A new age in air travel here

200 turn out for grand opening of airport terminal.

A new weather operating system, a deluxe pilot lounge and the ability to turn into an emergency operations center were celebrated at the grand opening of the Lake City Gateway Airport on Thursday afternoon. The newly renovated airport lounge was packed tightly with elected officials and local citizens while the airport's inclement weather resistance was tested by the pouring skies outside.

"We operate the airport 362 days out of the year,"



said airport manager Nick Harwell.

The airport consists of an 8,000-foot primary runway and a secondary runway spanning 4,100 feet.

The new airport terminal is a 6,000-square foot building with a range of deluxe capabilities such as wireless Internet, showers and a large conference room. The airport has a staff of four.

Greg Evans, P.E.

District Two Secretary for the Florida Department of Transportation, served as the keynote speaker for the event.

Evans emphasized the importance of having the airport in a rural area of Florida.

"One of my favorite hobbies is seeing dollars from Tallahassee move east, and not south," he said.

Airport manager up to challenge

Nick Harwell stepped into the position of Lake City Gateway Airport Manager earlier this year with plans to improve the airport. The airport just opened a new terminal, three years in the making, but that is not all Harwell wants to do.

He has plans to expand the facility. There will be additional executive hanger space built and the main taxiway will be extended and widened to make it easier for larger aircraft to get in and out. He has been working with a confidential client

County adopts ballots-on-demand

The county commission passed a resolution to put ballot-on-demand systems in polling places for the upcoming election, saving election costs in the long run.

Ballot-on-demand voting systems print a ballot for each voter as they arrive at the polling place. This system has been practiced in early voting in the past.

With the previous system, the Supervisor of

Elections was required to print ballots for 100 percent of all registered voters for the election.

Unused ballots were destroyed.

The cost for the ballot-on-demand system, which includes twelve printing systems and five laptops, is \$186,300 plus 30 cents for each ballot printed.

County Manager Dale Williams said money for the individual ballots has already been considered in the county's budget.

"Based on what we know of historical ballots used within the county, this system would save

each election cycle about \$37,000," Williams said. "So on that basis, once five election cycles were complete, it would have pretty much paid for itself."

Commissioner Ron Williams supported the system saying, "Let's face it, we're moving into new technology."

Commissioner Stephen Bailey said he used the system in the past for early voting.

"It worked really well," he said. "It prints out pretty quickly."

Shelton, Lambert hit CMA fest

NASHVILLE — Miranda Lambert recently got a much-needed 10-day vacation with Blake Shelton. It capped the couple's crazy first year of marriage, during which country music's hottest romantic duo experienced every emotion imaginable, from deep loss to pure exhilaration.

Quickly rejuvenated, Lambert admitted she was getting a little bored at their Oklahoma home toward the end.

"After that long, I was ready to do something," Lambert said with a little extra Texas twang in that last word.

They'll have lots on their plate this week at the CMA Music Festival. Both are top draws for the fan-driven event and expected to perform. Each has been experiencing career overdrive since their marriage, with Lambert launching her first arena tour and Shelton's popular run on "The Voice." Each has also scored No. 1 hits.

But each has experienced loss — Shelton's father passed away, as did a close friend of Lambert's.

The success of the couple's "Over You" — about the untimely death of Shelton's brother — coincided closely with both events. That made for a series of both difficult and powerful performances over the last few months.

"Miranda had a tough time for a couple of weeks there performing that

song," Shelton said at a party celebrating their success at the top of the country charts. "She said she couldn't sing it and the crowd ended up singing it back to her. And once the dust started settling there, she lost one of her childhood friends and had to go through the same thing again. And that's the tough part about a song like that. That's also how important it is, that it does bring some closure and it helps you get those emotions out of your body, out of your mind, out of your heart, and you can do it through a song."

"Over You," which gave

Lambert her third straight CMT female video of the year award Wednesday night, is believed to be the first country chart-topper co-written by spouses, then performed by a member of that couple. In a way, it will always be intertwined in the fabric of their marriage.

It's another celebration Lambert and Shelton, who despite seeing very little of each other over the last year feel even more strongly about their marriage.

"Man, you know what? I think Miranda is a keeper," he said, then joked: "At first I married her just

because of her looks, but since then I've realized how rich she is. You know, that equals out to many years of happy marriage."

Lauryn Hill faces tax charges

NEWARK, N.J. — Eight-time Grammy winner Lauryn Hill has been charged with failing to file income tax returns for several years with the Internal Revenue Service, the U.S. attorney's office in New Jersey announced Thursday.

Hill earned more than \$1.6 million during 2005, 2006 and 2007, the three years that she failed to file returns, federal prosecutors said. Hill's primary source of income is royalties from the recording and film industries, prosecutors said. She also owns and operates four corporations: Creations Music Inc., Boogie Tours Inc., L.H. Productions 2001 Inc. and Studio 22 Inc., according to court papers.

Messages left Thursday for her California-based attorney, Nathan J. Hochman, and an email sent to her publicist weren't immediately returned.

The 37-year-old Hill got her start with The Fugees and began her solo career in 1998 with the critically acclaimed album "The Miseducation of Lauryn Hill."

FAMU president receives no-confidence vote

TALLAHASSEE — Florida A&M University President James Ammons has received a no-confidence vote from the school's board of trustees because of his handling of the hazing death of a band drum major.

The board voted 8 to 4 Thursday to approve the no-confidence measure. Ammons won't quit and said he would fix any problems.

