MARIANNA — In September, Main Street Marianna had set spending priorities for the coming year in the town's Community Development Area. Those recommendations were able to help some of those approved by the CRA board, which is made up of the Mari-

Iconic downtown building will be back



ould you have retired at age 40 if you could have? "FIRE," an acronym for "Financial Independence, Retire Early," is a movement that crunches numbers for workers engaged in what is termed radical saving. The theory is that you work for about 20 years, bank and invest 50% of your paycheck, and by age 35 or 40 you enjoy the financial security to say "Adios!" forever to the working world.

I admire anyone with the discipline to save a significant amount of each paycheck, regardless of the investor's ultimate financial goal. And as we all know, the sooner we save and put our money to work, the more we

benefit from compounding. There are, of course, a couple of potential hurdles for young workers following the FIRE philosophy. The major one is the possibility that another large market downturn akin to the Great Recession can derail their investment plan. Or, annual returns simply might not match their expectations. Also, if you stop paying into Social Security at age 40, your annual benefit will suffer significantly when you reach your official retirement age. And you'll need to carefully guard against trivial consump-

tion, because you'll likely be spending down your assets over the remainder of your life.

FEMA offers housing assistance tips

FEMA is working closely with the State of Florida to help survivors recover from Hurricane Michael. Renters and homeowners must register with FEMA to be considered for disaster housing assistance, which dwelling is uninhabitable. FEMA temporary housing assistance is a grant and does not have to be repaid.

What type of housing assistance best fits your situ-

Rental Assistance

Rental Assistance provides temporary financial help for adequate rental housing during ongoing repairs to your damaged dwelling, or if you need to find permanent housing in another location. Since rental resources and housing may be limited in some areas, you may have to look outside vour immediate community.

Transitional Sheltering Assistance

On a case-by-case basis, FEMA may pay for lodging at participating hotels term housing or finish renters when repairs take

repairs to their damaged longer to complete. residence. You must be a disaster assistance applicant in Bay, Gulf or Jackson counties without a place to live to be considered for

Direct Housing

Because of extensive damage to local housing and the number of people affected, Direct Temporary Housing has been approved for Bay, Calhoun, Gadsden, Gulf and Jackson counties.

The state of Florida and FEMA have approved Direct Temporary Housing in the following ways:

» RVs may be used when there is a housing need of six months or less. RVs may be placed in commercial parks or on approved private sites.

» Manufactured Housing Units (MHUs) may be used as a longer-term solution while survivors find long- for both homeowners and

» Multi-Family Lease and Repair involves FEMA repairing and making improvements in existing multifamily housing, working with owners to make more short-term lodging available for sur-Direct Temporary Hous- vivors. Apply with FEMA Assistance, Transitional Sheltering Assistance or Direct Housing Assistance

» You may apply online at DisasterAssistance.gov or by calling the disaster assistance helpline at 800621-3362 (voice, 711 or VRS) or 800-462-7585 for TTY users.

» When registering for disaster assistance, you will be asked to provide information about the damage to your dwelling. A scheduled FEMA inspection will verify if your home is unsafe, uninhabitable or inaccessible.

» FEMA cannot duplicate assistance received from your insurance company.

» Additional phone interviews may be needed to determine if you qualify for housing assistance. Those approved for housing assistance must demonstrate an ongoing effort to find long-term housing and that they remain eligible.

People, including farmers and ranchers, whose homes were damaged or destroyed may qualify for help from FEMA. To find out who might be eligible, visit DisasterAssistance.gov or call 800-

Disaster assistance may be available through other federal agencies to businesses for damaged business property or economic losses as a direct result of a presidentially declared disaster. Farmers

and ranchers in Jackson, Bay, Calhoun, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Holmes, Leon, Liberty, Taylor, Wakulla, and Washington counties may be eligible.

The USDA Farm Service Agency make low-interest disaster loans to provide working capital and to repair or replace damaged property not covered by insurance. For more information and county

A Pentagon program involving insects

magine if vast fields of corn or soybeans, the bounty of United States agriculture, faced sudden death, withering because of disease, pests, weather or a deliberate assault on the food supply by another country. Now imagine that a fleet of insects could save the plants by infecting them with a virus, changing their genetic makeup to improve their resiliency, all in one growing season. This is not entirely a fantasy but the goal of an unusual Pentagon research effort- still in the laboratory- that could one day have enormous humanitarian benefits.

Five European researchers have posed a question that deserves an answer: Is this technology capable of being used for destructive purposes? Could the insects be turned into germ carriers that might just as easily destroy a food supply? The researchers' concern, expressed in Science magazine, is that the insects could become "a new class of biological weapon" and violate an international treaty against them.

The object of their concern is a \$45 million research effort called "Insect Allies," run by the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency, or DARPA, announced in November 2016 and expected to take four years. The end goal will be to conduct large, contained greenhouse demonstrations in which maize and tomato plants are infected by viruses transported by insects such as leafhoppers, whiteflies and aphids.

