## A gathering at the springs

**Baptism Sunday set for Oct. 7 at Ichetucknee.**

Many people believe springs have a redeeming quality that symbolizes new life.

Sunday, a number of people who hold that belief are slated to take part in a Baptism ceremony at Ichetucknee Springs State Park.

The Baptism Sunday at Ichetucknee event will take place 2 p.m. Sunday at the north entrance of Ichetucknee Springs State Park and will feature several people getting baptized in the springs. Regular parking fees will apply for admission into the park.

"We'll begin with old time gospel songs," said John Wheeler, event coordinator. "That will be followed by each pastor baptizing their candidates, then there will be an opportunity for members of the public to be Baptized. We'll finish with a dessert social."

Baptism at Ichetucknee Springs has been held for the past seven years and the event is always held at Ichetucknee Springs State Park at the head spring.

"We usually get 100-125 people," Wheeler said of event attendance. "We Baptize anywhere from 10-25 people with a total attendance of about 100-125 people."

Five churches are slated to be represented in this year's event: Broken Lance Native American Church, Christian Heritage Church, Mount

Tabor AME Church, Poole Memorial Church of God In Christ and Church On The Way.

Wheeler said the event is a significant event for residents in the area.

"Ichetucknee is a traditional place of baptisms in Columbia County going back several hun-

dred years," he said. "It's a place where various denominations can unify in their faith and it's a beautiful natural place to hold such a ceremony."

Wheeler also spoke about the added symbolism of rebirth in people being baptized in the springs.

"Baptism is an outward symbol of inward change," he said. "The going underwater and rising out the water is a symbol of death and rebirth — death of the old self and birth of the new self."

## Board says no to NFBA

County turns down request for use of towers, for now.

The North Florida Broadband Authority was designed for the sole purpose of providing broadband Internet access to rural North Florida cities and counties.

The agency was armed with a \$30 million federal grant and three years to have the project up and running, but their representatives' inability to answer questions about the agency's stability, future, and its next step during the Thursday night county commission meeting, appeared to have county commissioners questioning the agency's longevity and its ability to deliver on its most basic promise — providing broadband access to all of Columbia County.

County officials spent about 90 minutes of Thursday's commission meeting learning more about the NFBA, its history and its work in Columbia County.

A Lake City man was arrested Wednesday and faces felony sexual offense charges after a child told authorities she was sexually assaulted in September. Authorities have also issued an arrest warrant for his brother, another suspect in the case, reports said.

## 'Idol' divas Carey, Minaj take feud public

NEW YORK

Is this "Idol" threat an idle threat? Mariah Carey told Barbara Walters her fellow "American Idol" judge Nicki Minaj threatened to shoot her, Walters reported on ABC's "The View" Thursday morning.

Consulting her notes, Walters recounted a phone conversation with Carey just before the ABC talk show went on the air, with new details of Tuesday's blowup between Carey and Minaj that was partly captured on video made public on the TMZ website.

Walters said Carey told her that "when Nicki walked off the set, multiple people heard Nicki say, 'If I had a gun I would shoot the (adjective unspoken by Walters) bitch.'"

After a meeting on Wednesday attended by the pair, Minaj said to Carey, "I love you, but we might fight again," according to Walters. "Mariah responded, 'No, we will not.'"

Walters said Carey told her that the singer had hired extra security. "Mariah said she doesn't feel comfortable emotionally," Walters reported. "But she will continue with the show because she loves the show. And she loves mentoring the contestants."

Walters issued an invitation to Minaj, a past guest of "The View," asking her to return to the show to give her side of the story.

But Minaj wasted no time responding with a string of Twitter postings. One read: "Hey yAll. Lets just say nicki said smthn about a gun. Ppl will believe it cuz she's a black rapper. Lmao. I'll then hit up Barbara n milk it."

### Man sentenced for firebombing

PENSACOLA — A homeless man who pleaded guilty to firebombing a Pensacola abortion clinic will serve 10 years in federal prison.

A judge sentenced Bobby Joe Rogers, 41, on Thursday. He pleaded guilty in July to charges of arson and damaging a reproductive health facility.

The New Year's Day fire gutted the Pensacola Family Planning Clinic.

Rogers, a transient with a lengthy criminal history, told detectives that he had been living in a parking lot near the clinic and decided to set the fire because he was upset abortions were performed there.

### Inmate guilty of more murders

BARTOW — A central Florida man already on death row for murdering two women has now also been convicted of killing two gas station workers.

A Polk County judge found Leon Davis Jr., 34, guilty Thursday of two counts of first-degree murder and several other charges. Davis had waived his right to a jury trial.

Authorities said Davis fatally shot Pravinkumar Patel, 33, and Dashrath Patel, 51, during a Lake Alfred BP station robbery in December 2007.

Davis was previously sentenced to death for killing two women — Yvonne Bustamante, 26, and Juanita Luciano, 23, — during the robbery of a Lake Wales insurance company, about a week after the fatal gas station robbery.

Beach County deputy fatally shot a teen after responding to a domestic disturbance.

Sheriff Ric Bradshaw said the deputy killed Michael Camberdella, 18, Thursday morning in a gated community near Boynton Beach.

The sheriff said his office responded after several neighbors called to report the teen was attacking his mother. Authorities said the teen, who was armed with a hammer and hedge sheers, ignored repeated commands by the deputy to drop the tools.

### Justices hear plant cost appeal

TALLAHASSEE — An environmental group's lawyer said a law letting utilities charge consumers for planned nuclear power plants even if they are never built leaves regulators without "adult supervision."

Southern Alliance for Clean Energy attorney Gary Davis on Thursday urged the Florida Supreme Court to declare the law unconstitutional.

He made that argument while appealing

the state Public Service Commission's decision to let Florida's two largest electric utilities charge customers \$282 million for upgrading existing nuclear plants or building new ones.

The Legislature passed the nuclear cost recovery law in 2006. Expenses for non-nuclear power plants cannot be passed on until they go into service.

### Zimmerman might sue NBC

ORLANDO — George Zimmerman is considering a defamation lawsuit against NBC over its reports about a phone call he made to dispatchers moments before he fatally shot Trayvon Martin, 17.

Zimmerman's attorney said Thursday that the former neighborhood watch captain has contacted another lawyer about possibly filing a lawsuit.

