# 'Beach or Bust' results shared

Several members of the Jackson County Sheriff's Office that participated in a multi-agency spring break law enforcement wave were on hand Tuesday for a press conference to share information about the project. Operation Beach or Bust was ini-

tiated to conduct a three-pronged operation that would concentrate on the reconnaissance, surveillance, and interdiction of illegal narcotics, weapons, and fugitives that transit into or through the Panama City area via air, land and sea around the

# Military monument plans move forward

## Memorial would honor WWI African-American soldiers

Jackson County Commissioners met Tuesday morning in regular second-Tuesday session and again that afternoon in a special meeting to talk about a retooling of the county's organizational structure.

Immediately after the morning ses-

sion at county headquarters on Madison Street, some commissioners and county staff gathered across the street on the lawn of the Jackson County Courthouse with Curley Spires Potter to contemplate where a new memorial will be placed to honor African-American soldiers who died in World War I.

Potter is a descendant of Armstrong Pur-

dee, who had in 1916 secured permission from the Jackson County Commission of his day to place such a monument. But his quest had never been fulfilled.

Potter, his granddaughter, began a campaign late last year pursued the realization of that dream.

# Changes coming to organizational structure

Jackson County Commissioners on Tuesday approved a retooling of its organizational structure, a move that will add two positions and shift some responsibilities. Now, instead of all 18 department heads reporting directly to County Administrator Wilanne Daniels on a daily basis, others will share in that oversight responsibility.

Daniels said she hopes the change will give employees more opportunity for direct contact with the ad-

ministrative side of the house when they need it, and give her more time to focus on overall community matters that she needs to address in her county leadership role.

Daniels got the go-ahead at a special afternoon session of the board.

She plans to add a deputy county administrator to the line-up, with that person to oversee community development, the public works director, the road and bridge superintendent and the public safety officer. And those department heads will

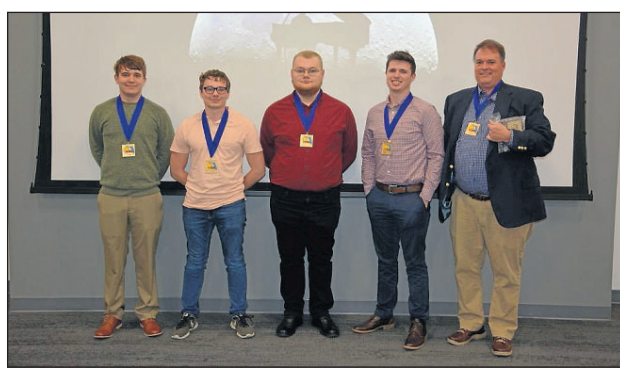

The Chipola team will next travel to Chicago April 5-6 for the ICT (Intercollegiate College Tournament) where they will compete against Four-year colleges. Only four community college teams earn bids to the four-year tournament. Chipola qualified two teams this year. The other community colleges will be Valencia (FL) and DeAnza College (CA).

# Death by ride-share

One of the first things we teach our children is to never, ever get into a stranger's car. In the age of Uber and Lyft, we all need to relearn that lesson. Along with: The later you're out at night, the greater your chances of running into the wrong person. And: It's always safer to travel in groups.

Nothing can ever mitigate the heartbreaking tragedy of the killing of University of South Carolina student Samantha Josephson, who was abducted and slain after she got into what she mistakenly thought was an Uber ride-share she had ordered. But maybe it can be some small comfort to her family if her death leads more young people to follow the advice of Ms. Josephson's father, Seymour Josephson, who urged students to stay in groups at night and called on ride-sharing services to do more to make sure passengers get into the right cars.

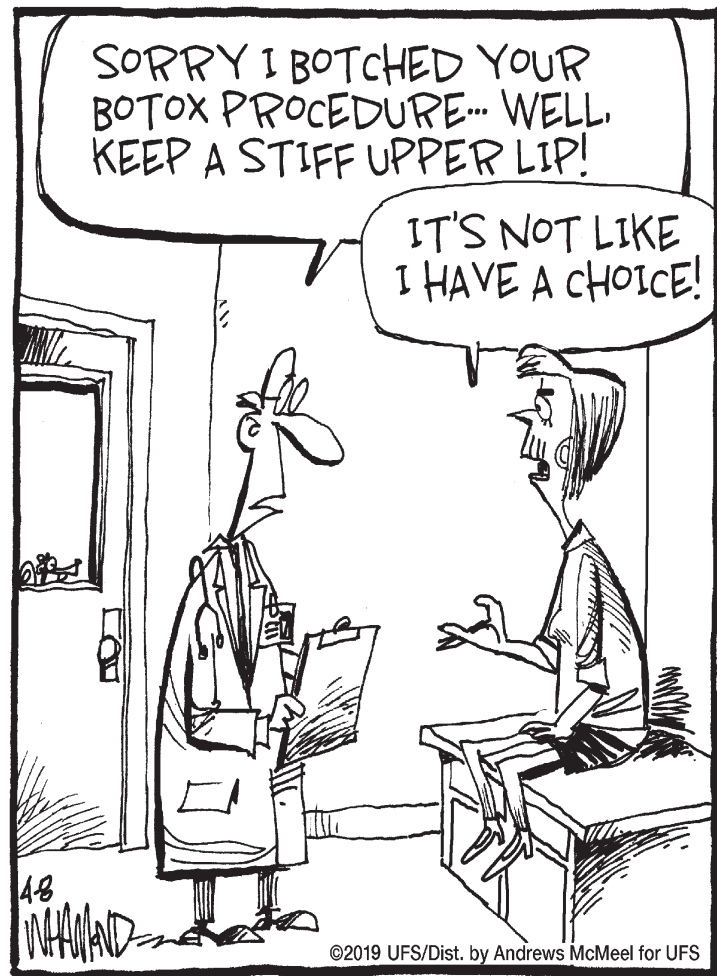
It's never been safe to be out in bar districts in the wee hours of the morning, and certainly not to leave your friends and strike out on your own. But the ubiquity of ride-sharing services — which many of us inexplicably consider safer than the more heavily regulated and more easily identifiable taxi services — has caused many people to let down their guard. Not only do we wander out alone, sometimes after consuming too much alcohol to drive safely, but we don't follow basic safety precautions when we think we spot our ride.

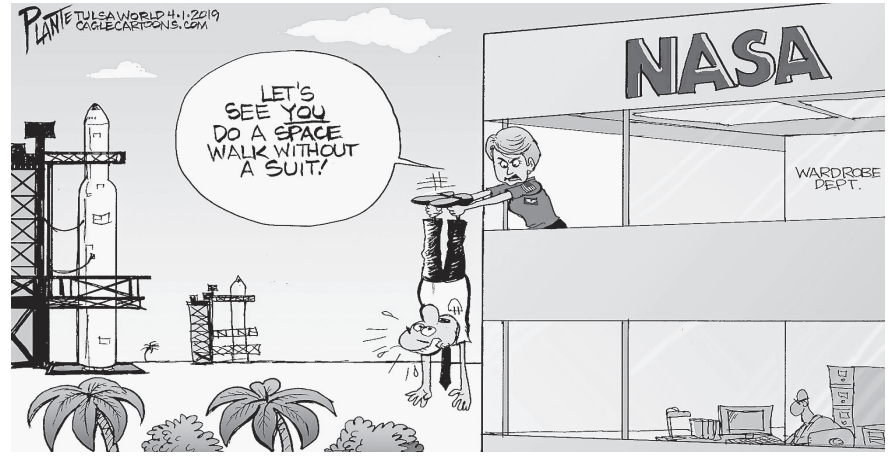
While lawmakers, regulators and the ride-share services consider what additional measures are needed, there are several precautions everyone who uses the services can and should take to protect their own safety. ...

Perhaps most importantly, if you don't feel safe, walk away. Don't worry about being charged for canceling a ride; ride-sharing services usually will refund the money if you don't feel safe. And even if they don't, the money isn't worth your life. ...

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# How bad does the border have to be for Democrats to admit it's an emergency?

Is there any number of illegal border crossings into the United States that would strike Democrats as an emergency?

As they resisted President Trump's efforts to stem the flow of illegal migrants across the U.S.-Mexico border, many Democrats made the point that fewer migrants are coming today than years ago, during the Bill Clinton and George W. Bush presidencies. The implication was that today's situation cannot be an emergency, because it used to be worse.

That doesn't make sense, of course. One could argue that crossings were an unaddressed emergency back then, and that today's figures, although lower, also qualify as an emergency.

But now, the border numbers are surging back to the bad old days. It appears that Customs and Border Protection apprehended more than 100,000 people in March (the precise figure has not yet been released), a pace that could mean more than 1 million apprehensions this year.

For some perspective: According to Border Patrol statistics, U.S. authorities caught 1,643,679 people trying to cross the border illegally from Mexico in fiscal year 2000. In 2001, the number was 1,235,718. In 2002, it was 929,809. In 2003, it was 905,065. In 2004, it topped the million mark again, with 1,139,282. In 2005, it was 1,171,396. In 2006, it was 1,071,972.

After that, due to a combination of slightly more assertive border security policies, plus — far more important — a massive economic downturn, the number of apprehensions began to fall. They hit a low point of 327,577 in 2011, leading many in Washington to assume that the problem — if they ever thought it was a problem — no longer existed.

Then the number began to creep back up, to 479,371 in

2014. Then it fell back down in 2017, to 303,916. That was likely due to would-be migrants' fear that newly elected President Donald Trump would get tough on illegal crossings. But the courts, resisting Democrats, ambivalent Republicans and Trump's own lack of focus, stopped any great progress on the border.

In a matter of months, migrants knew Trump could not stop them from entering the country illegally — and staying.

It should surprise no one that the numbers headed up again, to 396,579 in 2018. Now, crossings have gone through the roof, with 76,103 apprehensions in February 2019 and 100,000-plus in March — numbers that could have come from the early and mid-2000s.

It seems safe to say that more illegal crossers are staying in the U.S. than in the days of Clinton and Bush.