The hope is that viruses could be precisely tailored using sophisticated tools to deliver a specific result in the plant, far more quickly than, say, attempting to stimulate changes across generations of plant growth. DARPA has been home for decades to such blue-sky research missions, with long odds but high reward. "Insect Allies" might wind up in the agency's dustbin but, if it works, could be of significant benefit to mankind.

Without question, the European skeptics are right to raise questions about this dual-use research, meaning the program could be adapted, in theory, for malign intent. But much research in biology is dual-use by its very nature. Research facilities that produce lifesaving drugs and therapies can be used to create harmful agents and weapons. In the United States, a good amount of attention has been focused in recent years on oversight, including rules for government-funded work. (And there are legitimate concerns, such as earlier this year when researchers in Canada assembled bits of genetic material to resurrect a cousin of the virus that causes smallpox. It should not have been attempted.) Globally, the Biological and Toxin Weapons Convention of 1975 prohibits the research, development or deployment of germ weapons or their delivery systems, though it has rather weak enforcement mechanisms.

The skeptics say on their website that they worry the DARPA program could be "easily weaponized." That seems a stretch. No one can ever be sure that bad actors won't attempt something foolish, but fear should not paralyze a research program of such large potential. The best antidote to these concerns is rigorous $% \left\{ \mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right\} =\mathbf{r}^{\prime}$ oversight, transparency and regulation, which DARPA argues it has put in place. The right course is to proceed, with caution and

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

Scaramucci says Trump lies for a purpose

ormer White House com-for-a-few-days Anthony Scaramucci is very upset that CNN ran a headline Wednesday quoting him calling President Donald Trump a "liar." So when he was on Bloomberg TV the next day, he decided to clarify.

"Yes, the president is speaking mistruths," Scaramucci said Thursday after accusing the network of pursuing "clickbait." "Yes, the president is lying. He's doing it intentionally to incite certain people, which would include left-leaning journalists and most of the left-leaning politicians."

Scaramucci added: "He's an intentional liar; it's very different from just being a liar liar."

O . . . kay?

Points for honesty. This is a former White House communications director admitting that his ex-boss, the president of the United States, is in fact a prolific liar and someone who wields lies for political gain. That's no small thing.

But Scaramucci is also drawing a weird distinction. A lie is, definitionally, an intentional act. Saving someone is an "intentional liar" is redundant. If you don't know what you are saying is false, it's not actually

dia, including The Washington Post, continues to decline to label Trump's false statements as "lies." It's generally impossible to prove Trump knew better when he said the many false things he's said. Perhaps he is simply living in an elaborately constructed fantasy or doesn't grasp basic facts (which I've argued might be worse than being a liar!) -- and you don't write what you can't prove.

Scaramucci's main point, then, seems to be that Trump's lies are deliberate — as part of a strategy. He's basically arguing that Trump lies for a purpose — to goad his opponents into overreacting — and that this is somehow better than other kinds of lying. It's not like Trump has little or no control over his lying. It's that he's doing it proactively.

All of this seems quite likely. Trump, whatever you think of him, is a savvy media operator. He will often say controversial things in just such a way as to

allow himself plausible deniability, inviting tough coverage while giving himself an out. He has built a hugely loyal base, and a big part of that has been stoking feuds with the already much-hated media, often by saying so many false things that reporters are forced to cover them endlessly. Trump has seized upon the media's obsession with facts (which it is their job to pursue, first and foremost) to prop up an extremely convincing boogeyman.

But it's also quite a commentary on our political day and age when one of the president's former aides and biggest promoters feels the need to argue that the president's lies are actually smart lies. Scaramucci says Trump's base is in on the joke and views the media as an overzealous "hall monitor."

That might well be the case, but I don't think it's nearly as much of a mystery to the press as Scaramucci suggests. And if the president truly views lying as such a weapon. and so much of the country views it simply as the price of "owning the libs," that's a pretty sad state of affairs.

Democrats gave Trump an opening on immigration

resident Donald Trump certainly knows how to direct attention where he wants it. When he raised the idea of issuing an executive order to end birthright citizenship for the children of illegal immigrants, it became a top news story. Because of these remarks, and other provocative comments from members of his party about immigration, the change in Republican attitudes on the issue since George W. Bush's pro-immigration presidency is obvious to all.

But there has been a major, if lower-profile, shift on the Democratic side as well. You can see it in the polls. In 2005, an NBC/Wall Street Journal poll found Democrats evenly divided about immigration, with 45 percent saying it strengthened the country and 44 percent saying it weakened it. By 2017, a huge 81 percent majority said it strengthened the country and only 16 percent dissented.

