## Senior citizen's center to be renamed

The newly constructed senior citizen's center was approved to be renamed the Corrine Barfield Bryant Building by the Hamilton County Board of County Commissioners at their Feb. 5 meeting.

LaBarfield Bryant of Jasper has been petitioning the county commissioners for quite some time regarding naming the newly constructed senior citizen's center after his mother Corrine Barfield Bryant who was instrumental in bringing the first senior citizen's center into the town many years ago.

"My mother, she taught 37 years in this county," said Bryant.

He said she was the founder of the senior citizen services for Hamilton

Veterans Service Officer Clay Lambert invited the Hamilton County Board of County Commissioners out to the site of the Veterans Memorial Park on Tuesday, Feb. 5, to discuss removal of several old, unsightly, dead trees in preparation for leveling of the ground in order to begin work on construction of the park and three days later trees started com-

ing down.

The new park is located in front of the courthouse annex on the corner of NW 15 Avenue and Chanbridge Drive. It sits on a two and a half acre parcel of county-owned land and when completed will be an aesthetic sight for travelers on US 41 through the downtown area of Jasper. There are nearly 1,300 veterans in the county and the park is being designed to honor those who have died in the line of duty.

The county has already allocated \$39,000 toward the first two phases of the project.

Phase one of the project involved removal of specified trees. All the commissioners, Randy Ogburn, Buster Oxendine, Josh Smith, Beth Burnam and Robert Brown, along with County Coordinator Danny Johnson and several other interested parties toured the



"Since coming to Hamilton County, my husband and I built the North Florida Paws Spay/Neuter Clinic, and in the five years we've been in operation, we've done over 12,000 spay and neuters," said Rooney.

"We're real pleased that in these times we've been able to survive this long," she told the Hamilton County Board of County Commissioners at their Feb. 5 meeting.

Rooney thanked the commissioners for their assistance when she first started the spay/neuter clinic.

Commissioner Randy Ogburn told Rooney, "We so appreciate what you're doing."

"It's been great," said Rooney. "Super kudos to Danny Johnson (county coordinator)," she said. "He's been really, really working with us."

The newly formed Hamilton Humane Society in Jennings consists of dedicated volunteers who share a love of animals. Their objective is to promote a compassionate, humane and safe community for people and animals through advocacy, education, and support.

"We're getting a lot of programs started, but like everyone else we need funds," Rooney said.

entire area with Lambert and examined each of the trees.

Lambert had placed red ribbons around the trunks of the trees - mostly water oaks that had lasted their shelf life - that he and the park committee felt needed to be removed in order to accommodate all of the structures that will be placed in the park. The dead water oaks have been dropping limbs for a while, he said.

Many of the tall pine trees, he added, were also dead and right now all they are doing is serving as lightning rods. His concern on a few of the pine trees is that if they aren't removed and happen to get struck by lightning, they could fall atop the marble memorial wall that is going to be constructed to honor the 40 or so Hamilton County veterans who died serving our country.

Lambert explained that if the selected trees weren't removed from the area where the plaza and memorial bricks are slated to be laid, the root systems would eventually bust through and destroy the plaza.

Some of the planned structures for the new park will be the welcome wall and entrance sign out by US 41, a Wall of Honor, a concrete plaza, flag poles, pedestals, walkways, benches, a timber bridge and a large pavilion with a stage.

Aside from removing several trees, Lambert has been researching

with a local nursery to decide which types of trees they can plant to replace the ones being chopped down, specifically low maintenance and fast growing shade trees.

"Those will be laid out symmetrically to enhance the pavilion and the plaza," Lambert said.

The trees in the park now are naturally grown and located haphazardly throughout the park area, he explained. Most of the perimeter trees will stay put, however, especially around the proposed pavilion area, in order to offer shade for visitors to the park until the new trees mature.

Commissioner Burnam told Lambert, "I'll tell you right now, I love trees."

