Damage assessed in wake of fire

Generators purred throughout the day as the smell of smoke remained strong at the scene of a fire Wednesday that destroyed a warehouse and threatened a nearby home furnishings store.

The fire roared through a 9,000 square foot warehouse, leaving only charred, mangled debris from Cliff's Flea Market that had been housed there. The building's inventory

was completely destroyed and the scene was taped off from public access on Thursday.

The fire occurred at 835 SW Deputy Jeff Davis Lane. The cause of the fire, which took local firefighters more than 90 minutes to control, remains under investigation.

The building, constructed in the 1960s was the original showroom of Morrell's Home Furnishings, which had since moved to a building next door. The warehouse was leased to Clifford

Blackmon for Cliff's Flea Market.

Paul Mabile, one of the owners of Morrell's Home Furnishings, said they were open on a limited basis Thursday, but hoped to have all their electrical and Internet services up and running by the weekend.

"The furniture building is still closed — we don't have the electricity hooked up yet," he said. "The mattress gallery and the budget center is open."

More than 60,000 expected to attend fest

Wanee a monster for local economy

LIVE OAK
The Wanee Festival, a LiveNation event hosted by Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park, has sold a record number of tickets this year, more than 20,000 for each day's performances. The impact on the surrounding communities is huge, giving local hotels, restaurants and other businesses a tremendous surge in customers.

"This event over the last several years has grown to be the largest event in a national level that draws people from Lake City," said Rod Butler, manager of

LIVE OAK
It's 2:30 in the afternoon and already the music is pumping loud and proud at the Wanee Festival in the Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park.

Hammocks hang from trees like cocoons, descending down a natural amphitheater to one of several stages. The Bobby Lee Rodgers Trio rips on electric guitar with sun-baked, blissed out fans leaning in close.

It is Thursday, and the festival has only just begun.

Over 60,000 people are expected to attend the

event over the weekend. Music fans, vendors and artists travel from all over the country just to come to Wanee.

Pu Tzu, a geode vendor from California said the festival was definitely worth the 3,000 mile trek.

Tzu said he travels the world searching for "the world's best gems" and attending festivals. He said he had been to 207 Grateful Dead concerts. The Grateful Dead, he said, was the seed that all other festivals sprang from.

"That's where this all came from. That's where this whole concept of rockin' hippies hanging in nature and enjoying

Chapel 2nd in state for architecture

WELLBORN — Mandi's Chapel, the centerpiece of the Episcopal Diocese of Florida's Camp Weed and the Cerveny Conference Center, has been named the top religious building in the state and the number two building overall, in the American Institute of Architects (AIA Florida) Top 100 Buildings competition.

The competition was part of AIA Florida's 100th anniversary celebration: 100 Years 100 Places competition, recognizing the important contribution architects have made in Florida.

The competition lasted approximately four weeks, from March 1 - April 6, and approximately 2.4 million votes were cast online. The competition identified 100 structures across the state that represent the best in architectural achievement.

"To have Mandi's Chapel chosen to be one of the top 100 buildings in Florida for architecture by the AIA, was quite a surprise," said Joe Chamberlain, Camp

Band singer Helm passes away at 71


NEW YORK – Much of the Band’s innovative sound was born in the “Big Pink.”

It was a house in idyllic Woodstock, N.Y., rented for \$125 a week and nicknamed for its distinctive pink paint job. The group would gather for hours at a time to create songs. Musicians would walk by a typewriter on the kitchen table, dash off a verse or two to a song, and wander off. A microphone once was placed on top of the hot-water heater in the basement. Although they lived in other houses nearby, the Big Pink became the place for them to live communally and make music.

In an age of war, riots and assassinations, the Band lived out a dream of simpler times. They dressed plainly, played tightly and did not upstage each other. The tall, lanky Robbie Robertson was an expert blues-rock guitarist and the group’s best lyricist, his songs inspired in part by Bob Dylan and by his travels through the American South. The baby-faced Rick Danko was a fluid bassist and accomplished singer. The bearish Garth Hudson was an ingenious keyboardist of uncommon wit and emotion, while the sad-eyed Richard Manuel’s haunting falsetto on “Whispering Pines,” “Tears of Rage” and others led drummer Levon Helm to call him the group’s lead singer.

But for many Band admirers, honors belonged to Helm, whose life spanned and helped tell the history of rock ‘n’ roll, whose voice called back to the earliest days of American song.

The short, scrappy Helm, who died Thursday at age 71, had a bold tenor once likened to a town crier calling a meeting to order. He not only sang “The Night They Drove Old Dixie Down,” but inhabited it, becoming the Confederate Virgil Caine, “hungry, just barely alive”; his brother killed by the Yankees; the South itself

in ruins. It was the kind of heart-breaking, complicated story and performance that had even Northerners rooting for the proud and desperate Virgil. Helm was also the musical leader on stage, and played drums loose-limbed and funky, shoulders hunched, head to the side when he sang.

In some ways, the Band was the closest this country ever came to the camaraderie and achievement of the Beatles. They were a quintessential American group, but only Helm came from the United States. The son of an Arkansas cotton farmer, Mark Lavon (he later changed it “Levon”), Helm was born in Elaine, Ark., in 1940. He grew up around music and witnessed rock’s early days, seeing Elvis Presley perform before he was famous. The Helm family enjoyed listening to the Grand Ole Opry and Helm saw his first live show at age 6 – bluegrass pioneer Bill Monroe. He would later say the

experience “tattooed” his brain.