Each of the reports on either "Today" or NBC's Miami station involve editing of Zimmerman's phone call to a dispatcher that emphasizes his identification of Martin as a black male.

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## Non-residents can get tax break: Court

TALLAHASSEE — Foreigners and out-of-state residents may be able to get a break on state property taxes thanks to a potentially far-reaching ruling from the Florida Supreme Court.

The court on Thursday unanimously said that a couple from Honduras who had been living in a Key Biscayne condominium with their children were eligible for a homestead exemption.

Those in the U.S. on a temporary visa aren't normally eligible for the tax break, but all three children of David and Ana Andonie were born in Miami-Dade County and had never lived anywhere else.

Justice Jorge Labarga, who wrote the opinion, said that a provision included in the state constitution back in 1968 trumped an existing law that requires a per-

son seeking a homestead exemption to permanently reside in the home.

Labarga said the constitution made it clear that a home qualifies for the state's \$25,000 homestead tax break if it is the permanent residence of either the owner or someone who is a dependent of the owner.

The case could have wide implications for the numbers of Central and South Americans who live in South Florida and out-of-state residents who have also purchased property in the state.

The tax break — which was initially sought on the \$1 million home back in 2006 — was opposed by the Miami-Dade property appraiser. The county's Value Adjustment Board overruled the appraiser's office and granted the exemption.

The appraiser took the case to the courts, which have consistently sided with the couple.

## Local runaway added to missing/endangered list

Authorities are looking for a 16-year-old girl who ran away from a local rehab center in August and has not been seen or heard from by her family for more than a month.

Helena Magilene Pinkerton, 16, ran away from the Youth Interface facility in Lake City, a drug and alcohol treatment facility, on Aug. 16, when she walked away.

"She left her cell behind and has had no contact with her family or any of her known friends," said Craig Strickland, Lake City Police Department assistant public information officer. "She just left the facility, no note or anything."

Pinkerton is white, 5 feet 4 inches tall, weighs 130 pounds, has red/brown hair, brown eyes, braces on her teeth with pink bands and piercings in her ears, nose and navel.

Pinkerton may also be using the alias Helena

Magilene Travieso. Her nickname is "Who."

Authorities believe that after she ran away she may have gone to Gainesville or Live Oak because she has friends in both communities.

Pinkerton's information has been entered into the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Missing Endangered Person Information Clearinghouse as missing and a statewide notification has been released.

Strickland said Pinkerton was immediately reported as a runaway when she left the facility on Aug. 16.

A supplemental report identifying her as a missing person was filed by authorities when Pinkerton went missing for more than 30 days with no contact to her friends or family.

Anyone who has any information on Pinkerton on her current whereabouts or if she has been recently seen any time after Aug. 16 is asked to call Lake City Police

## NFBA: County says no to request

before they placed restrictions on allowing NFBA to have space on county towers.

Columbia County Commissioner Ron Williams interrupted a North Florida Broadband Authority presentation during the meeting and bluntly asked: "When will broadband Internet access be available in the rural areas of Columbia County such as Suwannee Valley?"

The inability to provide a direct answer prompted county officials to pound and prod NFBA officials about lack of broadband availability to all Columbia County residents.

Williams said there is an area between Interstate 10 and White Springs where some Columbia County residents don't have access to high speed Internet.

There are areas in the north end of the county from Deep Creek to the Georgia border where residents don't have access to high speed Internet service.

"This is skimming the cream off the top and giving us what's left," Williams

said, when NFBA officials couldn't give him a time frame for all of Columbia County to have broadband access.

A disgusted Williams said NFBA advertisements should say the agency is "partially" connecting the community to the world.

NFBA representatives said the agency only has about \$6 million left for work on the broadband project. As they gave a brief history of the agency's existence, it was noted that in July 2011 the federal government suspended its funding and came to check into allegations of waste, fraud and abuse. NFBA representatives said changes, in the agency's management group and with personnel, were made following the review and today the agency is on "excellent" standing with the federal government.

However commissioners also questioned why some of the original NFBA members left and what was the business model the NFBA planned to use to continue its goals.

Commissioner Jody

DuPree said no one has shown him a plan to address the needs of the people in the rural areas and even if the county allowed the NFBA to use some county towers, it would be questionable whether residents in the north end of the county would have broadband access.

When the NFBA organized the agency sought agreements from local governments pledging the use of in-kind services, such as the use of space on tower for equipment.

Commissioner Stephen Bailey voiced concerns over NFBA placing equipment on county towers that could interfere with emergency communications equipment.

"We don't need anything on our towers that are going to interfere with our public safety network," he said, as he noted all four county towers where NFBA is requesting space are on the public safety network.

The NFBA plans to use the space on the tower to sublease to other companies providing broadband Internet services.

Bailey also said he wants to make sure the NFBA is around after February and doesn't leave the county with equipment on its towers if the NFBA shuts down.

The board unanimously voted in favor of having county staff develop a list of criteria the NFBA has to meet, including a business plan, and then county officials will decide whether or not they would lease space to the NFBA on the four county towers.

## Romney takes Round 1

Often, little is gleaned from presidential debates but Wednesday night's clash offered a revealing contrast between the Democratic and Republican nominees. For the first time this campaign season, President Barack Obama seemed defensive, back on his heels, while Gov. Mitt Romney appeared to be in his element, in control.

As MSNBC anchor Chris Matthews said moments after the debate concluded, President Obama "was enduring the debate rather than fighting it" and Gov. Romney "was winning."

Mr. Obama and Mr. Romney, on stage at the University of Denver, jostled on domestic policy issues, including the role of government, education, tax policies, health care and more.

Much of the debate focused on pocketbook issues, those policies that impact the finances of individuals and families. If this presidential race becomes a pocketbook election, it then turns into a referendum on the Obama presidency. The first 45 minutes of the debate was spent discussing the economy.

Mr. Obama seemed tired and less relaxed, employing rhetoric similar to previous speeches. He also failed to defend and clarify his positions, unlike Mr. Romney did when the president criticized the Republican's tax policies, accusing him of planning to "cut taxes, skewed towards the wealthy," which would add to the deficit. Mr. Romney responded that "[t]here will be no tax cut that adds to the deficit" and no planned tax reduction for the richest Americans.