She pointed out a few of the marked trees that she felt should not be chopped down because they didn't seem to be interfering with any of the planned structures, nor would they block the view of the park from the street.

Lambert replied, "I'm always up to discussion."

Burnam admitted that "some of them, if you get up close and look at them, they are not pretty, healthy trees."

Out of the dozen or so trees Lambert had marked with ribbons to be taken down, he wound up compromising with the commissioners and agreed not to remove five of them.

The remaining trees will be "de-mossed" and trimmed up to make

them healthier and look more aesthetic. There are also a couple of unsightly trees that butt up against the annex building that Commissioner Oxendine suggested should come down while the tree removal crew is onsite. That cost will be broken out separately, he said.

Oxendine told Lambert, "It's in your hands and as far as I'm concerned you can proceed."

"We owe it to our veterans to get it done," Commissioner Ogburn told Lambert. "Let us know what we can do to assist you."

Lambert said, "That same week on Friday, the trees came down. We started taking them down about 7 a.m. and that got some attention really, really fast."

Local residents, he said, began arriving when they saw the trees coming down.

"They didn't know what was taking place," he said.

Lambert said once it was explained to them what was going on, they fully understood and were very supportive.

"We reassured them we only took down the trees we had to take down in order to make the park possible," Lambert said.

Once the trees came down, Lambert said the county road department was there to clean up on Monday morning. Shortly thereafter work began on the entranceway, which is the first of the three major phases of the project, which should be completed

within the next two weeks.

"From there we'll move into the plaza area," he said.

Lambert said the county and the city of Jasper have been extremely cooperative as they move forward with the project. The city, he said, quickly approved the setback variance they needed for construction of the entranceway.

Lambert said he is really looking forward to construction of the pavilion, which is in the fourth phase of the project.

"That's later on," he said. "You can hold events, plus in inclement weather you've got the auditorium. I think it will get a lot of use."

Lambert was referring to the old high school auditorium, which is right across from the park.

"When it's all said and done, I think it's going to be something the people can be proud of," said Lambert.

1994, Unit FL-943 was activated at the high school. Since then Lieutenant Colonel Davis has been diligently working to help better the community through the education of its youth.

"The program has been at the high school for about 19 years," said Davis. "This is my 18th year, so I've kind of grown with the program, so to speak."

Davis said he is really proud of all the cadets, especially the seniors who have stayed with the program for four years.

Cadet Major Edgar Perez told the board that he's a senior at the high school and that he is going to graduate, but that he had already joined the Army. He explained that the members of the AFJROTC take courses in aerospace science and leadership under the tutelage of both Davis and Snipes, as well as many other activities. The cadets also have weekly uniform and drill days and Perez invited the board members to come out and watch.

Cadet Captain Jamee Daniels added that they compete in drill meets. Some of their long term goals are for all senior cadets to graduate with a diploma, create tutoring classes to help other cadets achieve their academic goals, and increase their community service projects, she said.

The cadets also partic-

ipate in local parades and military events, visit military bases, prepare care packages, participate in paintball and sponsor potlucks and a military ball.

"As you can see, our kids stay pretty busy during the year," said Davis. "They can't say there ever is a dull moment."

One of the challenges the AFJROTC program faces, Davis said, is funding, because of cuts to military budgets across the board.

"There is concern about that, but right now we're holding our own," he said.

Another challenge, Davis added, is that students are being pulled from the program due to poor academics.

"They're always welcome back, once they get their grades up to speed," he added.

For the past two years, he said, the program was required to have 75 or more cadets, but starting this year they are back to the 10 percent rule, which is 10 percent of the school population.

"If we have somewhere between 48-60 kids, we're in good shape," he said.

Davis said things are changing within the military, but he was dedicated to doing his best to keep the program moving in the right direction.

School Superintendent Thomas Moffses told Davis, "You have a great group of kids out there doing good things."

