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## District eases water restrictions

### Water management relaxes rules after aquifer rebounds.

Though water shortage restrictions imposed by the Suwannee River Water Management District have expired, year-

round water conservation rules are now in effect.

The year-round rules are less strict than the water shortage restrictions imposed during the drought.

After a pattern of heavy rainfall this summer, the restric-

tions were allowed to expire on Sept. 30. The district declared a water shortage order in June to ease drought conditions. Conditions have improved considerably since that time.

"Groundwater levels have recovered to normal or above normal in most areas and river levels have not been this high since 2010," said Megan Wetherington, District senior professional engineer.

In August, the district received an average of more than 9 inches of rainfall, with accumulations of up to 16 inches in localized areas. On Aug. 26, the Santa Fe River near Fort White experienced minor flooding after it crested at 0.3 feet above flood stage, and the Waccasassa River saw its third highest stage in 10 years. The

## Blast at local paving plant takes life of Lake City man

### Diesel mixture ignited; no one else was hurt.

An Anderson Columbia employee was killed Monday morning when an explosion occurred in a tanker truck containing a fuel mixture.

Perry Pollard, 30, of Lake City, died in the accident. Lt. Josh Wehinger, Columbia County Fire Department public information officer, said Pollard was pronounced dead at the scene by Life Guard Ambulance Services emergency medical technicians.

According to information from the Columbia County Sheriff's Office, who confirmed Pollard's death, the incident occurred around 5:15 a.m. Monday at the

Anderson Columbia plant, 871 NW Guerdon St.

Authorities said there was no containment threat to the surrounding neighborhood and no other injuries were reported to other workers.

"I really don't know how big of an explosion it was," Wehinger said. "There was a lot of fuel in the tanker — several thousand gallons of a type #5 diesel recovered fuel. I don't know what caused the ignition, all of that is

still under investigation. It was a significant explosion, but there was no fire. It put itself out. As soon as the explosion went off, the vapors and everything went out. There was no active fire upon fire department arrival."

Wehinger said the call wasn't dispatched as an explosion.

"It was dispatched around 5:15 a.m. as an unresponsive patient," he said. "The crews coming into

## Still no trash bins for some

### New receptacles yet to be delivered to all city residents.

The city's staff is continuing to field calls about "missing" trash receptacles after the city's former solid waste vendor removed residential trash carts and commercial trash dumpsters before replacement carts were distributed.

Wendell Johnson, city manager, said it's just part of the transition to a new provider. Waste Pro hoped to have new receptacles to local homes by Sunday, but many people did not have the receptacles by that date.

Republic Services, which provided the service for the past 10 years, did not have its contract renewed and Waste Pro won the bid for the services. However, Republic Services employees took the trash receptacles on the final day of trash

## 'Family Guy' creator to host Oscars

LOS ANGELES

**F**amily Guy" creator Seth MacFarlane will host the 2013 Oscars ceremony in Los Angeles.

First-time Academy Awards producers Craig Zadan and Neil Meron made the announcement Monday.

Zadan and Meron said they're "thrilled" about their choice.

"His performing skills blend perfectly with our ideas for making the show entertaining and fresh," the producers said in a statement.

MacFarlane is best known for his envelope-pushing animated TV shows "Family Guy" and "American Dad." He made his big-screen directorial debut earlier this year with "Ted," which took in more than \$420 million at the box office. The 38-year-old entertainer also hosted the season opener of "Saturday Night Live" last month and released an album of big-band tunes from the 1940s and '50s last year.

This is his first time hosting the Academy Awards.

MacFarlane called the opportunity "an overwhelming privilege."

He also released a video on YouTube in which he reveals his "big news" to his father. In the minute-long clip, MacFarlane says he's been asked to host the Oscars, and his dad responds by offering him some "barely used" bathing suits.

"I've invited you here today to tell you I'm hosting the Oscars," MacFarlane says. "This should be huge news to you."

"Of course, it's wonderful news," his dad replies. "But also the fact that you're getting almost brand-new bathing suits is also good news."

When MacFarlane seems unappreciative, dad snatches back the swimsuits and says, "I'm going to give these to Billy Crystal."

Crystal hosted the most recent Oscar show.

### Jason Aldean apologizes after photos released

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Country star Jason Aldean has apologized to fans after pictures of him acting "inappropriately" last week popped up.

Aldean tweeted Sunday that he wanted to talk to fans directly instead of letting gossip web sites tell his story. The tweet comes after photos appeared showing Aldean and former "American Idol" contestant Brittany Kerr together at a bar last Wednesday in Los Angeles. In one photo, they appear to kiss.

