Gaming figures donated \$1M

Politicians' campaign chests benefited from Internet cafe money.

TALLAHASSEE — The key players behind a purported veterans charity accused of setting up

illegal gambling rooms pumped more than \$1 million into the campaign accounts of politicians who had the power to regulate or put them out of business.

As the untaxed, barely regulated industry mushroomed into a billion-dollar industry, money went to the campaigns of governors in Florida and North Carolina as well as dozens of state legislators, and state political parties.

"They certainly were involved in the process there's no doubt about that," said Florida House Speaker Will Weatherford, who himself received a \$500 check from one of the companies involved.

An Associated Press review of contributions showed more than \$1 million went into Florida campaign accounts from 2009-2012 and more than \$150,000 in North Carolina.

Allied Veterans of the World ran nearly 50 Internet parlors in Florida with computerized slot machine-style games and gave about \$6 million to veterans out of nearly \$300 million in profits. Investigators said much of the money went to charity leaders, who spent much of it on boats, beachfront condos and vehicles

Redacting documents causes delays

Many counties find complying with law to be burdensome.

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Florida now requires public records to be cleared of any personal information, such as Social Security numbers, before they are released, but Columbia County Clerk of Circuit Court still has

delays processing requests more than a year after the new law took affect.

It isn't alone. The Associated Press investigated all of the state's 67 counties and their respective courts to see whether each agency is complying with the law and how much of a delay doing so is causing in the release of information. The project, under the direction of the Florida Society of News Editors, was done in conjunction with this

year's Sunshine Week, an annual initiative to promote greater transparency in government.

Since Florida enacted the new law, records clerks must search every public document for personal information, such as credit card and bank account numbers, names of minors and Social Security numbers.

In many counties, the task has caused delays in the release of

House passes Porter bill

Landlord-tenant measure approved on a 78-38 vote.

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State law governing landlords and tenants may soon be simplified and all components of the law brought together in one statute, said a local state representative Porter who moved the bill in the state House of Representatives.

House Bill 77 passed 78-38 on Wednesday.

Porter said the laws governing landlords and tenants are spread across multiple statutes and are difficult to understand. House Bill 77 would change that.

Buble not worried about album sales

LOS ANGELES Michael Buble has sold millions of albums, but as he readies the release of his newest project, he's less concerned with his future sales, thanks to his wife's pregnancy.

"I'm nervous and excited, and truly I think it's given me great perspective," the singer said at the music video shoot for his new single, "It's a Beautiful Day."

"I used to worry about how the single would do and how the record would sell. And the truth is, I love this record. I'm so proud of it. But, at the end of the day, if it sells 10 million or 10 copies, I've got bigger fish to fry," he continued. "I've got a wife and a kid I love very much."

Buble married Argentine actress Luisana Lopilato in 2011. They announced in January they're expecting their first child, and his publicist confirmed Thursday the couple are expecting a son.

Most of Buble's albums have reached multiplatinum status, and his last three releases have hit No. 1 on the Billboard 200 albums chart, including the triple platinum "Christmas," the second best-selling album of 2011 behind Adele's "21."

His new album, "To Be Loved," will be released April 23. It finds the Grammy winner covering songs by the Bee Gees, Dean Martin and Elvis Presley, as well as collaborating with Reese Witherspoon. It also features four original songs, including a tribute to his wife called "Close Your Eyes."

"It's a Beautiful Day" is about a man who is happy because his failing romantic relationship has finally ended. So who inspired the song?

"Harry Styles," the 37-year-old Buble replied jokingly, referring to the One Direction band member who dated Taylor Swift.

Ed Asner of 'Lou Grant' released from hospital

LOS ANGELES — Ed Asner's publicist says the 83-year-old actor is out of a Chicago-area hospital after being diagnosed with exhaustion.

Publicist Charles Sherman says Asner was released Thursday and plans to fly home to Los Angeles. He likely will postpone some performances of his touring one-man stage show.

On Tuesday night, Asner was taken off the stage in Gary, Ind., and went by ambulance to the unidentified hospital.

Asner just completed filming several episodes of the TV series "The Glades" in Florida. He's been on a national tour portraying President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in the

play "FDR" for more than three years.

Asner is best known for his roles in TV's "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and its spinoff, "Lou Grant."

Current TV, Olbermann settle their legal dispute

Man found guilty in fatal robbery

TAMPA — A man accused of killing two Tampa Police officers has been convicted in another, unrelated fatal shooting.

A jury found 27-year-old Dontae Morris guilty Wednesday of first-degree murder and attempted robbery. He faces a mandatory life sentence.

Authorities say Morris killed 42-year-old Rodney Jones outside the Cotton Club in West Tampa on May 31, 2010. Officials say that one month after that incident, Morris shot and killed officers Jeffrey Kocab and David Curtis. Prosecutors are seeking a death sentence in that case. Morris also faces separate murder trials in the killings of Harold Wright and Derek Anderson.

The jurors in the current trial were selected from Orlando because too many potential jurors in Tampa were aware that Morris is also awaiting trial in the four other slayings.

