# Local candidate debate set for Aug. 12

Public may propose questions in advance

The Jackson County NAACP will host a candidate debate on Sunday, Aug. 12, at 5:30 p.m. in the Jackson County Agriculture Center, located at 3631 U.S. 90,

Marianna. All candidates in the local races have confirmed they will participate.

The contests involved will be Jackson County School Board District 1, and Jackson County Commission Districts 2 and 4.

Candidates in the School Board District 1 race are: Incumbent Terry E. Nichols, Diane Long and Connie Jean

Mitchell, with all active registered voters in Precincts 2, 3A, 12A, 13 and 14 eligible to vote in the non-partisan race.

Candidates in the Jackson County Commission District 2 battle are: Republican incumbent Clint Pate, and Democrats Steve R. Benton and Edward E. Crutchfield. Pate, as the lone Republican candidate, will sit

out the Aug. 28 primary and then in November will face the winner in the Benton-vs.-Crutchfield primary. In the August primary, only registered Democrats in Precincts 4, 6, 12 and 14A may vote in this race. In November, all voters in those precincts can vote to decide the final winner.

# Spotlight shines on donors and dedicated workers

Chipola Habitat for Humanity Director Carmen Smith put the spotlight on two dedicated employees of the organization at Habitat's annual meeting Thursday night.

Russell Husted and Annie Lewis both received five-year service awards that evening. Both work at the Habitat Restore on U.S. Highway 90 in Marianna. And both received recent promotions because of their tireless work through the years. Smith said their position upgrades were well-deserved and hard-won.

When Husted started, he was a driver and receiving specialist, and the face most people saw when the donated items and needed those picked up. His

face wasn't as familiar to customers of the store—that's because he was usually very busy in the back getting merchandise ready for the shelves. With his promotion, he's become the warehouse manager, as well. He's responsible for decision-making now as well as the intense labor he puts into his job.

And for Annie Lewis, the five-year recognition might be somewhat confusing for those who have known Habitat for the last 20 years. She's been a presence with the organization all the way back to 1998, when she received a Habitat home of her own. She was only obligated to put in a certain number of hours in "sweat equity" in addition to the no-interest mortgage she has to pay for the house. She was done with all that by the

Hospital to debate tax debate

The hospital will issue and sell bonds to pay for the expansion. If approved Tuesday, the tax continuation would pay off those bonds over 20 years.

Today in History

Today is Saturday, July 21, the 202nd day of 2018. There are 163 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 21, 1925, the so-called "Monkey Trial" ended in Dayton, Tennessee, with John T. Scopes found guilty of violating state law for teaching Darwin's theory of evolution.

On this date: In 1861, during the Civil War, the first Battle of Bull Run was fought at Manassas, Virginia, resulting in a Confederate victory. In 1930, President Herbert Hoover signed an executive order establishing the Veterans Administration (later the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs).

Thought for Today: "We have too many high-sounding words, and too few actions that correspond with them." — Abigail Adams, American first lady (1744-1818)

In 1944, American forces landed on Guam during World War II, capturing it from the Japanese some three weeks later. The Democratic national convention in Chicago nominated Sen. Harry S. Truman to be vice president. In 1949, the U.S. Senate ratified the North Atlantic Treaty. In 1955, during a summit in Geneva, President Dwight D. Eisenhower presented his "open skies" proposal under which the U.S. and the Soviet Union would trade information on each other's military facilities and allow aerial reconnaissance.

In 1961, Capt. Virgil "Gus" Grissom became the second American to rocket into a sub-orbital pattern around the Earth, flying aboard the Liberty Bell 7. In 1969, Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin blasted off from the moon aboard the ascent stage of the lunar module for docking with the command module.

In 1973, Israeli agents in Lillehammer, Norway, killed Ahmed Bouchikhi, a Moroccan waiter, in a case of mistaken identity, apparently thinking he was an official with Black September, the group that attacked Israel's delegation at the 1972 Munich Olympics and killed 11 athletes. In 1980, draft registration began in the United States for 19- and 20-year-old men. In 1997, the USS Constitution, which defended the U.S. during the War of 1812, set sail under its own power for first time in 116 years.

# Heat waves, dust storms and summer of '34

In the summer of 1934, the entire country was sweltering with record heat and suffering on multiple weather fronts. Three years of dust storms had culminated on an April Sunday when the country was hit by the worst dust storm in history. Dust bowl conditions prevailed from Minnesota to Texas, and food production declined significantly.

That summer saw 29 consecutive days with temperatures hovering in triple digits. By year's end, 75 percent of the country was suffering from drought conditions. In north Texas, the cicadas were too thirsty to chirp.

Americans were dying from both heat and hunger. In an attempt to bring relief to working class farmers, Congress passed the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act, which raised taxes on 900 imports. But the import tariffs caused an international trade war and the global economy hit a wall. The Great Depression then picked up speed and spread beyond our borders.

What many may not remember is

that before Smoot-Hawley, there was a tentative economic recovery afoot and unemployment numbers had temporarily leveled. The Tariff Act helped negate the fledgling recovery and thrust the U.S. and the world further into depression.

Tariff costs are almost always passed on to consumers. Makers of cars, appliances, and other products, when hit with tariffs, will often simply tack on that cost to consumers. The U.S. recently imposed 20-percent tariffs on the first 1.2 million washing machines imported this year. After that, there's a 50-percent tariff on machines, which is expected to take effect sometime in the fall; the United States imports over 3 million washing machines a year. The result? Between February and May of this year, prices rose 16.4 percent — the largest three-month increase in prices ever.

Washing machine sales are a

small part of the overall economy. If the tariff talk stops here, consumers would hardly notice. But investors rightfully fear what could be next.

For example, if automobiles, which are a much larger chunk of U.S. GDP, are tariffed at that same 20-percent rate, it would likely raise the price of a new car by at least \$5,000. This would hit a major domestic industry hard at a time when sales are flagging.

These price increases will likely show up full force in the CPI data later this year and early next year, just as the corporate sugar high from the recent tax cuts is starting to wear off. Beyond the headlines, what worries me most as an investor is that this will almost certainly speed up inflation data at a time when the Federal Reserve has a hair trigger and is primed to raise interest rates. Raising rates into an already slowing economy tends to equal downturns. Rinse and repeat, if you dare.

## Another View

### Breaking up Facebook would do more harm than good

Facebook bestrides the Earth. It attracts nearly 1.5 billion users a day, commands a fifth of global online advertising revenue, and has a market capitalization that exceeds the GDP of many countries. An average user spends nearly an hour a day on its various platforms — about as much time as they spend eating and drinking.

Any business of such dominance would raise concerns about fair competition, and Facebook is no exception. A number of activist groups are even demanding that the company be broken up. Increasingly, they have sympathetic ears on Capitol Hill and in the media.

Although tempting, this is the wrong approach. As preeminent as Facebook is, breaking it up would do little to stimulate competition, while causing plenty of harm. Far better to remedy its specific abuses, while taking care not to wreck a thriving American company in the process.

The most obvious problem with breaking up Facebook is that many consumers enjoy using it, and pay nothing for the privilege. Demanding that they choose between arbitrarily smaller, less useful services is hardly to their advantage. Small businesses, likewise, profit hugely from Facebook's scale, data and advertising tools. Depriving them of such a service would come at a high price while doing little obvious good.

Market forces would also likely impede such an effort. The main way Facebook and its fellow tech behemoths have grown so powerful is through network effects: The more people who join Facebook, the more useful it becomes; the more useful, the easier to attract more users. Breaking it up wouldn't reverse this dynamic. One of the new MiniBooks would in all likelihood emerge as better than the rest — bringing in disproportionate users, data, and advertising dollars, and thus achieving dominance just as Facebook has.

Dominance, moreover, shouldn't be mistaken for a lack of competition. As successful as Facebook is, there's little stopping other companies from doing things better. In fact, they already are: Nearly all of Facebook's constituent services — messaging, video sharing and so forth — face competition from apps around the world. One result is that Facebook's market share is quickly eroding among younger users, who prefer cooler and less intrusive services. Although the colossus is safe for now, there's no shortage of alternatives for consumers, and no reason to think government intervention would improve matters.

That said, Facebook isn't blameless when it comes to hindering competition. Its boldest ploy involves a security application called Onavo Protect. Through this tool, Facebook gathers data on nearly everything its users do online: what apps they install, sites they visit, stuff they download and so on. That information is stored in a database, which the company uses to determine what rival products are becoming popular. It then may acquire the company producing the app — as it did with WhatsApp — or develop a competing product of its own, as it did with live-video streaming.

Regulators must keep a close eye on this sort of thing, and shouldn't hesitate to intervene when it's being abused. The Federal Trade Commission should ensure that Facebook isn't collecting such data under false pretenses — Onavo, audaciously, markets itself as tool to “keep you and your data safe” — and any new Facebook acquisitions should be greeted with due skepticism by antitrust officials.

More broadly, lawmakers should consider ways to discourage any company from using its data to deter new competitors. One might be to offer a “fiduciary” standard that would encourage companies to compete on how responsibly they handle personal information. Another could be ensuring that a user's data is “portable,” as Europe's new privacy regulations require, which could help ensure that startups aren't stymied by the inherent data advantages that come with scale.

Such remedies may seem less satisfying than simply breaking Facebook into pieces. But they would respond to specific threats to competition — not to perceived problems with bigness per se. For all its faults and failures, Facebook shouldn't be vilified. It should simply be held to account when it behaves badly. Let the market take care of the rest.

## One word can ruin your life

Last Sunday, John Schnatter of Papa John's fame was removed from his office at company headquarters in Louisville, Kentucky. He had resigned a few days earlier, apologizing for using a racial slur during a May conference call.

Apparently, Schnatter was angry over being taken to task for his NFL kneeling remarks and defended them by repeating a racist remark attributed to Colonel Sanders.

Schnatter's heated words come at the same time as Elon Musk's. Musk had built a small submarine to help rescue the Thai boys' soccer team stranded in a flooded cave.

The British caver who spearheaded the boys rescue said Musk's submarine was nothing but a PR stunt — that it couldn't have negotiated the twists and turns of the cave. Musk fired back, calling the Brit a “pedo,” short for pedophile!

Both Schnatter and Musk are wealthy, accomplished men who let wounded pride lead to angry words that have now changed their reputations and lives.

Yet the Bible warns of this very thing in the book of Esther.

It's roughly 500 B.C., and King Ahasuerus reigns from India to beyond Egypt. As the book opens, Ahasuerus' queen insults him, leading the King to depose her and search for a new queen.

Young Esther wins his favor.

Now Esther is a Jew — her family was part of the deportation from Jerusalem by King Nebuchadnezzar. She's also an

orphan raised by her old cousin. He warns her to tell no one at the palace of her heritage.

Soon, a man named Haman is appointed as the king's second in command. Haman has a throne at the king's gate, and everyone in the land is required to bow and pay homage to him.

When a Jew refuses, Haman is furious. In fact, he's so angry he warns the king about these people, and Ahasuerus leaves the matter to Haman to resolve.

Haman then orders genocide for all the Jews of the land — on a certain date, the people of the land are to rise up and kill them.

But, unbeknownst to Haman, the old Jew who refused to bow is the cousin who raised Queen Esther. When she learns of the edict, Esther invites the king and Haman to a banquet.

“What is it you want from me?” the king asks at that meal.

She agrees to tell him if they'll come again to a banquet tomorrow.

Haman feels quite special as he's leaving the palace—the Queen has chosen only him to dine with the King and her. But at that moment, he sees the Jew who won't bow, and Haman's pride gets the best of him. He orders for gallows to be built so the Jew can be hanged the next day.

God intervenes and prevents that hanging, which grieves Haman. Before he can think, the king's eunuchs sweep Haman off to the second banquet.

Again, the King asks Esther for her request, promising to give her up to half of his kingdom.