Aldean says "the truth is I screwed up," had too much to drink and acted inappropriately at the bar. He noted he left alone and added "ultimately I ended up embarrassing myself and my family." Aldean is married with

two children. A publicist says there will be no further comment.

### Adele confirms she has recorded Bond theme

LONDON — Adele has confirmed she has co-written and performed the theme to the upcoming James Bond movie, "Skyfall."

The singer posted a picture on her Twitter feed Monday of what appears to be the sheet music cover page for the song, credited to Adele — as A. Adkins — and Paul Hepworth, who co-wrote her hit "Rolling in the Deep."

Rumors have swirled for months that the Grammy-winning British singer had recorded the theme, but there has been no official announcement from producers.

### Show goes deeper at Miami airport

MIAMI — The Travel Channel has spent years telling stories about where people go, but now they're doing a show on how people get there.

"Airport 24/7: Miami" offers viewers a behind-the-scenes look at what it takes to move more than 100,000 travelers each day through Miami International Airport.

"We host a Super Bowl every day at MIA," security director Lauren Stover said, comparing the number of travelers to attendance at the championship football game.

With thousands of employees running what can easily be compared to a small city, the show follows workers as they deal with terrorist threats, intercept drug smugglers, attend to medical emergencies, repair aircraft and secure an Air Force One landing, all the while trying to get the passengers to their flights and the planes in the sky on time.

The first two episodes of the show premier back-to-back at 9 p.m. Tuesday.

### Court unclear on boat question

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court seems torn on when the law should treat some floating homes as houseboats and when it should treat them as houses.

The question came up Monday as the court was trying to figure out whether Riviera Beach, Florida should have used maritime law to seize Faze Lozman's floating home.

Lozman said the gray, two-story floating structure was not a boat, so he should have had some of the same protection against seizure as a land-

based house. But the city, and the lower courts, all said that since it had been towed several times to different marinas across hundreds of miles, it was a vessel like a houseboat.

A ruling, which will be watched closely by floating casinos, hotels and restaurants, will come this year.

### Cops: Teacher tried to hire hit

PLANT CITY — Police say a feud between two teachers in a Tampa Bay area high school social studies department led one to try to hire a hit man to kill the other.

The relationship between one-time friends James Pepe and Robert Meredith deteriorated as they worked together at Strawberry Crest High School. They say 55-year-old Pepe eventually transferred to Bloomingdale High School near Tampa where he was arrested last week.

Plant City police spokesman Tray Towles says Pepe suspected Meredith was spreading rumors about him.

Police started investigating in August after a man called to tell them

that Pepe tried to hire him to kill Meredith. Pepe remains in Hillsborough County Jail.

### Woman gets 2 years for scam

WEST PALM BEACH — A Florida woman has been sentenced to two years in prison for duping Haitian workers in a visa scam.

Marie Nicole Dorval also was ordered Friday to repay \$26,350 to 31 victims. The Haitian-born, naturalized U.S. citizen pleaded guilty in October 2011 to conspiracy to commit visa fraud.

Prosecutors say Dorval's company recruited 145 Haitians to work in the U.S. in 2009 with false claims about jobs.


Attorneys representing the victims say some were sent to work on farms near Gainesville, where they lived without electricity.

Dorval's attorney said she made a mistake and should have withdrawn the workers' visa applications when the economy tanked.

The workers arrived legally with temporary work visas. They eventually were granted temporary protected status.



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# Red Lobster, for the non-seafood lover in you

NEW YORK — Red Lobster isn't just for the seafood lover in you. It's also for that eater in every group who just wants a chicken dish.

The chain that brought seafood to the masses is hoping to broaden its appeal by revamping its menu on Oct. 15 to boost the number of dishes that cater to diners who don't want seafood, including lighter options such as salads. Red Lobster also is increasing the number of dishes that cost less than \$15 to attract customers who have cut back on spending.

The chain, which is owned by Darden Restaurants Inc., says a quarter of the items on its menu will be non-seafood dishes, up from 8 percent. And the number of lower-cost entrees will rise to about 60 percent from 40 percent.

A lot hinges on Red Lobster's makeover. After a long streak of healthy growth that began in the late 1980s, the casual dining segment has struggled to grow in the past few years because of oversaturation of those restaurants. People also are eating out less or opting for places such as Five Guys burgers, Panera Bread Co. and Chipotle Mexican Grill Inc. that fall somewhere between traditional sit-down restaurants and fast-food chains. Red Lobster in particular has struggled, with traffic at restaurants falling in 12 of the past 24 months.

