Commissioners mull relocation

Resident George Roberson made a suggestion to the Hamilton County Board of County Commissioners at their June 17 meeting that they consider relocating commission chambers to a more suitable location that has room for larger crowds. The board agreed to look into it.

Roberson, who is a regular attendee at the county commission meetings, said he has been thinking about the matter for a long time. Current commission chambers are in a room in the county courthouse adjacent to the courtroom.

"You guys are crammed into this little room here that does not look professional at all," said Roberson.

He suggested the commission chambers are more suitable for an office rather than a meeting room because of its small size. There are four rows of hard wooden pews, as well

Blueberries are succulent, tasty, and are very low in calories. One hundred grams of fresh blueberries provide only 57 calories. They possess notable health benefit-



ing, plant nutrients, such as soluble dietary fiber, minerals and pigment antioxidants that contribute immensely towards optimum health and wellness.

The phyto-chemical compounds found in the blueberry help rid harmful oxygen-deprived free radicals from the body, and thereby, protect the human body against cancers, aging, degenerative diseases and infections.

Further research studies suggest that chlorogenic acid in these berries help lower blood sugar levels and control blood glucose levels in Type-II diabetes mellitus condition.

The town of Jennings has a paved area for walking around North Hamilton Elementary, as well as a paved area near the park named in honor of the late Mr. Pete Cunningham, long-time beloved citizen of the Jennings area.

Get out and take advantage of all these wonderful places for exercise. You don't have to walk 10 miles in a day. Work up to your goal of perhaps walking and/or exercising 45 minutes to an hour a day. Walk a while, rest a while, until you "build up to it".

Rome was not built in a day, but you are worth it. We all are. You know the old quote, "Physician Heal Thyself." I am taking it to heart and working to "do better" myself. The education establishment's success

Many view America's education as a failure, but in at least one important way, it's been a success -- a success in dumbing down the nation so that we fall easy prey to charlatans, hustlers and quacks. You say, "Williams, that's insulting! Explain yourself." OK, let's start with a question or two.

Are you for or against global warming, later renamed climate change and more recently renamed climate disruption? Environmentalists have renamed it because they don't want to look silly in the face of cooling temperatures. About 650 million years ago, the Earth was frozen from pole to pole, a period scientists call Snowball Earth. The Earth is no longer frozen from pole to pole. There must have been global warming, and it cannot be blamed on humans. Throughout the Earth's history, we've had both ice ages and higher temperatures when CO2 emissions were 10 times higher than they are today. There's one immutable fact about climate. It changes, and mankind can't do anything about it. Only idiocy would conclude that mankind's capacity to change the climate is more powerful than the forces of nature.

During Barack Obama's 2008 presidential campaign, his slogans were about hope and change. At the time, I asked people whether they were for or against change. Most often, I received a blank stare, whereupon I reminded them that change is a fact of life. Nonetheless, when candidate Obama uttered "hope and change," it was received with thunderous applause. There was also thunderous applause when Obama promised, "This was the moment when the rise of the oceans began to slow and our planet began to heal." Only a deranged environmental wacko and duped people could believe that a non-god can change ocean depths.

Americans fall easy prey to charlatans of all stripes because of the education establishment's success in dumbing down the nation. Nowhere has this dumbing down been more successful than it has in creating a historical amnesia. Historian Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr. wrote in "The Disuniting of America": "History is to

the nation ... as memory is to the individual. As an individual deprived of memory becomes disoriented and lost, not knowing where he has been or where he is going, so a nation denied a conception of its past will be disabled in dealing with its present and its future."

The National Assessment of Educational Progress tests students in grades four, eight and 12 on several broad subject areas every few years. Just 20 percent of fourth-graders, 17 percent of eighth-graders and 12 percent of 12th-graders were at grade-level proficiency in American history in the 2010 exams. Because students don't learn American history, they learn little about our founding principles and they fail to learn why America is an exceptional nation. But that's a part of the progressive/liberal agenda. If Americans knew and understood our founding principles and values, special interest groups and politicians couldn't run roughshod over our liberties.

But it's not just K-12 students who are ignorant of our history. In a 1990 survey -- and there's been no improvement since -- almost half of college seniors couldn't locate the Civil War within the correct half-century. More recently, 60 percent of American adults couldn't name the president who ordered the dropping of the first atomic bomb, and over 20 percent didn't know where -- or even whether -- the atomic bomb

had been used. The same people didn't know who America's enemies were during World War II (Germany, Japan and Italy). In a civics survey, more American teenagers were able to name The Three Stooges (Larry, Moe and Curly) than the three branches of the federal government (executive, legislative and judicial). A third of the people who were asked the origin of the statement "From each according to his ability, to each according to his need" responded by saying it's from our Bill of Rights, when it's actually from "The Communist Manifesto."

