## 3 sites in White Springs make history

The Town of White Springs now has three more historic sites included in the U.S. National Register of Historic Places with the addition of two homes and the current New Bethel AME Church.

"I couldn't be more pleased that our community has taken this step forward in recognizing the unique and fascinating history of White Springs," said Tracy Woodard, Historic Society Secretary/Treasurer and Chair of the White Springs Historic Preservation Agency.

The Town of White Springs is rich with history, dating back to the 1530s when Spanish explorers first arrived in Florida and encountered the Timucuan Indians living along the banks of the Suwannee River. Much has happened since that time and on Sept. 19, 1997 the White Springs Historic District was placed in the U.S. National Register of Historic Places through efforts of the White Springs Historic Preservation Society.

The historic district is roughly bounded by River, First, Suwannee, and Hewitt streets, CR 25A, US 81 and Suwannee Road, covering about 1,200 acres and over 80 different buildings, sites and objects. At a recent city council meeting in September, it was announced that three more buildings/sites were added to the register, one of which is a bit unusual.

The two homes that were added were built before 1904. One is painted blue and the other is painted yellow. They sit on opposing corners of Roberts (US 41) and Jewett Streets. The site where the current New Bethel AME Church now sits on the corner of Spring Street (US 41) and Adams Memorial Drive was also added to the register.

In case you're confused, US 41 runs through the town of White Springs, and depending where you are along the highway, it may be referred to as Spring Street or Roberts Street as you travel through the historic district.

## "School Lunch – Let's Grow Healthy"

Teaching Hamilton school students how healthy foods are grown

This fall, in celebration of National School Lunch Week October 10-14, Hamilton School District is hosting "School Lunch – Let's Grow Healthy" a campaign to help students understand where their food comes from and to get excited about healthy school lunch choices.

The campaign, which also coincides with National Farm to School Month, will put a spotlight on the Florida sourced foods served in Hamilton County schools. Please contact your child's school for menu and meal times. The adult meal price for lunch is \$3.25 at the elementary Schools and \$3.50 at the high school.

Serving more than 31 million children every school day, the federally-funded National School Lunch Program (NSLP) provides nutritionally balanced, healthy meals. The program, which has been serving the nation's children for over 60 years, requires school meals to meet federal nutrition standards.

Meals are based on the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, meaning they contain no more than 30 percent of calories from fat, and less than 10 percent from saturated fat.

School lunches include fruits and vegetables, grains and proteins, as well as milk, and they must provide one-third of the recommended dietary allowances of protein, Vita-

# 3 sites in White Springs make history

According to Woodard, the Leavitt home and the Canfield-Gonzalez home qualified under four of eight criteria that determine eligibility for placement in the White Springs Local Register. They were built as quarters for two key employees of the RJ and BF Camp Lumber Mill, which operated between 1897 and 1904. John Council (Buddy) Camp, in his memoir, "Those Were the Days", stated that his grandfather Benjamin Franklin Camp built the Leavitt home for Willie Williams, a member of the extended Virginia Camp family, who came to work in White Springs. The Canfield-Gonzalez house, Woodard said, was built for an unnamed employee.

"There were many more 'mill houses' built, but they have been lost to time and change," said Woodard.

The criteria they met were: 1) It is identified with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the Town; 2) It has distinguishing characteristics of an architectural style valued for the study of a period, method of construction, or use of indigenous materials; 3) Its character is a geographically definable area possessing a significant concentration or continuity of sites, buildings, objects, or structures united in past events or aesthetically by plan or physical development; and 4) its character is an established and geographically definable neighborhood, united in architectural style, or

physical plan and development.

The New Bethel AME church, Woodard said, was not identified in the 1996 survey. However, it is the original site of the church, which has been in existence since 1889 when the congregation used a house on the property from that point up until 1909. Therefore, the property itself qualifies as a local historic site.

"The building there now was built in 1973 and does not qualify as a historic building, since that honor is reserved for buildings and structures at least 50 years old," said Woodard. "New Bethel AME was listed by the White Springs Town Council upon the recommendation of the White Springs Historic Preservation Agency in their September meeting."

The criteria to qualify were: 1) Its value is a significant reminder of the cultural or archeological heritage of the Town, state or nation. 2) Its location is a site of significant local, state or national event. 3) It is identified with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the Town.

"The African Methodist Episcopal Church underwent tremendous growth in the late 1880s," Woodard stated. "White Springs' congregation began in that time."

African Americans of White Springs overcame great odds and acquired property on which they could meet, worship and build a sanctuary, Woodard explained. Among past members and officers of New Bethel AME Church, she

said, were John Graham, White Springs' first African American Mayor; Noah Bennett, the first black agricultural agent; Willie Guy Turner, first African American council member, Mrs. Pauline Anderson and Mrs. Sadie Turner, teachers; Prof. E.W. Graham, principal at Carver School; Barbara Thomas, first black county nurse; Jake Bradley and Bernard Williams, past town council members.

