On Sunday evening, Nov. 4, The Jasper Fire Department, the Florida Forest Service and Florida Highway Patrol responded to a fire that was across the roadway in Hamilton County on US 129, south of CR 150, according to reports.

Jasper Fire Chief Bill Trinder stated in his report

I-75 resurfacing continues in North Florida

Lake City - Interstate 75 in North Florida continues to be improved with resurfacing that began on another segment in Hamilton County earlier this week. A 9.5-mile section from the Georgia state line to State Road 6 (Exit 460) is being repaved, according to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

The \$11 million project is expected to be complete by next summer, depending on good weather. The FDOT hired APAC-Southeast Inc., of Jacksonville to do the work.

During the resurfacing project, the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) will be enforcing the 60 mph speed limit during lane closures. Motorists are reminded that speeding fines are doubled in construction work zones when workers are present. A Motorist Awareness System will be used to inform motorists of the lower speed limit and detects their speed, which is automatically flashed back at them.

No work will be allowed from 6 a.m. Friday until 9 p.m. Sunday because of the increased volumes of traffic on the interstate on weekends. Weekday lane closures begin at 5 a.m. and continue until dusk.

Also, construction is underway at the Suwannee River bridges approximately

Retired, who spoke for about 10 minutes on past and present wars and saluted all the veterans of each.

Lambert is a native of Hamilton County and was raised in Jennings. He served with the U.S. Marine Corps for 28 years, including during the first Gulf War with the liberation of Kuwait, and three separate tours in Iran. He just retired from the Marine Corps in March of this year.

He said during his speech, "Most recently, the young men and women today fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan, I can tell you, they are doing a magnificent job.

Those are young men and women that a couple years ago they had their music too loud, driving too fast through town, and Sheriff Reid was probably chasing them down the road somewhere," he added, which drew laughter from the crowd.

Those same type of men and women, he said, have answered the call now.

Lamar Royals said, "We're proud to have Clay Lambert back in our community and I think he's going to be a great asset in the future of this great organization that we know as the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Veterans of America."

Each year on Veterans Day VFW Post 8095 honors someone special in the community and this year they gave special recognition to Ms. Ruby Shaw of White Springs by presenting her with a plaque that states: Appreciation Award presented to Ruby Shaw for meritorious and distinguished service in furthering the aims and ideals of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States by VFW Post 8095. Nov. 11, 2012.

To Ms. Shaw, Royals said, "I think our community is well blessed to have someone of your stature representing this great county of ours."

The program continued with the placement of a wreath at the veterans memorial on the courthouse lawn, and then Pastor Roger Hutto played a solemn bugle rendition of TAPS.

Beauchemin gave closing comments and noted some important dates in our country's history.

Veterans Day, he said, began on Nov. 11, 1919 when President Wilson proclaimed it as Armistice Day to honor the heroism of those in

the military who died serving the country.

"The original concept of the celebration was for business to be suspended for a two minute period beginning at eleven o'clock," said Beauchemin. "That was back in 1919."

In 1921, he said, Congress passed legislation approving the establishment of The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Then in 1926 Congress adopted a resolution directing the president to issue an annual proclamation calling on the observance of Armistice Day.

"Throughout the 20s and 30s most states established Nov. 11 as a legal holiday," he said.

"In 1938 Congress passed legislation on May 13 making Nov. 11th a federal holiday. They called it Armistice Day."

Then in 1954, at the urging of the Veterans Service Organization, President Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name of the legal holiday to Veterans Day.

There was one slight interruption to the day's ceremonies when four members of the HCHS

AFJROTC had to be treated by Hamilton County Fire/Rescue when they collapsed, most likely due to locking their knees while standing at attention for such a long period of time, which interrupts blood flow, as well as from being overheated in their uniforms, according to officials. Rescue personnel arrived immediately to check

them out and after offering them water and periodically checking their vitals all the students were deemed to be fine.

that at 5:47 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 4, a call came in that the woods were on fire. Units arrived at the location on US 129 and NW 13th Street at 6:02 p.m. and found the grass alongside the roadway was burning and had spread into a nearby wooded area.

Reports further state that Florida Forest Service (FFS) was contacted and responded, arriving at the scene with a tractor. The fire was extinguished just after 7 p.m. and the scene was turned over to the FFS

for investigation as possible arson.