Mr. Romney fired back, stating that "[u]nder the president's policies, middle-income Americans have been buried."

This debate may turn out to be a turning point in the electoral race. Mr. Romney has run a careful campaign up until this first face-to-face encounter. He was more forceful and assertive but not offensively aggressive.

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## Where dreams go to die

When a dream comes your way, do you just let it lie down and die? As kids, we dreamed about things that could be; we daydreamed, and used our vivid imaginations to explore worlds and things to do that were way beyond our reach. When I was eight years old, I was a frogman for Navy demolitions, an astronaut exploring the moon and planets, and a pirate.

Somewhere along the line, we may begin to edit and temper our dreams. We stop fantasizing about things that are unlikely or difficult. Maybe it's to avoid disappointment, maybe it's because we're teased or criticized for being "dreamers." Daydreams are replaced by more realistic and achievable thoughts, much less astounding. When we create goals, instead of winning an Olympic gold medal or writing the great American novel, we settle for a job that offers enough money to make a living. Or maybe we stop dreaming at all.

Why do we let our dreams come here to die? It's likely that we want to invest in plans and expectations that won't let us down. Disappointment and fear of failure, and sometimes even fear of success, may be painful enough that we set our sights very low. We settle for less. When we do that, we

What's the price of doing that? It can be a little risky, a little unsettling. It's easy to let our fears stop us from living life to the fullest. We may fear the unknown, change, looking foolish, making mistakes, or failing. We may opt out, in favor of the practical side of life. But there are surely ways to get beyond these fears. Here are some things you could do to re-light the spark of adventure and self-development.

- Talk about possibilities and opportunities with a friend, or someone close to

you. Play "What if?" What if I volunteered at the hospital? Took a flying lesson?

- Ask questions. Follow your curiosity. Use the web on your computer. Call someone who knows something about the subject you're interested in. Does your local golf course offer classes for beginners?

- Play. Try it out, as a hobby, sport, or interest. Read about it. How about local history? Arts and crafts fair?

- Get educated. Local trade school or college subjects?

What are your friends doing that you're interested in? Can you join them?

- "Keep your day job." Become an actor or singer, but don't expect to make a living at it any time real soon. Go for it, but have a "plan B." Use common sense.

- Don't let your life become where dreams come to die. Don't shoot down a dream without giving it a chance to fire up your imagination. Be willing to reach for that better life for yourself. It could all start with just a dream.

## The new green zone

It appears increasingly likely the Sept. 11 terrorist attack on the U.S. Embassy in Benghazi, Libya, could have been prevented. Whistleblowers have been providing evidence to congressional investigators suggesting administration officials overlooked ominous warning signs, including violent attacks on diplomatic personnel in the region.

Republicans on the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee are determined to get to the bottom of the matter and have scheduled an Oct. 10 hearing. The panel's chairman, California Rep. Darrell Issa, joined Utah Rep. Jason Chaffetz in writing Tuesday to Secretary of State Hillary Clinton demanding answers. Her staff certainly has been busy.

As the National Legal and Policy Center pointed out, diplomatic missions overseas care more about creating "green zones" that refer not to safe havens in hostile territory, but areas where carbon footprints are reduced. Forget ammunition and armored vehicles. Forget about the war on terror. Foggy Bottom was engaged in an all-out war on incandescent light bulbs and internal combustion.

State bureaucrats even set up a "League of Green Embassies" website to tout the Baghdad Embassy's use of electric golf carts and expensive new light switches needed for the politically correct light bulbs in Jordan. The U.S. Embassy in Cairo listed itself as a member of the group, and our embassy in Finland blew \$47,500 in taxpayer cash on picking up a new Chevy Volt plug-in hybrid — even though the car is just a \$17,000 Chevy Cruze laden with pricey batteries.

A new Government Accountability Office audit calculated the federal government since 2009 has pumped \$1.3 billion into the factories that make these batteries. That's good news for Hollywood stars like Leonardo DiCaprio, George Clooney and Matt Damon.

Despite the billions in indirect subsidy and \$7,500 in direct cash to buyers, only about 17,000 all-electric cars were sold last year — far short of the government's rosy predictions. It turns out, Uncle Sam has been making a lot of lousy decisions lately. A separate GAO audit released Monday found the administration spread \$2.6 billion to scores of solar-panel manufacturers like Solyndra and Abound Solar, both of which went bankrupt.

The White House is charging forward, despite the high-profile failures of the early loans. In August, Mr. Obama announced he would blow millions more on seven new windmill and solar panel projects under his "we can't wait" strategy.

The job of a president is certainly not to micromanage every step his administration takes. Rather, he sets the agenda, ensuring his appointees know what he expects them to do. With the national debt standing at \$16.1 trillion and America's sovereign territory under siege, we now know Mr. Obama's priority. Solvency and safety can wait, but electric cars and curlicue light bulbs can't.

## The real purpose of the church

In the four Gospels, the word church is only found three times: Matthew 16:18 and two times in Matthew 18:17.

The English word church comes from the Greek "kuriakos" (belonging to The Lord); but it stands for another Greek word "ekklesia" (denoting an assembly). The word church is found 115 times in the New Testament; 92 of those times it refers to the local assembly. In other words "ekklesia" is when

the "kuriakos" come together.

The place we call the church should be a place where those belonging to God come together for worship, Bible study, and seeing souls saved. I am concerned that in this day it has lost much of its purpose. I fear the Devil has succeeded in getting the world in the church so it will lose its real purpose.

The position of the church should be as it was with Israel. They had been called out and were to separate themselves from the surrounding nations; yet they were as we are, to testify for God among the nations. The church is called a peculiar people (Titus 2:14 and I Peter 2:9 KJV). The word peculiar in its Biblical sense never means odd; it comes from a Latin term

Jesus, in His high-priestly prayer in John 17, tells the Father He has to leave us in the world but He asked for protection for us from the world.

The church is where God's people meet, study, worship, and find power to go into the world with the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

This is the first obligation of the church.

The church today is failing in its most important ministry. It spends so much time planning events, programs, etc; it, as a whole, doesn't have time to think about a lost and dying world on its way to a devil's Hell.

After giving some details about how God wanted things constructed, God told Moses, "See that you make them after the pattern for them, which was shown to you on the mountain" (25:40).