Nugent removed from concert lineup at Fort Knox in June

FORT KNOX, Ky. – Rocker Ted Nugent, who drew the attention of the Secret Service with comments that some perceived as a threat against President Barack Obama, has been removed from the lineup of a concert at Fort Knox.

The News-Enterprise in Elizabethtown reports the post said Thursday the annual summer concert June 23 will still feature REO Speedwagon and Styx, and a replacement may be selected.

Speaking at a National Rifle Association meeting in St. Louis last weekend, Nugent said of the Obama administration: “We need to ride into that battlefield and chop their heads off in November.”

He also said he would be “dead or in jail by this time next year” if Obama is re-elected.

Christie says he did not nod off during Springsteen concert

TRENTON, N.J. – New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie insists he was listening – not sleeping – during a recent Bruce Springsteen concert in New York City.

Christie says a fan snapped a photo of him with head back and eyes closed during the show at Madison Square Garden one day after returning from the Middle East. The governor says The New York Post incorrectly concluded that he had dozed off.

Christie told reporters Thursday that actually he simply leaned back and shut his eyes to listen to the spiritual-sounding song “Rocky Ground” when the picture was taken.

Floridians get \$37.7M from oil spill claims errors

TALLAHASSEE – State and federal officials say about 4,450 Floridians will be paid \$37.7 million because of errors in the 2010 Gulf of Mexico oil spill claims process.

That’s more than half of the \$64 million total that will be paid to 7,300 people and businesses whose claims with BP’s \$20 billion compensation fund were shortchanged or wrongfully denied.

The U.S. Justice Department announced on Thursday that the errors were identified through an independent audit of the Gulf Coast Claims Facility. Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi said she joined her counterparts in other Gulf Coast states and the Justice Department in urging the audit.

It was agreed to by former claims administrator Kenneth Feinberg. The facility paid in excess of \$6 billion to more than 220,000 claimants under Feinberg’s leadership.

Ex-state worker charged with loan sharking

TALLAHASSEE – A former Florida Revenue Department worker is accused of using his state computer for loan sharking, or criminal usury, in Tallahassee.

Assistant State Attorney David Marsey said on Thursday that Dorian Harper faces eight counts of charging more than 25 percent annual interest. Each count is punishable by up to 60 days in jail.

Harper also could get up to a year if convicted on one count of making loans without a license.

His lawyer did not immediately return a call seeking comment.

Harper resigned April 5 following his arrest. He

is free on \$4,500 bond and has pleaded not guilty. No trial date has been set.

Revenue spokeswoman Renee Watters said her agency notified the Florida Department of Law Enforcement after identifying potential criminal activity on Harper’s computer.

Teen gets 20 years for death of parents

NAPLES – A southwest Florida teen has been sentenced to just more than 20 years in prison for killing his parents.

As part of a deal with Collier County prosecutors, 15-year-old Alex Crain pleaded no contest Thursday to two counts of manslaughter.

Authorities say the teen fatally shot his parents, 40-year-old Thomas Crain and 38-year-old Kelly Crain, in December 2010 in their Golden Gate Estates home.

Florida State marks 50 years of integration

TALLAHASSEE – Florida State University is celebrating 50 years of integration.

The three-day celebration beginning Thursday reflects on the legacy of three pioneering black students.

They include the late Maxwell Courtney, who died 10 years after becoming Florida State’s first black graduate in 1965.

Fred Flowers, the university’s first black athlete and his sister, Doby Flowers, its first black homecoming queen, are participating along with one of Courtney’s relatives, John Payne.

The events include a 1,500-person “Hand in Hand Across Time” human chain on Thursday.

Fred Flowers, who played baseball at Florida State, is to throw out the first ball on Friday at the

Seminoles’ game against the University of Miami.

Famed poet Maya Angelou is speaking on Saturday.

Man suspected of robbery moments after release

TAMPA – Investigators say it didn’t take a Tampa man long to commit a crime after he was released from jail.

Tampa police say Marcus Wayne Hunt hit a man in the face and took off with his \$190 bicycle just 16 minutes after his April 14 release from the Hillsborough County Jail.

According to police, 22-year-old Hunt had been arrested earlier that day and jailed on charges of attempting to elude a police officer and not having a valid driver’s license.

Detectives were able to track Hunt down and he was arrested Tuesday on robbery charges. They say he has an extensive criminal history and had been released from state prison in December 2011.

Woman gets 10 years for fatally stabbing husband

FORT MYERS – A southwest Florida woman has been sentenced to more than 10 years in prison for fatally stabbing her husband.

A Lee County judge sentenced 42-year-old Leatha James on Thursday. She was convicted in January of manslaughter with a weapon. The News-Press reports that prosecutors had previously offered her a plea deal for five years of probation.

Prosecutors say James stabbed her husband, 44-year-old Arthur James, in the back in January 2009. The two had been fighting at their Lehigh Acres home after she learned he had cheated on her.

Holiday Inn and Suites.

Butler said his hotel has been sold out for this week-end months in advance.

People from all over the country are gathering for the event. Butler said visitors from New York, California and Pennsylvania and Kentucky have booked rooms for the weekend.

"Lake City really feels an impact," he said.

Nick Patel, owner of Hampton Inn and Suites, said hotel rates rise 15 to 20 dollars the weekend of Wannee Festival because demand is so high.

"It's a highly beneficial event for this area in the short term," Patel said.

Hotels in Lake City, Live Oak and even as far as Tallahassee have been sold out months in advance.

