The town of White Springs will soon have a brand new library just a couple blocks away from the current one on US 41, but bittersweet memories will remain in the hearts of the townsfolk forever.

Tracy Woodard has been the librarian at the White Springs Public Library for

Catholic Charities gives out 16K pounds of food to needy

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Needy families in Jennings and Jasper received an early Christmas present on Wednesday, Dec. 12, compliments of Catholic Charities Feed-A-Family Mobile Outreach Program, headed up by Executive Director Suzanne Edwards. This year's program was dubbed the 12-12-12 Project.

It was cold and rain was threatening to fall all morning, but people began lining up at Jennings Public Library at 7:30 a.m. They were there to accept a total of about 16,000 pounds of food, book bags filled with school supplies, and those with a valid driver's license received a \$100 gas gift card. Department of Children and Families was also on hand to take SNAP (food stamp) applications.

The program has grown since last March when the mobile outreach arrived in Jennings with 12,000 pounds of food. Edwards said their objective is to go home empty-handed after giv-

ing out all the food and supplies.

Fifty-two volunteers, eight staff members from Catholic Charities, and eight kids from the student government at Epiphany Catholic School in Lake City were on hand to help pass out the food and supplies.

Kenny Altman, USDA

representative for Hamilton County, along with County Commissioners Beth Burnam, Josh Smith and Robert Brown were in attendance and spent time visiting with all the folks who turned out.

A special treat this year came from a very special young man by the name of Zachary Bonner, a 15-

year-old who has changed the lives of many homeless kids across the country.

"He started a foundation and he walked from Tampa to Tallahassee to the governor to talk about child homelessness," said Edwards.

Road repairs from TS Debby moving forward

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Repair work should begin soon in Hamilton County on roads that were damaged by Tropical Storm Debby this past summer.

Jewett, Kendrick and First Streets in White Springs and a

section of roadway near a residence that were damaged from Tropical Storm Debby are on their way to being repaired, as well as NW 6th Street and 3rd Avenue in Jasper, as part of the FEMA funding for damages, according to County Engineer Greg Bailey.

"White Springs seemed to bear the brunt of the damage," Bailey said.

Jewett Street, he explained, was the worst as the entire roadway blew out, culvert and all.

"There's a big canyon there

Two killed in Christmas Eve crash

Two others critically injured

Two area residents were killed in a Christmas Eve, single-vehicle crash in Hamilton County and two others, including the wife of one of those killed, were critically injured, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

According to FHP, Tony Brady Ogburn, 24, White Springs, and Stephen Michael Cordle, 22, Lake City, both died from injuries sustained in the wreck.

#1 Tropical Storm Debby (June 28 and various)

Although many roads were impassable following TS Debby there was minimal damage to homes and businesses. No evacuations were ordered and some said they were only affected by the rising waters of the river than anything else. The Spring House at White Springs was up to its roof almost at one point and a sinkhole formed under the kindergarten building at South Hamilton Elementary School, causing the building to be demolished.

#2 CHE intervention and charter school

Central Hamilton Elementary School was in intervene status by the Department of Education due to its failing grade. It had one more chance to make a passing grade or something had to be done. The school board voted to close South Hamilton Elementary and move those students to CHE if CHE failed to make grade. A recommendation by then Supt. Martha Butler to close SHE to balance the budget, was shot down by the board in early June. The majority of the public that attended the meeting thought the school was safe. Yet, they didn't realize that there was still the plan to close SHE if CHE failed to make grade. CHE did make a passing grade in July, thus saving SHE and CHE. However, a concerned group decided that SHE should be trans-

15-1/2 years. She currently has two library aides, Marlene Shaw, who has been there 11 years and Beth Kerr, a fairly new hire as the adult programming coordinator.

Of the current library building, Woodard said, "It was unfit for human habitation in the late 70s and we came in here in 1997."