"We've seen good times and bad here, but our people are matchless for their ability to thrive," Woodard said. "Our Local Historic Register is a celebration of our buildings, sites and people of the past. Hopefully, we will be mindful of them and their legacy as we live here, building upon the past to meet our future."

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

## Police Chief Monthly Report

I am happy to start off October's report with some really great news. The Town of White Springs is one of seven cities in the State of Florida that will receive a COP'S grant. What that means to us is that we will be adding another officer to the Department.

This grant is very competitive and I cannot stress enough the effort and hard work that went in to writing it. I assigned that particular task to Lt Rodriquez and she did an outstanding job with it. That being said it was a total team effort on the part of the Town Staff. This grant requires a lot of research and information. I probably averaged at least one hour a day in meetings with Mr Townsend, Ms Heath and Ms Tomlinson getting the information I needed. Each time they would drop what they were doing and assist me with what I needed. I cannot thank them enough.

Now I have to come down off my cloud and get to business. Many of you have been victims of vehicle burglaries lately. While these types of crimes are hard to solve and prosecute

they are not impossible. I am going to pass on a list of suggestions to combat these crimes and if everyone will chip in I am positive they will decrease and so will the loss of property.

1. Lock your car. If you feel you would rather leave it unlocked to avoid damage to it then do not leave valuables in it such as cameras, jewelry, cash or important papers.

2. NEVER LEAVE YOUR FIREARM IN YOUR VEHICLE: A firearm left in an unsecured vehicle is a crime in the State of Florida. You can also be civilly liable if that firearm is taken from an unlocked car and used to injure someone. I am a firm believer in the right to bear arms but that right comes with a lot of responsibility.

In closing let me remind you that I am here if you need me. Please feel free to contact me.



Social Security disaster

Politicians who are principled enough to point out the fraud of Social Security, referring to it as a lie and Ponzi scheme, are under siege. Acknowledgment of Social Security's problems is not the same as calling for the abandonment of its recipients. Instead, it's a call to take actions now, while there's time to avert a disaster. Let's look at it.

The term was derived from the scheme created during the 1920s by Charles Ponzi, a poor but enterprising Italian immigrant. Here's how it works. You persuade some people to give you their money to invest. After a while, you pay them a nice return, but the return doesn't come from investments. What you pay them with comes from the money of other people whom you've persuaded to "invest" in your scheme. The scheme works so long as you can persuade greater and greater numbers of people to "invest" so that you can pay off earlier "investors." After a while, Ponzi couldn't find enough new investors, and his scheme collapsed. He was convicted of fraud and sent to prison.

The very first Social Security check went to Ida May Fuller in 1940. She

paid just \$24.75 in Social Security taxes but collected a total of \$22,888.92 in benefits, getting back all she put into Social Security in a month. According to a Congressional Research Service report titled "Social Security Reform" (October 2002), by Geoffrey Kollmann and Dawn Nuschler, workers who retired in 1980 at age 65 got back all they put into Social Security, plus interest, in 2.8 years. Workers who retired at age 65 in 2002 will have to wait a total of 16.9 years to break even. For those retiring in 2020, it will take 20.9 years. Workers entering the labor force today won't live long enough to get back even half of what they will put into Social Security. Social Security faces Ponzi's problem, not enough new "investors." In 1940, there were 160 workers paying into Social Security per retiree; today there are only 2.9 and falling.

Some politicians claim that Social Security has a huge trust fund and is

in good health. An uniformed public and a derelict news media don't challenge that lie. Back in August, politicians were in a tizzy over raising the federal debt limit. In an effort to frighten seniors, President Barack Obama said in a CBS interview, "I cannot guarantee that those checks go out on Aug. 3 if we haven't resolved this issue, because there may simply not be the money in the coffers to do it." Here's how we reveal the trust fund lie: According to the Social Security Administration, it has a trust fund with \$2.6 trillion in it. If those were real assets, then the Social Security Administration could have mailed checks out regardless of what Congress did about the debt limit. The reality is that the Social Security trust fund consists of government IOUs that have no real value at all and probably are not even worth the paper upon which they are printed.

I believe that a person who is 65 years old and has been forced into So-

cial Security is owed something. But the question is, Who owes it to him? Congress has spent every penny of his Social Security "contribution." Young workers have no obligation to be fleeced in order to make up for the dishonesty and dereliction of Congress. The tragedy is that most seniors just want their money and couldn't care less about whom Congress takes it from.

