## Possible closing of Greenwood stirs emotions

### Parents and teachers state their case in temper flared meeting

Emotions ran high and tempers flared at a Hamilton County School Board workshop Monday, April 18 when parents and teachers gathered inside the administration building to object to the closing of Greenwood School.

Parent Kellie Yeomans-Lindrose has two young children with learning disabilities who attend Greenwood. Her emotionally charged speech to the board had everyone's attention.

"This school is important," she said.

She explained that by law, every student with a disability or learning problem has the right to an education that is provided to them in a place that is designated for children with disabilities.

"A lot of people in this county don't classify kids with disabilities as people," Kellie continued. "They're just things. I've had people call my kids (and other kids) things. They're not. They're living human beings with feelings and they deserve every opportunity to get the education they need and deserve. If you close Greenwood, what's going to happen?" she asked

### HCSO and White Springs PD taking unwanted prescriptions

On April 30 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and the White Springs Police Department, in cooperation with the Hamilton County Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention Coalition, and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of po-

tentially dangerous, expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked. Bring your medications for

steel-drum grill behind his pickup truck, Teddy Bear pulled into the campsite at Stephen Foster State Park with his fully-equipped mobile kitchen, ready to feed a small army of hungry diners.

The menu consisted of deep-fried venison, barbecued chicken and ribs, drunken chicken, both grilled and boiled corn on the cob, baked beans, sweet potatoes served in scooped-out orange halves, and the crowd favorite - grilled cabbage seasoned with bacon, sausage and Teddy Bear's secret sauce, which was handed down to him from his father. That didn't include all the yummy dessert pies and cakes that were supplied by other members of the community.

"My dad was named Yogi Bear and I am Teddy Bear," he told the UF students who were hovering around the grill savoring the delicious aromas. "I even have a brother named Poo Bear."

In 1955, Marshall was born into a family of 19 children and raised on a farm in the White Springs area, about a mile from the state park. With such a large family, all of the kids had chores to do, he said. They learned about farming from their father and how to cook from their mother.

"There was 19 of us and I had to work hard to help cook for everybody," he said.

Mayor Miller's husband, Ed, said that as an adult in the 90s, Teddy Bear was injured on the job while doing construction work, which meant he had to find a new career. So, he set out to do what he does best, and that's cooking.

Having to ambulate with the use of a cane proved cumbersome, but it didn't stop Teddy Bear from pursuing his passion.

White Springs Town Manager, Robert Townsend, said Teddy Bear's father, Leroy Marshall Sr., aside from his farming business, did wood carvings, while at the same time selling his special grilled cabbage off the barbecue grill.

"There was always

meat in the pot," Townsend said of the Marshall family. "It could have been a turkey, a gator or any kind of animal."

Ed mentioned that food critics came into White Springs one day and they asked Teddy Bear to cook an all-garde feast.

"He came through with flying colors," Ed said. "The only thing he won't touch is armadillo. His father got sick from it. They carry viruses."

Teddy Bear's dream is to open a restaurant and he doesn't care about the money, Ed said. He just enjoys cooking.

"He's an absolutely wonderful person," Ed went on. "Everybody knows him. He's kind of a self-made entrepreneur. Any food not eaten tonight will go back to the community."

After dinner and dessert, Teddy Bear was still frying up a batch of catfish, which got rave reviews from all who tried a piece. Someone had given Martha Kohen, professor of College of Design, Construction and Planning at UF, a small piece of fish, which she was enjoying when Teddy Bear spotted her coming toward him.

"Hey, Martha, you about ready?" he called out. "You got the bum part. I got you a better piece," he told her, and then he handed her a full-sized chunk of catfish.

"Absolutely," she said. "Let me tell you, I've never had catfish like this."

"Teddy Bear, it was awesome," said Merri McKenzie, wife of White Springs Vice Mayor Walter McKenzie. "I am so stuffed, I am up to here," she said, pointing above her mouth.

"So, what did you put in...?" UF student, Jose Cruz, started to ask, but Teddy Bear cut him off.

"Unh, unh, unh..." Teddy Bear said, shaking his head, obviously not willing to give away any secret recipes.

At the end of the evening, wonderful and delicious were just two of the words spoken by the UF students to describe Teddy Bear's cooking. Need-

less to say, there were a lot of doggie bags taken home that night.

