

Hundreds gather for opening of FGC library

A standing room only crowd of more than 300 gathered at Florida Gateway College Tuesday afternoon for the ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the school's new library and media center.

The Wilson S. Rivers Library and Media Center officially opened with the passing of the last book, the Bible, to the new facility following a dedication service that lasted close to 45 minutes.

"It's a dream come true to finally be able to open the new library and media center," said Dr. Chuck Hall, Florida Gateway College president. "We've waited so long to get into it and now we're in here all we can think about is how we can use it to serve people, provide their needs and get them involved. It's really the library of the people and we want the people to come use it."

Construction and work on the 38,707-square-foot facility began in November 2009. The \$8.5 million facility is the first new building on campus in nearly 20 years.

Local officials, students,

college trustees and residents attended the service, which included library tours.

Randy Hanna, Chancellor of the Florida College System, served as the event's guest speaker and spoke about the history of the FGC campus and how the school has grown in the six-county area it serves, as well as the important role

community plays in having a successful school.

"Community is an integral part of Florida Gateway College," he said.

Hanna's remarks were followed by comments from Ivan Arevalo, FGC Student Government President, who said the library will provide a refuge for students from their daily lives.

Chuck Brannan, FGC Board of Trustees chairman, provided the final comments as he spoke of the process to get the library built and its potential impact on the community and FGC students.

"This place is both wired and wireless," he said. "I hope it will become a confluence of academic life."

Lawmakers weigh in on redistricting

Breakfast sparks dialog with local delegation.

Community members got the chance to meet face-to-face with state and federal representatives Tuesday morning for the Lake City-Columbia County Chamber of Commerce annual Legislative Breakfast.

The breakfast is one of the Chamber's mainstay spring events where elected national and state officials are invited to join a conversation with the community, said Todd Wilson, Chamber president. The

audience, gathered at the County Club at Lake City, was able to ask the elected officials questions.

Sen. Charlie Dean, R-Inverness, said the main issue this year is redistricting. Although the committee started last summer, districts are not yet finalized, he said.

The senate's second redistricting plan has not yet been approved by the Florida Supreme Court. The first plan was rejected last month by justices, citing eight districts and district renumbering as being in violation. The court affirmed the House plan unanimously.

"Personally I'm ready to get it over with," Dean

Man jailed in string of AC thefts

An O'Brien man, arrested Friday, faces felony charges in connection with a string of residential air conditioner unit thefts in central Columbia County, according to information released by authorities Monday afternoon.

Matthew Steven Thomas, 32, of 24454 County Road 49, O'Brien, was arrested Friday and charged with four counts of grand theft, four counts of burglary

and dealing in stolen property in connection with the case. He was booked into the Columbia County Detention Facility on \$180,000 bond.

According to the Columbia County Sheriff's Office, deputies have been investigating several air conditioner thefts from residences in central Columbia County.

Sgt. Ed Seifert, Columbia County Sheriff's Office public information officer, said four of the thefts were similar in nature and deputies believed the

same suspect was committing the thefts. The thefts occurred from April 4 - April 13.

Seifert said concerned citizens worked closely with authorities to identify the suspects responsible for the thefts and based on their information, Lt. Pete Spurlock was able to find a location where the suspect dismantled air conditioner units. When Spurlock arrived at the location he discovered the suspect actively dismantling an air conditioner.

Detective Jimmy Watson assisted in the investigation and learned that the suspect had been selling the stolen air conditioner parts to local secondary metals recyclers. Watson determined Thomas had stolen four air conditioner units from local homes.

Thomas was arrested without incident around 5 p.m. Friday and taken to jail.

"We don't expect more arrests in the case, however, as the investigation moves forward there maybe more charges filed," Seifert said.


Helm in final stages of throat cancer

WOODSTOCK, N.Y. – Levon Helm, a former member of The Band, is in the final stages of his long battle with cancer.

A message posted Tuesday on the 71-year-old musician's website by his family says "Levon is in the final stages of his battle with cancer."

Helm was diagnosed with throat cancer in 1998 and the illness reduced his voice to a whisper. But he still continued to sing on albums and at rollicking concerts at his Woodstock home.