Yet Democrats steadfastly refuse to recognize that the situation constitutes an emergency. Instead, they accuse Trump of making the whole thing up. They call it a "fake emergency" and a "manufactured crisis" and every possible variant of those terms. And they reject the idea that adding barriers on the border will decrease the number of illegal crossings.

Formally announcing his presidential candidacy March 30, Democrat Beto O'Rourke vowed to "find security by focusing on our ports of entry." Ports of entry are where the majority of illegal drugs crossing the border are seized, so that is indeed important (and why Trump proposed new funding and technology for drug-detection efforts at the ports).

But the 100,000-plus migrants crossing the border are not waiting at ports of entry. They are walking across the border in areas with inadequate barriers or no barriers at all. O'Rourke would not strengthen that security — he has actually said he would tear down some of those barriers.

The only Democrats who will admit there is a crisis are the ones no longer in office. Recently Jeh Johnson, who was Barack Obama's last secretary of homeland security, said that while in office, he checked the apprehension figures every day. Noting that there was a recent day in which there were 4,000 apprehensions, Johnson said: "I know that a thousand overwhelms the system. I cannot begin to imagine what 4,000 a day looks like, so we are truly in a crisis."

That is something Democrats in Congress will not admit. Perhaps they believe doing so would give a victory to Trump, which they cannot abide.

An expanded and strengthened border barrier would help in the long run. But in the immediate crisis, Trump realizes that the U.S. must change its policy of giving immediate and de facto permanent entry to virtually anyone requesting asylum. A large majority do not have a valid claim, yet get to stay in the United States anyway.

"Democrats, working with Republicans in Congress, can fix the asylum and other loopholes quickly," Trump tweeted Monday. "We have a major National Emergency at our Border. GET IT DONE NOW!"

It could be done. But doing so would require recognizing the emergency at the border as real, not fake, and not manufactured. Can Washington do that?

I think that's the power of the new movie "Unplanned." It tells the story of a woman and her desire to help people, to have a purpose, to do something good with her life. She believed she was doing that by volunteering and then working at a Planned Parenthood clinic in Texas. This decision pained some of the people closest to her — her parents, her boyfriend who became her husband — who believed that abortion ends human lives. But they loved her regardless of her opinions and choices. Love can do that. Love is sacrificial and hopeful, and it accepts people as they are.

I watched "Unplanned" thinking of the many caricatures we tend to make people into. With certain words or associations, we jump to conclusions about people, ascribing all kinds of ideas, values and motivations to them that may not be fair. One opinion voiced, one article tweeted, and we may write off people, unfriend them, dismiss them as nothing short of everything we perceive wrong with the world.

"Unplanned" certainly has what is an undeniably pro-life message. But it's not a list of talking points. It's the real story of Abby Johnson. She's a wife and mother who had two abortions herself. She never closed herself off

to learning, to befriending people she disagreed with, including the pro-life activists whom she was able to turn to when she realized that her conscience would no longer allow her to work for Planned Parenthood. Her message is one of mercy, her example one of not being afraid to change your mind, even if it implicates your livelihood, even if it means admitting that you were wrong about one of life's most basic principles.

"Look at the face of the other and ... discover that he has a soul, a history and a life, that he is a person and that God loves this person as much as he loves (him)self," Pope Benedict XVI said in 2010.

This is what "Unplanned" asks us to do. It goes beyond political and religious opinions, beyond the social media personas and posturing; it asks us to see each person as a uniquely created and uniquely loved human being, as a valuable and irreplaceable gift to the world.

One of the best-kept secrets in the pro-life movement may be the ministry started by Johnson called And Then There Were None, which helps abortion clinic workers leave the industry. She's carved out space for people to rethink and change their minds and way of life. She was able to walk away from an ideology that no longer made sense to her once she had seen too much — an ultrasound abortion in which the fetus tried to pull away from the instrument of death closing in on it — because of pro-life people who treated her with love. She makes it possible for others to do the same, if they choose. So far, almost 500 clinic workers and seven doctors have left abortion behind with this assistance.

There's a lot of radicalization and polarizing arguments happening right now. Love can be radical too, but instead of splitting us apart, it brings us together. True love, of the sort on display during the movie "Unplanned," is both a balm and a call to action. It heals us while challenging us to live better lives. Whatever your position on abortion, consider seeing it with an open heart. We can all afford to learn its lessons.

## Stories from the old log cabin

(Part 2 of a 12-part series.)

Jack had heard many tales about the Battle for Whiddon Crossroads from the older folks. The battle had been discussed during most gatherings of the local men. The young folks would be mesmerized by the stories of the Indian attacks and how his ancestors had fought to save their settlements along the Flint River.

Watching the clouds and thinking about the battle as he leaned against the wall of the old cabin, it wasn't long before Jack drifted off to sleep dreaming about the epic battle that he had heard so many times before.

Jack's grandfather Raymond Bates had been at the Battle for Whiddon Crossroads as a young boy and it was his tales that intrigued Jack the most.

Like Jack, his grandfather loved the woods. Early one morning, shortly after daybreak, he was walking along the banks of the Flint River not far from the settlement when he saw several canoes drifting down the river. It was not unusual to see canoes on the river, but this group seemed different.

The whites and Indians used the river for trade and transportation, but these Indians were different in the canoes, they had their faces painted in bright red and yellow.

"I stepped behind one of the large rocks that rested on the bank and watched as three canoes went by," Jack's grandfather would always say when

he started the story of the battle.

"Down river, the Indians paddled to the bank and got out of their canoes. I hid and watched them," his grandfather said.

"They hid their canoes in the woods near the bank."

The six Indian braves did not see him and soon they were out of sight as they headed into the woods toward the settlement.

Word had come down the river a few weeks earlier that a small band of Coushatta Indians had been raiding settlements along the Flint and Chatahoochee Rivers.

It was believed that the band was led by one of the chief's sons who had become disgruntled with his father. He took several braves and broke away from the tribe.

"I ran as hard as I could back to the settlement to tell them what I had seen," his grandfather would say.

Once back at the settlement his grandfather told his father about what he had seen. Preparations were made to defend the small settlement. The women and children were brought inside the makeshift barricade built by the settlers in the event of a hostile raid.

Five of the men decided to go out and meet the Indians in hopes of stopping the raid while the remain-

ing men stayed to protect the settlement.

Young Raymond was told to stay back in the barricade. Being the adventurous boy instead slipped under the heavy timbers and followed the men.

Whiddon Crossroads was two miles south of the settlement through the woods. It was the place where the Three Notch Trail and the West Trail from the Fowlstown settlement to the Flint River crossing intersected. It would be there that the two groups would meet.

Jack's great-grandfather John Bates spoke some Coushatta and planned to talk to the Indians before they could get to the settlement. The men had brought along some smoked meat and vegetables in hopes of warding off any bloodshed.

As the men approached the crossing, an arrow screamed by them, barely missing John. The seven men quickly found cover in an oak thicket near the crossing. From behind one of the trees a shot rang out and when one of the men fired his musket. He missed his target and bark above one of the Indians could be seen careening off to the side.

It had been a warning shot, but it was not heeded and the battle began. Arrows flew and the smell of musket fire was soon in the air. Smoke from the guns drifted across the crossing as each side took up a position. Another rally of musket fire was followed by the sounds of arrows careening through

the woods.

Amidst the sounds, Raymond, who had followed the men into the woods, hid behind a large tree. He could hear his father speaking in Coushatta. For a few seconds the woods became deathly quiet as his father repeated the words again.

The words had worked as a response came back from the Indians. Soon the offering of smoked meat and vegetables were in the center of the crossing as a lone Indian walked into the clearing. The meats and vegetables were gathered and the rustling of the retreating Indians moving back toward the river was all that could be heard.

Except for a few scratches while hunting for cover, the settlers were unhurt and the Indians fared about the same. But the story did not end there, Jack's grandfather would say.

News moved slowly from settlement to settlement and it would take several months for the final chapter of the Indian raids and the battle at Whiddon Crossroads to reach up and down the river.

After the battle of Whiddon Crossroads, the Indian raiding party moved farther down the river and into Florida. The small group of raiders had decided to leave the river and soon was in the sand hills of North Florida, where they stumbled upon a lone log cabin.

That encounter would leave two young girls and their mother dead and the chief's son mortally wounded.

Jack roused from his sleep and again stared at the sky wishing he could have been at the battle. It was now getting late and he knew his mother would soon have supper on the table. There were more adventures to be found in the woods, Jack thought, as he walked along the trail back to his house.


He stopped, turned around and looked at the old rundown house. He could not help but wonder what tales the old log cabin could tell if it could speak.

When he got back home the house was abuzz with noise and several men were standing in the yard. A prisoner had escaped,

he would learn, from an Early County jail while awaiting trial for murder. The man had stolen a car and was seen headed south toward Florida.

Supper was good and Jack was soon drifting off to sleep thinking about what adventures he would encounter the next day in the woods.

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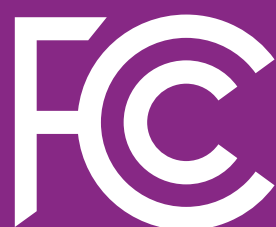


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# Realtor Kathy Milton speaks to Optimist Club

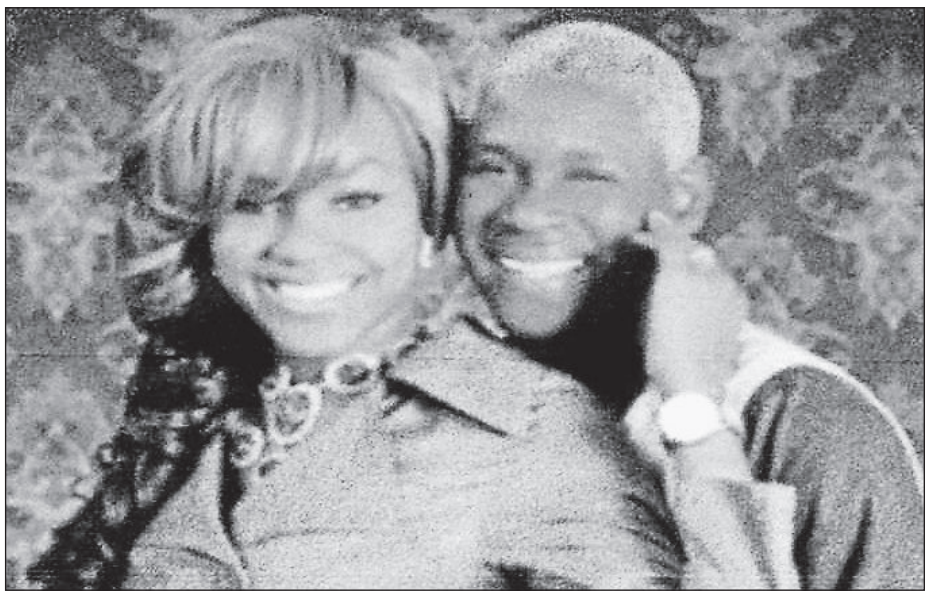

### Man initially accused of abduction attempt returns to Egypt

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — An attorney says an Egyptian man who authorities say was falsely accused of trying to kidnap a young girl at a West Virginia shopping mall has returned home.