"I'm not much at words," Teddy Bear said, when asked to define his life. "I got a blessing and the good Lord told me to do something. That's what I do."

He ended the night by saying, "I love this country."

disposal to the following sites:

Last September Americans turned in 242,000 pounds (121 tons) of prescription drugs at nearly 4,100 sites operated by the DEA, and more than 3,000 state and local enforcement partners, including Hamilton County Sheriff's Office and White Springs Police Department.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number

the board. "They're going to go into the general population with mean, vicious bullying kids who don't understand children with disabilities."

She suggested that the board should "take away from those pet projects and give it to the school that needs it

the most. The kids with disabilities."

She ended by saying that things with the school board were too political and that the kids at Greenwood are not a political issue.

"These kids need us, so why don't y'all do something for them," Kellie said as she left the podium.

Elizabeth Taylor, intermediate class teacher at Greenwood, spoke to address practical concerns about the suggestion of closing the school.

"At Greenwood we have a physical therapy room, we have physical therapy equipment that is shared among the students, so I'm wondering how that would work out," Taylor said. "Are we going to have to purchase more and have it in two locations? That's something to consider. We have adaptive bicycles and playground equipment, which is a safe playground for handicapped students."

Many students at Greenwood have eating difficulties and Taylor asked where they would be fed. She said that Greenwood was not a big moneymaker because of the small amount of students at the school. Then she asked if insurance savings by closing the school would make a difference, since the school board would still own the building and have to keep the building insured.

Surretta Bell, intermediate class paraprofessional at Greenwood, asked that all the board members come out to Greenwood School and meet the students.

"It has been very complicated for our students to mingle with regular students," Bell said. "I know that kind of sounds bad, but they have learned over the years to accept each other in the environment that they're in. Our bathrooms have been adjusted so that we can manage and maneuver around. I wish that y'all could have come out and I would have been one of the ones to follow you around and show you what it looks like there."

Bell went on to say that it isn't easy, but each and every one of the staff loves the students at Greenwood.

"Talk about money?" Bell asked. "Let's talk about the kids. What's important, the money or the kids?"

Several parents whose children attend Greenwood addressed the

board in tearful, emotional pleas to keep

Greenwood School intact. One parent said that autistic children don't deal well with change, and if they are forced into changes then they will regress.

Pastor Philip M. Jackson, who is a long-time member of the support staff at Greenwood spoke. He stated that he goes to Greenwood everyday and he never sees board members there. He challenged them to come out to the school and witness the changing of a diaper on a 22-year-old student. He said he saw board members Jeanie Daniels and Johnny Bullard out there, but none of the other board members.

"Superintendent, you need to come and see for yourself," Jackson told Butler.

"I have, thank you, P.J.," Butler countered.

"Let me set you straight."

"No, don't set me straight," Jackson retorted.

"I have been there," Butler repeated. "Don't you stand there and say I haven't."

Jackson said, "I saw you on the outskirts, but I haven't saw you coming in the classroom. I go there everyday and I haven't saw you go room to room. That's what I'm saying. I ain't mad," he said.

"Well, I am, now," Butler countered.

Jackson went on to say that closing North or South Elementary would make more sense, or that the big salaries of the board members and the administrative team were where the cuts should be taken and not by closing Greenwood.

Bullard then spoke to the entire board and the audience, stating that his first trip to Greenwood years ago was an eye-opening experience.

"I think it would behoove everybody to go out and take a look at Greenwood, including me," he said. "To go back, in the good old Baptist term, I may need a revival."

It was then agreed to continue discussion of Greenwood School at the next board meeting.

Daniels followed up stating that she didn't want anyone to think that it was an easy job to sit on the board and make decisions on cuts. She said nothing has been determined yet, and they are just discussing things that have been put out there for them to consider.

dual enrollment, Florida students may use their results for FCAT concordant scores, as well as eligibility for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship program.

HCHS will be hosting the last ACT assessment for the 2010-11 school year on June 11, 2011. Deadline to register is May 6 and must be done online at [www.actstudent.org](http://www.actstudent.org). The fee to register is \$33 for ACT (no writing) and \$48 for ACT Plus Writing. Students in grades 11 and 12 who are on free or reduced lunch are eligible for two fee waivers while they are in high school. They must see Tammy Law to receive one prior to registration.