The school has been reeling since the November death of drum major Robert Champion. Eleven members of the school's Marching 100 band have been charged with felony hazing for allegedly beating him to death. The death exposed a wide culture of hazing at the school. Critics say Ammons and other administrators ignored it.

Ammons became president in 2007 following a budget scandal that threatened the school's accreditation. He signed a five-year contract extension last year.

Girl, 4, caught in drive-by shooting

WEST PALM BEACH — A 4-year-old girl is hospitalized after being caught in the middle of a drive-by shooting in West Palm Beach.

Police spokesman Allan Ortman says shots were fired from a car around 11:15 a.m. Thursday.

One of the bullets went through the window of a home, hitting the child in her jaw.

Ortman says the girl is being treated and is expected to survive. No suspects have yet been

Man fatally shot by sheriff's deputy

BOYNTON BEACH — A man who authorities say was brandishing a gun has been fatally shot by a sheriff's deputy in Boynton Beach.

The Palm Beach Sheriff's Office says it was called regarding a fight outside 1st & 10 Sports Bar & Grill just after 5 a.m. Thursday. As they broke up the fight, a second one broke out. The sheriff's office says a man began to fight with a deputy and pulled a gun from his waistband.

Sheriff Ric Bradshaw says the man was shot because it was apparent he was going to shoot at a deputy.

The suspect died at the scene.

Justices consider defender dispute

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Supreme Court is considering whether overburdened public defenders can shed some felony cases.

The justices heard oral argument on the issue Thursday.

Miami's public defender is appealing a lower court ruling that his office could not refuse to accept clients to alleviate a crushing workload.

Public defenders represent criminal defendants who cannot afford a private lawyer.

Miami-based Public Defender Carlos Martinez wanted to stop accepting thousands of lesser third-degree felony cases such as auto theft, forgery and battery.

Martinez said he was unable to hire more lawyers because of a series of budget cuts in recent years.



Body of swimmer washes ashore

Evans offered a new slogan for the airport, saying, "pardon the pun, but the sky is the limit."

The airport plans to extend and widen its taxiway to accommodate larger aircraft, Harwell said.

"With the RACEC (Catalyst) site developing next door to us, what I anticipate happening is

large aircraft coming," Harwell said.

Harwell said the airport has the capacity to offer cargo services and is considering that option for the future.

"Now we are in position, and once we widen the taxiway, the sky is the limit as the secretary said," Harwell said.

for several months to relocate to Lake City Gateway Airport.

"This company would relocate their business to the state of Florida and we have been selected as one of two sites for the relocation of this business," Harwell said. "What they will do is construct, manufacture and fabricate on our airfield."

Harwell grew up in Marianna. He graduated from Cottondale High School in 1988. He played college baseball at Wallace Community College in Alabama and returned to Marianna to finish his AA at Chipola Community College in 1998. He worked for the Florida Department of Transportation for six years as assistant final estimate engineer. He then worked for CH2MHill for six years.

Harwell began at the Lake City Gateway Airport in January 2011, as assistant airport manager

and became the Airport Manager a year later. As airport manager, he manages day-to-day operations, incoming flights and fuel sales and testing. He also manages the contracts and the budget.

"We have a lot of business tenants that I manage the contracts for," said Harwell "We re-negotiate at the end of those terms."

Even with his airport duties, he finds time to also be the Public Information Officer for the city utility depart-

ment. He will graduate from St. Leo in the Spring of 2013 with a degree in business administration.

Forest fight

At Tuesday's roundtable discussion here with local civic and business leaders, Gov. Rick Scott reaffirmed his commitment to remove roadblocks to growth.

Welcome words. And we believe him when he says he'll do everything in his power to keep Tallahassee out of our way as we work to strengthen and grow the local economy.

The immediate problem we face, though, is federal, not state. The U.S. Forest Service holds the key.

At stake is rail service to the Rural Area of Critical Economic Concern Catalyst site east of town next to the Osceola National Forest. The site, one of four in Florida, is earmarked for incentives to attract manufacturing and industry to an area in need of an economic boost.

So far, USFS has refused to budge on granting an easement through the forest for a 1,500-foot spur to connect the 500-acre site to nearby Class 1 rail. That would make the site more attractive to industries dependent on shipping. As for modes of transport other than rail, Columbia County is already well set.

Two major interstate highways intersect here, and the site is a stone's throw from an airport big enough to land a 747.

However, USFS won't let us add the last piece of the puzzle.

The problem, we're told, is a colony of red-cockaded woodpeckers inhabiting the six-acre easement in question.

We appreciate what USFS does to protect and preserve our natural resources. The beauty of the local landscape is what first drew many of us, along with our forebears, to this locale.

Still, we're not convinced a 1,500-foot rail spur will cause irreparable harm to our way of life — or that of the red cockaded woodpecker, for that matter. Non-USFS naturalists who've weighed in on the matter have expressed similar doubts.

We suspect there may be something else afoot here. Whether it's plain old bureaucratic infighting or something more substantive, we'd like to find middle ground and put this matter behind us.

The Governor on Tuesday said he'd speak to U.S. Interior Secretary Ken Salazar on our behalf. We'll keep you posted on his progress.



In Wisconsin, Walker wins, unions lose

Gubernatorial recall elections have never been popular with American voters, who are reluctant to overturn regular elections that have been fairly fought and fairly won.

Wisconsin was only the third state to attempt ousting its governor. Republican Scott Walker became the first governor to survive a recall effort, handily defeating — 53 percent to 46 percent — the same opponent he beat in 2010.