In April of that year, Danny Hales, the former Suwannee River Regional Library Director, brought Woodard to the building, which sits just outside the entrance to Stephen Foster Folk Culture Center State Park, and showed her where she'd be working. He also explained her duties, which included drumming up volunteer laborers to fix the place up, Woodard said, laughing as she recalled that day.

"There were holes in the ceiling, there were holes in the floor, and the bathtub was just disgusting," she said. "People had come in here and vandalized, broke the windows and somebody had come in here and spray painted the walls."

There used to be a gas station at the site with a small store inside the building. It was called The Riverside Filling Station, circa 1914. The building was nestled among shade trees and some very tall palms, and the unmistakable Texaco star sign out near the street let travelers know where they could fill up their tanks. The canopy and islands are still there, although the gas pumps have been removed.

Woodard said the owner/operators, Glover and Elizabeth DeLegal, lived in one part of the building, which explains why

there's a bathtub in the lone restroom, as well as a kitchen. The tub has since been covered up and is used for storage now.

"There were French doors that separated the store from their living area," Woodard explained.

The bathrooms on the outside weren't useable, she said, so they just blocked them off.

"I had the county commissioners down here cleaning windowsills and wiping windows," she went on. "I couldn't help it. I just had this burst of like...it's got to be done! I was like a force of nature there for a while."

Woodard said she had Subway bringing in sandwiches and at one point she had jail inmates helping out with the refurbishing. There were many days she spent alone with the inmates and no guard was there to keep an eye on them. The Sheriff, she said, assured her the inmates would be on their best behavior.

"That was before cell phones," she said. "I can't believe I did that."

She said she quickly learned the trick, though. She fed them lunch and gave them cookies.

"They just treated me like a lady," she said. "Like I was their mama or something. I should brag about the power of cookies," she added, still laughing about the incident more than 15 years later.

Woodard is proud of the circulation desk that sits in the middle of the library that was made by prison inmates at Hamilton County Correctional Institution. It looks as good now as it did when they originally installed it.

"That cabinet shop is awesome at the prison,"

she said. "Kenny Woods does an awesome job."

Woodard said when she started working at the library she had two filing cabinets with an old door draped over top of them to serve as the circulation desk. It took about six to eight months for the inmate-made desk to arrive and when it did it had to come in through the window because it was so wide, she added.

It took about three months to make the place presentable and the library opened for business on July 30, 1997. Woodard recalled times in the past when people would come into White Springs after hiking the wilderness trail and they would use the bathroom sink in the library to wash up. One time, she said, a man came in and did his laundry in the tub and then hung it outside to dry. Thus, the decision to establish a code of conduct at the library and the ultimate boxing over of the tub.

Parking is extremely limited right now and Woodard is looking forward to moving into the new building, which will have ample parking spaces to draw in even more patrons.

The town of White Springs holds the lease on the existing building, Woodard said, and Mayor Helen Miller has expressed a desire to use it as a museum, a craft shop or an oral history center, once the contents get moved over to the new library a couple blocks up the road. The land and building, however, are sitting on state property that is part of Stephen Foster State Park.

"The state of Florida came through in 1970 and bought the spring house, the Colonial Hotel and they bought this strip, too," said

Woodard. "It's a neat old building."

The new library, which will hopefully be ready for occupancy in late January, will have central heating and air conditioning, windows

that close and men's and women's bathrooms; things the old building lacks, Woodard explained.

"There's a lot of pluses to moving," she said.

Another treat will be

an office with a door, but Woodard said she'll keep it open most of the time so that she doesn't get lonely.

"I'm used to having everyone around," she said.

formed into a charter school. The application was received Nov. 30. The application is being reviewed by a team of people throughout the district who are applicable to each content area of the application. It is the same team of people who reviewed the first application months ago.