According to Patel, hotels are not the only businesses benefiting.

"Anytime there is a festival like this, restaurants do benefit, gas stations benefit," Patel said.

The county has arranged special transportation services just to manage the immense crowds.

Columbia County's Tourist Development Council is funding, through a grant from Budweiser, a complimentary shuttle that will transport festival-goers to and from Wannee from the five major hotels in Lake City.

The shuttle will run from 10 a.m. to 2 a.m. on a continuous circuit from Thursday to Saturday.

The Suwannee Valley Transit Authority will work

with TDC to provide a free shuttle for festival-goers on Saturday.

SVTA will also offer rides from Live Oak hotels to the festival at \$2 a ride.

"The taxi is \$35 for one way, so we think that's pretty fair," said Bill Steel, SVTA operations manager.

Crowds will cram into the renowned music park to see headlining acts such as Furthur (a band composed of the surviving members of the Grateful Dead), The Allman Brothers Band, Bruce Hornsby and Buddy Guy.

"It is a great event that brings in people from all over the world. It's an exciting event for North Florida," said Teena Peavey, Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park Marketing Director.

He said the stores have limited communication with one telephone and limited Internet access through wireless cards.

"We're kind of up and running and waiting for the insurance adjuster to get here," Mabile said.

Even though electricians were on site working to restore wiring impacted by the fire, the doors to the home furnishings warehouse were open and the area cordoned off with tape.

"We got a little bit of smoke in the home furnishings building," Mabile said. "There is an ozone machine in there from Bayway (cleaning service) and they have some air scrubbers in there. We ran that

all night last night and we'll have to run it again all night tonight. We'll then assess things Friday and hopefully we'll have electricity this (Thursday) afternoon."

Mabile said authorities checked the home furnishings building after the fire was extinguished and confirmed the building had not been damaged by the blaze.

"We just got little bit of smoke in there, hopefully that won't be a loss for us," he said. "This was pretty unfortunate. Hopefully the insurance company holds up its end of the bargain."

John Norman was one of the vendors renting space in the warehouse that burned.

Norman had an inventory

of video games, video game systems, Disney memorabilia and other items he spent a lifetime collecting that were destroyed in the fire.

"People don't realize it's not just your product, but the equipment you have to have," he said Wednesday, speaking of his loss. "You just can't find this everywhere. It took months to get some of this stuff. This is a hard row to hoe, but I'll be back. I'm not just going to go out like that. I'm not just going to let some fire take me down. When I was a kid we had a restaurant and it burned, but we came back. We did it once and we'll do it again."

"He's my best friend,"

Gagnon said.

Gagnon was sweaty and smiling and said he could not wait for Saturday night to come.

Overall, it was agreed that Wannee was a "laid-back"

event, with plenty of people to meet and experiences to be had.

"It's relaxing, it's chill," Tzu said. "It really makes me feel like it's the beginning of the spring season."

Since he became secretary of defense in July, Leon Panetta has flown back to his home, a walnut ranch in northern California, 27 times at taxpayer expense.

The cost so far: more than \$800,000. He combines these trips with visits to military bases and assorted events, but he reimburses the Treasury for the personal part of his travel, about \$630 for a round trip for a total of about \$17,000 out of Panetta's pocket.

The government determines the reimbursement based on its own formulas. Panetta has no say over the cost nor does he have any say about his mode of travel. He is required to fly, when he travels anywhere, aboard military aircraft with secure communication to the White House, Pentagon and military commanders around the world.

Panetta echoed what many officials with high-intensity Washington jobs have concluded; that occasionally it's best to contemplate the national capital from a distance.

"For 40 years I've been in this town, I've gone home because my wife and family are there and because, frankly, I think it's healthy to get out of Washington periodically just to get your mind straight and your perspective straight," he said.

This recalls a flap in the last decade, when Republicans accused then-Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi of imperiously demanding that the Air Force provide her with a luxury-equipped military 737 so she could fly nonstop to her San Francisco district.

As third in line to the presidency, she was the subject of a post-9/11 directive to fly in secure military aircraft whenever possible. Even the Bush White House dismissed it as a "silly story," and it quickly blew over. This one will, too.

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

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Don't let Islamists use our tech to crush dissent

All the way back in 1990, Albert Wohlstetter, the great Cold War strategist, recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, said "The fax shall make you free." He was right: The advent of fax machines, Xerox copiers and other then-cutting-edge communications technologies was an enormous boon to the free flow of information. In Communist countries, the Samzidat was transformed: Dissident self-publishers, who previously would sit at typewriters copying banned books page by page, could now, with the push of a button, create dozens of copies and transmit them almost anywhere.

Ever since, there has been not just the hope but the expectation that advancing communications technologies — personal computers, the Internet, email, smartphones, satellites and the like — would inevitably spread freedom while constraining the power of the despots.

This just in: It's not turning out that way.

Instead, Iran's rulers have been using high technology to break the backs of their domestic opponents. My colleagues, Mark Dubowitz and Toby Dershowitz, last weekend reported on tests conducted secretly by nongovernmental technology experts revealing that Iranian security forces have the means to locate mobile phones in Iran to which

encrypted messages have been sent — and to do it within minutes.

The theocratic regime also has been increasing its ability to both monitor and control Internet activity within Iran's borders. Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei plans to go further: He has ordered the creation of an "Internet oversight agency" whose mission will be to limit Iranians' access to the Web. The Iranian chief of police, Esmail Ahmadi Moghaddam, has derided Google as an "instrument of espionage." A top Iranian intelligence official has called the Internet "a spy."