Afterward, Walker was uncharacteristically conciliatory, even proposing a peacemaking session with Democrats over beer and brats next week: "I think it's important to fix things, but it's also important to make sure we talk about it and involve people in the process."

Had he taken his own advice, much political bloodshed might have been avoided. He blindsided the state's public employee unions by taking away their collective-bargaining rights, a move, according to *The Wall Street Journal*, that is already costing them members and dues money.

Those unions were the biggest losers in Tuesday's



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election, and, by extension, organized labor generally. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 6.9 percent of private-sector workers are unionized, while 37 percent of public employees are. The largest American labor organization is a teachers union.

While much of the unions' power traditionally has been attributed to their fundraising, their true strength has always been their ability to turn out their members. This they did in Wisconsin, helping to knock on 948,000 doors and make 890,000 phone calls on behalf of challenger Tom Barrett, the mayor of Milwaukee.

But the unseen force in this election may have been the Supreme Court's Citizens United decision, which allowed the unchecked influence of outside cash. *The New York*

Times said that, as of late May, \$45.6 million had been spent on Walker's behalf and only \$17.9 million for Barrett. It was the most expensive race in Wisconsin history.

Less clear is what the race says about November. The conventional wisdom seemed to be that having gone Democratic six straight times, the state may be in play this fall. But exit polls quoted by *The Times* showed that 18 percent of Walker supporters said they planned to vote for President Barack Obama.

The two major-party candidates went out of their way to ensure that the Wisconsin vote would not be seen as a dress rehearsal for November. Both Obama and Mitt Romney kept their distance from the state, with the extent of the president's support being a late-breaking tweet on behalf of Barrett.

Maybe an old saw about America politics will prove true this fall: Anything that happens before Labor Day is ancient history.

Needed: a tougher stand on Syria

In the face of the ongoing massacre of civilians in Syria, the Obama administration has offered words without the desired results. In recent days, the words have become more pointed, but the White House should exercise more U.S. leadership in dealing with the crisis.

For the last two months, the administration has deferred to Kofi Annan, a former U.N. secretary general now deputized as an envoy. So far, Annan's achievement is brokering a cease-fire that Syrian dictator Bashar Assad simply ignores. The latest evidence came with the massacre of 108 people in the town of Houla.

Most of the victims were women and children. A U.N. spokesman said about 20 were killed by artillery, but many were killed at close range, by stabbing or gunshots. Some had their throats slit and their eyes stabbed.

At the U.N. in New York earlier this week, the diplomatic effort progressed to the point where the Security Council felt justified in condemning the Syrian regime — but only after the laughably fastidious Russians rejected an earlier statement that more directly blamed the Syrian government.

Meanwhile, the Syrian government denied responsibility for the Houla killings, and instead blamed them on a terrorist attack. The Syrians, apparently, have their own versions of Baghdad Bob, the Iraqi spokesman who insisted Saddam Hussein's forces were prevailing right up to the day the regime fell.

With Annan's mission degenerating, Washington's latest plan is to have Russian strongman Vladimir Putin persuade Assad to resign. Putin and President Barack Obama are scheduled to meet next month, and Obama plans to inveigh on his counterpart to sell Assad on the idea.

It's a stretch. Russia has a measure of influence in Syria, but it's wishful thinking to believe Putin has enough heft to convince Assad to leave — especially given that the success of the Syrian rebels is hardly assured. The turmoil has been going on for 15 months, an estimated 13,000 people have died and Assad seems determined to go on killing. He knows that as things stand, time is on his side.

Obama needs to lead a coalition with a goal of changing that calculation, using any one of several options, including creating safe zones for endangered civilians, helping arm the opposition — or supplying heavier weapons to groups after evaluation by the CIA.

The situation is admittedly much more complex than in Libya, where the opposition was less divided and was already in control of a substantial portion of the country's territory. But standing by and deferring to others only increases the risk of a wider conflict that ultimately engulfs Syria's neighbors, including Jordan and Iraq.

Obama has said one of America's core interests is "preventing mass atrocities and genocide." Now it is time for our president to exert leadership with that goal in mind.

Support for Syrian coalition is a strike against Iran's top ally

They say politics makes strange bedfellows. But even stranger are the bedfellows that national security policy makes.

Andrew C. McCarthy, a friend and colleague, provides a stunning example. In a *National Review* Online piece recently, he pointed out that by proposing American support for Syrians attempting to overthrow Bashar al-Assad, Mitt Romney and "the McCain wing of the Republican Party, and the rest of Washington's progressive, Islamophilic clerisy" are aligning with "al-Qaida emir Ayman al-Zawahiri and Muslim Brotherhood icon Yusuf al-Qaradawi."

Of course, it would be equally correct to point out that those opposing efforts to facilitate regime change in Syria are aligning with Vladimir Putin and Iranian Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei.

Within the loose coalition fighting Assad, there are freedom fighters. But, yes, Islamists are in the mix as well. Should Assad fall, who will end up on top?

We can't be certain, and that uncertainty lends weight to the anti-interventionist argument. As for humanitarian concerns, one can make the case that if the Arab League is unmoved by

the massacres of Syrian women and children (their angry eyes fixed as ever on Israel), and the Organization of Islamic Cooperation doesn't give a fig about Muslims slaughtering Muslims (a minor annoyance compared with "Islamophobia"), why should we Americans expend an ounce of energy?

McCarthy observes that the "Iranian regime is not the only virulently anti-American revolutionary movement realistically threatening to enslave the Middle East in its version of totalitarian sharia and implacable anti-Semitism." True, but only one is within a hair's breadth of obtaining nukes.