Man drunk-dials 911, lands in jail

ST. PETERSBURG — A 51-year-old Florida man got a trip to jail for drunk-dialing 911.

Pinellas County deputies didn't find an emergency when they arrived at Gary Alan Pockrandt's home near St. Petersburg on Wednesday morning. Pockrandt had called 911 twice, telling dispatchers his cell phone wasn't working.

Authorities weren't amused when Pockrandt called 911 again three hours later and told the dispatcher that his drug dealer was mad at him.

reports Pockrandt was cooperative the first time deputies came to his house. But he was combative when they arrived after the third 911 call. An arrest report noted he was intoxicated.

Pockrandt is being held in jail on \$150 bail. He's charged with misuse of the 911 system.

Officer kills man in patrol car

MIAMI — Authorities say a Miami-Dade police officer fatally shot a man who tried to run officers over with their patrol car.

The officers were responding to a call Tuesday night that a suspicious person was looking inside parked vehicles. When the officers confronted 44-year-old Juan Luis Rodriguez, he was not able to give a plausible reason for why he was looking inside the cars.

The Miami Herald reports that the officers tried to handcuff Rodriguez, but he broke away and got into their police cruiser. Police say Rodriguez tried to run the officers over, and one officer shot and killed him.

Rodriguez already had an open probation war-

rant from 2008 for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Man calls 911 after setting fire

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Authorities say a convicted arsonist called 911 to report his neighbor's house was on fire and then sat in his yard, drinking beer as fire consumed the house.

The Volusia County Sheriff's Office received a 911 call about the fire in the New Smyrna Beach house early Wednesday. Sheriff's spokesman Brandon Haught said James Bates told the dispatcher "the flames are going silly now."



The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports an investigation by the sheriff's office, the State Fire Marshal's Office and bloodhounds led to Bates, who was convicted in a series of arsons in 2012.

He faces first-degree arson and violation of probation charges.

records that are available to the public under Florida's public records laws. Prior to Jan. 1, 2012, record custodians were not required to redact any personal information in court cases.

"Look at it this way, if it were your personal information, you wouldn't want it handed out over the counter," said the Columbia County Clerk of Court P. Dewitt Cason.

Since last year, every file, even those already automatically redacted by computer software, has to be checked for personal information, said Pat Perry, chief deputy of Columbia County Clerk of Circuit Court.

Delays in getting the court records can prevent information about cases from being released in a timely manner. This is important not only to the media, but to individuals and businesses that need quick access to cases they wish to learn about.

In order to test the effect of the new requirement, representatives from 31 news organizations requested to view the hard copies of two civil cases and two criminal cases in all 67 counties. The criminal cases were generally a week-old and six-months old, as were the civil cases. Requests for 268 records were made.

According to the investigation, there was a delay in retrieving the records in just over half of the counties - whether it was because personal information needed to be redacted, because the file wasn't yet in the clerk's office or because the file couldn't be found.

Although Florida's public records laws don't spell out how long it should take to retrieve a record, the courts have ruled that a record should be produced in no more time than it takes to retrieve the record and review and redact exempt information, said attorney Jon Kaney, who has chaired the Florida Bar's media law committee.

However, Perry said the law has caused delays in filling public records requests, mainly because the Columbia County Clerk of Circuit Court office is understaffed. Each court department — civil cases, small claims, etc. — is staffed by only one person, who is responsible for all the work.

"That's what causes the delay," she said. "We don't have the staff members to devote only to redacting."

Not all files are on record at the local Circuit Court, some have to be ordered from its storage facility. Regardless of whether the record is imaged on the electronic software or retrieved as a hard copy from storage, each page must be examined for personal information.

Perry said redacting can take between 15 minutes to several days depending on the length of the document.

Columbia County records moved to electronic imaging approximately three years ago. Since then, public records are scanned daily.

Even with electronic files, there is still a certain amount of manpower required to search for and redact the document. Cason said the custodians must double-check the work of the automated redacting system.

Despite the redaction requirement, Social Security numbers were left in the files retrieved by the Associated Press in Calhoun, Columbia, Gilchrist, Hardee and Hernando counties.

"As long as you have a human element — people — involved there's always a small possibility that an error will occur," Cason said. "But we're doing our best to make sure that it doesn't happen again."

"(Owners) that might only have one or two rentals and also tenants that don't have a lot of access to legal council will be able to go to one place and know exactly what their rights and responsibilities are," Porter said.

Porter said State Sen. Kelli Stargel, R-Lakeland, proposed the bill in the Senate this year, and had fought for the bill in 2012. The bill died before it came to a vote in the Senate last year.

"This was originally her bill last year," Porter said. "... I do know it was moving through (the Senate) this year."

Porter said the process of a bill coming to the floor takes time, and sometimes is complicated. The bill has to be drafted, and put into "legalese." Then, the bill must pass through committees before finally

making it to the floor.

The bill must be read three times and all the representatives are given the chance to ask questions. Porter said she must have done a good job explaining the bill, because on the third reading there was no debate.