As is often the case, the evolution of Democratic attitudes can also be seen by tracking Hillary Clinton's comments over the years. When she first ran for president, from 2006 through 2008, she was careful to take a moderate tack. She opposed giving driver's licenses to illegal immigrants, came out for "tougher employer sanctions" to deter the hiring of illegal immigrants, and toggled between calling them "illegal" and "undocumented" immigrants.

During her second run, under pressure from Bernie Sanders, she came out for driver's licenses and apologized for using the term "illegal immigrants." Talk of employer sanctions fell away. (Sanders himself, by the way, has also "evolved" on immigration.)

Both conviction and strategy propelled the Democratic

change. As conservative Democrats have become conservative Republicans, there were fewer and fewer voters and politicians inside their coalition inclined toward restraint.

Many Democrats became convinced, as well, that a strong pro-immigration stand could help them win elections because it would appeal to Hispanics, a growing share of the electorate. The white workingclass voters whom that stand might alienate were, in contrast, a shrinking share.

At the same time, support for immigration became more and more associated with cherished values such as tolerance, openness and opposition to racism; support for restrictions on it, with intolerance, closed-mindedness and bigotry. The familiar dynamic of polarization also took hold: The issue became a mark of distinction between the parties, and a desire to crack down on illegal immigration and cut legal immigration became something Democrats linked with their partisan en-

One way of reading the data is that Democrats have led public opinion toward greater support for immigration. Independents and Republicans, too, became more likely to regard it as a net plus for the country between 2005 and 2017. Their shift was, however, much smaller than the Democratic one.

Democrats may, however, have moved too far for their own good. The public still shows some ambivalence. Only a minority of Americans wants an increase in immigration levels.

While most Americans favor granting legal status to illegal immigrants who have put down roots and behaved well here, some members of that majority doubtless fear that a continuing refusal to enforce the law means that one amnesty will be followed by more. Americans are also open to combining an amnesty with some of the changes that Trump wants, such as ending the visa lottery designed to increase diversity.

Democrats also seem to be failing to make the favorable trade between the white working class and Hispanics that they had expected. For some voters, the new rhetoric, which emphasizes the harshness of deportation and downplays the necessity of enforcement, signals indifference to the rule of law and to their opinions. The abandonment of the old, more balanced approach has lent credibility to Trump's claim that Democrats favor "open borders."

The president has used the opening Democrats have given him to push for policies that are also out of step with public opinion. Most Americans do not approve of his job performance on immigration. Even more disliked the separation of families at the border. Support for birthright citizenship seems to have risen in recent years.


The debate earlier this year over extending legal status to people who came here illegally as minors showed the costs of this polarization. Trump demanded that a wish list of restrictionist policies, including a cut in legal immigration, be included in any deal. Influential Democrats balked at coupling an amnesty with any enforcement measures.

The public seems to want immigration policies that are hardheaded without being hardhearted. Neither of our political parties, at the moment, seems interested in offering them.

Greyhound racing to phase out by 2021

FORT LAUDERDALE — Florida voters decided to phase out greyhound racing in the state by 2021, meaning thousands of dogs will soon need new homes.

The state voted 69 to 31 percent Tuesday to pass Amendment 13, which bans the sport beginning on Jan. 1, 2021. It is an overwhelming defeat for an industry already in decline, with 50 tracks closing nationally over the past 30 years because of shrinking crowds and accusations that dogs are mistreated.

Advocates for the ban say many of Florida's 8,000 racing dogs will now likely be adopted, as usually happens when they leave the sport, though some may be transferred to othwill remain legal.

Florida's 11 dog tracks constitute almost twothirds of those remaining nationally. When they close, the sport may be too small to survive long term. Two tracks remain in West Virginia and one each in ing.

Principal accused of taking \$900 from disabled 9-year-old

LAND O'LAKES — A Florida elementary school principal is accused of stealing \$900 from a mentally disabled 9-year-old.

The Tampa Bay Times reports 50-year-old Edward John Abernathy was arrested Thursday and charged with grand theft. A Pasco County Sheriff's Office release says deputies were told the child brought \$2,100 of his parents' money to Connerton Elementary School in Land O'Lakes in October.

It says teachers told deputies they found the cash, counted it and locked it in the principal's office. It says an investigation showed Abernathy only gave the student's mother \$1,200 when she went to pick up the cash, pocketing the rest.

Pasco County schools Superintendent Kurt **Browning says Abernathy** will be placed on paid administrative leave.

Man accused in hospital room killing too ill to stand trial

MIAMI — A psychiatric patient accused of killing his roommate at a Miami Beach hospital has been ordered too mentally unstable to stand trial.

A Miami issued the ruling on Tuesday, meaning 25-year-old Andre Brown will be sent to a state psychiatric hospital to rehabilitate. He's accused of beating and strangling 55-year-old Alejandro Ortega in May 2016 inside a room at Mount Sinai Medical Center.

