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Looking back at a life cut short

Memorial to slain corrections officer is planned.

The night Sgt. Ruben Howard Thomas III died, Bill Brewer was there. He rushed to help, but was struck in the eye with a

heavy metal lock from inside a sock swung by the man who killed his friend.

Thomas was a corrections officer with Columbia Correctional Institution, and Brewer still works as a corrections officer with CCI. Brewer's eye is 75 percent functional after the attack.

Now, almost a year later, Brewer is working to make sure Thomas will not be forgotten. CCI is raising money to build a memorial for Thomas, who was killed by an inmate on March 18, 2012.

"It's a healing process for all of us (who work at CCD)," Brewer said. "It's a way for us to say we are not forgetting."

The memorial will include a flag pole 22 and one-half feet tall. Brewer said Thomas died at 22:30 military time, and the flag pole was deliberately designed to symbolize the time of his death.

The Sgt. Ruben Thomas Memorial will be at the prison's entrance, so it can be seen from U.S. 90.

"No matter where you go, you will see it," Brewer said.

Also, at the memorial there will be a bench and a pedestal monument. Brewer said the memorial committee has decided on the quote to put on the bench. It comes from the Bible, John 15:13.

Cafeteria ransacked at school

A vending machine was damaged and multiple windows shattered at Westside Elementary School early Tuesday when a burglar ransacked the school cafeteria.

A school janitor contacted the sheriff's office Monday morning around 5:30 a.m. after he noticed a window had been broken and the staff dining room was left unlocked, according to a sheriff's office offense report.

When Deputy Archie Crews arrived at the Westside cafeteria, he saw pry marks on the vending

Wins spot on prestigious Parade magazine squad

Laremy Tunsil will be featured in Sunday's edition of magazine.

Columbia High's Laremy Tunsil will become the second Tiger football player in three years to be named to Parade's All-America High School Football Team, which will be released in the Sunday issue of Parade.

Tunsil follows in the footsteps of current Florida State Seminole Timmy Jernigan, who was named to the list as an honorable mention two seasons ago.

The left tackle is considering Alabama, Georgia and Ole Miss for his college

career and will make that decision on Wednesday, which is National Signing Day.

Tunsil is among seven Tigers who will sign commitments to play college football next season, with quarterback Jayce Barber already committed to Jacksonville State University. Joining Tunsil in making a decision on Wednesday will be Darren Burch, Shaq Johnson, Antonio Pelham, Javere Smith and Felix Woods.

ESPN is expected to be in the school's auditorium at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday for the signing.

Columbia head coach Brian Allen was unaware that Tunsil was given the honor until Wednesday afternoon.

"It's the first I'm hearing of it, but just as with the other awards it's a huge honor for the kid, the program and the community

Scott seeks \$1.2B more for schools

Would increase per-student spending by 6.5%, but some lawmakers may not bite.

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Gov. Rick Scott will ask for a \$1.2 billion boost in spending on public schools in the coming year, a move that could set up a clash with the Republican-controlled Legislature but could boost his bid for re-election.

Scott revealed the figure when he outlined his top spending priorities during The Associated Press' 19th annual planning meeting on Wednesday.

His announcement comes a day before the Republican governor is expected to make his 2013 budget recommendations to state legislators. Scott will give additional details on his budget proposal, although it is unlikely that Scott will provide a definitive answer on whether he supports accepting federal aid to expand Medicaid.

The total amount of money that Scott plans to seek for public schools includes his previously announced pitch to give every teacher in the state a \$2,500 pay raise.

Scott — who just two years ago had recommended a cut in education — said that his proposal would boost per-student spending by roughly 6.5 percent.

"Investing in our teachers and in our education system is the key to our state's continued economic growth," Scott said. "We made the hard choices to recover and get back on track — now we must make the smart choices to invest in Florida's future."

Some Democrats called Scott's recommendation an "epiphany" that may be more about his 2014 re-election bid. Scott has battled low poll numbers for most of his time in office.

"He's finally admitting that I was wrong to try to starve education," said Sen. Chris Smith, D-Fort Lauderdale.

House, Senate leaders outline 5-point agenda

TALLAHASSEE — Strengthening ethics and campaign-finance laws and improving Florida's universities are among the goals that Florida House and Senate leaders said Wednesday they've agreed to jointly pursue in the coming legislative session.

House Speaker Will Weatherford and Senate President Don Gaetz, both Republicans, said they also want to phase out pensions that provide defined benefits for public employees and replace them with 401(k)-like personal investment plans.

Finally, they pledged to fix problems such as long voter lines and delayed reporting of results that plagued Florida's general election last year.