Reports also show that at 8:30 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 4, an FHP trooper arrived at the scene and reported that a 1/4 acre fire had been deliberately set and had burned on both sides of the roadway. FHP had advised there was the possibility of light smoke during the overnight hours and that they would be monitoring the area periodically throughout the night.

The investigation remains open at this time, according to the Jasper Fire Department.

ment the diets of low-income needy persons, including elderly people, by providing them with emergency food and nutrition assistance. You are eligible to receive food from TEFAP if your household meets the income guidelines or participates in SNAP, TANF, SSI or Medicaid.

In October of 2008, the federal food stamp program changed its name to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), which focuses more on nutrition.

The Supplemental Se-

curity Income (SSI) program pays benefits to disabled adults and children who have limited income and resources. SSI benefits are also payable to people 65 and older without disabilities who meet the financial limits.

Medicaid provides free or low-cost health insurance coverage for eligible recipients.

six miles north of Interstate 10. Work on repairing and repainting the steel frame of the bridges, at a cost of \$1 million, began in September and is expected to be complete in the spring. No lane closures are expected as work is being done underneath the bridges.

The FDOT just completed a \$12 million, 9.5-mile long resurfacing project in Hamilton County north of the Suwannee County line

to US 129. This project included improvements to the US 129 interchange and the addition of an emergency median crossover between the agricultural inspection stations south of US 129.

Disaster ignorance

Here's a which-is-better question for you. Suppose a New Jersey motel room rented for \$125 a night prior to Hurricane Sandy's devastation. When the hurricane hits, a husband, wife and their two youngsters might seek the comfort of renting two adjoining rooms. However, when they arrive at the motel, they find that rooms now rent for \$250. At that price, they might decide to make do with one room. In my book, that would be wonderful. That decision would make a room available for another family who had to evacuate Sandy's wrath. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie and others condemn this as price gouging, but I ask you: Which is preferable for a family seeking shelter -- a room available at \$250 or a room unavailable at the pre-hurricane price of \$125? It's not the intention of the motel owner to make a room available

for another family. He just sees an opportunity to earn more money. It was not the intention of the family of four who made do with just one room to make a room available for another evacuating family. They are just trying to save money. Even though it was no one's intention to make that room available, the room was made available as if intended. That's the unappreciated benefit of freely fluctuating prices. They get people to do voluntarily what's in the social interest -- conserve on goods and services that have become scarce.

Gov. Christie told merchants that price gouging during a state of emergency is illegal because "during emergencies, New Jerseyans should look out for each other -- not seek to take advantage of each other." Christie warned: "The state Division of Consumer Affairs will look closely at any and all complaints about alleged price gouging. Anyone found to have violated the law will face significant penalties." It's not just Christie who has threatened to prosecute

sellers for raising prices. New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman has launched an investigation into post-storm price increases after receiving consumer complaints about higher

prices for everything from gasoline to hotel rooms.

Christie, Schneiderman and public officials elsewhere know better or have access to economists who inform them. But they're playing politics with people's suffering, emotionalism and economic ignorance. By the way, politicians would serve us better by focusing their energies on tax gouging.

Disasters produce ignorance in another way. Peter Morici is a professor at the University of Maryland and a former chief economist at the U.S. International Trade Commission. He argues that Hurricane Sandy may prove to be an economic boon, writing: "Disasters can give the ailing construction sector a boost, and unleash smart reinvestment that actually improves stricken areas and the lives of those that survive intact. Ultimately, Americans, as they always seem to do, will emerge stronger in the wake of disaster and rebuild better -- making a brighter future in the face of tragedy."

Professor Morici is not alone in this vision. Nathan Gardels, editor of New

Perspectives Quarterly, wrote an article titled "The Silver Lining of Japan's Quake," arguing the economic "benefits" of that disaster. Even Nobel laureates are not immune from this vision. After the 2001 terrorist attack, economist Paul Krugman wrote in his New York Times column titled "Reckonings; After the Horror" that as "ghastly as it may seem to say this, the terror attack -- like the original day of infamy, which brought an end to the Great Depression -- could even do some economic good." He explained that rebuilding the destruction would stimulate the economy through business investment and job creation.