Brown's attorney Stacy Marczak tells the Miami Herald that they're "looking forward to competency being regained and getting this case to trial."

Court records say Laurent Marc-Antoine Jean Maubert-Cayla pleaded guilty in Miami federal court this week to misconduct or neglect of a ship officer that resulted in the death of an individual. His sentencing is scheduled for Jan. 10.

Court records say Maubert-Cayla chartered the motor yacht to seven passengers in April. Officials say the boat, captained by Mauricio Alvarez, stopped in Biscayne Bay, between Miami and Miami Beach, and some of the passengers went swimming. The complaint says Alvarez engaged the engines at some point, and one of the swimmers was killed by the propeller. Alvarez didn't have a U.S. captain's

Alvarez has also pleaded guilty in the case.

Trump blames mental illness in California bar massacre

The Associated Press

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — As investigators worked to figure out why an ex-Marine slaughtered 12 people at a country music bar, President Donald Trump on Friday blamed mental illness, describing the gunman as "a very sick puppy" who had "a lot of problems."

Investigators have not commented on a motive for the rampage or whether mental illness played a role.

But neighbors reported hearing frequent loud fights between Ian David Long and his mother, one of them so extreme they called police in April, and authorities at the time worried that the 28-year-old Afghanistan war veteran might have post-traumatic stress disorder. However, a mental health specialist concluded there were no grounds to have him involuntarily committed for psychiatric evaluation.

On Wednesday night, the former machine gunner, dressed all in black with his hood pulled up, opened fire with a handgun at the Borderline Bar & Grill during college night, then apparently killed himself as scores of police officers

closed in. The dead included sheriff's Sgt. Ron Helus, a 29-year veteran nearing retirement who responded to reports of shots fired and was gunned down as he entered the bar. He and other first responders "ran toward danger," Sheriff Geoff Dean said at a vigil Thursday, calling Helus a hero.

The dead also included a man who had survived last year's massacre in

Las Vegas, Telemachus Orfanos, 27. "I don't want prayers. I don't want thoughts," said his mother, Susan Schmidt-Orfanos. "I want those bastards in Congress — they need to pass gun control so no one else has a child that doesn't come home."

Dani Merrill, who escaped from the Borderline bar when the shooting began, had also attended the 2017 Las Vegas country music festival where a gunman in a highrise hotel opened fire and killed 58 people. She was appalled that such bloodshed had come to her com-

"I'm super upset that it happened in our home, and I feel awful for the families that have to go through this," Merrill said at the vigil.

At the White House, Trump touted his efforts to fund work on PTSD among veterans. He declined to engage on questions on whether the nation needs stricter gun

"I was concerned because I knew he had been in the military," Tom Hanson said.

About 18 months ago, Don and Effie MacLeod heard "an awful argument" and what he believes was a gunshot from the Longs' property. Don MacLeod said he did not call police but avoided speaking with Ian Long.

"I told my wife, 'Just be polite to him. If he talks, just acknowledge him, don't go into conversation with him," Don MacLeod said.

were called to the scene around 2:28 p.m. Thursday and found Brooks underneath the then-stopped



Though the family is making progress to the home on their own, Ronald said he feels abandoned by FEMA and his insurance.

"We made it out alive and the rest we can make good again in time," he said. "But, the trouble is we're not getting any help. FEMA won't help us, I mean no help because we only have a little bit of renters insurance — they won't help us. I've never heard of such a thing. People don't help people here. Other than the churches that come

around, they're a blessing." Numbers released by FEMA indicate many are being helped, although it may be difficult to reach all residents affected. According to FEMA, 10,535 residents have registered for federal assistance and \$9,941,407 in individual aid has been approved. FEMA said more than 2,000 residents have visited the agency's disaster recovery center in Marianna.

Just down the street, businesses are suffering losses as well.

Most stores and restaurants have power and are slowly inching their way back to life, but Chevron owner Mohammed Shahjahnn feels there is no hope in sight.

The storm nearly destroyed the entire structure that now looks like a scene from a post-apocalyptic movie. However, the convenience shop of the gas station still remains, and is currently Shahjahnn's only source of income for the foreseeable future.

All four of the gas pumps at the station are out of service, and he said insurance payouts are diminishing Shahjahnn's chances of ever recovering in the same way surrounding businesses will.

"We are still struggling because this is the busiest choice for gas in Marianna. They advertise us on the





Or you can say this is bad publicity. Well, everybody's spelling the name right - N-A-S-C-A-R — but this is still bad public-

With only one race left to determine three of the final four drivers eligible to win the

championship in the season finale, NASCAR announced

on Wednesday that this year's dominant driver, Kevin Harvick, has been denied an automatic final four spot because his team cheated in last Sunday's race in Texas, which he won.