Helm was a key member of The Band and lent his distinctive Southern voice to classics like "The Weight" and "The Night They Drove Old Dixie Down."

In their letters, SAG-AFTRA and the American Federation of Musicians said they would support the deal if there were adequate mechanisms to ensure that Universal complies with its commitment to re-invest in artist development.

EMI is home to the recorded music of The Beatles, as well as American artists such as Norah Jones and The Smashing Pumpkins. Universal artists include Rihanna, Lady Gaga and U2.

"It has been wrenching to watch EMI wither" as its former private equity owner Terra Firma cut costs, wrote Kim Roberts Hedgpath, SAG-AFTRA's co-national executive director. She urged regulators to examine Universal's commitments to artist development.

Copper heiress' jewelry brings in \$21M at Christie's auction

NEW YORK – Signed pieces of Cartier and Tiffany jewelry belonging to a late Montana copper mining heiress have sold for nearly \$21 million at a New York City auction.

Christie's said Tuesday's sale from the estate of Huguette Clark had caught the attention of collectors worldwide. The star of the collection, a rare pink cushion-cut 9-carat diamond ring, sold for nearly \$16 million.

The auction house had estimated the collection of 17 pieces would bring between \$9 million to \$12 million.

The reclusive Clark was 104 when she died last year at New York's Beth Israel Medical Center.

Bond novels to be reissued by American publisher Amazon

NEW YORK – James Bond has a new American publisher: Amazon.com.

The online giant has acquired

rights from the late Ian Fleming's estate for North American rights to his classic spy novels in paper and e-book editions, including "Dr. No" and "From Russia With Love."

The books will be available from Amazon as of this summer. Independent stores and Barnes & Noble Inc. have usually declined to stock works published by Amazon, a top retail competitor.

Universal Music wins union support to acquire EMI

LOS ANGELES – Universal Music Group has won the qualified support of two North American artists' unions for its proposed \$1.9 billion acquisition of the recorded music division of the U.K.'s EMI Group Ltd.

The unions gave their conditional backing in letters sent last week to the Federal Trade Commission.

Country star Jones postpones shows due to health issues

NASHVILLE, Tenn. –George Jones needs more time to recover from a recent upper respiratory infection.

The 80-year-old country music singer is postponing his upcoming shows on April 20 and 21 in Minnesota and South Dakota. A statement from Jones' publicist, Kirt Webster, says doctors have advised Jones to continue resting at his Tennessee home for another week. The shows will be rescheduled.

Jones was scheduled to perform Friday at Shooting Star Casino, Hotel and Event Center in Mahanomen, Minn. That concert has been rescheduled for Nov. 8.

Janitor finds body in Miami college bedroom

KENDALL – A janitor on his early-morning rounds found a body in a bathroom at Miami Dade College.

College officials say a man in his 60s took a jog around the campus early Tuesday. He was found inside the bathroom, still in his running clothes.

The Miami Herald reports a Miami-Dade Fire Rescue crew could not revive the man.

Police did not release his name.

College officials sent out an email to notify students and faculty of a medical emergency that could cause "some disruptions" to class schedules and operations.

Police say they are investigating, but foul play is not suspected.

Principal accused of FCAT material tampering

MIAMI – The principal of a Miami charter school has been accused of tampering with materials for the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test.

The Miami Herald reports Ramz Academy principal Julio Cabrera allegedly opened sealed test booklets, took handwritten notes on the questions and distributed "study guides" to teachers. School attorney Carmen Calzon says Cabrera, a teacher, and an employee charged with overseeing the test's administration have been suspended.

Thousands of children across Florida are taking the annual reading and math assessment this week. The students at Ramz Academy in Miami's Little Havana will take the exam as soon as new test materials are available.

Both Miami-Dade Public Schools and Ramz Academy have begun

investigations to look into the alleged tampering.

Man gets life in prison for fatal robbery

JACKSONVILLE – A northeast Florida man convicted of killing a former Marine during a robbery has been sentenced to life in prison.

A Duval County judge sentenced 23-year-old Lucious Maurice Jackson on Monday. He was convicted last week of first-degree murder and attempted armed robbery.