Gaetz, of Niceville, and Weatherford, from Wesley Chapel, outlined their five-point agenda in a joint appearance before editors and reporters at the annual legislative planning meeting sponsored by The Associated Press. The 60-day annual session begins March 5.

To drive home how strongly he feels about those issues, Weatherford, the father of three young children, noted that he couldn't finish teaching his 4-year-old daughter to ride her bicycle because he had to attend to his duties in Tallahassee. His wife, though, sent him a video showing her finally riding the bike on her own.

"If I'm going to miss that, we're going to come up here and do real stuff," Weatherford said.

Lindsay Lohan in court again

LOS ANGELES

Lindsay Lohan briefly appeared in court Wednesday for the first time in nearly a year and left with a new attorney, new trial date and new judge.

Superior Court Judge Stephanie Sautner shook her head when she saw Lohan seated with her attorney, just months after the judge had warned the "Liz and Dick" star to grow up and stay out of trouble.

The actress was required to attend the pretrial hearing involving three misdemeanor counts filed after a car crash last summer. Lohan has pleaded not guilty to lying to police, reckless driving and obstructing officers from performing their duties.

Sautner previously sent her to jail, placed her under house arrest and forced her to perform morgue cleanup duty in another case.

Sautner warned Lohan on Wednesday that she could face jail time for a possible probation violation, even if she is acquitted of the counts filed after her sports car crashed into a dump truck.

Lohan was on probation at the time of the wreck and could be sentenced to 245 days in jail if a judge determines her actions in the crash were a violation of her sentence in a theft case.

Lohan's new trial date is March 18.

Lohan was accompanied to court by her new attorney, Mark Heller, who said he wanted to get the case resolved as quickly as possible.

Rihanna on dating Brown: A mistake?

makes her happy and "if it's a mistake, it's my mistake." She adds that she's ready to go public with her singer-boyfriend.

Four years ago, Brown attacked Rihanna and was charged with a felony. But rumors about their relationship emerged after the singers collaborated on songs and appeared in photos together.

Rihanna says she knows that her history with 23-year-old Brown is "not the cutest puzzle in the world." The 24-year-old also vows that Brown is "disgusted" by what he did in the past. She says the two have matured and they "know exactly what we have now, and we don't want to lose that."

Woman faces 351 years in prison

FORT LAUDERDALE — A South Florida woman convicted in an identity theft and tax fraud ring faces a potential maximum prison sentence of 351 years behind bars.

Trial testimony showed that 36-year-old Alci Bonannee of Fort Lauderdale was the leader of a ring that filed some 2,000 fraudulent tax returns over a two-year period. Those fake returns sought about \$11 million tax refunds, some of which was paid.

Prosecutors said Tuesday that Bonannee obtained much of the personal information used in the returns from a nurse at a local hospital.

A jury convicted Bonannee of 33 separate counts including identity theft, wire fraud and conspiracy to defraud the government. B

Two others pleaded guilty and face maximum prison sentences of 10 and 12 years, respectively. Bonannee will likely get less than 351 years.

State to keep custody of boys

HALLANDALE BEACH — Two brothers of a missing baby who is presumed dead will remain in state custody following a custody hearing.

The Florida Department of Children and Families took the boys into state care following the arrests of their parents earlier this month. Britney Sierra and Calvin Melvin are in the Broward County Jail, charged with child neglect in the case of their son, Dontrell Melvin, who was last seen in 2011 when he was six months old.

DCF spokeswoman

Paige Patterson-Hughes told *The Miami Herald* nothing has changed in terms of the boys' custody. Sierra's half siblings who lived in the same house were taken into state care.

Authorities found bones believed to be those of Dontrell in the backyard of a home the couple had rented.

Boys arrested after gun found

NORTH PORT — Police arrested two students at a school in North Port after a gun was found on campus.

The Sarasota Herald-Tribune reports officials were tipped off about the 9 mm handgun when a student told a teacher Tuesday afternoon at Imagine School.

North Port Police Capt. Anthony Sirianni says officials on the school's upper campus — for grades 6 through 10 — confiscated the gun about 3:30 p.m. in 13-year-old's backpack. Sirianni says a 12-year-old had given the gun to the boy.

The boys were arrested and taken to a juvenile justice facility in Sarasota. They are charged with possession of a firearm on school property.

Principal Justin Matthews says the penalty for taking a gun to school is a 10-day suspension and a recommendation for a one-year expulsion.

Deputies shoot burglary suspect

PENSACOLA — Authorities say a man breaking into a Pensacola self-storage business was killed by deputies.