Harvick can still make the championship cut, but he has to earn it at Sunday's race in Phoenix. His Texas win still counts in Harvick's and NASCAR's statistics. But it no longer locks him into that final four berth, as would have been the case had he not been driving an illegally aided car.

That's the way the sanctioning body traditionally does things. Whoever wins a race forever remains the winner, but said winner may be docked points, fined and otherwise punished for violations discovered during inspections after the event.

Those postrace inspections include a check at the track, then closer scrutiny

after the car has been hauled to NASCAR's Research & Development Center in Concord, N.C. That's where Harvick's Ford was found to have an unapproved spoiler.

The spoiler — the metal flare affixed to the car's trunk to provide critical aerodynamic downforce — is important at a track such as Texas Motor Speedway, where Sunday's race was held and where top speeds surpass 200 mph. Every NASCAR Cup Series car has a spoiler — but it can't vary from the officially approved version.

The victory was Harvick's eighth this season, more than any other driver. It was also the second time his winning car has been

found wanting in the R&D inspection. So on Wednesday, conversation swerved from how great Harvick looked in Texas to how iffy Harvick's win looks, how his season and the sport as a whole are tainted.

Twice NASCAR has caught Harvick's team cheating - infractions serious enough to removed the perks of victory if not the victory itself, and to call for point penalties, fines and suspensions. A fan might reasonably wonder whether Harvick's six other wins are legit.

And what's with an inspection process that takes half a week to complete and have the results announced? With NASCAR bearing down on what's supposed to be a grand finale, we're reminded that fans can't be sure about the validity of a race result for days after the checkered flag waves.

Harvick's punishment jumbled the eightdriver playoff picture.

» Still locked into the final four is Joev Logano, whose win at Martinsville a week earlier withstood all postrace scrutiny.

» Harvick, instead of nailing his spot with the Texas win, sits fourth in the points chase, just 3 points clear of the fifth-place team and in danger of missing the final four. He's been extremely successful at Phoenix, with nine wins including the race just after his Las Vegas infraction. He could win this one, too, and lock up the spot, but a stroke of misfortune could derail his quest for a champion-

» Kyle Busch and Martin Truex Jr. moved ahead of Harvick in the points race, improving their odds of making the final four.

» Kurt Busch and Chase Elliott, respectively 3 and 17 points behind Harvick, now have a much better chance to score enough points to make the cut and oust Harvick.

NASCAR's tough inspections are not a bad thing. Teams have engineers and master mechanics whose intent is to bend, even break, the rules if they can get away with it.

But goofs like the Johnson penalty and taking days to complete the process that resulted in Harvick's punishment leave a stain

By the time the series reaches the titledeciding last race a couple of Sundays from now at Homestead-Miami Speedway, fans will want to shake off this week's mess. They will want to watch the race for what it is, see who among the final four prevails.

Then they can wait a few more days to find out if what they saw was real.

chief for the rest of the year. This was a devastating ruling for the Stewart-Haas team and puts a serious burden on the most dominating driver we saw

all season. This was classic old NASCAR, handing down a late-season penalty without many specifics, both to shock the sport and to send the message to the other teams. Harvick's car was found to have an altered spoiler.

But by keeping the specifics private, it suggests something worse was attempted by Rodney Childers and the SHR fabricators.

Whatever it was, NASCAR deemed it to be blatant cheating and an attempt to steal a championship.

The irony is that Harvick is

clearly the favorite this week at Phoenix, a track where he has dominated in recent years. Now, he might have to win there to qualify for the championship in a season he's dominated.

This was a bombshell of a ruling by NASCAR, the severity of which the sanctioning body rarely makes. This was along the lines of Michael Waltrip and the mysterious substance in the engine manifold before the 2007 Daytona 500 and the Richard

Petty win at Charlotte in 1983 when his engine was found to have enlarged bore and stroke pistons.

This ruling is even more severe because of the timing of it.

Harvick's entire season is in jeopardy now. And his team's reputation has been tarnished. Even if he goes on the win the championship, Harvick will carry the burden of a cheating violation that makes his great season suspicious.

What to know about a cancer you may not have heard of

woman celebrating her 40th birthday, a young boy starting second grade or a college grad about to begin his career. All three could develop a rare form of cancer known as epithelioid sarcoma (ES), a form of soft-tissue sarcoma. There is little information available about ES. Patients, advocates, doctors and researchers across the United States are aiming to educate people about this ultra-rare cancer and the unmet need for an effective, tumor-specific treatment. Consider these facts

What are Soft-Tissue Sarcomas and What is **Epithelioid Sarcoma?**

Soft-tissue sarcomas (STS) are a type of cancer that occur in tissue like muscle, fat, skin, nerves and blood vessels. There are more than 50 types of STS, including ES, which is a rare form that can occur under the skin in the limbs (such as the arms, hands, legs or feet) or soft tissue in other places like the abdomen. Adults in their 20s and 30s and men, in particular, are more likely to get ES, although it can affect people of all ages and genders, according to research published in the Journal of Clinical and Aesthetic Dermatology.