Here's what might be a temporary fix: The federal government owns huge quantities of wasting assets -- assets that are not producing anything -- 650 million acres of land, almost 30 percent of the land area of the United States. In exchange for those who choose to opt out of Social Security and forsake any future claim, why not pay them off with 40 or so acres of land? Doing so would give us breathing room to develop a free choice method to finance retirement.

# Healthy Living

Stress. We all experience it on various levels at various times. If you asked a group of people 'what is stress', you are likely to get dozens of answers. Stress is essentially our body's reaction to a stressor, real or perceived. Good stress, or eustress, is a positively perceived stressor, and distress any stress perceived to be negative. Both kinds of stress put our bodies into an excited state so we can meet the challenges they present to us.

Many times how stress impacts us is a matter of perception. In the workplace for example, people are under the stress of expectations for performance and competition from coworkers. If individuals see the competition as motivating and perform on a higher level, the stress has positively affected them. However, if the stress in turn triggers extreme worry and anxiety causing a decrease in performance, less desirable results ensue (a powerful example of how perception influences reality).

mentally, emotionally, and physiologically).

Scientist Hans Selye (known as the father of stress research) in 1936 introduced his General Adaptation Theory stating the body responds to any external source of stress with a predictable biological pattern in an attempt to restore the body's internal homeostasis characterized by three distinct stages. During the initial stage or alarm phase, our first reaction is recognizing stress and preparing to deal with it, known as fight or flight response. Hormones cortisol, adrenaline, and norepinephrine are released providing us with instant energy and a deadening effect to pain. During the following stage, resistance, the stress is resolved, and the body begins to restore balance through repair, recovery, and renewal. Stage three, Exhaustion, occurs if this process is repeated chronically over time, and is very hazardous to your health.

Chronic stressful states

have been linked to compromised immune system function, high blood pressure, blood clots, atherosclerosis, coronary artery disease, heart attack, heart failure, muscle tension and pain, intensification of arthritic effects, gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), stomach ulcers, irritable bowel syndrome, ulcerative colitis, sexual dysfunction, pregnancy complications, asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), acne, psoriasis, frustration, inability to focus, depression, headaches and migraines, insulin resistance, thyroid dysfunction, increased blood sugar, impaired collagen formation and interruption in bone formation. Wow, that's quite a list!

The good news? There are many stress management techniques to help us minimize its harmful effects. As you probably guessed, exercise tops the list. When we exercise, we metabolize stress hormones, helping our bodies



to return to a calm relaxed state. Exercising to the point of sweating for around ten minutes has very potent effects.

Remember-awareness is the first step. Listen to your body and mind. Notice when you are feeling higher levels of stress. Does it continue into the next day, week, or month? Hans' ominous words remind us it is a necessity for health to keep our stress levels in check.

A ribbon cutting will highlight the grand opening at 10am and the trail will be open for the first time at this event. Foster's Hammock Loop Trail was de-


signed and constructed by members of the Suwannee Bicycle Association, a local not for profit bicycle organization, who will be on site to provide ride guides and special trips during the grand opening.

## Bears get a leg up on Trojans

CROSS CITY-Zack Cassidy's 17-yard field goal with 13 seconds left lifted Dixie County (2-3) to a 23-20 win over visiting Hamilton County (0-4) at Bruce Boyette Stadium.

Cassidy had field goals of 35 and 39 but his 17-yarder in the closing seconds gave the Bears the win.

James Bowers added a 9-yard touchdown run and Duke Dawson, who was 12 of 22 for 137 yards, completed a 27-yard strike to Shaquille Mitchem.

The Bears went three and out on their first series, four plays later Will Hill raced 66 yards for a touchdown giving the Trojans an early 6-0 lead with 8:54 left in the first quarter.

Two possessions later, Cassidy converted a 35-yard field goal cutting the lead to 6-3 on the second to last play of the first quarter.

Bowers touchdown run with

7:52 left in the first half gave the Bears a 10-6 lead, their first lead of the game.

On the ensuing play, Trey Zanders raced 80 yards untouched on a toss sweep to make it 12-10 putting the Trojans back in the lead.

Dixie drove 68 yards on 12 plays and capped the drive as Dawson connected with Mitchem for a 27-yard touchdown pass putting the Bears back in the lead at 17-12 with 3:20 till half.

Hamilton went four and out and punted, the Bears responded as Cassidy drilled a 39-yard field goal to give the Bears a 20-12 halftime lead.

Neither team could do much in the third quarter and nearly all of the fourth quarter, until Hill broke free for a 59-yard touchdown reception from Zack Deas. Hill lined up in the wildcat formation and ran in the two-point conversion tying the game at 20-20 with 3:31 left in the game, Following the touchdown, the

Bears went three and out again, which set up a bizarre set of plays in which neither team could hold onto the ball.