Public defender Michelle Protzman told The Herald-Dispatch Mohamed Fathy Hussein Zayan returned to his home in Alexandria, Egypt, on Sunday. The 54-year-old engineer had been in West Virginia for work.

Protzman says Barbo-ursville police drove Zayan to the Charleston airport Saturday as a courtesy.

On Friday, Santana Renee Adams was charged with falsely reporting an emergency incident.

Adams initially told police a man grabbed her 5-year-old daughter by the hair inside a clothing store April 1 and tried to pull her away but stopped when Adams produced a gun. Adams later changed her account. Police said Zayan may have simply been patting the girl on the head.

### Racist slur found on Connecticut university buildings

NEW BRITAIN, Conn. — Authorities are investigating racist slurs spray painted on two buildings at a Connecticut university.

The New Britain Herald reports that a racist epithet directed at African Americans was spray painted on an exterior wall of the student center and a wall of a parking garage at Central Connecticut State University over the weekend.

A spokeswoman for the New Britain school, Janice Palmer, says a school employee noticed the vandalism just before noon on Sunday.

President Zulma Toro said in a message to the campus that "We must stand together to demonstrate that this behavior will not be tolerated on our campus, and I commit to leading this charge."

Campus police are reviewing surveillance footage as part of their investigation.

### Man fatally shot after pointing gun at Indiana deputy

NEW CASTLE, Ind. — Authorities say a 32-year-old man who allegedly pointed a gun at a sheriff's deputy along Interstate 70 in eastern Indiana has died after being shot.

State police say dispatchers in Henry County received a call about a suspicious person walk-

ing along the interstate Tuesday morning and the deputy found the man in the median. Police say the deputy approached him to see if he needed assistance, the man pointed a gun at the deputy and shots were fired.

Police say Michael R. Guley of Greenfield was taken to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead. The sheriff's deputy wasn't injured.

The circumstances of the shooting are under investigation. Police say they didn't immediately know why Guley, who was reportedly wearing black clothing, was walking along the roadway.

### Rapper Boosie Badazz faces drug, gun charges in Georgia

ATLANTA — The rapper Boosie Badazz and a passenger were jailed on drug and gun charges after being pulled over south of Atlanta.

Coweta County jail records show the 36-year-old rapper faces charges of failing to maintain his lane, drug possession and having a gun during a crime. His real name is Torrence Hatch Jr.

The Newnan Times-Herald reports that Coweta County sheriff's Sgt. Jeff Bugg stopped a swerving Dodge Charger, then smelled marijuana coming from the vehicle in Newnan on Monday. The sergeant reported that a loaded handgun was found under a seat.

The jail identifies Hatch's passenger as Antonio Pezant Allen and says he's charged with having drugs and a gun during a crime.

Jail records don't list attorneys who could be contacted for comment on behalf of either man.

### 3rd juvenile charged in fire at historic Connecticut theater

STRATFORD, Conn. — Police say a third juvenile has been charged in connection with a fire in January that destroyed a long-closed Connecticut theater where Katharine Hepburn, Christopher Plummer, James Earl Jones and other stars performed.

Stratford police on Tuesday announced that the third juvenile is charged with third-degree conspiracy to commit arson, third-degree burglary and other offenses. No name or exact age was released.

Two teens, ages 18 and 17, were charged Monday with arson in connection with the fire at the American Shakespeare Theatre in Stratford on Jan. 13.

Their names were not released because both were juveniles at the time of the blaze.

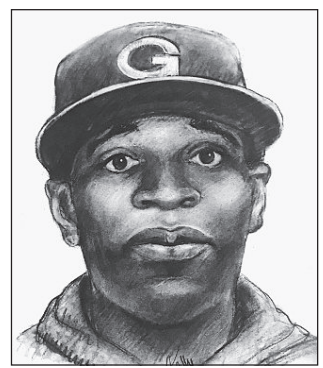
The Chipley Police Department is seeking the assistance from the public in identifying the suspect in an abduction and sexual assault that occurred on April 3.

# Feds break up \$1.2B orthopedics scam

WASHINGTON — Federal authorities said Tuesday they've broken up a \$1.2 billion Medicare scam that peddled unneeded orthopedic braces to hundreds of thousands of seniors via foreign call centers.

The Justice Department announced charges against 24 people across the U.S., including doctors accused of writing bogus prescriptions for unneeded back, shoulder, wrist and knee braces. Others charged included owners of call centers, telemedicine firms and medical equipment companies.

The Health and Human Services inspector general's office said the fast-moving scam morphed into multiple related schemes, fueled by kickbacks among the parties involved. The FBI, the IRS, and 17 U.S. attorney's offices took part in the crackdown. Arrests were made Tuesday morning.

Medicare's anti-fraud unit said it's taking action against 130 medical equipment companies implicated. They billed the program a total of \$1.7

billion, of which more than \$900 million was paid out.

Telemarketers would reach out to seniors offering "free" orthopedic braces, also touted through television and radio ads. Beneficiaries who expressed interest would be patched through to call centers involved in the scheme. Officials described an "international telemarketing network"

with call centers in the Philippines and throughout Latin America.

The call centers would verify seniors' Medicare coverage and transfer them to telemedicine companies for consultations with doctors.

"The telemedicine we are talking about is basically a tele-scam," said Gary Cantrell, who oversees fraud investigations for the HHS inspector

general's office. "We are not talking about the use of advanced technology to provide better access to care."

The doctors would write prescriptions for orthopedic braces, regardless of whether the patients needed them or not. In some cases several braces were prescribed for the same patient.

The call centers would collect prescriptions and sell them to medical equipment companies, which would ship the braces to beneficiaries and bill Medicare. Medical equipment companies would get \$500 to \$900 per brace from Medicare and would pay kickbacks of nearly \$300 per brace.

The scam was detected last summer, officials said. Complaints from beneficiaries were pouring in to the Medicare fraud hotline, and some consumer news organizations warned seniors. As the investigation progressed, Cantrell said, federal agents gained cooperation from people familiar with the various schemes.

Officials said it's one of the biggest frauds the inspector general's office has seen.

## College Scam

# Loughlin, 14 others face new charge

BOSTON — "Full House" star Lori Loughlin and her fashion designer husband, Mossimo Giannulli, and 14 other parents were hit Tuesday with a new money laundering charge in the sweeping college admissions bribery scheme.

The move comes a day after fellow actress Felicity Huffman, 12 other parents and a coach agreed to plead guilty — signaling an escalation in the case against the parents who are continuing to fight the allegations against them.

Loughlin and Giannulli were among 33 prominent parents accused of participating in a scheme that involved rigging college en-

trance exams and bribing coaches at elite universities. They were arrested last month on a single charge of conspiracy to commit mail and wire fraud. An indictment brought Tuesday adds a charge of money laundering conspiracy against the couple and 14 other parents.

Amy and Gregory Colburn, a California couple accused of paying \$25,000 to cheat on their son's SAT, were indicted on the money laundering and mail fraud conspiracy charges last month.

The parents are accused of paying an admissions consultant, Rick Singer, to cheat on their children's college entrance exams and get their children admitted as athletic recruits at such elite schools as

Georgetown and Yale.

Loughlin and Giannulli are accused of paying \$500,000 in bribes to get their daughters into the University of Southern California as crew team recruits, even though neither of them played the sport.

They appeared in Boston federal court briefly last week and were not asked to enter a plea. They have not publicly addressed the allegations against them.

Other parents indicted on the new charge Tuesday include Michelle Janavs, whose family developed the microwave snack line Hot Pockets before selling their company, and William McGlashan, who co-founded an investment fund with U2's Bono in 2017.

be assigned certain oversight responsibilities of their own.

Other shifts within the organization structure are also planned. For instance, now that Jackson County jail administrator Mark Foreman has announced his plan to take a job with a private correctional facility elsewhere, Daniels is creating a Public Safety Officer position, which will be the immediate contact point for corrections as well as emergency management and the fire rescue department.

With the retirement of long-time utilities director Steve Croxton, Daniels is creating a public works director position that will oversee animal control, parks and recycling, and utilities. Rett Daniels, who was previously responsible only for

parks and recycling, has already taken over those additional duties.

Daniels has created a community services director position, which will not immediately be filled but which, when it is manned, would be assigned duties related to oversight in areas related to agriculture, the Tourist Development Council, veterans' services and the library.

The community development director's post is current vacant, but once its filled, that individual would take on two additional duties as a reporting point for certain departments, including the building department and E911, in addition to continuing oversight of code enforcement, inspections, housing and planning.

Daniels is also adding

a long-term recovery coordinator position to the mix, and it will be part of the county lineup for as long as Hurricane Michael recovery needs persist. She's moving staffer Pam Pichard into that role, relieving Pichard of budget-setting responsibilities. Daniels will fill that budgeting job with someone yet to be hired and that person will additionally be assigned as operations director.