I'd say that the education establishment has been successful beyond its wildest dreams in reducing Americans' ability to think and therefore causing them to have little knowledge of or love for our founding principles.

Florida Department of Health reminds residents to "Drain and Cover"

The Florida Department of Health reminds residents and visitors that it is important to "Drain and Cover" this National Mosquito Control Awareness Week. The Department encourages everyone to take simple precautions to protect themselves and their neighbors from mosquito-borne illnesses which have received increased attention recently in Florida.

"A simple and easy way to prevent mosquito-borne illnesses is to follow the "Drain and Cover" method," said Dr. Celeste Philip, Deputy Secretary for Health and Deputy State Health Officer for Children's Medical Services. "Drain water from any containers around your home, cover your skin with clothing and mosquito repellent and cover doors and windows with screen to keep mosquitoes out of your home or business."

DRAIN standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying:

Drain water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected.

Discard old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used.

Empty and clean birdbaths and pets' water bowls at least once or twice a week.

Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water.

Maintain swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use.

COVER skin with clothing or repel-

lent:

Clothing: Wear shoes, socks, and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present.

Repellent: Apply mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing. Always use repellents according to the label. Repellents with DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, and IR3535 are effective. Use mosquito netting to protect children younger than 2 months old.

COVER doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house:

Repair broken screening on win-

dows, doors, porches, and patios.

conomic development director. His first day on the job will be on or about July 21.

"The town council was impressed with Lawrence's management experience, communication skills, understanding of team dynamics, and his sincere appreciation of the hardships experienced by seniors on a fixed income who are struggling to make ends meet in the face of rising costs for basic necessities," said Mayor Helen Miller. "Many communities in Maine and the surrounding northern states are experiencing economic dislocations due to the movement offshore of traditional industries," she added.

Harden earns detective badge

badge to Rodriquenz, she immediately pinned a gold detective's badge onto his uniform shirt. Rodriquenz said since 2003, when she hired on with the White Springs Police Department, Harden is the first certified detective she is aware of who has been employed by the department.

Harden said the class he attended covered a wide scope of topics, including homicides, serial killers, elderly abuse and burglaries.

"It was a massive amount of information," said Harden.

He said he learned the national average for solving burglaries is less than 12 percent with no property recovery.

"We're at a better percentage than that right now," he added.

As crimes go up, he said, the percentages don't go up much. Violent crimes are sitting at about a 24 percent solve rate. Harden said if law enforcement is notified within 45 minutes to

one hour of a crime, the solve rate goes up to about 80 percent, which means having someone at the scene, such as a detective, who can take charge, call in canines and make other law enforcement decisions.

Another topic Harden said he learned more about was elderly and sexual abuse. He said those types of crimes are more difficult to solve because 95 percent of them are not reported, due mainly to embarrassment on the victim's part.

Harden said his training is ongoing as he reviews all the information he received from the course, which was taught by two of the detectives who nabbed Aileen Wuornos, a female prostitute turned serial killer who shot and killed seven men in Florida in 1989-90.

"They were very knowledgeable," said Harden of the detectives. "You couldn't ask for a better class. I've been to several different classes in my career and this is probably one of the best I've ever been to."

as another one that sits perpendicular for audience members to sit, and many have complained they are extremely uncomfortable. When there are certain items on the agenda that draw a large crowd due to the subject matter, the overflow of people have to stand huddled in the doorway or spilled out into the

hallway. Complaints about the outside hallway speakers have been numerous over the years, as well, and many have said they cannot hear the proceedings going on inside the chamber.

"For your meetings...for people to be waiting out in the hall...to come into something like this is ridiculous," Roberson

continued. "Before we give all of our rooms away or let other people use them, I think you should consider having you another meeting place, whether it's here or where, it don't matter to me. I just see the situation as it is, okay?"

Roberson said he wasn't criticizing anyone, but he said the lawyers (referring to co-counsel Cliff Adams) don't have

a decent place to sit. Adams sits on the front row pew in the audience and usually has his laptop computer with him. The U-shaped desk where the commissioners sit is cramped and there isn't much room to maneuver, especially if one of them needs to leave the room for any reason.