Authorities say Jackson was trying to rob Gregory Eugene Chisholm at a Jacksonville gas station in April 2010 when Chisholm threw a handful of change in his attacker's face.

Broward man charged with sending powder

FORT LAUDERDALE – Authorities say a South Florida man mailed envelopes containing a powdery substance to the Broward Sheriff's Office and the county's state courthouse.

The U.S. Attorney Office in Miami announced Tuesday that 26-year-old Tarvess David Taylor has been charged with five counts of mailing hoax threats. He faces up to five years in prison for each charge.

Officials say the sheriff's office had to be closed last October while HAZMAT teams responded to collect the powdery substance and ensure the safety of the facilities.

It wasn't immediately clear if Taylor had an attorney.

Appeals court upholds DUI case sentence

BRADENTON – Authorities say an appellate court has refused to overturn the 10-year prison sentence for a Bradenton high school football coach

who was convicted in a DUI crash that killed his best friend.

The Bradenton Herald-Tribune reports the Second District Court of Appeal in Lakeland upheld the sentence handed down by a circuit judge in Manatee County. John Hunter has been out on bail while the appeal was pending.

Hunter was the football coach at Braden River High School when the crash happened in March 2009.

State CFO says he is weighing Senate bid

WEST PALM BEACH – State Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater says he's considering entering the Republican primary for Senate.

Atwater tells The Palm Beach Post he's "been asked by a number of people" about entering the contest to take on Sen. Bill Nelson and he's "going to consider it."

Rep. Connie Mack, former Sen. George LeMieux and businessman Mike McCalister are already competing for the GOP nomination.

Atwater is a former Florida Senate president who won the CFO job in 2010.

4-year-old girl drowns at Central Florida resort

LAKE BUENA VISTA – Authorities say a 4-year-old girl drowned in a pool at the Lake Buena Vista Resort and Spa near Orlando.

The Orange County Sheriff's Office says there were other people in and around the pool when the child was found unresponsive Monday night. CPR was performed, but she was pronounced dead after 9 p.m.

Orlando television station WESH reports deputies don't suspect foul play. (AP)

said.

With public meetings and the ability to submit district maps online, "the court can't say the citizens weren't involved," he said.

Rep. Elizabeth Porter, R-Lake City, said the House got redistricting right the first time and her district will now be more homogeneous, as it includes Columbia, Suwannee, Hamilton and Baker counties.

"It looks like I'm now queen of corrections alley," Porter said. "And that's fine with me."

Dean said he took a stand against the privatization of prisons.

The bill that would have privatized 27 prisons in the state was defeated February in the Senate, where it divided Republicans. The House version of the bill died in appropriations committee in March.

Dean said he thought it was wrong to privatize Florida's prisons and will continue to stand against it. North Florida residents especially would be hurt by privatizing prisons, he said.

Sen. Steve Oelrich, R-Gainesville, said he voted against the privatized prison bill because he is not willing to "farm out prisons under the guise of saving money."

Citing his 14 years as Alachua County Sheriff, Oelrich said he believes prisons are the government's responsibility.

Dean said he also opposed the parent trigger bill, which would have enabled parents to demand sweeping changes at low-performing schools. Converting the school to an independently run charter school would have been among the options.

"Folks, that's wrong," he said. Our tax money pays for the schools and we have to take ownership of failing schools, not turn them over to private companies, he said.

"This is a big one and it's coming again and again," he said.

Oelrich said he also voted against the parent trigger bill. "I'm not willing to give up on public education in the state of Florida."

Porter said she would reintroduce a bill that would require adjoining water management districts to work together and consider the effects on minimum flow levels when issuing a groundwater withdrawal permits.

"We're losing our water over here," she said.

The bill was approved unanimously in the House, but it was not brought to a vote in the Senate.

Senate leadership did not want the bill heard on the Senate floor, Porter said in March.

Dean sponsored the bill in the Senate and Oelrich supported the bill, she said.

Dean said he supports Florida Leaders Organized for Water (FLOW), a coalition of elected and appointed officials focused on water regional water supplies.