"After the hurricane, every weakness we had surfaced, so I think a big part of that can be made better by reorganizing the reporting duties," Daniels said. "I have 18 people reporting directly to me currently. Things can fall through the cracks because of this - it's too much to do and do effectively. It's unfair to these people - they're out there like islands. We've studied other entities, and none are set up like we have been. I think it

just morphed into this over time. I don't think it was really an intentional thing; it just developed this way over time, but it's really not a workable way of doing things. We need our employees to have someone they can go to and feel like their voices are being heard and that they have fair and proper access to the administration when they need it."

Daniels said she shared her proposed reorganization plan with commissioners individually, before presenting it for a vote Tuesday, saying those individual sessions were necessary to fully educate each board member so that each would have a full understanding of what she wanted to achieve.

At the board meeting, Daniels also presented a document outlining the changes and why she felt they were necessary. They are to take effect in June.

On Tuesday, Potter got another step closer to seeing it through: The current county commission directed County Administrator Wilanne Daniel to coordinate with Potter on the exact location for the monument.

There had been some discussion about whether it should be located in line with the other military monuments that are at the north corners of the courthouse lawn, or whether it would instead

be tied in with the monument on the northwest corner, and whether the county would help pay for any extra expense that might be incurred if it were tied in. But by the end of that gathering on the lawn, a third plan emerged as the most likely choice.

Although Commissioner Willie Spires had offered a motion to let the county help pay for some of the extra costs if the monument plan shifted from Potter's original de-

sired location, the motion was defeated 2-3 as commissioners Chuck Lockety, Clint Pate and Jim Peacock rejected the action.

And as the discussion wound down, Daniels and Potter agreed to meet on the courthouse lawn to discuss the location of the monument further. Hill and Spires also joined them there, along with a couple of veterans, Leon Kelly and Ernest McNeil.

Along the way, Spires and Daniels agreed that the best location would not be in line with the corner monuments, but in line with the Confederate monument, which

lies deeper in the lawn, closer to the courthouse structure. This placement would be more physically balanced to the eye, they determined.

This informal choice of location came on the day before Potter's mother, who is Armstrong Purdee's daughter, would notch her 109th birthday. Potter has said in the past that she hopes to have the monument in place in the lifetime of her mother. She is spearheading a fundraising effort to gather the money to pay for the monument, a visitation bench and other elements of the new courthouse lawn addition.

spring break time frame, officials said in a press release about the mission.

In support of Operation Beach or Bust, in Jackson County alone 71 traffic stops were conducted, two aircraft were intercepted and searched while on the ground at the Marianna Municipal Airport, 13 K9 deployments were conducted, 10 arrests were made, three warrants were served and two illegal immigrants were detained.

As a result, officials say, 3.27 ounces of methamphetamine, 2.14 ounces of marijuana, 5.38 grams Xanax, 0.6 grams of buprenorphine, 1.08 grams of Oxycodone, 0.96 grams of Hydrocodone, four firearms, \$1,457 in cash and an assortment of ammunition, drug paraphernalia, and alcohol related items were seized. Additional arrests and

seizures not listed above were made throughout Washington and Holmes Counties.

Officials say they gathered valuable information as well, establishing leads on suspected weapons smuggling, drug trafficking, immigration violations and more.

Local authorities arrested and charged the following individuals in the operation:

Mariah Dawkins, 21, of Marianna, charged with possession of controlled substance-four counts, possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia, carrying a concealed firearm.

Dennis Bursell, 50, of Belleview, charged with being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm/ammunition.

Terrell Joseph, 31, of Jacksonville, charged with possession of marijuana- not more than 20 grams, possess of a concealed firearm.

Luis Yzaguirre, 30, of

Maurice Bennett Jr., 31, of Marianna, charged with trafficking in methamphetamine, possession of marijuana w/ intent to distribute, carrying a concealed firearm, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Jose Gabriel Felipe, 53, Guatemala National, charged with driving without a valid driver's license, and being held for Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Abraham Gabriel Sanchez, 27, Guatemala National, charged with resisting LEO w/o Violence, and being held for Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Joseph Lipner, 30, Cottontale, picked up on a warrant arrest-violation of injunction for protection.

Amanda Self, 40, of Marianna, picked up on a warrant arrest-violation of probation.

A 21-year-old individual from Mulberry, whose last name was uncertain in the agency press release, was picked up on a warrant arrest-violation of probation.

The enforcement wave occurred during the week of April 1, and was hosted by the Department of Homeland Security's Customs and Border Protection Air and Marine Operations Units.

Members of the Holmes County Sheriff's Office, Washington County Sheriff's Office, Immigration and Customs Enforcement, and the United States Marshal's Service Florida Caribbean Regional Fugitive Task Force (comprised of members of the aforementioned agencies as well as members of the Panama City Police Department, Panama City Beach Police Department, Lynn Haven Police Department, and the Bay County Sheriff's Office) also participated in the operation.

# Inside 12 days of turmoil that shook Homeland Security

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump had had it.

The flow of migrants at the southern border was surging. Another caravan appeared to be forming. And his government had run out of holding space, forcing the release of tens of thousands of families apprehended at the border.

During a meeting with senior aides on the last Thursday in March, Trump demanded drastic action to make good on the threat he'd tweeted that morning: Shut the southern border. Curbing illegal immigration was his signature issue, he railed. Why couldn't he deliver?

Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen urged the president to reconsider. Her agency had already diverted hundreds of border agents away from certain crossings to process migrant families elsewhere, creating what would soon become considerable bottlenecks. Closing ports completely, she reasoned, would only encourage migrants to cross elsewhere — illegally.

Trump wasn't having it. Shut the ports at El Paso, Texas, at noon tomorrow, he ordered. End of meeting.

The directive set off a frantic behind-the-scenes push to get Trump to change his mind, and he ultimately relented. But the episode launched a turbulent 12-day stretch that would lead to the eventual resignation of Nielsen, the potential dismissal of much of her agency's top leadership and the beginning of a new phase in which immigration hard-

liners at the White House are determined to wield considerably more influence over Homeland Security.

This account is based on interviews with 20 administration officials, congressional aides and people familiar with the events, many of whom spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss internal deliberations.

## On borrowed time

Trump and Nielsen's relationship was never especially close. Nielsen had been picked for the top Homeland Security job at the urging of her predecessor, John Kelly, who left to become Trump's White House chief of staff. Trump had always been suspicious of her, in part because she'd worked for former President George W. Bush. She had been widely expected to leave the department last fall after Kelly's departure from the White House, but she appeared to get back on Trump's good side during the government shutdown, when she served as one of the top defenders of his push to build a southern border wall.

But Nielsen took the brunt of Trump's fury over rising border crossing numbers, and the situation was only getting worse. Aides spent months desperately trying to come up with new solutions, and some tried to steer Trump away from more drastic measures, including his talk of reinstating the family separation policy that

prompted international outrage.

While Nielsen had doubts at times, she had dutifully carried out Trump's orders, taking ownership of his most divisive policies, including the family separations, and spending months trying to broker arrangements with Central American countries, including Mexico. But it also fell to Nielsen to explain to Trump the legal limits of things he wanted to do. And he didn't like it.

It didn't help that Kelly had been critical of Trump in appearances since he left the White House — something Trump held against Nielsen. Or that John Bolton, Trump's national security adviser, had been pushing for Nielsen's ouster since last fall, telling Trump he didn't think her leadership or policies were effective.

## A trip cut short

Nielsen had just landed in Europe last week for her first time as secretary when she decided to rush back to Washington, landing early Tuesday morning.

Though aides had succeeded in talking Trump down from his border closure threat the week before, he had continued to crank up his rhetoric, warning by tweet that if Mexico didn't "immediately stop ALL illegal immigration coming into the United States through our Southern Border," he would be "CLOSING" the border, or large sections of it within a week.

By Wednesday, Nielsen was at the border, overseeing efforts to keep asylum seekers in Mexico and preparing for the president's Friday visit to Calexico,

California.

But the night before Trump's visit, a puzzling notice arrived on Capitol Hill: Trump was withdrawing his nomination of Ron Vitiello to permanently lead the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency. It had to be a mistake, staffers reasoned. Why would Trump be spiking his own nominee, a well-respected and long-time border official who appeared to be cruising to confirmation?

Vitiello got a call that night from senior Trump aide Stephen Miller informing him that he wouldn't be joining the president on his trip to the border the next morning. There was no explanation.

Nielsen had received no heads-up.

But word began to spread that his nomination was being yanked.

It was Step One of the plot to purge DHS leadership.

Nielsen joined Trump at the border, echoing his words at a roundtable with border officers and local law enforcement and standing by Trump's side as they toured a section of newly rebuilt border fencing, introducing him to local officials.

But inside she was fuming.

## Dusting off a letter

Nielsen returned to Washington on a Coast Guard Gulfstream as Trump continued onto California and Nevada to do some fundraising. By that night, murmurs were swirling that Vitiello's removal wasn't a one-off and that Miller was orchestrating a wholesale leadership overhaul of her department.

Already frustrated by what she saw as insufficient help from departments like Justice and Health and Human Services, with clear signs that White House hardliners were on the ascent, Nielsen pulled up the resignation letter she'd written months before — just in case.

She went into a Sunday White House meeting with Trump that she'd requested not sure if she'd be fired, resign or stay to fight another day.

It was, by all accounts, a cordial conversation in the Yellow Oval Room of the White House residence, with acting chief of staff Mick Mulvaney in attendance. Nielsen had come prepared with a list of ideas to share with the

president. But the two quickly agreed the arrangement was no longer working. Trump wanted to go in a different direction.

Nielsen resigned on the spot. Trump tweeted the news before she could get her letter out.

## The purge

Standing outside her home in Alexandria, Virginia, on Monday, Nielsen sounded just as loyal to Trump as she had at the border.

By the end of the day, the department she had led appeared to be on the cusp of being dismantled, with the head of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services and the department's general counsel among those expected to be pushed out.