Test prep booklets are available in her office. Additional prep materials are also available for check-out in the HCHS Media Center and for purchase online at the ACT website.

# OPINION Smugglers as heroes

Smugglers are heroes of sorts. The essence of what a smuggler offers is: "Government tyrants want to either prevent or interfere with peaceable voluntary exchange among individuals. I can reduce the impact of that interference." Let's look at smuggling, keeping in mind that not everything illegal is immoral and not everything legal is moral.

Leading up to our War of Independence, the British, under the Navigation Acts, had levied taxes on a wide range of imports. One of those taxes was on molasses imported from non-British islands. John Hancock, whose flamboyant signature graces our Declaration of Independence, had a thriving business smuggling an estimated 1.5 million gallons of molasses a year. His smuggling practices financed much of the resistance to British authority. In fact, a joke of the time was "Sam Adams writes

the letters (to newspapers) and John Hancock pays the postage."

Hancock's smuggling, as well as that of many others, made the people of our nation better off by providing cheaper prices for molasses used for making rum. British oppressors were worse off by having lower tax revenues.

In 1920, the 18th Amendment, prohibiting the production, distribution and sale of alcoholic beverages in the United States, went into effect. It had wide public support. In my opinion, no case can be made for stopping another person from enjoying beer, wine and whiskey. That's oppression,

but along came heroes to the rescue. The ink hadn't dried on the 18th Amendment before smugglers started smuggling beer and whiskey from Canada and Mexico. Ships lined up along our shores, just beyond the three-mile limit, to off-load whiskey onto speedboats. Smugglers and bootleggers spared millions of Americans from do-gooder oppression.

While the smuggler qua smuggler is my hero, sev-

eral important negative effects surround his activity. Smuggling is illegal. It becomes a sometimes-nasty criminal enterprise because those who engage in it tend to be people with an overall lower regard for the law.

Since smuggling is illegal, disputes must be settled with guns and violence instead of courts. Plus, police and other public officials are corrupted. Worse of all is the reduced respect for laws by the public at large. After the 18th Amendment's repeal, virtually all of the crime and corruption associated with Prohibition disappeared.

Not many Americans are aware of today's big smuggling activity -- cigarette smuggling. Confiscatory taxes that are as high as \$7 a pack, in New York City, making one pack of cigarettes sell for \$13, have encouraged a thriving smuggling business across our country. Like Prohibition, confiscatory tobacco taxes are popular with Americans.

A recent study by Michael LaFaive and Todd Nesbit of the Midland, Michigan-based Mackinac Center for Public Policy titled "Cigarette Taxes and Smuggling" shows that states with the highest cigarette smuggling rates are those with the highest tobacco taxes such as Arizona (51.8 percent of the state's total consumption are smuggled), New York (47.5 percent), Rhode Island (40.5 percent), New Mexico

(37.2 percent) and California (36.3 percent).

Cigarette smuggling, like yesteryear's whiskey smuggling, has become a livelihood for criminals. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives has found that Russian, Armenian, Ukrainian, Chinese, Taiwanese and Middle Eastern (mainly Pakistani, Lebanese and Syrian) organized crime groups are highly involved in the trafficking of contraband and counterfeit cigarettes. What's worse is that some of these groups use their earnings to provide financial assistance to terrorist organizations such as Hezbollah and Hamas. That means tax-hungry politicians and anti-tobacco zealots are providing the means for aid to America's enemies.

The solution to cigarette smuggling, and the criminal activities associated with it, is to eliminate the confiscatory taxes. Unfortunately for tax-hungry politicians and anti-tobacco zealots, who see confiscatory taxes as a tool in their moral crusade against tobacco, only benefits count. For them, the costs of their agenda are irrelevant or secondary at best. And, as novelist C.S. Lewis put it, "Of all tyrannies a tyranny sincerely exercised for the good of its victims may be the most oppressive."







Troubles that can only be overcome or even accepted by the understanding that we are not in control, nor does this world revolve around us. According to James 1:2-3, trials develop perseverance, which produces maturity. Webster's defines maturity as being fully developed. In context, we are mature not because of our physical size or the number of our years, but by how clearly we can differentiate between an inconvenience and an authentic trial. We are wise to learn to tell the difference, because our hearts matter!