“I and my people are to be destroyed,” she says.

“Who's dared to do this?” the king asks.

“This wicked Haman!” she says. (Esther 7:5)

Haman is then hanged from the very gallows he'd built for the Jew.

Scripture speaks of the inability to tame the tongue: “How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire...With [the tongue] we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come cursing and blessing...these things ought not to be so.” James 3:5ff.

A good exercise is to look back over your emails, texts, prayer journal. Try to remember recent conversations. Examine the negative things you say and write. You can fool yourself, but your words paint a picture.

I did this. I wanted to see for myself. As I went along, I thought of Jesus' words: “The things that come out of the mouth come from the heart...” Matthew 15:18

Instinctively, we know this. It's the reason a racial slur and a pedophile insult take us aback. That's not how we saw the heart of these men.

Place whatever is unholy in your heart at the foot of the cross, and ask the Lord to help you. One word can ruin your life.

# Florida soldier says agency is blocking path to citizenship

ORLANDO — Haeder Al Anbki was all set to become a U.S. citizen last year.

The former interpreter for U.S. forces in Iraq, who had been shot and stabbed during his service, was at a June 2017 naturalization ceremony in Fort Benning, Georgia, for 20 immigrant recruits when he was stopped and told he wouldn't be participating. No explanation was given other than "there was a problem in the system," according to a lawsuit he filed last month in the District of Columbia.

The 36-year-old Al Anbki says in the lawsuit that the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services was obligated to complete his citizenship application but instead was applying a different set of rules under a program known as the Controlled Application Review

and Resolution Program, which opponents say targets applicants from majority-Muslim countries.

"Everybody was looking at me and they were like, 'What's going on?'" Al Anbki said Wednesday in a telephone interview from Camp Blanding in Jacksonville, where he was training with his Florida National Guard unit. "It was frustrating for me. Like, why? Of the 20 soldiers there, I'm the only one who got held."

Al Anbki, who lives in Orlando, came to the United States in 2011 after working with U.S. troops in Iraq for nine years as an interpreter, a job that allowed him to get a special immigration visa. During his service with the troops, he was stabbed by an insurgent and shot in the leg. He lost a toe on his left foot from shrapnel. His brother, also a translator for U.S. troops, was killed.

CARRP, as the program is known, started in the final year of President George

W. Bush's administration. It's "an internal policy that has neither been approved

by Congress nor subjected to public notice and comment," according to Al Anbki's lawsuit.

The once-secret program is also being challenged in federal court in Seattle by the American Civil Liberties Union and the Northwest Immigrant Rights Project. Their class-action lawsuit claims the government since 2008 has blacklisted thousands of applications for asylum, legal permanent residency or citizenship as national security concerns. The case goes to trial next year.

An agency spokeswoman said in a statement that privacy restrictions prevent her from talking about specific cases.

"USCIS adjudicates all naturalization applications fairly, efficiently, and effectively on a case-by-case basis to determine if they meet all standards required under the law," the statement said.

The statement said

"some applications take longer than others to process," and that applicants are notified of a final decision. However, opponents say what really happens is the applications often are delayed indefinitely.

Other lawsuits around the country have challenged the program, but they were dismissed because immigration authorities quickly ruled on the plaintiffs' applications once the complaints were filed, erasing the legal grounds on which they sued.

Besides his National Guard work, Al Anbki is employed as a security guard at Orlando International Airport while raising two grade-school-aged boys as a single dad. He has passed multiple background checks from the visa, Guard participation and job, he said.

"This is no way to treat somebody who bled for his country," Al Anbki said.

# Trump Jr. rewards DeSantis' support with campaign stump

ORLANDO— U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis' early support for Donald Trump earned him a campaign visit on Wednesday from the president's eldest son, meant to boost the congressman's campaign for Florida governor.

Donald Trump Jr. praised DeSantis during a campaign stop before several hundred supporters at a restaurant in the heart of Orlando's tourist district. The president is backing DeSantis in a hard-fought race against state Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam for the GOP gubernatorial nomination.

"Why am I here in 2,000 percent humidity? It's because Ron DeSantis was there from Day 1,"

Trump said on a steamy Florida summer day. "He was with us when it wasn't exactly cool to be with us ... when we were at zero percent."

DeSantis, for his part, was unwavering in supporting Trump, despite a rocky week for the president. Trump received bipartisan criticism for his comments following a meeting with Russian leader Vladimir Putin. Trump's performance in Helsinki wasn't mentioned except sideways when a warm-up speaker denounced former CIA Director John Brennan, who this week went so far as to call Trump's actions "treasonous" after he doubted U.S. intelligence findings that Russia tried to sway the 2016 presidential election. Bren-

nan's name was roundly booed.

"There's a reason Donald Trump endorsed me in this race because he knows I'm a leader," DeSantis said.

Supporters of DeSantis and the president at the rally also were unconcerned by the president's performance in Helsinki.

"He is a patriot. He isn't a puppet for Putin," Jay Bennett of Casselberry, Florida, said about the president. "For some people, the president can never do anything right. He could cure cancer and they would say it's the wrong type of cancer."

The gubernatorial primary is next month. DeSantis promised he would shake up "the swamp" in Tallahassee if elected governor and fight "entrenched interests."

# Mayor apologizes for fight over 'Starry Night' home

ORLANDO — A Florida mayor apologized Wednesday to a couple fined thousands of dollars for having their home's exterior painted to emulate Vincent van Gogh's "The Starry Night."

The Orlando Sentinel reports that the Mount Dora City Council unanimously agreed Tuesday that Lubomir Jastrzebski and Nancy Nemhauser can keep the blue-and-yellow paint swirled on their walls in the style of van Gogh's masterpiece.

The settlement also requires the city to pay them \$15,000 and remove a property lien to end the nearly yearlong code enforcement case.

Mayor Nick Girone publicly apologized to the couple Wednesday at city hall, adding that his city has a long history of supporting artists. Mount Dora, about 25 miles (40 kilometers) northwest of Orlando, hosts one of the largest art shows in central Florida.

"We are absolutely delighted and ecstatic," Nemhauser said after Tuesday's vote. "I'm unhappy that we had to go through all of this, but the ending is a happy ending."

Artist Richard Barrenechea, who painted the murals, agreed.

"It's a big day for the arts," Barrenechea said. "It's a big day for Mount Dora, and a big day for freedom."

The dispute began when the couple painted an exterior wall as a way to calm their 25-year-old son, who is autistic and loves van Gogh's work.

Code-enforcement officers cited the couple in July 2017, saying the murals violated Mount Dora's sign ordinance and the house must be painted a solid color. The city also argued the bright colors distracted drivers.

The couple then had the rest of their home painted like van Gogh's painting, attracting national attention.

The council also voted to create a seven-member advisory committee for implementing new ordinances or codes, and invited Nemhauser to be a member.

"I hope she accepts," Girone told reporters Wednesday.

The "Starry Night" house will be exempt from any current or future ordinances so long as it keeps the murals in good condition. If they repaint, the homeowners lose their exemption.

# Greene joins Democratic debate for Florida governor

FORT MYERS — The Democratic candidates for Florida governor sped through a wealth of issues during a debate Wednesday, but differences on the environment, education, guns, health care and standing up to President Donald Trump were few. The following are some areas where each stood out from the others:

## GWEN GRAHAM

Graham, the daughter of former governor and U.S. senator Bob Graham, hit hard on her core issues — cleaning the environment, particularly the Everglades; improving schools and supporting teachers; abortion rights; and banning the sale of military-style assault weapons like the one used to kill 17 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School on Feb. 14. She also pointed out that she is the only candidate who has defeated a Republican, which she did when she won her congressional race in 2014. The Democrats have lost five straight gubernatorial elections.

"This is not a drill. If you are ready to end 20 years of Republican rule in our state capitol, I am ready to lead," she said.

## CHRIS KING

King has made not taking sugar money a central theme of his campaign, and he criticized Graham for earlier accepting \$17,000. Environmentalists blame sugar growers for polluting the Everglades and South Florida's water supply. It was the only direct criticism one candidate aimed at another during the debate.

"Congresswoman Graham, I have to disagree with one thing you just said because it wasn't true. You have taken money from the sugar industry. You took thousands and thousands and thousands of dollars," he said. "And the eve of our first debate, you gave that money back. Because what we have to do as Democrats is we have to recognize that we have to change the future of Florida's environment. We have to end toxic discharges once and for all." The line drew loud applause from the crowd as southwest Florida is in the middle of an algae outbreak in its waterways.

## ANDREW GILLUM

While each of the candidates criticized

the sugar industry for contributing to pollution problems, Gillum was the only person to talk about providing for the future of the people who now rely on the industry.

"We've got to deal with the 50,000 citizens who are surrounding that industry, many of them communities of color, who are not being talked to about the kind of job industry that we're going to usher into their area once we transform the agriculture use around it ... We've got to make sure that we give those people a new deal," Gillum said.

## JEFF GREENE

Greene was the only candidate asked how to better fund public schools.

"When I am governor, not a penny of public school money will be spent on private schools or charter schools, which are all just schools without rules."

He was also asked about legalizing recreational marijuana. He said he couldn't commit until he sees if marijuana use among minors increases in states where it's legal.

"Let's see what's happening in states like Colorado. If the consumption has increased among young people in places like this, I'd say let's definitely decriminalize it, but don't legalize it. If it hasn't, I say legalize it, regulate it, tax it and that will be the end of the story for good."

## PHILIP LEVINE

Each candidate was asked about how Florida can pay for school safety officers that are now mandated under a new law. Levine didn't directly address the question, but instead listed a number of ways the state can increase revenue, including cutting corporate tax loopholes and also expanding gambling at Seminole Tribe casinos.

"We're going to make sure we take that money from charter schools and put them into our public schools ... We're going to make sure that we stop shaking down the Seminoles and shake hands with them and take that hundreds of millions and bring it to our schools. We're going to make sure we have sports betting so we don't lose that money — keep it in the state of Florida," Levine said.

# Death toll from duck boat accident climbs to 17

BRANSON, Mo. — Divers found four more bodies Friday in a Missouri lake where a duck boat packed with tourists capsized and sank in high winds, bringing the death toll to 17 in the country-and-western town of Branson, authorities said.

Investigators blamed stormy weather for the accident Thursday evening on Table Rock Lake. Winds at the time were blowing as hard as 65 mph (105 kph), according to the National Weather Service.

The boat was carrying 29 passengers and two crew members on a pleasure cruise, and authorities said everyone aboard had been accounted for. Seven of the 14 survivors were hurt when the vessel went down. At least two were hospitalized in critical condition, officials said.

The crew member who was operating the boat died, but the captain survived, authorities said.

Named for their ability to travel on land and in water, duck boats have been involved in other serious accidents in the past, including the deaths of more than 40 people since 1999.

Five college students were killed in 2015 in Se-

attle when a duck boat collided with a bus. Thirteen people died in 1999 when a boat sank near Hot Springs, Arkansas.

“Duck boats are death traps,” said Andrew Duffy, an attorney whose Philadelphia law firm handled litigation related to two fatal duck boat accidents there. “They’re not fit for water or land because they are half car and half boat.”

Safety advocates have sought improvements and

complained that too many agencies regulate the boats with varying safety requirements.

The boats were originally designed for the military, specifically to transport troops and supplies in World War II. They were later modified for use as sightseeing vehicles.

Passengers on a nearby boat described the chaos on the lake as the winds picked up and the water turned rough. “Debris was flying ev-

erywhere,” Allison Lester said in an interview Friday with ABC’s “Good Morning America.”

Lester’s boyfriend, Trent Behr, said they saw a woman in the water and helped to pull her into the boat. He said he was about to start CPR when an EMT arrived and took over.