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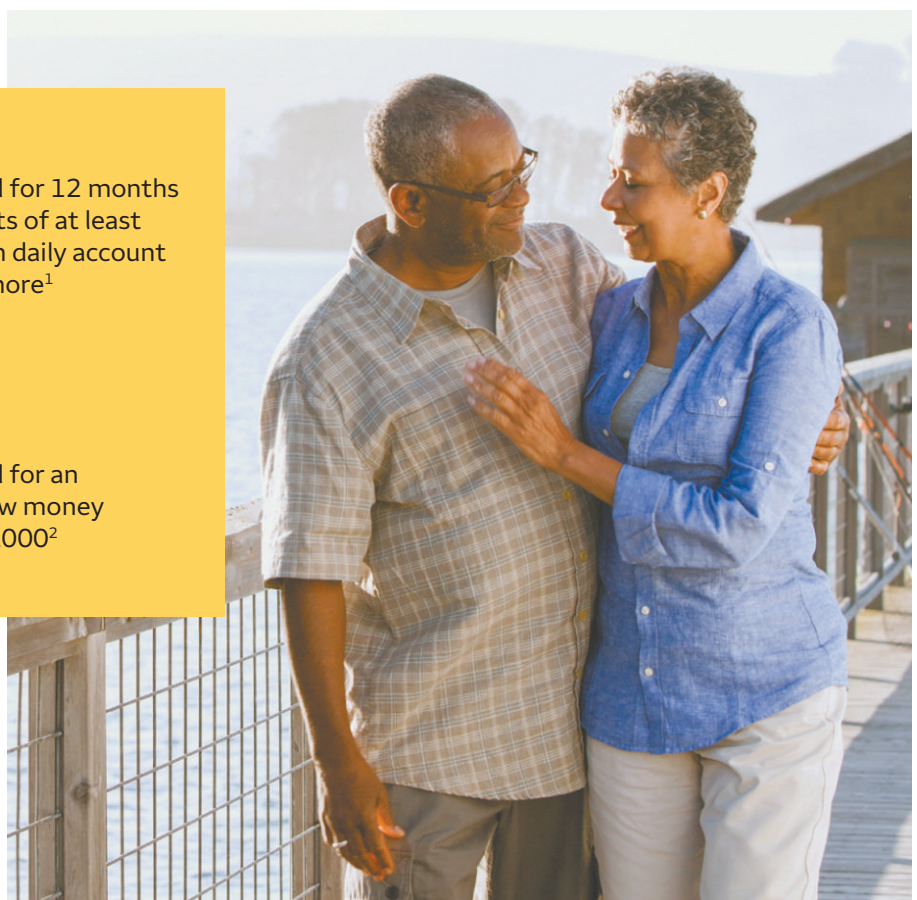

## Gibbs needs to find seat for Bell in the big leagues

CHARLOTTE, N.C.

Joe Gibbs has too many winning drivers in his organization. It is a good problem to have, but one that has led to increased speculation about his plans to juggle all his talent.

The Gibbs organization swept Bristol Motor Speedway last weekend as Christopher Bell won the Xfinity Series race Saturday followed by yet another Kyle Busch victory in the Cup race on Sunday. Gibbs drivers have won five of eight Cup races — including the Daytona 500 — and five of seven Xfinity Series races.

It's problematic because Gibbs can't keep Bell stashed away in the Xfinity Series forever and he simply doesn't have available seats for everyone.

Denny Hamlin, a two-time Daytona 500 winner and two-time winner already this season, is signed beyond 2020 and so are Busch and Martin Truex Jr. Erik Jones said at Bristol he is in active conversations on a contract extension with JGR.

But Bell has proven himself time and again in NASCAR's ladder system. He won the Truck Series title in 2017 and followed with seven victories last year in the Xfinity Series while making it to the championship finale. Now he's back in NASCAR's second-tier series for a second season, with the entire industry aware the 24-year-old needs to be promoted to the big leagues.

Gibbs was coy on how he plans to address his abundance of riches.

"You don't comment much on the future other than to say Christopher has a place with us long term, and so does Erik. That's our goal," Gibbs said. "That's what we'll keep working on. It's great to have young people coming, young talent, it's very important for us."

Gibbs has made cutthroat business moves before, such as letting Joey Logano go when he had the chance to sign Matt Kenseth. While Kenseth won 15 races in five seasons with Gibbs, he also was eventually cycled out when Gibbs needed a seat for Jones. Kenseth is now essentially retired and Logano won last year's Cup championship for Roger Penske.

Daniel Suarez wasn't brought back this season when Gibbs had a chance to add Truex, the 2017 Cup champion. Suarez is off to a decent start with Stewart-Haas Racing.

In theory, both Hamlin and Jones opened the season on the "hot seat" because Bell is ready to go Cup racing and Gibbs needs a place to put him. Hamlin was coming off the first winless season of his Cup career, but opened the season with another Daytona 500 win and then added a victory at Texas.

He bristled at speculation Gibbs would move him to make room for Bell.

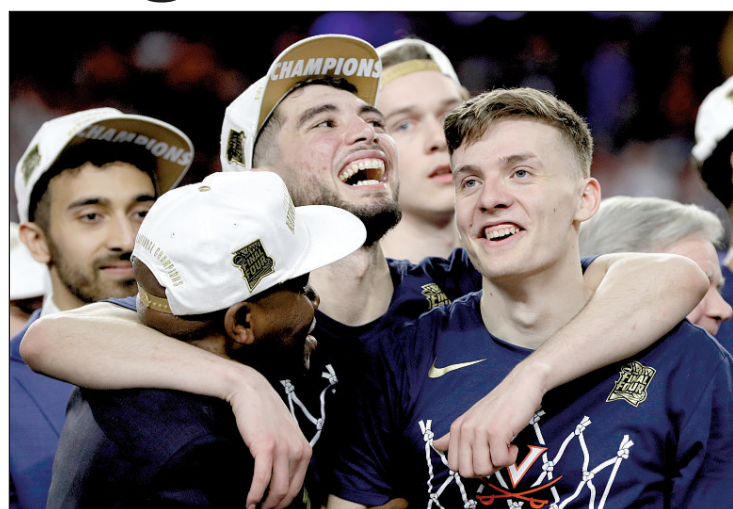
"Who says I'm on a hot seat? What do they know that I don't? That's what I don't understand," Hamlin said. "You all don't know my relationship with my sponsor, the team or anything. I've never once thought that someone could go out there and do a better job than I could in my own car."

# Virginia has look of perennial power

MINNEAPOLIS — Kyle Guy had every reason to look toward next season the moment last season ended, a stunning and humiliating loss to UMBC in the NCAA Tournament forcing him into what he called "a dark place."

Instead, the junior guard ruminated over the loss for weeks.

Guy might want to dwell on the way this year's tournament ended even longer, basking in an overtime victory over Texas Tech in the national championship game Monday night that was equal parts absolution and retribution. But when he finally does turn his attention toward

next season, he will face this reality: There's a good chance Virginia could be right back in the finals again.

The bulk of their lineup will return intact, hardened by both uplifting victory and soul-crushing defeat. They'll be joined by a pair of top-100 prospects, and they will have the confidence of winning a series of nail-biters on college basketball's biggest stage.

"As soon as the buzzer sounded (last year) and we were done with the press conference and stuff, we knew we all had the same goal in mind for next year, and that was to win a national

## After women play and kids compete, Masters comes into view

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Only when Nick Faldo took a break after playing nine holes Sunday at Augusta National did he look differently.

At least to Matt Wallace. Faldo was asked to present prizes for the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals, and he had to look the part. The three-time Masters champion headed upstairs to his locker, slipped on his green jacket and returned to the trophy presentation.

Wallace, making his Masters debut, rushed over to Faldo and rubbed the

sleeve of his jacket with his fingers. "I love it," Faldo said. "I come here, open my locker, there's my jacket. I've got to tell you, it's pretty cool. It's a pretty special thing."

It's what everyone wants a week from Sunday, perhaps the most significant piece of clothing awarded in sports. And the race for it is as open as ever against the

smallest field of the four majors.

Tiger Woods is going for his first Masters title in 14 years. Rory McIlroy is going for his first, which would be the last leg of the career Grand Slam. The last seven Masters champions were among the top 25 in the world, and six players from the top 10 in the world arrive at Augusta National having already won this year.

Players began filtering in at Augusta National in the last few days even as they had to share the golf course. The inaugural Augusta National Women's Amateur

# The season is winding down, and it's time to talk NBA awards

Take a look at the five highest-scoring seasons in NBA history.

— Wilt Chamberlain scored 4,029 points in 1961-62.

— Chamberlain scored 3,586 in 1962-63.

— Michael Jordan scored 3,041 points in 1986-87.

— Chamberlain scored 3,033 in 1960-61.

— Chamberlain scored 2,948 points in 1963-64.

There they are. The five best

seasons in terms of points that the NBA has ever seen. And those five seasons all have something in common — when they were over, someone not named Chamberlain or Jordan was the MVP.

What James Harden did this season for the Houston Rockets was scintillating. He scored 50 or more points nine times. He scored 61 twice. He scored at least 30 points in 32 consecutive

championship,” Guy said. “To battle everything we battled through and come out on top is a fantastic feeling.”

In college basketball, though, every ending is a new beginning. That was the case when the Cavs were bounced by UMBC a year ago, and it was the case again Monday night.

Multicolored confetti was still swirling inside U.S. Bank Stadium, and the party still going on in the locker rooms, when oddsmakers in Las Vegas made the Cavaliers the betting favorites for next season. Caesars Palace had them at 5-1 odds, while the Westgate Las Vegas Super-Book followed suit by installing Virginia and Kentucky as co-favorites at 7-1.

If the Cavaliers pulled off a title defense, it would be the first time since Florida

in 2007.

The reason for that optimism? Simple. The Cavaliers return just about everybody.

Yes, sophomore standout De’Andre Hunter is almost certainly off to the NBA, especially after a career-high 27 points in the Cavaliers’ 85-77 win over the Red Raiders. Junior guard Ty Jerome could join him in declaring for the draft, though he is considered a fringe first-rounder.

Otherwise, the only loss to graduation is Jack Salt, a role player off the bench.

Guy should be back for his senior year after a starring turn at the Final Four, and so should Mamadi Diakite, the versatile shot-blocking forward. Point guard Kihei Clark will be back with a year of experience, and top reserve Braxton Key could slide into a starting job.

The team that had never won a title could be starting at the prospect of two

straight.