The Escambia County Sheriff's Office reports that 49-year-old Paul Thayer was trying to enter

the business Sunday night when he was confronted by two deputies.

Witnesses say Thayer pulled a gun and fired at the deputies. The deputies returned fire, killing Thayer.

The Pensacola News Journal reports that the shooting remains under investigation.

FBI searches donor's office

WEST PALM BEACH — FBI agents are searching the office of a prominent South Florida political donor.

Authorities could be seen inside the Vitreo-Retinal Consultants Eye Center in West Palm Beach late Tuesday and past midnight Wednesday.

It is the office of Dr. Salomon Melgen, who has been linked to numerous politicians through his contributions.

The FBI did not speak to reporters on the scene. Melgen could not immediately be located for comment.

Motel becomes homeless shelter

VERO BEACH — A landmark Vero Beach motel is finding new life as a homeless shelter.

The 20-room Citrus Motel was foreclosed on and purchased in December for \$360,000. Its buyers are in the midst of renovating the property and hope to reopen it in April as Camp Haven.

Project organizers tell Treasure Coast Newspapers they plan to target newly homeless people to try and intervene before they become chronically homeless.

BUDGET: Schools would get \$1.2 billion more

shows that some of the \$1.2 billion won't necessarily make an impact in the classroom. His recommendations include a nearly \$300 million payment into the state pension plan on behalf of teachers. Scott's recommendation also includes a \$100 million "technology initiative," as well as the money needed to cover increased school enrollment.

It's unclear, however, whether Scott's fellow Republicans will approve a budget that includes his spending priorities. Legislative leaders have already said they are

uneasy with an across-the-board pay raise for teacher salaries. But they also said that while the economy is improving the state does not have an unlimited budget surplus.

"We do have more revenue, our budget surplus is breathing room," House Speaker Will Weatherford said. "It's not enough to put your feet up on the couch."

Scott is expected to announce on Thursday spending reductions in some areas of state spending, including nearly \$100 million in savings realized from changes in state contracts, the elimination of

nearly 932 positions by closing offices, shedding vacant state jobs and reorganizing parts of state government.

But the governor refused to say much on what may be the biggest budget question of the 2013 session: Will the state of Florida accept billions in federal aid to expand Medicaid coverage?

Under President Barack Obama's health care law, Washington would pay 100 percent of the costs of expanding Medicaid from 2014 to 2016. Between 2017 and 2020, the federal share would decrease to 90 per-

cent and the states' contribution would rise in stages to 10 percent, and that's where it would stay.

The law calls for states in 2014 to expand eligibility of Medicaid to those making up to 133 percent of the poverty level, or \$29,326 for a family of four in Florida. The changes would also require adding people who are below the poverty level but not eligible for Medicaid, such as childless adults.

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled last summer that expansion of Medicaid is not mandatory and states can opt out if they choose.

The two leaders' higher education proposals include expanding online learning and offering cash incentives to universities to increase enrollment in fields that offer the best job opportunities to graduates.

The lawmakers said they believe the state can provide high-quality virtual courses to more students at lower cost than traditional classroom attendance.

"Why would we not offer them that in the comfort of their home if that's what they want?" Weatherford asked.

State University System Chancellor Frank Brogan later told reporters and editors that Florida already is a leader in online education but warned that doing it properly doesn't come cheaply. Online professors still must have direct access to students, he said, and universities still need to offer the same support services that traditional students receive.

"It's labor intensive," Brogan said. "It's not what some people believe it is."

Brogan said the way to improve online learning is

for one or several universities working together to lead a statewide effort.

"I love local control, but the fact that we do 30,000 courses and 700 degree programs, while an amazing volume, doesn't address the issue of what quality we should expect, how it's accessible, how it's affordable and how you help provide a support network to make sure people graduate from it," Brogan said.

The legislative leaders want to expand an existing initiative providing Florida's universities \$15 million to increase enrollment in computer technology programs.

Gaetz said it's not just about science, technology, engineering and math programs, known as the STEM fields, that Gov. Rick Scott and other officials have been promoting as a path to higher-paying, high-demand jobs.

The Senate president noted there are differences even among STEM programs. For instance, health information students got jobs faster than meteorology majors.

"Greater love hath no man than this; A man who lays down his life for his friend," will be inscribed on the back of the bench.

Brewer, CCI chair of the memorial and morale committees, said the plan is to dedicate the memorial on March 18, the first anniversary of Thomas's death.

The memorial committee set a budget of \$8,000 for the project, and has been selling commemorative bricks that will allow up to three lines of text for an inscription.