Last month, President Barack Obama denounced Iran's efforts to erect an "electronic curtain" — a conscious echo of the "Iron Curtain," Winston Churchill's description of the Soviet Union's efforts to isolate nations living under Communism from the Free World.

Bashar al-Assad, Iran's Syrian handmaiden, also is escalating what Margaret Weiss of the Washington Institute for Near East Policy calls a "comprehensive crackdown" on Internet opponents. With assistance from

both Tehran and Lebanon-based Hezbollah, Iran's foreign legion, "the operational tempo of the pro-regime Syrian Electronic Army (SEA) has increased dramatically," Weiss writes. SEA routinely "defaces what it perceives as hostile news and opposition sites, and has barraged Facebook pages belonging to no less than the European Union, President Obama, the State Department, Oprah Winfrey, Human Rights Watch, and Aljazeera with pro-Assad comments."

On many occasions, Assad's cyber police have simply shut down the Internet and mobile phone reception to disrupt dissident efforts to organize, send photos and videos to the media, and evade arrest.

But that software almost certainly was not developed in Iran. Dubowitz and Dershowitz write that a long list of foreign companies — Chinese, European and even American — have been selling the Iranians "the technologies they need to make this oppression possible."

In a speech last June, Assad said "the electronic army" has become "a real army in virtual reality." That real army is now being deployed by him, by Iran's theocrats and by other despots against those who dare challenge their power and frustrate their ambitions.

The dog days of Barack Obama

The 2012 presidential campaign has become a dog-eat-dog contest. For months, Obama campaign operatives sought to make an issue of Mitt Romney carrying his Irish setter Seamus in a rooftop dog carrier during a family vacation in 1983. Some major media outlets picked up the non-story, and the Obama campaign buttressed it with an endless series of snarky tweets and barbs. The liberals are chasing their tails with this tale.

On Tuesday, the *Daily Caller's* Jim Treacher juxtaposed the Seamus story with a passage from President Obama's book "Dreams From My Father: A Story of Race and Inheritance," in which he describes eating dog meat while growing up in Indonesia. The message Democrats were trying to establish was that Mr. Obama was kinder to dogs. The book snippet supplied the rejoinder: At least Mr. Romney never ate one.

On its face, the dog-eating anecdote is just as much a non-story as the adventures of Seamus. But it exploded over social media and Twitter, and within hours, even mainstream media news hounds picked it up. Man bites dog is always news. It's the kind of story that lingers, a humorous situation that lends itself to endless one-liners. ("Why are there no more Blue Dog Democrats? Obama ate them.")

The Obama campaign is struggling to come up with a strong response, but nothing seems to stick. It can say the dog-eating took place when Mr. Obama was a child, that it was in a different culture or that the first family has not prepared dog in the White House.

However, it cannot escape the ick factor, which will hound it until November. Now the Obama campaign will have to call off the dogs on Mr. Romney.

Bo, the White House pooch, will have to retreat to an undisclosed doghouse until Election Day.

Mr. Obama won't be able to eat hot dogs in public. Meanwhile, online spoofs ("Dog: the other White House meat") and canine recipes are spreading faster than you can say "fetch."

This piles on to a recent run of bad news for the Obama campaign: the war on moms (which also was a liberal self-inflicted wound), investigations of wasteful spending at the General Services Administration, the Secret Service prostitution scandal, and the dispute between the White House and the secretary of defense over whether there was a deal to fly Secretary Leon E. Panetta back to California every weekend at \$32,000 of taxpayer money per trip.

All of these stories undermine confidence in government and the White House.

Dining on dogs shouldn't be a bigger bone of contention than Mr. Obama accruing \$5 trillion in new public debt, high unemployment, anemic economic growth, a foreign policy in shambles and a growing sense that there is no future for America. But as a news story, it is the top dog, at least for now. The old saying goes that if you want a friend in Washington, get a dog. Just don't eat it.

Finding favor with God - Nehemiah, Part 2

The Bible records many specific occurrences of God granting favor: Noah found favor in God's eyes (Gen 6:8) and Mary also found favor with God (Luke 1:30). Likewise, the scriptures also encourage us to ask God to grant us favor with others, just as God caused an official to show favor to Daniel (Daniel 1:9). The word favor indicates an effort on one's behalf or interest; to afford advantages for success. In all three of our examples, we can read how God's favor enabled them to accomplish a task successfully. Taking the definition a bit deeper, the Old Testament Lexical Aids defines favor as simply: "compassion, mercy, sympathy, tenderness, pity, and sensitive love." In other words, God's efforts on our behalf, whether concerning salvation, or specific daily blessings, are the result of his compassion and mercy on us.

After our first look at Nehemiah last week, our distinct challenge was to "hear" the problem or need that would warrant our involvement in taking on an overwhelming project or problem. Like Nehemiah, once we have heard clearly, the next step is an evaluation of where you are currently, and what is needed to get moving forward. In his case, Nehemiah clearly understood that his people were living in shame due to their disobedience to God's commands, decrees, and laws. He acknowledged his part through a prayer of repentance, then reminded God of His covenant with His people. Often we can't make progress in a difficult situation because we fail to see that we are part of the problem. Nehemiah could have easily blamed the previous generations and acted as though he was innocent, but he willingly admitted his sin before God. Armed with the understanding that he was unable to fix this problem simply by his own strength or wit, Nehemiah was now ready to ask for help...for favor.