When asked about the risks involved making such a dramatic change to the menu, Clarence Otis, CEO at Darden, which also owns Olive Garden, says: "the biggest risk would be to not change."

## THE MENU

The idea behind Red Lobster rolling out more

non-seafood options is to eliminate the "veto vote," or that one person in a family or group of friends that rules out Red Lobster because they don't like seafood.

Since opening its doors in 1968, Red Lobster has always had a steak dish or two on the menu. If people want a salad, the current menu offers a Caesar. That's it. But diners who aren't in the mood for seafood likely want a little more variety. So when the chain began the revamp about two years ago, it started by figuring out how to best fill in the gaps.

"We thought, what are the areas we're missing?" says Michael LaDuke, Red Lobster's executive chef.

Last summer, LaDuke and his team of chefs spent two weeks in Charlotte, N.C. to test about 50 dishes in three restaurants. They wanted feedback from diners, but also from the kitchen staff on any problems they encountered executing the dishes. For example, they decided that pineapple salsa should be prepared twice a day, instead of once, to keep it fresher.

Once various adjustments to sauces and cooking times were made, the test was broadened to 40 of its more than 700 restaurants in North America. Diners who ordered the new items were given surveys to fill out whether they liked the dish, what they would change and whether they'd get it again.

One of the dishes that made the cut is a Parmesan-crusted Chicken Alfredo that's served over corkscrew pasta; it's for diners who want a chicken dish that's a little more decadent. The Island Grilled Mahi-Mahi and Shrimp, clocking in at a modest 510 calories, is for those who want to go lighter.

Pork chops are on the menu for the first time. Ditto for the Roasted Vegetable

Skewers, the first vegetarian entree that isn't salad or pasta. And there are now three salads, including the Bar Harbor Salad, which has dried berries, pecans and blue cheese.

Speaking about the broader casual dining industry, Raymond James analyst Bryan Elliott says such updating is necessary for survival.

"Food is a bit of a fashion business, there's change that evolves steadily over time," he says. In other words, he says companies are simply putting on a "more contemporary set of clothes."

Cee Chappell-Bates, a 50-year-old resident of Columbus, Ohio, says she'd be willing to tag along to Red Lobster with her husband and children more often if there were a wider variety of dishes.

"As a family, we've gone probably two or three times in the past year. But they've been known to go without me too," she says, noting that she hasn't liked the texture of most seafood since she was a kid.

## THE PRICES

Red Lobster's latest update comes at a difficult time. Since 2005, consumers have been eating more meals at home and increasingly looking for cheaper options when they do eat out.

As a result, "value deals" that were popularized by fast-food chains like McDonald's have become more common in the casual dining industry. Applebee's, for instance, rolled out its "2 for \$20" promotion in the summer of 2008 at the height of the downturn; the response was so strong that it earned a permanent spot on the menu the following February. Chili's made a similar deal a permanent part of its menu in August 2010.

"The consumer, it's no

secret, is financially constrained," says Salli Setta, executive vice president of marketing at Red Lobster. "When they do go out to eat, price is much more of a factor."

Darden, based in Orlando, Fla., has been slow to emphasize affordability at its chains. At Olive Garden, the company says the "Taste of Tuscany" promotion earlier this year was a flop because it didn't underscore value enough. And a \$1 price hike for its "Festival of Shrimp" at Red Lobster didn't go over well either. Sales figures fell 1.8 percent and 3.9 percent for the chains respectively in the quarter.

The company's results have suffered, too. In its latest quarter, Darden said profit rose 4 percent primarily because new locations boosted revenue. But sales at restaurants open at least a year — a key indicator of health because it strips out the impact of newly opened or closed locations — fell 2.6 percent from a year ago.

Darden has since vowed that affordable prices will play a bigger role in its marketing. During its road show of new Red Lobster menu items at 40 restaurants across the country, the company tinkered with prices to see which ones might stick; they found that \$15 was an important psychological threshold.

"There's a difference between \$14.99 and \$15.50 and the difference is more

than 51 cents," says Dave Pickens, the company president.

Of course, the chain is betting that there are times when customers are willing to pay a little extra: The NY Strip Steak & Rock Lobster Tail still costs \$32.99. And a new "Four-Course Feast" comes with a soup, salad, entree and dessert; the meal cost \$15.99.

## Estimated nuke repair costs up

TALLAHASSEE — A new report says it would cost nearly \$1.5 billion to repair Progress Energy's damaged nuclear reactor at Crystal River.