"We don't want it to be too easy (for a bill to become law)," Porter said. "We have enough of them as it is."

such as Maseratis, Ferraris and Porsches.

The operations were shut down this week and nearly 60 people were arrested. Jennifer Carroll, Florida's Republican lieutenant governor, abruptly resigned after being questioned by investigators. Carroll did consulting work for Allied Veterans while she was a state legislator. She was not charged with any wrongdoing.

Undercover law enforcement agents fanned out in the beginning of 2012 to conduct investigations of 44 Allied Veterans locations, according to an Internal Revenue Service affidavit

filed in federal court.

The agents labeled the parlors "Internet casinos," saying employees urged them to pay more to gamble to win the biggest prizes. According to the IRS, that violates a Florida law saying any sweepstakes game couldn't have different levels of prizes for those who made donations and those who did not.

One undercover agent who took the employees' advice to bet higher amounts won more than \$630 in a single spin in December 2011 at an Allied Veterans site in Lake City.

A review of Florida contribution records showed

several people arrested donated to state politicians, as did the Oklahoma-based software company that worked with Allied. In addition, many of the more than 100 companies linked to the Jacksonville attorney who has been accused of masterminding the racketeering scheme also made contributions.

In Florida, a large chunk

went to the two political parties: The Republican Party of Florida received nearly \$300,000, while the Florida Democratic Party has received in excess of \$100,000.

Money was also given to many top Republican politicians as well as legislators who have been deeply involved with the future of gaming in the state.

"Right now we have 21 teams," said Svetlana Zhavoronkova, CARC executive director. "We still registering teams and also people can go to the bowling alley and register their team and pay on the day of the event. The bowling alley has 16 lanes, and we have 10 teams for one session and 11 teams for the other session, so we're open for people to come in."

Proceeds raised during the event go toward services provided by CARC.

CARC-Advocates for Citizens with Disabilities is a private, nonprofit organization that provides services for citizens with physical and mental disabilities. The organization serves 40 clients and each requires different types of services.

The two major services provided by CARC which use the bowl-a-thon proceeds are adult day training and the organization's group home.

"Those are our two main allocations where we spend all of our contributions from the community," Zhavoronkova said, noting nine residents live in the group home. The organization also has clients who use employment support services and in-home support services.

Zhavoronkova said sev-

eral local businesses have contributed door prizes for the fundraiser, including some companies that are making their first contributions to the event as sponsors.

"We really appreciate the donations from local businesses because they give the contributions no matter how they suffer," she said. "In this economy every single company in our town suffers too, but they still find something they can contribute to us, and that's very important."

CARC has experienced budget cuts from the state government in the past few years and the slow economy has taken a toll on its services and funding.

"We had an increase in the minimum wage of 45 percent since 2005 and a decrease in our rate of funding for services of about 40 percent since 2005, and we have to make up the difference," Zhavoronkova said, noting the fundraiser helps with that.

"Every fundraiser for us is special," she said. "Everything we do is special. The 21 teams we have is more than we had last year. This is the biggest fundraiser we have. We want everybody to come and have fun. It's a really fun time."

Celebrate sunshine

Sunshine Week, the annual celebration of open government in America, is a good time to reflect on the freedoms we are afforded in our nation – and an even better time to expand on them.

This week the Florida Senate took final steps toward passage of SB 50, the long-awaited “right-to-speak” bill.

The measure, along with its House companion, HB 23, guarantees the one thing Florida’s Sunshine Law doesn’t: The right to be heard at public meetings.

The right to listen quietly we already have.

But some places in Florida, with help from the courts, have suppressed the rights of citizens to speak at public gatherings of elected or appointed officials.

Sen. Joe Negron, R-Palm City, hopes to change that on his third try.

Negron filed near-identical bills in two previous legislative sessions but fell short both times.

This time around he’s well on his way.

Senate Bill 50 cleared its final committee hurdle Tuesday and could come to a vote in the full Senate early next week.

Sunshine Week ends Saturday, but eventual passage of the right-to-speak bill would be a fine, if belated, way to celebrate.

Corporations save the day

Despite diatribes to the contrary, American corporations include multitudes that are tough-minded, occasionally brilliant and manifestly capable, a major reason the stock market is not just alive and well, but downright perky.

That’s worth a grin, as is the somewhat misleading decline in the unemployment rate. But don’t suppose the government can’t change that to a frown, even wailing and gnashing of teeth. It’s trying right now.

Corporations have not had an easy go of it in either the past recession or a recovery in which federal wizards aimed to spend us out of trouble, thereby spending us into danger. Yet even with the worry of catastrophic debt default, the coming of the ultra-burdensome Affordable Care Act – “Obamacare” – and still other regulatory death-traps, any number of corporations big and small have managed to earn credible profits.

One means was cutting costs, and one way of accomplishing that end was to do more with less labor, horrifying many on the left. They think that, instead of increasing efficiency in hard times, businesses should convert to welfare agencies. Many, of course, would then go out of business, or at the least perform abysmally. Brave, bold profits, on the other hand, set them up for a sterling future of expansion and – let’s all say hallelujah – hiring sprees.