The Coast Guard and the National Transportation Safety Board were to investigate. Stone County Sheriff Doug Rader urged anyone with video or pho-

tos of the accident to contact authorities.

Weather conditions were sure to figure prominently in the investigation. The weather service issued a severe thunderstorm watch around midday Thursday, followed by a warning at 6:32 p.m., about 40 minutes before the boat tipped over. Both the watch and a statement issued at 7:02 p.m. mentioned the risk of 70 mph winds.

“When we issue a warning, it means, take action,” said Kelsey Angle, a weather service meteorologist in Springfield.

Divers located the vessel, which came to rest on its wheels on the lakebed, and authorities planned to recover it later Friday.

The boat sank in 40 feet (12 meters) of water and then rolled on its wheels into a deeper area with 80 feet (25 meters) of water. Investigators had no information about whether passengers were wearing life jackets or whether they were stowed onboard, the sheriff said.

The names of the dead were not immediately released.

An off-duty deputy working security for the boat company helped rescue people after the boat turned over, the sheriff

said. Dive teams from several law enforcement agencies assisted in the effort.

Suzanne Smagala with Ripley Entertainment, which owns Ride the Ducks in Branson, said the company was assisting authorities. She said this was the ride’s only accident in more than 40 years of operation.

Weather can change rapidly in this part of the country, moving from sunshine and calm to dangerous storms within minutes, said Jason Schaumann, another weather service meteorologist.

“Tornado warnings get a lot of publicity, and severe thunderstorm warnings should be taken very seriously too, particularly if you are in a vulnerable area like a lake or campground,” he said.

Branson, about 200 miles (320 kilometers) southeast of Kansas City, is a country-themed tourist mecca built on a reputation for patriotic and religious-themed shows in numerous theaters.

Table Rock Lake, east of Branson, was created in the late 1950s when the Corps of Army Engineers built a dam across the White River to provide hydroelectric power to the Ozarks.

### Facebook suspends Boston analytics firm over data usage

NEW YORK — Facebook said Friday that it has suspended Boston-based analytics firm Crimson Hexagon while it investigates how it collects and shares Facebook and Instagram’s user data.

Facebook has been facing increased scrutiny over how third-party firms use its data since news broke in March that data firm Cambridge Analytica improperly accessed user data.

The Wall Street Journal first reported that Facebook had suspended Crimson Hexagon. The newspaper says among the firm’s clients is a Russian nonprofit with ties to the Kremlin.

“We don’t allow developers to build surveillance tools using information from Facebook or Instagram,” said Ime Archibong, Facebook’s vice president of product partnerships. “We take these allegations seriously, and we have suspended these apps while we investigate.” Facebook said Friday that Crimson Hexagon is cooperating and that so far its investigation hasn’t found evidence that the firm obtained Facebook or Instagram information inappropriately.

Crimson Hexagon says on its website it has access to over 1 trillion consumer conversations from social media, forums, blogs and reviews.

### Court: Law doesn’t bar sex-orientation discrimination on job

ATLANTA — A federal appeals court in Atlanta this week reaffirmed its decision that workers aren’t protected against workplace discrimination based on sexual orientation, though two of the 11 judges strongly disagreed.

Gerald Lynn Bostock asserted in a lawsuit originally filed in May 2016 that he was fired from his job as a court child welfare services coordinator in Clayton County, just south of Atlanta, because he’s gay.

A federal judge last year dismissed his case, and a three-judge panel of the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in May upheld that ruling. The panel said binding court precedent set by a 1979 decision says Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 law doesn’t prohibit employers from discriminating against workers based on sexual orientation. The full court on Wednesday declined to reconsider that decision.

Circuit Judge Robin Rosenbaum, joined by Judge Jill Pryor, dissented from this week’s decision.

“I continue to firmly believe that Title VII prohibits discrimination against gay and lesbian individuals because they fail to conform to their employers’ views when it comes to whom they should love,” Rosenbaum wrote.

### Grand jury indicts Maryland newspaper shooting suspect

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — A grand jury has leveled 23 charges against a man accused of killing five people in a mass shooting at a Maryland newspaper office, a prosecutor announced Friday.

The grand jury indicted Jarrod Ramos, 38, of Laurel, on five counts of first-degree murder in the deaths of Gerald Fischman, Rob Hiaasen, John McNamara, Rebecca Ann Smith and Wendi Winters, according to a news release from Anne Arundel County State’s Attorney Wes Adams. Ramos is also now charged with attempted murder, assault and gun crimes.

The indictment moves from District Court to Circuit Court to progress toward a trial. Ramos is scheduled to make an initial appearance July 30 in Circuit Court, according to court records.

County police responding to the June 28 attack at the Capital-Gazette in Annapolis arrested Ramos in the newsroom. They said he blocked an exit and then used a shotgun to blast his way through the entrance.

# AP source: Trump was taped talking of paying Playboy model

NEW YORK — President Donald Trump’s former personal lawyer secretly recorded Trump discussing a possible payment to a former Playboy model who said she had an affair with him, a person familiar with an investigation into the attorney told The Associated Press on Friday.

The president’s current personal lawyer confirmed the conversation and said it showed Trump did nothing wrong, according to The New York Times, which first reported on the recording.

The FBI has the recording, which lawyer Michael Cohen made two months before Trump’s 2016 election, according to the person who spoke to the AP. The person, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss the ongoing inquiry, said the payment was never made.

The FBI raided Cohen’s office, home and hotel room in April amid an investigation into his business dealings, including any information on payments made in 2016 to former Playboy model Karen McDougal. She says she had an affair with Trump in 2006. He denies it.

The Wall Street Journal revealed, days before the election, that the National Enquirer — run by Trump

supporter David Pecker — had paid \$150,000 to silence McDougal. At the time, Trump campaign spokeswoman Hope Hicks said, “We have no knowledge of any of this.”

The Washington Post, citing a person familiar with the recording, said Friday the recording captured Trump and Cohen discussing an effort the attorney planned to make to buy the rights to McDougal’s story for roughly \$150,000 from the Enquirer’s parent company, American Media Inc.

Trump lawyer Rudy Giuliani told the Times the Republican president did discuss the payments to Mc-

Dougal with Cohen on the less than two-minute-long recording, but that the payment was never made.

Giuliani says Trump told Cohen that if he did make a payment, to do it by check so it could be documented.

“Nothing in that conversation suggests that he had any knowledge of it in advance,” Giuliani told the newspaper. “In the big scheme of things, it’s powerful exculpatory evidence.”

Giuliani and Cohen haven’t immediately responded to messages from The Associated Press. Cohen lawyer Lanny Davis declined to comment to the Times.

Cohen, a self-described fixer for Trump for more than a decade, said last year that he “would take a bullet” for Trump. But Cohen told an interviewer earlier this month that he now puts “family and country first” and won’t let anyone paint him as “a villain of this story.”

Hours before the Times published its story, Cohen met in New York Friday morning with the Rev. Al Sharpton, a frequent critic of Trump.

Cohen and Sharpton said in tweets they have known each other for 20 years. Cohen contacted the civil rights activist in recent weeks, longtime Sharpton spokeswoman Rachel Noerdlinger said.



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# Fashion firms upend design routine to focus on speed, trends

NEW YORK — Prototypes? Passe. Fashion company Betabrand saw that knitwear was a hot style in sneakers and wanted to quickly jump on the trend for dressier shoes.

It put a poll up on its website asking shoppers what style they liked, and based on that had a shoe for sale online in just one week.

What web shoppers saw was a 3-D rendering — no actual shoe existed yet. Creating a traditional prototype, tweaking the design and making a sample would have taken six to nine months, and the company might have missed out on the interest in knit.

“The web attention span is short,” said Betabrand CEO Chris Lindland. “So if you can develop and create in a short time, you can be a real product-development machine.”

Shoppers looking at the shoe online could examine the peekaboo detail or check out how the sole was put together, as they would from photos of a real product. They don’t get the actual shoes instantaneously — they have to wait a few months. But the use of digital technology in designing and selling means hot trends are still getting to people far faster than under the old system.

“Retailers and brands who are embracing this are going to be winners of the future,” said David Bassuk, managing director of consulting group AlixPartners. “This is flipping the business model on its head.”

## A cultural change

It’s a big cultural change for clothing makers. For decades, the process meant designers sketched

ideas on paper, a design got approved and the sketches went to a factory that created prototypes. Designers and product developers made tweaks and sent prototypes back and forth. Once a final version was approved, it was sent to the factory to be copied for mass production. Getting something from design to a store could take at least a year.

Now, some companies have designers sketching on high-resolution tablets with software that can email 3-D renderings of garments with specifications straight to factories, as better technology makes the images look real and the pressure to get shoppers new products swiftly intensifies. The goal is to reduce to six months or less the time it takes to get to store shelves.

Even chains like H&M, which once set the standard for speed by flying in frequent small batches, are realizing that’s not fast enough. H&M, which has seen sales slow, is starting to digitize certain areas of its manufacturing process.

## Design Decisions

For clothing makers and retailers, the shift means design decisions can happen closer to when the fashions actually hit the

shelves or website. That means less guessing so stores aren’t stuck with piles of unsold clothes that need to be discounted.

The 3-D technology is used in just 2 percent of the overall supply networks, estimates Spencer Fung, group CEO of Li & Fung, which consults with more than 8,000 retailers including Betabrand and 15,000 suppliers globally. But he believes that will change as retailers begin prioritizing speed and realize that cutting down on design time and prototypes saves money.

“You can actually essentially create an entire collection before you even cut one garment,” said Whitney Cathcart, CEO of the Cathcart Technologies consulting firm. “So it reduces waste, it reduces lead times, it allows decision making in real time, so the entire process becomes more efficient.”

Fung imagines a scenario where a social media post with a celebrity in a red dress gets 500,000 “likes.” An alert goes to a retailer that this item is trending. Within hours, a digital sample of a similar dress is on its website. A factory can start to produce the dress in days.

“Consumers see it and, they want it now,” says Mi-

chael Londrigan of fashion college LIM in New York. “How do you bring it to market so you don’t miss those dollars?”

## Sales

Nicki Rector of the Sonoma Valley area in California bought a pair of Betabrand’s Western-style boots last summer based on the 3-D rendering.

“It looked real,” said Rector, who examined the images of the heel and the insoles. She didn’t worry about buying off a digital image, reasoning that if you’re buying online you can’t really know how something’s going to fit until you put it on your feet. She said knowing it was designed from customer input also helped make the wait OK.

Betabrand has sold 40,000 pairs of shoes priced from \$128 to \$168 over the past year, all from digital renderings, and plans to add 15 to 20 such projects this year.

At a Levi Strauss & Co. research and development facility in San Francisco, designers use programs that offer the look of a

finished garment and let them make changes like adding pockets quickly, rather than requiring a new prototype. When they’re set, they can send a file to the factory for mass production. Using digital samples can shorten the design time to one week or less from an eight-week timeframe, Levi’s says.

## What others are doing

Few companies are yet selling directly to shoppers off digital renderings like Betabrand, and are instead showing them to store buyers or to factories rather than using traditional samples.

Xcel Brands uses them for its own brand of women’s tops and for the company’s Judith Ripka jewelry line. The company, which also makes clothes for Isaac Mizrahi and Halston, will start using them for other brands within the year. CEO Robert D’Loren hopes to start putting 3-D samples on its website next year.

Tommy Hilfiger has an interactive touchscreen table where buyers can view every item in the

collection and create custom orders. And Deckers Brands, the maker of Ugg boots, is using digital renderings of the classic boot in 10 colors, eliminating the need for 10 prototypes for store buyers. That helps reduce cost and increases speed.

Using digital designs also mean the exact specifications for different Levi’s design finishes can be uploaded to a machine that uses lasers to scrape away at jeans. No need to teach employees how to execute a designer’s vision, in a minute and a half the lasers have given the jeans the exact weathered look that took workers welding pumice stones twenty minutes to half an hour.

