidt."

The newbie comedies aced out long-time Emmy favorite "Modern Family," a five-time winner and perennial nominee since it

debuted in 2009 on ABC.

"Killing Eve" star Sandra Oh made as the first actress of Asian descent to be nominated for lead acting honors in a drama series. Oh had earned five supporting bids for "Grey's Anatomy."

"I feel tremendous gratitude and joy with this nomination" and am "thrilled" for the show's cast and crew, Oh said in a statement. She added a postscript: "I think my mother at this moment may actually be satisfied."

The TV industry has made recent strides toward inclusion, with Glover and Sterling K. Brown of "This Is Us" winning top acting awards last year and both nominated again. Only one nominations category is all-white, and in three categories minority actors account for more than half the nominees.

Among the notable first-time nominees: Issa Rae for "Insecure," Darren Criss, Ricky Martin and Penelope

Cruz for "The Assassination of Gianni Versace: American Crime Story," Tiffany Haddish for "Saturday Night Live," Letitia Wright for "Black Museum (Black Mirror)" and John Legend for "Jesus Christ Superstar Live in Concert."

If Legend wins, he'll join the rarified club of "EGOT" performers who've won an Emmy, Grammy, Oscar and Tony.

HBO's fantasy dragons-and-swords saga is a two-time best drama winner that sat out the last year's awards because of its production schedule. Although it's up for top series honors, it drew only three supporting actor bids for cast members Lena Headey, Nikolaj Coster-Waldau and Peter Dinklage.

"The Handmaid's Tale," the dystopian sci-fi series based on Margaret Atwood's novel, drew 20 bids, including one for last year's best actress winner, Elisabeth Moss, and supporting bids for Alexis Bledel, Ann

Dowd, Yvonne Strahovski and Joseph Fiennes.

Other drama series contenders are "Westworld" and "The Americans," nominated for its final season and with nods for stars Keri Russell and Matthew Rhys.

Competing with Moss, Oh and Russell for lead drama actress are Claire Foy for "The Crown," Tatiana Maslany of "Orphan Black" and Evan Rachel Wood of "Westworld."

Rhys and Brown will be up against Brown's castmate Milo Ventimiglia, along with Jason Bateman for "Ozark" and Ed Harris and Jeffrey Wright for "Westworld." Brown is also nominated for comedy series guest actor for "Brooklyn Nine-Nine."

Glover and Anderson's competitors for best comedy series actor are Ted Danson for "The Good Place," Larry David for "Curb Your Enthusiasm," William H. Macy for "Shameless" and Bill Hader for "Barry."

'The Rock' joining group that champions rights for disabled

BOSTON — Dwayne Johnson plays an amputee in his latest movie. Now he's jumping in to help people with disabilities in real life.

Johnson, who plays a former FBI agent with a prosthetic leg in the new action thriller "Skyscraper," said Thursday he's joining the Boston-based Ruderman Family Foundation, a leading voice in calling for more inclusion and opportunities for the disabled.

The actor nicknamed "The Rock" released a short video calling for more inclusion and opportunities for people with disabilities in the entertainment industry. Johnson said Hollywood has excluded characters and actors with disabilities for too long.

"Our industry has a responsibility to tell inclusive stories, and I hope my character in 'Skyscraper' is an example of that commitment," Johnson said. "I certainly encourage the entire (entertainment) industry to take steps forward to audition and cast actors with disabilities to play characters with and without disabilities. Disability is an essential piece



of diversity, and our characters and actors should definitely 100 percent reflect this."

Earlier this week, Johnson told The Associated Press he hopes "Skyscraper" will honor the amputee community.

In the film, Johnson plays Will Sawyer, the security consultant of a Hong Kong skyscraper, who must save his family and the city from harm when it becomes engulfed in flames from an inferno he's framed for having started.

"I was honored to play an amputee, and to make sure that I did right by them," Johnson said.

Foundation president Jay Ruderman said Johnson's influence in the

entertainment world will help bring about positive change inside and outside Hollywood.

"People with disabilities are 20 percent of the world's population, and their representation in popular entertainment will help reduce the stigma they face in society," he said.

Comcast, Fox both raise bids as they reach for Sky

LONDON — The battle for European pay-TV service Sky escalated Wednesday as U.S. rivals Comcast and 21st Century Fox took turns upping the ante in their quest to expand their media empires.

The stakes now stand at 34 billion — the value of Comcast's latest offer. That bid came after Fox raised its bid to \$32.5 billion earlier in the day.

Comcast's new bid translates to 14.75 pounds per share, or 18 percent more than its original offer. Fox is dangling 14 pounds per share for the 61 percent of Sky that it doesn't already own, more than 30 percent above its first bid in December 2016.

The duel for Sky is unfolding as Fox itself is the object of a takeover battle between Comcast and Disney. Disney said in June it is offering more than \$71 billion for Fox's entertainment businesses in a counterbid to Comcast's nearly \$66 billion offer.

Sky operates in Austria, Germany, Ireland and Italy as well as the U.K. It has

22.5 million customers, attracted by offerings such as English Premier League soccer and "Game of Thrones."