How Rare is Rare?

According to the American Cancer Society, a rare cancer is defined as fewer than six new diagnoses per 100,000 people per year.

ES is an ultra-rare cancer. According to available epidemiology and case reports, it is estimated about 600 people are properly diagnosed in the U.S. and Europe each year.

What are the Most Common Types of ES and **How Do They Impact Diagnosis?**

ES can take two forms:

Distal-type: Classic form, typically affects teenagers and young adults.

- Typically forms under the skin in areas like hands, legs and feet.
- Can be mistaken for another skin condition like an infected wart or a wound that won't heal, which may delay diagnosis. Proximal-type: Rarer form, mainly affects adults and is more
- Typically forms in central areas of the body like the abdomen.

 Can be mistaken for menstrual cramps or an upset stomach, making identification and diagnosis more difficult.

Dealing with a Diagnosis?

Due to its rarity, harmless appearance in its initial stages and occurrence in young people, ES is often misdiagnosed, according to the Liddy Shriver Sarcoma Initiative. For this reason, the Sarcoma Foundation of America recommends checking often for lumps and bumps in places they shouldn't be.

For people faced with a sarcoma diagnosis, it's important to get a second opinion from a sarcoma specialist. These specialists have extensive knowledge of STS and can determine what form of sarcoma one may have, what stage it is and the best course of treatment. The specialist may confirm the diagnosis with a physical examination, a scan or a tissue sample (biopsy) of the area.

It's common to feel a range of emotions after a diagnosis of ES, according to Clear View Health Partners, including:

- Fear
- Denial
- Frustration ■ Anxiety
- Hope that treatment will be successful
- Determination to beat ES

What Treatment Options are Available?

Treatment options depend on a variety of factors, including the location of the tumor, tumor staging and whether the disease has metastasized or spread to other parts of the body.

For patients with early stage ES, many elect to have surgery to remove the tumor, which may precede or be followed by radiation therapy or chemotherapy treatment, according to the Journal of Clinical and Aesthetic Dermatology. If the cancer returns or spreads, a patient may undergo radiation therapy and chemotherapy. New treatment options are being studied through clinical research, which is why seeking a specialist in the field is important if one is faced with a diagnosis.

As with many cancers, early detection is important and can increase survival or successful treatment. Typically, the distal form of ES is associated with more favorable survival rates than the proximal form.

In the spring of 2008, Maria Voermans' 4-yearold daughter requested an "airplane ride," and as Voermans lifted the young girl up with her legs, she had to make an "emergency landing" because

and significant pain in her upper right thigh. After a few months, the pain persisted. Voermans continued to jog and play sand volleyball, thinking nothing of it. At the recommendation of her primary care physician, she took some antiinflammatories and tried to rest, which wasn't easy to do as a single mother

children.

Two more months went by and her leg caused increasing problems. She could feel something in her leg, but never considered it a "lump" because it was not visible on the outside. Voermans took matters into her own hands and visited a sports medicine orthopedic specialist for further testing.

An MRI found a mass in her right leg and she was referred to one of the few musculoskeletal oncologists in Wisconsin, her home state. He ordered a biopsy, which on Voermans' youngest daughter's third birthday confirmed her worst fear: it was a rare form of cancer called proximal-type epithelioid sarcoma, and it was stage three. Her biggest concern was not living to experience future holidays, birthdays, graduations and other life milestones with her daughters.

Voermans underwent chemotherapy, radiation therapy and had surgery to remove the tumor. As of July 2018, Voermans reports the cancer has not returned.

Today, she's a wellness coordinator supporting other people diagnosed with cancer who are undergoing treatment or post-treatment. She's able to use her own cancer journey to provide empathy to others, and it's brought satisfaction to the whole experience.

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

Sara Gilbert stars in "The Conners"

'The Conners' brings back beloved characters

Conners.

sitcoms are a staple of prime time, peppering just about every night of the week. But few of this season's sitcoms have generated as much buzz as "The

Since losing his wife, Dan Conner (John Goodman, "The Big Lebowski," 1998) has been soldiering on as the head of the household in "The Conners," which airs Tuesday, Nov. 13, on ABC. The show is a

spinoff of ABC's "Roseanne," a comedy about a working-class family in the fictional small town of Lanford, Illinois, which aired from 1988 to 1997, and again last spring in a much lauded revival.

"Roseanne" centered on Conner family matriarch Roseanne (Roseanne Barr, "The Roseanne Barr Show"), but a now-famous racist Tweet from the comedian about Valerie Jarrett, senior adviser to former president Barack Obama, prompted ABC to cancel that show in May, despite its stellar ratings. Three weeks after Barr was ousted from the series, the network announced plans for a spinoff featuring all of the original cast with the exception of Barr.