"Give your servant success today by granting him favor in the presence of this man." In this one sentence, Nehemiah expresses a remarkable grasp on the situation. First, he was God's servant, not the other way around. Often our prayers sound more like three wishes to a genie in a bottle, than requests before

the Creator of heaven and earth. Second, Nehemiah clearly understood that the success of this project depended on God, not him. His role was to see where God would open a door, and then obediently walk through. Third, Nehemiah did not disrespect those in authority over him, but rather asked God to grant favor through them. As the last verse of chapter one explains, Nehemiah was the cupbearer to the king. This position is comparable to today's bodyguards. The cupbearer's job was to taste the king's wine in order to guard against poisoning, the most common form of assassination in those days.

For obvious reasons, a king would be reluctant to share his cupbearer with any other task, so Nehemiah would surely need God to intervene on his behalf. (We will discover how God accomplishes this next week!)

Meanwhile, once we have "heard" clearly, our next step is to evaluate where we are and how we arrived at this place. This is also the time to acknowledge our part in the problem and ask for forgiveness from God and anyone else that we may have hurt along the way. Finally, ask for favor in successfully seeing this project or problem through to the end...favor from God and others who could make the path a little clearer...because your heart matters!

Praying with confidence according to the Bible

Prayer is a blessed privilege, and absolutely necessary. How else does one communicate with a Holy God? To communicate means: "to be joined together in". Bible students recognize that our Savior continuously urged His disciples to pray. Studies of the life of Jesus will quickly help one realize the necessity of prayer.

An expository dictionary teaches us that possibly as many as eight Greek words are used for prayer. All basically mean the same thing - to ask, to desire, to call to oneself, a primary warning, a need. The Bible establishes certain guidelines for praying. Christ taught the conditions upon which prayer is answerable and successful. His direction as to how prayer is to be offered is clear and specific.

He taught that prayer must be accomplished by faith. "Jesus...said unto them, Verily I say unto you, If ye have faith, and doubt not, ye shall... say unto the mountain, Be thou removed, and be thou cast into the sea; it shall be done. And all things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive" (Matthew 21:21 & 22).

He taught that prayer must be offered in His name. "...Verily I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in My name, He will give it you" (John 16:23). When we pray in the name above every name, we are

assured of an answer, seeing that we plead the merit of Christ, of His perfect propitiation for sin.

He taught us to pray simply. We must remember that God does not answer prayer according to our intelligence. "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly" (Matthew 6:6).

He taught us to pray in secret. "...pray to thy Father which is in secret..." (Matthew 6:6). Behind closed doors, alone with God, the world shut out, prayer becomes more effective.

He taught us to pray persistently. "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened" (Luke 11:9; cf. Luke 11:5-8). Intensity and earnestness of purpose are expressed in such persistency. The saints of old knew how to storm heaven with their prayers. We too easily tire and retire.

He taught us to pray in all humility. The prayer of the Pharisee never rose above the ceiling. But the prayer of the publican, short in comparison, was accompanied with humility and penitence.

He taught us to pray, conscious that we are right with others. "But if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:14 & 15). A wrong relationship with fellow believers hinders effective prayer, even though we might have a right relationship with God.

We must cultivate the art of turning a promise into petition, instruction into intercession. One of the greatest of all prayer secrets is to pray in the realm of Bible truth and language.

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Encouraging Christians not to fall away

The longer one is involved in an endeavor and the more people try to discourage him, the easier it becomes to "fall away." The writer of the New Testament book of Hebrews seems to be writing to a group of people whom he wants to encourage to not "fall away" from following Christ.

The book of Hebrews is one of the most encouraging books of the Bible. Even though in some places it is very detail oriented and full of logic, the book has a very optimistic aura. Its overall message is do not go back to where you were before you

became a Christian because what you now have is better than what you did have. Do not "fall away."

Chapters 11 and 12 may be the most encouraging part of the book. In the former chapter the writer tells of all the people who acted upon their faith: "we understand," "Abel offered," Enoch was pleasing, Noah prepared, and Abraham obeyed. The author says, "these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth ... they [desired] a better

country, that is a heavenly one" (11:13-16).

The rest of chapter 11 tells about other people who acted upon their faith. For example, Moses who did not want to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter but rather wanted to "endure

ill-treatment with the people of God" (11:24-25). The children of Israel as "they passed through the Red Sea" (11:29), or the Israelite army marching around the city of Jericho for seven days and the walls "fell down" (11:30), or Rahab the harlot who did not perish because she was not like the others who were disobedient (11:31). Finishing with an exciting flair, the author mentions the names of great servants of God who remained faithful through very difficult circumstances.

In chapter 12 the author gives his reader some ways to make sure they do not "fall away." He tells them

to "lay aside every encumbrance, and the sin which so easily entangles" you (12:1). The following verse tells them to keep their eyes fixed on Jesus and consider what He endured at the hand of sinners. His third reason is that they have not "resisted to the point of shedding blood" (12:4) in their striving against sin even though what they have endured might have been very difficult. Concluding he tells them that this "discipline" is from the Lord because He wants them to have the strength to endure until the end.

Dear Christian, this book

tells us in very plain terms that there is a possibility of us "falling away." After telling them they had come to the "heavenly Jerusalem" the author's final words of encouragement were "do not be carried away by varied and strange teachings ... but [seek] the city which is to come" (13:9-14). Let us also encourage each other not to fall away.