“When they came on the recruiting visit, I remember telling them, ‘Look, the foundation has been laid by guys — Joe (Harris) and Malcolm (Brogdon) were here and all the guys who went before,’” Virginia coach Tony Bennett said. “We had won some ACC championships, we’ve been to the Elite Eight. I said, ‘We’re asking you to build on that foundation. That’s going to be the hardest step.’”

As hard as it is to win a championship, repeating is often tougher. The Cavaliers will get everyone’s best shot every night out — if they didn’t already. And the ridiculously deep ACC will be loaded again with Duke landing another top-notch recruiting class, North Carolina overflowing with talent and a handful of other programs also on the rise.

Then again, the Cavaliers aren’t exactly standing pat.

They already have signed a pair of top-100 prospects in Casey Morsell, a high-scoring guard from the Washington, D.C., area, and 6-11 forward Kadin Shedrick. Both had scholarship lists of more than a dozen deep, yet they chose to join a budding dynasty at Virginia.

The Cavaliers have been to six consecutive NCAA Tournaments. They’ve won a pair of regular-season ACC championships over the same span. They just won a school-record 35 games and capped it all off by hoisting the national championship trophy on Monday night.

“Yeah, we came in together and said that we were going to win a national championship,” Guy said late Monday night, “and to be able to hug each other with confetti going everywhere and just we did it, it’s the greatest feeling I’ve ever felt in basketball.”

Jones, in his third full season, won just once last year and hasn't been as competitive so far this year as his Gibbs teammates. But he said his manager is working hard with Gibbs on ironing out an extension, and neither he nor Hamlin has felt job pressure.

“I think both of us have felt pretty comfortable where we’re at,” Jones said. “I think Christopher is a great driver, but still when he moves to the Cup level, it’s going to take time to develop. You’re going to take a year or two to really get where you want to be at that level.”

“I feel like I’m going to be (at JGR) for a long time. I’m sure Christopher will get his opportunity in Cup at some point. He’s definitely got the talent and he’s good enough to do it, so he’ll get there for sure.”

But where? Toyota has a partnership with Leavine Family Racing that gives the single-car team technical support and assistance from the Gibbs group. Matt DiBenedetto is in his first year with Leavine and theoretically has the same equipment as the Gibbs drivers. The difference is in depth and resources, and it makes Leavine an iffy proposition for Bell.

A deal could be worked to get Bell in a second Leavine car, but expansion might stretch the small team too far. Bell could also just replace DiBenedetto, but isolating him on a mediocre extension of the big-league team is risky. Bell is considered a rising star because of his dirt track prowess, grassroots racing fan base and his hard-charging style — and racing is a results-driven business. Sticking Bell with the B-team just to get him a seat could backfire if he struggles.

Dave Wilson, president and general manager of Toyota Racing Development, noted driver lineups are up to teams. But he knows the resources that have been put into developing Bell, Jones, Suarez (who now drives a Ford), and even K&N Series driver Hailie Deegan.

“As Toyota has been vested in driver development for several years, we accept that these types of logjams are inevitable,” Wilson said. “We’re still working with all of our team partners on 2020 plans, but don’t have anything to talk about right now.”

The Bell situation needs to be solved. He is ready now and NASCAR is ready for him now. It’s not the worst problem for Gibbs, but it could get complicated over the next few months.

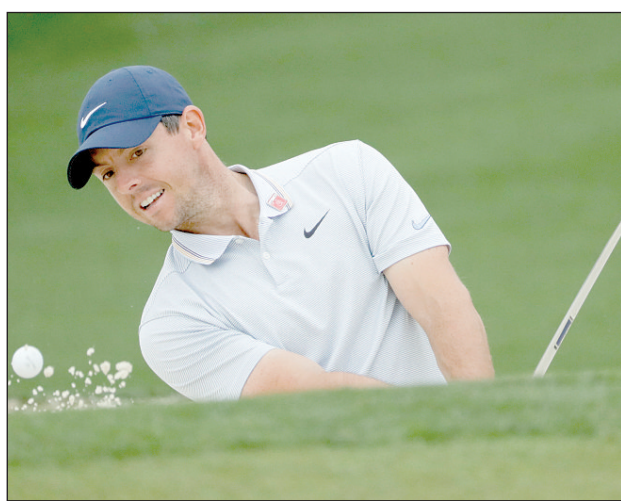
was held the previous two days, with 72 players practicing on Friday and the 30 players who made the cut competing on Saturday.

Faldo, who won his first green jacket 30 years ago and now is the lead analyst for CBS Sports, couldn’t think of a better place to be.

“There’s nothing like this,” he said. “Sure, we’re biased because we’re in golf, but you tell me what sporting event is better than this, especially for a week? You’ll get amazing matches at Wimbledon and all sorts of things. But this, for like 10 days, there’s nothing, I don’t think. You tell me what sporting event can top this.”

One veteran European writer suggested the Tour

de France.

Faldo pointed to umbrella-covered lawn tables and chairs outside the clubhouse, where visitors sipped on lemonade across from the putting green and first tee.

“You don’t have this ambiance,” he said. “Tour de France, you sit at a cafe and whoosh! There they go. And everyone says, ‘Ooh-la-la!’ And then what do you do?”

Nothing moves quickly at Augusta National except time.

Even as Sunday drew closer to the start of Masters week, so much of the chatter was on the Au-

gusta National Women’s Amateur, heralded as a wildly successful debut, especially with the way Wake Forest senior Jennifer Kupcho took on the par 5s and played the final six holes in 5 under to win.

Kupcho dreads going back to school next week. She was back on the course Sunday soaking up a win she considered bigger than her NCAA title last year, mainly because of the stage she was on and the effect on her sport.

“To get all the support that we’ve gotten from all the fans, all the press, it’s unbelievable for the women’s game,” she said. “It was just unreal. I definitely had nerves, butterflies. And there’s no words to describe it. It was just a great round, and it’s probably the most fun I’ve ever had on a golf course.”

By day’s end, as no more than five players were on the range in late afternoon with no one around, the Masters started coming into view.

“Rory wins, it’s the Grand Slam,” Faldo said. “If Tiger wins, my goodness, what’s that going to be? It might make the morning papers for three months.”

games, a stretch that lasted more than two months. He will finish this season with the seventh-highest scoring average in NBA history and win the scoring title by more than 8 points per game — a ridiculous margin.

He wins Most Voluminous Points.

But maybe not the Most Valuable Player.

There are some tremendous individual races in the NBA this season, with a slew of deserving candidates for coach of the year, a rather unexpected two-person race for rookie of the year, and the annual befuddlement about who should win defensive player of the year. The ballot that voters will agonize over most, in some cases, will be the one for MVP.

Is it Harden, for the second straight year?

Or is it Milwaukee’s Giannis Antetokounmpo?

Compelling cases can be made either way. Harden carried the Rockets and became the most unguardable player in the league. Antetokounmpo took a team that finished seventh in the East last year and lifted it to the No. 1 overall seed in the NBA, continuing his meteoric rise toward total superstardom.

Harden is the better scorer, Antetokounmpo the more accurate shooter. Harden is the better ballhandler and passer, Antetokounmpo the better rebounder and defender. Take Antetokounmpo off the Bucks, and they’d be lucky to make the playoffs. Take Harden off the Rockets, and they’d be lucky to make the playoffs.

The biggest argument for Harden is the scoring. It has been sensational, without question.

But there is precedent, as Chamberlain and Jordan learned. Even a gazillion points doesn’t guarantee anyone the Maurice Podoloff Trophy.

When these playoffs are over and the trophy is finally handed out in late June, Harden will find out if scoring was enough to win the vote this time.

It is tradition in this space to end the regular season by having AP Basketball Writers Brian Mahoney and Tim Reynolds reveal their choices for certain awards and predict what will happen in the playoffs.

Their selections:

### MVP

» **Mahoney:** Antetokounmpo. Tough to demote Harden when he was even more valuable this season than last, but can’t ignore a guy with the Greek Freak’s stats on the

surprise winningest team in the league.

» **Reynolds:** Antetokounmpo. He gets the nod over Harden because the Bucks enjoyed a level of success that few expected, and he’s why.

### MOST IMPROVED PLAYER

» **Mahoney:** D’Angelo Russell, Brooklyn. Didn’t just have a great season. He saved one for a Nets team that was going nowhere.

» **Reynolds:** Pascal Siakam, Toronto. The Raptors were 14-3 when he had a double-double, and he more than doubled his scoring average.

### COACH OF THE YEAR

» **Mahoney:** Mike Budenholzer, Milwaukee. Oversaw improvements across the board to turn a team with playoff aspirations into one with championship aspirations.

» **Reynolds:** Doc Rivers, LA Clippers. Hard call over Budenholzer. Steve Kerr, Nick Nurse, Steve Clifford, Michael Malone and Kenny Atkinson also deserving.

## McIlroy leads list of contenders

AUGUSTA, Ga. — The Masters should have been the first major Rory McIlroy won. Now it is the only one he is missing.

Augusta National was thought to be the domain of Tiger Woods when he won four green jackets before turning 30.

Now he is 43, with eight surgeries behind him, so far removed from his last Masters victory that the club has changed chairmen twice since he last won 14 years ago.

McIlroy and Woods are the central figures at the 83rd Masters, which starts Thursday. They share the stage with a cast of characters that gets deeper and stronger every year. McIlroy at No. 3 is among five players who are vying for No. 1 in the world — Justin Rose, Dustin Johnson, Brooks Koepka and Justin Thomas are the others. It has never been this crowded at the top since the ranking began in 1986.

Missing from that list, and perhaps the most intriguing player at the Masters besides Woods and McIlroy, is Jordan Spieth. No one has performed as well at Augusta as Spieth since his debut five years ago — two runner-up finishes, a wire-to-wire victory, in the hunt on Sunday every year and ending the day atop the leaderboard eight times out of 20 rounds.

But he is in the worst slump of his young career, winless since the 2017 British Open. He says his game is close. The Masters might be the ultimate measure of how close — or far — he really is.

That is also true for Woods, McIlroy and everyone else.