In addition, Iran's rulers have long been the leading global sponsors of terrorism. They have facilitated the killings of Americans in Iraq and Afghanistan. Their acquisition of nuclear arms, if allowed to happen, will license even more audacious behavior. Plan on this: They

will threaten and perhaps lay claim to Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates, and Bahrain (where the U.S. Fifth Fleet is based); attempt to control the Strait of Hormuz, essential to a global economy that continues to depend on Gulf oil; intervene more forcefully in Yemen; increase their influence in Iraq and Afghanistan; conspire against the Saudis; and, of course, hang a nuclear Sword of Damocles over Israel's head.

The War Against the West that began with Iran's 1979 revolution, from which sprang all the other modern Islamist and Jihadist movements (al Qaida's included) will be won or lost — it cannot be resolved through "confidence building measures."

It is worth recalling: In World War II, we first fought the Germans not in Europe but in the remote deserts of North Africa, correctly perceived as a battlefield we could not afford to cede. And in that conflict, we aligned with Soviet communists because, as President Franklin D. Roosevelt phrased it, he was willing to "hold hands with the devil" to defeat fascist ideologies and movements.

Family of 6 killed in plane crash

LAKE WALES — A Kansas businessman, his wife and their four children were killed Thursday when their small plane crashed into a swampy area of central Florida, authorities said.

The single-turboprop, fixed wing plane broke apart and went down about 12:30 p.m. in the Tiger Creek Preserve, just south of Lake Wales, the Polk County Sheriff's office said. Ronald Bramlage, 45, was piloting the plane headed from the Bahamas to Junction City, Kan. The family had stopped for customs in Fort Pierce, Fla., and had taken off a half-hour before the crash.

The 2006 Pilatus PC-12/47 was at about 26,000 feet when it first began experiencing trouble, officials said. Deputies reached the area by helicopters but it was clear there were no survivors, the sheriff's office said.

The cause wasn't immediately known, and parts of the plane were found two miles from the crash site, which was only reachable by helicopters and all-terrain vehicles. The National Transportation Safety Board will lead the investigation but a Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman said it would take a long time.

Ronald Bramlage was a prominent businessman in Junction City and owned Roadside Ventures LLC, to which the plane was registered. Also killed were his wife, Rebecca Bramlage, 43, and their four children, whose ages were not released.

The couple were graduates of Kansas State University, and members of the K-State Alumni Association, President's Club, Foundation Trustees and Ahearn Fund.

"We are shocked and saddened by the tragic news of the deaths of Ron and Becky Bramlage and their children today," said a joint statement released by University President Dr. Kirk Schulz and Athletics Director John Currie. "The Bramlage family holds a special place in the history of Kansas State University and K-State Athletics, and Ron and Becky have been loyal supporters and great fans of K-State. Our thoughts and prayers are with the Bramlage family during this difficult time."

Ron was the grandson of the late Fred Bramlage, a 1935 graduate of K-State and Junction City businessman. Fred Bramlage was the lead contributor to the construction of Bramlage Coliseum, a multi-purpose arena that opened in 1988 and is home to the K-State men's and women's basketball teams.

James A. Sands, vice mayor of Junction City, said the Bramlage family has been a huge influence. He said he had not heard about the plane crash, but that he knew the Bramlages were away on a trip. A library in the city is named for Ron Bramlage's grandmother, Dorothy Bramlage.

"I know Ron is very much into the city. He knows real estate and he tries to better the city any way he can," he said. "My goodness. Just great wonderful people. And I think Mrs. (Becky) Bramlage was on the school board."

He said the Bramlages at one point owned the loan on the building for a local homeless shelter and "one day, Dorothy Bramlage just said, 'Nah. It's paid off. You don't owe any more.'"

The 4,900-acre Tiger Wood Preserve about 50 miles southwest of Orlando contains hardwood swamps, hammocks, scrubby flatwoods, pine flatwoods, sandhill and longleaf pine/wiregrass habitat, according to its website.



Jesus must authorize my behavior

The behavior of a Christian, Paul says, is to be authorized by the Lord Jesus. To the Colossians he told them, "... whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus,

and "deed" would be our actions. The things which I talk about, as well as the things that I do, must have the "name of the Lord Jesus" attached to it.

Consider this example. A father tells a son to go tell his sister that he said come to him. If the son goes to his sister and says, "Go see daddy," then the directive is given in the name of the son. If however, the son goes to his sister and says, "Daddy said for you to come see him," then the son has given the directive in the name of the father. It is because the father said so, and not the son. The same is true in our life. If we do things because we say so, or because our preacher says so, or because some religious council says so, then we are not doing it because the Lord Jesus said so. If however, we do things because we have His authority to do something or say something then we will be pleasing to Him.

How can we know that we have the "name of the Lord Jesus" for everything that we "do in word or deed"? We must go to the Bible for our support for our behavior. As we live our lives we must consult the Bible to see if we have permission for our actions or speech. If I cannot turn in the Bible to

a particular chapter in a book and find the verse in that chapter that authorizes me to do something then I do not have the authority of the Lord Jesus. Maybe I have to consult several passages to obtain His authority. The Bible should be our sole source of authority in all matters of our life; physical and spiritual.

Consider these passages as examples of our actions being in the "name of Jesus Christ." Baptism for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). Peter healing a man at the temple (Acts 3:6). Baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus (Acts 8:16; 19:5). Paul exhorted the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 1:10). Some were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus (1 Corinthians 6:11). Paul gave the Thessalonians a command in the name of the Lord Jesus (2 Thessalonians 3:6).