Top Egyptian cleric visits Jerusalem

CAIRO — A top Egyptian Islamic cleric paid a rare visit to Jerusalem Wednesday, breaking with decades of opposition by Muslim leaders on traveling to areas under Israeli control.

The Grand Mufti Ali Gomaa wrote on his Twitter account that the symbolic visit was in solidarity with the Palestinians' claim to east Jerusalem, under Israel's control since it was captured in the 1967 Mideast war. He prayed in the Al-Aqsa mosque, Islam's third holiest site, during his two-hour visit.

Gomaa called the trip an unofficial visit, clearly an attempt to defuse criticism he is already facing for breaking an unofficial ban by Muslim clerics and most Egyptian professional and private associations on visiting Israel or Israeli-controlled Palestinian territories. The Egyptian Coptic Church, and most Muslim clerics around the region generally uphold the ban as well.

Egypt and Israel signed a peace treaty in 1979, but most Egyptians view the Jewish state as their top enemy, shunning dealings with Israeli authorities. Jordan is the only other Arab country with full diplomatic relations with Israel.

The spokesman for Egypt's powerful Muslim Brotherhood, Mahmoud Ghozlan, said the visit was "very strange."

"Muslim clerics have taken a position that there is no visiting Jerusalem with continued Israeli occupation," Ghozlan said. "He violated this opinion of the majority of clerics. Why, I don't know."

Abdel-Akher Hamad, the leader of the more radical Al-Gamaa al-Islamiyya said the visit was a "challenge" to the boycott and that Gomaa took advantage of Egypt's turbulent political scene to defy a national position.

He called the mufti a hold-over from the era of ousted President Hosni Mubarak and predicted Gomaa would not last in his position after a new president is elected.

Gomaa was appointed by Mubarak in 2003 to be Egypt's top religious law expert. He heads Dar al-Ifta, an advisory body where Muslims go to seek a religious opinion on anything from marriage rituals to commercial dealings. The government-appointed cleric also provides the state with religious opinions.

"This visit only endorses the occupation," Hamad said. "But the country is going through a tough time and it is not now that we should call for his dismissal. After an elected president, all these figures must be changed."

Following Mubarak's ouster, Israelis have watched the rise of Islamists in Egypt and have become increasingly concerned over the future relations of their relations with their neighbor. Islamists now dominate the first post-Mubarak parliament and are making a bid for the presidency.

Public opinion in Egypt is generally hostile to warmer relations with Israel, and many had criticized

Mubarak for closely coordinating policies with Israel. In September a mob of protesters attacked the Israeli embassy in Cairo after its forces accidentally killed five Egyptian soldiers in the Sinai Peninsula during a pursuit of militants.

The mufti's spokesman, Ibrahim Negm, said the visit was organized by the Jordanian royal family to inaugurate an Islamic research center.

commissioners unanimously voted in favor of the proposal after getting a recommendation from the county utility committee and the county's legal counsel for conflict.

Commission chairman Scarlet Frisina did not attend the meeting and the board's vice-chairman Stephen Bailey suggested the proposal be pulled from the meeting's consent agenda for discussion.

The owner of the property is SM Mapps Inc. and the tract of land is 7/10ths of an acre. The property is located under the fourth rib at the Ellisville Wastewater Treatment Plant. A rib is an area for retaining effluent from a wastewater treat-

ment plant. In this case, part of the rib was "cut in half," according to commissioner Jody DuPree, and the parcel in question will make it whole.

"The offer is in excess of the appraised value, however, our conflict counsel Joel Foreman recommends the offer as stated to avoid legal costs associated with taking the property," said Lisa Roberts, assistant county manager. "The offer was approved by the Utility Committee and it will be paid from the LP 6025 (legislative) grant."

Although the Columbia County Property Appraiser's office has the value of the property listed at \$159, the county may be able to avoid

legal fees by paying the recommended amount.

"The \$5,000 would be less than what legal fees would probably cost in order to take the property through eminent domain," Roberts said.

In other business, the commission voted unanimously voted in favor of purchasing a piece of playground equipment from Beyond Your Ordinary Recreation Company for the Westside Community Center at a cost of \$33,358. The equipment, a dual slide, is ADA compliant and the county received an \$18,138 discount by joining a contract for playground equipment with St. Johns County.

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Williams elected to Hall of Fame

Her namesake softball complex at Florida Gateway College is almost in ruins, but Jean Williams is still respected in the rest of the state.

Williams was voted among the first three members of the Florida College System Activities Association Softball Hall of Fame. The induction banquet is Thursday in Pensacola at the state softball tournament.

"Some are in the overall Hall of Fame, but this is new for softball to be sports specific," Executive Director Jeb Blackburn said.

Williams was named to the FCCAA (now FCSAA) Hall of Fame in 1994. The FCSAA Softball Scholar-Athlete Award is named in her honor.

There were 10 nominees for the inaugural class and Williams was the one coach selected.

She will be joined by Mickey Englett, athletic director at Northwest Florida State College and FCSAA Women's Commissioner for 15 years, and Crystl Bustos, a national champion player at Palm Beach Community College and a three-time Olympic medalist.

"Obviously I am very pleased and happy," Williams said, "It is always humbling. The FCCAA Hall of Fame was more of a leadership type of thing than for coaching."

Williams was the FCCAA Women's Athletic Commissioner for 16 years and the NJCAA Women's Region VIII Director for 12 years, but the softball field is where we remember her best.