Investors see this, they begin to have hope where there was

very little, they invest more, stock prices go up and the left sneers. The supposition, as economically uninformed as it is ideologically inspired, is that the stock market is just a way for the rich to get richer.

The actuality is that about half of all Americans have stock investments, and whether the stocks are individually owned or, say, part of a union pension fund, owners profit when stocks grow in value. If that pension fund is for government workers, some taxpayers get off a hook or two. When investments by nonprofit groups do well, they can provide more services to the needy. As their value goes up and they get more capital, businesses can provide more goods, services, tax revenue and occupations that put money in pockets and not infrequently do something that too often gets lost in the discussion. Jobs can add purpose to human lives.

Of course, it wasn’t just corporate character and cleverness that led to the latest rise in stocks, but a number of other factors, not the least of which was the Federal Reserve and its easy money policies. Though those policies help boost stock prices, they also threaten runaway inflation. If you think the Federal

Reserve is always a lifeguard and never an anchor tied to a swimmer’s foot, think again. Easy money helped drag us into a recession along with crony capitalism and federal policies that prompted people to buy houses they could not afford. There’s little that big, bad Wall Street did wrong that was not abetted by big, bad government.

The other cheering news of the moment is that unemployment is down to 7.7 percent of those seeking work. The heart palpitates at a slower speed when we realize we got there in large part because of ever fewer people seeking work. That’s not all there is to it – the construction industry is growing again and 236,000 jobs were created last month – but vast numbers have retreated in the battle to secure employment.

The cure is really, truly vigorous economic growth that we can only instigate and sustain if the administration quits handling the politics of overspending by exaggeration, trickery and blatant insincerity. At some point, we need seriousness about long-term reductions of a debt that could turn our world upside down.

In the meanwhile, the free citizenry and a private sector of amazing energy and ingenuity are edging us in the right direction. The government obstructs, but we the people keep doing our best to overcome.

Deficits falling – maybe

There is nothing better for a bad federal budget than a good economy, and the recovering U.S. economy is beginning to work its magic on the federal deficit, which has been in the \$1 trillion-plus range the last four years.

The Associated Press says, “For once, the government’s financial shape is actually improving and will get better still over the next few years as the U.S. economy continues to pull itself slowly out of the worst recession since the 1930s.”

That “for once” is a little unfair because from 1993 to 1997 the federal deficit, the excess of spending over revenues, fell by more than \$230 billion to around \$21 billion – itself the lowest in over 20 years – before going into the black for the first time in nearly 30 years.

That happy state of affairs lasted four years, until 2002, and the first round of the George W. Bush tax cuts. The federal budget numbers look so impressive, so orderly, so definitive in the annual White House budget office but it’s an open secret in Washington that these numbers are just informed guesses often based on improbable assumptions. For example, the number

crunchers are required to assume that Congress will actually do what it says it will.

The Bush White House mistakenly believed it was dealing with a 10-year surplus of more than \$5 trillion. Then came a second round of tax cuts. The Bush mantra was “we’re going to put some extra money in your pocket,” neglecting to mention that the money would have to be borrowed.

Then we fought a costly and, as it turned out, unnecessary war in Iraq and are still fighting a second one in Afghanistan, neither of them paid for. One wonders what the response would have been if the government had asked the voters: “We feel for the good of the country we have to invade Iraq. How much more in taxes are you willing to pay to have us do that?”

And finally there was the prescription drug benefit, whose numbers were greatly fudged to get it through Congress. That wasn’t paid for either.

We might have survived that fiscal recklessness if the economy hadn’t tanked in the worst recession since the Great Depression. The loss of tax revenue and the huge amounts of federal money spend to stop the bleeding drove us deep into the hole and now we’re slowly starting to climb out as the economy picks up.

The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office predicts the deficit will drop to \$845 billion this year, and, the CBO says, even if Congress does nothing the deficit will drop to \$430 billion by 2015, about what it was in 2008 as the economy began to crater.

But then the fiscal good news runs out and absent higher taxes, cuts in the rate of increase in Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid or a wholly improbably growth spurt in the economy, we will be back where we started. Not a good place to be.

City man arrested after threats incident

A Lake City man was arrested for allegedly assaulting his stepdaughter with a deadly weapon and resisting arrest early Thursday morning.

The Columbia County Sheriff's Office responded to a disturbance on Cypress Lake Road at 12:29 a.m., Lora Meadows said

Unfinished projects, broken promises and lack of growth result in seriously damaged relationships. Procrastination even takes a toll on our health: ignore that symptom or avoid a check-up long enough and there could be trouble. What are you

"putting off", and what could it possibly cost you? Proverbs 27:1 brings a healthy perspective:

"Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring forth."

When we procrastinate, we are "boasting" that we have the right to a tomorrow, (a tomorrow without it's own set of struggles), and the truth is, we may not. We also are giving ourselves an excuse not to deal with things that are causing harm today. Problem is, the longer we leave it, the more damage it will cause. Last, but not least, we are developing a bad habit that can become a way of life. Hebrews 3:7-8 gives us the cure: "Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts ..." "Hear" in this passage implies more than just listening. It means to attend to; to consider what is or has

been said. "Harden" in the original Greek actually translates "to become stubborn." In the south, we might say it like this, "Don't be so hard-headed, for cryin' out loud, and tend to what needs tending!"