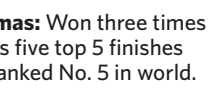

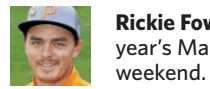

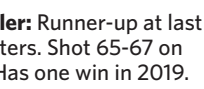

**The good:** Fred Couples pushed his tee shot in 1992 during the final round but the ball miraculously stayed on the bank of Rae's Creek. Couples calls it the biggest break of his career. He went on to par the hole and beat Raymond Floyd by two strokes to win.

**The bad:** The 12th hole is also where Jordan Spieth suffered his greatest collapse in a major, hitting two shots into the water with the lead on Sunday in 2016. He made a quadruple-bogey and lost to Danny Willett.

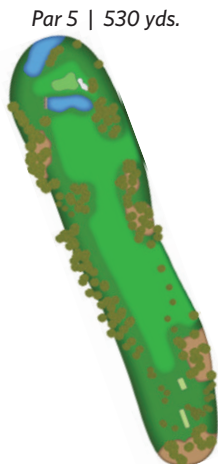
#### No. 13 AZALEA Par 5 | 510 yds.



**The good:** In 2010, Phil Mickelson hit one of the most memorable shots on Sunday in Masters history. Lefty hit a risky shot from pine straw through a narrow gap in the trees right of the fairway that cleared Rae's Creek. The ball found the green and led to a birdie that helped him capture his third green jacket.

**The bad:** Tommy Nakajima managed to incur four penalty strokes on the 13th hole during the second round in 1978. It led to an unlucky 13, the highest ever on the hole.

#### No. 15 FIRETHORN Par 5 | 530 yds.



**The good:** Plenty of eagles have been made on the 15th hole, but two stand out. The first occurred in 1935 when Gene Sarazen double eagled the hole. The feat is often referred to as "the shot heard 'round the world.'" Sarazen went on to win in a playoff. The second is Jack Nicklaus' eagle in 1986 on Sunday that led to his record-setting sixth green jacket.

**The bad:** Sergio Garcia made a 13 in 2018 during Round 1 after hitting five shots into a pond.

#### No. 16 RED BUD Par 3 | 170 yds.



**The good:** Two of the game's greatest players, Arnold Palmer and Tiger Woods, sank chip shots on the 16th hole during their final rounds that led to Masters titles. Palmer's difficult chip in 1962 for a birdie and Woods' sublime chip in 2005 that took forever to find the bottom of the cup are some of the tournament's most memorable.

**The bad:** Greg Norman's disastrous final round in 1996 included a double bogey on No. 16 after hitting his tee shot in the water.

# Brain zaps boost memory in people over 60

Zapping the brains of people over 60 with a mild electrical current improved a form of memory enough that they performed like people in their 20s, a new study found.

Someday, people might visit clinics to boost that ability, which declines both in normal aging and in dementias like Alzheimer's disease, said researcher Robert Reinhart of Boston University.

The treatment is aimed at "working memory," the ability to hold information in mind for a matter of seconds as you perform a task, such as doing math in your head. Sometimes called the workbench or scratchpad of the mind, it's crucial for things like taking medications, paying bills, buying groceries or planning, Reinhart said.

"It's where your consciousness lives ... where you're working on information," he said.

The new study is not the first to show that stimulating the brain can boost working memory. But Reinhart, who reported the work Monday in the journal *Nature Neuroscience*, said it's notable for showing success in older people and because the memory boost per-

sisted for nearly an hour minimum after the brain stimulation ended.

One scientist who has previously reported boosting working memory with electrical stimulation noted that the decline in this ability with normal aging is not huge. But "they removed the effects of age from these people," said Dr. Barry Gordon, a professor of neurology

and cognitive science at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in Baltimore.

"It's a superb first step" toward demonstrating a way to improve mental performance, said Gordon, who was not involved in the new study.

Reinhart agreed that more research is needed before it can be formally tested as a treatment.

The electrical current

was administered through a tight-fitting cap that also monitored each subject's brainwaves. For study participants, that current felt like a slight tingling, itching or poking sensation under the electrodes for about 30 seconds, Reinhart said. After that, the skin got used to the current and it was imperceptible.

The researchers' idea

was to improve communication between the brain's prefrontal cortex in the front and the temporal cortex on the left side, because the rhythms of activity in those two regions had fallen out of sync with each other.

So the researchers applied the current to those two regions to nudge the activity cycles back into a matching pattern. The

results provided new evidence that a breakdown in that communication causes the loss of working memory with age, Reinhart said.

Part of the study included 42 participants in their 20s, plus 42 others aged 60 to 76. First they were tested on a measure of working memory. It involved viewing an image such as a harmonica or broken egg on a computer screen, then a blank screen for three seconds, and then a second image that was either identical to the first or slightly modified. The subjects had to judge whether it was the same image or not.

During a sham stimulation, the older group was less accurate than the younger participants. But during and after 25 minutes of real brain stimulation, they did as well.

The improvement lasted for at least another 50 minutes after the stimulation ended, at which point the researchers stopped testing. It's not clear how long the benefit reached beyond that, Reinhart said, but previous research suggests it might go for five hours or more after stimulation stops.

Researchers got the same result with a second group of 28 subjects over age 62.

# Glaciers are shrinking faster than scientists thought

Earth's glaciers are melting much faster than scientists thought. A new study shows they are losing 369 billion tons of snow and ice each year, more than half of that in North America.

The most comprehensive measurement of glaciers worldwide found that thousands of inland masses of snow compressed into ice are shrinking 18 percent faster than an international panel of scientists calculated in 2013.

The world's glaciers are shrinking five times faster now than they were in the 1960s. Their melt is accelerating due to global warming, and adding more water to already rising seas, the study found.

"Over 30 years suddenly almost all regions started losing mass at the same time," said lead author Michael Zemp, director of the World Glacier Monitoring Service at the University of Zurich. "That's clearly climate change if you look at the global picture."

The glaciers shrinking fastest are in central Europe, the Caucasus region, western Canada, the U.S. Lower 48 states, New Zealand and near the tropics. Glaciers in these places on average are losing more than 1 percent of their mass each year, according to a study in Monday's journal *Nature*.

"In these regions, at the current glacier loss rate, the glaciers will not survive the century," Zemp said.

Zemp's team used ground and satellite measurements to look at 19,000 glaciers, far more than previous studies. They determined that southwestern Asia is the only region of 19 where glaciers are not shrinking, which Zemp said is due to local climate conditions.

Since 1961, the world has lost 10.6 trillion tons of ice and snow (9.6 trillion metric tons), the study found. That's enough to cover the lower 48 U.S. states in about 4 feet of ice.

Scientists have known for a long time that global warming caused by human activities like burning coal, gasoline and diesel for electricity and transportation

is making Earth lose its ice. They have been especially concerned with the large ice sheets covering Greenland and Antarctica.

This study, "is telling us there's much more to the story," said Mark Serreze, director of the Na-

tional Snow and Ice Data Center in Boulder, Colorado, who wasn't part of the study. "The influence of glaciers on sea level is bigger than we thought."

A number of factors are making sea levels rise. The biggest

cause is that oceans are getting warmer, which makes water expand. The new figures show glacier melt is a bigger contributor than thought, responsible for about 25% to 30% of the yearly rise in oceans, Zemp said.

Rising seas threaten coastal cities around the world and put more people at risk of flooding during storms.

Glaciers grow in winter and shrink in summer, but as the Earth has warmed, they are growing less and shrinking more. Zemp said warmer summer temperatures are the main reason glaciers are shrinking faster.

While people think of glaciers as polar issues, shrinking mountain glaciers closer to the equator can cause serious problems for people who depend on them, said Twila Moon, a snow and ice data center scientist who also wasn't part of the study. She said people in the Andes, for example, rely on the glaciers for drinking and irrigation water each summer.

A separate study Monday in *Environmental Research Letters* confirmed faster melting and other changes in the Arctic. It found that in winter, the Arctic is warming 2.8 times faster than the rest of the Northern Hemisphere. Overall, the region is getting more humid, cloudier and wetter.

"It's on steroids, it's hyperactive," said lead author Jason Box, a scientist for the Danish Meteorological Institute.



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# Spacewalking astronauts tackle battery, cable work

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Spacewalking astronauts completed battery and cable work outside the International Space Station on Monday despite communication trouble that sometimes made it hard for them to hear.

During the spacewalk, Canadian astronaut David Saint-Jacques reported that U.S. astronaut Anne McClain's voice was faint at times. The problem worsened as their 6½-hour excursion drew to a close.

"We know that it's a lot of hard work and a lot of big sighs of relief as soon as this hatch gets closed," McClain said once the pair were inside the air lock.

Within moments, the spacewalkers could barely hear their colleagues over the radio loop. They had to shout and repeat words at times, as did the astronauts on the other side of the hatch.

McClain, meanwhile, reported having a thin layer of moisture inside her helmet. The change to her visor was noticeable in the last 15 minutes of the spacewalk, she noted.

NASA is wary about

moisture inside helmets ever since an Italian astronaut almost drowned during a spacewalk nearly six years ago because of a water leak in his suit. McClain insisted she wasn't wet, and that the moisture was minimal. A crewmate later noted perspiration.

Earlier, McClain and Saint-Jacques hustled through their part in battery swap-outs that began last month. It was the third spacewalk in just 2½ weeks for the space station crew.

The cable routing took more time, providing a backup power circuit for the station's Canadian-made robot arm and expanding wireless communications. At one point, the spacewalkers had to use a pry bar to loosen a stuck fastener and get behind a protective panel.

The ongoing battery work involved re-installing two old batteries. One of six new lithium-ion batteries did not work, so McClain had to remove an adapter plate she put in.

Last week, flight controllers used the space station's robot arm to remove the failed battery along with an associated charging device. Work-

ing remotely, the controllers also installed a spare charging device and one of the old batteries made of nickel hydrogen. The second outdated battery will go in — robotically — later this week.

NASA said it will send up another new battery, although it's uncertain when. Until then, this combination of old and new batteries is expected to work fine, according to managers.

Because of trouble with a trunnion pin, Saint-Jacques could not complete prep work for a future payload platform.