With Williams at the helm, the Lady Timberwolves won 17 consecutive Mid-Florida Conference titles, including an undefeated conference season in 1993. Her teams won eight state championships and seven national championships. Her won-loss record in softball was 874-274.

Williams established the women's athletic program at Lake City Community College in 1971. She coached volleyball from 1971-82 and softball from 1972-94.

Mostly out of college softball these days, one thing Williams likes is that many of the women coaches today are in full-time positions.

"I always envisioned it as a full-time job," Williams said. "A lot of things I did or chose to do were so women could have full-time coaching

Summitt: It has been a 'great ride' at Tennessee

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — A relaxed and smiling Pat Summitt said it's been a "great ride" and it is the right time for her to step down after coaching the Tennessee Lady Vols for nearly four decades.

"It has been a privilege," the Hall of Fame coach said Thursday during a press conference. Summitt will become head coach emeritus and longtime assistant Holly Warlick has been promoted to replace her.

"I just felt like it was time for me to step down knowing that Holly was going to be in great hands," said Summitt, who revealed on Aug. 23 that she had been diagnosed with early-onset dementia, Alzheimer's type. "She's a great coach and you know I'm going to continue to support her. You know it's never a good time but you have to find the time that you think is the right time and that is now."

Summitt, who won more games than anyone else

in NCAA college basketball during her 38 years at Tennessee, discussed the decision to step aside on the court named for her after her 1,000th win.

"It was really a great ride for me," Summitt said.

The ride on the coaching carousel may be over for Summitt, but there are other challenges and honors ahead.

The White House says later this year Summitt will receive the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor.

President Barack Obama said Summitt is an "inspiration" as the coach who has won more games than anyone else in NCAA college basketball history and for her willingness to "speak so openly and courageously about her battle with Alzheimer's."

In her new role at Tennessee, Summitt will report to athletic director Dave Hart.

"I made a choice early in my career to challenge myself to step up my game each and every day,"

Summitt said. "You can be sure I will take this same attitude into my new role as head coach emeritus and continue to teach our players the same commitment. I can promise you ladies I'm here for you. Trust me that that will happen."

The 59-year-old coach revealed Aug. 23 that she had been diagnosed with early onset dementia, Alzheimer's type. Warlick, Summitt's longtime assistant, has been promoted to replace her.

During the press conference, Summitt called Warlick over and handed her a whistle.

"It is now time to turn over my whistle to you," said Summitt, who hugged Warlick and the crowd gave them a standing ovation.

"I know this works because I've heard it a lot of times," Warlick said, referring to the whistle.

Warlick isn't the only coach on the move. Tyler Summitt, Pat's son, will be an assistant women's coach at Marquette.

"This was her decision

and I think that she took time after the season, thought about everything and the thing my mom's always taught me is to put the team before yourself," Tyler Summitt said. "She really felt like this was the best thing for the Lady Vol program. She's still going to be in a mentoring role."

Also on hand for the news conference were Tennessee football coach Derek Dooley and men's basketball coach Cuonzo Martin.

Summitt tried to show people that it was possible to function even in the face of dementia and Alzheimer's. She had the blessing of Tennessee Chancellor Jimmy Cheek to keep coaching.

She delegated duties to Warlick, the associate head coach who directed the Lady Vols during games and addressed reporters postgame with other assistants taking on much more of the workload in an emotionally draining season that felt like a farewell tour it wound up being.

Reichert's stay wasn't a long one, however, as she fell 6-3, 6-2 against Rachel Adler from King High.



Rebound

Biffle: 'This year is my year'

Greg Biffle's rebound appears to be for real. The veteran driver, who hasn't performed up to expectations in recent seasons, broke a 49-race losing streak on Saturday at Texas Motor Speedway, and has led the Cup points standings since the third race of the season, at Las Vegas.

In the eyes of many observers, Biffle's victory validated his position atop the points standings. For others, it raised the possibility, although it's still very early in the season, that he could become the first driver ever to win a championship in all three of NASCAR's elite divisions — Camping World Trucks, Nationwide and Cup. Biffle won the truck title in 2000 and the Nationwide crown two years later.

But as Biffle pointed out in his winner's interview at Texas, where he defeated five-time Cup champion Jimmie Johnson in a late-race duel, the higher a driver advances up the NASCAR ladder, the more difficult it is to win races and championships.

"When I moved from the truck series to Nationwide, it was a huge step," Biffle said. "It was much, much harder. And when I moved from the Nationwide to the Cup Series, I had no idea that the competition was going to be what it was.

"I knew it was going to be hard. But man, it's tough, and there are a lot of great drivers in this sport and a lot of good equipment. ... But this year is my year, so I'm going to keep after it all the way to Homestead."

Biffle has come close in the past. In 2005, he led the Cup circuit in race victories with six, and tied his Roush Fenway Racing teammate Carl Edwards for second in the championship standings, 35 points behind winner Tony Stewart.

He was third in 2008, but the next three seasons saw him win just two races — at Pocono and Kansas in 2010 — and finish outside the top five in points.

Midway through last year, Biffle's team got a new crew chief as Matt Puccia replaced Greg Erwin. The results began to change almost immediately.

Like Biffle, Puccia's career has seen him make stops in all three NASCAR divisions, and like Biffle, he's a longtime member of Jack Roush's race team. Saturday's victory at Texas was his first in the elite Cup series.

"Jack gave me this opportunity in the Truck Series and I got my first win with Roush in 2008 with Erik Darnell," Puccia said. "It's been a great progression with the company."