Let's not put off till tomorrow what really needs to be tended to today, for there is much to lose, and our hearts ... well, they really do matter.

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James becomes a believer

“What did it take for James, the half-brother of Jesus, to become a believer?” the speaker asked his audience. That is a great question. So let’s meditate upon this.

Early in His ministry, Jesus goes to Nazareth, His hometown and wants to preach to the people. He is so overwhelmingly rejected that He does very few miracles there. Luke (4:16ff) records that when Jesus commented on the passage from the Old Testament that He had just read, the people tried to stone Him but He escaped. Matthew and Mark record the reactions of the town’s people as asking, “Where did this man get His wisdom and His ability to perform miracles?”

On another occasion, when Jesus was at His home, His

family rescued Him from the crowds who were outside. The family of Jesus said, “He has lost His senses” (Mark 3:21). One year when “the Feast of Booths was at hand” (John 7:2) the brothers of Jesus made some derogatory remarks to Jesus and the author of the gospel of John comments, “for not even His brothers were believing in Him” (John 7:5).

Mark (6:3) and Matthew (13:55) records that Jesus had four brothers, one of which was named James. It is believed that this James became a leader of the church in Jerusalem (Acts 15) as well as the James who Paul identifies to the Galatians as “the Lord’s brother” (Galatians 1:19). Some even think that this same James is the author of the New Testament book, James.

So what caused this unbeliever to become a believer? What caused this “half-brother” of

Jesus to change his beliefs about his “brother”? Why would this James refer to Jesus as “Lord” and to himself as “a bond-servant of God and the Lord Jesus Christ” (James 1:1)?

The answer must be that he heard of the things which Jesus did, especially His death and resurrection. James knew his brother as they were growing up. In the beginning of the ministry of Jesus, James probably heard about the miracles Jesus did but probably paid no atten-

tion to them, after all they were brothers; they had grown up in the same household. They had the same mother. James knew Jesus possibly when Jesus was a teenager or a young man before Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist. The miracles attributed to Jesus, James may have just passed off as, “that can’t be my brother.”

However, if James witnessed the death of his brother, he might have begun to question himself as to whether or not Jesus could have really done the things He said He had done. But, when James saw his brother after the resurrection of Jesus, then things would take on a whole different meaning. When James considered the resurrection of Jesus, the empty tomb, and the appearances of Jesus to various people and groups (consult 1 Corinthians 15:5-8), he possibly had enough evidence to produce the faith

in himself that Jesus was truly who He said He was.

James became a believer in Jesus the same way that we become a believer in Jesus. He had to consider the evidence that was presented about the life of Jesus. He had to meditate upon the things which he read and say to himself, “Do I believe this or not?”

The gospel writers present enough information about Jesus to cause us to believe (John 20:30, 31). If a half-brother of Jesus can change his mind and believe, can we not become believers in Jesus also? Read the testimony, consider the evidence and become a believer just like James.

New pope’s views bind simplicity with ‘complexity’

VATICAN CITY — At gatherings of Latin American bishops, then-Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio was often a star speaker about economic inequities in a profit-driven world. He also has used the forums to warn fellow church leaders about drifting from core Catholic values and teachings.

The twin messages are now expected to frame the beginning of the papacy of Pope Francis: Reinforcing the Vatican’s views on issues such as birth control and women’s ordination that will disappoint reform-minded followers, yet showing an activist streak that could hearten others pushing for greater attention to problems that include poverty and international debt.

These broad ideological strokes — drawn clearly over decades in the Argentine church — will likely be accompanied by growing nuances and initiatives demand-

ed by the modern papacy that requires diplomatic skill, managerial acumen and a degree of pastoral flair.

His emphasis on clerical simplicity and populism, including efforts to keep divorced Catholics

and unmarried mothers in the church’s fold, could raise alarms among staunch conservatives about a reorientation of Vatican priorities after eight years of strict guidance under Benedict XVI, who spent most of his Vatican career as

the main doctrinal enforcer.

Through lesser-known gestures and comments in the past, the first Latin American pontiff also has shown an inclination to expand interfaith outreach to Islam and Judaism, and efforts to further close the nearly 1,000-year estrangement with the Orthodox churches. The pope’s historical namesake, St. Francis of Assisi, is described in church lore as walking unarmed to meet an Islamic ruler during the 13th century Crusades in a gesture of respect and shared humanity.

In his first Mass on Thursday as pope, Francis reinforced his pastoral priorities and service during a brief homily in the Sistine Chapel that was simple and inclusive, calling on all Catholics to help “build” the church and “walk” with the faith. Without such collective spirit, he said the underpinnings grow weak.

“What happens when children build sand castles on the beach?” he told the congregation that

included the cardinals who elected him. “It all comes down.”