After he was given the details for building the temple, King David said, "All this the Lord made me understand in writing by His hand upon me, all the details of this pattern" (1

Chronicles 28:19).

Paul said that Jesus used him as an example (or pattern - KJV) to show the perfect patience of Jesus (1 Timothy 1:16). To Titus, Paul said that he was to be a good example (or pattern) in good deeds (Titus 2:7).

God has given us many patterns or examples that we must follow. To the Christian community, he has told us how to "make" Christians, what the worship service of the church is to be like, how the leaders of a local church are to function, and take care of the people who attend.

It seems to me that in a lot of areas of our life God has given a pattern as to how He wants things to be done. He has shown us the way. He has laid out the blueprints, if you please. But why?

When we stop and think about

things, we realize that everything belongs to God.

When you own something, or you are paying for something to be built, you want it built your way. Since God has all knowledge, He does not need to consult with anyone as to how something should be built. He does not need to make "amendments" to His plans, because He knows exactly how He wants it done.

One question we really need

to consider is, what right do human beings have to change God's pattern?

What "position" do we hold or what credentials do we have that gives us the right to make changes in God's pattern without His approval? How superior is our intelligence to that of God's intelligence? How can we improve upon what God wants done?

All of us would agree that we do not have the right to change God's pattern. We are not in a position to make changes without His approval.

We definitely are not superior in intelligence to God, and we cannot improve upon what He wants done. In fact, we cannot do what we want many times, without changing the plans at least once. Even in the writing of this article, I have changed several things already.

We would be very upset if the builder of our house made changes without consulting us or our representative (been there, done that).

We would not pay for costs the builder incurred which were not "called for" in the blueprints. Why do we think God would be any different?

Let us not forget that this is God's world and all that is in it (Psalms 89:11). That includes our lives as well as our church activities.

Before we "build" anything, let us see if God has revealed a pattern. If He has, we need to follow it.

I know, you knew better when you did it. I STILL LOVE YOU AND FORGIVE YOU, BY MY GRACE AND BECAUSE OF THE WORK OF MY SON, JESUS. NOW YOU MUST FORGIVE YOURSELF." Maybe then that would be enough!

Fact is when we sin, 99% of the time we know better. Quit looking at the other person, and

be responsible. Quit gossiping about brother so and so. Quit looking down on others like you are better than they. Paul says plainly, "ALL HAVE SINNED" and "THERE IS NONE RIGHTEOUS, NO NOT ONE."

Understand, grace is not a free pass on sin. Grace can be abused, been there, done that. Not proud of it, and won't repeat it. You don't brag about hurting the "God of all grace", the One who loves you, the Christ who died for you, and the Spirit that indwells you. Grace, when understood, is truly one of the most wonderful motivations for service that can be imagined. Paul claimed that he was the chief (worst) sinner of all, (I Timothy 1:15). Why did Paul feel this way?

In Paul's pre-Christian life, he did some pretty bad things. In

Acts 8 Stephen was being stoned to death, and Saul (Paul) was there. Not 'rubber-necking' as a passerby, but actually condoning the action of the group doing the stoning... (Acts 8:1). The persecution that started against the church then, marked the beginning of the fanatical persecution of Saul who "began to destroy the church. Going from house to house, he dragged off men and women and put them in prison" (Acts 8:3). He was on the way to

Damascus, with papers from the Sanhedrin to do the same there, when he met the risen Jesus (Acts 9). He shortly after that did what Ananias told him and was immersed into Jesus, (Acts 22:16).

In Galatians 1 he spoke about his life then when he said, "...you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of god and tried to destroy it." He described himself as "extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers" (Galatians 1:13-14).

## Rangers still have a chance

**T**here is not much solace to be found in the collapse by the Texas Rangers that cost the team the West Division.

There is a wild card chance for redemption when the Rangers host the Baltimore Orioles at 8:30 p.m. today.

Texas led Oakland by 13 games on June 30. Losing a lot of that is not unusual — the New York Yankees frittered away 10 games to the Orioles before going 7-3 down the stretch and winning their final four games and the division.

New York had Baltimore on its tail for several weeks. The Rangers led Oakland by five games with nine left to play. Texas finished 2-7 in those games, while the A's went 8-1 including the three-game sweep to win the West.

It was only the fifth time in baseball that a team has come back from at least 13 games down to win a division or pennant.

Lake City's Michael Kirkman handled his relief duties well for the Rangers in his two appearances in the Oakland series.

On Tuesday, Kirkman pitched two-thirds of the eighth inning with no hits and one strikeout. On Monday, Kirkman got the final out in the sixth inning. Oakland won 3-1 on Tuesday and 4-3 on Monday, so Kirkman helped keep his team in the game.

Kirkman's previous appearance also came against Oakland, in a 3-2 extra-inning win by the A's in Texas on Sept. 25. With the game tied at 2, Kirkman pitched two hitless innings with one walk and four strikeouts.

Kirkman pitched with mixed results in games on Sept. 14, Sept. 7 and Sept. 6.

In a 9-3 Texas home win against Seattle on Sept. 14, Kirkman pitched the ninth inning with four hits, two runs and one strikeout.

In a 3-1 loss in 11 innings at Tampa Bay on Sept. 7, Kirkman relieved in a 1-1 game with two outs in the ninth inning. He recorded a full inning with two hits and three strikeouts.

In a 5-4 Texas win in 10 innings at Kansas City on Sept. 6, Kirkman had his second blown save. He relieved in the seventh inning and gave up the tying run.

For the regular season, Kirkman appeared in 28 games and pitched 35 1/3 innings. He allowed 24 hits (five homers) and 16 runs (15 earned) for a 3.82 ERA. He struck out 38 and walked 17.

# Passing the Panthers

Columbia hosts Ridgeview in key district matchup.

Columbia High has a chance to serve up revenge tonight when it hosts Ridgeview High in a game that could decide the District 3-6A championship.

Last year, Ridgeview went 5-5 while the Tigers finished the regular season 7-3. All that mattered though was the Panthers' 34-26 win against the Tigers in Orange Park.

Tonight, the game returns to Lake City at 7:30 p.m. and the Tigers don't want to let history repeat itself.