Also like Biffle, he's looking forward to the upcoming stretch of races on the schedule.

"We've got some good race tracks coming," he said. "We've got Kansas and Richmond and Talladega and Darlington, and as we look ahead there's not one race I can't say we can't go and run good and be in contention to win every week."

"So we're looking forward to getting going the next part of this little stint here."

Bristol owner cautioned in addressing attendance woes

Speedway Motorsports Chairman and Bristol Motor Speedway owner Bruton Smith is trying to put the action genie back in the bottle at Bristol, but several drivers are saying "not so fast" to his plans to somehow alter the track in an attempt to bring back the beating and banging that fans say they miss.

The recent Food City 500 played out before a 160,000-seat grandstand that was barely half full, setting off a debate over the drop-off from years of consecutive sellouts.

Some say the surface, reconfigured in 2007, eliminated the one-groove racing that led to the large use of bump-and-run tactics, and fans don't like the side-by-side racing that ensued.

Others say the slumping economy, coupled with the high cost of attending races, is to blame.

Jeff Gordon is among those urging Smith to proceed with caution. "I think you have to be very, very careful," Gordon said in his weekly press conference, at Texas Motor Speedway, adding that the track's issues might be more related to the Car of Tomorrow than the racing surface. He said that with the new car, bump-and-run at Bristol might not be practical.

"This car punches a big hole in the air, and I'm not so sure we'd be able to get to the guy's rear bumper," he said. "We might see more single-file racing."

Gordon said he polled his Twitter followers, and a majority of them said the racing surface wasn't a big issue.

"My Twitter poll was that gas prices and hotel prices and the economy are the biggest reason why people are saving their money to come to the night race there, and not able to travel as much as they used to and be able to incur some of the expenses that they used to," he said. "They're going to save up for a Saturday night race."

Kasey Kahne took the checkered flag in Sunday's Camping World Truck Series race at Rockingham Speedway, but the real winners were track owner Andy Hillenburg and the people in the Rockingham area who worked hard to bring NASCAR racing back to the Rock.

An impressive crowd estimated at 27,500 was on hand to participate in the first NASCAR race at Rockingham since 2004, when the track was closed and its remaining Cup race moved to Texas Motor Speedway. Hillenburg told reporters after the race that although he doesn't have the final numbers, he considers the weekend a big success.

"As a promoter, I still want to go and do better, but I am very proud of our efforts," he said. "It was a team effort, and I feel like we did the best that we could do based on the knowledge that we had. I also feel confident in saying that if I get a second chance from NASCAR, I can do even better."

Hall of Fame nominees named

Pioneering African-American driver Wendell Scott and NASCAR's first treasurer and secretary Anne B. France are among the latest five nominees for induction into the NASCAR Hall of Fame in Charlotte, N.C.

Joining Scott and France are engine builder and car owner Ray Fox, sponsor executive Ralph Seagraves and driver Rusty Wallace.

They join 20 nominees who were on the list last year. Five will be selected on May 23.

Scott, who died in 1990, is the only African-American to compete regularly in the series now known as Sprint Cup. He ran 495 races from 1961-73, winning one pole, at Savannah, Ga., in 1962, and one race, at Jacksonville, Fla., in 1964.

He also had 20 top-five and 147 top-10 finishes. His career essentially ended with a grinding crash at Talladega in 1973.

Fox won 14 races in NASCAR's elite series, and fielded cars for drivers including Junior Johnson, Buck Baker and Buddy Baker.

Seagraves, as a senior vice president of R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., helped bring the sponsorship of Reynolds' Winston brand to NASCAR, and worked with the NASCAR industry to expand the sport.

Wallace, who retired from driving in 2005, won 55 Cup races and the 1989 championship.

Stenhouse gets 2nd 2012 win

Ricky Stenhouse Jr. continues to show that he's truly one of NASCAR's up-and-coming stars.

At Texas Motor Speedway, the defending Nationwide Series champion got his second Nationwide victory of the season, and moved to within four points of series leader Elliott Sadler.

Stenhouse led three times for 68 laps and held off Cup regulars Paul Menard, Kasey Kahne and Denny Hamlin to get his fourth career victory.

"I feel a lot better coming into this year, obviously, with the championship from last year," Stenhouse said. "One thing I do enjoy about this is running up front every week, and we have a shot to win every week. That is all we can do. When we can finish it off like that, that is a positive."

Denny Hamlin went from being one of the stars of one sport to being a fan of another athlete during last week's Masters golf tournament in Augusta, Ga.

His friend and fellow "Dukes of Hazzard" enthusiast Bubba Watson had Hamlin caddy for him during a preliminary event at Augusta, then went out and scored a dramatic win in the prestigious golf classic.

"Of course that trick shot I taught him on Wednesday paid off on Sunday," Hamlin joked in reference to the hook shot that Watson launched from the woods that put his ball within easy reach of the cup during the second hole of a sudden-death playoff. "It's just one of those things where it was an amazing accomplishment for him and his family." Hamlin said that he and Watson hit it off from the first time they met, on a golf course in Phoenix in 2010.

"We're both lefties," he said. "We both obviously like racing. I grew up loving 'The Dukes of Hazzard,' and he obviously does as well. I don't know what it is about our personalities, but we seem to get along. It was right from the 'get go.'" And he admits pushing hard for his friend in the closing round of the Masters. "I was just generally nervous for him on Sunday," Hamlin said. "I'm nervous because it's my friend and you hope that the guy does well. It's just a great feeling. I felt like I won it myself."