Let's set one thing straight: Destruction does not create wealth. The billions of dollars that will be earned by people in the building industry and their suppliers will surely create jobs and income for those people. But rebuilding diverts resources from other possible uses. Natural or man-made disasters always destroy wealth. Were that not the case, mankind could achieve unimaginable wealth through wars, arson, riots and other calamities.

Heart Matters

In the 14th Chapter of Exodus, the Israelites find themselves standing between a rock and a hard place...more literally between an army and lots of water! Observing their desperation clearly shows our oddly human preference of going back to what is familiar when things get scary, even if what is familiar is very unhealthy.

I believe this tendency is a result of familiarity being directly linked to our comfort. In other words, we may not particularly like the situation, environment, or relationship we are in, but compared to stepping into the unknown, we often consider it preferable. Let's watch as the Israelites display this behavior over and over again in their journey from Egypt through the wilderness:

Exodus 14 records part two of God's rescue mission. In part one, Moses led the way out of Egypt. Don't forget their desire to go back to Egypt rather than face the army approaching. Part two describes how God miraculously parted the Red

Sea for the Israelites to walk across on dry ground. Do you think they were still wishing to go back to slavery as they stood on the other side of the Red Sea and watched Pharaoh's army drown? Of course not!! They celebrated, just like we would! But, then it's time to get moving again and now water and food is in short supply. Exodus 16 records the next timely "if only" statement:

"The Israelites said to them (Aaron and Moses), "If only we had died by the Lord's hand in Egypt! There we sat around pots of meat and ate all the food we wanted, but you have brought us out into this desert to starve this entire assembly to death." (Exodus 16:3)

About now you're thinking what I'm thinking: "Are you kidding me?" Yet, before we judge too harshly, let's think about times when we are tempted to sound just as ludicrous. In the face of uncertainty, do we think back to what is familiar and remember it favorably? Anyone overhearing the Israelites' statement above would never have guessed they were slaves in Egypt. They made it sound like they lived in paradise!

I was talking about this with a friend of mine recent-

ly who shared feeling very much the same way during her divorce. The relationship was extremely unhealthy, her spouse did not desire reconciliation, and yet more than anything, she wanted to go back. She agreed that the fear of the unknown (being on her own as a single mom) began to paralyze and prevent her from moving forward. Where we were brings us to where we are, and if going back is ever to be a healthy option, problems must be faced and changes made...which means we are indeed moving forward. If not, we only prolong the suffering.

I suppose our lesson this week is simply to expect these kinds of feelings when we find ourselves traveling in unknown territory. When we anticipate the overwhelming desire to go back the way you came, we can refuse to let it be our GPS and direct our steps into an unhealthy situation. As Paul says in Philippians 3:14, "I press on toward the



goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus." Press on in the face of uncertainty. Know for certain that God will lead you forward...because every heart matters!

The Church of Jesus Christ

The Church of Jesus Christ is not built on a political philosophy, or some kind of old constitution; the Church is built upon the existing foundation of the apostles (that's the New Testament), the prophets (that's the Old Testament), and Jesus Christ the Chief Corner Stone." (Arno Froese). While many organizations and denominations may call themselves "a church", that does not mean that they are a Biblical church. However, they may have members of the true church as a part of their membership. The Church of Jesus Christ, the real Church, is made up of born again believers only.

The apostle Peter gave a definition of the Church with these words: "Coming to Him as to a living stone, rejected indeed by men, but chosen by God and precious, you also, as living stones, are being built up a spiritual house, a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (I Peter 2:4-5 NKJ). We are living stones, which make up the spiritual house, being active as priests and we are to offer up spiritual sacrifices unto God by Jesus Christ.

How do we offer up spiritual sacrifices to God? The first thing we need to do is as Jeremiah 4:3 says "Break up your fallow ground and do not sow among thorns". Fallow ground is ground that has been plowed and made ready for sowing, but for one reason or another is not planted and is allowed to become useless and unproductive. Do you know anyone like this? God has always rebuked His people for this. They allow the world to choke out His word. The word "fallow" is used only one other time: "Sow for yourselves righteousness; Reap in mercy; Break up your fallow ground, For it is time to seek the Lord, Till He comes and rains righteousness on you" (Hosea 10:12).