Fans and critics wondered how "The Conners" would fare without the actress, but so far, things are looking good for the comedy. In a review of the show's debut episode on rollingstone.com, TV critic Alan Sepinwall expressed hope for the new incarnation of the series sans the controversial comedian.

"There are enough sturdy characters and performances here to move on without her," wrote Sepinwall, "and the premiere felt more focused than many of the episodes from the spring."

In addition to Goodman, Sara Gilbert ("The Talk") returns as Dan and Roseanne's youngest daughter, Darlene, who's set to take on an even larger role in "The Conners." Original series star Alicia Goranson ("Boys Don't Cry," 1999) is back as the eldest, Becky, and Michael Fishman ("Undrafted," 2016) once again appears as Roseanne and Dan's son, D.J. **Emmy winner Laurie Metcalf** ("The Big Bang Theory"), who was a breakout star of the original show, reprises her role as Roseanne's flighty sister, Jackie, in "The Conners.

The cast of the new comedy also includes a number of performers who weren't part of the original series but appeared in last spring's revival. Emma Kenney ("Shameless") portrays Darlene's daughter, Harris Conner-Healy. Ames McNamara ("At Home With Amy Sedaris") portrays Darlene's son, Mark. Their father is Darlene's ex, David, played by Johnny Galecki ("The Big Bang Theory"), who will guest star in the show. Young actress Jayden Rey ("Unforgettable") plays D.J.'s daughter, Mary, while Maya Lynne Robinson ("Mom") stars as D.J.'s wife, Geena.

As far as the ratings go, the debut of "The Conners" performed fairly well against the competition, drawing more than 10 million viewers. The show may not have reached the peak of the revival's debut ratings last spring, which attracted 18.44 million initial viewers, but the premiere was still among the top-rated shows of the night, behind only CBS's "NCIS" in its time-slot. Interestingly, the spinoff's premiere was on par with the spring finale of "Roseanne," so it looks as if plenty of fans are still interested in the Conners' story.

Just like its predecessor, "The Conners" is set to tackle hard-hitting subjects as the Conners work through their grief after the death of Roseanne from an accidental

opioid overdose. The debut addressed not only the subject of opioid addiction and abuse in America but also the desperate lengths underinsured, financially strapped people may go to as they try to compensate for their lack of coverage. Roseanne, as it was discovered in the premiere, was part of a neighborhood network of people who would trade and share medicine. After the show's debut Barr was critical of how her character was killed off, saying the opioid overdose "lent an unnecessarv grim and morbid dimension to an otherwise happy family show," in an official statement on Facebook with Rabbi Shmuley

During its 10-episode first season, "The Conners" is expected to continue the conversation about a variety of issues facing workingclass Americans. Along with typical family dilemmas such as financial strain and co-parenting tensions, the show will look at gender issues through the eyes of Dan's gender non-conforming grandson, Mark.



The future success of the series rests very much on the shoulders

of the cast, particularly the very capable shoulders of Goodman. He won a Best Actor Golden Globe for his work as Dan during the original series run and went on to enjoy a successful film career, often collaborating with acclaimed filmmakers the Coen Brothers. His credits include "O Brother, Where Art Thou" (2000), "Monsters, Inc." (2001) and "10 Cloverfield Lane" (2016).

Recurring characters from the original series will also appear in the show's debut season, including stage legend Estelle Parsons ("Bonnie & Clyde," 1967) as Roseanne and Jackie's mother, Beverly. Natalie West ("The Poker House," 2008) reprises her role as Roseanne's friend Crystal and James Pickens Jr. ("Grey's Anatomy") is expected to appear as family friend Chuck Mitchell.

As the Conners and their friends forge ahead through their grief, life will go on in Lanford, and the family will once again tackle challenges with love and laughter. Check in with Dan and his brood in a new episode of "The Conners," airing Tuesday, Nov. 13, on ABC.

The season for sweets: 'Holiday Baking **Championship' returns to Food Network**

hanksgiving is pretty much the unofficial kickoff to the holiday season, but Food Network's been quick out of the gate this year with both returning favorites and new surprises already underway a few weeks before Turkey Day. This year's "Holiday Baking Championship," always an audience favorite, got underway last week and is currently airing Monday evenings.

Former NFL quarterback Jesse Palmer returns to host this year's competition, which brings nine of the country's best holiday bakers together to vie for a \$25,000 prize. That's a lot of dough, especially at this time of year, but earning it won't be easy with a series of insidiously tricky baking challenges standing between the contestants and the prize.

This week's episode, airing Monday, Nov. 12, gets the con-

testants into the Thanksgiving spirit a few weeks early. In the pre-heat challenge, the eight remaining bakers are divided into teams to make their favorite varieties of Thanksgiving pie. As in years past, baking experts Duff Goldman ("Ace of Cakes"), Nancy Fuller ("Farmhouse Rules") and Lorraine Pascale ("Worst Bakers in America") serve as judges, keeping a watchful eye on the contestants' every move and sampling all of their sweet and savory creations before deciding at the end of each episode which one of them has to hang up his or her apron for good.