## Review team learns about SRWMD's largest restoration project; provides input on land management practices

LIVE OAK, FL, April 13, 2011 – In the 1950s, when industrial landowners began to convert Mallery Swamp (Lafayette County) to pine plantations by draining water off the property, the swamp lost some of its ability to hold rainwater and gently feed it to the Steinhatchee and Suwannee rivers downstream. In 2001, a strike of lightning ignited the dry land and a wildfire swept through 60,000 acres of the swamp.

Now the Suwannee River Water Management District (District) is in the process of restoring the land back to its natural state and condition. In 1999, the District purchased a conservation easement on the property to protect the land from further development and in 2002 the District acquired full management and ownership of nearly 30,000 acres of the property.

On April 5, a group of about 25 biologists, foresters, parks and recreation specialists, environmentalists and landowners toured Mallery Swamp and other District lands to provide feedback on the District's land management practices. The group, referred to as the land management review team, tours District property annually; their comments are later presented to the District's Governing Board.

Before taking the tour, the group heard a presentation about land management practices and recreational opportunities on several District properties, including Mallery Swamp – home of the District's largest single restoration project.

Beau Willsey, District environmental scientist, gave a presentation on the history of Mallery Swamp.

About 30 years after landowners installed a system of drainage canals, scientists determined that the hydrological alterations were increasing the discharge of water from the Steinhatchee River into the Gulf of Mexico, he told the group.

"The increased flow had the potential to negatively affect aquatic organisms in the river downstream to the gulf," Willsey said. Such alterations also changed the hydrology of the swamp and affected natural vegetation and related wildlife.

On the tour, the land management review team saw firsthand what the District has done to restore the natural hydrology of the swamp and related natural communities. Members of the team asked questions and made suggestions along the way.

Willsey and Scott Gregor, District natural resource specialist, discussed the extensive network of canals and ditches previously installed to drain the swamp and what the District has done to reverse the effects of such alterations.

A member of the review team, Jack Ewel (ecologist and farmer), praised the District's efforts to install culverts, ditch blocks and other structures to restore groundwater levels and natural drainage patterns.

Land managers have installed 311 culverts, 58 ditch blocks and eight flashboard riser structures to reduce the flow of water into the Steinhatchee and Suwannee rivers and to recharge the aquifer and rehydrate wetlands within the swamp.

Data from groundwater and surface water monitoring devices and the response of vegetation in wetland areas will be used to determine whether restoration goals are being met.

Willsey and Gregor also discussed the correlation between restoring water resources and the health of the ecosystem.

Management activities, such as prescribed burning and reforestation are tools being used to restore natural plant communities with vegetation that existed prior to land use alterations.

Plant and animal species on the property are monitored to determine the effects of land management activities on such species and whether the District is successful at returning the land back to its pre-altered state.

Another review team member, Jacqui Sulek (Four Rivers Audubon Society), suggested the District do more extensive monitoring of birds on the property and she offered to provide volunteers from her group to implement that.

"One tool for measuring the quality of a natural community is how many birds or other species are present; it's like if you build it [natural habitat], they will come," said Gregor.

Since 2003, the District has spent more than \$3.4 million on restoration efforts. About \$2.4 million was provided by the United States Natural Resource Conservation Service through the agency's Wetlands Reserve Program.

Restoration efforts at Mallery Swamp are a key example of the District's land acquisition and management goals. The District acquires and manages lands for flood control, water quality protection and natural resource conservation. District lands are open to the public for recreational opportunities, such as hunting, fishing, hiking, camping and horseback riding.

The purpose of the land management review team is to determine whether District land managers are fulfilling their statutory obligations, complying with District policy and improving land management practices. The District is statutorily required to get feedback on its land management practices each year. Invitations are sent to various local governments, agencies, organizations and citizens in order to form a land management review team.

TALLAHASSEE-The area started with about 75 athletes competing at regionals, after the weekend we are down to just eight left.

Branford's Ashley Horn, Logan Boss, David Bass and Stephanie Copeland all qualified for state along with Hamilton County's Antonio Turner and the 4x100 relay team of Anthony Ingram, Gerald Bristol, Will Hill and Turner after finishing in the top four at the Region I-1A meet Friday at Maclay.

Boss (47.23) broke the school record in the 300 hurdles winning the event nearly two seconds ahead of runner-up Maclay's Imoni McCorvey.