The pope then showed a sterner side by citing the words of French writer Leon Bloy, an agnostic who experienced a strong religious conversion before his death in 1917: “He who doesn’t pray to the Lord prays to the devil.”

“To focus on the new pope only as a traditionalist is wrong, as is only to focus on him as a champion for economic justice,” said Ambrogio Piazzoni, a church historian and vice-prefect of the Vatican library. “He is both and much more. This will be a papacy of complexity.”

A Vatican spokesman, the Rev. Thomas Rosica, described the initial period of any papacy as “days of surprise.”


But core elements of Pope Francis’ pontificate are already informed by his Jesuit order. Its nearly 500-year history has been marked by hostility from the Vatican over perceived disobedience.




Columbia High swept all courts against visiting Union County High on Tuesday.

NFL issues proposals for rule changes in 2013 season

The tuck rule could disappear from NFL games if owners approve a proposal from the competition committee to dump it.

The owners, who meet next week in Phoenix, also will consider a change to instant replay rules allowing for a video review even when a coach makes an illegal challenge.

Under the tuck rule, if a passer is in the act of bringing the ball down into his body rather than throwing it and loses control, it is ruled an incomplete pass. The proposal under consideration would make it a fumble.

Competition Committee co-chairman Rich McKay, president of the Atlanta Falcons, noted the contro-

versial history of the tuck rule Thursday. He said the change has full support from on-field officials, particularly now that all turnovers are automatically reviewed.

"What is happening is a great majority of these plays are appropriately called fumbles," McKay said on a conference call. "Then officials go into replay and look at it, and under the rule if the tuck had not been completed (the call) has to be reversed from ... a fumble. They think they can call it and can understand when a passer has lost control of the ball, so we felt more comfortable proposing the rule."


The rule was among the NFL's most obscure until it became infamous during the 2001 playoffs in New England, when Tom Brady

apparently lost a fumble late in a game against Oakland. Initially ruled a fumble, it was reversed under the tuck rule, the Patriots kept the ball and eventually beat the Raiders.

Replay also plays a key role in another potential rule change.

Last Thanksgiving, Detroit coach Jim Schwartz challenged what officials ruled was an 81-yard scoring run by Houston's Justin Forsett. Because all scoring plays are reviewed, Schwartz was not allowed to throw the red flag, and by doing so he negated use of replay. Forsett clearly had been down by contact earlier in the run, but the touchdown stood and the Texans went on to win in overtime.

McKay called the way the rule stood "an anomaly."


105-pound weight class in the Rookie category (two years experience). He was 6-1 during the competition and placed second. Mann is a seventh-grader at Richardson Middle School.

Small lakes can offer big incentives

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission often focuses on big, marquee water bodies, such as the Kissimmee Chain of Lakes or Lake Okeechobee, but also works on smaller water bodies with great fishing potential.

Many smaller lakes have fisheries that compare favorably with big lakes when it comes to catch rates and quality-size fish. Check out recent results on *TrophyCatchFlorida.com* for proof.

Small lakes accommodate smaller boats and are less crowded, appealing to many anglers. Below is a description of some relatively small, public lakes from around the state that are worth exploring with rod and reel.

Alligator Lake in Columbia County is east of U.S. Highway 441 in Lake

City and is between 300 and 800 acres depending on water levels.

As with many north Florida lakes, it has been plagued by low water during the last decade. However, Tropical Storm Debby refilled it last June.

The FWC was quick to take advantage of the lake's restored water levels by stocking redear sunfish and bluegill in September 2012, and a stocking of largemouth bass is planned for spring 2013.

Despite recent droughts, a handful of deep areas held water. These refuges sustained enough fish to renew the fishery, and fish should grow rapidly due to newly available habitat and resulting forage.

In August 2012, Bernard Donnell Jr. caught a near

state-record, 17-pound, 1-ounce trophy bass from Alligator Lake. If rainfall keeps Alligator Lake full, look for this fishery to re-establish itself as a winner.

Merritt's Mill Pond, Jackson County, is east of Marianna and U.S. Highway 90 and covers 202 acres. Merritt's Mill Pond is spring-filled with crystal clear water and lots of submerged plants.

The pond is known for Florida's state-record (4.86 pounds) redear sunfish, which was caught in 1986. It still produces quality redear, plus bluegill and spotted sunfish.

The water clarity that makes Merritt's Mill Pond a scenic gem makes fish shy, which can present challenges to anglers and biologists. Despite the challenge, biologists routinely collect quality bass, and recent sampling indicates an increasing average weight of bass.

With three access points and lots of protection from wind, Merritt's Mill Pond is a small-craft-friendly lake,

and paddlers may have an advantage in catching more and bigger fish.

Lake Gibson, in Polk County, is north of Interstate 4 and Lakeland and comprises 480 acres.

Gibson has a productive bass fishery, and recent monitoring suggests the bass fishery excels in number and size of bass.

FWC's current angler survey shows anglers are reporting an average catch of one bass per hour, which is more than double the statewide average.