"We have people coming in and they don't

have anywhere to sit," Roberson said. "It's ridiculous. You should be looking for a place to hold a meeting in a different environment than what you have here. I wouldn't even complain about you spending a little money on it," he added with a chuckle.

Commissioner Beth Burnam said she agreed with what Roberson said about the lack of seating space for audience members.

"When we think about it, that's a good problem for us to have because it shows that people are interested and we're getting more community involvement," Burnam said, which confused Roberson, so she clari-

fied. "It's a good thing that we have so many people coming a lot of the time that we may need to look for a bigger facility."

Commissioner Randy Ogburn said he was interested in seeing if there is room at the courthouse annex that they might be able to utilize. He asked County Clerk Greg Godwin and County Coordinator Louie Goodin if they would check it out. He also said if they decided to relocate, it would free up the room for the court system to use more often than they do already.

All the board members were in agreement.

Grape, Golden Beet and Brown Rice Salad

Servings: 8

- 4 medium golden beets, scrubbed
- 2 cups cooked brown rice
- Salt, to taste
- 1/3 cup chopped red onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup white wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon honey
- Black pepper, freshly ground, to taste
- 1 cup thinly sliced celery
- 1 cup halved red seedless California grapes
- Pinch cayenne
- 1/4 cup chopped Italian parsley

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Trim off all but 1 inch of stem on the beets and place in a small baking dish. Cover with foil and bake until a paring knife inserted into the center of the beets goes in easily, about 60–90 minutes. Let cool until easy to handle. Peel, then cut the beets into 1/2-inch wedges.

At the same time, combine the onion, garlic and vinegar in a large mixing bowl and let stand 15 minutes. Whisk in the oil, honey and salt and pepper to taste. Then add the rice, beets, celery, grapes, cayenne, parsley and toss. Serve warm or chilled. Makes about 6 cups.







Around the Banks of the Suwannee

"That's your tale. I'll sit on mine." "Since you seem to want the (whole name of the baby), I'll give it to you."

The quotes above are humorous and I heard them both used more than once when someone made a comment about some "doubt" regarding a story or an anecdote that had been shared: "That's your tale. I'll sit on mine."

My elementary principal, the late Mr. Hal M. Worth, longtime principal of South Hamilton Elementary in White Springs, was famous for using that line. When you gave him an answer, if you simply nodded your head to affirm "yes" or shook it back and forth to indicate "no", it never failed to elicit the response from him: "Cows and horses shake their heads. People answer."

If someone seemed to "keep on and on" being inquisitive as to a story, my daddy, the late Wade Bullard, would finally say, at times, not all the time, mind you, "Let me give you the (whole name) of the baby", which interpreted means "This is as much of this story as I know."

Our area, and the South in general as a region, has been held up in many instances as the object of fun, the stereotype for ignorance, backward thinking, provincialism and blatant "narrow mindedness".

I have to relate to you that when I see these stereotypes, which is someone describing a group based upon race, religion, gender or place of origin based purely upon observation, I do, in many instances have a problem.

Many of the people who are perpetuating their stereotype of Southerners would be the very first to relate to you that they, themselves, are so broadminded and enlightened, they would never "fall heir" to prejudice, pre-judging someone based upon what one believes, rather than what one knows. There is a big difference, and yet it persists.

Julia Reed, a Southern columnist and journalist wrote the following in the June/July edition of "Garden and Gun" Magazine, and I quote:

"There are, alas, some queasy mo-

ments, those dread occasions when the shenanigans of some of our Southern inhabitants make me feel as though I have been born under a bad sign, or flag, as it were. The third week of Jimmy Fallon's triumphant debut as host of "The Tonight Show" was just such a time.

It had been a pretty good week so far. New Orleans was in the midst of Mardi Gras celebrations. I was enjoying a visit (here I am paraphrasing) with my friend Elizabeth McGee Cordes when her sister Anne came hollering down the stairs. She dragged us back up the stairs to the TV on which she had recorded the last bit of Fallon's monologue, which turned out to be the Trifecta of the Embarrassing South. Honey Boo's Mama June discussing her very personal life with her older daughter, the confused Pumpkin, the Mississippi coroner who pronounced a live man dead and sent him in a zipped up body bag to the funeral home; and Paula Deen, who declared her comeback at a Miami food festival by mounting and riding Food Network chef Robert Irvine, who was on all fours on a stage."