Two plays later, the Trojans fumbled the ball away, only to have the Bears fumble it back away three plays later, however one play later, Hamilton fumbled it back away.

With the ball inside the 20, Dixie didn't risk turning the ball over and on the ensuing play following the Trojans last fumble, Cassidy drilled a 17-yard field goal with 13 seconds left to give the Bears a 23-20 lead.

Hamilton had one last play though but Deas was sacked to end the game and the Bears escaped with a win.

The two teams combined for seven turnovers, with six of them ending up in the other teams hands.

Dixie (0-4) will try to shake off another disappointing loss and get ready for the District 5-1A opener this Friday at Lafayette (2-2) at Dale Walker Field.

Outlook: This is the first meeting since the 1996 season opener, in which Hamilton came away with a 33-20 win. The two have recently met in kickoff classics in the late 2000's but those games didn't count. The series is knotted up at 7-7, although technically Hamilton leads 2-0 since Hamilton County High didn't open until 1975 and all previous games in the series prior to 1995 were played against Jasper High. # From Around the Banks of the Suwannee

"Don't you take more than two cookies and one cup of Kool-Aid and remember to say 'Thank You!'"

These words from my mother over forty-five years ago are still firmly etched in my memory. In those days of the mid to late sixties, Vacation Bible School in my hometown of White Springs, Florida, was alternated on an annual basis between the Baptist and Methodist churches. One summer the Baptist Church sponsored the Bible school and the following summer the Methodists. Summer time always saw at least a week of Vacation Bible School--- During this time, students were taught Bible verses, did arts and crafts, played games, and you were served, each summer, the very sweet strawberry or cherry Kool-Aid and cookies, usually Oreos or some derivation. The Bible School ended with a commencement ceremony attended by parents, grandparents and community members. It was an EVENT in our small town and most of the small town South during the years of my childhood.

Vacation Bible Schools are still being held, but the simplicity of the Bible School in days past is, not to be redun-

dant, a thing of the past. Vacation Bible School today is far more elaborate and involved. Even the refreshments are more involved. Vacation Bible School is a mirror image, in many ways, of the traditional events and way of life held dear by many of us here in the Suwannee River Valley--- Like annual family reunions, church homecomings, and school events, it is one of the events and ceremonies of life that make us who we are.

One of these events so prevalent during the autumns of my childhood was the "cane grinding". Sugar cane was cut and brought to the area where a sugar cane mill, either operated by a horse or, later, an engine, would systematically "grind" the porous and pithy and sweet, sweet sugar cane, extracting it's golden, semi-chartreuse colored juices which were boiled until they became award winning sugar cane syrup...or simply, to most of us, in my "neck of the woods" on the Woodpecker Route, "cane syrup.

"....I can still smell the sweet pungent aroma of the syrup as it was cooked in the huge kettle, I can see the bees buzzing around the area where the syrup was being made, and I can see those who stirred and carefully tended the kettle---knowing "in their bones" when the



syrup was ready---Oh how wonderful it was when the first syrup was turned out to eat it with a platter of homemade buttermilk biscuits. Cane grindings were a common occurrence during the years of my childhood---now they are more uncommon, just as the refreshments of Kool-Aid and cookies given during the Vacation Bible Schools of my childhood.... My neighbors, M r. and Mrs. E.V. Stormant still host a cane grinding and syrup making each fall, and one can see demonstrations at some of the Rural Folk Life Days held in our area at Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park and Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park---I am thankful that these traditions are "carried on" at these fine venues.

Events and ceremonies which bind us together with a common thread help make us stronger, and, hopefully, more congenial and more focused. Such events bring back, at least to me, a flood of fond memories that bring smiles, and, at times, a few tears too.... And whether it is the memory of a church service at Prospect Primitive Baptist Church, complete

with "all day preaching" and dinner on the grounds, and foot washing, or Easter Sunrise Service at the Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park, and the beautiful voices of the White Springs Community Choir, and the solo of Sister Mae Frances Marshall, or annual family reunions where one heard how "so and so" was kin to "such and such"---I can still hear voices, songs, and I can still see faces---those who are still with us and those "gone on"---I see, I taste, and I hear---the wonderful food, the voices and the events of our beloved Suwannee River Valley, along with my mother's long ago adjurement, "Don't you take more than two cookies, and one cup of Kool-Aid and remember to say "Thank you!"....

And I do say "Thank you" for growing up and living my life in an area rich in traditions, rich in heritage, and rich in love and friendship.

From the Eight Mile Still, on the Woodpecker Route, north of White Springs---I wish you a day filled with joy, peace, and, above all, lots of love and laughter. So blessed to be in the number "one more time".