Electrofishing surveys on Lake Gibson have collected bass that ranged from a few inches (a sign of successful spawning) up to 9 pounds. Several bass over 8 pounds were tagged last year as part of an FWC study evaluating catch of trophy largemouth bass. A tagged bass (9.5 pounds) was recently caught and released by a local angler.

Lake Gibson is home to quality sunfish and catfish populations, offering multispecies fishing opportunities. The lake has a public boat ramp off

Socrum Loop Road and Lake Gibson Drive.

Lake Baldwin is an Orange County lake just north of State Road 50 near Orlando Executive Airport and is approximately 225 acres.

Orange County is peppered with scores of lakes, some more deserving of your attention than others. Lake Baldwin is one you should try.

There, bass anglers have been experiencing some of the highest catch rates in the area. Bass average 2 pounds or less; however, high catch rates are great for developing a fishing interest in younger anglers.

FWC staff planted eelgrass recently, and the city built two fishing piers. Although there is bank fishing in Baldwin Park, the best fishing is by boat. A public boat ramp is on the south shore. Boaters with motors greater than 10 horsepower have a "no wake" restriction.

Lake Osborne is in Palm Beach County just west of Interstate 95 and Lake

Worth and covers 356 acres.

Amid canals and the urban backdrop of south Florida, Lake Osborne provides exceptional freshwater fishing opportunities. Anglers enjoy catching largemouth bass, sunshine bass, black crappie, bluegill, redear sunfish, catfish and Mayan cichlids in this park-like atmosphere.

Sunshine bass are hybrids (produced and stocked by FWC hatcheries) of striped bass and white bass and handle warm waters better than their parents. Look for them in open-water portions of the lake or deep, constricted areas such as the 6th Avenue pass. A large stocking of hybrids last year should have the fishery primed this spring.

FWC installed nine fish attractors that congregate fish for anglers. John Prince Park provides bank access, a fishing pier and a public boat ramp.

Matt Kenseth gets the most out of his car on his birthday; claims his first win for Joe Gibbs Racing

Matt Kenseth won Sunday's Kobalt Tools 400 at Las Vegas Motor Speedway in much the same fashion as he did the 24 Sprint Cup races he'd won previously — by getting the most out of his car when it counted.

He took the lead by making a gas-only trip down pit road and led the final 41 laps, holding off Kasey Kahne, who not only had a faster car, but fresher tires.

"Matt did everything right," Kahne said. "This is not the guy you want to have to race with 10 (laps) to go because he's going to do everything right. He did a perfect job and we came back second."

But this victory, Kenseth's third at Las Vegas, was different. For starters, it came on his birthday, something that has happened only to two other drivers in the history of the Cup series.

Cale Yarborough won on his birthday, March 27, at North Wilkesboro Speedway, in 1977, and again at Atlanta Motor Speedway on his birthday in 1983, and Kenseth's teammate Kyle Busch won on his birthday, May 2, at Richmond International Raceway in 2009.

Kenseth's victory also was significant because it was his first since joining Joe Gibbs Racing at the start of the season. All of Kenseth's previous victories came while he was driving for Roush Fenway Racing.

Kenseth said in his winner's interview that he never doubted he'd be able to win in Gibbs' No. 20 Toyota. Nevertheless, he was glad to be in Victory Lane after just three races.

"I'm not a huge goal person, but my goal was to win and to win early," he said. "Nobody has put any pressure on me except for myself, but I also know that Coach (Joe Gibbs) hired me to come in there and climb in that car and win races, so you certainly want to do that and you don't want to disappoint people."

Kenseth went on to say that he doesn't believe the racing world has seen all they're going to see of him and his Jason Ratcliff-led team this season.

"I feel like this is the beginning," he said. "I have a lot of confidence,

had a lot of confidence after our first meeting and decided to go do this and just had a great feeling about it.

"And I still do ...

"It's always great to get a win early in the season, but you certainly don't want to act like it stops."

He said he was already thinking about what he needs to do at Bristol Motor Speedway this weekend.

"That's the great thing about the sport," he said. "It never stops. You only get to enjoy [winning] for a couple of days."

Ratcliff sounded as if he and Kenseth are thinking alike about where they're headed this year.

"We've just got a great group here, and we've got Matt and we're going to win a lot of races, I think," he said. "I knew that we would get to Victory Lane at some point, and to do it this early in the season is great, and I'm looking forward to the rest of the season."

Team owner Joe Gibbs had been to Victory Lane in the Sprint Cup Series 100 times before Sunday, but it also was a new experience for him, especially after his drivers had engine problems the past two weeks, and one of them, Denny Hamlin, ran afoul of NASCAR for his post-race comments at Phoenix.

"In tough times, everybody kind of bands together around our place, and we start fighting and we worked our way out of some tough things," he said.

And he said he was proud of his

newest driver and the contributions he's making to the entire organization.

"Obviously, Matt has just been special," Gibbs said. "I think Denny (Hamlin) and Kyle (Busch) both really respect him. I think that's helped a lot. I think he kind of likes working with them, so we've got three guys that really, I think, can get after it and drive a race car."