Stopping the Panthers is all about shutting down one of Jacksonville's premier quarterbacks in Ridgeview's Josh Moore.

Moore is a dual-threat, but relies more on his feet than his throwing ability. It's something the Tigers weren't able to shut down last year as he ran for 145 yards to pace the Panthers.

"He's almost like having another running back," Columbia head coach Brian Allen said. "He's like (top recruit) Derrick Henry with an arm."

The Panthers offense will run through Moore in a variety of ways.

"They're going to run quarterback power," Allen said. "They'll go as he goes, that's usually with the run, but when he's had to pass, he's been able to deliver."

And Allen believes he could be running behind one of the best offensive lines that the Tigers have faced this year.

"Their front five is a

bunch of big linemen," Allen said. "They're not big and slow either. They're big and athletic. We have to play assignment football, because these aren't heavy guys. They have movement, they're an athletic group and if we don't play our assignments they can slip one outside."

Allen said the key to beating the Panthers won't be attacking their offense, but containment football.

"We're not so much going to attack as we're just going to try to play our assignments and execute like we've taught since the summer," Allen said. "If a guy is supposed to squeeze, we

have to squeeze. If he's supposed to spill, we have to spill. We can't let them slip out for huge yards. We've got to stay inside our system no matter what they're running."

Allen said Vanguard High's defense last week was a good test for getting ready for the Panthers as their defensive schemes are similar.

"We're going to see a lot of robber in coverage," Allen said. "They're going to bring the safety down into the box."

Offensively, don't expect much change out of the Tigers' identity.

"We're going to stick to

our identity with the power running game," Allen said. "We want to show up big. We need to play like we did in the second half last week to get things accomplished. Shaq (Johnson) should have some opportunities to make some plays. We have to hit the throws when they're open."

Allen also spoke to limiting the mistakes — something that cost the Tigers in the first half against Vanguard before the comeback.

"We can't have holding penalties," Allen said. "I talked to Laremy (Tunsil) about laying on a guy. They're going to call that

every time even if you pancake him. He's got to give him a chance to get up and then stab him back down. That negated a huge offensive run last week. We had a couple of plays that were called back and we have to do a better job of execution. We can't do those kind of things against this caliber of an opponent."

**Notes:** Tyrone Sands will miss the rest of the season with an ACL injury, but the Tigers will receive Darren Burch back at fullback. Trey Marshall is expected at 100 percent after suffering a high-ankle sprain against Buchholz High three weeks ago.

## CHS well prepared

Tigers 4-1 through difficult opening stretch.

Although tonight will undoubtedly be the biggest game on Columbia High's schedule so far, this isn't the Tigers' first rodeo.

Tonight's game against Ridgeview High will most likely decide the outcome of District 3-6A according to Tigers head coach Brian Allen.

He feels that the Tigers have endured enough in the first five games while compiling a 4-1 record to be the most prepared team coming into this game.

"The big thing is that we matured as a group against Vanguard," Allen said. "We have to continue to grow and let that momentum build. We have to quit talking about last year and go get it done."

The maturity of the Tigers when in the second half came in Columbia scored 21 points in the fourth quarter to rally from a 20-7 deficit and defeat the Knights

28-20 on their home field.

Columbia also knows what it feels like to lose in one of their big games — a feeling that Allen and the Tigers want to avoid.

The biggest thing Allen feels the Tigers have learned during those contests is to overcome challenges.





# LSU's depth faces big test at Florida

BATON ROUGE, La. — LSU is about to hit the toughest part of its schedule now with a handful of key players either unable to suit up or hobbled with injuries.

Turns out the dismissal of the honey badger, Tyrann Mathieu, is only one of several episodes of misfortune for the fourth-ranked Tigers.

At least four players who were projected starters back in early August won't be on the field for LSU (5-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) at No. 10 Florida (4-0, 3-0) on Saturday.

Losing Mathieu, a Heisman Trophy finalist as a cornerback and punt returner, was a big blow on its own. But it was just the beginning.

■ Linebacker Tahj Jones has not played because of academic problems.

■ Left tackle Chris Faulk, arguably the top pro prospect on the offensive line, is out for the season with a knee injury that he suffered during practice before the Tigers' second game against Washington.

■ Top running back Alfred Blue is sidelined indefinitely with a knee injury from LSU's third game against Idaho.

■ Then last Saturday, J.C. Copeland, a 270-pound fullback with three touchdowns this season, injured his knee against Towson.

Copeland returned to practice on Wednesday and still could play. If not, that would further test LSU's depth against the Gators, who had last week off and are getting healthier.

"It is a challenge. There's no doubt about it," said offensive lineman Josh Dworaczyk, who has started for Faulk at left tackle but could move to right tackle this week. "For a team to have the depth chart challenged the way that we're at, at this point in our season is certainly something that we have to hit head on."

Meanwhile, there is mostly encouraging news on the injury front for Florida, which looks to be gaining momentum with each victory.

"We were able to get some guys back that I don't know if we had played last week would have been able to play in the game," Gators coach Will Muschamp said.

Defensive end Dominique Easley (sprained left knee), linebacker Jelani Jenkins (broken right thumb) and versatile fullback Trey Burton (back spasms) all are expected to return against LSU.

Easley and Burton missed the Gators' 38-0 romp over Kentucky two weeks ago.

Jenkins sat out the last

two games after breaking his thumb in the first series of a 20-17 win at Texas A&M. He'll take protective measures, such as wearing a soft cast, against LSU.

"Certainly, his experience, maturity, play-making ability, being able to make some defensive calls and calm some guys down in situations in a game like this," Muschamp said of Jenkins. "There is no question it will be an added boost."

The knee Easley hurt is the same one in which tore his anterior cruciate ligament last November against

Florida State, so whether he bounces back quickly remains to be seen.

Florida also was happy to have an extra week to rest leading running back Mike Gillislee, who is averaging 100 yards a game but has been slowed by a groin injury, gaining only 56 yards at Kentucky. His practice snaps were reduced during the bye week to get him back to full speed.

"We've got to do what we've got to do," offensive coordinator Brent Pease said in reference to Gillislee's workload. "If he

needs to carry it 30 times this time, he'll carry it 30. ... Mike can handle that."

LSU has built up quality depth. Since taking over in 2005, Les Miles helped LSU to continue to be an annual contender for a national title.