McClain has now logged two spacewalks and Saint-Jacques one. Their six-

month mission began in December.

The next spacewalk will be next month by the two Russians on board. Two other Americans round out the six-person crew.

## Are astronauts worth tens of billions of extra dollars it costs to go to Mars?

As society contemplates going to the moon or Mars, there's a rising debate as to whether it's worth spending billions of dollars to send humans to other planets if a robot or rover can perform the necessary science.

I think NASA needs to send both humans and machines. Let me explain why.

I started off my 28-year career at NASA as an engineer on the shuttle training aircraft — an airborne simulator of the space shuttle. During my 17 years as an astronaut, I flew on three space missions. Two of those were shuttle missions, STS-117 and STS-119, to the International Space Station.

The main goal of both of these missions was to build the actual ISS, leaving little time for actual experiments. However, our mission was fulfilling because we were building a science laboratory in space. During my third mission, ISS Expedition 39 and 40, I spent five and a half months on the ISS.

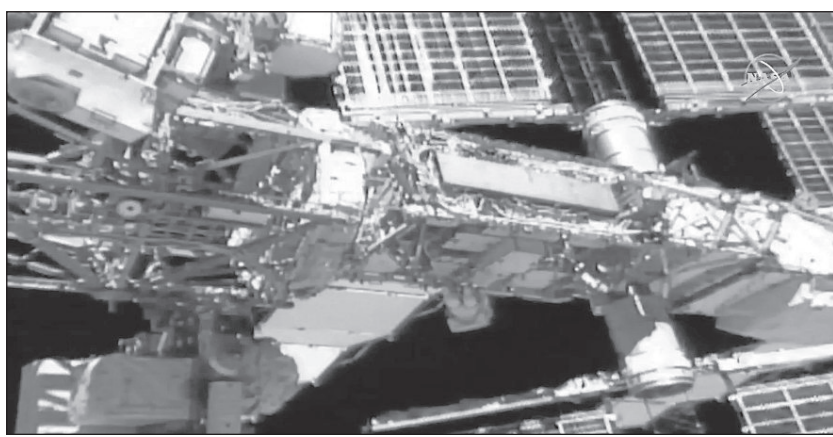
While we were on board, my crewmates and I performed more than 300 different experiments. Some we did not touch, like the alpha magnetic spectrometer that scans the universe for antimatter. Others we set up and the mission controls then took over. For other experiments we set them up and performed the experiment. In some, we astronauts were the guinea pigs.

Hence, we used our time to squeeze the most science out of our ISS visit by collaborating with the scientists on the ground. Through this mix of human and automated experiments, NASA increased the amount of science being conducted on the ISS.

### Apollo 17 versus Curiosity

To try to compare scientific output between a crewed and a robotic mission, let me contrast the Apollo 17 — the last moon mission of December 1972, in which Gene Cernan and Harrison Schmitt spent 75 hours on the lunar surface — with the Mars Curiosity rover with respect to three variables: distance traveled, cost and soil samples taken. While these two missions are distinctly different — the former being lunar and the latter on Mars — there are similarities that help us compare their productivity.

When it comes to distance covered, the humans won. The two Apollo 17 astronauts drove a distance of 35 kilometers on the moon in the span of three days — that's approximately

11.6 kilometers per day. As of February 2019, Curiosity had traveled 20.16 kilometers on Mars, an average of 9 meters per day since it began its journey on Mars in August 2012.

Now I'm not knocking Curiosity or its team. But executing a task is extremely difficult when dealing with a rover 55 to 400 million kilometers away, depending upon the relative positions of Earth and Mars in their orbits. If the Earth-based Curiosity team issues the wrong commands to the rover, it could jeopardize or even end the mission. Hence, they have to move slowly and verify every step. That means that something a human could accomplish in a couple of hours — like taking multiple rock samples — make take a robot weeks.

During Apollo 17 the astronauts collected 741 rock and soil samples, including a deep-drill core sample 3 meters long. This amounts to 247 samples each day. I had some difficulty finding the equivalent information for Curiosity. What I did discover was that as of Jan. 15, 2019, Curiosity had drilled 19 sites and had taken two samples without drilling. So Curiosity has taken at most 30 soil samples while on Mars. When equipment such as a drill malfunctions, which it has on Curiosity, there is nobody there to repair it. So the team must find workarounds to the problems for them to continue to get science.

### Cost of Apollo versus Curiosity

In 2015 dollars, each of the seven lunar Apollo missions cost about US\$20 billion. The cost of Curiosity was about \$2.5 billion in 2015.

Yes, I am comparing a lunar mission to a Mars mission, which isn't exactly fair. So, let's use an estimate of what a human mission to Mars is expected to cost — the number ranges from around \$100 billion to \$500 billion per mission. I imagine it is going to be closer to the \$500 billion or more given that the ISS alone cost more around \$150 billion.

If we assume \$500 billion per mission — a figure that would hopefully decrease with multiple missions — then a manned mission would yield a better return on the investment. From the ballpark estimates above, we can say a crew of four would be at least 500 times more productive in performing science than a rover, although the cost would be about 200 times greater.

### Space exploration needs both

Now I admit there is a large margin of error in these quick calculations. However, I'm trying to underscore the benefits from human involvement. Consequently, I think the most cost-effective solution is to use humans and rovers together. This is how we boosted science output on the ISS.

For Mars we could have teams at mission controls around the world running the experiments using rovers as they do now — but the teams could do the science much more quickly. That's because there would always be a human nearby to help out if the rover got stuck or malfunctioned.

Yes, it is more expensive to send humans to space than probes and rovers, but we can't disregard that humans can rapidly adapt to unanticipated situations and repair and modify equipment, which in the end boosts the likelihood of success.

### A human perspective

There is also so much we can learn about a new world that sensors just can't tell us. What does it feel like? Look like? Smell like? This is how most people on Earth will relate to space exploration. So having this human perspective is vital for generating enthusiasm.

I agree the rovers on Mars have done wonders and helped get people excited about planetary exploration, but I'm sure the excitement of humans going to Mars would be much greater.

## Film explores rural health care amid poverty, opioid crisis

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. Northern New Mexico is known for tourist attractions such as artsy Santa Fe, eclectic Taos and the healing dirt of El Santuario de Chimayó. The region's relaxing spas and skiing options present middle-class and wealthy visitors the opportunity to bask in the allurements of quiet and breathtaking landscapes.

But seldom do these tourists stop in the drive-by towns and villages where largely Hispanic and Native American residents make their home. And there sits another side of northern New Mexico.

A new documentary, set to air on the PBS Independent Lens series this week, explores the world of rural health care amid poverty and a persistent opioid crisis by focusing on these northern New Mexico communities.

"The Providers" looks at the challenges three health care workers in rural New Mexico face as they give services to aging patients and those struggling with addiction to alcohol and opioids.

Through the eyes of physician assistant Matt Probst, family physician Dr. Leslie Hayes and nurse practitioner Chris Ruge, the film shows how the health care providers from El Centro Family Health Center refuse to pass judgment on their patients who are just trying to get to the next day. El Centro is a group of clinics in northern New Mexico that helps people in a region four times as large as Connecticut.

They meet pregnant mothers on heroin, patients' whose liver and stomachs have been destroyed by alcohol and aging residents begging for a just a little more

dosages of painkillers. Staff shortages make the work overwhelming, so does the worry over funding home visits.

Meanwhile, the young are moving away and high-paying jobs are rare. And now the clinics are seeing a third generation of residents addicted to opioids.

"There is so much beauty here," Probst, who leads El Centro, says in the film. "And there is so much pain."

But seldom do these tourists stop in the drive-by towns and villages where largely Hispanic and Native American residents make their home. And there sits another side of northern New Mexico.

Now, Probst leads dedicated staff members who travel into people's homes and urge them to come in for routine checkups using tough love but no condemnation.

Filmmakers Laura Green and Anna Moot-Levin, both children of health care providers, said they captured around 350 hours of footage.

"It was important not to create a project of hopelessness," Green said. That's why she and Moot-Levin filmed hours of the three providers interacting with patients and reassuring them they controlled their fate, Green said.

Moot-Levin said the pair spent six months looking for the right location to show the challenges of rural health care. They knew immediately northern New Mexico was the spot after learning about Probst and El Centro.

"We found tremendous hope in the relationships, even in bleak circumstances," Moot-Levin said.

The film is scheduled to begin airing online and on most PBS stations on Monday.



**Mojo Marinade:**

- 3/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 cup cilantro, minced
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup fresh squeezed lime juice
- 3 tablespoons fresh garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon fresh oregano, minced
- 2 teaspoons cumin, ground
- kosher salt, to taste
- coarse black pepper, to taste

**Sandwich:**

- 3 1/2 pounds pork shoulder or boneless pork butt
- 2 teaspoons Tabasco Chipotle Sauce
- 3 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 6 pieces Cuban bread or baguette (6 inches each), cut lengthwise
- 8 ounces deli ham, thinly sliced
- 1/2 pound swiss cheese, thinly sliced
- 24 dill pickle chips

- 1 cup unsalted butter

To make Mojo Marinade: In bowl, whisk olive oil, cilantro, orange juice, lime juice, garlic, oregano, cumin, salt and pepper until incorporated. Adjust salt and pepper, to taste. Reserve 4 tablespoons marinade in separate bowl, cover and set aside in refrigerator.

Place pork in large zip-top bag. Cover with Mojo Marinade and close bag. Place in roasting pan and refrigerate overnight.

Heat oven to 450 F.

Remove pork and marinade from bag and place in roasting pan. Cover with foil and cook in oven 45 minutes.

Remove from oven and let rest 20 minutes before slicing. In small bowl, mix chipotle sauce and mayonnaise until fully incorporated.

Spread mixture on bottom bread slice.

On top bread slice, place two slices deli ham, 3-4 ounces roasted pork, two slices swiss cheese, 4-6 pickles and yellow mustard.

Over medium-high heat, butter flat surface of griddle and add reserved Mojo Marinade while butter is melting.

Place assembled sandwiches on griddle, pressing grill weight or heavy skillet on top of sandwiches.

Cook until bottoms are golden brown and cheese is melted.