NASCAR's \$25,000 fine imposed on Denny Hamlin for his mild criticism of the Generation 6 race car and the kind of racing it produced at Phoenix International Raceway, coupled with Hamlin's insistence that he won't pay the fine, has brought into question NASCAR's recent crackdown on free speech by race drivers.

In recent years, NASCAR has been fining drivers, some in secret and some openly, when they said something NASCAR officials deemed critical of the sport.

Many of those drivers have become less willing to express their true feelings.

Driver-turned-TV-analyst Dale Jarrett said last week that in light of Hamlin's penalty, anything any driver says about the racing with the Gen-6 car is going to be looked upon with suspicion.

"Now, when a driver says this car is great, the fans are going to think that all is contrived," Jarrett said.

NASCAR's current method of dealing with outspokenness on the part of its race drivers is far different than it once was.

Some of the sport's all-time great drivers also were some of the most vocal. Many fans remember hearing drivers like Dale Earnhardt, Bobby Allison and Darrell Waltrip making comments much stronger than Hamlin's at Phoenix, but not being punished.

Even in the days when NASCAR founder Bill France Sr. was known for ruling the sport with an iron fist, drivers and car owners could offer criticism without being fined.

In Greg Fielden's "Forty Years of Stock Car Racing," the top drivers and car owners of the day often had strong words about the dangers of racing in the mid-1960s, boycotts by various manufacturers and about NASCAR's rules enforcement.

Some strong words were said at a race at Atlanta in 1966 after NASCAR officials basically threw out the rule book in an attempt to drum up interest in the sport.

After seeing some of the aerodynamic trickery on the "Yellow Banana" Ford that Junior Johnson got by the NASCAR inspec-

tors as well as Smokey Yunick's handiwork on his Chevrolet, Cotton Owens put some similar, questionable devices on his Dodge, driven by David Pearson, who at that time was leading the points standings.

Owens was nabbed by inspectors and withdrew his car in protest, saying: "This was the only way we could be competitive with these other two 'Funny Cars.' You have to fight fire with fire. This may cause me and David to lose the championship, but somebody has to stand up for what is right."

France later acknowledged that mistakes were made by the sanctioning body.

"I admit the rules were bent at Atlanta," he said, promising to "stick to the rule book" in the future.

Pearson and Owens sat out the Atlanta race, and seven others of the 49 on the schedule, but still won the championship.

Despite admitting mistakes, France retained a firm grip on the leadership of the sport. The manufacturers all eventually returned in force.

And many of the most outspoken critics of NASCAR at that time wound up among the first four classes of the NASCAR Hall of Fame.

Hornish Jr. wins Sam's Town 300

Sam Hornish Jr., the one-time IndyCar star now racing in NASCAR's Nationwide Series, dominated Saturday's Sam's Town 300 at Las Vegas Motor Speedway and picked up a trophy that already had his name on it.

It was his second career Nationwide win, and it put him in sole possession of the series points lead.

Hornish and his crew chief, Sprint Cup veteran Greg Erwin, are racing in the second-tier series but hoping to one day rejoin the elite Sprint Cup circuit.

"It is great for us to all be hungry the way we are, and we feel like we have a lot of good opportunities here at Penske Racing," Hornish said. "[Team owner] Roger [Penske] has said many times he wants a third Cup team again, and we want to make sure we do things the right way."

Hornish led four times for a race-high 114 laps, but had to hold off Kyle Busch on a late-race restart to secure the win.

Busch said his No. 54 Toyota was no match for Hornish's No. 12 Ford.

"There at the end it felt like we were getting beat everywhere — all the way around the race track — a solid tenth-and-a-half or two [seconds per lap]," he said. "You hate to see that, especially with so many mile-and-a-half race tracks we go to this year."

Danica's rookie struggles

After a strong pole-winning, top-10 result in the Daytona 500, Danica Patrick has had more rookie-like results in the subsequent two races.

At Phoenix, she qualified 40th, blew a tire, wrecked and finished 39th. Then last Sunday at Las Vegas, she struggled from the start and finished 33rd, six laps down.

"We knew we were going to have tough days, but this is not the kind of tough day we thought about," she said. "We need to figure out how and why it (the car) changes so much from practice to the race and really learn this new car."

"Being behind traffic, the aerodynamics change a lot, and it's a handful. I felt like I was about to spin on the frontstraight. We just have to figure out how to make it better and ... make sure that we never have this day again."

She's now 30th in the standings, 53 points behind leader Jimmie Johnson.

Enfinger gets big win

Grant Enfinger, who races occasionally in the Camping World Truck Series, got the biggest win of his career over the weekend when he won the ARCA Mobile 200 at his home track, Mobile International Speedway.

Enfinger, of nearby Fairhope, Ala., took the lead on Lap 172, then held off 15-year-old Kyle Benjamin on a restart with nine laps remaining to seal the victory, which also was his first in the ARCA series.

"I knew we were going to get here, I just didn't think it would take this long," Enfinger said in Victory Lane. "I started knocking on the door in 2009, and I don't know how many second- and third-place finishes I had."

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
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