The spiritual sacrifices (I Peter 2:5) we are to offer are not the animal sacrifices as in the Old Testament, but

the spiritual sacrifices that are acceptable to God. What are they? Hebrews 13:13 says "outside the camp"; this means outside our church, outside our comfort zone. Hebrews 13:15: "... let us continually offer the sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of our lips..." The "fruit of our lips" is to share and praise God for all He has done and is going to do. This can be done no matter where we are; at the grocery store, at Wal-Mart, at the gas pump, anywhere.

Other acceptable sacrifices are prayers. How else can we communicate with God. As someone has said, prayer is 'the vital breath of a Christian'. We sacrifice by giving. According to Philippians 4:18, it is: "an odor of a sweet smelling aroma, an acceptable sacrifice, well pleasing to God." Another acceptable sacrifice is good work and sharing. "But do not forget to do good and share, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased" (Hebrews 13:16). Remember we are saved entirely by God grace, but created specifically unto good works (Ephesians 2:8-10). We must give of "ourselves". Romans 12:1 says: "We are to present our bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God which is our reasonable service". We as Christians are to serve God.

Suwannee River and Northwest Florida water management districts work together to discuss upcoming cross-boundary MFLs

LIVE OAK, FL – The executive directors and technical staff from the Suwannee River and Northwest Florida water management districts recently conducted a site inspection of the Wacissa River to investigate ways to collaborate on developing minimum flows and levels (MFLs).

The crew set out at the head spring and paddled to Goose Pasture, a 10-12 mile stretch of the river. Technical staff from both districts discussed methodology for MFLs as well as possible cross-boundary effects for establishing the MFL for the Wacissa River.

"Even though the Wacissa River is within the Suwannee Dis-

trict, we believe the groundwater flow from the springs along the river is possibly sourced in both districts," said SRWMD Executive Director Ann Shortelle. "Therefore we are collaborating with the Northwest District as we plan to develop the MFL for that water body."

The SRWMD is scheduled to begin the data collection phase to establish the MFL for the Wacissa River in 2014, and the MFL is scheduled for adoption in 2015.

MFLs determine the amount of water that can be removed from the natural system without causing significant harm to the resources and the ecology. They are used in water supply planning,

water use permitting, and other decisions.

"Combining the knowledge and expertise of the talented scientists and engineers from both districts will allow us to ensure a sustainable supply of water for the citizens and resources of both our Districts," said NWFMD Executive Director Jon Steverson. "We appreciate the opportunity to work with the Suwannee District as they develop this MFL and look forward to more collaboration in the future."

"Our District will continue its commitment to establish MFLs for the protection of our springs, rivers, and groundwater resources," said Shortelle.

Lake City Social Security office to close half hour early each day noon on Wednesdays

Effective Nov. 19, 2012, the Lake City Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. – a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday. In addition, beginning Jan. 2, 2013, the office will close to the public at noon every Wednesday.

While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-to-face interviews and process claims work without incurring the cost of overtime. The significantly reduced funding provided by Congress under the continuing resolution for the first six months of the fiscal year makes it impossible for the agency to provide the overtime needed to handle service to the public as it has done in the past.

In addition, on Nov.

23, the day after Thanksgiving, all Social Security field offices will be closed to the public. As we did last year, employees working that day will focus on reducing backlogged workloads.

Most Social Security services do not require a visit to a local office. Many services, including applying for retirement, disability or Medicare benefits, signing up for direct deposit, replacing a Medicare card, obtaining a proof of income letter or informing us of a change of address or telephone number are conveniently available at www.socialsecurity.gov or by dialing our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778. Many of our online services also are available in Spanish at www.segurosocial.gov.

Public schools should honor Veterans Day

In May 1866, more than two years after the Battle of Olustee, the largest Civil War battle in Florida, Lt. Frederick B. Grossman of the 7th U.S. Infantry inspected the battleground and had Company B of that regiment intern the fallen soldiers in a wooden monument. To further honor their fallen comrades, Grossman and his men engraved words on the sides of the monument. On one side they engraved, "May the living profit by the example of the dead."

The words that Lt. Grossman and his men inscribed almost 150-years-ago should be taken to heart by all of us. We can never honor our veterans enough for the sacrifices they have made for our country and for our freedoms.

With more than 1.6 million veterans calling Florida home—more than any other state besides California—we especially need to ensure that veterans and mem-

bers of our Armed Forces are honored here in the Sunshine State.