The South as a region is certainly more than a dichotomy, and so is our area. Dichotomy is one of those twenty-five dollar words that means "a separation of different contradictory things; a separation into two divisions that widely contradict each other."

It is a good term to describe who we are and what we are about, and some folks never do quite "get it". They never quite get the difference between "making fun of someone" and "laughing at oneself."

The South has, justifiably, produced its bounty crop of those for whom we could poke fun. This was perpetuated for years by the press and television series, such as "The Beverly Hillbillies" and comic strips such as "Lil Abner". It had so much of the nation believing that we were all inbred with bad teeth, poorly educated, poorly nourished, and not enlightened. Yet, as a region, despite "Honey Boo Boo" and "Mama June", and by the way, I have not one thing against them, you've got to give them

credit. They made the most out of what came their way..."cha-ching". So really, who is the biggest fool in this case? Think about that one for a moment.

To reiterate, while our region has produced that which often is made an object of fun by others, we have also produced:

Leontyne Price, opera diva of the Metropolitan opera, New York City, born in Laurel, Miss.; Truman Capote, one of the most brilliant novelists of the 20th century, born in New Orleans, La., and lived most of his childhood in Monroeville, Ala., who wrote, among other notable novels, "In Cold Blood"; Robert Penn Warren, one of the most noted novelists of the 20th century, as well as literary critics from the state of Ky.; Maya Angelou, world famous author and poet born in St. Louis, MO, but spent most of her childhood years in Stamps, Ark.; Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Atlanta, Ga., Nobel Peace Prize winner and one of the primary pillars of the modern Civil Rights movement; Zora Neale Hurston, born in Eatonville, Fla., novelist, journalist, anthropologist who wrote, among other works, "Their Eyes Were Watching God"; Jim Henson, who "invented" the Muppets, who was born in Leland, Miss.; William Faulkner, famed Nobel Prize winning Southern author, who was born in Miss. and spent most of his adult life there; Alice Walker, author of the

award winning, "The Color Purple", born in Eatonton, Ga.; Hank Williams Sr., one of the foremost singers and songwriters of modern Country and Western music, born in Butler County, Ala.; Elvis Presley, the "King of Rock-n-Roll" music, born in Tupelo, Miss.; James Brown, the Godfather of Soul, born in Barnwell, SC.

In today's day and age, however, nobody is given a rest. In defense of Jimmy Fallon, a few nights after the Fallon Show, Jimmy Kimmel hosted Toronto's crack smoking, hard-drinking, seemingly insane mayor Rob Ford, who also had a bad moment in Florida, where he was charged with marijuana possession and DUI.

His antics were enough to even give "Mama June" a pause.

Despite our detractors, and we have many, I continue, and shall always love the place where I live. Do I recognize its faults? I do. Do I recognize its strengths and its beauty? I do, and, do I despise when anyone laughs at us, rather than with us? Again, I do. That's enough "I do's".

I won't be like Elizabeth Taylor and express it six or seven times. I forget how many times she said it, but way too many.

From the Eight Mile Still on the Woodpecker Route north of White Springs, wishing you all a day filled with joy, peace, and above all, lots of love and laughter.

So blessed to be in the number "one more time".

UF/IFAS strategies give forest owners, managers disaster-coping methods

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – Scientists believe climate change means more erratic weather patterns for the future, and that doesn't bode well for forests in the Southeastern U.S.

Two things trees don't need are damaging hurricane-force winds and wildfires, and they believe those climate change-related weather patterns portend more of both.

University of Florida researchers, including postdoctoral research associate Andres Susaeta, built a computer model that simulates various climate scenarios in hopes of minimizing the potentially cataclysmic damage to forests on privately owned forest land.

"Climate change is likely to affect forest productivity and exacerbate the impacts of big disasters on forest ecosystems in the South," Susaeta said.

To help tree owners and managers minimize losses after disasters, Susaeta, working with Professor Douglas Carter and Assistant Professor Damian Adams, created a model that emphasizes two strategies: vary the number of trees planted

per acre, and plant slash pines instead of loblolly pines.

Susaeta, Carter and Adams are all in forest resources and conservation, part of UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences

Privately owned forest land is big business in Florida, covering more than 16 million acres. More than 300,000 private landowners own more than 60 percent of Florida's forest lands, and 89,000 Florida jobs depend on forestry, Adams said.