Fox, which is run by media mogul Rupert Murdoch, still faces significant regulatory battles in Britain. The challenges include the culture secretary's assertion that Fox would have to sell Sky News to win government approval because of concerns about media plurality.

Fox's bid for Sky is the most recent episode in Murdoch's long-running effort to take full control of the company.

His last bid foundered amid a 2011 phone-hacking scandal, in which journalists working for Murdoch newspapers were accused of gaining illegal access to the voicemail messages of crime victims, celebrities and members of the royal family. News Corp., which is controlled by the Murdochs, withdrew its bid for Sky soon after.

Both Comcast and Fox want Sky in order to amass more programming as they compete for viewers with both traditional TV networks and technology companies such as Netflix and Amazon.



LATE-LIFE ISSUES DETECTED?

High blood pressure may harm the brains of older people, study says

Decades ago, hundreds of nuns and priests made an extraordinary decision: They agreed to donate their brains upon death to science, hoping to help solve mysteries about Alzheimer's and other diseases. Now, a study that used their gifts is giving some clues. It reveals that high blood pressure late in life might harm the brain.

Autopsies on nearly 1,300 older people, including about 640 clergy members, found more signs of damage and one of the hallmarks of Alzheimer's disease in the brains of those with higher blood pressure than among those with pressure closer to normal, researchers reported Wednesday.

The study does not prove cause and effect, and it does not yet provide a comparison of rates of dementia or its most common form, Alzheimer's — those results will take longer to parse. But it challenges a theory that high pressure is not as harmful in old age as it is when

people are younger. "We can't be alarmist. This is preliminary data" that needs to be validated by others, said the study leader, Dr. Zoe Arvanitakis of Rush University Medical Center in Chicago. "It's far too soon to make recommendations about blood pressure in older people based on this study."

The research began in 1994 and combined people from three studies of aging who agreed to donate their brains for autopsy upon

their death, including the Religious Orders Study of Catholic clergy throughout the United States. All were over 65 and without known dementia at the start and were followed until they died — at an average age of 89 and after an average of eight years in the study.

Two-thirds had high blood pressure, defined as a top reading of 140 or more when the study began (it's now 130 under new guidelines adopted last fall.) Their pressures

were measured once a year during the study — a strength of this work over some previous research that just relied on people to say whether they had high pressure or not.

After each participant died, researchers examined their brains for areas of dead tissue caused by lack of blood supply. These blighted areas can be tiny and cause no symptoms, so they're sometimes called evidence of "silent strokes."

About half of the study participants had one or more of these, and the risk was greater for those with higher blood pressure. For example, people with an average top reading of 147 had a 46 percent greater risk of having one or more of the bad spots than those with an average top reading of 134. People with higher bottom blood pressure readings also had a greater risk for this problem.

Researchers also found a

link between higher pressure and one of the signs of Alzheimer's — tangles of a protein called tau — but not another Alzheimer's hallmark, amyloid plaques. This needs further research to understand the implications, Arvanitakis said.

"It's a pretty strong study," said James Hendrix, director of global science initiatives at the Alzheimer's Association. "Autopsy data is really powerful" and has been the gold standard for diagnosing Alzheimer's for many years, he said.

With Alzheimer's, changes in the brain occur a decade or more before symptoms do, so high blood pressure may have been doing damage well before the age when these people enrolled in the study, he said.

How might high pressure do harm?

"Lower blood pressure reduces the risk of those blood vessel blockages" that can cause a silent stroke, said another independent expert, the Mayo Clinic's Dr. David Knopman. The work shows that "treating blood pressure throughout the lifespan is important."

Knopman is a spokesman for the American Academy of Neurology, whose journal, *Neurology*, published the study. Federal grants paid for the work.

Maryland governor signs federal all-payer health contract

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Maryland Gov. Larry Hogan signed a contract with the federal government on Monday to enact the state's unique all-payer health care model, which he said will create incentives to improve care while saving money.

Hogan signed the five-year contract along with the administrator of the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, Seema Verma.

"The Maryland Model provides incentives across the health system to provide greater coordinated care, expanded patient-care delivery and collaboration of chronic-disease management ... all while improving the quality of care at lower cost to the consumer," Hogan said.

He said the model emphasizes the quality of care over the quantity of care.

The Hogan administration said the new contract is expected to provide an

additional \$300 million in savings a year by 2023, totaling \$1 billion in savings over five years.

Maryland is the only state that can set its own rates for hospital services, and all payers must charge the same rate for services at a given hospital. The policy has been in place since the 1970s, though Maryland modernized its one-of-a-kind Medicare waiver about four years ago to move away from reimbursing hospitals on a fee-for-service basis to a fixed budget.

Because that change focused on hospitals only, the federal government required the state to develop a new model that would provide comprehensive coordination across the entire health care system.

Under the agreement, Maryland will be relieved of federal restrictions and red tape that the other 49 states face in the Medicare program. However, the state will have to meet benchmarks of improving access

to health care while improving quality and reducing costs.

Verma said the model is the first involving the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services that holds the state "fully at risk for total Medicare costs for all residents."

"The state and CMS have agreed on the goals, and now our job is to get out of the way and give the state the maximum flexibility to achieve success."