The bricks cost \$35. Brewer said to pay for the monument about 1,800 bricks need to be sold.

As of Wednesday, the memorial committee has collected about 12 percent of the \$8,000, or a little less

than \$1,000.

Sherry Martin, morale committee member and a nurse at CCI, said correctional officers in the prison system has donated their time to help stay within the budget.

She said Darrell Kennington, who works at Union Correctional Institution, will build the flag pole for the memorial, and Sgt. Reginald Lewis "put thoughts onto paper" by creating a conceptual drawing of the memorial.

She said CCI has received support from other prisons across the state, and the one of the goals "was to make it so people could go sit and reminisce."

Brewer said he would like to collect the entire \$8,000 by the end of

February so that the entire monument can be built by March 18 for the dedication.

On Feb. 28, CCI will sponsor the Ruben Thomas Memorial Golf Tournament at the Lake City Country Club, all proceeds from which will help fund the memorial. The tournament will be a four-person scramble, and have a shotgun start. Entry is \$60 per person or \$240 per team. Hole sponsorship costs \$100, or co-sponsorship for \$50.

Any money left over after the construction of the memorial will be put into a trust fund for Thomas's children, Brewer said. Call 292-7127 to contact Brewer about the golf tournament or to buy a brick for the memorial.

machine, but noted it had not been opened.

Inside the main cafeteria room, a window in the northwest corner had been shattered. Also, the left serving line double door window was shattered in the main room, which Crews said appeared to be

the way the burglar entered the kitchen area.

In the kitchen area, the kitchen manager's office window was broken, and the cash drawer was on the floor in front of the manager's desk. There was no money in the cash drawer "before or after the bur-

glary occurred," according to the offense report.

A security camera in the cafeteria captured a "very brief shadowed image of what appeared to be a white male in light colored clothing," Crews said.

The suspect appeared to have cloth material draped

over his head to conceal his face, according to the report.

The report said the scene was processed for fingerprints, and the prints that were recovered were sent to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to be processed.

"He was easy to coach and always listened," Peeler said. "He works hard, was able to quickly pick up the system and understands the game."

The Lake City Reporter tried to reach Tunsil for comment, but phone calls were not immediately returned.

Ethics reform: Get it done

State Sen. Don Gaetz, the reform-minded president of the Florida Senate, comes from a Florida Panhandle county called Okaloosa, a county some now call "Scandal-oosa." Consider that in January, the Okaloosa County tax collector resigned after it was discovered he made public employees work at his private business. In September, a county commissioner was arrested for perjury and official misconduct. Last May, its Tourist Development Council director committed suicide after stealing bed tax and BP settlement money. Two years ago, its hometown speaker of the Florida House resigned after wielding his influence to benefit himself and a political benefactor. That same year, its local college president resigned after accepting public money for a private airport hangar. And in 2009, its sheriff was convicted on federal fraud and money-laundering charges. Sadly, public corruption in Florida is not isolated to Gaetz's mid-sized county, which is why all of Florida should be enormously grateful for his leadership in trying to end it.

Indeed, Florida ranks No. 1 in public corruption. Between 2001 and 2010, federal prosecutors convicted 781 politicians for enriching themselves at the public trough, according to the watchdog group, Integrity Florida.

Two months ago, when he became president of the Florida Senate, Gaetz promised to make a difference. And last week, he scored a big victory in pushing the most sweeping ethics reform law in decades.

The bill that unanimously passed its first committee would:

- Prohibit state lawmakers from voting on bills that would line their pockets. It's hard to imagine this is not already illegal, but it's currently allowed, so long as lawmakers disclose their conflict within 14 days of a vote.
- Prohibit politicians from taking a state government job after their election. Colleges and universities are especially generous in offering six-figure jobs to newly elected lawmakers, hoping their investment brings home the bacon.
- Ban lawmakers from lobbying the governor or the Legislature for two years after leaving office. Just last year, the day after the legislative session ended, the speaker of the House became a lobbyist for companies whose businesses benefited from his votes.
- Prohibit politicians from using political committees for personal expenses. Some lawmakers pay their living expenses from these committees, which can accept — even demand — million-dollar checks from people who want something from government.

The question now is whether the Florida House of Representatives will join the reform effort, or let a good thing die in the horse-trading over its own legislative wants.

For while House Speaker Will Weatherford is supportive of ethics reform, we've yet to see movement from his members, many of whom enjoy the perks of political life and don't want to limit their possibilities.

We, the people who sent Gaetz, and Weatherford and the other members of the Legislature to Tallahassee to represent us, expect the highest standards of ethical conduct.