Without Blue, some of LSU's other talented running backs will get an opportunity. Kenny Hilliard, Spencer Ware and Michael Ford have all had spectacular moments during their careers and freshman Jeremy Hill is showing promise. Hilliard and Ware are also big and tough enough to fill in at fullback.

Dworaczyk is a sixth-year senior and a former starter at guard. He said he feels comfortable moving to either tackle spot, and added that many LSU players are adept at multiple positions, giving the coaching staff a lot of flexibility.

Mathieu's departure on August forced LSU to start freshman Jalen Mills at cornerback, with Mills moving to nickel back and redshirt freshman Jalen Collins coming in at cornerback in passing situations. Mills has a pair of interceptions and Collins has broken up a pair of passes that wound up being intercepted by a teammate on the deflection.

"We don't recruit these guys for no reason. They're great football players," said receiver Russell Shepard, who works against Mills and Collins in practice. "Those guys are ready because the coaches do a great job preparing them and our leaders on the team do a great job of showing them how we play our style of football."

## Tebow time? Not yet for struggling Jets

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — Tim Tebow came to Broadway in March as a backup, already a bona fide star.

NFL fans nationwide caught sight of him on TV last season, leading the Denver Broncos to one improbable comeback after another and then into the playoffs. His force-of-nature style was the talk of the league, with fans "Tebowing" at games and parties, in their offices and living rooms. When actor Robert Downey dropped to a knee and bowed his head in prayerful pose at the Oscars, everyone was in on the joke.

Then Gotham and the Jets beckoned — along with the tantalizing prospect to build his brand further and someday take over from Mark Sanchez as quarterback of one of the league's highest-profile teams. With the Jets 2-2 coming off a disheartening 34-0 loss to San Francisco, scores of disappointed New Yorkers are ready for a change, ready to find out if they got a fierce competitor, as advertised, or a publicity stunt.

And they wonder why "Tebow Time" shouldn't start on Monday night against the undefeated Houston Texans.

He may be wondering the same thing. The easy smile that was Tebow's trademark when he arrived seven months earlier isn't flashing quite so much lately.

"It's just frustrating to lose, and to lose like this," Tebow said quietly in the Jets' locker room Sunday after the 49ers game.

Jets coach Rex Ryan and new offensive coordi-

nator Tony Sparano kept their plans for Tebow and the wildcat package under wraps, even as the starting offense failed to score a touchdown in the preseason. Now, with the offense still sputtering under Sanchez, it seems clear that Tebow needs to be a bigger part of things, and right now.

Tebow has played in just 31 of the Jets' 257 offensive snaps through four games, including only seven Sunday. He has lined up at quarterback a few times, as a fullback at others and even gets to block as the personal punt protector. He also went out for a pass at Miami two weeks ago — and Sanchez plunked him in the back of the head.

He said all the right things after the 49ers' blowout, as he always seems to do, careful about not exacerbating what could soon be a full-blown quarterback controversy.

"I get excited any time they ask me to go out there and help the team," Tebow said, brushing aside question after question about his limited playing time.

Tebow said last week that compared to this time a year ago in Denver, he's actually playing more. That is, until the Broncos decided to bench Kyle Orton after a 1-4 start and gave Tebow a chance. What followed was an amazing run of five fourth-quarter comebacks in eight games as Tebow led Denver all the way to the playoffs — and an overtime win at home over Pittsburgh.

Success came despite constant criticism about his mechanics and inability to play well until the final quarter of games. But somehow, he found a way to win just as he did at the University of Florida.

## Shootouts not shutouts norm in SEC

The defensive-minded Southeastern Conference is generating headlines more for shootouts than shutouts.

The league that has won six straight national titles largely on the backs of powerful defenses had two teams combine for 1,038 yards Saturday afternoon. Then it happened again.

Texas A&M racked up 716 yards and 58 points in a rout of Arkansas, which piled up 515 yards. Then Georgia and Tennessee got into a new-fashioned shootout, combining for 1,038 yards in the Bulldogs' 51-44 victory.

Mississippi coach Hugh Freeze can hardly believe the gaudy numbers.

This is the SEC. "I was shocked to see that Georgia-Tennessee score," Freeze said. "I grew up watching all those games, and usually you

thought 21-17 was high. But my, how things have changed."

They have, indeed. Some SEC teams, and plenty of games, are bucking the conference's defensive tradition.

Through five weeks, SEC defenses have already surrendered 50-plus points four times, one more than all of last season. It's only happened on average 3.4 times over the past 10 seasons.

The Razorbacks have been the victims twice, including a 52-0 loss to Alabama.

The average yards allowed per game in the SEC has risen from 320.8 last season to 344.9 in 2012.

Not everyone welcomes the trend.

Powerful teams like No. 1 Alabama, No. 4 LSU, No. 6 South Carolina and No. 10 Florida are still getting it done old-school with stingy defense to go with solid offenses. Those teams and high-scoring Texas A&M

all have top 10 scoring defenses nationally. No. 20 Mississippi State (13th) is only a few spots behind.

Then there are teams like No. 5 Georgia and Tennessee.

The Bulldogs rank 46th in scoring defense, a huge falloff from the other Top 25 teams. Tennessee's defense is giving up nearly 30 points a game, 81st nationally. Both have prolific offenses and star quarterbacks, though.

Don't expect the Crimson Tide to follow suit.

Alabama coach Nick Saban's allegiance lies with the defense. He said there should be tweaks to just how fast uptempo offenses should be allowed to go.

After giving up two extended drives to Ole Miss's no-huddle attack, Saban said having defenses on the field for extended periods with no chance to substitute creates fatigue and potential injury issues. "At some point in time,

we should look at how fast we allow the game to go in terms of player safety," Saban said.

He references West Virginia's 70-63 win over Baylor in the Big 12, which made Georgia-Tennessee look like a defensive struggle.

"It's obviously created a tremendous advantage for the offense when teams are scoring 70 points and are averaging 49.5 points a game when people are doing those types of things," Saban said. "More and more people are going to do it. I just think there's got to be some sense of fairness in terms of asking, Is this what we want football to be?"

Missouri wide receiver T.J. Moe responded via Twitter: "Sure is."

Georgia and Tennessee both have two of the nation's top 20 offenses. But their combined 95 points in an SEC game raised more than a few eyebrows.