"The incentives are going to be aligned so that it's right place, right time, right purpose, right price, instead of, 'Come back and see me in two weeks, and we'll run the same set of tests on you,'" Neall said.

FDA to more aggressively tackle disruptive drug shortages

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration said Thursday it wants to more aggressively fight medication shortages that have led to rationing of some drugs and disrupted patient care.

The agency announced plans for a task force to find ways to improve the supply of crucial drugs. It's a new approach for the drug regulator, which has very little control over drugmakers' operations. It generally can't act until drugmakers tell the agency that shortages are imminent or that it will stop making a drug.

FDA Commissioner Dr. Scott Gottlieb said the agency will ask Congress for the authority to allow it to intervene. He said he has a clear idea of changes needed in the FDA's powers, regulations and drug reimbursement policies.

"I feel we have a mandate to do this," Gottlieb told The Associated Press, citing a recent letter from about 200 members of Congress urging changes and offering support.

Most shortages involve low-profit generic pills and injections that are hospital workhorses, including injected painkillers, old cancer drugs and saline solution needed to give IV medicines. Many are made by only a few companies, so when production problems occur, the few other drugmakers can't cover the shortfall. Last year, hurricanes knocked many drug factories in Puerto Rico and southern states out of commission for long stretches.

While the number of drugs in shortage

is down from the peak several years ago, many shortages are lasting much longer, sometimes well over a year.

Currently, FDA inspectors can work with a manufacturer to quickly resolve quality problems that have shut down production. The agency also works to find alternate suppliers and expedite approval for them to sell that medicine.

A hearing is planned for the fall to get input from patients, manufacturers and others.

A key issue, he said, is that generic drugmakers increasingly are squeezed by middlemen — hospital group purchasing organizations and prescription benefit managers — paying them at rates barely above their production costs or even less. He said finding ways for the Veterans Administration, Medicare and Medicaid to pay a bit more for the most crucial medicines could nudge private insurers to do the same.

Drug manufacturing expert Girish Malhotra, president of the consulting firm EPCOT International in Pepper Pike, Ohio, called the FDA's plan a positive change but said he's not sure it will solve the problems. He said the agency doesn't have the expert staff needed for one aspect of the plan, supporting new technologies that can improve manufacturing.

Malhotra also suggested that FDA publicize anticipated shortages, to encourage foreign companies to jump on opportunities to sell those drugs in the U.S.

"How quickly will patients see results? That's anybody's guess," he said.

Crime Briefs

No new sentence for man who killed when he was 16

TALLAHASSEE — A Florida prisoner serving a life sentence for a 1991 murder committed when he was 16 won't get a new sentencing hearing despite recent state and U.S. Supreme Court rulings that ban life sentences for juveniles.

The Florida Supreme Court ruled Thursday that Budry Michel's life sentence was constitutional because it included a possibility of parole after 25 years, so it doesn't necessarily mean Michel will spend life in prison.

Michel was 22 when he was sentenced in 1996 for the Broward County murder, meaning he would be eligible for parole when he's 47. The court said that was well within his expected lifetime.

Man gets life for shooting ex's new boyfriend

NAPLES — A Florida man has been sentenced to life in prison for kidnapping and shooting his ex-girlfriend's new boyfriend.

The Naples Daily News reports that 22-year-old Keyion Linton was sentenced earlier this week. He was convicted last month of kidnapping and aggravated battery with a firearm.

Authorities say Linton lured the then-17-year-old victim out of his Golden Gate home in July 2016, claiming he wanted to resolve their differences regarding the girlfriend.

Linton pulled a gun on the teen and forced him to walk to a nearby pharmacy. They were picked up and driven to a park, where Linton shot the teen twice. Linton and another man then drove the teen to the hospital, where he eventually recovered after spending two weeks in the intensive care unit.

Deputies fatally shoot man who pointed gun at them

TAMPA — Authorities say Florida sheriff's deputies fatally shot a 60-year-old man who showed up at his estranged wife's home and would not leave.

Hillsborough County Sheriff's spokesman Danny Alvarez said it happened early Friday in Riverview, where deputies say the man refused to respond to their commands and raised a firearm at them.

Alvarez said the deputies then fired multiple shots in fear for their lives, and the man died at the scene.

Alvarez said the dead man's record included arrests for robbery and white-collar crimes in Texas and trespassing in Florida. Authorities were working to notify his relatives before releasing his identity.

Police: Bystander killed by gunfighter who is then shot dead

LAKE MARY — Sheriff's deputies say a bystander was struck in the eye and killed when two other men traded gunfire across a parking lot.

Also killed was the man whose bullet killed Daniel Strada while he stood outside a restaurant after watching a World Cup game.

Prosecutors say Victor Emanuel Brown didn't have a concealed-carry license and would have been charged with killing Strada had he survived.

Seminole County Sheriff's investigators say Brown and Jorge Vega-Rosado were fighting Sunday in Lake Mary. They say Brown fired and missed his target, striking Strada in the eye. Vega-Rosado then fired several shots, killing Brown. They say he won't be charged because he fired in self-defense.

Lawsuit: party hindered security in airport shooting

FORT LAUDERDALE — A new lawsuit claims a detective's retirement party got in the way of security before a 2017 shooting that killed six people at a Florida airport.