We applaud Sen. Gaetz — and Weatherford, too — for pushing meaningful ethics reform.

Now, let's get it done.

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
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Disturbing news from D.C.

Eat the snakehead before it eats you

The Chesapeake Bay has a problem, and soon you will, too, unless area residents can eat a certain species of invasive fish into extinction.

Ravenous local humans have come close to eating Chesapeake Bay oysters, blue crabs, rockfish and sturgeon out of existence, but this particular species poses special problems, beginning with its name — the snakehead.

These fish are as ugly as their name sounds, and while they will eat anything, not much will eat them.

Snakeheads have mouths full of nasty teeth, grow to nearly 4 feet long and 15 pounds, and proliferate like crazy. They're native to China and Korea, but turned up in the Washington area only a few years ago when they were discovered in a Maryland pond.

If they don't like their surroundings, they slither overland to more desirable venues, which is evidently how they wound up in the Potomac River and in the Chesapeake.

Environmentalists hope that restaurant patrons will — if not eat snakeheads out of existence — at least gnaw them down to manage-

able numbers. It's proving to be a tough sell.

The legendary hostess Perle Mesta had a simple maxim for filling out the tables at a Washington dinner party: "Hang a lamb chop in the window." Somehow it's hard to believe that hanging a snakehead in the window will exert the same kind of social magic.

The other night, the snakeheads' numerous enemies held their second annual "ProFish Invasive Species Dinner" at a popular local seafood restaurant. (Washington is the kind of town where people turn out for this sort of thing, even at \$125 a plate.)

The chefs did their best to make the snakehead appear appetizing. The Washington Post's reporter described one dish as sliced snakehead marinated in a "tasty" chimichurri sauce, skewered, baked and

served with a sweet-potato chorizo flauta. The coverage included a photo of a man feeding a spoonful to his very unenthusiastic-looking date.

Selling the snakehead is going to be an uphill battle. The Chinese claim great curative powers for snakehead soup, but the Chinese brand has been rather sullied because they claim magical benefits from all sorts of disgusting food products — rhino horn, bear paws, shark fins.

American law prohibits deceptive and dishonest medicinal claims, which pretty much bars the most effective means of eliminating this unwanted fish: "A snakehead a day will make you as randy as a teenager. Rediscover the magic of adolescent hormones through the magic of snakeheads."

Maybe we could enlist Michelle Obama to insist that a tasty slice of snakehead should be part of every nutritious school lunch. Or we could do it the good, old-fashioned American way and serve it to the troops and disaster victims, two groups who don't really have a choice.

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What the new health care law means for Fla.

MIAMI — Florida's Republican lawmakers are reluctantly acknowledging that the Affordable Care Act is the law of the land and are taking steps to determine exactly what that will look like. The Sunshine State has one of the highest numbers of uninsured residents in the country, some of the most stringent eligibility requirements for health care safety nets, a large number of legal immigrants and a proposal to privatize its Medicaid program statewide.

So how will the federal health overhaul impact that? There are still a lot of unanswered questions, perhaps the biggest being whether Gov. Rick Scott will expand Florida's Medicaid rolls. The Republican governor was a vocal opponent of so-called "Obamacare" but softened his stance after the November election. He remains wary of the increased cost a Medicaid expansion could bring to Florida taxpayers and has been accused of playing politics with numbers after he referenced figures showing costs could be as high as \$26 billion over a decade. The state health agency later revised that figure to \$3 billion.

Florida lawmakers are also playing catch-up because the Legislative session is not convening until March, after or very close to federal deadlines.

Here are some questions and answers about how the Affordable Care Act could play out in Florida.

Q: How many Floridians are uninsured and how many of those are projected to get insurance under the exchange?

A: Florida had the nation's third-highest rate of residents without health insurance during the past three years, according to Census data. It also has some of the most stringent eligibility requirements in the country for Medicaid. A family of three with income of \$11,000 a year makes too much to qualify and single residents are not covered.

Nearly 1 million people are estimated to take advantage of the state exchange, including residents who are employed and the unemployed. Many would be eligible for federal subsidies to help pay for it.

Q: How many people Floridians are currently served by Medicaid and how many more will be served if lawmakers choose Medicaid expansion?

A: Florida's Medicaid program currently costs more than \$21 billion a year, with the federal government picking up roughly half the tab. It covers nearly 3 million people — about half are children — and consumes about 30 percent of the state budget. About 900,000 more residents could be covered if Florida decides to expand its Medicaid rolls.

Q: Is it true that U.S.-born residents below the poverty line will not be able to get coverage in the exchanges but legal immigrants below the poverty line will be able to get coverage through the exchanges?