Let us all work hard at making sure that Jesus will authorize our behavior.

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giving thanks through Him to God the Father" (Colossians 3:17). We cannot do anything in our life without the permission of the Lord Jesus.

When a person becomes a Christian they have volunteered to be in subjection to the kingship of Jesus. He has become lord of their life. Everything they do must have his permission or authority because He has dominion over them.

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Nehemiah, Part 9

Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words... well they can really hurt too, can't they? Careless words have the potential to wound, but nothing is felt more deeply than words spoken with the intention to destroy. While our first response is to deny or defend against words like these, deep inside we often tend to agree with them. How can we argue with someone who calls us a failure when we have felt that way many times?

No doubt the Jews who were working with Nehemiah to rebuild the wall could relate. By Chapter 4, the names of Sanballat and Tobiah are familiar, our resident bad guys...and as usual, they are up to no good. The mode of operation this time is ridicule.

Sanballat "ridiculed the Jews, and in the presence of his associates and the army of Samaria, he said, 'What are those feeble Jews doing? Will they restore their wall? Will they offer sacrifices? Will they finish in a day? Can they bring the stones back to life from those heaps of rubble-burned as they are?'" (Nehemiah 4:1-2)

The Hebrew word for "ridicule" is la'ag which means to mock, scoff, to stammer, or speak as a foreigner. This gives a clearer picture of what was happening...Sanballat had an audience and he put on a show at the Jew's expense, perhaps even to the point of using Hebrew words or accent. Note some of the words he used to intentionally wound:

He called them "feeble" Jews. Wouldn't a "lack of strength" be obvious in the face of the task at hand...by hand? We can agree with that one. Check

Will they restore the wall? A question that had run through every mind at some point during this work. Could it be done? Check.

Will they offer sacrifices? The temple was already restored under Ezra's leadership some 70 years prior, so this wasn't a question about being able to offer sacrifices after the wall was rebuilt. Perhaps Sanballat was attempting to plant doubt in their minds by mocking the heart of the Jew's worship service, suggesting they offer a sacrifice to see if God would help them. Would He? Check.

Will they finish in a day? How many times have we started a project only to discourage ourselves by thinking, "This is going to take forever," or "We will never finish!" Check

Can they bring the stones back to life...? For crying out loud, even the materials we are using are damaged...how will this work? Check, check and check!!

Tobiah the Ammonite also threw his two cents in to join Sanballat's attack: "What they are building-if even a fox climbed up on it, he would break down their wall of stones!" (v.3) See how opposition works? By wearing you down with the goal of getting you to quit!

The source of all opposition to the work of God is the devil, referred to in Revelation 12:10 as the

Accuser. Scripture also calls him a liar, and the father of lies. However, by adding just a touch of truth to his lies, he can often get us to agree with him. Yes, we are all feeble...BUT our weakness, God makes us strong (2 Cor. 12:10) Hold out for the whole truth!

So, what are you ready to quit on? Your marriage...a relationship with your teenag-

er...finding a better job...finishing college...a closer walk with God? Listen closely to the ridicule, and recognize the voice of the accuser...the liar. Disagree with his half-truths. Then roll up your sleeves and get back to it.

Triple threat

NEW YORK — The Triple Crown. Three races in a five-week span at varying distances on different tracks. So tough only 11 horses have won it, none in 34 years, by far the longest gap ever.

Now it's your turn to try, I'll Have Another, on Saturday at the Belmont Stakes.

"You need the racing luck," suggests Bob Baffert, the only trainer to lose the Belmont three times with horses that won the first two legs.

It's tougher these days because of changes in breeding, full fields of 20 horses in the Kentucky Derby, more foals and an increased emphasis by owners and trainers on the sport's three biggest races.

I'll Have Another, an average-sized chestnut colt, appears to have rebounded well after two hard races in the Derby and Preakness, with the most exhausting still to come. He'll run 1½ miles around Belmont's oval

with 11 rivals gunning to keep history from happening.

Twenty-five years passed between the Triple Crowns of Citation in 1948 and Secretariat in 1973.

Ask trainers and jockeys what makes winning the Triple Crown so difficult, and no one can agree on a single factor.

When Sir Barton became the first horse to sweep the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont in 1919, the phrase Triple Crown hadn't been invented. And he wasn't even the most popular horse of his era; that mantle belonged to Man o' War, who won nine of his 10 starts as a 2-year-old but didn't run in the Derby the next year.

Sir Barton had just two opponents in the Belmont, which was then run at 1¾ miles. His winning time of 2:17½ was an American record.

After him, the Triple Crown was won in bunches.

Three horses accomplished the feat in the 1930s, four did it in the '40s, and three more pulled it off in the '70s.


The current 34-year drought began after Affirmed outdueled Alydar to sweep the series in 1978.

In 1930, Gallant Fox won the Preakness, which was run a mere eight days before the Kentucky Derby. The bay colt easily won the Derby, but wasn't the favorite in the Belmont. Even so, he led wire to wire, and by then, the Triple Crown moniker was attached to the three races.

The Belmont took a toll on War Admiral in 1937.


A son of Man o' War, he won by three lengths but not without theatrics. He acted up at the start and repeatedly crashed through the gate, delaying the race for almost nine minutes. Then he stumbled at the start and sliced off a piece of his right front heel, leaving behind a trail of blood. He came up lame, but returned to racing that fall.