"I've never seen that many county commissioners come together and agree," he said. Water is the greatest issue facing Florida and we have to take care of it, he said.

When asked by an audience

member why Porter's water bill did not come up for a vote in the Senate, Dean did not answer the question. Instead, he continued talking about the struggles the Senate has faced with redistricting.

Oelrich said he was one of a few Republicans to vote against the budget this year, citing favored projects in the midst of cuts to state universities, social services and prisons.

"I thought it had way too many turkeys," Oelrich said.

Gov. Rick Scott signed into law Tuesday a \$70 billion state budget and vetoed \$142.7 million in spending.

Oelrich said this year's legislative session was one of the more contentious ones he's experienced.

He said his votes were based on conscience, which consequently means going against party leadership sometimes.

Oelrich also made it clear that he is running for U.S. Congress.

Porter said Tuesday she was glad to sponsor the bill giving families three days of tax-free school shopping in August.

Porter said she made sure local counties and the Suwannee River Water Management District received Payments in Lieu

of Taxes, which help offset losses in property taxes due to nontaxable lands in their boundaries. She said local jobs maintaining forestry land depend on those payments.

Lynne Bannister, director of outreach for U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson, said Nelson has hosted several town hall meetings during the Easter recess.

Bannister said rural areas are of the most concern to Nelson because the areas do not have as much job diversity.

Bannister said Nelson is proud of the Restore Act which would direct money into Gulf Coast states affected by the BP oil spill, she said. The money would provide money in Florida for Gulf counties, whose tourism businesses took a hit after the spill. She said the act passing the Senate is a bright, shining moment of bipartisanship.

Nelson continues to oppose drilling for oil off Florida's coast, recognizing the need for military training spaces, she said.

Ashley Cook, staff assistant for U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, said Rubio attended the Summit of the Americas last weekend and met with South American leaders. Cook said residents having trouble with federal agencies should contact Rubio's office for help.

Nathan Riska, district representative for U.S. Rep. Ander Crenshaw, said Crenshaw has worked to tighten the government's budget, just as families have had to tighten their own. Riska said Crenshaw continues to fight to keep Navy ships in Jacksonville.

With redistricting, it is probable that Crenshaw will lose Columbia County from his district, Riska said. It was a privilege to serve the county, he said.

TDC slated to present sports upgrade budget

The Tourist Development Council will present a proposed budget for improvements of the Southside Recreation Complex to the County Commission special meeting on May 1.

TDC board member and local hotel owner Nick Patel advocated the budget, calling tournament play a major industry.

"The economic impact is huge," Patel said. "If somebody wants to talk about return on investment, then you better open up your eyes."

The budget divides improvements between the TDC and the county commission with each agency funding over one million dollars in improvements.

Collaboratively, these funds will work towards building concession stands, restrooms, improving the playing surface of the fields, upgrading bleachers, replacing lighting, repaving the parking lot and other landscaping projects.

A list of optional upgrades will also be presented, including a portable restroom and an air conditioner for the concession facility.

The TDC is seeking accreditation from

Destination Marketing Association International, a title that would lend prestige to the TDC.

If accepted, TDC Director Harvey Campbell said Columbia County's TDC "will be the smallest TDC in the world to be accredited."

Several TDC board members took a trip this week to Nations Park, a baseball tournament park in Newberry.

Commissioner and TDC board member Scarlet Frisina said she was "impressed" with the facility but felt the area did not provide enough space for parents to see their children play.

"Maybe I view things a little different because I am the mother that goes to these places," Frisina said. "My son plays baseball right now and I have a daughter and when we go I want to sit behind the plate and watch them bat and watch everything from the infield. They had all their viewing stuff in little tiny boxes at very edges of the outfield way in the corner."

Frisina as well as other board members said they were satisfied with the set-up of the Southside Recreation Complex that it better caters to the needs of the local community.

Job seeker arrested after leaving child in car

ORMOND BEACH, Fla. — Police say an applicant for a job at a sports bar ended up in jail after she decided to stay for drinks while leaving her 5-year-old daughter unattended for an hour inside her car.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports the woman had three tequila shots at the Pirana Bar and Grille in Ormond Beach after filling out a job application last Friday.