The lawsuit was filed Thursday on behalf of Ann Andres of Virginia Beach, Virginia. Her husband Terry Andres was shot at Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport. The lawsuit claims Broward Sheriff's Office deputies who should have been on duty at an airport baggage claim area were instead at the party eating cake.

Twenty-eight-year-old Esteban Santiago of Anchorage, Alaska, pleaded guilty in May to federal charges in the shooting and faces life in prison at his sentencing next month.

Pastor accused of taking pic up parishioner's dress

DELTONA — A pastor in Florida is under arrest and out of a job after allegedly recording images under the dress of a parishioner as she bent over to put her child in a car seat.

Thirty-one-year-old Brian "Rick" Kenyon Jr., formerly with the Florida Church of Christ, was arrested Thursday on a charge of video voyeurism.

Volusia County Sheriff's spokesman Andrew Gant tells The Daytona Beach News-Journal that the 41-year-old woman reported the incident on April 24, telling investigators it happened two weeks earlier when she attended a service at the Church of Christ of Deltona.

An arrest report says that she felt skin against her leg and turned to see Kenyon holding his cellphone.

MHS track coach accused of sexual battery on student

A track coach at Mariana High School has been charged with sexual battery of a student while in familial and/or custodial authority, according to a news release from the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

Officials with that agency allege that Te'Quayis LaVonte Brigham, 23, was sexually involved with a 16-year-old student. The release states:

"On July 10, 2018, the Jackson County Sheriff's Office received information that 23-year-old Te'Quayis LaVonte Brigham, the track coach at Marianna High School, was sexually involved with a 16 year old student.

"During the course of the investigation it was revealed that Brigh-

ham and the student had multiple sexual interactions which may have taken place on the school grounds. At least one of the sexual interactions took place while Brigham and his team were at a track meet in Jacksonville, Florida. Investigators are also looking into Brigham's and the student's cell phones to acquire if any images/photos or videos were exchanged between them.

"Investigators learned that Brigham had a 'secret' relationship with the student that took place over the course of approximately four months. On July 10, Brigham was brought in for questioning and acknowledged his involvement with the student, however he de-

nied that he had a 'secret' relationship with the student.

"As investigators were interviewing Brigham, the Department of Children and Families received a second report in which it was reported that a second student may have also been sexually abused by Brigham. Brigham was questioned about the second victim's allegations in which Brigham denied the allegations.

"Based upon the facts provided during the investigation Te'Quayis Lavonte Brigham was taken into custody without incident and taken the Jackson County Correctional Facility to await first appearance. Due to the incidents occurring while Brigham was acting in familial and/or custodial authority he is being charged with Sexual battery, F.S. 794.011 (8)."

Florida gun, mental laws couldn't have stopped school massacre

SUNRISE — Florida's gun and mental health laws likely could not have prevented school shooting suspect Nikolas Cruz from buying the semi-automatic rifle authorities say he used to kill 17 people — even if the laws had applied to him, the state commission investigating the shooting learned Thursday.

Robin Sparkman, chief of the state's Firearm Eligibility Bureau, told the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission that even if Cruz had been subjected to an involuntary, three-day mental health evaluation under a state law called the Baker Act, he still could have bought the AR-15 allegedly used in the Feb. 14 massacre.

The only way the 19-year-old Cruz would have been ineligible to buy a gun was if he had been declared mentally ill by a judge or convicted of a felony. Cruz was never committed under the Baker Act, convicted of a crime or judged to be mentally ill.

"So many people think the Baker Act is a magic wand — that the Baker Act cures and fixes all. The Baker Act doesn't," said Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri, the commission's chairman. "The Baker Act is a temporary custody status for assessment. Rarely does the Baker Act result in any treatment. People think that if Cruz had been Baker Acted that this wouldn't have happened. That is flat-out erroneous."

Under the Baker Act, Florida can involuntarily commit a person for a mental health evaluation for up to 72 hours — about 192,000 such commitments were made last year, about one for every 100 Florida residents.

It can be implemented if a police officer, judge, doctor or mental health official believes the person is mentally ill and is a near-term danger to themselves or others. Many are released within hours and anyone detained under the act must be released within three days unless they volunteer for treatment or a judge agrees the person needs to be committed. Less than 1 percent are transferred to long-term commitment.

Circuit Judge Steve Leifman, who helped create a mental health program in Miami-Dade County, told the commission that's because the state is "cheap," not because a higher percentage shouldn't be hospitalized.

Being evaluated under the Baker Act or volunteering for commitment does not make a person ineligible to buy or own a gun. School and law enforcement officials considered detaining Cruz under the Baker Act in 2016, but did not.

School and government records obtained by The Associated Press and other news media shortly after the shooting show Cruz was diagnosed as developmentally delayed at age 3 and had disciplinary issues dating to middle school. In February 2014, while in eighth grade, Cruz was transferred to a school for children with emotional and behavioral issues. He stayed until 10th grade, when he was transferred to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High. He also received mental health counseling for years, but refused treatment after he turned 18.

About a year before the attack, Cruz was kicked out of the school after he harassed other students, had outbursts, fought and had numerous other issues. His mother called deputies about 20 times, in-

cluding accusations of battery on her, but he was never arrested.