In 1943, Count Fleet had just two opponents in the Belmont, and he crushed them both. He won by 25 lengths, a record that stood until Secretariat's 31-length victory in 1973.

Thunder: Futility to finals in 3 years

OKLAHOMA CITY — At the beginning of the video the Oklahoma City Thunder play before their starting lineups are announced, there's a message on the scoreboard.

RESILIENCY. IT DEFINES OUR TEAM.

That was especially true during the Thunder's comeback from an 18-point deficit Wednesday night to beat the San Antonio Spurs and clinch a spot in the NBA finals. But that's only the final step in a remarkable turnaround.

It was only three seasons ago that Oklahoma City's new team was 3-29 and just hoping to avoid the worst record in NBA history.

"You can look at it as a negative, but I think as a group and as an organization, we've seen some light, and we've seen that one day we'd be at this moment, and one day we'd have an opportunity to win a championship," said Russell Westbrook, who may best personify the transformation by turning himself from a

rookie struggling with turnovers into an All-Star.

Back when Scott Brooks was hired as coach around Thanksgiving 2008, his first task was trying to get the team to be competitive in the fourth quarter. Now, opponents can't seem to put the Thunder away when it comes to crunch time.

"Even back then, we weren't losing games. I was telling the guys we were learning how to win games, and there's a big difference between that because we had guys that worked every day and it gave me hope that when we were down they were still practicing, still working hard," Brooks said.

All that hard work paid off with the franchise's first shot at the title since 1996 as the Seattle SuperSonics.

Oklahoma City has gotten this far with a youthful core featuring homegrown first-round draft picks Durant, Westbrook, James Harden and Serge Ibaka that has blended with a trio of veterans who already have championship rings — Kendrick Perkins, Derek Fisher and Nazr Mohammed.



Sharapova advances to final, shot at Grand Slam

PARIS — Wind blew in her face, kicking up flecks of clay, and Maria Sharapova stood at the baseline, knowing she needed one more point to reach her first French Open final and return to No. 1 in the rankings.

She rotated her right shoulder, the one surgically repaired 3½ years ago, and served a fault.

Gulp.

Her next try found the mark: a second-serve ace at 104 mph that landed in a corner. It was a fitting way to close out a 6-3, 6-3 victory over No. 4-seeded Petra Kvitova of the Czech Republic in the semifinals at Roland Garros on Thursday, a fitting way to announce that Sharapova is once again at the height of her powers and at the top of her sport.

"It's a long road back; it's a long process. It's a lot of days of frustra-

tion and uncertainty, not knowing if you'll ever get there, not knowing how much you want it, not knowing whether (there) would be a moment like that for you again," Sharapova said at her news conference, the WTA's glass vase signifying her No. 1 status sitting inches away.

"So there's definitely a lot of tough things you have to go through to get to this point. But when you get here, and you look back at the things that you did, and the work that you put in, and the toughest days that you can remember, it's all really worth it."

On Saturday, the second-seeded Russian will face 21st-seeded Sara Errani of Italy for the French Open title. It's the only major tournament Sharapova hasn't won; she can become the 10th woman to complete a career Grand Slam.

"I was in a position a few years ago where I didn't quite know if I would ever be here again on this stage,

playing professionally. And not just at that, but at a level to get to No. 1 in the world and a first Roland Garros final for me," Sharapova said. "So a very special day, no doubt."

Errani felt the same way. Playing in her first Grand Slam semifinal, she beat reigning U.S. Open champion Sam Stosur of Australia 7-5, 1-6, 6-3.

"Players like Sharapova, Serena Williams — they're accustomed to making it this far," said Errani's coach, Pablo Lozano, who held his 10-month-old son while cheering in the stands. "For us, every day brings a new surprise."

Indeed, it's been quite a two weeks for Errani, who will play in the women's doubles final on Friday with Roberta Vinci against Maria Kirilenko and Nadia Petrova.

Entering this tournament, Errani was 0-28 against women ranked in the top 10. But she beat No. 10 Angelique Kerber in

the quarterfinals, then No. 6 Stosur on Thursday — and those upsets were preceded by victories over two past French Open champions, 2008's Ana Ivanovic and 2009's Svetlana Kuznetsova.

In the men's semifinals today, No. 1 Novak Djokovic faces No. 3 Roger Federer, and No. 2 Rafael Nadal plays No. 6 David Ferrer. Djokovic is attempting to become the first man in 43 years to win four consecutive Grand Slam titles; Nadal is bidding for a record seventh French Open title.

Sharapova, of course, would be thrilled to grab her first trophy at Roland Garros.

At the start of her career, success arrived so quickly and, it seemed, effortlessly. She won Wimbledon at age 17. Made it to No. 1 in the rankings at 18. Earned her second Grand Slam trophy at 19, and her third at 20.

But the shoulder operation put a halt to all of that.

Veteran broadcaster retires from TV, not from racing

It's often been said that for those who have driven race cars, nothing else in their lives ever quite measures up to the thrill of competing in an automobile race.

It's like an addiction with no antidote, and many a driver, even some of the all-time great ones, continue to hang onto the steering wheel long after their winning skills have left them.

Dick Berggren, the longtime racing editor and broadcaster who retired from the FOX team after last Sunday's race at Dover International Speedway, knows how those drivers feel. But he's also managed to put together a remarkable career after his own driving days ended, and he's not done yet.

"I'm not retiring," Berggren said. "I'm still heavily involved in Speedway Illustrated and also heading up a group intending to build a museum to capture history of New England auto racing that will be at New Hampshire Motor Speedway."