According to a police report, a customer came in the bar and announced that a small child was alone in a car parked outside. Police say the woman denied the child was hers.

Police say the bartender eventually took away the woman's keys until police arrived and arrested her on child neglect charges. The woman's mother took custody of the child, who was not injured. (AP)

Scott signs \$69.9B budget, vetoes \$142.7M

ST. JOHNS — Gov. Rick Scott, using a top-rated elementary school in suburban Jacksonville as a backdrop, signed the state's \$69.9 billion budget into law Tuesday.

Before the signing, the Republican governor also vetoed \$142.7 million by eliminating spending items ranging from museums to medical schools sprinkled throughout the budget by the GOP-led Legislature.

Scott vetoed less than he

did last year, saying lawmakers had heeded his warnings to give him evidence of why the money is needed and what taxpayers would get in return.

The governor said, for example, that's why he had decided to spare nearly \$4 million for

the public television stations after vetoing their money last year. He also kept \$5 million for a Sarasota rowing center he previously vetoed because local officials have agreed to repay the state if the project fails to boost sales tax revenue as promised.

This occasion will fall even later next year if President Obama succeeds in making the tax code more complicated and expensive.

Mr. Obama has invoked Warren Buffett's name at 49 different events since mid-August to justify his tax-raising plans. Despite the all-out White House lobbying effort, the president's allies in the Democratic Senate failed on Monday to get the votes needed to pass the 30 percent tax hike on income over \$1 million.

The House budget replaces six income brackets with two at lower 10 percent and 25 percent rates and cut the corporate rate to 25 percent.

Until they have a partner on tax reform in the White House, the best the GOP can do is provide short-term relief. On Thursday, the House will vote on Majority Leader Eric Cantor's bill to give companies with fewer than 500 employees a 20 percent tax cut to spur the economy for the 2012 tax year. For the three-quarters of small businesses who file as individuals, this deduction would encourage them to hire now, despite next year's uncertainty. When current tax rates expire on Dec. 31, Mr. Obama wants to hike taxes on any profit over \$200,000 to almost 40 percent.

The one-year deduction would also benefit companies that file corporate taxes. They pay a high of up to 35 percent now, exceeding the developed world's 25 percent average. According to an analysis by Fiscal Associates, the GOP plan would create 194,000 jobs and boost gross domestic product by \$112 billion. That prospect gives voters an important choice in November. They can take a path of lower taxes and more growth, or they can make Tax Day 2013 more painful for everyone.

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

Despite veto, Florida habitat still in jeopardy

Here in Florida, shortsightedness and greed have always guided and motivated our movers and shakers, our leaders.

These folks have been responsible for paving over our grasslands, butchering our mangroves, backfilling our swamps, gouging our shorelines, damming our rivers and bulldozing our trees.

Shortsightedness and greed have made Florida — one of the nation's most biologically diverse regions — one of its most at-risk ecologically. We are second only to California in the number of animals and plants the federal government has designated as endangered or threatened.

Too many Florida leaders, political, business and otherwise, apparently do not care about the essential link between people and their impact on wild species and their natural habitats. Research shows that negative human impact on the environment includes habitat destruction, pollution and the introduction of nonnative and invasive species of flora and fauna.

Most habitat destruction, and subsequent harm to plants and animals, results from development that is seen as crucial to human progress.

But habitat destruction is just as damaging when it is carried out for frivolous purposes. The most prominent example of such frivolousness was in a bill introduced during the recent legislative session in Tallahassee. The zoo bill, HB 1117, dubbed the "Jurassic Park bill" by critics, would have permitted zoos and aquariums to lease state-owned lands to

conduct breeding and research on animals such as rhinos, zebras, giraffes and elephants.

Many Florida residents love zoos and take their children and grandchildren to them. But few of these residents would vote to permit exotic animals to be bred and allowed to roam on our public lands. We love our wild places and species and are extremely protective of them, as was demonstrated after the zoo bill was introduced by state Rep. Shawn Harrison, a Republican.