Cruz's brother says he pointed a rifle at him and their mother, but they never called police for that. Their mother died in November of pneumonia. Their father died when they were young.

Gualtieri said after Cruz turned 18 in September 2016, he needed a state identification card to buy a gun. His mother, Lynda Cruz, helped him obtain the ID, even though counselors told her he should not be allowed to own a gun, Gualtieri said. He purchased the AR-15 in February 2017.

Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd, a commission member, said Florida law enforcement, educators and other officials get frustrated because people repeatedly get placed into the mental health system, but never get the treatment they need and eventually commit a crime.

Three weeks after the massacre, Florida changed its gun laws, implementing a system under which police departments and sheriff's offices can petition a judge to block a person with suspected mental illnesses from owning weapons for up to a year and then apply for extensions. It also increased the age limit for buying rifles and shotguns from 18 to 21 under most circumstances.

Best Management Practices program for agriculture.

Those BMPs provide guidelines which, in part, help farmers conserve water and reduce their impact on Jackson Blue further by reducing the amount of fertilizer they apply to their lands. Growers can get help in the cost of implementing those strategies, like the purchase of new-generation systems that help them pinpoint applications of water and fertilizer. The BMPs also encourage farmers to add a rotation of grass to their growing schedules.

Putting in a year of grass between crop years—for instance, peanuts, then grass, then cotton—is beneficial in a couple of ways. Grass and the roots it puts down helps soil retain more moisture. And giving the land a rest from the substances

that go into crop management also allows the soil to recuperate and rebuilt its natural health. That leaves the land in better condition for the ensuing crop year, so that it might not require as much irrigation or fertilizer.

And having less irrigation helps the District meet one of its major goals—water conservation. Having

less fertilizer applied to the lands helps meet another major goal that the agency shares with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection—protection of Jackson Blue and all the springs of the system. They all receive water from the basin lands via stormwater runoff; as rain comes down, it mingles with what's on

the ground and washes into the bodies of water and the underlying Floridan aquifer that give rise to the springs.

District representative John Alter and others on the board say Bishop has fully and enthusiastically embraced the cost-sharing opportunities that are available to those willing to change their way of doing things in order to take advantage of them.

Bishop says he has had a long-time interest in emerging technology and for that reason it is in his nature to try something new if it makes sense. He said he's always seen the BMP program as a common-sense approach to the goal of better resource management.

He had to put skin in the game to get the financial assist offered in the program—he had to pay 25 percent of the cost in putting those new irrigation systems in, for example—but the 75 percent offered by the state

for that and other improvements, he said, made it easier to take that plunge. He hopes to, in a few years, see his investment returned many times over in cost savings for irrigation, fertilizer and other amendments. And at the end of the day, he's the proud new owner of the some technologically advanced equipment that he couldn't have imagined buying on his own with any hope of a foreseeable return.

On Thursday, the District read a resolution into its record regarding Bishop. In it, the agency notes that Bishop and other local growers who have enrolled in the BMP Cost Share program since 2013 have, together, reduced by more than 630,000 pounds the annual amount of nitrogen (mostly from fertilizer) used in the basin, and that they save an estimated 9.1 gallons of water per day in Jackson County compared to the previous total being used on

crops. "Mr. Bishop and Bishop Farms (have) steadfastly supported the District's various agriculture-focused programs and (share) the... passion for being good stewards of the area's natural resources."

Bishop was joined at the meeting by his daughter, Caroline. She grew up in Marianna and watched as her father's farm operation grew from its first modest 17-acre rented-lands operation in 1992, to the 5,500 acres it now encompasses in Jackson and Calhoun counties. Her dad owns about 1,000 acres of that property now. Although she's studying biology at Chipola College and intends to enter a different field herself—medicine—she says she appreciates her father's work, too, and his commitment to standards that benefit the environment which has helped him put food on the family table all her life.



Auburn, UNC football to meet in 2020

ATLANTA — Auburn and North Carolina football will meet in the 2020 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game in Atlanta.

Isner, Anderson agree: 5th-set tiebreaker needed at Wimbledon

LONDON — John Isner already had won the longest match in Wimbledon — and tennis — history. And now he's lost the second-longest one ever played at the All England Club.

So there's not much better an authority to weigh in on whether it's time for fifth-set tiebreakers at all Grand Slam tournaments. Actually, both Isner and Kevin Anderson, the man who won their Wimbledon semifinal 26-24 in the final set after more than 6 1/2 hours Friday, agree a switch is necessary.

"I'm a proponent of changing that rule, for sure," Isner said. "I think it needs to be done."

The 33-year-old American is best known, of course, for beating Nicolas Mahut 70-68 in the fifth set of an 11-hour, 5-minute match that was contested over three days in Wimbledon's first round in 2010.

This one seems rather tidy by comparison: Anderson won 7-6 (6), 6-7 (5), 6-7 (9), 6-4, 26-24. Still, Is-

ner did jokingly ask chair umpire Marija Cicak at one point during the last set whether they could play a tiebreaker.

That's how the U.S. Open settles things at 6-all in the fifth set of a men's singles match — or at 6-all in the third set for women — and has since 1970.