“Thirty years ago, jeans were only available in three shades — rinse, stonewash and bleach,” said Bart Sights, head of the Levi’s Eureka lab. “Our company now designs 1,000 finishes per season.” Such a long lead time “pushes production and creation too far away.” Levi’s latest technology alleviates this issue, he said.

# An hour of meal prep on Sunday sets you up for a yummy week

What if you had a prep cook in your kitchen? A sous chef who made sure that all of the slicing and dicing and mincing and zesting was done for you, so that when it came time to make dinner, all you had to do was wash your hands and start cooking?

Most of us aren’t going to get this in our lifetimes. But what if we took an hour on Sunday evening to be our own prep cooks, and make life easier all week long?

Yes, you can buy many of these items pre-cut — but since they’ve been cut days before, even as you take them from their bags, you can see some browning or dryness or aging. When you prep the ingredients yourself, you have a better shot at a longer shelf life, and you know exactly how fresh they are.

If you are a meal planner, already aware of which recipes you plan to make for the week, then identify the ingredients that can be prepped ahead of time, add them to your shopping list and get them into recipe-ready shape.

But if you aren’t quite sure what you are making, then you can still be your own best friend by prepping a bunch of ingredients you likely will call into duty.

If you have a food processor, this task just got easier, as you can

pulse everything up, small batches of one ingredient at a time, and have yourself an arsenal of prepped ingredients at the ready. Keep all of your prepped items in tightly sealed containers in the fridge.

Here are some suggestions: ingredients that make frequent appearances in my kitchen. But you’ll determine the ingredients you most often use.

**MINCED GARLIC:** This will last for up to a week in the fridge, and mincing it yourself is much better than buying a jar of pre-minced.

**MINCED SHALLOTS:** If you don’t cook with shallots, please reconsider. They are a bit of a cross between onions and garlic, but they have a mild sweetness as well. Use about half the amount in any recipe that calls for onions, and twice as much if you are subbing them for garlic. Shallots are perfect in vinaigrettes.

**CHOPPED OR SLIVERED**

**ONIONS:** How nice to get any onion-induced crying out of the way in one fell swoop. I usually sliver one onion and chop a couple.

**BIG CARROTS PEELLED AND CUT INTO STICKS:** Keeping them as sticks means you can munch on them throughout the week, or if you need them chopped for a recipe later, you are halfway there.

**CITRUS ZEST AND JUICE (LEMON, LIME AND/OR ORANGE):** Use a grater (a Microplane is good) to remove the brightly colored outer layer of your citrus fruit and store that in a tiny bag or container. Then juice the fruit and strain the juice into a container. Both items will lend a welcome bit of brightness and freshness to recipes of all kinds, from soups to sauces to salad dressings.

**BROCCOLI OR CAULIFLOWER FLORETS:** You might simply roast or saute these later in the week, or use them in stir-

fries or soups, or lightly steam them and use in pastas and salads.

**CHOPPED PARSLEY:** Useful in dishes and as a finishing bit of fresh herbiness on all sorts of foods, especially hearty stewed and braised ones. Other fresh herbs are less sturdy, and to get a head start on those just pull the leaves off, fold them into a slightly damp paper towel, and store them whole. If you chop them they will blacken in a day or two.

**COOKED CRUMBLER BACON (DON’T JUDGE ME):** A little container of this is like gold, perfect to top off a soup, add to potato or pasta salads, stir into a frittata — there are more ways to use cooked, crumbled bacon than can be mentioned in a few sentences!

**GRATED CHEESES:** Yes, you can buy some pre-grated cheese, and you should definitely do that, but sometimes you want to grate your own Parmesan, or you need a grated cheese that’s not as easy to find, like fontina.

Week to week, your list of pre-cut foods will vary. Sometimes it might be sliced radishes or cubed butternut squash or chopped celery. It depends what recipes are in the forecast, and also what ingredients are in the fridge and begging to be used. So, next Sunday, put on some music and pay it forward. Your Wednesday self will thank your Sunday self shortly.

# Trimming and tidying: Perennials need care too

The great attraction in growing perennial flowers is that you never have to replant them, at least in theory. This doesn’t make all perennials care-free, though. Few of them let you just sit back to enjoy them year after year once they’re planted.

Take coreopsis, for example, a wonderful perennial that ends its first flush of bright yellow blossoms around mid-summer. Like a number of other perennial flowers, coreopsis can be overly exuberant in some gardens — mine, for instance. Right now, the plants are threatening to take over the whole flower bed in which they were planted.

## SOME PERENNIALS WANDER

Coreopsis spreads very effectively by self-sown seeds and by roots that travel underground and then send up shoots (“suckers”) some distance from the mother plant. Both seedlings and root suckers are beginning to elbow out dianthus and other more sedate neighbors.

Agastache (sometimes known as anise hyssop), also in that bed, is one plant that can stand up to coreopsis. As a matter of fact, agastache is so aggressive that I might call it a weed, tempting me to remove it altogether once and for all. Like coreopsis, it spreads by seeds and suckering roots. As I pull on those licorice-minty

stems, though, their aroma beckons me to leave in at least a few plants. I give in.

Fortunately, keeping agastache, coreopsis, and similarly exuberant perennials in line is satisfyingly easy. A quick tug on a stem or two will wrench a wayward plant from the ground, roots and all, causing little disturbance to nearby plant roots. (Tug on too many stems at once and they don’t release so easily, or they pull along too big a clump of soil.)

## SOME PERENNIALS NEED TIDYING UP

Oriental poppy is another perennial needing some attention in summer. Excess plants may need to be weeded out, but — more important — this plant needs tidying up. Oriental poppy dies back in summer, so I cut back the sad-looking, dying flower stalks and leaves and cart them over to the compost pile.

Shearing stimulates growth of new, flower-bearing stems.

## SOME PERENNIALS NEED NOTHING FROM YOU

A few perennials do live up to gardeners’ hopes of a plant you set in the ground and then do nothing more than enjoy. Some that come to mind are peony, daylily, hellebore and hosta, all with dense enough foliage to even shade out most weeds. Baby’s-breath and butterfly weed also rarely need attention.

# Airman who inspired 'Good Morning, Vietnam' film has died at 79

NORFOLK, Va. — Adrian Cronauer, the man whose military radio antics inspired a character played by Robin Williams in the film "Good Morning, Vietnam," has died. He was 79.

Mary Muse, the wife of his stepson Michael Muse, said Thursday that Cronauer died Wednesday from an age-related illness. He had lived in Troutville, Virginia, and died at a local nursing home, she said.

During his service as a U.S. Air Force sergeant in Vietnam in 1965 and 1966, Cronauer opened his Armed Forces Radio show with the phrase, "Gooooood morning, Vietnam!"

Williams made the refrain famous in the 1987 film, loosely based on Cronauer's time in Saigon.

The film was a departure from other Vietnam war movies that focused on bloody realism, such as the Academy Award-winning "Platoon." Instead, it was about irreverent youth in the 1960s fighting the military establishment.

"We were the only game in town, and you had to play by our rules," Cronauer told The Associated Press in 1987. "But I wanted to serve the listeners."

The military wanted conservative programming. American youths, however, were "not into drab, sterile announcements" with middle-of-the-road music, Cronauer said, and

the battle over the airwaves was joined.

In the film, Williams quickly drops Perry Como and Lawrence Welk from his 6 a.m. playlist in favor of the Dave Clark Five.

Cronauer said he loved the movie but much of it was Hollywood make-believe. Robin Williams' portrayal as a fast-talking, nonconformist, yuk-it-up disc jockey sometimes gave people the wrong impression of the man who inspired the film.

"Yes, I did try to make it sound more like a state-side station," he told The AP in 1989. "Yes, I did have problems with news censorship. Yes, I was in a restaurant shortly before the Viet Cong hit it. And yes, I did start each program by yelling, 'Good Morning, Vietnam!'"

The rest is what he delicately called "good script crafting."

When the film was released, the presidential campaign of Democrat Jesse Jackson called asking if Cronauer would help out. The conversation died quickly after Cronauer asked the caller if she realized he was a Republican.

In 1992, George H. W. Bush's re-election campaign taped a TV ad slamming Bill Clinton's draft record. In the ad, Cronauer accused Clinton of lying.

"In many ways, I'm a very conservative guy," he said. "A lifelong, card-carrying Republican can't be that much of an anti-establish-

ment type."

Cronauer was from Pittsburgh, the son of a steelworker and a schoolteacher. After the military, he worked in radio, television and advertising.

In 1979, Cronauer saw the film "Apocalypse Now" with his friend Ben Moses, who also served in Vietnam and worked at the Saigon radio station.

"We said that's not our story of Vietnam," Moses recalled Thursday. "And we made a deal over a beer that we were going to have a movie called 'Good Morning, Vietnam.'"

It wasn't easy. Hollywood producers were incensed at the idea of a comedy about Vietnam, said Moses, who co-produced the film.

"I said 'It's not a comedy — it's the sugar on top of the medicine,'" Moses said.

Writer Mitch Markowitz made the film funny, and director Barry Levinson added the tragic-comedy aspect, Moses said. Williams' performance was nominated for an Oscar.

Moses said the film was a pivotal moment in changing the way Americans thought about the Vietnamese and the war.

Muse, the wife of Cronauer's stepson, said the movie "helped open dialogue and discussion that had long been avoided." "He loved the servicemen and servicewomen all over the world and always made time to personally engage with them," she said.

**Director Gunn fired from 'Guardians 3'**

LOS ANGELES — James Gunn has been fired as director of "Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3" because of old tweets that recently emerged where he joked about subjects like pedophilia and rape.

Walt Disney Studios

Chairman Alan Horn said in a statement Friday that the tweets are indefensible, and the studio has severed ties with Gunn.

Gunn has been writer and director of the "Guardians of the Galaxy" franchise from the start, taking an obscure Marvel Comics title about a group of misfits and turning it into

two huge hits that together totaled more than \$1.5 billion in global box office.

Gunn on Thursday sent several tweets saying he was sorry for trying in the past to get laughs through shock value.

His publicists did not immediately respond to an email seeking comment.

# Disney streaming could get boost as Comcast drops Fox bid

NEW YORK — Comcast is dropping its bid for Fox's entertainment businesses, paving the way for Disney to boost its upcoming streaming service by buying the studios behind "The Simpsons" and X-Men.

Getting Fox would help the House of Mouse compete with technology companies such as Amazon and Netflix for viewers' attention — and dollars.

Disney needs compelling TV shows and movies to persuade viewers to sign up and pay for yet another streaming service. It already has classic Disney cartoons, "Star Wars," Pixar, the Muppets and some of the Marvel characters. With Fox, Disney could add Marvel's X-Men and Deadpool, along with programs shown on such Fox channels as FX Networks and National Geographic. Fox's productions also include "The Americans," "This Is Us" and "Modern Family."

The deal would help Disney further control TV shows and movies from start to finish — from creating the programs to distributing them through television channels, movie theaters, streaming services and other ways people watch entertainment. Disney would get valuable data on customers and their entertainment-viewing habits, which it can then use to sell advertising.

For Comcast, dropping the pursuit of Fox lets it focus on getting European pay-TV operator Sky, a deal that would help the Philadelphia-based cable and

media company expand beyond the U.S.

Fox shareholders are to vote on the Disney deal on July 27.

Cable and telecom companies have been buying the companies that make TV shows and movies to compete in a changing media landscape. Although internet providers like AT&T and Comcast directly control their customers' access to the internet in a way that Amazon, YouTube and Netflix do not, they still face threats as those streaming services gain in popularity.

AT&T bought Time Warner last month for \$81 billion and has already launched its own streaming service, Watch TV, with Time Warner channels such as TBS and TNT, among other networks, for \$15 a month.