Gov. Rick Scott vetoed the bill following vigorous opposition led by Defenders of Wildlife. Explaining why he rejected the bill, Scott wrote that it "lacks sufficient safeguards" to "ensure the protection of state ... lands, native species and habitats."

But we should be realistic about the governor and his veto.

In the same letter, Scott explained that he had little trouble rejecting the bill because he believes state law already allows the governor, Cabinet and the five water management districts to lease state lands for purposes deemed constitutional.

Forget about science and safety. Is it constitutional? Furthermore, according to the Tampa Bay Times, Harrison said Scott told him personally that the state already has the

authority to lease state-owned lands to zoos. It just has not happened — which does not mean it will not happen. Why would the governor assure Harrison of this authority? Apparently feeling triumphant, Harrison said: "I'm happy ... that we've brought attention to the fact that Florida law already allows this to happen."

Then there is Larry Killmar, the Lowry Park Zoo vice president and president of the Florida Association of Zoos, who shepherded the bill to the governor's desk. During the legislative session, the Tampa Times reports, Killmar said the association would "certainly plot forward" to find state land suitable for breeding large herds of exotic animals.

While Defenders of Wildlife officials and other environmentalists hope the governor keeps herds of exotic animals off state lands, they are right to be vigilant. They believe, for example, that exotic animals roaming state lands would displace native habitats and species. They also fear that animals could escape and threaten human life, and they are concerned about the spread of non-native seed and feed and the potential spread of disease.

Fortunately, Laurie MacDonald, Florida director for Defenders of Wildlife, has a warning for Killmar and others: "We will be watching very closely any applications for this use."

Although the wrongheaded "Jurassic Park bill" is dead for now, Florida's legendary environmental shortsightedness is alive and kicking.

Scandal, yes, but there was a summit, too

The prostitution scandal involving U.S. Secret Service agents in Colombia had at least some benefit: It helped eclipse the fact that the Summit of the Americas was largely a failure. Rep. Connie Mack, R-Fla., who led a congressional delegation, said those shameful activities "unfortunately have become a big part of the buzz around the summit."

Back in the U.S. they were the only buzz around the summit and perhaps a good thing for American diplomacy.

The U.S. faced demands that Cuba be included. Leftist-governed Ecuador, Nicaragua and Bolivia boycotted over Cuba's absence and threatened to do so again at the next summit, set for 2015 in Panama. Venezuela also was absent, but its president, Hugo Chavez, is seriously ill.

President Barack Obama placated Cuban-Americans in Florida by refusing to sign a statement calling for Cuba to be invited to the next summit, but he angered another key constituency, organized labor, by certifying that Colombia, which had a horrendous record of unsolved murders of union organizers, had met its human rights obligations.

The U.S. also came under attack for its "war on drugs" that participants said contributed to instability and violence fueled by

the huge U.S. market.

Several nations called for decriminalization. President Otto Perez Molina of Guatemala argued for legalization, regulation and taxation, which the U.S. opposes. Obama offered the noncommittal response that it's "wholly appropriate to discuss the issue." In other words, no.

A subtext of the summit was that rising economic powers like Brazil and China mean the U.S. is no longer an unchallenged actor in hemispheric affairs.

Obama did receive good local press for being the first U.S. president to spend a significant amount of time in Colombia — three days. Somehow back home, that small bit of good news was totally overshadowed by the Secret Service agents.

Norway's gentle justice for a mass murderer

If you're a lunatic mass murderer, you couldn't pick a much better venue for the crime than Norway.

That's the lesson from the trial that began Monday in Oslo of Anders Breivik, who has admitted to killing eight people in a bomb blast in the capital's downtown and, later that same day, 69 youngsters that he hunted down individually in a youth camp.

Breivik admits to the killings. He says he did them in self-defense.

He began the first day of his trial by asserting that he did not recognize the jurisdiction of the court because of the government's support for multiculturalism and didn't recognize one of the five judges because of her choice of friends.

He entered the court, according to one description, "smug and smiling" and favoring the court and the spectators with periodic clenched-fist salutes.