# The 'must read'

## Veteran journalist covered auto racing for six decades

When the current media center/press box at Indianapolis Motor Speedway was new, there were rows of work stations each with an electrical outlet, phone jack and high-speed Internet connection. But at one seat up front there was a station with a typewriter, where Chris Economaki could be found clacking away at another story for National Speed Sport News. His clacking on the typewriter was a familiar sound for years at race tracks large and small across America.

Economaki, who died last week at 91, was the undisputed leader of the American motorsports journalist corps, and his publication was, during his time as editor, the "must read" paper for anyone associated with American auto racing.

Economaki also had a distinguished career as a broadcaster. He was knowledgeable about the elite racing circuits, but also kept fully abreast of the goings on at the short tracks and smaller touring series that are the backbone of American auto racing.

His Editor's Notebook was by far the most-read article in National Speed Sport News, and in the days before the Internet he gleaned information from newspapers all across the country and passed along the most significant happenings, always crediting the reporter and paper that first published the news. He also befriended those reporters, took them under his wing and encouraged them in ways he likely never fully knew.

When reporters would gather to reminisce, his stories about long-gone pioneers like Tommy Hinnershitz and Ted Horn were to be treasured, as they were direct links to

the sport's earliest days.

Economaki began hawking copies of National Speed Sport News at age 14 at local tracks and eventually held the position of editor for more than 60 years. He also worked as a track announcer and with ABC's Wide World of Sports, as well as covering races for CBS and ESPN.

Many a racing movie from back in the day includes clips of Economaki calling the action.

Dick Berggren, a longtime announcer and journalist himself, said Economaki was "the most premier auto racing journalist who ever was and ever will be. We'll never again see someone as incredibly diverse and successful at his craft."

Economaki is survived by his daughters Corinne and Tina and two grandchildren.

The racing community also lost another beloved leader last week as Bob Newton, the founder of Hoosier Tire, passed away.

Newton is remembered as a man who cared deeply for the sport of auto racing and its participants. His company had a brief run in NASCAR, with several drivers winning races on his tires, but most of his focus was on the other circuits in the motorsports world.

Tony Stewart was among those offering remembrances of Newton.

"If it weren't for Bob and the company he built, guys like me never would've had the opportunity to do what we do, and I never would've had the opportunity to make it to NASCAR," Stewart said in a statement. "No one cared more about racers than Bob. For decades, he's been responsible for shaping short-track racing."

### Testing; Danica; HANS

**NASCAR is relaxing** its restrictions on testing. For the first time since 2008, teams can test independently at tracks that host NASCAR's top three divisions. Each Cup organization, no matter how many cars it fields, can test four times next season. The testing is in addition to the Preseason Thunder test at Daytona International Speedway the second week of January.

**Reports from Dover** indicate that Danica Patrick will race next year with veteran crew chief Tony Gibson and the crew that has been paired with Ryan Newman.

Newman's new crew chief and crew members have yet to be determined.

**Simpson Performance Products**, one of the leading manufacturers and distributors of racing safety equipment, has acquired HANS Performance Products, which builds HANS head-and-neck-restraint devices worn by most racers these days. HANS Performance Products was formed in 1991 by five-time IMSA driving champion Jim Downing and Dr. Robert Hubbard. The Atlanta-based company will be operated as a separate division of Simpson Performance Products and Downing and Hubbard will continue to provide engineering experience and support.

### Talladega could be 'wild card'

This weekend's Good Sam 500 at Talladega Superspeedway is one many Chase drivers dread, as one of the multi-car crashes that typically occur there could ruin a championship run.

On the other hand, it could bring back into contention some who have fallen behind. Clint Bowyer, winner of the past two fall races at Talladega, said Sunday's race definitely will be the "wild card" race of this year's Chase.

"Things are so tight right now and the competition is so close, it's literally a point or two here and a point or two there that's shaking up the Chase right now," he said. "That race can shake things up in a big way. It can propel you to the lead or bury you. It's one of those races that I kind of look forward to. I've won a couple times there and enjoy it, but I also know what can happen there, too."

### Annett: 'We keep getting better'

Nationwide Series driver Michael Annett tied his career-best finish by running third last Saturday at Dover International Speedway behind race winner Joey Logano and runner-up Paul Menard. But he said this third-place run meant more to him than the one he got earlier this year at Daytona, where the draft and the mad scrambles at the end can produce surprise finishes.

"To get [a third] on a track where you really have to earn it is pretty cool and a testament to our team that we're still getting better," he said. "We didn't level off there and be happy with consistent top 10s; we want these top fives and we just keep getting better."

And he said he's getting close to that breakthrough victory.

"If you get yourself in the first three rows of a late-race restart, then you have a chance for a win and that's what we did," he said. "Obviously we're still looking for that first win, but I just said that we're still getting better while a lot of teams are leveling out."

### Wallace ends top-10 streak

Darrell Wallace had another strong run in the No. 20 Toyota from Joe Gibbs Racing. The Drive for Diversity participant started from the pole at

Dover, his first Nationwide Series pole, but finished 12th, his worst result in four career Nationwide starts.

"Every race we have a car better than where we finish," he said. "I'm the world's worst on restarts."

"I'll figure it out someday, hopefully, so we'll maintain our spot and go forward instead of coming backwards and then going forward."

But he said that overall he was pleased with his performance. "We kept the car in one piece, and we finished the race on the lead lap, but bummed we broke our top-10 streak," he said.

### Busch defends Furniture Row

Kurt Busch, who announced last week that he'll move from James Finch's No. 51 Chevrolet to the No. 78 Furniture Row Chevrolet now driven by Regan Smith, disputed those who have called his move a lateral one.

"That is a slap in the face to [Furniture Row owner] Barney Visser," Busch told reporters at Dover. "He has put together a program that is tiers above ... just different levels of competition above where James Finch is."

He said Finch, who fields cars built and powered by Hendrick Motorsports, is running obsolete equipment. "The No. 51, we are running equipment that is four years old," he said. "It's very obvious to me on why this is not a lateral move."

Busch also said that he expects to work closely with Richard Childress Racing, which supplies cars and engines to Furniture Row Racing.