3 Jarvis withdraws from race

Third Judicial Circuit State Attorney Robert L. "Skip" Jarvis Jr. informed *The Jasper News* by email Monday afternoon, Aug. 20 that he is withdrawing from his race for reelection in order to resolve pending grand jury issues. Jarvis reached a deal where he was allowed to finish out his term and keep his retirement, so long as he withdrew from the race. According to documents from the special prosecutor assigned to look into allegations against Jarvis, they claim Jarvis misused his office by using several confidential databases for personal or political reasons.

4 Slots referendum passes

Hamilton County voters approved a slot machine wagering license by a large margin on April 10, but state of Florida officials are siding with an opinion of State Attorney Pam Bondi that slots can only be approved in Miami-Dade and Broward counties in south Florida.

5 Love's Travel Stop opens

Love's Travel Stop at the junction of US 129 and I-75 in Jasper held their official grand opening ribbon cutting ceremony on Sept. 26 with a host of dignitaries in attendance from all over the county, as well as Senator Leonard Bembry. The truck stop also boasts an Arby's restaurant.

At least 60 new jobs were created.

6 White Springs Library moving forward

About 50 people came out Tuesday, May 1 for the library groundbreaking ceremony on US 41 in White Springs, including county and city officials and State Rep. Elizabeth Porter. The project has been in the works for some time.

7 Nudist resort

Suwannee Valley Resort, a clothing optional, members-only facility, had their grand opening on May 10. The resort and campground is located at 786 NW Stephen Foster Drive on the banks of the Suwannee River in Columbia County just across the bridge from White Springs.

8 Election 2012

President Barack Obama was reelected to another four years. Locally, Tom Moffses (Rep.) beat Democratic candidate for superintendent of schools Spencer "Sarge" Lofton. Former superintendent, Martha Butler, was voted out in the primary. Republican Jeff Siegmeister was chosen to fill the Third Circuit State Attorney office over Bill Brannon. County commission District 1 went to Republican Beth Burnam over Richard Williams.

9 Trinity Hospital case

Robert A. Krasnow Jr., 38, was sentenced to 36 months in state prison on both counts of racketeering and scheming to defraud for his involvement in the connection with the 2008 closure by federal authorities of Trinity Community Hospital in Jasper. His father, Robert T. Krasnow Sr., 60, pleaded guilty to racketeering in a plea agreement. His sentencing was postponed until Jan. 2. He faces 24 months in state prison.

10 Gov. Scott visits

Florida Gov. Rick Scott made a scheduled stop in Jasper June 5 as part of his North Florida Tour in Rural Counties to talk about economic development. More than 50 city and county officials were invited to participate in the roundtable discussion.

FHP reported that around 11:45 p.m. Ogburn was traveling south on US 41 in a 2010 Chevrolet Camaro approaching a right hand curve near US 41, about 500 feet north of Collins Street. Ogburn reportedly failed to negotiate the curve and traveled onto the east shoulder. The Camaro struck a road sign with its front then continued in a southerly direction. The Camaro then struck a tree with its front and rotated clockwise striking a second tree with its rear. The Camaro was located facing east in a wooded area east of US 41.

Both Ogburn and the right front passenger, Cordle, were pronounced deceased at the scene. Both female rear passengers, Virginia Kay Wagoner, 22, Jasper, and Katlyn Paige Cribbs, 14, Jasper sustained critical injuries and were transported to Shands of UF in Gainesville. They were not listed as patients Wednesday morning. Wagoner is the wife of Cordle, according to information received.

Cordle, who went by Michael, is from Live Oak and lived in Lake City, his dad said.

"He will be dearly missed by his parents and two brothers," according to Stephen Cordle.

Ogburn served two years as vice president of the White Springs Chamber of Commerce. He was also part of the The Hamilton County Alcohol & Other Drug Prevention Coalition and worked with a lot of students.

"His main concern with that was to get tobacco out of the schools," said Monica Amerson of the Chamber.