# County commissioners approve special referendum School tax levy on ballot for tentative April 30 vote

30 which will ask voters to approve a four year .25 mil tax levy for critical operating needs of the school district.

At the Feb. 11 meeting of the Hamilton County School Board, a recommendation by Superintendent Thomas Moffses to hold a special referendum to continue the .25 mils for critical operating needs was unanimously approved.

Moffses then took that recommendation before the county commissioners on Tuesday, Feb. 19

where it was also unanimously approved.

"The .25 millage in years past was assessed automatically," Moffses explained. "Years ago the legislature changed that. It used to be a 2 mil levy. It was a 1.75 levy from the state and a .25 from the district that automatically happened. Later, it was changed that the .25 could still be had, however, it had to go in front of the voters in the district, which it has done."

The current .25 mil is running out at the end of this year, which is why

Moffses is asking for a special election. He stressed that it is not adding a new tax or new millage. It is simply to continue the millage that has been in place for years. As there are no upcoming elections in the timeframe needed, this special referendum will be the only thing on the ballot and the school district is footing the bill.

Moffses said he had expected it would have been on the general election ballot this past November, but it wasn't.

"If we do not proceed in this fashion, you will

lose it for the upcoming budget cycle," Moffses stated.

The .25 millage, he said, equates to roughly \$185,000, the equivalent of one step for Hamilton County teachers.

"Not receiving that money will have a major impact on the upcoming budget," he added.

Moffses' recommendation to the school board on Feb. 11 was voted on and passed by all board members. Then on Tuesday, Feb. 19, the county commissioners approved it, as well.

"We are shooting for an April 30 special election," Moffses said.

# Life in WHITE SPRINGS

Some stories about White Springs bear retelling. This past President's Day holiday reminds me of a story in a previous column about a President who might have come to White Springs. Supposedly, Theodore Roosevelt stayed at the Telford Hotel here in White Springs in 1912 or 1913 as did many rich and famous people throughout the early 1900s. I have seen Roosevelt's name on one of the old registry books that used to be on display at the Telford Hotel, back when it was open. (Oh, how I wish it would re-open for business!) I can't help but wonder why he was here in our little town. At this point in my research I can only offer some conjecture and share with you some interesting parallels between the social and political scene when TR visited us and the way it is today. Politics were so polarized then that TR, at this time a former president of the United States, had split from the Republican Party and formed the Progressive Party, under whose Bull Moose banner he again ran for president. I suspect that he was in White Springs as part of a campaign swing for the Progressive Party through the south, or perhaps he was here for pleasure, or just passing through. That may well have been the last time a presidential candidate ever came to White Springs.

The hammered dulcimer originated from the Middle East around 900 AD. It spread across the north of Africa and appeared in into Europe during the 12th century. There are people who believe that hammered dulcimers were played even earlier than this in Ireland. It is unclear when the first hammered dulcimer made its entry into America. The earliest reference to the instrument in this country comes from Judge Samuel Sewall. He wrote of seeing a dulcimer played

the 20th century. A possible explanation is the competition with the more fashionable piano. In case you wondered, this beautiful instrument is now on the comeback trail. More and more new dulcimers are being built and there are an increasing number of new players. Michael Vickey is certainly at the front of the line. There is sure to be a great lineup of talent when the Coffee House is hosted by Michael, so come on out for an evening of fun!



# OPINION Abraham Lincoln

Steven Spielberg's "Lincoln" has been a box-office hit and nominated for 12 Academy Awards, including best picture, best director and best actor for Daniel Day-Lewis, who portrayed our 16th president. I haven't seen the movie; therefore, this column is not about the movie but about a man deified by many. My colleague Thomas DiLorenzo, economics professor at Loyola University Maryland, exposed some of the Lincoln myth in his 2006 book, "Lincoln Unmasked." Now comes Joseph Fallon, cultural intelligence analyst and former U.S. Army Intelligence Center instructor, with his new e-book, "Lincoln Uncensored." Fallon's book examines 10 volumes of collected writings and speeches of Lincoln's, which include passages on slavery, secession, equality of blacks and emancipation. We don't have to rely upon anyone's in-

terpretation. Just read his words to see what you make of them.