But the other three Grand Slam tournaments all play on until one player wins by two games.

"It's way beyond a normal tennis match or tactics. I mean, it's just who's going to outlast each other," said Anderson, a 32-year-old from South Africa who is seeking his first major trophy. "It's pretty tough in the format that we have right now, especially at Slams. I mean, it's not easy in that setting at the end."

He and Isner suggested one possible compromise: a tiebreaker at 12-all.

"A sensible option," Isner called it.

Anderson noted that some members of the Centre Court crowd were ready for his match to end, so that the day's second semifinal, between

Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic, could begin.

One spectator called out, "Come on, guys! We want to see Rafa!"

"If you ask most of them, I'm sure they would have preferred to see a fifth-set tiebreaker, too. They've paid to see two matches, and they came pretty close to only seeing one match," Anderson said. "I don't see the other opposing view of not incorporating a fifth-set tiebreaker at all the Slams."

Now he's going to have to use Saturday to try to rest and recover so he can give it his best shot in Sunday's final.

Isner had nothing left to give after his 70-68 record-setter eight years ago, and lost his next match.

Of course, Isner would love to have to deal with such problems now.

He also would love it if this were never again an issue.

"I think it's long overdue," Isner said. "I mean, I'm a big part of that, a big part of this discussion, of course."

Mbappe, France to face Modric, Croatia for World Cup title

MOSCOW — Kylian Mbappe has electrified the World Cup with his speed and youthful exuberance. Luka Modric has coolly controlled matches in Russia with his graceful play in the middle.

Whether France wins its second title in 20 years or Croatia raises the trophy for the first time Sunday at the Luzhniki Stadium in front of Russian President Vladimir Putin and nearly a billion television viewers could turn on the play of the two stars.

The 19-year-old Mbappe has been the biggest sensation at the tournament in Russia, scoring three goals — in-

cluding two against Argentina in the round of 16 — and creating havoc for opposing defenses with his pace and his agility.

"It's going to be the biggest match of my life, for sure," the Paris Saint-Germain forward said Friday.

Although Mbappe has impressed for France at the month-long tournament, Modric has been the rock and the spark for Croatia. When the Real Madrid midfielder has the ball at feet, good things seem to happen for Croatia.

"Even when you think they're going to lose, or going to crack, they always have the mentality to come back," Mbappe said of the Croatian team.

"It's a team that plays with a lot of intensity."

France last won the World Cup title in 1998, at home. The French defeated Croatia in the semifinals that year, which until now had been the country's best showing at the tournament.

The heads of state from both countries are expected to sit with Putin. Will Smith is set to headline the closing ceremony.

Croatia, a country of 4.5 million people which gained independence from the former Yugoslavia only 27 years ago, enters the final after playing three straight extra-time matches, including two nerve-racking penalty shootouts.

In all three of those matches, Croatia has had to recover from being a goal down. The players never gave up.

"When you put the sacred Croatia shirt on you become a different person," Croatia midfielder Ivan Rakitic said through a translator. "I'm not trying to say it's a superior feeling that the French have for France, or Russians for Russia."


"The best feeling is to be Croat these days and this is the source of all our strength."

While Croatia had to rally to keep advancing, France won all three of its knockout games in the regulation 90 minutes and trailed for only nine of the 540-plus minutes it has been on the field.

Restrictor plate push takes hit at Daytona

Daytona always tells us something. This time, stock car racing's mecca reminded us that NASCAR was wise to pump the brakes on the move to more restrictor-plate racing.

Last weekend's 400-mile race on the 2.5-mile Daytona International Speedway, NASCAR's annual midsummer party, left a lot of its participants with a massive hang-over.

By the time it was over, 20 of the 40 starting cars were undone, damaged so badly in crashes that they couldn't continue. Nearly all of the remaining cars showed damage as well. Winner Erik Jones' Toyota had a concave right rear fender, which may actually have been an aerodynamic gift.

A NASCAR race car can cost \$150,000 or more. The repairs necessitated by Saturday's race, which will range from cosmetic bodywork for some teams to start-from-scratch replacement for others, probably will cost a few million dollars in sum.

This is not a time when extra millions are easy to come by in the racing business.

Teams are stretched thin and working hard to find and keep sponsors — the financial lifeblood of racing's business model.

Need we any more telling example than seven-time champion Jimmie Johnson? We learned in March that Johnson will lose his backer of 18 seasons, Lowe's. Here we are in mid-July, and even though Johnson assured

us in May that there is a "long list of hopefuls" interested in slapping their brand on his fenders next year, we're still waiting for the announcement.

So that's the bottom-line backdrop to a race Saturday that had crash after multicar crash. One of those wrecks involved 22 cars.

That's the kind of thing that happens at the fastest tracks, where NASCAR bolts restrictor plates — which inhibit air intake and slow the cars — onto the engines of the racers.

It's a thrilling spectacle to watch, but the result is outbursts of chaos. Even the slightest aggressive move and resulting bump can trigger another crash.

And aggressive moves are a given, especially for the usual midpack runners like Ricky Stenhouse, who was involved in — many would say caused — the contact that triggered two big crashes.