Horn (5:38.59) broke the school record which she set earlier in the season finish-

ing fourth in the 1600 run.

Copeland (110-4) finished second in the discus ahead of Morgan Jones from Baker.

Bass (1:58.29) broke the school record on his way to winning the 800 run ahead of runner-up Maclay's Scott Billings.

#### GIRLS

Copeland (32-11) nearly qualified in the shot put finishing fifth, two feet behind fourth place finisher Jones.

Horn (12:39.25) nearly qualified for the 3200 finishing fifth two seconds behind fourth place finisher Baker's Katie Rispono (12:37.31). Teammate sixth grader Taylor Jones (13:55) finished in ninth in the 3200 run.

Olivia Boney was twelfth in the 100 dash ahead of Hamilton's Dre'nisha Peterson, who finished fifteenth. Boney also placed twelfth in the 200 and fourteenth

in the long jump, while teammate Cameron Casube was seventh in the pole vault.

Boss (who finished fifth in the high jump) and teammate Typhani Whitley finished tenth and eleventh in the triple jump, while Lafayette's Elizabeth Anderson held off Branford's Montana Bailey to finish ninth in the 400.

Branford's 4x800 relay team nearly qualified for state finishing fifth.

Hamilton and Lafayette finished eleventh and thirteenth in the 4x100 relay, while Lafayette and Branford finished eleventh and thirteenth in the 4x800 relay.

Maclay won the girls title with 116 points, over runner-up St. Johns Country Day (98.50), Port St. Joe (69), Graceville (61) and Baker (60). Branford finished seventh with 39.5 points, while Lafayette finished seventeenth with three points.

#### BOYS

The 4x100 relay team of Turner, Ingram, Bristol and Hill finished second with a time of 43.60 behind winner Sneads (43.21).

Turner finished second in the long jump and triple jump behind Maclay's Lee Williams in both events good enough to qualify for state.

La Willis and Branford's Kenny Johnson finished eleventh and fourteenth in the long jump, while Simmons and Hill placed fifth and sixth in the triple jump.

Ingram (11.24) placed fifth in the 100 dash, missing state by .1 second behind Sneads's Xavier Eutsay (11.23). Ingram was seventh in the 200 dash, while Hill was twelfth and Ingram was fifth in the high jump, while Bristol was ninth.

Cole Lamb held off Hamilton's Ryan Hart to finish eighth in the 400 dash, while Hart and Wade Norris finished seventh and eighth in the 800 run.

Hamilton County's Destin Walker was fifteenth in the shot put, while teammates Dustin Bryant and Deonte Simmons finished ninth and eleventh in the discus.

Branford's Dakota Blunt finished tenth in the 1600 run, while Lafayette's Octavio Escamilia held off Branford's Cameron Daughtry to finish twelfth in the 3200 run.

Simmons finished sixth in the 100 hurdles, missing the state meet by one second.

Branford and Lafayette finished fifth and tenth in the 4x800 relay as the Bucs missed qualifying for state by two seconds.

Aubrey Sapp (12-0) finished fifth in the pole

vault, one-foot behind fourth place finisher Matt Kim of Maclay. Teammates Lazaro Hernandez and Nicholas Dickorson finished seventh and ninth in the pole vault.

Maclay made it a sweep winning the boys title with 136 points, well ahead of runner-up Sneads (55), Baker (52), Pensacola Christian (52) and Hamilton County (49). Branford finished eleventh out of 22 teams, with 26 points.

Region I-2A  
After sending just two guys to state last season, Suwannee looked to better

that with 20 athletes competing at the Region I-2A meet Friday at Bolles. Unfortunately, no one qualified for state as Suwannee was shut out at the regional meet.

The Bulldogs best chance to send someone to state was Rashad Gardenhire (2:01.58), who finished seventh in the 800

run (two seconds from

qualifying for state) and Tanisha Wheeler, who finished seventh in the pole vault.

Jon-Keyth Godwin placed eleventh in the 100 hurdles and thirteenth in the 300 hurdles, while teammates Cody Carlton and Austin Collins tied for twelfth in the pole vault.

Josh Randolph tied for thirteenth in the long jump, Andre Zanders and Randolph finished eighth and fifteenth in the triple jump and Keith Cordle was eleventh in the discus and sixteenth in the shot put.