On a wider scale, the South ? which, as defined by the researchers, includes 13 states, from Texas and Oklahoma east to Virginia and south to Florida ? provides 57 percent of the nation's industrial wood, used for pulp, among other things. Individuals own about 68 percent of the South's private forestland, so UF/IFAS scientists focused their research on those trees, Susaeta said. Companies such as Georgia-Pacific and Rayonier own the rest.

Researchers chose to model loblolly pine, the dominant commercial species in the South, because it is more susceptible than slash and longleaf pines to breaking, uprooting and deterior-

ating by insects and diseases, the study said.

In addition to providing revenue for private landowners and retaining carbon, forests serve as ecosystem hosts and emit oxygen.

"If we can reduce the risk of trees being destroyed by disasters, forests are likely to continue providing these services," Susaeta said.

Those disasters include diseases such as canker, which will likely impact southern forests over the next 50 years, threatening their viability, the study said.

Pest outbreaks pose another stress to timberland. For example, the southern pine beetle caused \$1.5 billion in damage between 1970 and 1996. Expected droughts will increase wildfire potential in the South, as well.

Hurricane risk is also expected to increase because of climate change. In 2005, Katrina and Rita combined to damage about 5.5 million acres of timberland. The storms caused between \$2 billion and \$3 billion in wind damage to forests in southern coastal states, Susaeta said.

The trio's paper appears in this month's issue of the Journal of Environmental Management.

Bay scallop season starts June 28

Get your bay scallop bags and shucking tools ready. The recreational bay scallop season opens in some Gulf of Mexico state waters (shore to 9 nautical miles) starting June 28, three days earlier than the season was slated to start. The portion of Gulf state waters is from the Pasco-Hernando county line north and west to the west bank of the Mexico Beach Canal in Bay County.

The season will remain open through Sept. 24, with the first day of the closure on Sept. 25.

Gov. Rick Scott asked the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to open the 2014 season early to provide additional opportunities to Florida's residents and visitors who flock to the coast to partake in this activity. The season is an economic draw to the coastal counties within the open region. This change is not expected to harm the scallop population.

All size limits and bag limits remain the same. The bag limit is 2 gallons of whole bay scallops or 1

pint of meat per person, per day, with a vessel limit of 10 gallons of whole bay scallops or a half-gallon of meat. Scallops may be collected by hand or with a landing or dip net.

Scallops cannot be taken ashore outside of the open area.

There is no commercial harvest for bay scallops in Florida.

The average number of scallops observed during 2013's post-season surveys suggests similar or slightly rising abundances for 2014 in Homosassa, St. Joseph Bay and Steinhatchee. The St. Marks average has been decreasing since June 2012, which is most likely due to increased storm runoff in recent years.

Be safe when diving for scallops. Stay within 300 feet of a properly displayed divers-down flag when scalloping in open water and within 100 feet of a properly displayed

divers-down flag if on a river, inlet or navigation channel. Boat operators traveling within 300 feet of a divers-down flag in open water or 100 feet of one on a river, inlet or navigational channel must slow to idle speed.

Heat exhaustion and heat stroke pose significant threat.

Summer is a season best spent outdoors, and many people anxiously await their opportunity to soak up some sun in the warm, summer air. But the summer heat can be relentless, posing a potentially significant threat to those who aren't careful when the dog days of summer arrive.

Heat exhaustion and heat stroke are two of the biggest concerns for those spending time under the summer sun. Differentiating between the two and understanding the causes and symptoms of each can help revelers survive the summer heat.

What is heat exhaustion?

Those who work or exercise in humid or hot conditions might have experienced some level of heat exhaustion. When a person is suffering from heat exhaustion, their body is losing its fluids through sweat, and that loss causes dehydration. The body will also overheat, with its temperature rising as high 104 F.

What is heat stroke?

Heat stroke can be life-threatening. When a person is experiencing heat stroke, his or her body's cooling system stops working, and the body's temperature can rise to 105 F or higher. The cooling system is controlled by the brain, so heat stroke can even damage the brain and/or additional internal organs.

What causes heat exhaustion?

Many people who suffer from heat exhaustion are not used to exercising or working in hot or humid environments, an unfamiliarity that makes them susceptible to heat exhaustion. Gardeners, for example, might be able to work in the garden in late spring and feel no ill effects. However, once summer arrives with its humidity and higher temperatures, those same gardeners are not accustomed to such conditions and might develop heat exhaustion as a result. Especially humid days make it difficult for the body to properly evaporate sweat, and the body will lose fluids and electrolytes. As this is happening, people who do not adequately replace those lost fluids are more likely to suffer from heat exhaustion.