Last week, I found that in my district Alachua, Columbia, Bradford, Marion, Madison, Hamilton and Union county did not observe Veterans Day. My disappointment simply cannot be measured.

It's troubling that Alachua County Public Schools even had off on Friday for the University of Florida's homecoming but not on Monday for Veterans Day. As a proud alum of the University of Florida and a fervent member of the Gator Nation I know how much the University has done for the people of Alachua County. I bleed orange and blue but we all collectively need to bleed red, white and blue as every American owes generations of veterans and their families for their service and sacrifice. For without our veterans, we would not have the opportunity to cheer on our Gators or any of the wonderful freedoms that we as

Americans enjoy. The very least we can do is honor and remember our heroes who served this country—especially those that made the ultimate sacrifice.

Students in Alachua County and all across North Central Florida should follow the spirit that Lt. Grossman and his men etched at Olustee—"May the living profit by the example of the dead." We need to ensure that our students learn to honor and respect our veterans, the men and women currently serving our nation in the Armed Forces—one of whom, I am proud to note, is my daughter—and the countless sacrifices they have made on our behalf.

Our public schools should honor Veterans Day with a holiday and teach our children how much we owe the men and women who have defended this nation for more than 225 years. And all of us need to thank veterans every day for their service, especially on Veterans Day.

SBA helps veterans start, grow and expand small businesses

WASHINGTON – The U.S. Small Business Administration continues to build on its successful programs for America's military veterans, helping tens of thousands of veterans each year with small business financing, comprehensive business training and counseling and access to federal contracts.

"Around Veterans Day, our thoughts turn to the men and women who are currently serving in the Armed Forces, as well as to all veterans who have made sacrifices and served our country over the years," said SBA Administrator Karen Mills. "When you consider the leadership and management skills our veterans develop while on active and reserve duty, it's no wonder we see so many of them choose the path of small business ownership."

According to data from the U.S. Census Bureau veterans are successful small business owners. Nearly one in 10 small businesses nationwide are veteran-owned. Collectively, these 2.4 million small businesses employ almost 6 million Americans and generate more than \$1 trillion in receipts. In the private sector workforce, veterans are 45 percent more likely than those with no active-duty military experience to be self-employed.

SBA supports veteran business owners through entrepreneurial training and mentoring, access to capital, and business development opportunities through government contracts.

Entrepreneurial Development

This year SBA partnered with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense to develop a national entrepreneurship training program for transitioning service members as part of the new Transition Assistance Program. Operation Boots to Business: From Service to Startup was piloted with all four branches of the services in summer and fall 2012. The Boots to Business program will be rolled out during 2013 providing exposure to entrepreneurship training to all 250,000 service members who transition from active duty to civilian life each year.

In a closely related effort, SBA and Syracuse University continue to expand the success of the Entrepreneurship Boot Camp for Veterans with Disabilities program. The growing partnership between SBA and Syracuse University, now in its fourth year, provides training on how disabled vets can start and grow a small business, with programs targeted to service-disabled veterans who served in Iraq and Afghanistan and their family caregivers, women veterans, and National Guard and Reserve members and their families. Since 2009, the first year SBA partnered with Syracuse University, 434 service-disabled veterans have participated in the program.

Participating schools include: Syracuse University, University of Connecticut, UCLA, Florida State University, Texas A&M University, Purdue University, Louisiana State University,

and Cornell University.

SBA is also providing \$2.6 million through a cooperative agreement over three years for two programs; Women Veterans Igniting the Spirit of Entrepreneurship (V-WISE), that focuses on training, networking and mentorship for women veterans, and Operation Endure & Grow, targets National Guard and Reserve component members, their families and partners.

Access to Capital

In FY 2012, SBA backed more than 3,200 loans supporting nearly \$2.1 billion in financing to more than 2,800 Veteran-Owned Small Businesses (VOSBs) through its flagship 7(a) and 504 loan programs, including \$118 million through the Patriot Express Loan program. Patriot Express loans offer many advantages to veterans and to SBA's network of participating lenders nationwide. They feature one of SBA's fastest turnaround times for loan approval and an enhanced guaranty and interest rate on loans up to \$500,000 to small businesses owned by veterans, reservists and their spouses. Patriot Express loans can be used for most business purposes, including startup, expansion, equipment purchases, working capital, inventory or business-occupied real-estate purchases.