"He offered to help wherever he could and ran errands for us," said Susan Ramsey, Chamber of Commerce president. "He was only 24 and had such passion for his community."

Neither occupant in the Camaro wore seatbelts, according to FHP.

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

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Heart Matters

I like moving forward...especially this time of year. After Christmas Day, I am ready to take down the tree, pack up the decorations and begin looking for the fresh clean pages of a New Year's calendar. Depending on how you look at it, those pages can represent days full of dread and demands or they can shine

with possibility and opportunities!

The Bible records the Apostle Paul saying it best:

"...I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me...but one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in

Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:13-14)

Understanding that God has a plan and purpose for our lives is important, but He has called us to participate with Him in bringing that purpose to reality. Paul says we have to "press on" or keep moving forward to fulfill that plan. Then he gives us instruction on how to do just that. Forgetting what is behind doesn't

IN GOD WE OUGHT TO TRUST Mary, queen of Heaven?

I recently read an article by S. Rindlisbacher that I totally agree with and I want to share some of the thoughts. What is the Biblical stand concerning the veneration or worshiping of Mary? Is she the Queen of Heaven, or an absolutely normal person? (Venerate: to honor or reverence with religious awe - to reverence to the highest degree.) From the beginning, I want to state that we have no reference to the veneration of Mary in the Bible, such as is practiced in the Roman Catholic Church. Such veneration, also called Mariolatry, must be firmly rejected. With all our hearts, however, we can join in the praise of Elisabeth, who said to Mary, "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb" (Luke 1:42). This Biblical praise of Elisabeth expressed Mary's attitude to God's counsel: her submission, humility and readiness to do the will of God and to accept it in her life, despite all the negative things. Whatever goes beyond this praise, how-

ever, either in Mariolatry or in the cult around Mary, we must reject in light of the Bible, particularly in view of the words of God. "I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. Thou shalt have no other gods before me" (Exodus 20:2-3).

Let us consider briefly the virtues attributed to her by the Catholic Church and compare what the Bible has to say.

Mary is said to have had an "immaculate conception," or also the "perpetual sinlessness." These characteristics attributed to Mary are in clear contradiction to the words of God in Romans 3:23, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." David the king also says in Psalm 51:5, "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." These statements - I want to emphasize the word "all" in the text from the letter to the Romans - apply without exception. This includes Mary and invalidates any claim to the contrary.

The Bible does not speak of a perpetual virginity either. Mary certainly was a virgin when she became pregnant with Jesus Christ, through the visitation of the Holy Spirit. This is expressly stated in the Bible. But after the birth of Jesus, Mary gave birth to several other children. We read in Matthew 13:55-56, "Is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary? And his sisters, are they not all with us?" Through this Bible text alone it is clear that Mary lost her virginity after the birth of Jesus.

Also, the term "Mother of God" is not tenable. Mary is the bio-

For the third year the local Hamilton County Farm Bureau has sponsored an essay contest for all county fourth graders. Each student must personally write a 100-word essay on the subject of "Why is agriculture the most important industry in America?" The students must do the work in his or her handwriting and must also do the

research themselves. The essay must also be done in the classroom environment.

The teachers pick the top five essays from each classroom and then Farm Bureau sends the 25 or more essays to Gainesville for the public relations department to do the final judging.

Cash awards were presented to the top five county winners at the Annual Farm City Week Awards Banquet, which was held prior to Thanksgiving. The children, their parents, their teachers and other school officials were present for the awards ceremony.

This year the top five winners were:

First place, Travis Powell, South Hamilton; Second place, Miguel Tomas, North Hamilton; Third place, Isabella Brown, North Hamilton; Fourth place, Autumn Register, Central Hamilton; Fifth place, Kade Lanier, North Hamilton.

Also, the official proclamation designating the week of Thanksgiving as Farm City Week was signed by the mayor of Jasper.