Stenhouse has won only twice in his 108 NASCAR Cup Series starts, both times at restrictor-plate tracks where the draft gives him a chance to mix it up with the elite teams.

For Stenhouse and for many drivers, a win at one of the three regular-season restrictor-plate races (Daytona was the last of the three) is the best shot, maybe the only shot,

at the playoffs.

Which brings us back to the call for restrictor plates at more tracks.

When NASCAR experimented with the plate for its All-Star Race in May at the 1.5-mile Charlotte Motor Speedway, the result was race more competitive than most on such tracks.

Some fans and commentators called for plates at all 11 races on the circuit's eight 1.5-mile tracks — without delay. No, NASCAR said, not this year, not without further research and testing.

And Daytona's Saturday-night crash extravaganza demonstrated why NASCAR's prudence is well-advised.

The teams' willingness to compete seriously in restrictor-plate races has to have a limit. In the three such races so far this season, 14 cars crashed out of February's Daytona 500, 11 at the spring race at the 2.6-mile Talladega Superspeedway — and now 20 at Daytona's second event.

At this season's other 15 events to date, what's the average number of cars unable to finish because of a crash? Try 2.4.

NASCAR already has trouble filling its 40-car starting grid. More often than not there's an unfilled spot or two at the back.

The teams can't afford to reduce more race cars to junk race after race. The series owes it to the teams to make sure that doesn't happen.

NASCAR made the right call to black flag Haley's wrong turn

NASCAR made the correct call to strip Justin Haley of his victory in the Xfinity Series race at Daytona.

No doubt Haley's move was stunning, and he nearly out-wheeled veterans Kyle Larson and Elliott Sadler in the final moments for his first series win. But the rule — as much as I hate it — has been repeated ad nauseam: If your name isn't Jeff Gordon, Dale Earnhardt Jr.

Haley had plenty of room to make the pass without dropping under both lines, which makes the black flag all the more disappointing but necessary. However, I'm looking forward to how he'll respond when he's in the same situation next time.

Impending doom: Multiple threats plague season 2 of 'Salvation'

Science fiction is increasingly becoming science fact. The dreams of golden era writers and directors, while perhaps a bit exaggerated, are more prevalent now than ever before. Space exploration is advancing, with multiple groups and organizations vowing to establish a new home on Mars. This might explain why so many of us are captivated

by intergalactic what-ifs, and why many summer TV viewers are tuning in to the sci-fi drama "Salvation," now in its second season, with a new episode airing Monday, July 16, on CBS.

"Salvation" takes place in present-day America, using modern technology and a dash of fictional liberty to set the stage. Liam Cole (Charlie Row, "Red Band Society") is a highly intellectual MIT graduate student whose research has been devoted to mapping the unknown

parts of space. What Liam didn't anticipate, however, was that his program would uncover a serious, impending threat to the entire planet: an asteroid set to collide with Earth in 186 days. Anxious to get the data to the government, Liam reaches out to his professor, but after the professor goes missing, he turns to his one other option: scientific genius Darius Tanz (Santiago Cabrera, "Big Little Lies"), a recent speaker at MIT who's still — thankfully — in town.

Armed with this new, time-sensitive information, Darius and Liam head to the Pentagon and deliver the news to the Department of Defense's deputy secretary, Harris Edwards (Ian Anthony Dale, "Hawaii Five-0"). Harris and DOD public affairs press secretary Grace Barrows (Jennifer Finnigan, "Tyrant") have no choice but to let these two skilled scientists into a covert operation called Sampson, revealing that the government was already well aware of the threat but had chosen to keep it hidden in order to prevent mass pandemonium.

The thrilling conclusion of season 1 saw the president reinstated, TESS's source code given up to RE/SYST and the group divided, awaiting the impending likely demise of the East Coast. Harris and Grace, along with the rest of the selected crew, are all stowed away within a hangar, ready to board the Ark if necessary, while Darius and Liam work from a secure location to try to determine another way to prevent Earth's destruction.

With the second season now underway, it's clear to see that the danger is compounding. RE/SYST is threatening nuclear action, the asteroid's imminent collision continues to present a dire outlook for humanity, and neither situation can be resolved without global co-operation. Meanwhile, Harris and Grace are struggling to quell potential chaos within the hangar as the newly informed citizens learn to accept their fate.

In a recent interview with KCAL9 CBS Los Angeles, Finnigan touched on the growing tension of a disaster-bent narrative. The actress notes that, while "the show is mostly about this impending asteroid — the sort of scaring, impending doom of that," people are "still living [their lives]," as the truth makes it difficult for people to accept, which leads them to set out a course of action that reveals what's truly important to them. Now that "the public knows" and "the secret is out... people go bananas." An event such as this will no doubt "bring out the best" or to

"bring out the worst [in us]," but ultimately, Finnigan believes that the most realistic depiction — something that the series strives to exhibit — is where the best and worst in us collide.

A large part of the show's success is thanks to the popular disaster genre. Most prominent in film, the genre was born in 1901 with a silent film called "Fire," though "Salvation" is likely drawing more so from the golden era of disaster cinema, circa the 1970s. Films such as "Airport" (1970), "Earthquake" (1974) and "Meteor" (1979) gave audiences a thirst for the point at which science fiction and dramatic thrillers meet. In the late 1990s, a new wave of disaster films arrived that, like "Salvation," saw our biggest threat coming from the stars. "Independence Day" (1996), "Deep Impact" (1998) and "Armageddon" (1998) are just three of the space-based dramatic thrillers that signified this once niche subcategory of the genre growing increasingly prominent.