That's up from the utility's prior estimate of \$900 million to \$1.3 billion.

Progress submitted an independent review of the plan to the Florida Public Service Commission.

The utility's incoming president, Alex Glenn, said a decision has not yet been made on closing or repairing the plant.

It has been down due to a containment building crack that happened during a project in 2009.

Progress serves 1.6 million customers in central and north Florida.

## Obama's red line fever

Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu literally drew a red line for Iran on Thursday. In his speech before the United Nations General Assembly, Mr. Netanyahu said the threshold for pre-emptive action will be "before Iran completes the second stage of nuclear enrichment where it's a few months away or a few weeks away from amassing enough enriched uranium to make a nuclear weapon." When that point arrives, Israel will go it alone if necessary.

Establishing red lines helps to prevent conflict, not generate it. Clear, unambiguous and credible thresholds signal to an adversary that certain behaviors will trigger definitive consequences. When the other side knows the risks, it may avoid courses of action that will bring the known response.

Red lines are only useful when they are credible, and the world has no doubt that Mr. Netanyahu means it when he draws a line in the sand. That's a form of credibility President Obama lacks. So it's just as well that the United States hasn't made similar threats. No one would believe them.

Two weeks ago an unnamed administration official protested that the United States has a red line, "which is a nuclear weapon. We're committed to that red line." That simply tells Tehran that the only circumstance under which Mr. Obama might — might — be willing to take action would be after Iran already had achieved that which was supposed to be forbidden. This gives Iran a winning hand. It would be unlikely for the Islamic Republic to reveal it had constructed working nuclear weapons before stockpiling a number of them, the better to deter U.S. retaliation. At this point, nothing is likely to happen before the November election. If Mr. Obama wins, Israel will continue to plan to go it alone against Iran. The resulting crisis will be all the more dire, thanks to American impotence.

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## Candidates: Look at their logic

In my youth, I naively believed that fact, logic and reason were all most people needed to make sound decisions on political issues that promote the greater good.

I also believed that a democracy needed an informed citizenry, and I believed that America had the world's most viable democracy because our citizens strived to be politically informed.

I learned years ago that I was wrong. Fact, logic and reason do not play much of a role in the political decisions of most Americans. Too many of us are misinformed or uninformed or ill-informed, or all three. Too many have become intellectually lazy when it comes to politics.

One result of this malady is that we fail to put politicians — those who make important decisions about our individual lives, the nation and the rest of the world — to the rigorous test of truth. Too many have learned to be comfortable with the blatant lies and rhetorical tricks of our leaders and would-be leaders.

I know I am spitting in the wind, but I want voters who watch the first debate between President Barack Obama and Republican nominee Mitt Romney on Wednesday night to set aside their emotions and listen for the logic in the candidates' arguments. Try to detect logical fallacies and when the candidates fail to use sound reasoning.

Keep in mind that the overwhelming majority of logical fallacies are intentional. They are honed by highly paid speechwriters. The candidates cynically believe fallacious arguments will be effective and win votes.

Below are a few fallacies to listen for as the candidates spar this week. My major source is "The Bedford Handbook for

Writers," Fourth Edition, by Diana Hacker:

– Hasty generalization: a conclusion drawn from insufficient or unrepresentative evidence that uses words such as never, every, always and all. A stereotype, often derogatory, is a hasty generalization. Obama suggested, for example, that rural Americans cling to their guns and religion. Romney described Obama supporters as people dependent on government largesse who see themselves as victims.

– Non sequitur: a conclusion that does not follow from what has been asserted or is derived from irrelevant information. Example: Romney is a Mormon; therefore, the White House will be run in Salt Lake City.

– False analogy: a comparison between two basically dissimilar things. Here is one we regularly hear: A person who has headed a successful multibillion-dollar private company is qualified to be president of the United States. Yes, both jobs require being in charge and making big decisions, but many of the challenges the president of a company faces are nothing like those the president of the world's lone superpower faces.

– Either/or fallacy: the assertion that there are only two alternatives when there actually are more. How often have you heard that if you don't finish college, you won't get a good job? Tell that to the dropouts making millions of dollars with the clever mobile apps they are pro-

ducing. The truth is that many occupations do not require one day of college.

– Faulty cause-and-effect reasoning: the assumption that because one thing follows another, the second is the direct result of the first. This is a leap to an unverifiable conclusion. Example: Unemployment has dropped in Florida since Rick Scott became governor.