Godby claimed the boys title with 128 points, ahead of Episcopal (88), West Florida Tech (60), Bolles (51) and Raines (40).

Suwannee finished tied with Rutherford for twenty-second place with six points beating out Bradford, Union County, Marianna and West Nassau.

For the girls, Wheeler finished fifteenth in the 100 and 200 yard dash and Linsay Michal finished twelfth in the 800, eleventh in the pole vault and twelfth in the 1600 run.

Juliana Roush was fifteenth in the 3200 run, Amanda McCall was fourteenth in the 100 hurdles, Kiara Davis fifteenth in the discus and both the 4x400 and 4x800 relays were both fourteenth.

Bolles claimed the team title with 103 points, ahead of runner-up Raines (81 points), Godby (59), Episcopal (55.5) and West Florida Tech (45.5).

Suwannee finished twenty-third out of 24 teams finishing with 1.5 points ahead of Madison County.



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## Spring Not Fun for Allergy Sufferers

Many embrace the spring thanks to its warm weather and budding flowers and trees. Those with seasonal allergies, however, may not look so favorably on the new season.

According to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation, about 50 million Americans experience spring allergies. Some may have allergies each and every year. Others may find their allergies are newly discovered. The most common allergy triggers in spring include trees, grasses and weeds.

Allergies can evoke a number of symptoms:

- \* itchy eyes
- \* sneezing
- \* congestion
- \* headaches
- \* coughing
- \* runny nose
- \* sore throat
- \* shortness of breath
- \* hives

Several of the symptoms of allergies mimic those of the common cold, and allergies are often mistaken for late winter colds. But as time spent outdoors with flowering plants triggers symptoms or inhalation of dust from spring cleaning induces an attack, the allergy culprit may become more apparent.

Pollen is one of the main contributors to allergies in the spring. For many people, pollen is seen as an outside invader to the body and its immune system. When pollen is inhaled or comes in contact with the eyes, the immune system triggers a response to get rid of the foreign substance. Excess mucous buildup and tears may be generated to wash out the

pollen. What all of this fluid can mean is sinus pressure, runny nose, watery eyes, and eventually cough or congestion from fluids running down the breathing passages and into the lungs.

As the body prepares to fend off pollen invaders, other symptoms may occur. Fatigue, aches and pains and other flu-like symptoms may be present. While battling pollen, the immune system is in full swing and may not be able to fully devote attention to other invaders, like bacteria and viruses. A person with allergies might be more susceptible to sickness.

There really are no cures for common allergies, only methods to manage the symptoms. Individuals with strong allergies to pollen should avoid spending a lot of time outside when pollen counts are especially high or the wind is blowing pollen around. Pollen predictions can be obtained through the local weather report or doing a little investigating online. Here are some other steps to limit troublesome springtime allergies.

- \* Take a shower to wash off pollen from hair and skin after coming indoors.
- \* Launder clothes regularly.
- \* Keep windows and doors closed on high pollen days.
- \* Use a HEPA air filter inside of the home.
- \* Do not air-dry clothes, linens or other items outdoors on a clothesline.

\* Consider using a saline irrigation spray to improve breathing and cleanse the nasal passages of pollen.

\* Talk with a doctor about the best OTC products available for allergy symptoms. If those are ineffective, prescription medications may work.

\* Some people find relief from alternative health treatments, such as acupuncture or ear candling.

Being proactive about seasonal allergies can mean getting relief earlier or even preventing serious complications in the spring.

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## Fact Sheet on the claims and litigation process for the Deepwater Horizon oil spill

Attorney General Pam Bondi has made responding to the oil spill a priority of her administration. This response includes facilitating the individual and business claims process, assisting in the development of the state's claims, working with local governments, as needed, and pursuing, in conjunction with the Department of Environmental Protection, environmental claims on behalf of the State of Florida. As Florida's chief legal officer, the Attorney General is responsible for, among other things, bringing lawsuits on behalf of the state and offering legal advice to other governmental agencies.

### I. The Oil Pollution Act

With regard to the oil spill, the most important statute is the federal Oil Pollution Act (OPA). OPA allows those harmed by the oil spill - state government, local governments, businesses, and individuals - to recover economic losses caused by the oil spill. To promote compensation without resorting to litigation, OPA requires potential claimants to first present their damages claim to the responsible party before filing a lawsuit.