It's a fitting project for a 70-year-old New England native who has carried on a lifelong love affair with auto racing, an affair that began when he was eight years old and his father took him to a race at Stafford Springs Speedway.

"It was love at first sight," Berggren said. "I walked in, and I just thought it was the most exciting thing I could have ever imagined, never mind seeing."

"It just took hold, and it's still got a hold on me."

Rice Brainard won that race, driving a cut-down car powered by a straight-eight Buick engine that overwhelmed the rest of the car, and young Dick anxiously awaited return trips to the track.

"My parents figured out it was the way to control me as a child," he said. "If they needed the lawn mowed, put Dick on the job and we'll let him go to the races on Saturday night."

"My childhood was doing things so I could earn the money to get admission to the speedway, doing things so my mom and day would take me to the speedway on the weekends."

As he got older, he began hanging around race shops, bumming rides to the tracks and planning on ways to get his own race car one day.

He went from being a poor student in school to an excellent one, his thinking being that an education was the ticket to the funds needed to race.

While in graduate school, he bought his first race car.

"I got impatient," he said. "I bought a car, and off I went."

He ran his first race at Stafford, the same track where he first saw a race.

"I ran the last couple of races that were ever run there on the dirt, in 1965," he said. "I was pretty awful. The second race I went into the wall and broke my hand. It's the only bone I've ever broken in my whole life."

But his driving skills improved, and soon his racing life came to be in conflict with his academic life.

He was teaching psychology at Emmanuel

College, at that time an all-women's school in Boston.

One weekend his racing schedule forced him to drive his ramp truck, with his mud-covered sprint car on back, to work on Monday morning.

"I pulled into faculty parking lot and about 10 minutes later, there was a page: 'Dr. Berggren, report to the president's office.'"

The president informed him that dirt track cars wouldn't be tolerated on campus. Berggren refused to park his rig on the street. Neither party budged, so at that point, he shifted to a full-time career in motorsports.

"That was the end of my professional teaching career," he said.

Although most people know Berggren from his media roles, he also was a credit to the sport as a driver.

Asked to rate himself as a driver, Berggren said: "In my best days driving a sprint car I was pretty darned good."

He wasn't so good at other forms of racing, but the radical sprint cars suited his style.

"If it was a really nasty, overpowered car that you could throw around and be violent with, I was really good," he said. "I was no good with the kind of cars that you had to drive well to move up in almost any kind of professional racing. I was a terrible pavement driver. I wasn't smooth."

A meticulous stat keeper in his media career, Berggren wasn't that way about his own racing.

He figures he won somewhere around 20 main events.

"I never wrote any of that stuff down when it was going on," he said.

His broadcasting and magazine duties eventually began to take time away from his

driving, and he began to look forward to running celebrity events where he didn't have to worry about preparing a car.

It was in one of those events, at Boone Speedway in Iowa, that his driving days came to an end. It was the track's biggest race of the year and fans had overflowed past the area where they were protected by guardrails.

"I got to the end of the backstretch," he said. "Somebody hit me in the back, turned the car, and I was headed to the pits."

"I hit a dirt bank, and as soon as I did I saw people starting to scatter. I closed my eyes. I was always afraid I was going to hurt someone else driving a race car. When I landed, I was fortunate enough not to hit anybody or hurt anybody."

"I decided right then and there, it was the most frightening thing I'd ever had happen to me in my life. I didn't want to go through that again. I got out of the car and I never raced again."

He said he's had second thoughts to this day, but he stuck with his decision and moved over to the media side of the sport on a full-time basis.

But like any other driver who no longer races, it's just not quite the same for him.

"Nothing has given me as much satisfaction as driving that sprint car when it was hooked up," he said. "That's been the best part of it. To step on the gas, see the front end pick up off the ground, pass people and see the checkered flag waving. You're in front. You're the big winner on a Saturday night at a local speedway."

"That's been the highlight for me, bigger and better than announcing as a part of the best announcing team that has ever been at the Daytona 500."

Dover sees multi-car pileup

It took until the halfway point of the regular season, but the Sprint Cup Series finally had a major multi-car incident. It occurred on Lap Nine at Dover and involved 12 drivers. It was triggered by a collision between Tony Stewart and Landon Cassill that caused Regan Smith to hit Stewart from behind. The incident forced the race to be red-flagged for 20 minutes while workers cleared the track.

"[Cassill's] No. 83 was trying to get back down to the bottom, and we were just in the wrong place at the wrong time," said Stewart, who returned to the track and finished 25th. "It wasn't Regan's fault. He was right behind us, and he didn't have anywhere to go, either."

"You get back there with some of those guys, and you've just got to be more patient. But, as far back as we started, I didn't really have the luxury to be as patient as I would have liked to have been."

Busch suspended for blowup

NASCAR has suspended driver Kurt Busch one week and extended his probation until the end of the year after Busch cursed a reporter at Dover International Speedway last week.

Kurt Busch, who was fined \$50,000 last year after directing a profanity-laced tirade at broadcaster Jerry Punch, unleashed another burst at another member of the media after Saturday's Nationwide Series race at Dover.

Sporting News reporter Bob Pockrass asked Busch if the fact that he is on probation for an incident at Darlington Raceway last month affected the way he raced with Justin Allgaier in Saturday's race. The two raced hard early and had a spirited discussion after the race.