– Clearly, the governor knows how to produce jobs," his spokeswoman says. Not so fast. Unemployment numbers may have dropped because officials do not count people who stopped looking for jobs. The reason also could be that the tourist season, which requires many workers, is kicking off as it always kicks off this time of year. Did the governor's policies have anything to do with this natural cycle?

– Appeals to emotion: An attempt to win sympathy instead of intelligent agreement. How many times have we heard a candidate implore us to vote for him because he hails, say, from coal-mining roots in rural West Virginia? His father died of black lung mere days before his son became a cadet at West Point. Ad hominem, Latin for "to the man," is an appeal to emotion. ("He's a Muslim") instead of logically refuting his stance on the issue.

From now until Nov. 6, we will be bombarded with exaggeration, lies, mudslinging and every other rhetorical device as the candidates vie for the White House. I believe we have a duty as voters to pay close attention to the logic of what Romney and Obama utter on the stump and during the debates.

## The ballad of John and Bruce

Their friendship on earth started in the second grade when they played ball together at Enota Elementary School. It continued until 2001.

The story in between could be the lyrics of a country song. And either one of these guys could have written them.

You may have heard of these songwriters: John Jarrard and Bruce Burch, two young men who made their first recording together in the bathroom of the Day's Inn in Gainesville, Ga., where Burch was night auditor. They'd heard that the acoustics in a bathroom most closely approximated a recording studio's. That may be the case, but the tape they made that night, they said, belonged in the bathroom.

Then they went off to Nashville to write their songs. Burch went first, in 1977, and Jarrard helped him move. "I took John to the bus station to go back to Gainesville and then cried like a baby," Burch said. He was in Music City all by himself.

But about nine months later, Jarrard moved to Nashville, and they were together again.

This gig was going to be easy, Burch thought. After all, he'd already found a company that liked some of his songs and actually published them. Trouble was, he didn't get any money. So he spread his wings, as fledgling songwriters do, and got outside work. He became night clerk at the Hall of Fame Motor Inn, a job Jarrard took after Burch became vice president of the Saucy Dog, a hot dog place. Later, Burch graduated to waiting tables at Houston's.

Income was really important now that both had married women who were not willing to wait for No. 1 songs before they ate.

But the hits finally did come, first for Jarrard, whose "Nobody But You," by Don Williams, reached No. 1. Burch's No. 1 songs—"Rumor Has It" and "It's Your Call"—were recorded by a redhead who'd checked in one night at the motor inn and later ate dinner at Houston's. Burch met her both times. Her name is Reba McEntire.

Jarrard was more successful with songwriting, Burch said. He actually could boast of having 11 No. 1 hits. But he didn't brag. He just celebrated with his friend.

Not long after moving to Nashville, diabetes took John Jarrard's sight. He bought a cane and walked to work unattended. The disease took his kidneys—he endured two transplant operations—and then his legs. On Feb. 1, 2001, it took his life.

But that's not the end of the story. Eleven years ago, Bruce Burch started a John Jarrard benefit singing that has raised more than \$1 million for charities. He and several friends — Mike Banks, Philip Wilheit, Jim Mathis and Allen Nivens — also founded the John Jarrard Foundation.

So every September, successful songwriters travel to Jarrard's hometown to sing and play, not for money, just for a friend they remember and for Bruce Burch, his best friend.

That's what country songwriters do best while they're on this earth.

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# Skydiver aims to break sound barrier in free fall

CAPE CANAVERAL — His blood could boil. His lungs could overinflate. The vessels in his brain could burst. His eyes could hemorrhage.

And, yes, he could break his neck while jumping from a mind-boggling altitude of 23 miles.

But the risk of a gruesome death has never stopped "Fearless Felix" Baumgartner in all his years of skydiving and skyscraper leaping, and it's not about to now.

Next Monday over New Mexico, he will attempt the highest, fastest free fall in history and try to become the first skydiver to break the sound barrier.

"So many unknowns," Baumgartner says, "but we have solutions to survive."

The 43-year-old former military parachutist from Austria is hoping to reach 690 mph, or Mach 1, after leaping from his balloon-hoisted capsule over the desert near Roswell.

He will have only a pressurized suit and helmet for protection as he tries to go supersonic 65 years after Chuck Yeager, flying an experimental rocket plane, became the first human to go faster than the speed of sound.

Doctors, engineers and others on Baumgartner's Red Bull-sponsored team have spent as much as five years studying the risks and believe they have done everything possible to bring him back alive.