A: Yes. The Affordable Care Act assumes that states would expand Medicaid coverage, so the only provision for a subsidy below 100 percent of the federal poverty level is for aliens who are in the country legally but are ineligible for Medicaid because of their alien status.

That means if Florida does not expand its Medicaid rolls, only legal immigrants, but not citizens, would be eligible for subsidies under the exchange.

A spokeswoman for Gov. Scott has said he is

concerned over "how legal immigrants and U.S. citizens are treated differently under the president's healthcare law, which we continue to learn more about."

Q: How many small businesses are likely to take advantage of the health insurance offered on the state exchange?

A: Many small business owners are still in wait and see mode. Florida led the country in challenging the constitutionality of the Affordable Care Act, but the Supreme Court upheld it. That's left Florida scrambling at the 11th hour to make decisions about how the state wants to implement the law and many unanswered questions.

With little guidance from lawmakers, many small business owners don't

want "to jump right into an exchange environment because they don't know what to expect," said Jon Urbanek, a senior vice president with Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida.

Urbanek said about 50 percent of the small businesses his company talked with initially indicated they would opt out and pay a penalty for not providing coverage. But as Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida is working with employers, that number has fallen below 20 percent, he said.

He also anticipated between 15 to 18 percent of small businesses will stop offering health coverage and allow their employees to seek their own individual coverage under an exchange.

Q: How is the exchange going to be set up in Florida

and which agency will be responsible for overseeing it?

A: Florida has three options. It can run the exchange itself, partner with federal health officials or allow federal officials to run the program entirely. At this point, Florida has defaulted into allowing the feds to run the program because leaders missed key deadlines, but the door is still open for lawmakers

to consider a partnership or run the program themselves in the future.

The Department of Children and Families currently determines Medicaid eligibility and the Agency for Health Care Administration oversees the program.

Q: How much money has Florida received so far from the federal government to do the initial work in setting up an exchange?

A: Florida was awarded \$1

million in a planning grant in 2010, but never drew down the funds so they expired in 2011, according to federal health officials.

Q: How will the changes under the Affordable Care Act effect Florida's plans to privatize Medicaid statewide?

A: In an effort to cut costs, Florida lawmakers passed sweeping legislation in 2011 to privatize Medicaid. Rather than having government insurance, patients would be assigned to for-profit insurance companies, which would receive a per-person fee from the state and decide what services and prescriptions to cover. But the state is still waiting on the federal government to sign off on the proposal. If Gov. Scott decides to expand Medicaid, the 900,000 new recipients would get their Medicaid coverage under the privatized system.

Q: How will Florida residents access the exchange and what kind of customer support will be offered?

A: Regardless of who runs the exchange, making sure that Floridians have ample guidance in selecting a plan is a key priority. Federal health officials are launching a website with chat capabilities and a 24 hour call center. Individual health companies will also offer their own customer support. Some health plans will have walk-in storefronts and mall kiosks for customers to talk to someone in person.

Rivalry rematch

Columbia, Fort White meet tonight

The headlines last time read that it was a "hoops hurting" for Columbia High after the Indians of Fort White defeated the Tigers, 74-53 on Dec. 17.

This time, Columbia head coach Horace Jefferson will have his team back at full throttle and is hoping to reverse the outcome.

Columbia played without its leading scorer, Morris Marshall, after he rolled his ankle at school on the day of the game.

Jefferson didn't make excuses after the game for missing his points leaders, but he hopes Marshall can give the Tigers a boost this time around.

"We missed his points, but that did not cost us the game," Jefferson said after the initial contest. "I thought we had enough firepower, but Fort White just outplayed us. They got every loose ball and we made poor decisions. We didn't compete like we should have."

Fort White was also missing a player as Trey Phillips was competing in an all-star game.

This time, both players are expected to compete.

Jefferson hopes having his guy will make a difference.

"We hope that Marshall is a big factor," Jefferson said. "I hope he makes the difference."

But Jefferson also called out one of his other leaders in point guard Javontaé Foster, who he expects to have a bounce-back game against the Indians after being shut out in the last contest.

"Foster didn't score and I anticipate a different game from him," Jefferson said. "I think that he's going to play good."

Jefferson said the two, along with Tre Simmons, which make up the Tigers' "Big 3," have Columbia playing as well as they have all season.

"I think we're playing as good as we have all year and that's the way you want to be playing at this point," Jefferson said. "I think it will make for an interesting matchup."

Jefferson believes there are two keys for the Tigers to come out on top this time.