"It refrains me from beating the [expletive] out of you right now because you ask me stupid questions," Busch told Pockrass. "But since I'm on probation, I suppose that's improper to say, as well."

Last year's incident with Punch came just days before he and his then-car owner Roger Penske parted ways. This year, Busch is racing in Sprint Cup for maverick team owner James Finch and in Nationwide for his brother Kyle Busch.

Busch issued the following statement: "I accept NASCAR's decision. I put them in a box, they had to take action and it's my fault for putting them in this position. I apologize for the comments I made to Bob Pockrass."

Stenhouse: Crash 'driver error'

Back-to-back bad finishes by Ricky Stenhouse Jr. have knocked him from the top of the Nationwide Series standings.

Stenhouse, who is now second, and 12 points behind Elliott Sadler, finished 26th at Charlotte after problems with his driveshaft. Then he wrecked on Lap 27 at Dover and finished 32nd.

"I just lost it," Stenhouse said of his Dover crash. "I wasn't up on the wheel and just kind of riding around until that competition caution and just got behind on the steering. It was driver error, totally my fault. We will have to go back, take a weekend off and get 'em at Michigan ..."

"You aren't going to have perfect races every week, but we will bounce back from this."

Hendrick keeps momentum after milestone 200th win

It took Hendrick Motorsports from last October at Kansas until last month at Darlington to go from career win No. 199 to 200, but since then the four-car team has been on an amazing roll.

Jimmie Johnson won the All-Star race. Kasey Kahne won the Coca-Cola 600, and on Sunday, at Dover International Speedway, Jeff Gordon had the fastest car and Johnson rode the race winner.

It was Johnson's seventh Dover win in 21 tries and the 57th Cup victory of his career. He's now tied with NASCAR Hall of Fame drivers Richard Petty and Bobby Allison for most wins at Dover.

Johnson said in his post-race interview that he's proud of the recent string of strong performances.

"It's nice to have the success right now because the last two years we have been working very hard in a lot of areas," he said. "When you have success and continued success, you narrow down your focus in where you need to be."

"I think things are very good for our company. We know the areas where we found some raw speed and now we are fine-tuning from there."

Gordon had the raw speed at Dover, but once again, as has happened so often this season, something out of his control took away

his chance to win.

This time it was a loose left-rear wheel that forced an unscheduled pit stop that put him out of contention. He wound up 13th and moved up one spot to 21st in the points standings.

"It's always more frustrating when you've got a car that can win, and you show it by going up there and taking the lead," Gordon said. "We don't care about finishing top 15 or top 10 right now. That does nothing for us. We need wins."

Man's motorcycle madness is driving his wife over the edge

DEAR ABBY: My husband, "Chris," wanted a motorcycle for seven years. Last year I finally gave in, with the stipulation that he take a safety course and buy a good helmet and riding gear. Two months later, Chris was in a crash and suffered several broken bones and a concussion. The hospital bill was more than \$60,000. His accident was a reality check for me. Ever since, I have been petrified of losing him. Every time Chris rides I worry, pray and often cry until he returns or calls to say he's OK.

I have begged him to get rid of the bike. The stress is taking a toll on me physically and emotionally and creating tension between us. I'm afraid it would be selfish to insist he get rid of something he loves; on the other hand, I feel Chris is selfish for not taking my feelings into consideration. I'm torn between wanting him safe and wanting him to be happy. What should I do? — STRESSED OUT IN PHILLY

DEAR STRESSED OUT: If his close call wasn't enough to convince your husband to rethink his motorcycle riding, and your begging and obvious distress haven't dissuaded him, accept that short of hog-tying Chris, you can't stop him from riding.

You can, however, protect yourself from some of the fallout that might result from another accident. Tell Chris that if his heart is set on riding, you want him to buy a life insurance policy and sign an organ donor card, because healthy young men on motorcycles are the most desired organ

donors — a fact shared with me by a former executive director of an organ donation registry. That way you will be provided for in case of a tragedy — and it will ensure that part of him lives on when he is removed from life support.

It's also important that you find ways to lessen your stress. So start making time for activities you can enjoy while you're on your own. It'll give you less time to worry and something else on which to concentrate.

DEAR ABBY: I am a woman who last year discovered I was gay. I was married with children. When I told my husband I was gay, he embraced and supported me with a great deal of love. We told our children in an open and honest way, and they, too, have supported me. I have also told a select group of friends whom I felt I could trust.

One of these friends is the mother of one of my son's classmates. Her daughter asked her mom why I was always with a woman and her response was, "It's her girlfriend." Her daughter asked more questions, so her mother told her I was gay — out-ing me to her daughter and my son's classmates! I am beyond hurt, and I am considering dissolving my friendship with this person. I am unsure what I should say or do. Can you help? — CONFUSED IN SEATTLE

DEAR CONFUSED: Once a "secret" is shared, there is no guarantee that it will remain a secret. When you began coming out to your friends, you revealed who you are. You CAN'T be both in and out of the closet.

Please forgive your friend. Her daughter asked honest questions and was given honest answers. That is a good thing. There are worse things than being known as gay in Seattle — such as being gay in a place that's less accepting. So

start celebrating who you are and the rest will fall into place.

DEAR ABBY: My husband, "John," and I have been married 12 years. My stepdaughter, "Diana," who gave me a "My Second Mom" card on Mother's Day, is being married in September. Diana is very close to her mother, "Charlotte," who resents me.

John and Charlotte will be taking part in the ceremony together, which is fine with me. Diana asked me to play a small role in the ceremony, but Charlotte became very upset, so I was excluded.