Expect something similar from Disney after the deal closes. In addition to boosting the Disney streaming service, expected to debut next year, the deal paves the way for Marvel's X-Men and the Avengers to reunite in future movies. Though Disney owns Marvel Studios, some characters including the X-Men had already been licensed to Fox.

Disney would also get a controlling stake in the existing streaming service Hulu.

Separately, Disney said it will release new episodes of the "Star Wars" animated series "The Clone Wars" on its upcoming streaming service. The original "Clone Wars" series ran for six seasons, with the final one as a Netflix exclusive.

# GENETIC TESTING

Tests can provide health clues — and needless worry

NEW YORK — Last year, Katie Burns got a phone call that shows what can happen in medicine when information runs ahead of knowledge.

Burns learned that a genetic test of her fetus had turned up an abnormality. It appeared in a gene that, when it fails to work properly, causes heart defects, mental disability and other problems. But nobody knew whether the specific abnormality detected by the test would cause trouble.

"I was pretty distraught," says Burns, a photographer in Charlotte, North Carolina. "I had a baby who was kicking. I could feel him moving inside of me. But at the same time I had this ache in my chest. What was his life going to be for him?"

It took two months to get more reliable information, and Burns says she wasn't really sure of the answer until after she gave birth in October to a healthy boy.

Her experience is a glimpse into a surprising paradox of modern-day genetics: Scientists have made huge leaps in rapidly decoding people's DNA, but they sometimes don't know what their findings mean. They can even get fooled.

That can come to a head when medical professionals have people tested for genetic variants that cause or promote a disease, usually because they show symptoms or an illness runs in their family. The testing often focuses on relatively rare disorders, caused by a single gene.

Medicine is getting into genetic testing in a big way. One recent estimate found nearly 75,000 health-related DNA tests being marketed by American labs to health care providers, mostly for single-gene disorders, with the total growing rapidly. And this year, the Pennsylvania-based Geisinger health system began offering free genetic testing to its patients as a standard part of its disease prevention efforts, along with things like mammograms and cholesterol checks.

Americans are interested in what their genes say about their health. Poll results released Thursday by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research found that 60 percent would want to know if they carried a variant associated with even an incurable disease.

But DNA test results can be puzzling. Katie Burns' fetus had what experts call a "variant of uncertain significance," or a VUS. Many are known: One standard database contains almost 193,000 variants categorized as a VUS, more than twice the number of listed variants known to cause disease.

Each variant may be seen in only one or a handful of patients. But as a group, many thousands of them are being reported to patients, said Heidi Rehm of Boston's Massachusetts General Hospital and the Broad Institute in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The rates vary by disease. In seeking genes to explain a patient's hearing loss, for example, around half of tests will find only a VUS, she said. A child with symptoms that suggest developmental delay or a related disorder might get a test that examines 200 genes, she said. With such a wide net cast, the chances of a VUS are nearly 100 percent, she said.

That can cause more than

worry, said Otis Brawley, chief medical and scientific officer for the American Cancer Society. He tells of women who got breasts removed after learning they had a VUS in a gene linked to breast cancer — only to learn years later that further research showed the variants were harmless.

How can this be? How can scientists not know whether a DNA abnormality is dangerous?

To understand that, it helps to know a bit about DNA.

In each of us, the genetic code is like a text with 3 billion letters. Some of those letters spell words — genes — that carry out specific jobs. If a gene has one or more letters that aren't the ones found in the generic "spelling" of human DNA, they are called variants.

Some variants lead to disease. But each of us carries many variants, and most are harmless. You can't tell their effect just by looking at them. And just because a variant is rare, that doesn't mean it's harmful.

Scientists do have ways to

determine if a variant is risky or not, but they often don't have enough information to make the call. That's what happened to Katie Burns.

She had the genetic test done because of an unusual finding on a fetal ultrasound scan. The VUS prompted her genetic counselor to suggest testing both her and her husband to see if they had the variant. The counselor also brought up the possibility of an abortion.

"Termination was off the table," Burns said.

Instead, Burns scoured the internet. In a searchable database of genetic variants called Clinvar, she saw that Rehm's laboratory had encountered the variant found in her fetus, and classified it as a VUS.

Burns contacted Rehm, who provided some reassurance. In the years since the 2013 classification as VUS, the variant had turned up in three members of the general public, and Rehm told Burns she suspected that either she or her husband would be found to have the variant. That would give further evidence that

it's harmless.

When Burns later learned that the variant appeared in her healthy husband, "a lot of stress kind of eased off."

And in October, her son was born without any trace of the disease.

So how should a person react to a VUS? Genetic counselors say it should be considered along with the person's other medical information, but not used as the sole reason for a major decision like breast removal.

That message has not gotten through to some doctors, said Dr. Allison Kurian of Stanford University. She recently surveyed surgeons about tests that examined the BRCA1 and BRCA2 genes, in which certain mutations can greatly increase the risk of breast cancer. Many surgeons said they'd treat a patient with a VUS the same way as if she had a known disease-promoting mutation.

Kendra Snyder, of Newton Hamilton, Pennsylvania, recalls being told by her genetic counselor "just to live your normal life" after VUS results this year. She had

taken the test because of a heart condition.

But upon reflection, she said, she realized she shouldn't stress over it, because doing so would reduce her quality of life. As for the VUS finding, "it's there, but I'm not really panicking and thinking much about it."

As scientists find more people with a VUS and carry out lab studies, they hope to distinguish the truly risky ones from those that are harmless. With large population databases that have recently become available, they can determine if a VUS is more common in the general population than the rare disease it might cause — a sign that it's harmless. And combining results from different test labs, such as those submitting information to the Clinvar database, can help.

# Flint water crisis prompts call for more federal oversight


WASHINGTON — A federal watchdog is calling on the Environmental Protection Agency to strengthen its oversight of state drinking water systems nationally and respond more quickly to public health emergencies such as the lead-in-the water crisis in Flint, Michigan.

In a 74-page report released Thursday, the EPA's inspector general reported pointed to "oversight lapses" at the federal, state and local levels in the response to Flint's contaminated drinking water.

"While oversight authority is vital, its absence can contribute to a catastrophic situation," the inspector general, Arthur A. Elkin, said in a statement. His office has concluded the EPA was too slow and passive in responding to the Flint crisis.

The finding comes as the Trump administration seeks to cut the EPA's budget, including some drinking-water programs. The administration also has called for reining back federal environmental regulation overall and transferring more oversight authority of some programs to the states.

The EPA said in a statement it agrees with the

inspector general's recommendations and is adopting them "expeditiously."

"The agency is actively engaging with states to improve communications and compliance with the federal Safe Drinking Water Act to safeguard human health," the statement said.

But the internal watchdog said the agency's proposal for stepping up oversight falls short.

Flint's tap water became contaminated in 2014 after officials switched from the Detroit system to the Flint River to save money, exposing many residents to lead, a potent neurotoxin. Children are particularly vulnerable, and the EPA says there is no safe level of lead.

EPA officials had stressed

they had wanted to foster a collaborative partnership with Michigan, the report said. In Flint, the quest for "partnership limited effective EPA oversight."

Rep. Dan Kildee, who was traveling to Flint on Thursday to inspect work done on the city's water system, said the state bore most of the blame for the slow response to the health crisis, but also said "the EPA should have been more aggressive."

"EPA should not have taken the state of Michigan at its word" that everything was fine with Flint's water, said Kildee, D-Mich. "Water quality is too serious a question ... without doing more to assure the rule is being properly enforced."

The switch to the Flint

River was to be temporary, until the city could connect to a planned regional pipeline from Lake Huron. At that time, the impoverished majority-black city of nearly 100,000 residents was under control of an emergency financial manager appointed by Republican Gov. Rick Snyder.

Residents complained the river water smelled and tasted bad and was causing skin rashes and other health problems. Local officials insisted it was safe.

After tests showed high levels of lead in a home in April 2015, Miguel Del Toral, a water regulations official in EPA's Chicago office, contacted officials with Michigan's Department

Environmental Quality. Del Toral also alerted superiors at EPA who decided not to make the information public, instead prodding the state agency to act behind the scenes. After a draft of Del Toral's report was leaked, EPA's regional administrator apologized to the city.

In emails later released through public-records requests, Del Toral voiced frustration over EPA's slow pace and described the agency as a "cesspool."

State officials finally acknowledged the lead contamination in September 2015 after doctors reported high levels of lead in Flint children's blood and Virginia Tech University researchers said their testing of Flint water samples found some with lead levels meeting EPA's definition of "toxic waste."

Snyder ordered the National Guard to distribute bottled water and filters, requested federal aid and eventually accepted the resignation of his top environmental official. Flint returned to the Detroit water system.

In January 2016, the EPA notified Michigan that its actions were inadequate and ordered stronger intervention. The agency's regional administrator in Chicago, Susan Hedman, resigned the next month. The preliminary inspector

general's review later that year found the regional EPA office should have had "a greater sense of urgency" and was too deferential to the state.

Former EPA Administrator Gina McCarthy acknowledged during congressional hearings that her agency should have been more aggressive in testing the water and requiring changes but said the federal agency "couldn't get a straight answer" from Michigan officials about what was being done in Flint.

"We were strong-armed. We were misled," McCarthy said. "We were kept at arm's length. We could not do our jobs effectively."

Republican lawmakers accused McCarthy and the Obama EPA of incompetence and neglect.

Snyder ended water distribution in Flint last April, saying water quality had improved significantly. The state environmental agency this week said tests during the latest six-month monitoring showed lead levels were beneath the action threshold and better than those of some other Michigan cities.

The Michigan attorney general's office has filed criminal charges against 15 state and local officials in the Flint matter, which also has spawned numerous lawsuits.

### Fugitive caught in Jackson County

On Wednesday at approximately 5:30 a.m. the North Florida Regional Fugitive Task Force of the U.S. Marshal Service took Jacob Marquis Alexander Arnett into custody at a residence on Weddington Road in Jackson County.

According to a news release from the Jackson County Sheriff's Office, he was wanted out of Decatur County, Georgia on two counts of armed robbery, kidnapping, first degree burglary, possession of a firearm during the commission of a crime, felon in possession of a firearm, and fleeing or eluding a police officer.

Officials say he was also wanted out of Gadsden County for violation of probation and is a suspect in several armed robberies in Gadsden County.

Arnett, 22, initially refused to exit the residence when officers arrived at the home on Weddington Road, but surrendered after approximately 10 minutes once he realized he had no avenue of escape, authorities report.

He was held in the Jackson County Correctional Facility to await first appearance. He will be extradited back to the other respective jurisdictions to face charges.

Jackson County Sheriff Lou Roberts said his agency was assisted by U.S. Marshal Service, the Panama City Police Department, The Bay County Sheriff's Office, The Holmes County Sheriff's Office, U.S. Customs and Border Patrol, the Jackson Correctional K-9 Tracking Team, and Sneads Police Chief Burt McAlpin in capturing Arnett, who is listed as a resident of Mount Pleasant in Gadsden County.

### Tallahassee man charged with making false tax returns

Kenneth Alexander, 46, of Tallahassee, was arraigned Tuesday in the U.S. District Court in Tallahassee after a federal grand jury returned an indictment charging him with nine counts of preparing false tax returns, filing a false tax-related document, theft of government funds, and aggravated identity theft. The indictment was announced by Christopher P. Canova, United States Attorney for the Northern District of Florida.

The indictment alleges that Alexander, the sole shareholder of Wizard Business Center, a tax preparation business in Tallahassee, prepared and filed false tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service for various individuals between 2012 and 2016. The indictment alleges that Alexander falsely represented the taxpayers' Schedule A itemized deductions, Schedule C and E losses, and marital status.