Government Contracting

The Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concern Procurement Program allows federal agencies to set acquisitions aside for exclu-

sive competition among service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns. Federal prime contracting dollars awarded to Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses (SDVOSBs) increased for the fifth consecutive year to \$11.2 billion, or 2.65 percent, in FY2011, up from \$10.793 billion, or 2.50 percent, in FY2010.

Over the last year, SBA has created a series of online contracting courses called Government Contracting (GC) Classroom to help prospective and existing small businesses, including VOSBs and SDVOSBs, understand the basics about contracting with federal agencies. In addition, the Office of Veteran's Business Development provides procurement training to SDVOSBs to help them take advantage of federal contracting opportunities under the Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concern Procurement Program.

SBA reaches out to veterans through its 68 SBA district offices, 15 Veterans Business Outreach Centers nationwide, more than 1,000 Small Business Development Centers, 110 Women's Business Centers and some 12,000 SCORE volunteers, more than 40 percent of whom are veterans. SBA also has numerous programs creating government contracting opportunities for VOSBs. For more information, visit www.sba.gov/vets and www.sba.gov/reservists.

Becoming commercial fishermen to get easier for Florida vets

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) honored Florida's heroes on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, by implementing changes to commercial licensing requirements. The changes will make it easier for Florida veterans and veterans with disabilities to enter the commercial fishing industry.

Governor Rick Scott said, "We have a tremendous opportunity not only to give thanks to the men and women that served our nation so courageously, but also to provide them with more support so they can pursue careers in fishing here in Florida. This initiative will expand job opportunities for our veterans and get more folks involved in the commercial fishing industry, which is a win-win for Florida."

The Commission adopted the changes at its September meeting and made a formal announcement of the changes in a media event on Nov. 9.

"I am excited to be extending this opportunity to the men and women who so bravely served our country,"

said Commissioner Charles W. Roberts III. "Job creation and Florida's economy are priorities for everyone, including the FWC. Our hope is that more of Florida's veterans and veterans with disabilities, especially those who have recently returned from active duty, will be able to partake in the commercial seafood industry and benefit from this opportunity."

The changes will modify income requirements for many of Florida veterans seeking a commercial restricted species endorsement, which allows commercial harvesters to fish for and sell species that are designated as restricted.

Spanish and king mackerel, flounder, shrimp, mahi mahi and several reef fish are among the list of species that require a restricted species endorsement.

Currently, commercial harvesters attempting to qualify for a restricted species endorsement must have a Florida Saltwater Products License, which is Florida's commercial saltwa-

ter fishing license, and be able to attribute \$5,000 or 25 percent of their total annual income during one of the past three years to sales of saltwater products.

With the new changes in place, restricted species endorsement income requirements will be waived for one license year (July 1 - June 30) for Florida veterans who were honorably discharged between Sept. 11, 2001, and June 30, 2014. After June 30, 2014, this income-requirement waiver will continue to extend to Florida veterans as long as they apply within four years of an honorable discharge.

The one-license-year waiver also extends to all honorably discharged veterans with service-connected disabilities, regardless of when they were discharged. After the one-year waiver expires, veterans with service-connected disabilities will also have a reduced income requirement of \$2,500 instead of \$5,000. All other veterans must meet the \$5,000 income requirement after the one-year waiver expires. To quali-

fy for these exemptions, veterans must be certified by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs or the U.S. Armed Forces to have at least a 10-percent disability that is service-connected.

"I salute the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission for making it easier for Florida's veterans to become commercial fishermen," said Mike Prendergast, executive director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. "With more than 1.6 million veterans in Florida, including nearly 260,000 with service-connected disabilities, this new opportunity provides an avenue to help them achieve their dreams after honorable military service."

Frank has, for many years, been a headline performer at the Florida Folk Festival in White Springs, and he is a former recipient of the prestigious Florida Folk Heritage Award, presented annually by the Florida Department of State. He has written the music and the lyrics to a "catalogue" of over 400 songs about the state of Florida, and he knows about that of which he pens, since he is descended from a family who has been in this state since the late 1700s. His songs are a veritable cornucopia of history and beautiful visual imagery of and about our beloved sunshine state. One of my very favorite songs written by Frank is entitled "The Old Cracker Cowman". A lot of people don't know the tremendous contribution Florida has made and continues to make as a major producer of beef cattle. Part of the lyrics are:

"And dirt bikes scream over land that used to be scrub cow trails...