He has tested out his suit and capsule in two dress rehearsals, jumping from 15 miles in March and 18 miles in July.

Baumgartner will be more than three times higher than the cruising altitude of jetliners when he hops, bunny-style, out of the capsule and into a near-vacuum where there is barely any oxygen and less than 1 percent of the air pressure on Earth.

If all goes well, he will reach the speed of sound in about half a minute at an altitude of around 100,000 feet. Then he will start to slow as the atmosphere gets denser, and after five minutes of free fall, he will pull his main parachute. The entire descent should last 15 to 20 minutes.

He will be rigged with cameras that will provide a live broadcast of the jump via the Internet, meaning countless viewers could end up witnessing a horrific accident.

Baumgartner is insistent on going live with his flight.

"We want to share that with the world," he says. "It's like landing on the moon. Why was that live?"

His team of experts — including the current record-holder from a half-century ago, Joe Kittinger, now 84 — will convene inside a NASA-style Mission Control in the wee hours Monday for the lift-off of the helium balloon at sunrise.

"All the things that can happen are varying degrees of bad," offers

Baumgartner's top medical man, Dr. Jonathan Clark, a former NASA flight surgeon.

Clark was married to space shuttle astronaut Laurel Clark, who was killed aboard Columbia while it was returning to Earth in 2003, and he has dedicated himself to improving astronauts' chances of survival in a high-altitude disaster.

NASA is paying close attention, eager to improve its spacecraft and spacesuits for emergency escape, but is merely an observer; the energy drink maker is footing the bill and will not say how much it is costing.

The No. 1 fear is a breach of Baumgartner's suit.

If it breaks open — if, say, he bangs into the capsule while jumping or supersonic shock waves batter him — potentially lethal bubbles could form in his bodily fluids. That's what's known as boiling blood. A Soviet military officer died in 1962 after jumping from a balloon at 86,000 feet; the visor of his helmet hit the gondola and cracked.

During the descent, the temperature could be as low as minus 70. Baumgartner's suit will be all he has between his body and the extreme cold.

Then there's the risk of a flat spin, in which Baumgartner loses control of his body during the free fall and starts spinning. A long, fast spin, if left unchecked, could turn his eyeballs into blood-soaked, reddish-purple orbs, and he could be left temporarily blind. Also, a massive

blood clot could form in his brain.

A small stabilizing chute will automatically deploy if he goes into a flat spin and blacks out or otherwise becomes incapacitated. He also has an emergency chute that will automatically deploy if he is unable to pull the cord on his main chute.

Baumgartner's team has a plan for every contingency but one: If the balloon ruptures shortly after liftoff because of a gust of wind or something else, the capsule will come crashing down with him inside.

He won't have time to blow the hatch and bail out.

"I have every expecta-

tion that he'll come through this successfully based on our analysis," Clark says, "but you know, it still is an unknown."

Kittinger leapt from an open gondola on Aug. 16, 1960, from an altitude of 19.5 miles and reached 614 mph, or Mach 0.9 — records that stand to this day. He was a captain in the Air Force, and the military's Excelsior project was a test bed for the nation's young space program.

Kittinger has been Baumgartner's mentor, signing on with this new project after decades of refusing others' requests.

Fearless Felix insists he would not attempt the jump if the odds were against

him. "I think they underestimate the skills of a skydiver," says Baumgartner, who has made more than 2,500 jumps from planes, helicopters, landmarks and skyscrapers, with no serious injuries.

If he makes it back in one piece, Baumgartner plans on settling down with his girlfriend and flying helicopters in the U.S. and Austria, performing mountain rescues and firefighting.

"After this," he promises, "I'm going to retire because I've been successfully doing things for the last 25 years and I'm still alive."

# Ikea deleted women from Saudi version of catalog

STOCKHOLM — Ikea is being criticized for deleting images of women from the Saudi version of its furniture catalog, a move the

company says it regrets. Comparing the Swedish and Saudi versions of the catalog, free newspaper Metro on Monday showed that women had been airbrushed out of otherwise identical pictures showcas-

ing the company's home furnishings.

The report raised questions in Sweden about Ikea's commitment to gender equality, and the company released a statement expressing "regret" over the issue.

"We should have reacted and realized that excluding women from the Saudi

Arabian version of the catalog is in conflict with the IKEA Group values," the company said.

Women appear only infrequently in Saudi-run advertising, mostly on Saudi-owned TV channels that show women in scarves covering their hair and long sleeves. In imported magazines, cen-

sors black out many parts of a woman's body including arms, legs and chest.