The maximum penalty for each count of preparing false tax returns and filing a false tax-related document is three years in prison. The maximum penalty for theft of government funds is 10 years. The penalty for aggravated

identity theft is two years consecutive to any other sentence imposed. The trial is scheduled for Sept. 10 at 8:15 a.m. at the United States Courthouse in Tallahassee.

This case resulted from an investigation by the Internal Revenue Service — Criminal Investigation and the Emerald Coast Financial Crimes Task Force, which includes IRS Criminal Investigation and the Leon County Sheriff's Office, with the assistance of the Treasury Inspector General's Office for Tax Administration. Assistant United States Attorney Gary Milligan is prosecuting the case.

An indictment is an allegation by a grand jury that a defendant has committed a violation of federal criminal law and is not evidence of guilt. All defendants are presumed innocent and entitled to a fair trial, during which it will be the government's burden to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt at trial.

### Man sentenced to 27 years on child porn conviction

Nicholas E. Fogarty, 36, of Palm Beach Gardens, was sentenced to 27 years in federal prison Tuesday, after being convicted on March 13 of advertisement of child pornography and distribution of child pornography. Fogarty will also be required to register as a sex offender. The sentence was announced by Christopher P. Canova, United States Attorney for the Northern District of Florida.

During the day and a half jury trial, the government presented evidence that, beginning in June 2017, an undercover investigator in Pensacola, posing as a minor female on the social media platform Kik, identified Fogarty, who had created the Kik group "Tweenteenlove," a group that shared child pornography online. During the investigation, Fogarty instructed others to find and bring young girls to the online group. Fogarty communicated with the undercover agent online, including providing direction to the dark web, which is a hidden Internet where child pornography can be found. Upon Fogarty's arrest in southern Florida, a search of his electronic devices revealed child pornography and a search browser for the dark web. In all, between 4,000 and 5,000 images and videos of child pornography were captured from Fogarty during this investigation. Fogarty has a prior child pornography related conviction in 2014 out of Palm Beach County.

The case was investigated by the United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement Homeland Security Investigations, the Air Force Office of Special Investigations, the Boynton Beach Police Department, and the North Florida Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney David L. Goldberg.

# Four indicted in Florida shooting death of rapper XXXTentacion


FORT LAUDERDALE — A Florida grand jury has indicted four men on first-degree murder and armed robbery charges in the shooting death of emerging rap star XXXTentacion.

Broward County panel formally charged Dedrick Williams, 22; Michael Boatwright, 22; Trayvon Newsome, 20; and Robert Allen, 22, on Wednesday, court records showed.

According to a warrant filed in Boatwright's case, the car driven by XXXTentacion, whose real name was Jahseh Onfroy, was blocked by a dark-colored SUV as it was exiting the Riva Motor Sports motorcycle shop. Two masked men got out of the SUV with a gun intending to rob XXXTentacion, who had a Louis Vitton bag containing \$50,000 in cash, police said.

A struggled ensued and the 20-year-old rapper was shot multiple times by one or more gunman, who took the bag and fled. The indictment names Boatwright as the person who fatally shot XXXTentacion.

Williams was arrested two days after the shooting, and Boatwright was arrested earlier this month on an unrelated drug charge. Authorities continue to

search for Allen and Newsome.

At least one of the suspects, Williams, was seen in the store on surveillance cameras while XXXTentacion was shopping. A store clerk said Williams purchased a black neoprene mask and that he recognized Williams as a repeat customer, according to the warrant.

Williams later told police he was with others at the motorcycle shop but did not know in advance

they intended to rob the rapper. Authorities say Williams drove the SUV.

"Williams stated that he wanted to tell the truth ... Williams stated he was fearful of being labeled a snitch when he went to prison," the warrant says.

Later, police said Williams' girlfriend told them he had told her he was involved but that it was Boatwright and Newsome who carried out the actual robbery and slaying. Police also found cellphone data on Boatwright's phone indicating it was near the motorcycle shop at the time of the killing.

Other evidence includes cellphone video and photos with three of the suspects holding large amounts of \$100 bills, police said. XXXTentacion, who sported dreadlocks and facial tattoos and who pronounced his name "Ex ex ten-ta-see-YAWN," was a platinum-selling rising star who tackled issues including prejudice and depression in his songs. He also drew criticism over bad behavior and multiple arrests, including charges that he severely beat and abused his girlfriend.

Messages sent to attorneys for Boatwright and Williams weren't immediately returned. It wasn't immediately known if the other two had attorneys.

# Ohio killer spared after extent of childhood abuse revealed

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio Gov. John Kasich on Friday spared a condemned killer whose sentence was challenged after a juror came forward and said information about the extent of the inmate's tough childhood wasn't properly presented at trial.

The Republican governor commuted the sentence of death row inmate Raymond Tibbetts to life without the possibility of parole, citing "fundamental flaws" in the sentencing portion of Tibbetts' trial.

"Specifically, the defense's failure to present sufficient mitigating evidence, coupled with an inaccurate description of Tibbetts' childhood by the prosecution, essentially prevented the jury from making an informed decision about whether Tibbetts deserved the death sentence," Kasich said. The guilt of Tibbetts, 61, has

never been in doubt. He received the death sentence for stabbing Fred Hicks to death at Hicks' Cincinnati home in 1997. Tibbetts also received life imprisonment for fatally beating and stabbing his wife, 42-year-old Judith Crawford, during an argument that same day over Tibbetts' crack cocaine habit.

The 67-year-old Hicks had hired Crawford as a caretaker and allowed the couple to stay with him.

The case against Hicks seemed closed until a former juror, Ross Geiger, came across materials presented on Tibbetts' behalf to the Ohio Parole Board that documented horrific facts about Tibbetts' early years, which jurors never heard.

When Tibbetts was a boy, he and his brothers were tied to a single bed at night, were not fed properly, were thrown down stairs, had their fingers beaten with spatulas and were burned on heating reg-

isters, according to Tibbetts' application for mercy last year.

Geiger wrote Kasich in January citing his concerns and asking that Tibbetts be spared. He also testified before the parole board last month in a rare follow-up clemency hearing. The board had voted 11-1 against mercy for Tibbetts last year.

Geiger told the board that Tibbetts' upbringing was presented as a debate between his attorneys, who said his background was terrible, and prosecutors, who said it wasn't that bad.

"I was just struck and frankly upset that information that was available was not even addressed, other than in very summary fashion," Geiger told the board.

Geiger's comments didn't sway the panel, which again recommended against mercy for Tibbetts with an 8-1 vote.

Kasich's decision Friday rejected that ruling.

### ICE protesters face unlawful assembly charges

MIRAMAR — At least 17 protesters face charges after blocking a roadway outside a South Florida office of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

The Miramar Police Department said Thursday that the protesters face charges of unlawful assembly and obstructing a highway for the protest on Wednesday at a busy intersection in Miramar.

Authorities say the protesters set up chairs in the road and used their bodies to stop traffic.

The police department says hundreds of vehicles had to be diverted during the protest.

Protesters all over the nation have marched outside ICE offices to object to the Trump administration's zero-tolerance immigration policy.

### Father charged with stuffing wipes in baby's throat

TARPON SPRINGS — A Florida father is facing attempted first-degree murder charges after his 5-month-old son was found with

wipes stuffed in his throat.

Authorities in Tarpon Springs say the baby is in critical condition on a ventilator in a hospital.

The child's 32-year-old father, Michael Hurley, was being held in jail after bail was set for \$500,000.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that Hurley was at home alone with the baby when the boy's mother arrived to find Hurley holding the baby with his fingers down his throat saying he was trying to grab something but "his fingers were too big."

time she took ownership 20 years ago. But she continued volunteering, putting in bucket-loads more of sweat equity in various ways.

She did that for almost two decades without pay, but in 2013 was actually hired as a cashier. She is the face of ReStore for many customers. But recently she was promoted to also become the front-end manager. She and Husted between them now handle much of the decision-making when it comes to the store and its merchandise. That gives Smith a little more time to handle overall administrative functions, with confidence that the store is in good hands.

And she has her hands full in that

endeavor. A few years ago, the Jackson County Habitat team joined forces with Washington County Habitat, which was struggling at the time. The Habitat group was renamed Chipola Area Habitat for Humanity to reflect that connection which doubled Smith's workload.

Since then, the annual gross revenues at the Washington County Habitat store have risen from \$35,000 to \$75,000. And two houses have been built there since the partnership began. Before those two, it had been a decade since the last Habitat home had been built there.

And Smith has five houses in Jackson County that are nearing completion. All should be done in August, she thinks. Some of that work was done in Habitat's first "Women Build" event, held earlier this year and involving about 50 local

female volunteers.

Thursday night's meeting was also a time to honor three corporate sponsors. ## Town hopes lava tourism will bring economic relief

HONOLULU — Stunning images of Hawaii's erupting Kilauea volcano have captivated people around the world. But ironically it's nearly impossible for residents and visitors on the ground to see the lava — a fact that's squeezing the tourism-dependent local economy.

Big Island businesses are calling for a lava viewing site, but authorities say they're finding it difficult to set one up while keeping people safe.

The risks posed by the volcano came into sharp focus this week when lava flowing into the ocean triggered an explosion that sent a hot rock the size of a basketball crashing through a tour boat's roof. One woman broke her leg, while nearly two dozen others suffered minor burns and scrapes.

Diane Ley, Hawaii County's director of research and development, said she's been working on setting up a lava viewing site for nearly two months, consulting with federal scientists and the county's

civil defense administrator. The injuries from the tour boat only validate the county's caution, she said.

"That's a challenge — to find us a site that is safe from volcanic hazards, emissions and can afford the ability for large numbers to be able to come in and view," she said.

Still, pressures are mounting from mer-

chants, tour guides and others on the island, where tourism has dropped since Kilauea began erupting in a residential neighborhood and burning down homes in May.

Downtown Pahoa, which is just a few miles from where the volcano is pumping a river of molten rock into the ocean, has been hit particularly

hard. The small, rural town serves as a gateway to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, which is normally the state's most popular tourist attraction but has closed indefinitely because of dangers to visitors and staff.

As recently as April, travelers could watch molten rock in the park's lava lake and hike to remote spots

to see flowing lava.

State Sen. Russell Ruderman said the county needs to urgently set up a lava viewing site to bring visitors back to Pahoa.

"Our town is dying very, very fast and very, very dramatically," said Ruderman, who owns a natural foods store in Pahoa. "It's needless because if we could get the word out that

our town is open for business, we could still save it."

Currently, only helicopter and boat-tour passengers — paying about \$250 each — are able to see the lava in person.

The area where lava is bursting from the ground is under a mandatory evacuation order. Residents nearby may go to their homes, but the county restricts access for everyone else except scientists, authorities like the National Guard and a handful of escorted media.

Officials have cracked down on violators, issuing citations to more than 80 people for loitering in a restricted disaster area.

Kilauea, which has been erupting continuously for 35 years, has long attracted travelers. About 5,000 people a day descended on an official county lava viewing spot in May 1990 as molten rock slowly consumed the town of Kalapana, the Honolulu Advertiser reported. That's even though the spot offered views of cooled, not flowing, lava. County workers set aside some newly hardened rocks for tourists to touch as consolation.

## Cape-to-Connecticut ride shows progress, bumps on Greenway

BRISTOL, R.I.

After a white-knuckle trip over a bridge from Portsmouth into Bristol, which involved lifting our bicycles over concrete barriers and construction equipment, the police officer who pulled us over told us something we had already figured out.

"You shouldn't try to cross that bridge on a bicycle," he told my friend and me. "It's dangerous."

What he could not tell me was a better way, other than taking a bus, to get to the East Bay Bike Path, a safe, multi-use paved trail that runs along Narragansett Bay from Bristol to Providence.

It was second day of a four-day ride to explore by bicycle the southern New England portion of the East Coast Greenway, a planned 3,000-mile route of connected trails from Maine to Florida. More than a quarter-century into the project, long swaths are now on protected, safe trails. Others are not.