In an 1858 letter, Lincoln said, "I have declared a thousand times, and now repeat that, in my opinion neither the General Government, nor any other power outside of the slave states, can constitutionally or rightfully interfere with slaves or slavery where it already exists." In a Springfield, Ill., speech, he explained, "My declarations upon this subject of negro slavery may be misrepresented, but can not be misunderstood. I have said that I do not understand the Declaration (of Independence) to mean that all men were created equal in all respects." Debating with Sen. Stephen Douglas, Lincoln said, "I am not, nor ever have been, in favor of ... making voters or jurors of Negroes nor of qualifying them to hold office nor to intermarry with white people; and I will say in addition to this that there is a physical difference between the white and black races, which I believe will forever forbid the two races living together on terms of social

and political equality."

You say, "His Emancipation Proclamation freed the slaves! That proves he was against slavery." Lincoln's words: "I view the matter (Emancipation Proclamation) as a practical war measure, to be decided upon according to the advantages or disadvantages it may offer to the suppression of the rebellion." He also wrote: "I will also concede that emancipation would help us in Europe, and convince them that we are incited by something more than ambition." At the time Lincoln wrote the proclamation, war was going badly for the Union. London and Paris were considering recognizing the Confederacy and considering assisting it in its war effort.

The Emancipation Proclamation was not a universal declaration. It detailed where slaves were freed, only in those states "in rebellion against the United States." Slaves remained slaves in states not in rebellion -- such as Kentucky, Maryland and Delaware. The hypocrisy of the Emancipation Proclamation came in for heavy criticism. Lincoln's own secretary of state, William Seward, said, "We show our sympathy with slavery by emancipating slaves where we cannot reach them and holding them

in bondage where we can set them free."

Lincoln did articulate a view of secession that would have been welcomed in 1776: "Any people anywhere, being inclined and having the power, have the right to rise up and shake off the existing government and form a new one that suits them better. ... Nor is this right confined to cases in which the whole people of an existing government may choose to exercise it. Any portion of such people that can may revolutionize and make their own of so much of the territory as they inhabit." But that was Lincoln's 1848 speech in the U.S. House of Representatives regarding the war with Mexico and the secession of Texas.

Why didn't Lincoln feel the same about Southern secession? Following the money might help with an answer. Throughout most of our history, the only sources of federal revenue were excise taxes and tariffs. During the 1850s, tariffs amounted to 90 percent of federal revenue. Southern ports paid 75 percent of tariffs in 1859. What "responsible" politician would let that much revenue go?



# Heart Matters

When my youngest son was about five years old, our family went to visit my sister-in-law for the weekend. We were all outside enjoying the pool one afternoon when I ran inside to grab some extra towels. To my horror, I saw the alphabet, written in crayon... in his handwriting all the way down the hall. He was learning to write his letters and I suppose the freshly repainted hallway was just too tempting a canvas to ignore. When I questioned him, he looked at me with huge eyes and assured me that he didn't do it. He went on to explain that it must surely have been his little sister...who was one year old.

Blaming others isn't something we have to be taught is it? We almost come out of the womb yelling "It's not my fault!" While today's culture is awash with reality shows filled with people blaming someone for something, the Bible reminds us this is not a modern phenom-

non. As far back as the Garden of Eden, when called on the carpet, Adam blamed Eve, who blamed the Serpent. This truth exposes a fundamental problem with human nature: we fail to take responsibility for our own lives. Why? A quote by Mason Cooley says it this way: "Excuses change nothing, but make everyone feel better." Excuses let us off the hook, and we can lay down the heavy load of responsibility...temporarily.