### II. The Attorney General Office's Role with Respect to Various Claims under OPA

#### a. The State Claim under OPA

In anticipation of presenting an OPA claim to BP on behalf of the State of Florida, the Attorney General's Office has coordinated a multi-agency effort to identify and quantify the state's damages as a result of the oil spill. Such damages could include lost tax revenues and clean-up costs. Other agencies involved in this effort include, among others, the Office of the Governor, the Legislature, and the Department of Revenue. Once the necessary data and supporting information have been assembled, the state's claim will be presented to BP for payment.

#### b. Individual and Business Claims

In conjunction with the Obama administration, BP appointed Mr. Ken Feinberg as the administrator of the Gulf Coast Claims Facility (GCCF) to resolve individual and business claims under OPA. The GCCF and Mr. Feinberg are responsible for the processing of individual and business

claims for economic loss from the oil spill. The Attorney General has kept the pressure on Mr. Feinberg to make the claims process faster, more efficient, and more transparent for claimants. Additionally, our office has contacted the GCCF on numerous occasions to request expedited review of claims for individuals and businesses facing severe hardship.

The Attorney General's role in this process has been to aggressively communicate with Mr. Feinberg to bring more transparency and fairness to the claims process for individuals and businesses. To date, improvements have occurred, but the Attorney General continues to actively monitor the process and engage in discussions to further those goals.

#### c. Local Government Claims

The Attorney General's Office has also worked for many months with the Florida Association of Counties, the Florida League of Cities, individual counties, and certain interested legislators and local officials, providing them with information regarding the OPA and how the claims process was contemplated to work.

#### III. Multi-District Litigation

Separate from the OPA claims process, there is also pending "multi-district" litigation in federal court in New Orleans, La. That litigation involves hundreds of lawsuits that have been filed by a wide array of parties against BP, Transocean (the owner of the oil rig) and others. In one aspect of the litigation, Transocean has sought to limit its liability to the scrap value of the oil rig - approximately \$27 million.

The judge overseeing the litigation has imposed a deadline of April 20, 2011, for any interested party to assert certain claims against Transocean.

The deadline does not apply to any litigation that could be brought against BP or other defendants. The Attorney General's Office is evaluating whether it is in the state's interest to file a lawsuit against Transocean at this time.

**Ask the Guys**

Dear Classified Guys, I've been a cash-in-hand man since I bought my first car in 1968 for \$300. When I buy something, I buy it outright. No loans. If I can't afford it, I save until I have the money. I'm trying to buy a 2008 Jetta from a guy who is not like me. He owes \$10,500 on his car loan, so the bank still has the title. He suggested I just pay him so he can square away with the bank and mail me the title. Seems awfully strange to me. How does one go about buying a car that the owner still has on loan?

**Cash:** That's an excellent question and one that many people have to deal with in today's "Buy now, pay later" market. Someone like yourself, who pays cash, is a rare breed. Today, people commonly spend money before they have it.

**Carry:** It seems everything is paid in easy monthly payments: cars, houses, appliances, alimony...

**Cash:** No need to worry, though. Buying a car that a seller has on loan is quite simple. It just takes a little coordination.

**Carry:** Your concerns about handing over \$10,500 are correct. There's risk in



giving your money to a seller without receiving the title and a bill of sale for the vehicle. A better bet is to complete the transaction at the bank.

**Cash:** Here's how your deal may take place. Once you've negotiated a price with the seller, ask him to make an appointment with his loan officer.

Before your meeting, have two bank checks prepared. One should be made out to the bank for the amount left on the loan, in your case, \$10,500. Have the other check made out to the seller for any difference you owe in the negotiated price.


**Carry:** For instance, if you agreed on \$12,000 as the selling price, you will

need to pay the seller an additional \$1500.

**Cash:** At the appointment, the bank will sign the title over to you upon receiving your check. Have them also fill out a bill of sale so you can register the car in your name.

**Carry:** Purchasing a vehicle on loan can work to your benefit. Sellers are often so happy to be out from underneath loan payments that they sell the car for the remaining loan amount. You may be able to purchase that Jetta for \$10,500.

**Cash:** That's a far cry from your \$300 purchase in 1968, but a good deal nonetheless. Nowadays, you're lucky if \$300 buys you a good set of tires.