"This writing exercise is a good pro-

gram to help our students with their writing skills," said Damon Deas, president of the local Hamilton County Farm Bureau. "We are glad to sponsor this contest and hopefully it will become an annual event in our county. We simply must make sure our children know and understand just how important farmers are to our county, our state and our nation. Agriculture is the most important industry we have in America."

"Then he walked from Tampa to Washington D.C. to talk to the president. He now has a foundation called "Little Red Wagon" and a movie about his life is debuting in L.A."

"The Little Red Wagon" official movie trailer is available on his website at www.littleredwagonfoundation.com.

Bonner donated 216 backpacks full of age-appropriate school supplies for the 12-12-12 Project in Jennings.

"I had to go down to Tampa and pick them up," Edwards said. "He would be here, but he's in L.A. right now."

Bonner was born in Searcy, Arkansas in 1997 but now lives in Tampa. He is home schooled and in the 8th grade. He started doing community service in 2004 after Hurricane Charley struck the west coast of Florida and in 2005 he formed the Little Red Wagon Foundation, a non profit organization designed to help underprivileged kids with a

focus on homeless youth. Because Catholic Charities helped Bonner start his foundation, when Edwards told him about the 12-12-12 Project he offered to donate the backpacks. They were then given out to kids from kindergarten to sixth grade.

"He is a dynamic, most simple human being that has not let it go over his head," said Edwards.

Another surprise came from an anonymous donor who gave \$100

gas gift cards to eligible recipients who had a valid driver's license.

Edwards said they invited North Hamilton Elementary to the event because of their extensive efforts in identifying homeless children through their liaison program. Book bags were reserved for all their homeless students and given out to them when they arrived at noon.

Edwards said the new face of homelessness is middle class America; those who have lost

their jobs and/or those who have been forced to take a reduction in wages just to keep their jobs. Frozen chickens and hams, three days worth of canned and dry goods, pastries from Publix and pastries and bread from Harvey's were distributed at the event. Recipients also received a referral book listing all the agencies that could possibly help them with their unique situations. Interpreters were on hand for those who didn't speak Eng-

lish.

"We actually came with a gracious plenty," said Edwards.

Parents or guardians were required to be present to accept the book bags for their children, Edwards said, because they have to be accountable to their donors.

Edwards thanked Jennings Librarian Sandy Allen, who was instrumental in getting everything set up at the library and local law enforcement who made certain the area was safely roped off.

now in White Springs," he said.

Kendrick and First Streets weren't as badly damaged as Jewett, Bai-

ley added. The roads were washed out, but the culverts remained. Another county road going toward the river, he added, washed out a section of road next to

Sudye Cauthen's home.

Bailey said they approached NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) for emergency funding and they approved the projects.

FEMA, he said, came back and agreed to fund the Jewett Street project. Bailey stressed that now that the projects have been approved by state and federal agencies, the work must be completed by April.

The board of county commissioners on Tuesday, Dec. 4 unanimously approved that the projects can now go out for bid.

Additionally, Commissioner Robert Brown brought up another road issue in the city of Jasper

on NW 6th Street and 3rd Avenue. According to County Coordinator Danny Johnson, that project was submitted to FEMA by the city of Jasper and they are awaiting approval. The city, he said, wants to partner with the county to get the road repaired using county labor.

"They'll buy the materials," Johnson said. "They have a FEMA claim in and we earlier had given them an estimate on that."

City Manager Charles

Williams said the pipe on that street has a hole in it, which has pulled the pavement down, so the pipe needs to be replaced, otherwise they'll be repairing it again in a year or two.

"Any FEMA money that we do receive we will share with the county," Williams said.

If the claim is approved, Johnson said, the county could be reimbursed part of that money anyway. Williams interjected that the project has already been approved, but he stressed that it could take quite a while for the actual funds to arrive from FEMA.

Bailey confirmed that if FEMA has approved the project then repairs can be started, so the commissioners agreed that the county would work with the city to get the road repaired.