Breivik claims to be a resistance fighter in a far-right, white-supremacist group modeled after a Christian order that fought during the Crusades.

As authorities have been able to determine so far, this group exists only in Breivik's head.

Two groups of psychiatrists have examined that head, with the milder of the two diagnoses finding him a "paranoid psychotic schizophrenic" but still sane enough to stand trial. The other diagnosis said that if Breivik were ever released, he would be highly likely to commit similar massacres.

According to the London Daily Mail, Breivik, rather fittingly, is being held in a former Nazi concentration camp in isolation from the other prisoners because they would kill him given a chance.

His accommodations are considerably better than those accorded the original inmates. He has a "suite" of three 86-square-foot cells. (An inmate in a U.S. supermax prison typically gets a single 96-square-foot cell and stays in it 23 hours a day with little in the way of diversion.)

Breivik sleeps in one cell, works out in another that is equipped with exercise equipment and uses the third as an office.

It has a computer but no Internet access. He has cable TV with access to 15 channels.

The trial is to last 10 weeks and will give Breivik ample opportunity to expand on his wing-nut views.

To bolster his case — although it's hard to see how — he will call radical Islamists and right-wing extremists to testify on his behalf.

If he is sentenced to jail time, he will likely serve his sentence in a prison that sounds like a country club even by Norwegian penal standards, according to the Daily Mail — private bathrooms, flat-screen TVs in the bedrooms, personal trainers, even a recording studio and a climbing wall.

He has told his defense lawyer his only regret was that the death toll from his killing spree wasn't higher.

If he is convicted, the 33-year-old Breivik faces a maximum sentence of 21 years, just a little over three months per victim.

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

Gardening Gurus

Edible landscaping and water conservation are hot button topics for hands-on Master Gardener workshop.

A cry has been heard from those aspiring weekend warrior gardeners who just can't get their plants to grow. The Master Gardeners and UF/IFAS Columbia County Extension will host a two-day, hands-on workshop that will address the challenges of gardening and landscaping in North Florida.

"I felt there was a real need for it, we've had so many people ask," said UF/IFAS Columbia County Extension horticulture agent Nichelle Demorest. "It's geared for everybody, but especially for people new to gardening in this area. They may try for a season or two and give up. They can't make it work because they don't understand how to grow things in our soils or climate."

"The workshop is geared

for gardening in our area; North Florida is different from Central and South Florida," she continued. "We have a lot of deep sandy soils with shallow clay pockets. We also have the fragile nature of the karst soil system."

According to gardenmedia-group.com (a garden trend-spotting group) Americans are trending toward gardening issues that Floridians have realized for decades. Trends such as water conservation along with hydroponic gardening, 'eco-gardening' and the pursuit of health and better quality of life have caught the national eye.

"Edible landscaping is a hot button topic," said Demorest. "People sometimes don't realize that a vegetable plant takes the same requirements as a perennial — so why can't you grow it in a formal landscape?"

"We get the most questions about raised bed gardens. You don't have weed or

nematode problems or soil diseases or fungus problems with raised beds," she said. "People are also concerned about keeping nutrients out of the water, they're interested in the springs and also in water conservation."

Some workshop topics include exhibits and hands-on working demonstrations for composting, gardening for wildlife, micro-

irrigation, rain barrels and plant propagation, natives and invasives with exhibits, edible landscaping and edible 'weed' recipes and taste-testing and citrus tips for North Florida. Also, demonstrations on floating gardens, vertical gardens, container gardens and raised-bed gardens.

The two-day workshop will be held April 23 and 24 and will be

taught by UF/IFAS Faculty and Master Gardener Volunteers. Single day fee is \$15 or both days for \$25 and there is a spousal two-day discount with both spouses attending both days for \$40. Blaze 75% contained

The effort U.S. Forest Service rangers have put into establishing and maintaining a secure perimeter around the County Line fire has been beneficial and earlier this week stopped a new fire in its tracks while increasing the containment level around the County Line Fire to 75 percent.

Officials plan to continue to reinforce containment lines and be alert to spot-overs and new fires in the meantime. The County Line fire has burned 34,936 acres.