When Starbucks opened its coffee shops in the conservative, Muslim kingdom, it removed the alluring, long-haired woman from its logo, keeping only her crown.

Ikea's Saudi catalog, which is also available

online, looks the same as other editions of the publication, except for the absence of women.

One picture shows a family apparently getting ready for bed, with a young boy brushing his teeth in the bathroom. However, a pajama-clad woman standing next to the boy is missing from the Saudi version.

# Law commercials off air after suspension

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The ever present commercials for the law firm of Winters & Yonker are off the air in Louisville and Florida after the Tampa attorneys who head the law firm were suspended.

The firm, known in Louisville as Winters, Yonker and Kannady, spent \$651,000 on 12,212 spots in the Louisville market in the first eight months of this year.

William Winters and Marc Yonker were sus-

pended for 91 days and 60 days respectively earlier this month by the Florida Supreme Court, which found they stole clients from their former boss 11 years ago to start their own firm.

Florida State Bar staff counsel Kenneth Lawrence Marvin says the pair is barred from seeking new business or advertising in Florida during their suspensions.



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# Accident leaves 1 dead, 5 injured

A Lake City man is dead and five of his family members who were traveling with him lay injured following a single-vehicle wreck on U.S. 90 late Saturday, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

Virendra Patel, 47, of Lake City, was killed in the wreck, which occurred around 9:25 p.m. Saturday on U.S. 90 in the area of the 1800 block of Lake City, east of Southwest Faith Drive.

According to Florida Highway Patrol

reports, Patel was driving west on U.S. Highway 90 in a 2012 Jeep Commander when he apparently experienced a medical emergency and was incapacitated, said FHP. His vehicle swerved across the east-bound lanes, hit a fence on the south side of the roadway and overturned, coming to rest on its right side. Patel was taken to Lake City Medical Center in critical condition and later died.

Five passengers were hurt, according to FHP. One of the vehicle's occupants was thrown from the Jeep during the

rollover and was flown to Shands at the University of Florida and was listed in serious condition.

Binduben Patel, 47, was listed in serious condition from injuries she suffered in the wreck; Usna Patel, 72, was taken to Lake City Medical Center and was listed in serious condition. Dipti Patel, 50, was not wearing a seatbelt in the crash and

suffered critical injuries and was taken to Shands in Gainesville. Dipti Patel was the only occupant in the vehicle not wearing a seat belt, reports said.

Manima Patel, 14, was treated at Lake City Medical Center with minor injuries and Neil Patel, 10, was also treated at the Lake City Medical Center for minor injuries.

collection last week, leaving many city residents with no place to put their refuse.

"One of the things that compounding the transition and causing some problems is the accuracy of the records, particularly for commercial customers by Republic Services," Johnson said. "There was some errors in there that were discovered by Waste Pro. There are commercial cans that are still out and in the residential, we've got several thousand customers and just getting the cans out it's just part of the process. When you've had a company for 10 years and you're changing over, some cans may get missed."

Johnson advised residents to call customer service at City Hall if they continue to experience problems. He said he saw Waste Pro employees working during the weekend to get the trash bins out.

In other business, the council:

quately supervised. It just creates a concern on my part and that's one of the reasons it was brought up to begin with. The children sign in, they go and play outside and then they leave. I feel it's not effective or efficient nor the best use for that facility."

After several minutes of discussion, council members agreed that the topic would be added to the city's Oct. 15 meeting agenda.

If closed Johnson said the facility could be used for utility service occupancy and serve as the gas, water and sewer department.

"Doing that will save the

city about \$390,000 a year — a combination of general fund and enterprise funds," he said. "I think that would be a better and more effective use to benefit the citizens at large."

The meeting also addressed the recreation services the city provides such as youth football, volleyball, T-ball and basketball and the ratio of participants taking part in the services.

City records indicate 75 percent of the participants using the services are county residents, who pay the same amount as city residents to participate in the activities.

"My intent is to go ahead

and approach the county about making sure they're aware of the situation and see if they are willing to work with the city to improve on that because the cost is being borne by the city," Johnson said. "We want to have a more equitable sharing of the cost of the service."

Johnson also suggested the modular office building that was used by former Southside Recreation director Roger Little, who retired last week, be turned over to the executive director of utilities. Council members agreed in principle.

Ichetucknee River had sustained flows not seen since 2006.

The water shortage restrictions mostly restricted outdoor watering, particularly lawn and landscape irrigation. Under the order, lawn and landscape irrigation was limited to once per week.