"We have to either outrun them or slow them down," Jefferson said. "We

have to be able to handle their pressure. They're great at creating turnovers and last time we didn't take care of the ball."

Last time, the Tigers were led by Dekarry Rossin with 16 points. Although Jefferson appreciated his points inside, he was quick to point out that Rossin shouldn't be the Tigers' leading scorer.

"Our offense doesn't run through Rossin and he gets most of his points on put-backs," Jefferson said. "If he's leading us in scoring it isn't a good thing, because that means we're missing a lot of shots. On the opposite side of that, it means we had a presence inside."


Missing long jumpers won't help the Tigers and plays into the game of Fort White according to Jefferson.

"They have a tendency to release guys," he said. "We have to be aware of that. It's going to sound crazy, but our perimeter players must be aware of what they need to do on defense while they're playing offense. Fort White gets a lot of their points by beating other teams down the court. They create turnovers and their good in transition and on fast breaks."

Since making a move to the starting lineup, Jefferson has continually singled out Akeem Williams as being a big key on the defensive side. The coach believes that Williams will play a pivotal role in tonight's matchup.

Which brother wins?

NEW ORLEANS — The San Francisco 49ers never have tasted defeat in a Super Bowl, going 5-0. It's the most impressive mark for any franchise in the big game.

Baltimore also is undefeated, with the Ravens winning their only appearance, in 2001.

Someone will have the Super Bowl blahs for the first time after Sunday's title game in the Superdome.

The Ravens (13-6), who are 3 1/2-point underdogs, are on one of those runs reminiscent of recent NFL champions. Indeed, the New York Giants reached the Super Bowl a year ago in a similar manner, winning a wild-card game at home, then two playoffs on the road, including an overtime thriller.

The Giants got healthy down the stretch, something the Ravens have replicated, particularly on defense where star linebackers Ray Lewis and Terrell Suggs are giving vintage performances following injury-shortened seasons.

"I believe we have found a way to believe in each other, and nothing else matters," said Lewis, who will retire after the game. "That is one thing about our sideline. When we are on our sideline, there is only one thing that matters, when this game ends, we will be victorious. That's what's

been our road, no matter who's been up, who's been down, who's been hurt, who's been injured."

Baltimore's path to New Orleans led through New England, where the Ravens fell to the Patriots in last year's AFC title game. But they outscored the Patriots 21-0 in the second half to earn their spot in the Super Bowl.

San Francisco (13-4-1) also came up one win short a year ago, losing to the Giants for the NFC championship. That defeat has driven the 49ers just as much as the Ravens' failure in 2011 lifted them.

These Niners are built around a physical, stingy defense — that also has been the Ravens' persona for years, although not as much in 2012 as in Lewis' other 17 pro seasons. Linebacker Patrick Willis, who like Lewis wears No. 52 and is a perennial All-Pro, is the anchor.

"As a kid, you grew up watching," Willis said. "Just to have the opportunity to be able to play in this game given my first four years (out of the playoffs), we were at home at this time watching other teams play. Last year to be able to game away. To be able to be here, is truly special."

To make it extra special, San Francisco's offense will need to outdo Baltimore's. The Ravens have scored 90 points in three games, and the Niners have 73 in two.

Baltimore's defense has

made big plays against Andrew Luck, Peyton Manning and Tom Brady. Now it gets an entirely different type of quarterback, Colin Kaepernick. His combination of running skill, powerful arm and surprising cool for a second-year pro makes him particularly dangerous against the Ravens. Baltimore does not have the fastest defense in the league.

Then again, the 49ers must deal with Joe Flacco, the only QB to win a post-season game in each of his first five seasons. Flacco also has six road playoff victories, a league record.

He's also outplayed Brady, the most successful quarterback of the last dozen seasons, in two straight AFC title games.

But he has his critics because this is his first Super Bowl trip in five tries.

"I think there is definitely a part of all of us that hear things and when somebody doubts what you want to do, you definitely go show them that they may be wrong," he said.

While the Ravens and 49ers play for each other, the Harbaugh brothers will go against each other in the first Super Bowl featuring sibling head coaches. They've had fun with the topic this week, but it will be as serious as football can get on Sunday.

Ravens: Lewis report won't be a distraction

NEW ORLEANS — The Baltimore Ravens don't intend to let the controversy surrounding linebacker Ray Lewis become a distraction in their preparation for the Super Bowl.

An article in Sports Illustrated said Lewis sought help from a company that says its deer-antler spray and pills contain a banned product connected to human growth hormone.