Monday afternoon initial attack crews responded to a new fire on the north side of U.S. 90 at the Baker and

Columbia County line which was quickly contained at 1/10 of an acre.

"It was a railroad fire, where one of the train's car brakes was faulty and throwing sparks which ignited the dry vegetation," said Petra Setlich, public information officer trainee. "Fortunately we still had our initial attack teams out there and they are policing the area for up to 10 miles and if they had not caught that we would have had another huge fire on our hands."

Setlich said sparks were also thrown in the areas where prescribed burns had been done to eliminate fuels from the county line fire and didn't ignite. Initial attack teams are strategi-

cally placed around the fire and they monitor the perimeter.

"If that had not been done that would have been a runaway fire," she said.

The amount of personnel working on the County Line fire has also been reduced. There are approximately 304 people working on the fire with 31 fire engines, 27 dozers and five helicopters.

"We're still working doing the burnout in the center of the fire," Setlich said. "We're over 200 feet in the containment line now and the safe zone is considerable. We're working it as safely as possible so spreading is not an issue now. It's not going to jump that 200-foot containment line."

Positive outlook good for the heart

Be happy — it seems to be good for your heart.

Scientists have long known that Type A personalities and people who are chronically angry, anxious or depressed have a higher risk of heart attacks.

Now a Harvard review of the flip side of that psychology concludes that being

upbeat and optimistic just may help protect against heart disease.

Rather than focusing only on how to lessen heart risks, "it might also be useful to focus on how we might bolster the positive side of things," said lead researcher Julia Boehm

of the Harvard School of Public Health.

Boehm reviewed dozens of studies examining a positive outlook — as determined by various psychological measurements — on heart health. Optimism in particular seems key, as a number of studies found the most optimistic people had half the risk of a first heart attack when compared to the least optimistic, Boehm said.

Kentucky's starting 5 declares for NBA draft

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Kentucky's starting lineup of three freshmen and two sophomores did most everything together. Now, they will go their separate ways in the NBA.

Freshmen Anthony Davis, Michael Kidd-Gilchrist and Marquis Teague, and sophomores Terrence Jones and Doron Lamb declared for the draft in a nationally televised news conference Tuesday night.

"We made it work," Jones said. "We all wanted to be there and do it together like we've done everything else together."

The group, all clad in similar blue UK golf shirts, came into the season largely untested before ascending to No. 1, winning the Southeastern Conference in dominating fashion and capping an NCAA tournament run with a 67-59 victory over Kansas in the title game for the school's eighth championship.

"It's been a great opportunity playing here, I'll miss this team, the way we

played together. We all love each other," said Davis, who picked up every major player of the year award and is likely the No. 1 pick in June's draft. "I'm just going to miss this place. We won an NCAA championship here and did a lot. We all did a lot for this school and I'm going to miss it."

The five join seniors Darius Miller, who is also projected to be drafted, and Eloy Vargas in leaving the program.

"This is a players' first program. I said it three years ago. During the season, it's about our team. You saw it in this year's team, they were about each other," coach John Calipari said. "When the season is over, it's about moments like this."

The departures mean only freshman Kyle Wiltjer remains from the rotation with a new class of highly touted recruits joining Calipari next season. Calipari said he had never watched the final game of a season until this one.

Kidd-Gilchrist appeared emotional for a few moments at the podium and later

said his mother, Cindy Richardson, wanted him to return to school since he was one of the youngest players in Division I after turning 18 in September. Instead, he has other plans for her.

"I want to spoil my mom. I think I'm going to spoil my mom to death. That's one thing I'm looking forward to," said Kidd-Gilchrist, who plans to buy her a watch for starters. "I'm ready, I think I'm ready for anything that comes my way now."

Teague, the point guard, seemed to be the only player who might be a questionable first-round pick in Calipari's effort to match his 2010 draft class that saw five players go in the first round led by the No. 1 overall pick, John Wall. Teague said he felt like he did enough to be drafted in the first round by leading a "great team that's kind of like an NBA team" to a national championship.

"This is my lifelong dream to play in the NBA and to be doing it with these guys, we're all just making the decision together just makes it that much more special," Teague said.