Since the order expired, residents and others fall under mandatory, year-round water conservation rules. The rules limit lawn and landscape irrigation to twice per week for this time of year, and apply to residential landscaping, public or commer-

cial recreation areas, and public and commercial businesses. In addition, watering is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Farmers are required to follow conservation measures included in their water use permit.

"Though the district does not feel it is necessary to prolong water restrictions at this time, we ask that all water users conserve water and help us sustain our water resources," said District Executive Director Ann Shortelle.

that didn't have any idea there was an explosion until they got there."

He said the responding crew of two firefighters noticed it was possibly a hazardous materials incident when they saw signs on the side of the trucks. Other agencies, including the Lake City Fire Department Hazmat Team and a hazmat team from Gainesville, ere notified of about the situation.

Once crews figured it wasn't a hazardous materials incident the team from Gainesville was canceled and the local units surveyed the scene. The state fire marshal's office and representatives from OSHA were also called to the scene.

Wehinger said there was no blast radius. He said the semi truck tanker was open and somewhat full of used oil and diesel fuel mix.

"They have a boiler system out there where they keep the asphalt in the liquid form and the fuel they recover, they used that to burn off this boiler," he said. "He (Pollard) was measuring to see how much was in that tanker truck and something ignited the vapors from that tanker. It didn't cause any kind of rupture to

the tank, I assume, because it was open on top. Representatives from the DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) came out and there wasn't even a significant amount of material that got into the environment. It was just an explosion."

Pollard's body was sent to the Medical Examiner's Office in Jacksonville for an autopsy to determine the exact cause of death.

"I don't know exactly what killed him, there was obviously trauma," Wehinger said. "He died at the scene. When we got there he was already expired."

The current investigation by the state fire marshal's office and OSHA may take several weeks to be completed.

Wehinger said the investigation could take months and noted the chemicals that were in the tanker will also be checked.

He said the fuel is less volatile than gasoline.

"The type of fuel that it should have been is a non-flammable type of fuel," he said. "I don't know that else was mixed with it. It will take a while for them to finish that investigation."

## Jets sticking by Sanchez, despite big loss to 49ers.

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — The boos started sometime in the third quarter, anxious Jets fans watching their struggling team get trampled.

By the time the game Sunday was in its closing minutes, the remaining few wearing green and white made their feelings known with each chant, loud and clear:

"Tee-boww! Tee-boww!"  
Well, this mess the New York Jets are in might be

too big for even Tim Tebow to fix.

Mark Sanchez and the offense had another lousy performance in a 34-0 loss to the San Francisco 49ers. Bad passes, bad routes, bad football.

But this was supposed to be exactly how Tebow was going to help, by bringing a spark to the team by confusing defenses and making big plays.

So far, the Tebow wildcat experiment has been a dud. He has played in just 31 of the Jets' 257 offensive snaps, and Tebow has done little to strike fear in opposing defenses when he has been out there.

"We haven't been as successful at running the wild-

cat as I thought we would," Rex Ryan said. "I think that's fair to say, but again, without question, I'm not ready to give up on him. I think the wildcat is tough to defend and I've always said that."

Still, while they are standing by Sanchez right now, perhaps their biggest potential playmaker — Tebow — is mostly just standing by.

# Cup win a tribute to Seve

LONDON — Not even the family of Seve Ballesteros could have imagined a Ryder Cup finish quite like this. It was after midnight in Spain when a European team inspired by the "spirit of Seve" and captained by his close friend Jose Maria Olazabal completed its improbable comeback victory over the United States in Medinah, Ill. "What happened yesterday went beyond sports," Ivan Ballesteros, Seve's nephew and vice president of the Madrid-based Seve

Ballesteros foundation, told *The Associated Press* on Monday. "We want to thank Jose Maria for remembering Seve not just throughout the week but for always keeping his memory alive. I would say that not even Hollywood screenwriters could have imagined what happened yesterday." Seve Ballesteros died in May 2011 from a brain tumor, and the team played in his honor, overcoming a 10-4 deficit to win 14½-13½ after an epic day of singles matches. Ballesteros was everywhere Sunday. His image adorned European bags

and shirts, his name was sung by Europe's fans well into the night and his spirit was invoked by players wearing the navy trousers and white polo shirt that were the Spaniard's trademark. To a man, Europe's players said it was Seve's memory they were attempting to uphold. "Lots of feelings and emotions were revived again," the Madrid-based Seve Foundation, which collects funds to promote brain tumor support, said in a statement. "It was great to see the European team showing that fighting spirit Seve always showed."