And interstate highways have tak-

en the place of old Mr. Flagler's rails..

And condos rise from the land and space shuttles fly.

And the old cracker cowman don't know how it all passed him by..."

I love the lyrics of this song, as it evokes for me, at least, a feeling of nostalgia about the state of Florida and, in particular, our own home, "Around the Banks of the Suwannee". During this blessed, special season of Thanksgiving that is for me a time of obsequious oblations--and consuming more than is an "elegant sufficiency", I am so thankful that I grew up at a time in the life of America that was, for this part of the world, tied closely to the earth and its bounties.

Thanksgiving is, commercially, not nearly as high on the ladder of popularity as Christmas or, for that matter, even Halloween. For me, though, Thanksgiving is very special. It is my VERY FAVORITE holiday. I love the colors, the fall season, and I love the fact that Thanksgiving reminds us that we are dependent upon the beneficence of our Creator. It also reminds us, because its central theme is food, that we should "give thanks" for the bounties of our earth. One of the symbols of Thanksgiving is the cornucopia--the horn of plenty, spilling forth with beautiful fruits and vegetables..

Some of us who live "Around the Banks of the Suwannee" are blessed to be part of a heritage that reaches back a century or more on this sandy soil. Most of us who are part of the "Old Guard" certainly know about and appreciate the bounty of the land on which we live. We know from whence came the mustard greens, fresh acre peas, squash, sweet potatoes, pecans, and, even in some cases, the pork, poultry, beef, venison, or even fish on which we are feasting and that a lot of it was "raised" on the land "Around the Banks of the Suwannee" or came out of one our area's many rivers, lakes, or, in some cases, the Gulf of Mexico not too far from our beloved homeland. We recognize the bounty of the land, and we appreciate it but, like the old cracker cowman in Frank Thomas' song we know, as the folk singer and famous recording artist Bob Dylan wrote "The Times- They are A Changin".

A generation ago, it would have been impossible to imagine that a child reared within a 50 mile radius of the Suwannee River Valley would have been ignorant as to from where certain agricultural staples come but, sadly, in today's world, many do not. The present generation is more removed from the land than my generation and my generation, more than the generation before.

In today's world, if a person has the money, they can pick up the phone and order an entire Thanksgiving meal and never go near a stove. That would not have been true even a few decades ago. The only way most people would not have cooked would have been (A) to have been so ill they could not, (B) been a man, as most men did not and many still do not cook in this part of the world other than to smoke or grill meat (c) been rich enough to have a maid or cook

do all your cooking and those who were that "well heeled" were few and far between or (D) go out for Thanksgiving lunch (a.k.a. "dinner") and, in this part of the world that didn't happen often for most folks.

If you cooked, or if you cook, it takes time, especially if you use fresh ingredients, or, even if your ingredients are canned or put in the "deep freeze". Time and effort are involved and, in preparing the Thanksgiving meal, it crosses one's mind as from whence certain foods come.

If Thanksgiving does nothing else, it reminds us that we are dependent upon God and that He provides the harvest of good food we enjoy on Thanksgiving and throughout the year, and it reminds us that the love of our family and friends is very important.

The late Truman Capote, one of my very favorite American writers, won the Pulitzer Prize for Literature for his very first novel "Other Voices Other Rooms". This Thanksgiving I will enjoy the congenial company of friends and family members dear to my heart, but, for just a moment, as I gather with them around the Thanksgiving table, I will close my eyes--and I will hear and see "Other Voices and Other Rooms" and, like the old Cracker Cowman of Frank Thomas' song I will wonder for just a minute how "It all passed me by."

Time does go by in a flash- It seems it takes us forever to turn 21, and we're forty in three weeks, and then 50, and then 60 and so on. I pray that you truly enjoy the blessings of our land and of those you hold near and dear this Thanksgiving and the whole year through...

From the Eight Mile Still on the Woodpecker Route north of White Springs, I wish you all a day filled with joy, peace, and, above all, lots of love and laughter.