There are 386 miles of Greenway planned in southern New England, and that section is about 41 percent complete, according to Lisa Watts, a spokeswoman for the East Coast Greenway Alliance. The rest is on everything from quiet back roads to very busy four-lane thoroughfares.

"We always caution long-distance cyclists that

this is a route in development," Watts said.

I rode with Lori Riley, of the Hartford Courant, 212 miles from Cape Cod to eastern Connecticut. More than 96 miles of it was on rail trails and other bike paths featuring views of the water, old railroad bridges, ice cream shops, joggers and bicyclists. Our one flat tire came two miles from a bike shop that was adjacent to the path in Dennis, Massachusetts.

In between the trails, the riding was often on heavily trafficked roads, such as the Old Kings Highway on Cape Cod, with no shoulder. That meant cars screaming by inches from us, honking, with people yelling, "Get off the road," "This isn't the Tour de France" and worse.

Leaving the Cape meant traveling the pedestrian walkway on the Bourne Bridge over the Cape Cod Canal, and then trying to negotiate Cape-bound Friday traffic on a heavily traveled rotary.

Then came the searching. We used the mapping tool on the East Coast Greenway website to stay on course, but that's hard to do while riding. Signs pointing the way were few and usually small and hard to spot.

We passed salt marshes and windmills as we explored new bike paths on what is to become the 50-mile South Coast Bikeway system in Massachusetts.

But the GPS then took us through the heart of New

Bedford, Massachusetts. Confronted with a highway on-ramp at the end of a bridge, we were forced to walk the saddlebag-laden bikes down a long flight of stairs. That was followed by a teeth-jarring trip over downtown cobblestones and more traffic past a mall, before we figured out some back roads into Rhode Island.

While some renovated bridges have bike lanes, on the Mount Hope bridge from Portsmouth we had to lift our bikes as we squeezed past equipment and construction barriers. The police officer, who did not ticket us, said someone called because they thought we were getting ready to jump.

Once on the East Bay path, the stress disappeared with sunset views of Narragansett Bay.

The next morning, a short ride downtown from where the East Bay path ends in Providence, we found the 19-mile Washington Secondary path, which runs through Cranston, Warwick and Coventry and ends a few miles short of the Connecticut border.

Our fourth day took us home in Connecticut, mostly along the Air Line Trail from Pomfret, an unpaved stone-dust path that runs past East Hampton.

It costs an average of \$1 million per mile to build the Greenway and can take up to 20 years to complete a segment, but officials say it is worth the investment. A recent

study by the planning and design firm Alta in North Carolina showed the East Coast Greenway generates over \$90 million in total benefits annually in the Raleigh-Durham-Chapel Hill triangle.

In Connecticut, where 48 percent of the Greenway is done, several projects are have just been completed or are in the final stages, including key segments in Cheshire on the Farmington Canal trail

and in Bolton, where two bridges connecting the Hop River to the Charter Oak trail are scheduled to open in September.

Connecticut spends about \$15 million a year on its rails-to-trails pro-

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

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — A light rain in the morning that gave way to soft sunlight in the afternoon took some of the sting out of Carnoustie.

Just not all of it. Kevin Kisner found that out with one swing that erased his two-shot lead Friday in the British Open and left him tied with housemate Zach Johnson. He hit an 8-iron that only needed to go 150 yards to clear the Barry Burn in front of the 18th green. Instead, it floated out of the yellow grass to the right, bounced off the base of the rock wall that frames the winding stream and led to a double bogey.

Disappointed but not down, Kisner removed his cap behind the green and scratched his head as if he wondered what hit him.

“They call it ‘Car-nasty’ for a reason,” he said after signing for his 1-under 70. “Even when you think you’ve got it, it will jump up and bite you.”

It took a chunk out of Dustin Johnson and Justin Thomas, the Nos. 1 and 2 players in the world who won’t be around for the weekend. Johnson finished with a double bogey to miss the cut by one. Thomas made three straight double bogeys on the front nine and missed by one.

And it left a wide-open weekend on a course with a history of crazy finishes.

Zach Johnson, whose name already is on the claret jug from his play-off victory at St. Andrews three years ago, played in the morning under an umbrella and finished with a 30-foot birdie putt for a 67.

Johnson and Kisner are staying in a house of seven players — five of them major champions — and share the lead at 6-under 136.

They played on different ends of a day that started gray and ended with shadows. Scotland's unusually dry summer finally got a reprieve. There wasn't enough rain to turn brown fairways green, though it at least kept shots from rolling endlessly.

They head into a weekend with endless possibilities.

One shot behind were Tommy Fleetwood (65), Pat Perez (68) and Xander Schauffele (66). Perez was tied for the lead until he hit into a bunker on the 18th hole and took bogey. Rory McIlroy, pledging to "go down swinging" to rid himself of a bad Masters memory this year, had another 69 and was part of a large group two shots behind.

Jordan Spieth also is in the mix in his bid to take the claret jug back home to Texas. Spieth hit 8-iron through a gap in the trees for a birdie-birdie start to the back nine, and he dropped only one shot — not four like he did on Thursday — over the four closing holes at Carnoustie for a 67. He goes into the weekend just three shots back.

"Very happy to be back in the tournament," Spieth said.

Tiger Woods still has work to do after a rugged start, good recovery and then a mix of birdies and bogeys that left him stuck in neutral on a better day for scoring. Woods had another 71 and was six shots behind, with 28 players between him and the lead.

"We've been fortunate with the conditions. It hasn't blown yet," Kisner said. "I think it will blow this weekend and make it even more difficult. Who knows what's going to happen? We're going to just keep trying to get after it."

Carnoustie was a far different test from the opening round, when sunshine baked the fairways crisp and it was difficult to figure out how far the ball was going when it hit the ground. The steady, light rain made them a little slower and a lot more predictable. The greens held shots a little better. Strategies changed. Slightly

softer conditions meant power players who were driving beyond the trouble hit more irons off the tee, and shorter players hit more drivers and fairway metals.

Kisner hit 5-iron off the first tee Thursday. He hit 3-wood Friday.

"Hit the same club as the approach," Kisner said. "That's a pretty dramatic difference in distance."

Kisner is a newcomer to what amounts to an American fraternity house at golf's oldest championship the last three years. Four of them are among the top 11 on the leaderboard going into the weekend with Spieth and Rickie Fowler, who shot 69 and was at 3-under 139.

As for talking shop after work? Nothing is off limits.

"Everybody will tell their horror stories and good stories, and we'll laugh and eat a big old meal and sit around and watching something stupid," Kisner said.

Thomas will have one of the horror stories.

The PGA champion took three to get out of a pot bunker from the fairway on the par-5 sixth hole, making the first of three straight double bogeys. Johnson became the first No. 1 player to miss the cut since Luke Donald in 2011, and it was the second straight that the top two players in the world ranking missed the cut in a major.

The way golf has been going, it would be reasonable to see the name "Johnson" atop the leaderboard and assume it belonged to the top-ranked player.

But not necessarily at the British Open.

"I've been called Dustin many times," Zach Johnson said. "I doubt he's been called Zach that many times."

Johnson overcame a bogey on the opening hole with birdies on the third and fourth holes, and he never put himself under too much pressure the rest of the way.

Already a two-time major champion with titles at St. Andrews and Augusta National, the 42-year-old from Iowa now has made the cut 12 straight times in the British Open, a streak that began at Carnoustie in 2007. His low ball flight, grinding nature and good putting give him the right ingredients.

Kisner is no stranger to pressure at a major. He had at least a share of the lead after each of three rounds at the PGA Championship last summer until a bogey on the 70th hole ruined his chances.

"Hopefully, I'll have another chance to prove that I can do it here," Kisner said.

## Woods has mixed bag and another 71

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Tiger Woods didn't entirely hurt his chances in the British Open.

Better yet, he didn't hurt anyone in the gallery.

Woods still walked away Friday realizing he made it a little tougher on the weekend at Carnoustie if he wants to end a decade without winning a major. A rugged start, a strong recovery, a few putts for birdie, a few he missed for par, and it added to an even-par 71.

"I could have cleaned up the round a little bit," he said.

He was tied for 29th, six strokes behind leaders Zach Johnson and Kevin Kisner.

The wildest moment on a wet day in Scotland came on the second hole, when Woods hit his drive well to the right on the side of a dune. The grass was deep enough that it was certain to twist the

club on impact. Woods asked the gallery to move back because he would have to start it to the right with the golf ball well above his feet.

The shot came out hot and right at them. There was no evidence it hit anyone — no one was hurt, anyway — because the ball at least kept going in the rough.

Woods was thankful.

"I was trying to play for the grass to wrap the shaft around there and hit it left, and I was just trying to hold the face open as much as I possibly could. It grabbed the shaft and smothered it," he said. "I was very, very fortunate that I got far enough down there where I had a full wedge into the green."

He still made bogey. He made another bogey on the next hole, and just like that he was on the cut line.

Woods answered with a pair of birdies, and it was give-and-take the rest of the way.

The only time he was under par for his round was after a 5-iron easily cleared the Spectacle bunkers on the par-5 14th and rolled onto the green to a front pin, leaving him an 18-foot eagle putt. He missed and made birdie.

Two holes later, he found a pot bunker right of the par-3 16th and made bogey.

And on the final hole, he hit an approach he judged perfectly to about 10 feet pin-high. He missed.

"I played a little bit better yesterday," Woods said of his matching scores for the opening two rounds. "Today wasn't quite as good, but I finally birdied the par 5."

He was six shots behind when he finished and figured the margin would be a little wider, which it was. Woods and the rest of the early starters faced an entire round of light rain, while it cleared out for the afternoon.

"It will be a pretty

packed leaderboard, and I'm certainly right there in it," Woods said.

Typical of his first full season since 2015 because of back surgeries, the challenge is more the number of players in front of him than the deficit he faces. This is his 12th tournament of the year, and Woods has been among the top 10 just once — the Valspar Championship in March — going into the weekend.

The one shot Woods would like to have back was the 13th, where he made a 15-foot putt for par. He left it well short, behind a bunker, and had to play a pitch over the top of the bunker and onto the green.

The pin was toward the center of the green. Woods had a 9-iron. He expected better.

"There were a few shots I hit poorly out there. That was one of them," Woods said. "I didn't really draw a bad lie on the tee box."

## Cut down: 3 of top 5 players to miss weekend

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Justin Rose made his only birdie of the day when he needed it the most, sinking an 18-footer on the final hole to make the cut Friday in the British Open.

Other top players weren't as fortunate.

Three of the world's top five players missed the cut, including top-ranked Dustin Johnson and No. 2 Justin Thomas. Masters champion Patrick Reed nearly went home after making double bogey on No. 15 and bogey on 16, but parred the final two finishing holes to make the cut on the number at 3-over-par.

Jon Rahm didn't come close, despite an opening 69. Rahm shot a second round 78, but the birdie on the tough 18th hole was little consolation for his week's work.

"At least I can say I made birdie to that pin on the 18th at Carnoustie," said Rahm, who is ranked fifth in the world. "Besides that, things didn't happen. I can't give an explanation really. I don't know."

Rose, who is ranked No. 3, came to the 18th hole needing a birdie to survive the cut. He got a big cheer from the crowd after rolling in his putt to avoid heading home.

"Right now my thoughts are I'm delighted," Rose said. "Twenty minutes

ago, I was not very delighted."

Rose said he thought 3 over was going to be the cut line, and it was. Now he's got an early tee time Saturday and an outside chance to make his way up the leaderboard.

"Just got to try to turn it around for the weekend," he said. "Be out there fairly early tomorrow and certainly try to get into the red as soon as I can and try to make a run."

Johnson, meanwhile, never recovered from the triple bogey on the 18th

hole in his first round. He shot 76-72 to miss the cut by three shots.