"We can't let that distract us from our one true mission, winning the Super Bowl," Baltimore running back Ray Rice said Wednesday, shortly before the Ravens hit the practice field to prepare for Sunday's game against the San Francisco 49ers.

Minutes earlier, Lewis said he "never, ever" used performance-enhancing drugs in his effort to return from a torn right triceps. He also distanced himself from Sports With Alternatives To Steroids (SWATS).

The Ravens are standing behind the 37-year-old Lewis, who sat out 12 weeks before returning to fuel the Ravens' playoff run. He will end his 17-year career after the Super

Bowl.

"Ray is an awesome guy and we're here to play football. We don't even want to give that (report) any merit," Baltimore guard Bobbie Williams said. "It's kind of sad that they would try to discredit a guy who's done so much and been such a big influence not only to this team but the National Football League. Here we are just a couple of days away from the Super Bowl and they try to do this right here. We just really want to just stay away from that."

Coach John Harbaugh also backed Lewis, saying, "He told me there's nothing to it. He's told us in the past, he's told us now, that he's never taken any of that stuff, ever. And I believe Ray."

So do Lewis' teammates.

"No one has not passed a test and no one has tested positive for anything, so it's all speculation," linebacker and special teams standout Brendon Ayanbadejo said. "There's information and disinformation. If you have a little intelligence you can dissect it and keep it moving."

The 49ers also find the story hard to believe.

"I don't think Ray would take any substance," San

Francisco tight end Vernon Davis said.

Lewis and the Ravens have been taught not to take any medication or drug without first getting the OK from the league or the team's training staff.

"I will run everything by my trainers to make sure it's legal by the NFL," cornerback Corey Graham said. "As an NFL player and a professional athlete, you do try a lot of stuff. I'm not going to sit here and say you don't. But you do have to run it by your trainers and people who know what's legal and not legal before you try it."

Linebacker Paul Kruger said he learned of the league's policy on drugs during his first season in the NFL.

"If there is something you're interested in taking, you have to make sure it's cleared and OK," he said. "From what I recall from the rookie symposium, the best way is to take it to the trainer and see what they think."

Williams said if he is interested in taking something, he'll check with the NFLPA.

"They run it for banned substances and have people there for us to check everything," Williams said.

Latest A-Rod troubles have team frustrated

NEW YORK — Alex Rodriguez was speaking on a conference call.

"A huge debacle," he said. "Distasteful."

That was on Dec. 13, 2007, when he re-signed with the New York Yankees and was discussing his decision 1 1/2 months earlier to become a free agent.

Now those words describe how some in the team's front office feel about A-Rod's \$275 million, 10-year contract.

Once considered a player who could shatter the career home run record, Rodriguez has transformed from All-Star to annoyance for some in the Yankees organization. He hasn't played a full season since he was voted his third AL MVP award in 2007, he's out for at least the first half of this year following hip surgery on Jan. 16 and now he's been accused of again receiving performance-enhancing drugs — an allegation he denies.

Even before the charges were published Tuesday by the alternative weekly Miami New Times along with accusations against Melky Cabrera, Nelson Cruz, Gio Gonzalez, Bartolo Colon and Yasmani Grandal, some Yankees executives were wishing Rodriguez would just go away. Speaking on condition of anonymity because

the team isn't publicly commenting on A-Rod's latest troubles, they revealed their frustration with the slugger.

And they have a big incentive for A-Rod to disappear. If he doesn't play again due to a career-ending injury, about 85 percent of the \$114 million he's owed by the team would be covered by insurance, according to one of the executives who spoke on condition of anonymity.

New York also might be able to free itself from having the \$27.5 million average annual value of Rodriguez's contract count in its luxury tax payroll in each of the next five seasons, a key factor as the Yankees try to get under the \$189 million threshold in 2014.

If Rodriguez is on the disabled list, his contract is included. But if he's on the voluntary retired list, it would not be part of the total.

And if the Yankees fall under that \$189 million benchmark, their luxury

tax rate would drop from its current 50 percent to 17.5 percent for 2015. That would give them far more flexibility to pursue pitchers Clayton Kershaw, Felix Hernandez and Justin Verlander if they become free agents following the 2014 season.

New York is not likely to be able to void A-Rod's deal. Baseball's drug agreement between management and the players' association specifies the commissioner's office has all disciplinary authority for violations.

A-Rod's poor health, however, may provide the path to savings for the team.

While Rodriguez rebounded from right hip surgery in March 2009 to help the Yankees to their first World Series title since 2000, Dr. Bryan Kelly said recovery from his operation on A-Rod's left hip this month will be more complex if for no other reason than it receives more stress because Rodriguez is a right-handed hitter.