Not constricted by the two-to-three-hour runtime of its big-

screen forerunners, "Salvation" provides deeper insight into the human reactions and cost of catastrophic events, rather than placing emphasis on fantastic explosions, tidal waves and meteor collisions. Despite the immensity of the threat, audiences find themselves more compelled by the characters' narratives than a desire to witness destruction, which is a refreshing take on a genre increasingly oversaturated with CGI and mass destruction.

As season 2 of "Salvation" progresses, the price of loyalty will increase in value. As the asteroid continues its journey toward Earth, Harris, Grace, Liam and Darius will do all they can to try and maintain a sense of calm while uncovering a means by which disaster might ultimately be prevented. If all else fails, there is, of course, the Ark, but that will mean bidding a tearful adieu to two beloved characters. Not content to enjoy just one, he first tries the original with chocolate and rainbow sprinkles, and follows it up by coming up with his own specialty flavor of the frozen fruit treat.

Through all six episodes, Lomac not only hits coastal destinations in the west and the east, but also the north and south. The shores of Lake Michigan and the Gulf Coast have beaches that are just as spectacular as those in New England or the Carolinas, and the foods served there are just as delightful to boot.







hollywood **Q&A**

Q: I'm a great fan of "If Loving You Is Wrong." Can you please tell me when it will be returning this year? I can't wait to see it.

A: I'm afraid I can't — OWN is taking its time dishing out renewals for its shows. I can, however, double-speculate.

First I have to speculate about whether it will be renewed for another round, which seems fairly likely at this point. OWN (otherwise known as the Oprah Winfrey Network) clearly enjoys being in the Tyler Perry business: "If Loving You Is Wrong" is one of the multiple hit shows and films that have come out of writer/director/producer/actor Perry's brain in recent years.

Though "If Loving You Is Wrong" took a bit of a dip in the ratings this season — it shed about 300,000 viewers over the course of season 3, and season 3 was already drawing fewer than season 2 — its numbers are still strong for a cable show. Indeed, the only OWN show that's doing better is "The Haves and the Have Nots," which also happens to be a Tyler Perry show.

In other encouraging news, none of the stars have suddenly fled to other shows since the third season ended in March. All this makes it fairly likely that the show will be picked up for a fourth season.

As for when, that's an even easier guess: every other season so far has debuted in September, so the next one, if it happens, will likely do the same.

When it will finish, however, is another matter. You may have noticed that OWN is splitting the seasons in half, and the second halves have been a little less dependable in their debut dates.

Q: I hear "Code Black" has been canceled. Please tell me it's not true, or at least tell me that the powers that saw fit to cancel this great show were considerate enough to have given it an ending, and not just leave us hanging.

A: The way you've phrased your question means I can phrase my answer like it's good news: yes, you will get a satisfying ending to your show, which is in fact canceled.

CBS made the decision to cancel "Code Black" in late May, shortly after the show's third season began.

However, much like you, the show's writers met the cancellation with a sort of grim fatalism. Series creator Michael Seitzman said on Twitter that they sensed the end was coming and they acted accordingly.

"We always suspected this would be the last season. We wrote it to end that way."

That is to say, the current season will end in a satisfying, loose ending sort of way.

TVSeriesFinale.com, which makes a business of tracking the fate of TV shows, got pretty cute about its explanation for the cancellation: "The patient eventually succumbed to acute ratings anemia."

That's cute because it was a medical show, and because the show's ratings have been dropping since it started.

By the point at which CBS canceled it, it was averaging about 5.5

million viewers, which was a big drop from the seven million it averaged in its first season. And its numbers in the 18-49 demographic, which are arguably even more important in these decisions, were even worse, dropping about 25 percent from season to season since it began.

Q: Apparently, Betty White was the first woman to win an Emmy for hosting a game show. What game show was it?

A: If it weren't for the groundbreaking nature of Betty White's hosting role, "Just Men" would be completely forgotten today.

But it did, as you say, give her the opportunity to become the first woman to win an Emmy for hosting a game show, and so the short-lived show entered the history books.

By most accounts it didn't deserve to.

It lasted only three months before being canceled in early 1983, and it was pretty poorly reviewed while it was on. The Washington Post was particularly vicious, calling it "the litmus test for people who think the TV show that can make them physically ill hasn't been invented."

Yes, the show deserves some praise for breaking one particular

gender barrier, but it didn't do feminism any other favors.

It was (as you can guess by the title) a battle-of-the-sexes sort of show — two female contestants competed to guess at questions about the lives of a panel of seven male celebrities. (One very dated question, posed to "WKRP in Cincinnati" star Tim Reid: "Tim, is your mother a swinger?")

Indeed, though she went on to win an Emmy for it, the Post argued that White was "terribly demeaned by this role."

Fortunately, she would go on to fill her awards shelf with more statues for other roles, so she clearly deserves her place in the history books.