"You are going to see a No. 29 car, a No. 31, a No. 27 [all Childress entries] and you're going to see a No. 78 work together as one," he said.

Busch is set to take over the No. 78 at Charlotte next week.

### 1. Brad Keselowski 2,142 (finished first)

He stretched his fuel to the finish to win for the second time in three Chase races, but he insists it's still early. "It feels great to win. I'm so proud of my team. But I can't state loudly enough how much longer this battle is," he said.

### 2. Jimmie Johnson -5 (finished fourth)

He had taken command of the race as the laps wound down but had to back off to save fuel, which isn't his strongest suit. "We have a handful of races that come down to [fuel mileage] each year, and we've worked to get better at it," he said.

### 3. Denny Hamlin -16 (finished eighth)

After starting from the pole, he had a car capable of finishing in the top three, but a late-race stop for fuel dropped him down in the running order. Still, he was upbeat about his Chase chances. "There's nothing we can't handle on the race track," he said.

### 4. Clint Bowyer -25 (finished ninth)

He and crew chief Brian Pattie weren't happy after Dover, but Talladega is next, and they like that. "We'll go to Talladega and hopefully shake them up there," Pattie said.

### 5. Tony Stewart -32 (finished 20th)

He was unlucky but still ran better than he usually does at Dover. "I don't know what we've got to do to change our luck, but that's just the story of the day for us," he said.

### 6. Kasey Kahne -32 (finished 15th)

He had plenty of fuel and a fast car at the end, but a mechanical issue followed by a pit road penalty put him three laps down at the end. "We were sitting really good because we had just pitted and topped off [the fuel tank]," he said. "It's too bad whatever it was."

### 7. Dale Earnhardt Jr. -39 (finished 11th)

He had a so-so run, which isn't good enough to win a championship. "Eleventh isn't too bad if you want to run seventh in points, but if you want to try to win the championship ... you are going to have to win races," crew chief Steve Letarte said.

### 8. Martin Truex Jr. -42 (finished sixth)

He started third, faded early and bounced back. "We showed what we were made of, and battled," he said. "We were just off at the beginning of the race."

### 9. Kevin Harvick -46 (finished 13th)

Three straight finishes between 11th and 13th have him more than a full race behind the leader in the points standings. "Our car wasn't very good," he said. "We made some good adjustments, [but] just couldn't make up those two laps."

### 10. Jeff Gordon -48 (finished second)

After hitting the wall because of a stuck throttle at Chicagoland, he's finished third at New Hampshire and second at Dover, but he's lost one point to the leader in that span. "We've got seven more weeks to get it done," he said.

### 11. Greg Biffle -51 (finished 16th)

The points leader at the end of the regular season continues to drop in the standings and needs poor finishes by his competitors. "It's pretty much a stretch for us right now," he said. "We would have to have a lot of help at Talladega and a few other race tracks to try and leapfrog back in."

### 12. Matt Kenseth -72 (finished 35th)

He's a lame duck at Roush Fenway Racing, and his cars keep breaking down on him. At Dover, the rear suspension broke. "Our performance hasn't been very good either," he said.

# One-game wild-card playoffs: Dramatic, but fair?

By sometime Friday night, either Chipper Jones will be out of baseball or the defending World Series champion Cardinals will be out of the playoffs. One and done.

A pair of wild-card matchups — St. Louis at Atlanta, then Baltimore at Texas — to decide which teams advance to the next round. Part of the new, expanded postseason format, where 162 games, six months of grinding and upward of 50,000 pitches get boiled down to nine all-or-nothing innings. Dramatic? Certainly. Fair? Well, depends on who you ask.

"I hate it. I'm old-school. I'm old," Washington manager Davey Johnson said.

At 69, he has a vested interest. His NL East champion Nationals will visit the Cardinals-Braves winner Sunday in Game 1 of the division series.

"I love it," Cleveland closer Chris Perez said. "If you are in it, or watching it as a fan, it doesn't get any more exciting."

Or, as Texas general manager Jon Daniels summed up on the eve of his team's big game: "I'll let you know tomorrow."

Clearly, several sides to this debate. Major League Baseball hoped to get more clubs involved in postseason races, and the Angels, Dodgers, Brewers, Rays and Pirates were among those that enjoyed the chase this year.

There also was some sentiment that wild-card teams were getting it too easy and winning the World Series too often, as the Cardinals did last season. By adding an extra playoff club in each league and then forcing it to play in a winner-take-all game, it could make the path tougher.

That's OK by Cardinals manager Mike Matheny, whose team clinched the majors' final playoff spot this year. "We're ecstatic. We'd be home right now. We'd be spectators, so we're exceptionally happy about the format," he said. "The fact that we have to use up a pitcher, it makes sense to me. I believe the

team that wins the division ought to have an advantage. I think it's been well done," he said.

On the other hand, a club that runs into the wrong pitcher could be eliminated in a hurry.

"I think for teams like Atlanta — who had an unbelievable year, and it could be ruined by one game — it's probably unfair," Washington first baseman Adam LaRoche said.

"Now, in one game, any given day, a college team could beat a big league team. It's just the way the ball rolls. So I don't know how much one game proves as far as who deserves to move on," he said. "You almost have to do it two out of three. But then you get other teams sitting around for a week. So I don't know the right way to do it."

Braves second baseman Dan Uggla isn't a fan.

"I'm not for this new playoff thing at all," he said. "They're kind of messing things up for everybody."

This could be the last game for Uggla's star teammate, with Jones set to retire at age 40.

Orioles All-Star center fielder Adam Jones also is in jeopardy. His team returns to the postseason for the first time since 1997, but could be ousted before it gets a home playoff game.

"I'm sure there are some people in Baltimore that are frustrated. Of course you want Camden Yards rocking," he said.

"This is the situation we put ourselves in. We're happy to be in the situation, and we're going to take full advantage of the opportunity," he said.

This is not the first time a whole season has come down to one game.

Baseball history is filled with thrilling one-game playoffs — the Bucky Dent home run in 1978, Matt Holliday heading home in the 13th inning in 2007, among others. But those came about naturally, tiebreakers forced by final-day developments.

Minnesota's Ron Gardenhire is the only person to manage two one-game division tiebreakers, losing 1-0 to the Chicago White Sox in 2008, then beating Detroit 6-5 in 12 innings the following year.