What causes heat stroke?

Unlike heat exhaustion, which is largely caused by external conditions, heat stroke can result from an existing medical condition or medications. People with certain conditions or on medications that hinder the body's ability to sweat may be predisposed to heat stroke because their cooling mechanisms are already impaired or compromised. But heat stroke can also be caused by anyone exerting themselves in a hot environment, even if those people do not have a preexisting medical condition.

What are the symptoms of heat exhaustion?

Heat exhaustion symptoms vary but can include:

- sweating profusely
- feelings of dizziness
- muscle cramps or pains
- fainting
- dark-colored urine (dehydration)
- nausea
- pale skin
- rapid heartbeat
- headache

What are the symptoms of heat stroke?

A body temperature of 105 F or above is a telltale indicator of heat stroke, but additional symptoms may include:

- throbbing headache
- flushed, hot and dry skin
- slightly elevated blood pressure
- dizziness and light-headedness
- nausea and vomiting
- rapid, shallow breathing
- lack of sweating despite the heat
- rapid heartbeat that is strong or weak
- unconsciousness

What do I do if I suspect I am suffering from heat exhaustion?

If heat exhaustion is suspected, get out of the heat immediately, ideally into an air-conditioned room but under a tree in the shade if that's the only option. Call a doctor if you cannot keep fluids



down or if you seem incoherent.

Those who can keep fluids down should drink plenty of noncaffeinated and nonalcoholic beverages, and remove any tight or unnecessary clothing. In addition, take a cool shower or bath, but ideally only do so if someone is around to monitor you.

What should I do if I suspect I am suffering from heat stroke?

Heat stroke is potentially life-threatening, so immediately dial 911 if you feel you have heat stroke. If you suspect someone else has heat stroke, administer some first aid while waiting for an ambulance to arrive. Move the person to an air-conditioned room, and try to get his or her body temperature down to a more manageable 101 F or 102 F. Wet the person's skin and apply ice packs to the armpits, groin, neck, and back, as these areas have an abundance of blood vessels close to the skin, and cooling them can help lower body temperature.

The church needs to 'Rethink Possible'



The other day we had some phone work done at our church. As the phone man worked around our church I noticed just above the pocket on his shirt these words "Rethink Possible." I have seen this before but never before did I relate it to the church. I wondered is it time for the church to "Rethink Possible?"

First of all let me clarify the definition of the church. It is not a religion or denomination. It is not those who say you have to be a member of their group. It is all those from every walk of life that has accepted the sin payment of the Lord Jesus Christ on the cross of Calvary (1 Cor. 15:1-4).

Is it time to "Rethink Possible" about prayer? There is no doubt that most Christians don't pray enough. When they do pray, its some make shift prayer with no faith behind it. The world as a whole doesn't even believe in the Rapture, many others think it will be in the distant future; but according to 1st Thess. Chapter 4, it could happen at any moment; in an hour when we think not. Today, if we "Rethink Possible" it could happen at any moment, then certainly we would be better prepared.

the receiver, but it is necessary for training. This training marks the difference between discipline and punishment. Punishment focuses on what the child did wrong and making them pay for disobedience, while discipline focuses on training and teaching the child to choose what is right next time. The harvest that discipline produces is desirable in the life of every child: righteousness and peace. Righteousness is the ability to make wise choices that while difficult, keep us in right standing with God and others. Teaching a child to do what is right at a young age makes it easier for them to choose right as they grow into adulthood. Even in the midst of difficult circumstances, they will then experience the peace that comes from a clear conscious.

"Discipline your son, for in that there is hope; do not be a willing party to his death" (Proverbs 19:18); "Discipline your son and he will give you peace; he will bring delight to your soul." (Proverbs 29:17) As parents we can grow weary in trying to discipline our children, especially living in a culture that condemns this practice. It is easier at the time to

give in, but in failing to correct a child, we allow disobedience. We may avoid a temporary battle, but we lose the war in building self-control and responsibility within the child. This allows them to travel a path that leads to destruction of their relationships, reputations, health and possibly their lives. Our desire to be "friends" with our children can be realized after they are adults and will come as a result of the respect gained though the hard work of being their parent when they are young.

Consistent, loving discipline ultimately teaches our children how to discipline themselves and guard their hearts from the consequences of bad choices. After all, their hearts really do matter!

Science Fair is elementary