The problem is that no matter how good the reasoning behind the excuse, you are still no closer to a solution for the issue being excused. A person who will not accept responsibility for their own life and instead continually blames others for what is wrong is a perpetual victim. Unless and until responsibility is taken, this life will continue in a destructive cycle...and go nowhere.

In Matthew 25:14-30, Jesus tells the parable of the loaned money: A

man called his servants before going on a journey, giving one 5 talents, one 2 talents, and one 1 talent. The first two servants went to work and doubled their sum. The last servant did nothing with his. Upon the master's return, he praised the first two servants. The last servant immediately began to blame the master: "I knew you were a hard man, hard man...so I was afraid and went out and hid your talent..." The master called the servant worthless and had him thrown out.

The issue we need to address is the same as the servants: what are we doing with what has been given us? We can certainly list everyone that has mistreated us and name every offense in an attempt to get us off the hook for doing nothing to take responsibility for our lives, but when the excuses fade, we will still be dangling from the hook...and nothing will be different. Take action with what you have been given,



and take responsibility for your life...because every heart matters!

Ephesians 6:10-20

war with human power but against principalities (meaning Satan - a supernatural being without physical presence). The shield of faith is so important to the Christian - that is how we walk; praying always (verse 16).

## What is the value of a tree?

Do you hear that? It is not a car, nor a train...it is the distinct sound of the red tailed hawk. That pecking noise, you guessed it, that's the giant pileated woodpeckers. As I sit outside this beautiful sun lit morning and skies of blue...that's what I hear, the lovely sounds of nature. I live in the middle of town surrounded by streets, commercial properties and the slow hustle and bustle of traffic in Jasper. We, my family, feel very blessed to live here, in this town of Jasper. That's why we are so thankful for our surroundings—mainly trees!

Let me first start by professing that I am not a "tree hugger". Our family logged timber locally for three generations. I grew up seeing trees cut and hauled for timber. I can close my eyes right now and recall the distinct pleasant aroma of fresh cut pine trees. I, myself, was a certified master logger by state of Florida. The trees in which we harvested were planted for that purpose...to be cut be cut down.

Where are all of the large mature trees? Take a look around town; you will see quite a few on private properties, but very few large, old growth trees on municipal properties. This is alarming. Why is it that when building or renovating properties, people choose to strip the landscape baron, make the necessary or desired improvements and plant a handful of shrubs and a few trees the size of pencils, and consider it a job well done? This is because it is the "easiest" way to do the job.

Have you ever thought, "I loved that tree, it's a shame they cut it down."? Perhaps, with a little more preplan-

ning, some large mature trees could be saved. Maybe the building could be placed three inches more to the left, or the parking lot could be designed to incorporate and embraces these magnificent giants that we call trees! Now I am not saying that all trees should or could be saved; some simply need to go. Those may include ones that are diseased, ones located in the middle of the project, or simply undesirable.

Large established trees are valuable assets to property owners, communities, and cities or towns in general. Where would our wildlife live? Most do not reside in small trees the size of pencils. Big trees are important to people. They are majestic, though they were once as all other saplings. By preserving them, we preserve our heritage and hope, and maybe a bit of ourselves as well.

The biggest trees are not necessarily the oldest, but they are usually the trees that have been protected in some way. Trees are one of the few things that actually appreciate in value as they get older. Bigger trees clean more air, filter more water, sequester more carbon, save on energy cost by providing shade to reduce cooling cost, and keep the environment healthy.

How long does it take to grow a "mature" live oak tree? A mature live oak tree height is approximately 60-80 feet and branch span if 80-100 feet. It only grows 12-18 inches a year. This being said, it would take approximately 54 years to grow a lovely live oak specimen. That's two-thirds of most peoples lives. If the common practice of clear-cutting trees and clearing properties continue - our next generation, our children's-children, may not know that large tree once existed in

our town, Jasper. It sound bizarre, but think on it.