It was just as tough for Thomas, who bogeyed two of the last three holes to miss the cut by a shot.

For Rahm, it was an abrupt end to a week in which many thought he might contend for his first major championship. He struggled to explain how he shot the 78 that sent him home.

"Right now I'm not in any mental state to think about what happened, to be honest," he said.


Rahm said there is a fine line between contending and missing the cut in most major championships, when a few stray shots can make the difference.

"I don't think I ever had a grasp on it," he said. "It's just sad. You never know in a major. Once you make the cut, you can have a good weekend. You get the right side of the draw, and you're playing some good weather, and you might be able to make some shots back and make it happen. You never know."



# Streaks are measure of stability, ability

As this NASCAR season has taken shape, the talk has trended toward a dominant trio of racers. So far, the three drivers have won 14 of 19 events — Kevin Harvick has won five, Kyle Busch five, Martin Truex Jr. four.

In the latter laps of last weekend's race at Kentucky Speedway, won handily by Truex, one observer drolly tweeted that if anybody watching the telecast had chosen the phrase "Big Three" as a drinking-game trigger, all the players would be inebriated by then.

In contrast to the strength of the Big Three, consider the relative weakness of a couple of drivers who could be known as the Formerly Reliable Two — Jimmie Johnson and Denny Hamlin.

Part of the reason the Big Three have had room to win so many races is the absence from victory lane of Johnson and Hamlin. The two of them represent two of the three longest winning-years streaks in NASCAR's premier Cup Series.

Johnson, whose seven championships and 83 wins put him squarely in the conversation about stock car racing's greatest driver, has won races in 16 straight seasons. That's two years shy of Richard Petty's record of 18 years.

Next among active drivers is Busch. His streak is intact at 14.

Hamlin's streak is in danger of stalling at 12 seasons, third longest among active drivers.

The significance of such a streak is debat-

able. It often has much to do with the stability of a driver's team. But even for drivers such as Johnson and Hamlin who have never switched car owners, winning year after year attests to the ability to adjust to the inevitable changes in car models and NASCAR's sometimes fluid rules.

Here are a few notes about the drivers with the longest streaks.

Petty, whose 18-year run started in 1961 and ended in '77, came awfully close to a 22-year streak. In 1978, Petty failed to win but had 11 top-five finishes, three of them second-place finishes. And he won races in each of the next three seasons.

David Pearson's 17-year streak started in 1964. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about the run by the Silver Fox was that in many of those seasons he was on a limited schedule. The most stunning example: In 1973, driving for the Virginia-based Wood Brothers team, he entered 18 of that season's 28 events and won 11 times.

Johnson has won at least two races in each of his 16 years leading up to this year. But he's on a 42-race losing string, the longest such drought of his career.

He has two top-five finishes this year — a third at Bristol and a fifth at Charlotte, but in

neither of those races was he a threat to win.

Hamlin has been more of a contender this season. He has six top-five finishes, and in at least one race, pit-road penalties ruined what may have been a shot at victory.

Johnson is tied with Ricky Rudd and Rusty Wallace at 16 years. Rudd's streak may be my favorite. He drove three car makes for four owners (including himself for the last five years of the streak).

Rudd won just 23 races in his career, so he stretched 20 wins to cover his 16-year streak — 12 single-win seasons, four two-win seasons. One reason he kept the streak alive was that he was among the best road-course racers of his day. In 1988, for example, his lone win came at Watkins Glen, one of only two road courses on the schedule.

Tony Stewart, Darrell Waltrip and Dale Earnhardt Sr. are next with 15-year streaks. Stewart and Earnhardt started their streaks their rookie seasons, as did Johnson, Hamlin and Busch.

On the other hand, Petty, Pearson, Jeff Gordon, Waltrip and Bobby Allison — the series' top five all-time winners — had winless rookie years.

Finally, a salute to Cale Yarborough. He was 32 years old and a veteran of 199 races in parts of 15 seasons with 14 victories before he started his 13-year winning streak in 1973. The last five years of the streak he was running only a little more than half the races.



## Inspector Morse continues his investigations in 'Endeavour'

Literary detectives are right at home in PBS's "Masterpiece," especially the British ones. When "Sherlock," the hit series about the legendary Sherlock Holmes, made its way to this side of the Atlantic, it fit right in among the channel's other British imports, and Det. Const. Endeavour Morse has done the same.

British crime drama "Endeavour" returns to PBS with a new episode on Sunday, July 22. The series follows the most recent television incarnation of Endeavour Morse, a detective popularized by author Norman Colin Dexter's Inspector Morse novels. Sunday's episode sees Det. Sgt. Morse, portrayed by actor Shaun Evans ("The Last Weekend"), continue to investigate an assassination attempt in Oxford after his probe is unexpectedly cut short, while his partner Fred

Thursday (Roger Allam, "V for Vendetta," 2005) looks into a related case.

"Endeavour" is not the first TV adaptation of Dexter's famous detective, though it is chronologically the first. Set in the 1960s, "Endeavour" is a prequel to the long-running detective drama, "Inspector Morse" which ran on British television from 1987 to 1993 and continued airing specials until 2000. A spinoff of "Inspector Morse," called "Lewis," was

created in 2006 and centered on Robert Lewis (Kevin Whatley, "The English Patient," 1996), Morse's sergeant from the original show. The current series has seen Morse begin as a young, disillusioned constable about to quit the force until he is taken under the wing of veteran Det. Thursday, who sees his potential. Under his tutelage, Morse thrives as he successfully investigates the crimes of Oxford and eventually becomes a sergeant after a long road toward passing his exams.

Evans certainly can relate to his character's rise through the ranks as he quickly found success as an actor once he put his mind to the task. He began appearing on stage and in film after making the decision to act at a young age, telling Express Sunday, "I just thought, 'I think I will do that.' That's why I feel quite lucky that it's always been quite clear to me what I should do." One of Evans' first roles was in the comedy series "Teachers," which was also one of the first roles for current "The Late Late Show" host James Corden. The two both later starred in the biopic "Telstar: The Joe Meek Story" in 2008.

Evans has spent more than 15 years stacking his filmography with varied roles in British television, like those in miniseries "The Take," legal drama "Silk" and TV movie "The Scandalous Lady W," making him a natural choice to take over such an iconic role as Morse in "Endeavour."

Evans is not the only "Endeavour" actor bringing a wealth of screen and stage experience to his performance in the show. Allam is one of those British actors that you've seemingly seen in everything. He has appeared in episodes of notable crime dramas "Midsomer Murders," "Waking the Dead" and "Foyle's War" as well as on film in movies such as "Pirates of the Caribbean: On Stranger Tides" (2011) and "The Lady in the Van" (2015). He notably portrayed Illyrio Mopatis in "Game of Thrones," and in a time-bending appearance, he played character

Denis Cornford in an episode of "Inspector Morse."

The long list of memorable film credits attributed to him is something of a new development in his career as Allam began his screen work rather late. Not initially predisposed to building a career on screen, he told the Irish Times, "I had to make a conscious decision to do more on screen ... I never thought it was something I could actually do because it wasn't obvious to me how it was made." Allam began his acting career in a feminist theater troupe in the 1970s before spending a decade with the Royal Shakespeare Company. Though proud of his film and television work, Allam admitted to The Guardian that his greatest achievement was performing as Falstaff in the 2010 production of "Henry IV" at Shakespeare's Globe in London.

Credit for the success of "Endeavour" is not solely due to its performances, compelling though they are. Screenwriter Russell Lewis has written every single episode of the series since

its debut. Though now a prolific television writer, Lewis began his career as a child actor performing in films and on stage in a 1972 production of "Young Winston" directed by Richard Attenborough. Lewis gave up acting to pursue music before joining fringe theater to begin his writing career. Lewis has written episodes of both "Inspector Morse" and "Lewis" and adapted Agatha Christie's 1961 novel "The Pale Horse" for an episode of "Agatha Christie's Marple."

As proof of the series' popularity, the current fifth season has expanded to six episodes from the four that previous seasons had, an expansion that's meant many sleepless nights for the man helming the script. The pace apparently not only works for Lewis but for viewers as well, as the popularity of "Endeavour" has already secured a sixth season, to begin sometime next year.

Don't miss Morse's latest investigative adventure in a new episode of "Endeavour," airing Sunday, July 22, on PBS.

season premiere, she had her band over before a concert for homemade snacks that included orange barbecue steak kabobs, cornbread and chili bites and a charred lemon ricotta dip.





**Q: Have "Zoo" and "The Last Ship" been canceled?**

A: Yes and ... sort of. It's all bad news for "Zoo," which got the axe last fall after three increasingly unsuccessful seasons on CBS.

The bad news for "The Last Ship" is that TNT canceled it in May, but the good news is it still has an entire season in the hopper that the cable channel will air later this year.

The upcoming final season of "The Last Ship" will be its fifth, which is a pretty respectable run for any TV show. And the producers and cast seem to have been told ahead of time that it would be canceled, which is a bit of extra good news for viewers.

I say they "seem" to have been told because when shooting finished on the fifth season last fall (months before the cancellation announcement), series co-star Travis Van Winkle posted on Instagram that it was a "series wrap." The producers made him take down the post shortly afterward.

The reason this is good news is because it means the show won't end in a cliffhanger — season 5 will finally provide some resolution to the sci-fi plot of a mysterious plague wiping out humanity. There's a little less intrigue about the end of "Zoo." The show started strong in the ratings (well, as strong as a summer show can be — they never do as well as fall and winter shows), but it dropped pretty steadily from there. And it was pretty expensive to make — net-

works rarely do scripted shows over the summer because they're pricier than reality TV shows and, again, they're competing for smaller audiences.

There's even a tiny bit of good news here, though: one of the reasons CBS went ahead on an expensive show in the summer is because it cut a deal with Netflix ahead of time to allow the streaming service to offer each season shortly after it aired on CBS. That means what there is of "Zoo" can still be found online. And its off-the-wall plot about animals going mad makes it pretty rewatchable.

**Q: How scripted was "Supernanny"?**

A: To some degree it depends on who you ask, but the consensus answer seems to be "not as much as you'd think."

"Supernanny" was a reality TV show that originated on the U.K.'s Channel 4 but was reproduced for various markets. The U.S. version imported not only the format but the nanny herself: Jo Frost. It featured stories of families whose kids' bad behavior pushed them to the desperate end of asking a reality show nanny for help.

The families and their problems were certainly real. There was proof of this in the number of times the families subsequently ended up in the news, such as when one family's kids burned their house down, and the time Frost reported a family to the Department of Children and Family Services.

As for the actual, on-screen interactions between Frost and the families, this is where the staging comes in. For example, Channel 4 board member Roger Graef said publicly that children were often

"forced" to cry for the camera, in the British version at least.

However, Dylan Young, one of the children featured on an episode of the U.S. version, went on the popular social media site Reddit to talk about his experiences, and he said that it wasn't a matter of scripting so much as provoking.

"There were situations they would put me in just to get a rise from my brother and sister."

Because the family's problems were real, he said, it was just a matter of reproducing the things they were going through for television.

"A lot of it was scripted — it is a TV show, after all — but at the same time they just basically followed us around like we were living our everyday lives."

Five years later, another great director, Rob Reiner, was making the biopic "LBJ," and he turned again to Donovan and his eternally babyish face, this time to play JFK.

Of course, it hasn't just been Kennedys since Donovan's show "Burn Notice" ended in 2013. He took another crack at series television in 2016 with "Shut Eye," an oddball crime drama that only lasted a season on the online Hulu channel. He also did an arc in the critically acclaimed cable drama "Fargo."

Back on the big screen, his biggest non-Kennedy role has been as DEA agent Steve Forsing in 2015's "Sicario" and this year's sequel, "Sicario 2: Day of the Soldado."