It's a brutally tough competition, but it's also filled with holiday cheer. Over the course of the next several weeks, the bakers will be challenged to come up with seasonal desserts that make cranberries the star, make sweet treats that combat the post-turkey dinner sleepiness by incorporatating coffee, build cream puff displays inspired by holiday decorations and even make beautiful hand-painted eggnog cakes that taste as good as they look.

It's the most wonderful time of the year, especially for lovers of baked goods. "Holiday Baking Championship" currently airs Mondays on Food Network.

Q: Has the show "Life in Pieces" been canceled? We really enjoyed it and I keep looking for it to reappear.

A: It's understandable you'd be worried about the fate of "Life in Pieces." Since the end of season 3 in the spring, there's been an explosion of news about new projects the cast members and producers are taking on. That's usually the first (and sometimes only) sign of a cancellation. But not this time.

"Life in Pieces" has been renewed for a fourth season, which will premiere sometime over the winter (there's no firm date yet).

The announcement glut can be explained by the fact that the show has reached the stage where it can survive without quite as much attention from its producers. And with a huge ensemble cast, it's always afforded its stars a little extra free time beyond what they'd get on another show.

It's usually around the season 2 or 3 mark that producers start

launching new projects, once the show has developed a bit of a formula and a solid production team that knows the show well.

"Life in Pieces" director and executive producer Jason Winer is at that stage. Now that the series has hit its stride, he can turn his attention to new shows. But instead of taking a one-at-a-time approach, he's taking on a bunch at once.

He's co-producing a sitcom called "Single Parents," which launched in September on ABC, and he also has deals for two others, drama series "The Family Practice" and the working-mom sitcom "Woman Up."

For the latter series, he's also enlisted the talents of "Life in Pieces" star Zoe Lister-Jones.

She's not the only "Pieces" actress doing double duty, either. Costar Hunter King has a pretty weird arrangement with "The Young and the Restless" where she comes and goes in the role of Summer Newman in that series in between shooting "Life in Pieces." Indeed, the soap series brought in an understudy to play Summer for just a

couple of days this fall while King zipped away to shoot her other

Meanwhile, Winer's fellow "Life in Pieces" producer Aaron Kaplan has also announced a new familythemed sitcom, "Carol's Second Act," starring Patricia Heaton in the title role.

Q: What happened to Christopher Kimball on the "Cook's Country" and "America's Test Kitchen" programs?

A: The relationship between Christopher Kimball and the food-media empire he helped to create went sour seemingly overnight, as things often do when they're left out too long.

Their relationship was out very long indeed — Kimball hosted PBS's "America's Test Kitchen" (and later its spinoff, "Cook's Country") since its debut in 2000. He also helped create the company behind it, Boston Common Press, in the early 1990s. Kimball and Boston Common created a foodmedia empire together, until 2015 when Kimball was ousted from the company under contentious circumstances.


He hosted one more season of both shows in 2016 and maintained a minority stake in the company, but they were no longer on good terms.

This was proven late in 2016, when the company sued Kimball for trying to "literally and conceptually rip off" the "America's Test Kitchen" format for his new project, "Milk Street."

"Milk Street" has at least followed the same approach to multiplatform publishing: Kimball quickly launched a magazine, TV show, podcast, cooking school and even a set of cookware, all under the

Fittingly, the nasty breakup played out in multimedia as well, with each side publishing articles explaining their positions. The highlight was probably the website launched by Boston Common Press, WhyWeAreSuingChristopherKimball.com, which is pretty well exactly what it says on the package.

Q: I was just watching reruns of "Night Court" and I was wondering, why did they switch bailiffs so often?

A: The revolving door of female bailiffs in "Night Court" is one of the few sad details of that otherwise whimsical show.

Longtime TV writer and actress Selma Diamond originated the role, playing it as a smoking, gravel-voiced and world-weary cynic, also named Selma. But she died of lung cancer after the second season.

They brought in Florence Halop, who filled the role as a similarly cynical senior citizen. Sadly, she also died, also of lung cancer, after just one season.


Once the sting had died a little for fans and producers of the show, it came to be known among both groups as the bailiff's curse.

Marsha Warfield stepped in to the role next, and cut a very different figure: she was a young black woman who, rather than being a sarcastic joke-cracker, played it as a stone-faced hard case (she kept the world weariness). She stayed in the role until the end of the show in 1992.

In an interview with People magazine partway through her run, Warfield joked about being the one to break the curse. "There's no way to say this without sounding callous, but if the two women before me had been 33-year-old black women, I would have been really nervous about taking the part."