Many times when new projects are presented, it is local authorities or employees that make the crucial decision of which trees to cut or remove. They may not realize that certain trees were planted for remembrance or dedication; nor they appreciate ones that were plant by the Key Club or FFA members many generations ago. They may not be able to make an educated decision on which tree stays or goes. Do we cut down the water oak or the live oak? What about the maples? Do we preserve them? This is a common practice, but perhaps with some educated guidance from the uf/ifas agency or other local knowledgeable sources, we can make better decisions. Why not preserve our historic, magnif-

icent large trees and palm tress that have grown 30 years to achieve their elegance, and pine trees that reach high into the heavens - you know the ones hawks enjoy to perch on? Do we have to cut them all down for a parking lot or can we choose selectively which trees "really" need to go? By making better decisions, can achieve both objectives: completing the project and preserving the incredible mature trees that we so love.

I am not an expert, but I am educated and have a degree in this field of study. I just ask this one thing - before you cut down large mature trees, consider all of the reasons you should not. I charge you to make this consideration in all projects you undertake - preserve our heritage, preserve our large trees.

# Suzanne Edwards is passionate about Catholic Charities

County Commissioners. Don't be deceived by the name of the organization, Edwards said.

"I'm Southern Baptist and I'm the CEO," said Edwards. "It's about our mission statement." She explained that they help anyone in need regardless of their church affiliation, or if they have no affiliation at all.

"We are your help-mate in helping your residents through these hard times," said Edwards. Although they've had a presence in the county for 13 years, Edwards said she found out that the county commissioners were unaware of all they had been doing, so she gave them a brief update.

The 12-12-12 Project in Jennings alone this past December, Edwards said, was able to give needy residents six meals per person that included frozen chicken, canned goods and dry goods along with \$8,100 dollars worth of gas cards that were given out to those who had valid driver licenses.

"That was a gracious gift that we received and we bestowed \$8,100 on Hamilton County at a time when most needy people are trying to get through this economic crisis," said Edwards.

Catholic Charities has been taking care of the under-served citizens in five counties, of which Hamilton is one, but over the last 48 months,

Edwards said, they are seeing middle class America struggling, too. The fact that 16,000 pounds of food was given out in two hours on Dec. 12 kind of puts it into perspective, she said. Then their two back to back weekly visits to the Jasper Civic Center on Jan. 9 and Jan. 16 with yet another 12,000 pounds of food clearly showed there is a need in the county.

For the three weeks they spent in Hamilton County between Dec. 12 and Jan. 16, Catholic Charities provided 9,318 meals for 1,533 people, 217 full backpacks for needy students, plus \$8,100 in gas cards, and it all happened in less than three hours total, Edwards said.

For citizens having difficulty feeding their family, keeping their lights on, or paying their rent, Edwards said it was time to think outside the box.

"That's when we took the Feed-a-Family Mobile Outreach out to the field," said Edwards.

The program was well received and Edwards said they backed off on their mobile visits thinking people would simply come to the food bank in Lake City. That didn't happen because those who needed the food had no transportation to get there. It is 51 miles from Jennings to the Lake City food bank and 51 miles back, she noted.

Edwards said, "It's

wonderful dealing with communities that say you have something, we need something, what can we do to work together?"

Edwards' point in her presentation was that she needed a place locally in Jasper where her organization could set up a permanent office so they could offer even more services to the community, such as financial assistance and other programs.

"There are many times I cannot help the person because they do not fit the criteria, but that's why we have skilled case managers."

Edwards said they will continue to bring the mobile outreach program to Hamilton County and she would like to continue to be able to use the Jennings Public Library and the Jasper Civic Center as distribution points.

"I'm passionate about what Catholic Charities does and the fact that we help make a difference in people's lives," Edwards said.

Commissioner Randy Ogburn said, "We're grateful for what you've done and we want to do what we can to help you make it a success for our people."

Ogburn told Edwards to continue working with County Coordinator Danny Johnson, County Clerk Greg Godwin and Emergency Management Director Henry Land to ensure the needs of Hamilton County citizens are met.
